PRISONER TRANSFERS BANK ROLL

When Sheriff Perkins went to Del Rio a few days ago to see if he could get on the trail of Walter Harris, one of the bank robbers who broke jail here, Jack Johnson, who is being held in the local jail authorized the sheriff to transfer the Jack Johnson bank account from the banks at Del Rio to a Ballinger bank.

Several weeks after Johnson was recaptured and placed in jail here it developed that he had a deposit at Del Rio \$1,200, having a balance of \$600 in two banks at that place. Mr. Perkins called at the Del Rio banks and found that Johnson was in good standing, and transferred the money to the Ballinger banks for the alleged robber.

The money was deposited in the Del Rio banks by Johnson but under another name, twenty days after he escaped from jail at Ballinger. Johnson was supposed to be broke when he escaped from the Ballinger jail, leaving here without a cent, and how he got so much money in such a short time would perhaps make an interesting story.

Since transferring his bank account here Johnson has been checking on it. His bond was fix at \$1,000 in each of the two cases here, and the \$1,200 was not sufficient to buy his freedom like his pal Newton did at Memphis, Tenn.

J. H. Johnson, of Oklahoma, was here Wednesday to see his brother, Jack, and Jack turned over the money he had in the bank here to his brother and he returned to Oklahoma to see if he could make bond for Jack.

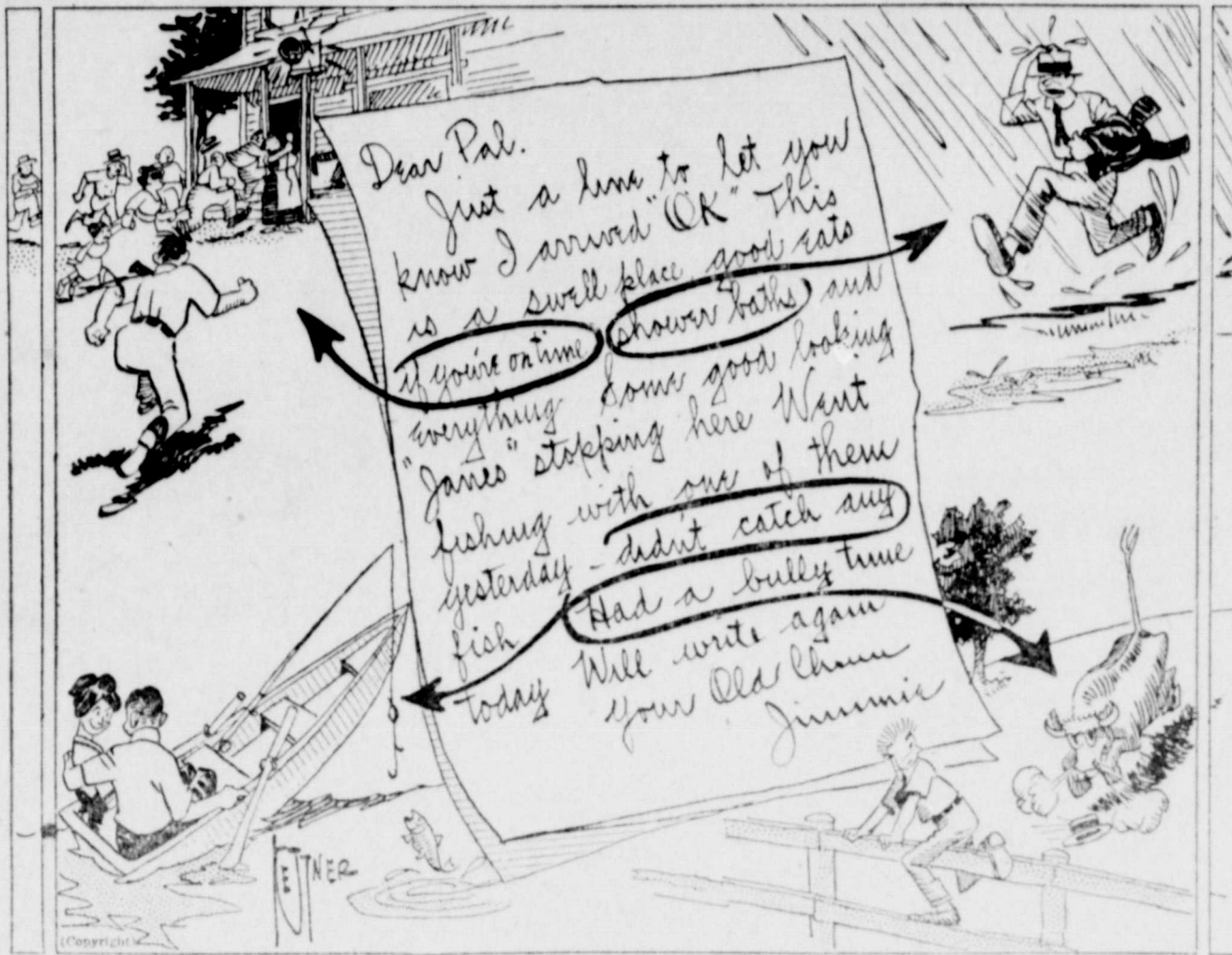

INDUSTRIAL RESOLUTION VOTED DOWN

Austin, July 16.—The Texas industrial board was practically killed today when the House struck out of the general appropriation bill all items for clerical help, traveling expenses and other expenses of that department and reduced the chairman's salary to one thousand dollars per year.

SEVEN LOST WHEN U.S. STEAMER SINKS

Washington, July 15.—One officer and six enlisted men were killed when the American mine sweeper Richard Buckley struck a mine in the North Sea July 12. Two other officers were injured. Two officers and sixteen enlisted men were rescued. Commander Frank A. King remained on the bridge directing the efforts being made to save the crew, and went down with the ship. The remainder of the dead were either killed by the explosion or trapped below deck when the vessel sank.

ALLEGED BANK ROBBER PUTS UP CASH---ESCAPES

"In again, out again, gone again" is the old trick of Willis Newton wanted at Ballinger on charge of robbing the Winters State Bank.

The Ledger published an account of the arrest of Newton a few days ago and stated that Sheriff Perkins was rejoicing over the good news wired to him from Memphis, Tenn., where Newton was arrested for robbery and placed in jail.

Before the necessary steps could be taken and requisition papers obtained to bring Newton back to Ballinger or detain him on the robbery charges in this county, he put up \$2,000 cash bond, gained his freedom and addressed a letter to Mr. Perkins telling the local sheriff not to worry that he would be here to stand trial next fall.

When arrested on robbery charges in Tennessee, Newton waived examining trial and demanded bond. The court fixed his bond at \$2,000, little thinking that the man could make it. Quicker than it takes to tell the story, Newton put up \$2,000 cash, and there was nothing for the officers to do but release him.

The Memphis authorities had Newton to pose for a picture and booked a description of the man before he was released on bond, and Mr. Perkins has received one of the pictures.

The \$2,000 cash bond put up by Newton at Memphis will no doubt be forfeited. He will not appear when the grand jury indicts him, and the letter written Mr. Perkins advising him that he would be here to attend court was of course written only to hurrah the sheriff.

Newton had no money when he left Ballinger, but in putting up the cash for his bond, he shows that he has been doing some good work since breaking jail here.

Newton went under the name of R. E. Wilson at Memphis and made bond under that name. It was not until after he had made bond and been released that the authorities learned that his real name was Willis Newton and that he was wanted at Ballinger.

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Williams have received from the French government a Croix de Guerre medal in honor of their son Pat who fell on the battlefields of France. This is the highest honor medal awarded to men in service by the French government.

Accompanying the medal was a citation from Gen. Foch, briefly stating why this medal had been awarded, and commending Pat for his bravery and heroism. Pat was with the 36th Division and how he met death on the battlefields is known to the readers of this paper.

So far as The Ledger has been able to learn only one other Ballinger boy has received the Croix de Guerre honors. Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Taylor received a similar medal a short time ago in honor of the heroism of their son Major Ewing Taylor, who is now in the hospital at San Antonio.

WILSON INVITES POLITICAL ENEMIES TO A CAUCUS

WITHDRAW TROOPS OUT OF LONGVIEW

Austin, July 16.—With quiet restored at Longview, all state troops, except forty militiamen and three rangers, were withdrawn from that city today, according to announcement made from the adjutant general's department.

If disorder is not renewed by Friday at noon martial law will be lifted and the city again left in the hands of the county and city officials.

Washington, July 16.—It was announced today that President Wilson had summoned fifteen republican senators to confer with him at the White House regarding the peace treaty and league of nations.

Included among the Senators invited to the conference are some of the president's bitterest political enemies. It is believed that the president has called this conference with the hope of eliminating some of the Senate opposition to the treaty and league by explaining in detail to the Senators his work while in Paris.

Bruce Creasy Lands in U. S.

Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Creasy received a radio message from their son Bruce Tuesday, stating that he was nearing the American coast and would arrive safely in America some time Tuesday. Bruce was one of the first boys to go into service from Ballinger. He spent several months at San Antonio as an instructor in the motor branch of the service, and has been on the same job in France. If he makes time made by other boys, he should arrive in Ballinger within ten days or two weeks.

Dr. and Mrs. W. B. Halley left Tuesday afternoon for Seattle, Washington, and will visit many points of interest in the North west and on the Pacific coast. They will be gone six weeks or two months.

Break Downs Delay Work

The Harper thresher turned over Tuesday afternoon while the tractor was pulling it from the L. B. James field to the W. E. Allen farm. High weeds prevented the men in charge from seeing a ditch and when the machine ran into the ditch it turned over and was damaged to such an extent that at least a days' delay will be experienced while repairs are being made.

George Schneider, who was threshing out the Moreland crop on the Joe Routh old place, experienced a break down Tuesday, and a trip to San Angelo was necessary to get repairs, and this machine did not resume operation until Wednesday at noon, a days' delay being caused by the break down.

Farmers are working over time and bending every energy to get as much grain threshed as possible before it rains, and delays are not only expensive but keep the farmers in a state of impatience. However, accidents will happen.

125 BUSHEL OAT YIELD REPORTED

The Ledger did not get it direct from Mr. Nitsch, but the report has reached us through different parties that Ben Nitsch, who lives near Winters, made 125 bushels of oats per acre on a 15 acre patch.

Another heavy yield is reported in the Northern part of the county where it is claimed that a field averaged 110 bushels per acre.

If the reports are true, Mr. Carter will have to take a back seat. 125 bushels of oats at the prevailing prices makes out growing in this country profitable even though a crop is not made every year.

Wheat in the northern part of the county is making from twenty to thirty bushels per acre, many farmers reporting an average yield of twenty-five acres, which at two dollars per bushel is not bad.

School Work Here is Promising Much

Despite the enormous decrease in scholastic population for the year of 1919, Runnels county is making a record in her educational affairs.

Ballinger independent district has increased her teaching force and raised her financial support, and greater preparation is being made for the ensuing term than ever before. Teacher's salaries have been raised, the course of study will be enlarged and more equipment installed.

The Ballinger Summer Normal has been established which promises to become one of the few good summer schools in Texas.

Winters independent district is planning an educational program

that will excel that any of her preceding years. Superintendent Watts is on the job working out a course of study and supervising the reconstruction of the school plant to the end that Winters may have a first class high school by the end of this term. The school board and patrons are behind him.

Miles is voting more building bonds to repair and equip her school plant in modern fashion; and Rowena is adding another teacher and expects to take advantage of the Smith Hughes Act in putting in vocational training.

Six one-teacher rural schools have eliminated, and consolidated schools will be built.

There are one-five teacher school three four-teacher schools, nine three-teacher schools, sixteen two-teacher schools, and twenty-one one-teacher schools in the rural districts of the county, also the St. Joseph private school at Rowena.

There is no district in the county without special tax. Thirty two have voted the fifty cent limit and the others range from twenty to forty cents.

Victory school district No. 27, and Dale district No. 8 have begun to make plans for their new school building which will cost \$3,000.00 and \$4,000.00 respectively. These houses will be modern in every way.

Dietz district, No. 31, has an election ordered for the voting of bonds to build modern school house. Puckett, No. 20, is also voting bonds for a new two teacher school house in their district.

Barnett district, No. 15 and Pearce, No. 10 have recently voted a fifty cent special school tax and expect to reconstruct the old building and add another teacher to each school.

Benoit district, No. 11, has raised her school tax which the first step toward a modern, rural high school in that district.

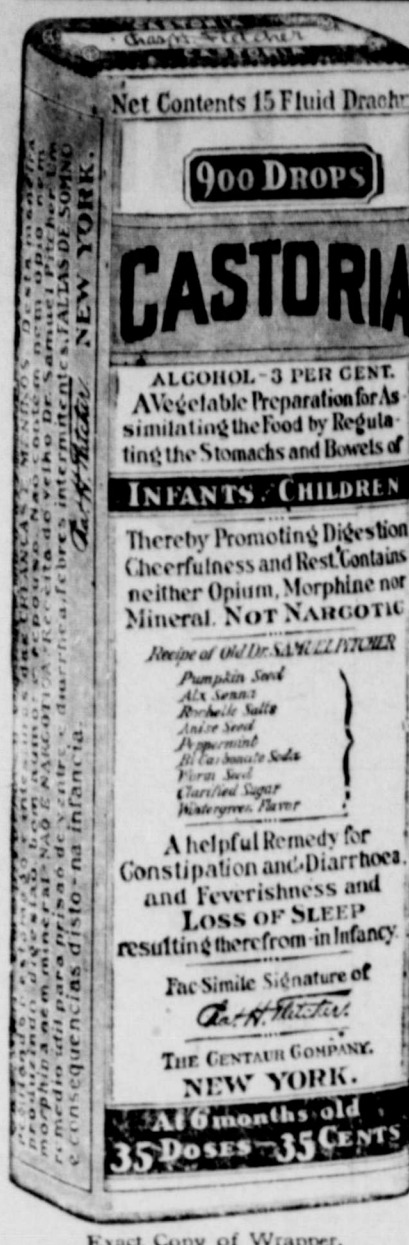

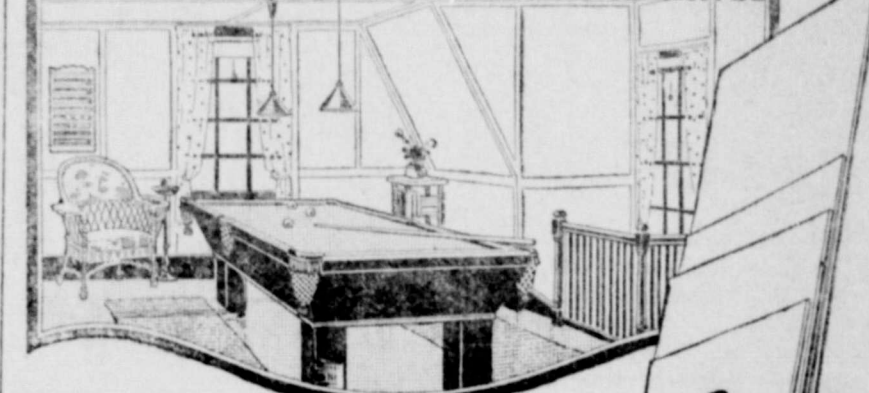

Local Cotton Man Dead at B'wood

After a lingering illness of Bright's disease, T. Glen Heslep died last night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Brooke Smith, Sr., at 1003 Center Avenue. The funeral services will be conducted in the Smith home this afternoon at 5 o'clock, by Rev. W. B. Gray and Rev. L. A. Webb and interment will be in Greenleaf Cemetery. The pall bearers are Messrs. P. L. Howlett, Arnold Kirkpatrick, Ward McConnell, Harry McGhee, August Hoffman and Gardner Thomas.

Mr. Heslep was born at Caldwell, Texas December 5, 1874, and spent most of his life in that city with the exception of some six or eight years during which he was a citizen of Brownwood. Coming here about fifteen years ago he was married to Miss Norma Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Brooke Smith, on Nov. 4, 1906. Mrs. Heslep died in 1910 and shortly thereafter Mr. Heslep returned to Caldwell. While there he was engaged in the cotton business and has been in that business and general merchandising at Caldwell for a number of years. His health has been slowly failing for some time and he recently came to Brownwood with the purpose of going on to California and other western places, but after reaching this city his condition became so serious that plans for the trip to the west were abandoned, death followed within a few days. He will be buried by the side of his wife, in the most beautiful spot in Greenleaf Cemetery.

Mr. Heslep was widely known in the business and social circles of the city, and was universally respected for his uprightness of character. His death is mourned by scores of warm friends as well as by a number of relatives. His mother, Mrs. N. W. Heslep of Caldwell is an invalid and could not attend her son's funeral this afternoon. He has three sisters, Misses Blanche and Zella Heslep of Caldwell, the latter having been here for several days, and Mrs. Raymond Cobb of Dallas, and two brothers, Ed Heslep of Austin and Norman Heslep of Arlington, the latter arriving this afternoon to attend the funeral.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Mr. Heslep was well known in Ballinger having bought cotton here several seasons a few years ago.

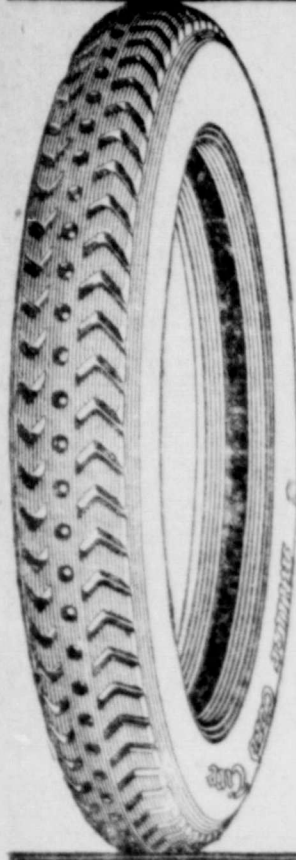

MAY ROUT LIQUOR FROM THE CELLAR

Washington, July 15.—A man's right to keep liquor in his own home, which stood the test before the house judiciary committee must take it chances now in the house.

Notice was served today on the committee by one of its members that when the house resumes consideration of the prohibition enforcement measures an amendment would be offered to make it unlawful for a person to retain possession of liquor stored prior to July 1. The committee, in framing the general enforcement measure eliminated the section which would have made home storage illegal but the big majority polled yesterday by the prohibitionists was accepted in some quarters to mean that the bill, in certain respects will be made still more drastic.

The prohibition measure was not taken up today, the sundry civil appropriation bill vetoed by the president, having the right of way and neither can it be called tomorrow, which is calendar Wednesday, except agricultural appropriation bills also vetoed by the president have privileged status, and prohibition leaders do not expect to resume work on the measure before Thursday or Friday.

The only reference to prohibition on the floor today was by Representative Blanton, democrat, Texas, who wanted stricken from the record the speech by Rep. Gallivan democrat, Massachusetts charging that members of congress had hoarded large quantities of liquor. Speaker Gillett ruled however, that Mr. Gallivan's remarks were in order.
