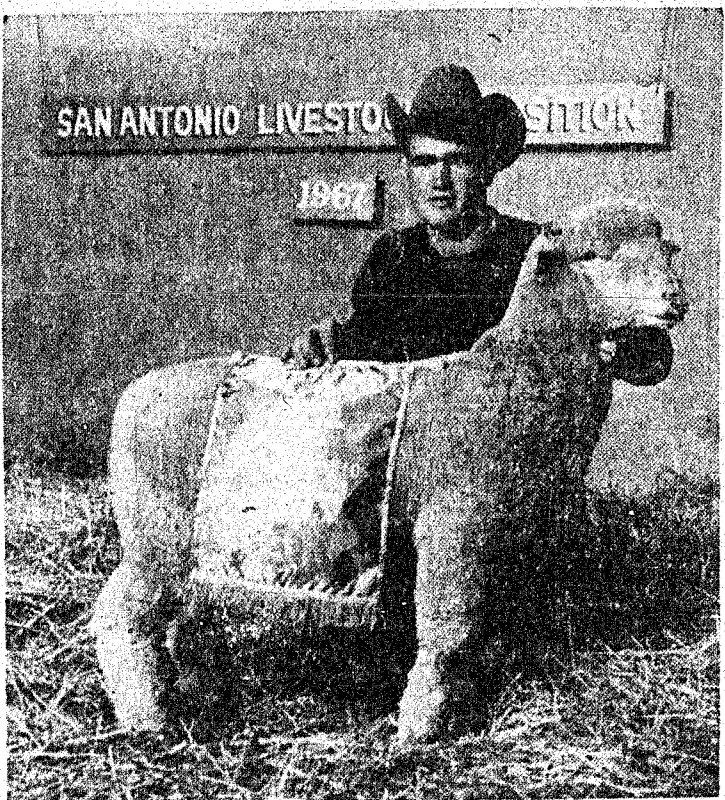

Easter Seal Appeals Go Out This Week

Easter Seal Appeal letters are being delivered this week in Coleman County, according to Mr. Amon Johnston, who is the Easter Seal Representative for the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

As Representative, Mr. Johnston serves as contact representative for disabled persons needing Easter Seal rehabilitation services and also serves as treasurer of the Easter Seal Appeal in Coleman County.

The Easter Seal Society offers physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs, and special equipment loans to enable disabled persons to make the best use of their abilities to overcome handicaps. These services are financed by the annual Easter Seal Appeal.

The society also provides for research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions, finances public education programs, and provides scholarships for training of staff rehabilitation centers.

Mr. Johnston pointed out that all these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

During 1966, the Texas Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services to 11,045 children and 4,986 adults who were in need of rehabilitation services. These services are available to anyone disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, Mr. Johnston added.

The Easter Seal campaign will run through Easter Sunday, March 26.

Mr. Johnston urged increased support for the Easter Seal Society and its program of services to crippled children and adults.

Texas Public Schools Week

has been set this year for March 6-10 and has been for about 15 years a period of special recognition for the work being done in the public schools of Texas. This annual period has generally been in March. It has been noted for special school visitation days, by patron school programs and other community activities connected with education.

During recent years the Santa Anna Independent School District has provided plans for both day and night programs in recognition of Public Schools Week. Recently, in a school board meeting, a question regarding recommended plans for the local public school for Public Schools Week was finally answered with a most unusual decision. Why not this year make it a "Stay at Home With the Children Week," allowing no scheduled night programs during the school week? This idea was unanimously adopted as a suggestion for the week, and as a result, only daytime programs will be held. The week will be

cut short for the students because a scheduled holiday is planned for Friday, March 10. District XI, Texas State Teachers Association, meets in convention in Brownwood on March 10, and all faculty members are expected to attend. The public is invited to visit the schools during the week; if any visitors choose to eat in the school lunchroom, arrangements as to a time must be made the day before the visit to prevent confusion in necessary service to students.

On Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. a general assembly of students is anticipated. A program by one of the school musical organizations is being planned for that time and the public is invited to attend that program.

The Santa Anna Independent School District now covers 308 square miles and had enrolled 395 students on January 13, the end of the first semester of 1966-1967.

The current assessed valuation is \$4,374,450.00 and the tax rate is \$2.00 per \$100 assessed valuation. Tax collections have, in recent years, run about 95 per cent of total. It is required that \$39,000.00 be assigned to match State Foundation Program funds and about \$19,000.00 additional of the total must be assigned to the Interest and Sinking fund. Outstanding serial bonds totaled \$151,000.00 on March 1 and about \$13,000.00 of short term obligations were outstanding. Tax assessment and collection is under contract to the County Tax Collector and to Mrs. John Skelton for a total of 2 per cent on assessment and 1 per cent on collections. This arrangement is the most economical procedure available to an independent school district; the percentages are set by law. They cannot exceed those amounts. The operation of a separate tax office would be much more expensive than the tax collection and assessment plan used currently.

Most school districts are faced with continually rising costs and the local district is no exception. Programs must be designed to fit finances available and there are always needs which are never met.

The local faculty consists of 23 professional personnel and two teacher aides. Three of these teachers and the two aides are made available through Title I, of the Elementary and Secondary Act for which the local school receives about \$18,000.00 this year.

Patrons are invited to visit classes at any time during the Public School Week and the teachers will appreciate the interest shown by the community.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. W. L. Albers of Lyford, Texas; two nieces and two nephews.

Pallbearers were Ford Barnes, H. D. Speck, William Brown, F. B. Hill, Max Eubank and Ed Schrader.

We can fulfill our obligation in this educational triangle by being an active participant in Texas Annual Public Schools Week, March 6th through March 10th, 1967. All schools will have open house during this week. Visit your child's school. It will be a rewarding experience.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C. — The flack and flap over the public disclosure of the subsidization of a number of organizations by the Central Intelligence Agency has been thick and fast these past two weeks.

The Director of the CIA was scheduled in advance of this recent publicity to make a periodic report to my Committee. His appearance had nothing to do with the revelation that the CIA, acting through a number of foundations, was contributing funds to certain student, labor, and church groups and other organizations with international activities. The Director was to brief the Committee on political conditions around the world as related to our own self-interest. Inevitably, however, Committee members' first questions were about the immediate news of the Central Intelligence Agency's operations.

My concern as expressed to the Director was not a criticism of the CIA's purposes and intent but rather whether we had received our money's worth.

In this situation, "Money's worth" cannot be measured in yards, inches, pounds or gallons. It must be measured by the intangible accomplishments of the CIA in combating the ideological advances of communism.

The "cold-war" is as real today as it ever was. In fact, by reason of the great scientific advances, by reason of great strides in transportation and communication, our world gets smaller and smaller. As a result, people are closer and closer together. To relax our guard and not be knowledgeable of the communist conspiracy at home and abroad is to fail in our duty as a Nation to meet the threat.

We live in a world in which ugly mobism is only "demo-

cratic protest" in the opinion of some. We see today public officials barely saved from physical violence when facing the beatnik and peacenik: a world in which every agency of Government entrusted with this Country's physical security is physically attacked and smeared; in which night is day and truth is a falsehood and patriotism has become a sour note.

On March 12, 1964, this column referred to the great influence of students in foreign countries. The university student in Latin America for instance has always carried prestige different from that in our own Country. Presently, however, "campus demonstrations" whose leaders are openly wearing the symbols of communism are coddled and publicized here at home. Now that there is publicity about the attempt of the CIA to have the true spirit of America reported by patriotic students meeting with other students in foreign countries, a few of our "great thinkers" worry about the "integrity of American education."

1700 students at Stanford University listened in-stilled fashion to the Vice President of the United States speak on the Vietnam situation. A mob of 300 outside his car called him a war criminal and shouted that well-known slogan "Burn Baby Burn." The decent conduct of the 1700 was not news.

There is comfort in steps taken, as small as they may be, to prevent total capture of the international student movement by the communists.

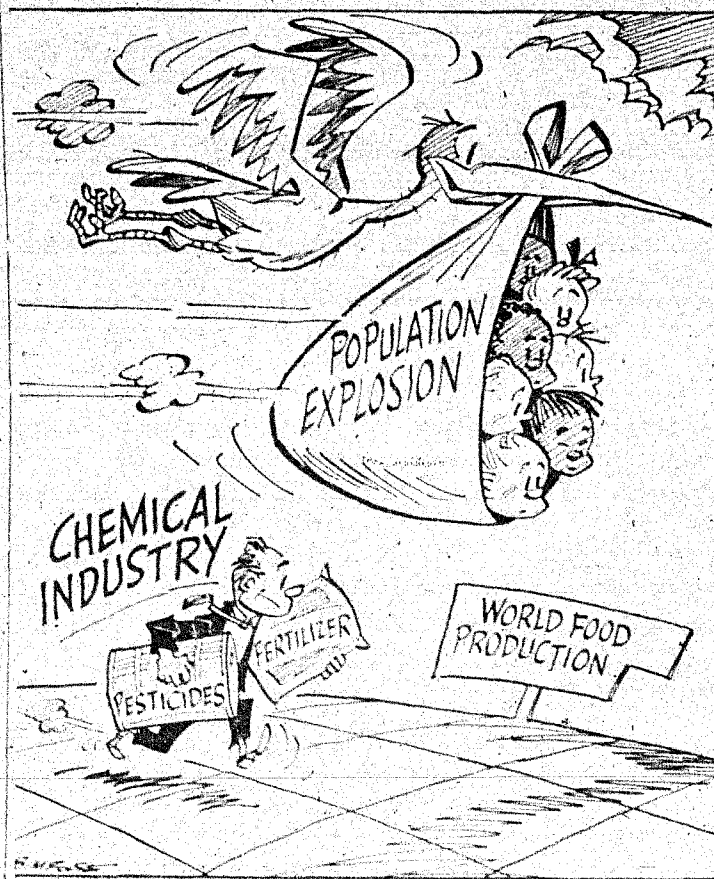

TOOL FOR SURVIVAL

Several years ago, the use of pesticides in agriculture suddenly became an issue of national concern. Many took the extreme view that pesticides should be outlawed altogether in the belief that they posed a health hazard of enormous proportions. In effect, it was advocated that the "balance of nature" be permitted to work its will and that man continue to live in submission to that will as best he could.

The trouble with this "balance of nature" philosophy is that in this day and age of soaring populations, man himself was destined to become its victim. Thus, he has been faced with the choice of stoically accepting the fate of decimation through starvation or of achieving through science a means of protecting his food supply. He chose to protect his food supply. In this effort, pesticides have been one of his major allies, and their use has been accepted as a matter of necessity in what must become a global effort to increase the world's food production. The chief concern of scientists, governmental authorities and industry now lies in intensive chemical research, controlled application and general public education.

The federal government is deeply involved in this matter. Dr. George L. Mehren, Assistant Secretary of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, points out that the USDA is "... responsible for developing, promoting, and using methods of pest control that are effective and as safe as science can make them ... USDA has the responsibility for regulating the interstate sale of pesticides. By a system of registration and label approval ... supplemented by strict enforcement ... we make sure no pesticide product is put on the market until its worth and safety have been demonstrated by the manufacturer ... recognizing that effective pest control is impossible without pesticides, we are availing ourselves of all opportunities for making these materials more selective and less persistent, and their application more precise."

Dr. Mehren further points out that there is convincing evidence that pesticides are being used safely. Analysis of so-called "market baskets" of foods from grocery shelves in major cities revealed that pesticide levels are generally less than one per cent of the safe legal tolerances. Pesticides are indispensable to present-day food production requirements. Breakthroughs in the science of chemistry will in all likelihood enlarge their role in years to come.

Lack of Detailed Medical Bills Info Delays Payments

Doctor bills sent to the medicare carrier for repayment must be itemized and must be marked paid, reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

Blue Shield, the carrier that handles medicare doctor bills in this area, cannot make payment for bills that are not receipted or that show only "services rendered," he said. Sending an unitemized or unpaid bill to the medicare carrier causes delay while Blue Shield writes back for needed information.

Tuley explained that there are two methods of payment under medicare doctor bill insurance. When the doctor agrees, the "assignment" method may be used. The doctor sends the request for payment form to the carrier and bills the beneficiary only for the part of the bill that medicare doesn't cover.

With the second method the same request for payment form is used, but the patient himself sends the claim to the carrier after paying the doctor's bill.

When the beneficiary is going to send the claim to the medicare carrier himself, he fills out the first part of the request for payment form and then either has the doctor complete the second part of the form showing the services and the charges or encloses an itemized receipted bill.

"When a bill is enclosed," Tuley said, "it is very important that it show not only the charges, but what specific services were given to the patient and on what date. The bill must also be marked paid."

Tuley emphasized that a beneficiary who sends in an itemized receipted bill should also be very careful to complete all blanks on the top part of the request for payment form including the "description of illness." Here he said, the beneficiary must simply put down why he went to the doctor or in his own words what was wrong with him.

"Because some beneficiaries seem to be confused or have questions about making a claim for payment of their doctor bill benefits," Tuley said, "we are inviting beneficiaries to come in and see us when they make their first claim. We will be happy to help them make sure that all of the necessary information has been included, and at the same time we can answer any questions they might have."

"If there are some beneficiaries who are unable to come to the Abilene office or to meet a representative of our office when he is in their vicinity, they may mail us their forms with their telephone number and we will contact them if additional information is needed," Tuley said.

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASS'N.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma is an increasingly serious eye disease which occurs most frequently in persons over the age of 30 and affects at least 2 per cent of people over 40.

A recent article in the Journal of the American Medical Association points out that there are 54,000 men and women blind from glaucoma and that an additional 185,000 people are blind in one eye from this disease. In the United States, says the JAMA article, there are about 1.2 billion people with undiagnosed glaucoma and this disease is responsible for 3,500 new cases of blindness each year.

A type of glaucoma, called chronic glaucoma, causes no symptoms until severe damage has been done, says "Today's Health Guide," the manual on health information for the American family. Chronic glaucoma can be detected only by the medical eye physician (ophthalmologist) who uses an instrument to measure the degree of pressure in the eye and another instrument to measure the size of the visual field, or side vision. Every adult over 40 should have a test for eye pressure as well as a test for visual fields when he goes for an eye-glass check.

The second type of glaucoma which affects people over 40 is called acute glaucoma. In this ailment the pressure rises to a very high level and the attack is accompanied by severe pain, redness and markedly blurred vision. Most often the patient must be placed in a hospital immediately and undergo surgery to relieve the pressure. This is successful in most cases, but prompt treatment is very necessary.

The major problem physicians face in dealing with glaucoma is to detect the disease early enough to begin treatment before serious eye damage is done. Many

of the people who have glaucoma don't know it. It is highly important for persons past 40 to have an annual medical checkup for their eyes, even if they don't wear glasses and have no apparent visual problems.

BAD DRIVERS SUSPENDED

Automatic suspension of the license of any driver convicted of certain major traffic law violations would help make our highways safer, says "Texans for Traffic Safety." Proposed in Governor Connally's highway safety program is a 12 month automatic suspension for such drivers, upon conviction.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Legislative redistricting reared its ugly head suddenly and formidably for Texas' House of Representatives. A U.S. Supreme Court decision invalidates the carefully-stuck-together reapportionment act of 1965 for representative districts.

This unexpected court action has changed redistricting from a routine cleanup chore into a major task. It could very well mean the end of the political line for some representatives and possible shaking of the House unity.

The court found population variances among representative districts (up to 26 per cent) too great to meet its one-man-one-vote standard and sent the 1965 districting bill back to Houston federal judges for redraft.

Representatives had figured all that was necessary this year was elimination of the 11 electoral districts criticized by the Houston federal district court. Now, they are faced with wholesale redrawing of lines to equalize population discrepancies over the state.

Speaker Ben Barnes acknowledged "It is a difficult situation."

Big city lawmakers said they would soon introduce a bill to give Bexar, Dallas and Harris Counties one more representative each (high court held they were entitled to that) and adjust other variances.

Sensing that congressional reapportionment also might be struck down, redistricting acts in this area were introduced by Reps. R. L. Vale and Jake Johnson of San Antonio and Rep. Frank Caboon of Midland.

LIQUOR-BY JIGGER
A bill to legalize sale of liquor by the drink in Texas was introduced this week.

Reps. John Field and Dick McKissack, both of Dallas, are House authors. Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso is the Senate sponsor.

Highlights of the bill are:

- Open saloons (banned by constitution) are defined as places devoted exclusively to sale of liquor for on-premise consumption. Bill would legalize mixed-drink permits for qualified hotels, private clubs, restaurants and lodges—businesses or organizations NOT engaged exclusively in the business of selling liquor.

- Measure would authorize mixed drink sales in some 122 counties where on-premise consumption of beer and wine and package store sales already are permitted. Provision is made for local elections in these areas on specific issue of mixed drinks. Failure of election would not affect status of other alcoholic beverages. In other areas, affirmative vote would be required for mixed drinks.

a suspended sentence under the old criminal code may not have his sentence reduced or terminated under provision of the new code.

- A bill to provide benefits to survivors of firemen and law enforcement officers killed in line of duty cannot be made retroactive.

- It is not within the discretion of a trial court to stay an order of the Department of Public Safety suspending a driver's license or motor vehicle registration.

ABORTION BILL

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas has introduced a bill to expand the circumstances under which women can get legal abortions in Texas.

Present law allows an abortion only if delivery of the child would endanger the life of the mother. Parkhouse's bill also would allow abortions in the case of rape or incest, if the health of the mother would be impaired by having the baby, or if there is substantial evidence that the child would be born with a serious physical or mental defect.

This bill would require that a hospital abortion committee approve any abortion by a majority of the five members.

COLLEGE BIDS REJECTED

After extensive hearings, the Higher Education Coordinating Board again declined to give its blessing to creation of four-year colleges in Midland-Odessa, Texarkana and San Antonio.

Midland-Odessa and Texarkana groups want to elevate existing junior colleges to senior college rank. San Antonio legislators propose a

new institution to be built "from the ground up."

Board said all such proposals must await the statewide master plan for higher education, expected to be completed by the spring of 1968.

SHORT SNORTS

Texas travel exhibit, designed to attract tourists to the state, has won top honors in the first of six North American travel shows in which it entered.

Gov. John Connally named Harry Jersign, San Antonio brewing company head, to the State Parks and Wildlife Commission, succeeding A. W. Moursund of Johnson City who did not seek re-appointment.

Albert Allison of Dallas is new executive director of the Republican Party of Texas, succeeding Marvin Collins, formerly of Corpus Christi, who held the job since 1963.

Legislation to stiffen Sunday closing law (removing emergency purchase provision) cleared Senate committee.

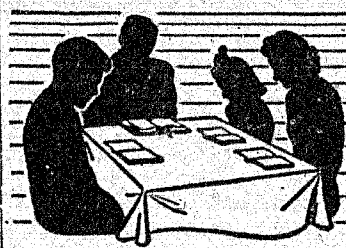
Ground has been broken for \$10,000,000 Institute of Texan Cultures building at San Antonio's HemisFair '68.

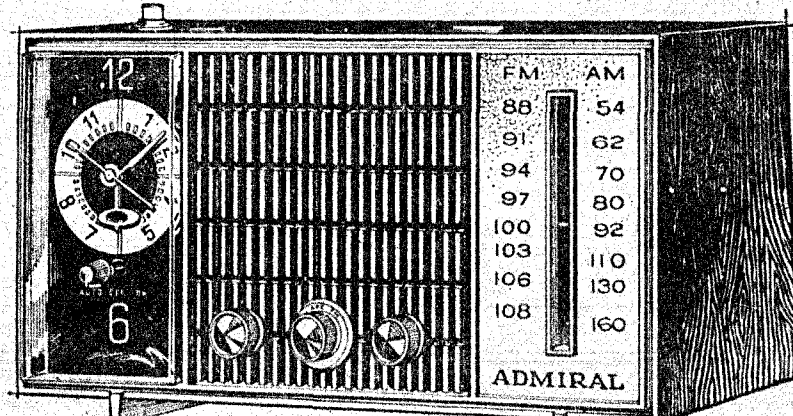
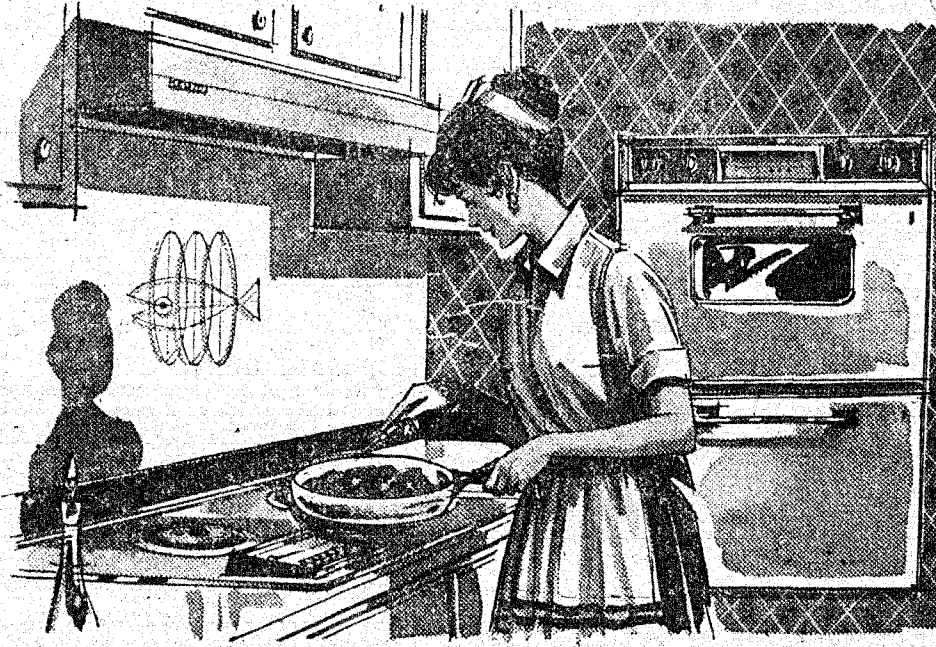

Milk Quality Is No Accident

When you pick up a carton of milk at your doorstep or grocery store, you are selecting one of the best food values available today, points out A. M. Meekma, Texas A&M Extension dairy specialist.

"Many consumers have little appreciation of the high sanitation standards observed on Texas farms," Meekma said. "People may not realize that dairy farms are rigidly inspected by both state and local health departments," he noted.

"No other country in the world produces milk under such strict supervision. For these reasons, high quality is taken for granted in the United States. In few other countries is this true," he said.

Among the careful procedures that must be followed before milk can be sold to consumers are:

1. Dairy cows are fed balanced rations of high quality feeds.
2. They are checked regularly for infectious diseases.
3. They are mechanically milked in sanitary milking parlors.
4. The milk moves from the cows to the cooling tank through stainless steel or glass pipes.

It is immediately cooled to prevent bacterial growth, and pumped from the cooling tank into a stainless steel tank used solely for hauling milk.

The truck delivers the milk to modern dairy plants, where it first passes through a standardizer-clarifier to bring it to the proper condition for bottling. The milk is then pasteurized and homogenized before being bottled in either glass bottles or plastic cartons.

All along the processing line, rigid bacteriological and other quality standards are maintained. The end product is milk, bacteriologically safe, free from unpleasant flavors, and with a storage life that has been tripled in the last fifteen years.

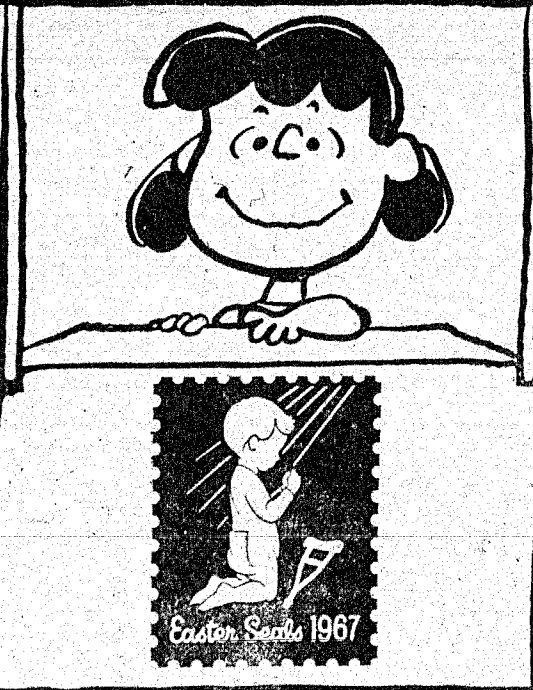

Veteran Benefits Usually Tax Free

Most veteran benefits are tax-free and need not be reported on income tax returns, Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, reminded former servicemen and women.

However, interest earned on GI life insurance dividends left on deposit with the VA is not classed as a benefit but as earned income and must be reported on tax returns. Proceeds of GI policies and the dividends are non-taxable and need not be reported.

Other VA benefits not taxable include education and training allowances, subsistence allowances for disabled veterans in vocational rehabilitation training, compensation and pension payments, grants of "wheelchair" homes, automobiles and all benefits to families of deceased veterans.

Time Expiring For Veterans Loan Program

During the last 20 years nearly six million World War II veterans have purchased home under the World War II GI Bill home loan guaranty program. The amount of the loans guaranteed or insured has totalled about \$45-billion.

Now, this nationwide program is coming to an end on July 25, 1967. . . is the word from the Veterans Administration. There are still more than two million World War II veterans who have unused, unexpired eligibility for a home, farm or business loan guaranteed by the Government . . . and who must use that eligibility or lose it by July 25, 1967, VA reports.

It's not enough that a veteran's application be received in VA by that date. The veteran's lender must have applied by then to have the mortgage guaranteed by the Government.

The VA urges all World War II Veterans who have plans to obtain a GI home, farm or business loan not to wait until the last minute. VA says the July 25 deadline does not apply to Korean Conflict veterans or those eligible under the new GI Bill for Viet Nam Era Veterans.

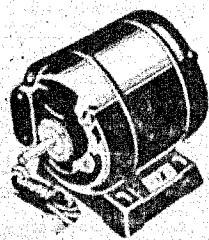

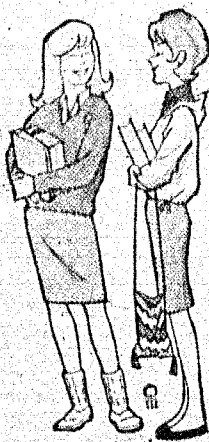

A & M Specialist Notes Trends In Livestock Feeding

Today's consumers, with more money to spend, are demanding higher grades of meat. To meet this demand, commercial feedlots in Texas are growing rapidly, and so with them, certain economic trends are evolving.

Increased production of heavy beef along with further gains in slaughter calf feeding have met this demand, says Dr. Edward Uvacek Jr., Extension livestock marketing specialist and assistant professor at Texas A&M University, Texas, for the most part, still prefer fed calf, however; but their tastes are rapidly shifting to the heavy beef. Further growth in Texas cattle feeding may emphasize the tremendous demands for fed calf in the Gulf Coast states.

With the economics of transportation favoring shipment of feeder animals rather than fat cattle, feeding in this state will become more oriented to local market demands. Furthermore, emphasis should be forthcoming on carcass yields and the ability of an animal to reach the Choice grade at a light weight.

NO "OTHER GUY"

Half of the fatal highway accidents that occur on the rural roads of Texas might well be called "do it yourself" accidents, because only one car is involved, says "Texans for Traffic Safety."

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I think I'm liable for self-employment tax. What form do I use?

A—Use Schedule C-3 to report this tax. Any tax due should be entered on your Form 1040, line 15 page 1, and paid with your income tax.

Copies of Schedule C-3 may be obtained from local IRS offices as well as some post offices and banks.

Q—I got married this January. Can I file a joint return with my wife for 1966?

A—For tax purposes, your marital status is determined by whether you were married or single on the last day of the taxable year for which the return is filed. From the information you provide, you must file a separate return since you were not married until after the close of your 1966 tax year.

Q—I heard a lot about the changes in educational deductions last year. Can I still deduct courses required by an employer?

A—Yes, you can if the course is required by your employer to maintain your present job. The cost of education courses may also be deducted if they are taken primarily to maintain or improve the skills required on your present job.

Q—Our baby had a bad skin rash last year and the doctor advised us to use a diaper service instead of doing them ourselves. Is the cost of the service a medical expense?

A—No. This is not a deductible medical expense.

Q—I have some income from the sale of a home to report. Where should I do this on my 1040?

A—Gains or losses from the sale of property should be reported on Schedule D and then entered on Page 2 of Form 1040 on line 5, Part II. Copies of Schedule D may be obtained from local IRS offices as well as some banks and post offices.

Q—I've heard that you should identify your payments of tax to IRS to make sure they are credited to your account. How do you do this?

A—To identify your tax

payment, put your Social Security number on the check or money order. If the payment is in response to a notice of payment due, please enclose the notice with your payment.

Q—My husband is stationed in Viet Nam with the Marines. What do we do about our 1966 tax return?

A—Military personnel on active duty in a combat zone do not have to file tax returns while stationed there. You may therefore wait to file a joint 1966 tax return until 180 days after your husband leaves Viet Nam. This postponement does not apply to the filing of a separate return by the wife if she chooses to file one.

Q—if you want to file your return for 1966 early because you have a refund coming, indicate in the space provided for your husband's signature that he is on military duty in Viet Nam.

Q—Do I have to report the interest on savings bonds I bought for my son?

A—It depends on how the bonds are registered. If the child is listed as co-owner on the bond, the purchaser is liable for tax on the interest. If the child is sole owner with the parent as beneficiary, the child assumes the tax liability.

Q—My wife and I have always filed joint returns. Can we switch to separate returns this year if it is to our advantage?

A—Yes, you can. We are moving out of the state next month. Should I mail my return to the district office at my new address?

A—No, mail your return to the IRS office indicated in the 1949 instructions based on your address at the time you file the return. However, if you move be certain to leave a forwarding address. One reason many refunds are delayed is that the post office is unable to locate the taxpayer.

Q—When I itemize deductions can I list what I've paid in taxes on wine and liquor?

A—No, there is no deduction for these taxes on individual income tax returns.

Q—I was in an auto accident last year and had to pay part of the cost of having the other fellow's car fixed. Is that deductible?

A—No. The deduction for a casualty loss is allowed only to the person who owns the property.

Q—The statement the bank sent me on interest paid on my savings account last year is wrong. If the bank sends IRS the same information it could mess up my return. Is there anything I can do about it when I file?

A—Yes. Enter the correct amount on your return. You

should consider the possibility that the bank is including interest which is paid automatically by adding it to your account at the proper time—often at the end of the year. It will not appear on your pass book until the bank has brought it up to date.

If you are sure of the bank being in error, you should notify them. An explanation of the error should be attached to the return.

Q—Do I report capital gains on line 1c of Part II of the 1040 where it says capital gains distribution?

A—No. Distributions from certain investment companies, such as mutual funds, which represent capital gain dividends, are to be entered on this line. These amounts are also entered on line 8, Schedule D, Form 1040.

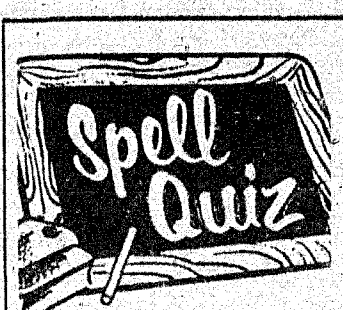
Also reported on Schedule D, in the appropriate sections, are the gains or losses realized upon the sale or exchange of property. For instance, the sale of capital stock which you have held for more than six months is reported on line 5, Part 1 of the form. Additional information about Schedule D may be found in the instruction booklet and on the form itself.

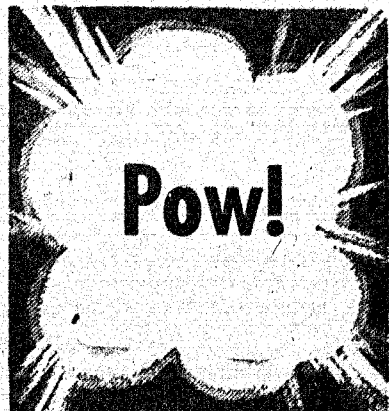

50th Anniversary Of Highway Dept. To Be Observed

The 50th anniversary of the Texas Highway Department will be observed in an "appropriate and dignified manner" under the direction of a citizens' committee headed by former Governor Allan Shivers.

This announcement came from the Department on behalf of the Texas Highway Commission. Chairman Herbert C. Petry, Jr., of Carriazo Springs and members Hal Woodward of Coleman and Jack H. Kuitgen of Waco sent a letter to Shivers outlining their thoughts about a proper celebration of the 1917 creation of the Department. They said Shivers has accepted the assignment.

The celebration, in the view of the Highway Commission that doubled our highway... to our illustrious predecessors (on the Commission), to the administrators and staff members whose unflinching and loyal efforts have earned international recognition, and—certainly not last on the list—Governors and legislators of the past and present who have sponsored and passed excellent laws and made revenue available to build the nation's No. 1 state highway system."

Governor John Connally, representatives of the legislative branch, and Highway Commissioners of other years should be made honorary members of the observance committee, the Commissioners said.

In launching the program, the Commissioners made it clear that details will be left to the lay Arrangements Committee. They told former Governor Shivers he was the "logical person" to serve as chairman, "both because of your statewide and nationwide prestige and your great record of support and friendship for the Texas Highway Department."

"As State Senator and Lieutenant Governor you were instrumental in passing much of our modern highway legislation. As Governor you sponsored a construction program that doubled our highway mileage. And in recent years you have remained actively interested in the highway program."

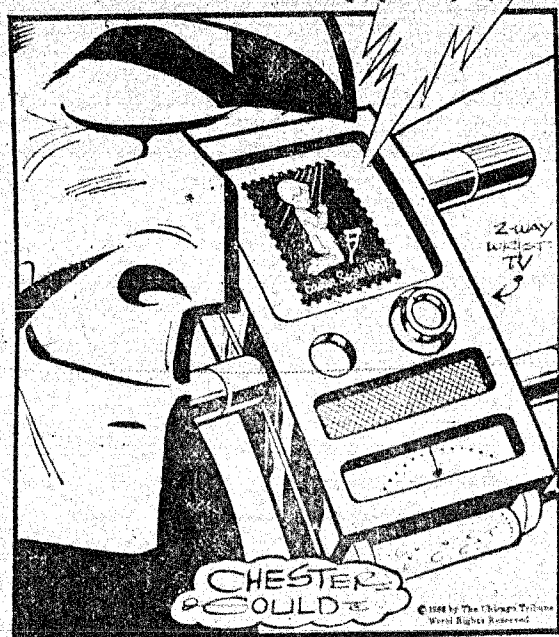
Shivers was in the Senate from 1935 to 1947 and then Lieutenant Governor until he succeeded to the Governorship upon the death of Beauford H. Jester, July 11, 1949. He served as Governor to January 15, 1957. During his 22-year public career the State Highway System grew from 12,338 paved miles to 52,849. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Texas Good Roads Association.

Squirrely? Not At All, Says Expert

Squirrels on a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department project in Freestone County are being dressed in their Sunday best.

Orange and red shoulder girdles and brilliant ear-tags—but there's a reason.

Biologists are live-trapping the animals, tagging them with flashers that may be seen for distances up to 100 yards, to determine possible long-range movement or annual migrational shifts of the squirrel populations.

This is winter-time work aided with feeders in strategic spots to lure the bushytails to the box-type live traps.

Farm Bureau Looking For Rural Hero

Somewhere in rural Texas lives a person who is due a hero's award. He or she, adult or youth, may be a member of your family or one of your neighbors.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council is now seeking that individual and you can tell the Council where he or she lives and about the deed performed.

The individual that is being sought, may have rescued another person from a burning building, saved a child from drowning or performed an heroic deed of another nature.

Whatever the deed, the Council would like to recognize and show their appreciation to the one considered as most typical of the nominees.

The Council will present to the person selected their Rural Heroism Plaque.

Nominees must come from a rural area or from a town of less than 2,500 population.

It is easy to make the nomination. Just submit a narrative covering the heroic deed and include the details, such as the full names of all persons involved and news clippings and pictures if they are available.

Mail the entry before March 10 to Rural Heroism Safety Award, in care of Smetana, Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau, P. O. Box 489, Waco, Texas 76703.

Smetana is secretary-treasurer of the Council. Other officers are Tony Price of Dallas, president, and Bob Etheredge of Fort Worth, the vice president.

Vacuums Feature Variety This Year

Homemaker can choose from five types of portable home vacuum cleaners this year, says Miss Joy Arrington, home management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

The specialist named the upright, canister, lightweight, hand vac, and shop-type cleaners. The shop-type vacuum is designed for heavy-duty jobs such as garages, patios, and fireplaces.

More and more home owners are installing central vacuum cleaning equipment. This system has a motor, fan filter and bag located in a remote home location. Outlets are placed in strategic positions throughout house. A long, portable hose and nozzle are connected to the

outlets for cleaning. Many of the portable type cleaners will sport a variety of new features in 1967. One of the most important of these is a variable speed setting which will permit step-down speeds for cleaning jobs such as draperies and upholstery.

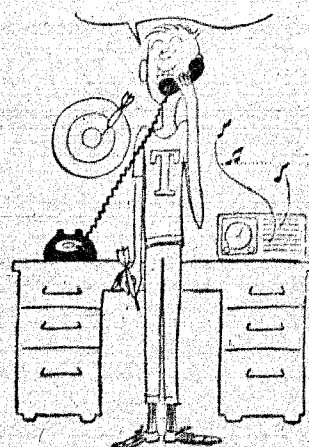
