SHANGHAI, Mar. 28.—Fleeing before a rising tide of anti-foreignism, foreigners of nationalities today were moving steadily on Shanghai, some of them running a virtual gauntlet of Chinese fire. The Yangtze river, the coast from other directions through a hostile population.

Shanghai itself was the center of growing anti-foreign feeling in the native district where leaflets and hand-bills were distributed blaming the British for the Nanking bombardment on Thursday and calling for a boycott of British goods and a strike of employees of British firms. The part played by the United States forces was not mentioned.

In the face of this agitation, the barriers about the international settlements were being strengthened steadily.

Fighting on Yangtze

The Yangtze river, chief means of flight from the interior has become the scene of a virtual state of war between Nationalist soldiers on each bank, and foreign vessels carrying refugees. Ships have been fired on nearly every day proceeding down the river, naval vessels themselves escorting merchant ships being the targets for snipers.

Remote districts of the interior which have been cut off by evacuation have been picking up the evacuation notice sent out by radio last week by American Consul General Clarence F. Glavin, with the result that foreigners, in increasing numbers are flocking to the coast.

Promises Poisoning

Two small steamers brought 71 Americans from Nanking to Shanghai, many of them suffering from dysentery and cholera. Eleven were sent to a hospital. Twenty-five Americans arriving at Kiangnan, from Nanchang, have embarked for Shanghai, only five Americans, all men, are still in Nanchang.

Other Americans have been evacuated.

YEAGER IS FOUND GUILTY

Jury Metes Out Life Imprisonment to
Alleged Slayer of Oil Man
From Sand Springs

TULSA, Okla., March 28 (AP)—Walter M. Yeager, New York oil man, was found guilty of murder in connection with the death of Edwin A. Craig, Sand Springs oil operator and punishment fixed at life imprisonment by a jury in district court here tonight. The jury deliberated for one hour and 15 minutes.

Craig was found dead on an oil lease near Kayton, January 10, by a searching party sent out by his wife when he failed to return to his home.

The evidence against Yeager was all gathered circumstantial. Yeager and Craig had been in business ventures together, and early in the day of January 10, Yeager telephoned Craig that he would meet him on the oil lease and pay him \$2,000 which he owed him.

Convict Surrenders To Governor Moody

AUSTIN, March 28 (AP)—Tired of "coddling the law," wounded and conscience-stricken, Severiano Lopez, escaped convict today surrendered to Governor Dan Moody, who three years ago was instrumental in placing Lopez in the gray walls which did not hold him.

Lopez jumped into Governor Moody's office and in halting English told his story of constant fear of capture which led him voluntarily to give himself up to the man, who as district attorney prosecuted and sent him to prison.

As he recited his some half dozen jail escapes, he begged to be locked in prison walls away from the specter of arrest and temptation, which he said he is unable to resist, of another escape.

Lopez was convicted in Travis county district court in 1924 of burglary and sentenced to serve two years under the prosecution of Governor Moody, who then was district attorney.

From the Blue Ridge farm where he was sent, according to his own story, Lopez escaped and went to Dallas. There he was recaptured, taken to Bexar county and convicted on two additional burglary counts for which he drew sentences of four years and two years, respectively, running concurrently.

MORE PROSPERITY IS REPORTED IN TEXAS

SURVEY OF FEDERAL RESERVE
GIVES ECONOMIC TREND
AS BEING UPWARD

(By The Associated Press)

DALLAS, March 28.—Prosperity again is flourishing with the state whose undivided loyalty in cotton recently brought economic depression.

The current survey of the Federal Reserve bank of Dallas, released today, states that increased bank deposits, rising livestock values, and a large volume of public spending at principal cities of the district were outstanding features of the business and industrial situation the last month.

Rising prosperity of the livestock industry is offsetting some of the cotton price depression, the survey noted.

The return to prosperity of the livestock industry has served to offset to some extent the unfavorable features of the agriculture situation. It has impressed upon the farmer the wisdom of raising his own meat and of extending his operations to include livestock as a portion of the products of the farm.

The physical condition of the livestock industry is now better than at any time since 1919 and market values for livestock have turned sharply upward. There is a broad demand for stockers at steadily rising prices. The presence of these factors makes the outlook for the industry exceedingly favorable.

The report notes that the deposits of member banks rose \$11,255,000 between January 26 and February 23 and on the latter date were 2,353,000 greater than on the corresponding date in 1926.

OIL AUCTION IS SLOW

Operators Fail to Offer Big Prizes
Expected in Sale of Indian
Oil Lands

PAWNIUSKA, Okla., March 28 (AP)—Wildcat acreage failed as a bait to oil operators who had come to pay big prices at the Osage Indian lease sale Monday.

Sales amounted to \$2,485,700, fully \$1,000,000 less than conservative forecasts of the sales had estimated. Weakness in markets and a general shut down because of over-production is believed to have been the cause of the lack of sales.

Keweenaw Oil and Gas company set the pace for bidding by paying \$645,000 for a tract offsetting what is known as the Keweenaw extension of the Burbank pool. Shelly Oil company was second with payment of \$55,000 for a tract in the same vicinity.

SAPIRO TELLS OF LIFE

History Starting With Poverty and
Growing Into Success Is
Related to Jury

DETROIT, Mich., March 28 (AP)—Arthur Sapiro, sleek-haired, 42 years old Chicago Jew, who does not look like a Jew, today took the witness stand in today to relate the story of his life in his \$1,000,000 libel suit against Henry Ford.

It was a picture of a most unpromising start which culminated in international recognition, success which he left with the jurors, because his narration was broken by adjournment before he reached any of the story of alleged personal harm and injury to his efforts as an organizer of farm-co-operative done by articles printed in Ford's weekly the Dearborn Independent.

An hour and a half tomorrow will suffice for the last part of the story, William Henry Gallagher, counsel for Sapiro, said at adjournment.

TWO WOMEN HELD

LEGAL BATTLE MAY BE
CAUSE OF THEFT OF
CHILD

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., March 28.—Arrested tonight on a warrant charging kidnapping and demanding a ransom, Frank A. Baskett, 47, was spirited out of town for safe keeping, in custody of officers engaged in pursuit of the abductors of Virginia Jo Frazier, two years old, who Wednesday night was stolen from her crib and returned to her parents last night for \$12,500 ransom.

While Baskett was being conducted to a place of safety, city detectives arrested Mrs. Annie Tomlinson, of north Chattanooga, in connection with the kidnapping and took a second woman into custody for questioning. The name of the latter was not divulged, and no charges had been preferred against Mrs. Tomlinson.

Detective Chief W. H. Hackett declined to discuss the evidence which led to the arrests.

Baskett formerly lived in Dayton, Tenn., where Fred R. Frazier and Mrs. Frazier, the parents of Virginia Jo, also lived. Eight years ago he was acquitted of the murder of Tom Fugit, a brother-in-law. Mr. Frazier represented him at that time as counsel. What connection this may have had with the kidnapping, officers have been unable to determine.

FLIERS NEARING HOME

U. S. Good Will Expedition Reaches
Trinidad City on Last
Leg Home

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, March 28 (AP)—Steadily drawing nearer home, the United States army Pan-American squadron arrived here today from Georgetown, British Guiana, on the mainland of South America.

The planes alighted on the bay and subsequently were wheeled on shore where the American leg consul and local officials received the aviators. A crowd of several thousand persons gave the fliers a hearty welcome.

Major Herbert R. Dargue, flight commander, said that the weather had been heavy while crossing the mouth of the Orinoco and that the aviators had lost sight of land.

The squadron, giving the island of Trinidad its first air mail service, brought a quantity of mail from British Guiana to connect with a European sailing tomorrow saving two weeks time for the mailing.

CHICAGO GANGLAND WAR IS APLAME ONCE AGAIN

DETROIT, Mich., March 28 (AP)—The fate of a kidnapped gangster, police believe tonight, holds a possible solution of the slaying by machine gun fire of two men and the wounding of a third in the latest outbreak of Detroit's bootlegging war.

Entering a third-story apartment hall before darkness in answer to a telephone summons, Joseph Bloom, George Cohen and Frank Wright, Alvin Edward O'Brien, were shot down from behind a steel fire door by a volley of machine gun and revolver bullets. The bodies of Bloom and Cohen were riddled. Wright is in a critical condition at a hospital.

Texas Tour Of East Definitely Agreed On

DALLAS, March 28.—Newsapermen, Chambers of Commerce, and railroad officials, and representatives of business interests of widely scattered sections of the state, gathered in Dallas today to launch plans for an all-Texas products exhibit in the midwest, east and New England states.

It was definitely decided that a special train, carrying a hundred or more Texans, will be run the latter part of May and early June to Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, Cleveland, Washington, Philadelphia, New York, Boston and other cities.

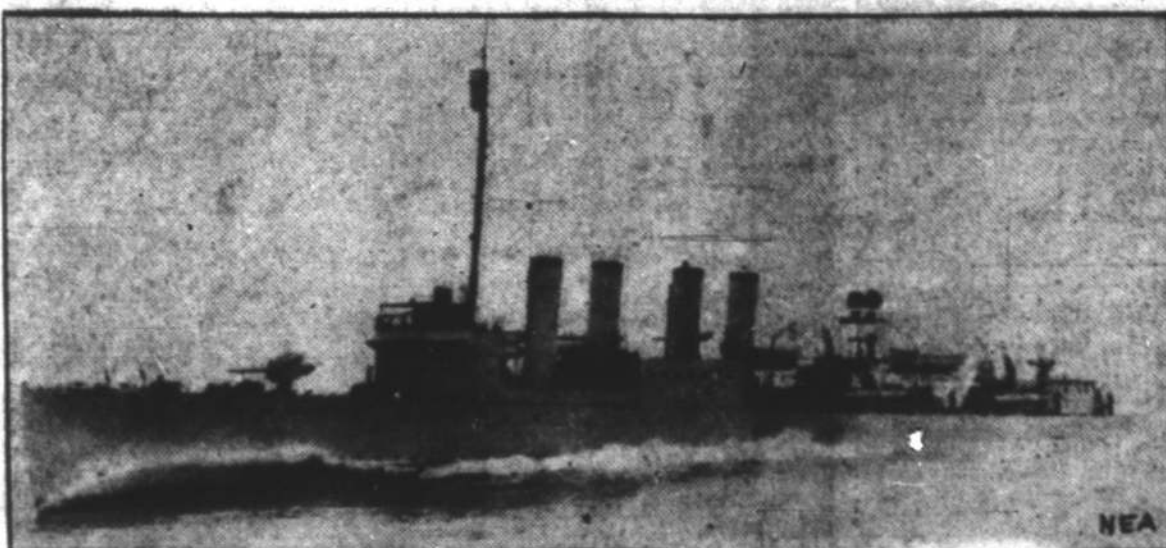
Final details will be worked out at another conference to be held in Ft. Worth, April 11.

FIFTY-FOUR BILLS SIGNED BY MOODY

EXPENDITURE OF \$1,500,000 ON
PRISON SYSTEM IS
INCLUDED

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, March 28.—Governor Dan Moody late today sent to the secretary of State with his signature, fifty-four bills and resolutions passed by the recent session of the legislature.

Among them is the house measure appropriating more than \$1,500,000 to put the prison system on a cash basis, the house motor license fee bill giving counties more road money than they used to get, and the house resolution referring to popular vote next August the question of abolishing the fee system among county officers.

Others of only slightly less import include the house bill dividing the state into nine administrative judicial districts with a presiding judge for each to facilitate handling of district court business and the measure providing for a state service office to handle Texas ex-service men's claims of which there are 7,000 pending.

Old Debt Paid

In a statement, Moody explained that nearly \$900,000 of the prison appropriation is to pay the old indebtedness of the prison system, now outstanding, or which will mature before end of the fiscal year ending September 1.

"The state has been paying interest on that amount at a higher rate than the state ought to have to pay on its obligations," Moody declared as he did several weeks ago when he recommended passage of the bill in a special measure to the legislature.

"More than \$700,000 of the sum appropriated," the governor continued, "is to operate the prison system from now until the end of the fiscal year. This represents only a part of the system's indebtedness inherited by this administration."

EDINBURG, Texas, March 28 (AP)—Canuto Silva and Gerardo Zamora, charged with robbery with firearms, were convicted and sentenced to forty years in the penitentiary in the seventy-ninth district court here this afternoon. The two defendants, with Jose Quintanilla, who is at large, were charged with robbing with firearms, Meyer Redman near Mission on August 13, 1924. Redman has never been seen since his disappearance being a mystery. The entire trial was completed Monday.

PROBE CAUSE OF WRECK

Blame Is Unified in Oklahoma Crash
of Locomotive That Injured
Number of Persons

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 28 (AP)—Cause of the head-on collision of a passenger train and a freight train, on the Rock Island line seven miles east of El Reno, early Monday in which several persons were slightly injured, probably will not be discovered until investigation is completed Tuesday, according to D. Van Hook, superintendent of the road at El Reno.

FAVORITISM CAUSES SLAYING OF PARENT

GIRL CONFESSES BUT MOTHER
DENIES STORY AND SAYS
MAN INVOLVED

WINONA, Minn., March 28.—Because her parents treated her young brother better than they did her, Kitty Jones, 15, shot and killed her father and seriously wounded her mother late last night, she told officials in the county jail here today.

Mrs. Jones is in a hospital with three bullet wounds in her body and her condition was declared to be serious.

The shooting occurred at the Jones farm, near Stewart, Minn.

Mrs. Jones, at a hospital corroborated her daughter's story of the affair, but later denied it, saying that there had been a man with whom her husband had quarreled over alleged attentions to the daughter and that he had committed the act.

The mother refused to divulge the man's name.

GREER CASE IS ARGUED

Attorneys Match Wits With Life of
Murdered Man's Widow in
the Balance

PRYOR, Okla., March 28 (AP)—Attorneys for the state and defense pleaded today in the steamy-breathed atmosphere of the crowded court room here with the destiny of Anita Greer, charged with the murder of her husband, Leonard Greer, in the balance.

Two attorneys yet were to be heard when a recess was taken until tomorrow morning. Indications were the jury would not get the case before tomorrow afternoon.

"Are you going to say to this woman," cried R. A. Wilkerson of counsel for the state to the jury, "that if a husband is stricken by disease as Leonard Greer was, a woman is justified in seeking the palace of ill-fated love?"

"She is the best woman I ever saw," shouted A. C. Brewster of counsel for defense, in shirt sleeves and vest, the reverence of his argument in the warm, damp air having caused him to remove his coat. "She went to the very ditch to help her husband. I will always say she was the most perfect woman for her ministrations to her husband. I ever saw."

MEXICAN TREATY ENDED

Barrier To Unrestricted Shipment of
Arms Is Repealing
Nation Lowered

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The anti-smuggling treaty with Mexico, in effect one year, was terminated tonight in accordance with the state department notification last week to the Mexico City government.

The termination removes a barrier to unrestricted shipments of arms and other munitions into Mexico, and in some quarters the prediction has been made that it might be followed by the raising of the embargo on arms shipments, although the state department has denied that any consideration has been given to such a step recently.

Assistant Secretary Andrews of the treasury said today that termination of the treaty would not affect seriously the assignment of customs agents as officials on duty with the border patrol.

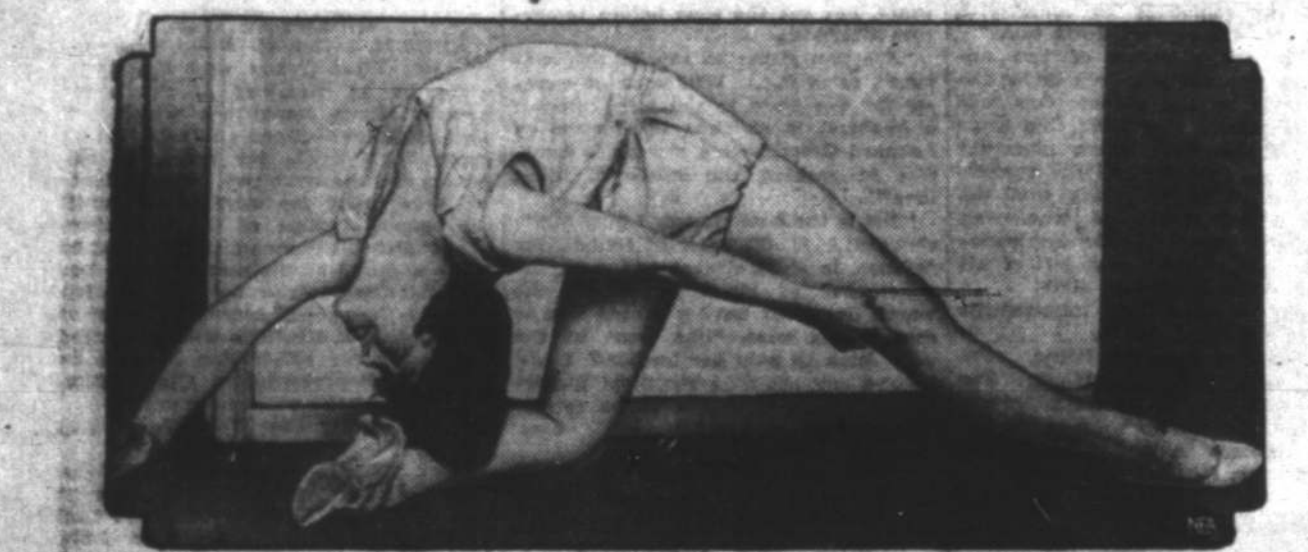

When you once become agile and limber, and when your muscles have learned how to mind the slightest impulses of your will, then there is a tendency to become a contortionist.

Twisting your ankles about your neck or turning handspins becomes a necessary form of expression. So for the advanced members of our little group of serious exercisers we will give one more of these stretchers, then pass on.

Don't Be Discouraged

This last exercise of course that you can drop gracefully on your knees and then slip down until your arms touch the floor back of you. From this comfortable position stretch one leg out straight, and then un-bend the arm on the same side and let it follow the general direction. Find Your Own Rhythm

So find your own rhythm and try to keep to it as you exercise. Make it a part of you. Then when you feel like an engine that is steaming ahead with no brakes to regulate it, and you need to slow down, you have a balance wheel and when you suddenly find yourself too slow and lethargic, you will know that you need to brace up.

Now that the springtime is here, get out into the air and sunshine. Get away from the city, if you happen to live in one, and allow yourself the exquisite pleasure of just enjoying the soft air and the sunshine. If you can just relax a bit, and be happy, you can do much for your beauty and health, even if you can't do this day's exercise.

COTTON IS STEADY
NEW YORK, Mar. 28.—The cotton market showed continued steadiness today, but trading was very quiet and prices fluctuated within a range of 5 or 10 points. July contracts sold up from 14.25 to 14.35 and closed at 14.31, or net unchanged. The general market closed steady, net 1 point lower to 2 points higher.

The opening was steady at unchanged prices but a decline of 3 points, under a little southern selling and liquidation. Liverpool made a fairly steady showing but favorable weather news from the south probably brought in some selling at the start. Comparatively small offerings were absorbed at about the opening prices, with trade interests reported buying of near months to 15 cents, while there appeared to be more commission house or speculative demand for new crop positions, particularly October. The steady forward market and prices worked up from 1.467 to 1.473 for May and from 1.449 to 1.455 for October.

Offerings increased slightly at these figures, and fluctuations later in the day were narrow, some irregular. Twelve up of May contracts was in evidence at times, with traders exchanging May for July and October deliveries at about the recent differences between months. The opinion was expressed in some quarters that there was a considerable interest outstanding in May, but the first notice day is still nearly a month away, and the liquidation of near months commitments is not considered likely to become active for another week or two.

Private cables said continental buying had absorbed holding and some Bombay selling in the Liverpool market, but reported buyers of cotton cloth holding aloof in anticipation of lower prices.

Advices received in the trade here from Osaka said the Chinese situation had not influenced the cotton spinning industry in Japan, but that Chinese mills might suffer from possible labor disturbances.

A NEW SELF MADE KING

Milton Bronner, special writer for a well-known news syndicate in writing of the conditions of Albania, says that again the cry of fire has been raised over the ceaselessly smoldering Balkans.

Italy anxiously informs England that Yugoslavia, backed by the French, contemplates invading Albania to overthrow the Tirana government, with which Mussolini recently consummated an at least defensive alliance. And Great Britain, apparently, accords Italy tacit support of its determination to preserve the Albanian status quo.

Thus the eyes of Europe are turned with intense interest upon a unique character—Ahmed Zogu Bey—president of the Albanian Republic.

Don't be surprised if your newspaper informs you one of these mornings that Zogu Bey has proclaimed himself king of Albania, thus becoming the first Moslem ruler of a European nation.

It will be one of the great international romances. It will mean one more advance in the Mussolini policy of dominance in the Balkans. It will be one more Italian threat to Yugoslavia and Greece, both of which are not exactly on good terms with the Fascist dictator.

Zogu Bey's career is part and parcel of the story of Albania which has been independent only since 1912. By consent of the powers, Prince William of Wied, a German, was made ruler of Albania in 1914. When the war broke out he fled. Then the Austrian army swept in, to be driven out later by the Italians. Notwithstanding the Italian soldiers withdrawal after the war, Italian influences have been felt ever since.

Although the bulk of the million Albanians is Moslem, there has always been a considerable degree of religious tolerance. This is demonstrated by the fact that a couple of years ago the head of the government was Monsignor Fan Noli, an Orthodox catholic priest, who for a time resided in the United States. He fell because it was believed he was too much under Italy's thumb.

As he left the country for exile in Belgrade, Ahmed, also an exile there, returned to Albania and made himself President. Supposedly of pro-Yugoslav sympathies, Zogu began to make a noise like progress. He built 125 miles of roads and the first railway, a stretch of 25 miles between the seaport Durazzo and Tirana.

Then one day he signed with Italy a treaty making Albania a virtual military protectorate of Italy. Nominally, it safeguards the political and territorial status quo of Albania. The two countries agreed to conclude no political or military pacts prejudicial to each other.

In reality, the treaty means that Albania can't deal with Yugoslavia or Greece without Italy's consent; that Italy will send troops to defend Albania against Yugoslavia in case of need; that Italy is pursuing her policy of making the Adriatic an Italian lake. The treaty created a crisis in Yugoslavia and brought about the fall of the cabinet.

Freed from the fear of Yugoslavia, Zogu has been putting on airs. He adopted a rigid royal etiquette in the presidential palace and surrounded himself with a bodyguard of courtiers and soldiers, most of whom are Russian "White" refugees, who are gorgeously uniformed.

And when the proper time arrives, it is now believed he will proclaim himself King Ahmed the First. And Mussolini will smile his approval.

But there is a great difference between what you get and what the wild-cat promoter paints in the imagination of his victims by the precipice of financial ruin. THE SMALL NATIONS

We glory in our size many times, and marvel at our strength, but it is left to the smaller nations to set some wonderful examples of peace and good will one to the other. Setting a resplendent example to sister-nations, Sweden lately has been concluding with her neighbors treaties which mutually pledge perpetual peace. Only the other day the two countries' parliaments ratified such a compact between Sweden and Norway, thus transforming a traditional enmity into what is designed to be an undying friendship. Similar agreements previously had been signed with Denmark, Finland and Belgium. These events surely will make a profound, lasting impression on the life of the world. Perhaps they will mark the dawn of a new era in the relationship of nations. Times without number, individuals have shown toward one another a life-long devotion, characterized by forbearance, a disposition to give and take, to condone mistakes and shortcomings, to smooth over misunderstandings and to exercise always a spirit of tolerance. Such a friendship is grounded in a mutual esteem strong enough to withstand all the rude shocks and petty trials which inevitably enter into every relationship. Why cannot two nations likewise live in harmony? Indeed, this has been accomplished—as witness the century of peace between the United States and Canada, though that was maintained not by formal pledge, but by like interests and purposes. If in some years there has been doubt as to what disposition should be made of the Nobel Peace Prize, it would seem that no such difficulty should arise when the 1927 award is voted. Let it be kept close to home and given to King Gustav V, or to the person principally responsible for his country's peace policy. This statesman apparently has devised a simple formula for solving problems which have vexed diplomats for ages: The two governments sign an undertaking never to go to war with each other under circumstances. That is the purport of the new treaty, which though ostensibly running for twenty years, is self-renewing and thus has the effect of a perpetual covenant. Clothed in such clear, sweeping terms, this understanding all but robs the professional old-school diplomat of his calling. What need has he to practice wiles, to cite precedents or stand upon fine points of "vital interest" and "national honor"? Here is afforded the young folks of the land a source of inspiration radically different from that animating the Carthaginian youth of old, who were compelled to swear upon the altar eternal hatred of Rome. Hereafter the children of Sweden, Norway, Belgium and the other signatory countries doubtless will receive a training at variance with that which French pupils were given after 1871—continually admonished, by parents and teachers, never to forget Alsace-Lorraine. Not "revanche," but brotherhood, doubtless will be the keynote of the Swedish boys' and girls' education. Though they still may be taught a proper pride in the glorious achievements of that mighty warrior, Gustavus Adolphus, they may be told that his descendant and namesake, by promoting amity and understanding among nations, had rendered even more worthy service to his own people and to mankind. Though the soldier-king drew his powerful sword in behalf of the church, the peace-loving Gustaf V has a part in applying its elemental, changeless principles to the affairs of nations, and thus he may aid the coming of universal brotherhood. Is not his the greater glory? How many a martyr gladly has laid down his life on the altar of brotherly love! The Master himself died for men. Peace hath not alone her victories, but her opportunities for service, her occasions for heroism and even martyrdom.

But what if some of the ammunition or the rounds were to land on Uncle Sam and kill some of our soldiers and sailors? Wonder what on earth Uncle Samuel would think about it then?

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Clean Up

With the approach of the annual state-wide clean-up campaign which is set to the week April 13-19, Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, urges the cooperation of the entire citizenry of the state in ridding Texas of dirt and disease producing germs. As a means of assisting towns and communities in checking up on health and sanitary conditions he makes the following recommendations:

Cities.—Municipalities should have sanitary sewage disposal plants, with 100 per cent of houses having sewer connections. Towns not having sewer disposal plants should have a system of sanitary sewers.

Cities with common water supplies should monthly send samples of water to state laboratory for analysis with a report of methods of operation. At present 100 cities are doing this, and it is hoped to see a big increase in this service.

Towns in malarial districts should have a mosquito-control district. All towns should have the standard milk ordinance.

Rural Communities.—In rural communities, special attention should be given to water supplies. Water from shallow wells is liable to contamination through drainage. Wells should be preferably three hundred yards from closets or barns and should be on elevated ground so that drainage will be away from the well. The top curbing should be made of concrete or other impervious material for a distance of several feet, and should be provided with a tight cover. Where a chicken is used for water supply, it should be stucked to prevent mosquito breeding.

Farm premises should be kept clean of rubbish and barnyards and chicken houses should be cleaned regularly.

Campaign Against Typhoid.—As a means of lessening this year the casualty list from typhoid, Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, has announced that the entire month of April will be devoted to a special campaign for typhoid fever prevention.

The reduction in the prevalence of this disease in the United States, Dr. Anderson stated, "is one of the signal triumphs of sanitary science, and has been achieved primarily through the sanitary progress made in cities. In rural districts, where sanitary progress has been much slower, the typhoid rate is still high, thus showing the dire need for an increase in the work pertaining to rural sanitation."

Sanitary measures for the prevention of typhoid fever and other filth-borne diseases are highly economical. In Texas last year there were reported 723 cases of typhoid, and at an estimated cost of \$100.00 for each case, for medical attention, loss of time, and lowered efficiency, the loss to the state would total more than \$72,300.00. When, too, these figures do not take into account the loss sustained by deaths from this disease.

Typhoid Prevention.—The primary measure in the prevention of typhoid is sanitation or cleanliness, and it is within the province of every community to reduce the rate of this disease. The main factors in achieving reduction, in fact, are:

Big Attendance.—Messages from chambers of commerce of the South Plains give assurance that the meeting is to have a large attendance. Every official and member of the South Plains organizations is particularly urged to take part.

Dogs from Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas will compete.

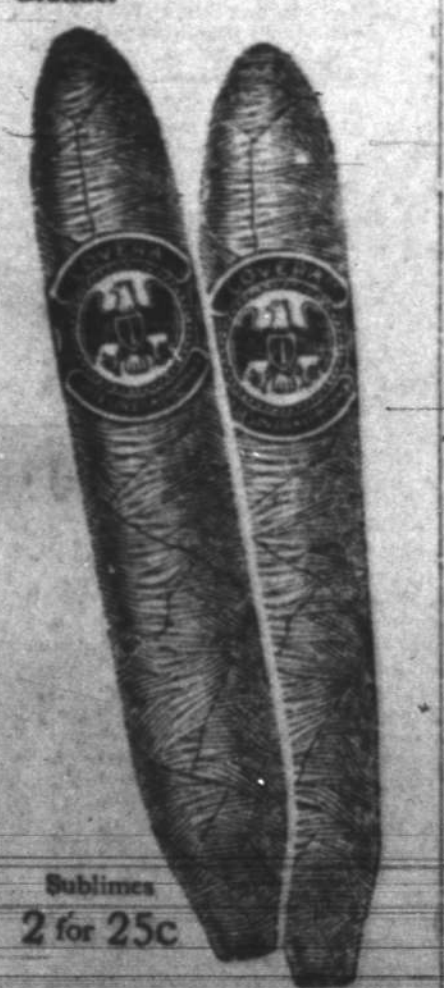

Often it takes an actual happening to point out the defect in a rule regarded as fool-proof when made.

out and runners on second and third to point out the defect in a rule regarded as fool-proof when made.

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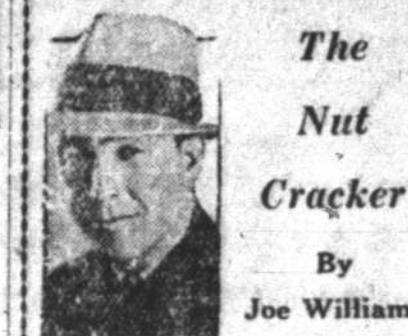

**Papers Brought Up
For Court Opening**

The new court will be presided over by Judge Clark M. Mullison, who was transferred from the bench of the 72nd district and Judge Homer L. Pharr, will preside in the 72nd district.

ated from Yangchow, Swatow, Tamsui, Chinkiang and various other smaller cities. The American destroyer Preble has completed a tour of the smaller ports along the lower Yangtze where 15 men and 14 women and 18 children all Americans were picked up.

Tension Lessens

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP)—Hope for a general outbreak of anti-foreign violence in China was averted today after examination of navy

and state department advices.

All messages showed a relaxation of the high tension at Shanghai which prompted Admiral William's hurry call for reinforcements, already on their way or being mobilized to sail.

Danger to Americans in the treaty ports and the Yangtze valley is far from over, however, and international military and naval forces at Shanghai are taking precautions to guard against mob attack on the international settlement at the instigation of Chinese agitators. For the moment, at least, moderate leaders among the nationalists appeared in control.

Americans Quit Interior

In the meantime Americans continued to pour out of the danger

zone under the urging of Minister Mac Murray, at Peking, and consuls to whom his instructions were passed to leave consulates in the far up-river regions closed and Americans even at Canton have been warned to evacuate.

Aside from the lessening tension at Shanghai, reported officially by Consul General Gurnea and reflected in Admiral William's orders withdrawing part of his blue jacket banding force to the ships, failure of the general labor union ultimatum demanding removal of barriers and defenses around the settlement to be followed up by mob action or the threatened general strike was regarded as evidence that Cantonese military forces were endeavoring to

keep agitation in check. Word of this development from Gurnea was supplemented by his statement that Cantonese troops were guarding the native side of the barriers at the French concession to prevent violence.

BRITAIN STANDS PAT

LONDON, March 28 (AP)—The British cabinet decided today to take a firm stand in China and to make no further concessions there until the present "unstable" conditions have ended and the Chinese authorities have proved themselves capable of establishing order.

Leaving a two hour meeting of the foreign secretary Chamberlain opened to the House of Commons and there entered the members that there would be no further surrender of British

rights in China until the Chinese could prove order wherever their authority exists.

PANAMA MEN WITNESS TEST OF FIRE EQUIPMENT

A demonstration of local fire equipment, conducted under the supervision of the American La France company, was witnessed Sunday by city officials and a party of international citizens from Panama, who are in the market for new equipment.

Tests of pumping capacity of fire trucks were made under conditions by the Fire Club members association. Those here from Panama were Mr. Lewis, city commissioner; Mr. Kline, fire chief; and Mr. F. H. Henson and Mr. C. H. Henson.

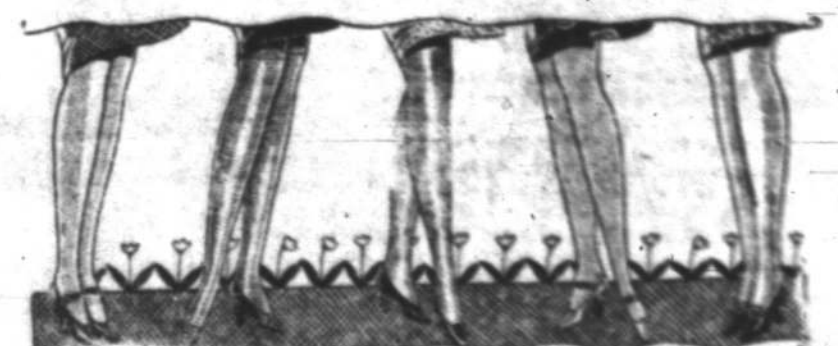
