RODEO PARADE, 4 P. M., FRIDAY; NINE RIDING GROUPS TO ENTER

A gala rodeo parade is promised as the kickoff of the 7th Annual "Texas' Last Frontier Rodeo" at Morton, Friday afternoon at 4 p.m.

The parade, under the direction of J. C. (Jake) Wylie, Parade Marshall of the host Cochran County Sheriff's Posse, will wind through Morton's downtown streets, featuring competing Sheriff's Poses, bathing beauty contestants, competing organizational floats, and the Morton School band.

One distinguished guest in the parade will be Crate Snider of Ropesville, who has three times been elected President of the American Association of Sheriff's Poses and Riding Clubs.

Other riding groups to be on hand to compete for a handsome trophy to be awarded the winner and also runner-up trophies will be the Albany Riding Club, Earl Winters, President; the Earth Riding Club, D. E. Layman, president; the Hockley County Sheriff's Posse, Elmer Barton, president; the Idalou County Sheriff's Posse, Henry Mayfield, president; the Slaton Rangers, John Fondy, president; the Lynn County Sheriff's Posse, Dub Middleton, Sr., president; and the Gaines County Sheriff's Posse (Seagraves), J. F. Singleton, president. Others may also appear, and, of course, the host Cochran County Sheriff's Posse will be well represented.

All ten of the entries in the Jaycees Bathing Beauty Contest will ride in the parade, atop sleek convertibles, with their sponsor's name on each side of the car.

PERFORMANCES SET FOR 8 P. M. FRIDAY, SATURDAY

With the usual passel of last minute, hectic and frantic detail taking care of, directors of "Texas' Last Frontier Rodeo" were trying hard this week to get everything ship - shape for the 7th Annual Rodeo, to be held at the Rodeo Grounds, northeast of Morton.

A worry about the stock contractor that had directors wondering a couple of weeks ago, faded last week when the five man group heading the show found out that A. L. Long of Roswell, N. M., is ready and waiting to provide the stock for the annual show as originally contracted for.

The rumor that Long had sold a bunch of his stock was true, but the worrying was unfounded. Long told them he simply saw a chance to "unload" did so, and almost simultaneously, bought the stock of another rodeo producer. He stated he would have plenty of stock on hand to give area rodeo goers a bang up, good show.

The Rodeo, a two day affair, will get underway tomorrow night (Friday) at 8 p.m. and the second go-round will be held on Saturday night.

There hasn't seemed to be as much talk about the show this year, but advance ticket sales, and the terrific publicity buildup that has been going on for over a month, plus a look at the parade entry list, reveals that this show is likely to be one of the biggest ever held here.

The rodeo directors, Herb Hillman, representing the Cochran County Sheriff's Posse; Joe Seagler, representing the Morton Jaycees; Roy Gentry, representing the Morton Lions Club; Don Hoffman, representing the Roping Club; and Jake Wylie, elected director at large; and their secretary, Mrs. Herb Hillman, have been having meetings daily ironing out last minute problems.

The Posse members have been working hard and long getting the rodeo grounds into shape and among other things that have been added are new permanent concession stands.

Lions Club directors met on Tuesday night of this week to name four team captains and set up their group for the ticket taking. Entry to the rodeo grounds will be through two gates, as usual.

Jaycees this week were working on several projects in conjunction with the rodeo. They were completing the publishing of the Rodeo Program, which already has provided to be the biggest in the history of the show. They also conducted two booster trips, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week distributing 3,000 circulars and telling folks of most of the neighboring cities about the two day show.

And, as further inducement, they set up and manned a ducking board through which persons who threw baseballs at Jaycees on the end of the board were able to win free rodeo and barbecue tickets.

The parade, too, was whipping into shape with the announcement that a bevy of local girls entering the bathing beauty contest, several Sheriff's Poses, and a few floats were to take part along with the Morton High School band.

As for the rodeo contestant entry list, its hard to give any early summary as to how many competitors will be here. Nearly all entries are received on the day before and the morning of the day of the first performance.

Those desiring to enter any one or more of the events for which \$2,500 in prizes will be awarded, prior to application of a charter.

Other members of the committee are Roy Hickman, William Zuber, George Williams, Ralph Burt, and Walter Sandifer.

Unless an organization is set up here, it was said, area farmers must go to Lubbock to secure Nationals.

Cochran County farmers are not eligible to get Nationals from the Muleshoe or Littlefield centers since the counties are in different districts. Levelland can't supply Hockley County's own needs, it was said.

A meeting of the directors of the Farm Bureau has been called for Tuesday night at 8 o'clock in the county agent's office.

The action came out of the labor meeting called Wednesday night at the County Activities Building here.

Following discussion by TEC, Department of Labor, and area labor center operators, the group elected to have the Cochran County Farm Bureau sponsor the organization of the labor center here.

LeRoy Johnson, president of the local Farm Bureau, was named to work in cooperation with a committee named earlier to complete plans for application of a charter.

Membership must be determined prior to application of a charter.

Rev. John Rankin, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Amherst, is to do the preaching for the revival Aug. 2 - 11 at Three Way Baptist church.

Rev. Rankin is the district Royal Ambassadors leader.

D. C. Lindley, a member of the Three Way church, is to direct the singing.

Prayer meetings will begin each night at 8 o'clock, and preaching services will begin at 8:30 p.m. Everyone is urged to attend both the prayer meetings and preaching services.

BATHING BEAUTY CONTEST AND BARBECUE AT ACTIVITY BUILD'G

Two of the biggest pre-rodeo events, the annual Morton Jaycee Bathing Beauty Contest and the Rodeo Bar-b-que sponsored by the Cochran County Sheriff's Posse, will be held in the County Activities Building Friday afternoon, instead of at the County Barn and the Swimming Pool.

The switch, made a week or so ago, was to keep from "spreading out" the events, and keep the afternoon, pre-rodeo activities closer together for the convenience of those who want to take part in the whole program — parade, beauty contest and bar-b-que.

The Bathing Beauty contest, featuring 10 entries, none of whom has competed in the bathing beauty contests held here previously, will be held at 5 p.m., one hour after the scheduled start of the rodeo parade, in the County Auditorium.

Following the bathing beauty contest, the annual bar-b-que will be served in the County Activities Building's dining room — serving time is set for 6 p.m.

This event, sponsored by the Sheriff's Posse, originated years ago as a posse get-together, but has been expanded to include all who enjoy a bar-b-que.

Tickets are on sale by Posse members, or will be available at the Activities Building at \$1.50 and 75c each. They can be purchased in combination with rodeo tickets at HB Service Station or from any Posse member.

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

Washington observers know heaviest domestic pressure for bigger foreign give-away programs comes jointly from socialists and some influential big business leaders.

Socialists' viewpoint is understood. Not so fully understood is how some big business firms cash in on foreign aid. So many in Washington were keenly interested in recent report on a dairy operation as printed in national business publication.

Nine years C. W. Harder ago a firm called International Dairy Supply was formed. It was an immediately brand new firm got Defense Dept. contract to supply milk to armed forces. This firm then merged with Foremost Dairies, who has since completed merger with some of nation's biggest dairy operations. But according to the published report, military business is still bulk of corporation's business, estimated to be somewhere around half billion dollars per year.

In many parts of U. S. consumers pay high fixed price for milk, while there are dairy farmers who claim they do not receive fair share of what consumer must pay. Foremost operates in some of these areas.

In addition, Foremost is doing a lot of milk business in Asia, shipping into the area dry milk solids and condensed buttermilk which when combined with water produces a palatable milk.

Government, through Agriculture Dept., is supplying Foremost with ingredients for a little more than half the value of those

ingredients in the U. S. market. Thus, there is a government subsidy involved.

Company's announced aim is to combat communism among Asia's teeming millions by supplying them milk.

But contrasted to the high sounding aim is report that in Hong Kong, Thailand, other places, company gets around 40 cents per quart for product. Forty cents is about day's wages in area. In Japan, where wage rates are around 8 cents per hour, price is 24 cents per quart.

In addition, government is giving away thousands of dollars of Foremost milk to natives to help them acquire taste for product. Nothing is said as to eventual consequences if all Asians become milk addicts and they cannot get the 40 cents for a daily quart.

Altogether, it was quite a story, especially when born in mind, it is alleged in this published report, this one firm has almost exclusive contract to supply armed forces, thus shutting out independent dairies near defense installations.

It perhaps could be said this is quite a milking operation.

And it also seems but logically obvious that here is one huge combine that is all in favor of big foreign aid programs. It is not illogical to assume it is in there pitching for more of the same. And bearing in mind that one of the parts of this combine, International Dairy Supply, could, when newly formed, share the Defense Dept. contract when there were much, much longer established firms in the business, gives logical ground to an assumption that the firm must have considerable influence in official circles.

Report from ...
YOUR COUNTY AGENT

Some of the irrigated cotton is
looking good but is not putting on
forms as it should. After exami-
ning some of the cotton, the County
Agent found lygus bugs a-plenty in
some of these fields. Lygus bugs
are much bigger than fleahoppers
and do the same kind of damage
except the lygus bugs can puncture
small squares.
The control for lygus bugs is the
same as for thrips and cotton flea-
hoppers. Dieldrin, Aldrin, Hepta-
chlor and toxaphene are all rec-
ommended for control of this pest
in the 1967 Guide for Controlling
Cotton Insects. These guides are
available at the County Agent's of-
fice.
Would advise you not to irrigate
cotton unless it is loading up. Wat-
er will increase the size of the st-
alk but will not add the fruit.

GRAIN SORGHUM STORAGE
More grain sorghum facilities wi-
ll likely be needed on the farm this
fall. That is if we get the rain
during August. If you do not have
enough storage space and need fi-
nancing for this, you will find
loans available through the CCC.
These loans are available through
local banks or directly from CCC.
Owner - Operators, share tenants,
share landlords, and producer part-
ners are all eligible. Applications
for this type loan can be made at
the local ASC office. These loans
can be paid over a four year pe-
riod. Interest is at 4 per cent. Stor-
age structures built with these lo-
ans must meet the standards of C
CC price support program. Adeq-
uate storage space means getting
a better price for your crops, after

the usual low harvest time price
 levels have passed. Suggest you
 contact the local ASC office for
 more detail on this type loan in
 this particular area if interested.

CORN EARWORM AND
SORGHUM WEBWORM
Heavy infestation of corn ear
worm and sorghum web worm have
developed in grain sorghum south
of us where the crops have headed.
These insects feed upon the devel-
oping grain and may cause serious
losses if control measures are not
taken. DDT or a mixture of tox-
aphene gives good effective control
of these pests.
DDT should not be applied to
grain sorghum after the heads are
formed if grain or forage is to be
used for livestock feed. Twenty
percent toxaphene dust at 15 to 20
lbs per acre or toxaphene emulsion
(6 lbs. per gal.) at 2 to 2 1/2 quarts
per acre will control these insects.
These insecticides should usually be
applied late in the morning after
the heads are opened.

OUTLOOK ON MEAT ANIMALS
Steady to stronger prices are in
prospect for fed cattle during the
next several months.
Prices of lower grades of cattle
will decline seasonally. However,
they will be supported by a strong
demand for feed lot replacements
and prices should remain at a high-
er level than last year.
Hog prices will probably contin-
ue above a year earlier during the
rest of the summer and early fall.
However, there is slight possi-
bility that prices at the end of the
year may be below the prices of
late last year, but not much below,
I hope.

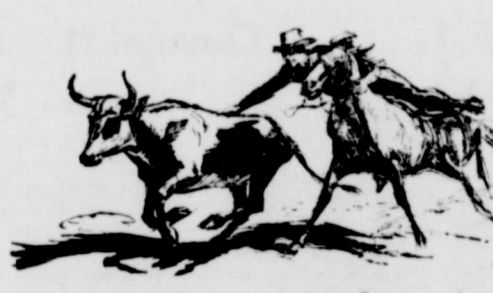

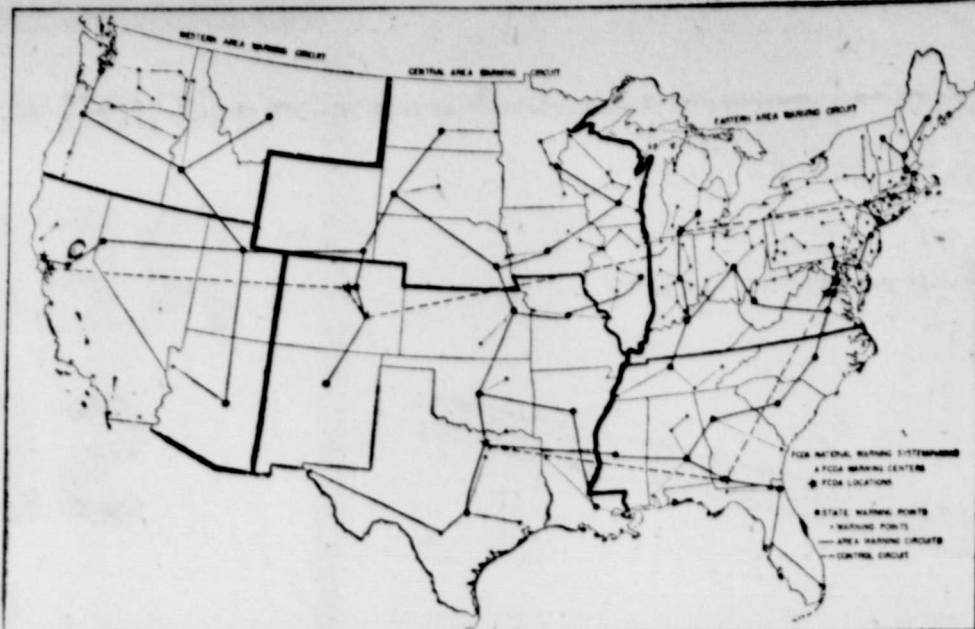

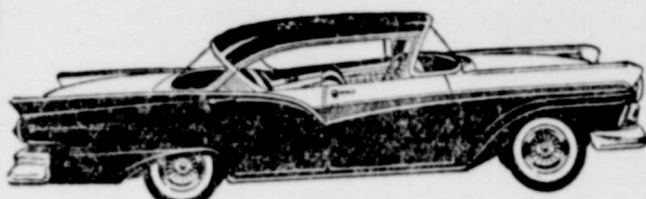

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Several cooperators with the Cochran Soil Conservation district are harvesting, or getting ready to harvest grass seed. Lots of the weeping love grass and blue panic is getting ripe.

J. L. Schoeller cut about 3,000 pounds of weeping love grass seed from about 80 or 90 acres. This was not a bad yield considering that it is a dryland farm, and the grass has been grazed heavily for the past two years. This was on a place near Whiteface that Loyal Schoeller recently purchased. J. L. plans to use some of the seed on his ranch south of Lehman.

Soil Conservation service technicians have recently completed the layout of level borders on about 3 acres on the O. K. Hardin place. This place is operated by Carl Knott.

Carl, a cooperator with the Cochran Soil Conservation district, is in the process of having level borders constructed. When completed, Carl plans to plant a soil conditioning crop such as clover or peas. This crop will help improve the soil fertility and water intake.

After the land has been levelled between the borders, Carl will be able to apply a uniform amount of water in a given length of time and create a minimum of erosion.

Several ranchers in the Cochran Soil Conservation district are giving part of their grassland a tem-

porary rest in the form of summer deferment. Grass, like most any other living thing, needs some rest and proper management for it to stay in a thrifty condition and make maximum growth.

The leaves of grass plants act as a factory. While they are growing, food is manufactured for use by the grass and the surplus is stored in the roots for use later. A periodic deferment gives the grass plant a chance to make some extra growth which helps it to main-

tain its vigor. The extra growth also helps maintain a litter on the ground, which is important in making better use of rainfall and also aids in regulating the temperature of the soil.

Muleshoe I-H Co. Damaged in Fire

Johnson - Nix International Harvester Implement Company of Muleshoe was damaged by fire the night of July 13. The fire of unknown origin caused an estimated \$12,000 damage, according to Muleshoe firemen.

W. B. Young of the firemen, said the first alarm was turned in at about 11:45 p. m. and firemen found the sheet iron building in flames when they arrived.

Two pickup trucks, four irrigation motors and a quantity of shop equipment were among the property lost in the fire.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State, is hereby resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

Section 1 That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62 (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of political districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions or classifications of officers and employees of political districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 14 of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized by this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein.

The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of political districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions or classifications of officers and employees of political districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 14 of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized by this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein.

The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of officers and employees of the State of Texas for such purposes as Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund as are provided by the Texas Constitution shall be deposited in the State Treasury of the State of Texas, and shall be held in the name of the State of Texas, and shall be used for the purposes of the Fund as provided by law.

"Should the Legislature enact such laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

"The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AMENDING SUBSECTION (a) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE."

"The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

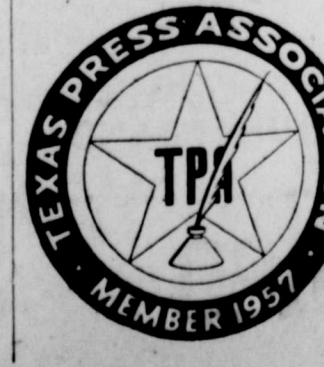

FREEZING SNAP BEANS

Select only fresh, tender beans. Wash, cut or snap off the tips and sort for size. Freeze small beans whole if desired. Put beans in blanching basket, lower basket into boiling water, and cover. Keep the heat on high and begin counting heating time immediately. Heat in boiling water: small beans, 2 minutes; medium beans, 3 minutes; large beans, 4 minutes.

Plunge basket of heated beans into a large container of ice water or running cold water. It takes about as long to cool vegetables as it takes to heat them. When beans are cooled, remove from water and drain.

Pack beans into moisture-vapor-proof container leaving one half inch head space. Label. Store at Zero degrees Fahrenheit or below.

Poor quality frozen green beans may be caused from beans being too mature, from poor packaging, or from being stored where the temperature is too low, but the first reason is generally the cause.

CANNING VEGETABLES

"One Step Cold Pack Method for Canning Certain Vegetables" is a bulletin available from this office. Come by for one or call one and it will be mailed to you.

Twelve pounds pressure should be used in canning vegetables and meats in this altitude. This is so the temperature will be the same as 10 pounds pressure at 1,000 feet elevation.

Fifteen pounds pressure is no longer used for canning any food at this altitude.

Mechanics Get

Lowdown About MVI Changes

L. W. Wilhite, district supervisor for the motor vehicle inspection division, instructed eight mechanics from Morton and the surrounding area, July 15, on new and different aspects of inspection, in a meeting held in the Commissioner's Courtroom of the Court House.

The motor vehicle inspection for next year will include pulling the wheel to check the brake lining. If the lining is the rivet type, and as much as 60 percent is gone, the brake must be relined. The brake must be relined if the lining is the molded type and as much as 75 percent is gone.

In the case of a scared drum, it must be turned down until it is smooth.

Brake fluid will also be checked. If it is as much as an inch low it will have to be replenished. This check will not apply, however, to pole trailers, motor scooters, motor cycles, nor automobiles with under 4,000 miles registered.
