March of Dimes Drive Personnel Lined Up For Push

"Porch Light" Campaign Planned As Wind-Up For Fund

Off to an official start on January 2, the 1953 annual March of Dimes campaign to further the continuing fight on the dread disease of poliomyelitis, was picking up momentum in Ozona this week as the people of Crockett county face the task of raising an unprecedented \$3,000 budget to meet the distressing need in Texas where polio has reached epidemic proportions five years in suc- cession.

Record outbreaks of polio in Crockett county in those years has depleted local chapter funds, which the present campaign will seek to replenish as well as to help the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis retire a huge deficit occasioned by unusual de- mands in late years.

Coin receptacles have been dis- tributed in business houses of Ozona and Ozonans are urged to start now and repeat often the habit of dropping change into these small receptacles. These and other voluntary contributions must account for the county's showing in the January drive.

A plan that has proven suc- cessful in many cities, the "porch light" campaign, wherein resi- dents are asked to turn on their porch lights on a certain night to invite March of Dimes workers to come in for a contribution, will be tried in Ozona on January 29.

Mrs. Jack Wilkins, 1953 drive chairman, has lined up a group of workers who will make a con- certed drive throughout the resi- dential sections on January 29. Then, after dark, the wind-up of the drive will be made via the "porch light" campaign. For those who do not have porch lights, a candle in a window, or a flash- light is suggested.

Mitchell Deep Well Has Heavy Flow Of Gas

Sun Well in SW Crockett Flows 5 1/2 Million Feet Daily

Sun Oil Co. 1 Mitchell, Crockett county Ellenburger, gas discovery in 111-1-I&GN, 40 miles southwest of Ozona, logged three flow gauges then was shut in for bottomhole pressure surveys.

The discovery flowed at the rate of 5,450,000 cubic feet daily on a 30-64-inch tubing choke, 5,475,000 cubic feet daily on a 10-64-tubing choke.

The flow was from open hole between 13,750-14,950 feet. Cities Service Oil Co. 1-B Hobbs indicated. Cisco discovery in 7-GG-GC&SF, nine miles northeast of Sheffield, at total depth of 5,959 feet, was running test tool to attempt drillstem test between 5,924-49 feet. The tool didn't open on the first try.

Operator had cored between 5,938-49 feet, recovering 100 per cent. The recovery was gray, fine to very fine crystalline, dense, slightly fossiliferous lime with some calcite veins and numerous sulphur crystal veins. There was no fluorescence.

Sinclair 1 Friend, wildcat, at total depth of 10,547 feet, running logs. Ralph Lowe 1 Neal, wildcat, drilling below 4,883 feet in shale. Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field: Conoco 28-A Shannon, at total depth of 7,407 feet, waiting on cement on 5 1/2-inch casing set at 7,407 feet.

Elkhorn West Stepout Flows 56 Barrels Oil In One Hour on Test

Continental Oil Co. 28-A J. M. Shannon 22-UV-GC&SF, west stepout to the Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field of Crockett county, flowed 56 barrels of oil in one hour on a drillstem test between 7,277-407 feet.

Tool was open one hour and 56 minutes on the test, with gas to the surface in 15 minutes, mud in 44 minutes, and oil in 56 minutes. Additional recovery was 180 feet of oil and 540 feet of black sulphur water. Flowing pressure was 1,200 pounds and bottomhole pressure was 2,400 pounds.

A core taken between 7,391-407 feet recovered 12 feet of dolomite and chert.

Operator was drilling ahead below 7,407 feet. Conoco 32-A Shannon, 23-UV-GC&SF, Elkhorn field, was drilling below 6,087 feet in sandy shale

Dist. Grid Stars Hear Mr. Football At Banquet Here

Sammy Baugh Speaks As Lions Honor All-District Players

A once all-district football player spoke to a group of all-district 6-B players from the 1952 season at the annual banquet staged by the Ozona Lions Club here Monday night to honor the all-district gridgers.

The speaker, who made all-district when he played for Sweetwater High School back in the thirties, hung a few more records and honors on top of that first honor, including all - Southwest Conference, All-American, All-pro and finally Mr. Football of these United States.

Sammy Baugh, the Slinger, Sammy of T.C.U.'s hall of fame, and the ace footballer of the professional ranks, who in 16 years as a pro, has hung up more records than any football player who ever lived, talked football for thirty minutes or more to an enthralled audience of high school football players.

Love of the game spells the difference between a good player and a mediocre one, Sammy told his attentive audience. Some boys who are not so good this year may be the best in the business two or three years from now, he said, some reach their peak in high school and some don't reach it even in college. Mental attitude, he told his listeners, is 90 per cent of a team's success. Love of the game and a heart to play it to the best of your ability are the best qualifications of a football player.

Every good athlete has a lot of pride, Baugh told the boys. He hates nothing worse than to look bad in a game.

"But if you've given the best licks you've got, if you've done your very best and put out to the limit, win or lose, you can go off the field feeling satisfied," he declared.

C. R. Brace, superintendent of schools at Menard, introduced the all-district players who were presented certificates by Lion Presi- dent Byron Williams. Sammy Baugh obligingly posed with each

In addition to this trophy, which becomes the permanent pos- session of a club member who wins it three times, Mr. Donsky awards individual trophies, replicas of the large trophy, to those showing the grand champion lambs.

Mr. Donsky, in addition to these trophies, awards medals to those showing reserve champions as well as numerous other gifts and awards, and is almost always one of the top buyers of club lambs at the county shows.

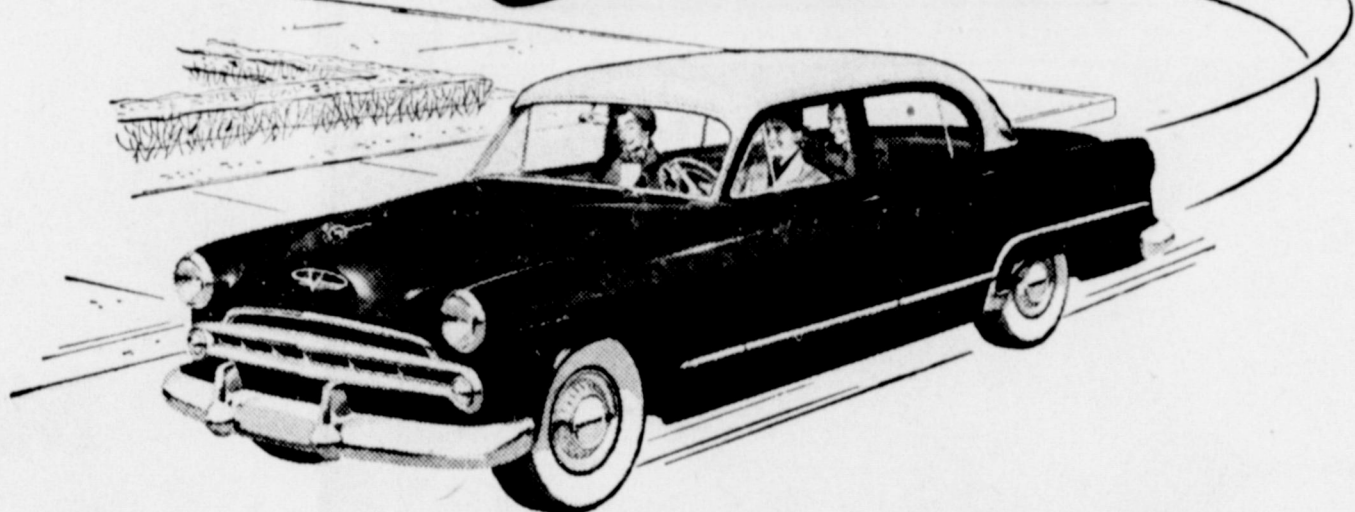

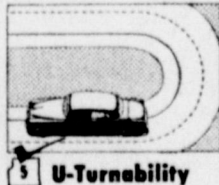

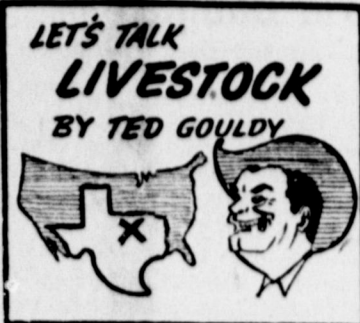

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY

FORT WORTH — Pressure on fed steers and yearlings and on fat lambs resulted in sales weak to 50 cents or more lower at Fort Worth in the first session of the first full marketing week in the new year. Other classes of livestock fared much better, however, than the fed steers and lambs.

Cows were strong to higher, bulls fully steady to strong. Stocker buyers took high grade offerings at strong prices, and less than choice stockers and feeders ruled about steady in both cattle and sheep barns. There continues to be improved inquiry for suitable stocker cows and ewes. That touch of green on the hills and in the valleys as a result of recent rainfall is a prop for these classes.

Hogs ruled strong, selling at a top Monday of \$19.25 to \$19.50 at Fort Worth. Sows drew \$16 to \$17.50.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings sold from \$19 to \$25. Ernest Wisdom, Callahan county, had two loads of 830-lb. heifers at \$24, and V. O. Hildreth, Parker county, had two loads of 917-lb. heifers at \$24. Crystelle Waggoner, Wise county, sold 40 steers at Junior Duke, Scurry county, sold 794 pounds at \$23; Junior Drake, Scurry county, sold 20 steers at 702-lbs. at \$22. Lon and Guinn Campsey—Jack county, sold loads of steers at \$22. Common and butcher cattle drew \$12 to \$18.

Fat cows sold from \$19 to \$25 when good and choice, and cull, common and medium butchers sold for \$10 to \$18.

Stocker steer calves cleared at \$13 to \$23, and steer yearlings sold for \$22 down. Bulls sold from \$12 to \$18.50.

Good and choice fat lambs sold at \$18 to \$20.50, some 90-lb. wool-lambs from Glen McNeas,

Grandfield, Okla., at \$20.50 and Whitehead Bros. of Granbury and C. B. Hodge, Salado, had 83 and 85-lb. lambs, respectively, at \$20, with about No. 1 skins. Jack Kirby, Meridian, had some 82-lb. lambs at \$19.25 and C. L. Bast, Nolan county, had some \$19 lambs at 87 lbs. Medium to fair yearlings drew \$16. Stocker and feeder lambs sold at \$12 to \$17, with some shearing lambs upwards to \$19.50. Old ewes sold at \$7 to \$8.50 and some stocker ewes drew \$9 to \$10. Old bucks sold around \$7 to \$7.50.

The wonderful thing about a dog is that he is ready to share your plans. He is ready to go with you when you want to go, and wherever it may be, by day or by night, in fair weather or foul. He pays you the supreme compliment of freely and openly giving you his full affection, regardless of how worthy or unworthy you are. He never grows tired of your company. His supreme desire is just to be close to you and now and then to have a kind word or a pat from your friendly hand. In return for this simple kindness and a few scraps of food, your dog will follow you through hell or high water.

It makes no difference to him whether you live in a palace or a hovel, or what your social standing is.
