NEW ORLEANS, May 11 (AP)—Mississippi flood waters rearing from the northeastern Louisiana lowlands to advance upon the central part of the state today had failed to find a penetration in the levee along the Des Moines sector, although various authorities had predicted a break along that sector. The levee above New Orleans on the side of the river, inevitable rescue fleets and mobilized at short notice in the Des Moines sector. Levee board officials said embankments would hold and mowed workers in a desperate fight to hold back the sweep of waters.

Local aviators who flew over the levee at Baton Rouge late yesterday, however, that the fight to the levee had practically been won. The water had reached the top of the levee and the boards behind which work were being done were being placed.

Aviators reported they saw three danger spots along the part of the Atchafalaya river, the west bank of the Mississippi from the Old river to the Rouge.

Rescue apparatus was set up at Simpsonton that were ready to be sent to maintain communication with the section.

SCHOOL FUND BILL PASSES THE SENATE

HUNDRED THOUSAND EXTRA
WRITTEN IN FOR THE
SCHOOL OF MINES

(By The Associated Press)
AUSTIN, May 11.—The senate's third major appropriation, providing for support of the state's higher educational institutions, was finally passed today with amendments bringing its total to nearly \$17,000,000.

Approximately \$120,000 was written into the \$14,772,316 measure as drawn by senate finance committee.

The main increase was an additional \$100,000 for expansion of the El Paso School of Mines. Commission of provisions for teachers and other items for the various institutions offered as committee amendments today made up the remainder of the increase.

The house adjourned until Thursday after a 15 minute session today, when it was found that the appropriations committee had not completed the public educational bill.

Senator Wood, chairman of the senate finance committee, estimated today that the four senate bills will run \$256,000 to \$400,000 more than was originally drawn from the commission claimed by those who receive the appropriations.

Atlantic Being Combed For Missing French Aviators

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, May 11.—The eyes of the world were still turned upon the North Atlantic tonight and hope refused to die that France's "White Bird" would be found somewhere in those watery stretches with its two dauntless aviators still alive.

Two days ago the clouds should have parted to reveal the victorious approach of Captains Nungesser and Coli, the daring Frenchmen who sought to win for their country the honor of the first non-stop flight from Paris to New York.

But the clouds rolled solidly across the sky, a curtain, shielding "all from knowledge of whatever grim adventure had befallen the intrepid fliers.

Search Organized
Today the search for the aviators was fully organized, and the United States coast guard was particularly turned over to the task of finding Nungesser and Coli.

Besides that all ships in the north Atlantic were requested to keep special lookout for the fallen plane and the liner France received orders on the other side to alter its usual course to New York as it is to parallel the air route of the fliers.

From Maryland to the northernmost point of the New England coast boats of the coast guard took up the hunt and it was announced at Washington that the search would be extended to mid-Atlantic.

In Canada the Maritime provinces joined in the rescue attempt on the chance that the French plane had been brought down in the icy northern waters.

Twenty Boats Aid
Twenty coast-guard patrol boats and three coast-guard airplanes were patrolling the New England coast today for the miles out to sea. Eight destroyers had been taken from other duty to concentrate upon the search further from land and the entire Timp, which had been watching for icebergs off the grand banks was assigned a 1,200 mile area northeast of Boston.

POPULAR BLUFF IS BURYING ITS DEAD

LIST OF VICTIMS MOUNTS
TO 101 TODAY WITH
100 INJURED

POPULAR BLUFF, Mo., May 11.—After two days of suffering and stress, caused by a tornado which virtually demolished the business section, Popular Bluff tonight began to bury its dead. Ten funerals were held, although the majority were arranged for tomorrow and the next day.

The number of known dead tonight had increased to 101, while a complete inspection of every unit of the hospital is in store for the visitors, officials have announced.

As a special feature of the day, the Lubbock high school band will play upon the lawn of the Lubbock sanitarium. Open house will be observed beginning at 2 o'clock.

May 12 has been set aside as National Hospital Day and the citizens of the entire United States are to go through the hospitals today. More than 10,000,000 people visited the institutions last year.

SNYDER FATE FRIDAY
Date for Sentence is Advanced by
Officials: Death is
Mandatory

NEW YORK, May 11 (AP)—Mrs. Ruth Snyder and her husband, Alvin Karpis, were sentenced today to hang for the murder of her husband, Alvin Karpis, magazine editor, who was sentenced Friday morning instead of next Monday as had been arranged. It was announced today.

Sentence will be pronounced in the Queens county courthouse, where the trial was held, by Justice Townsend. Death sentences are mandatory for both. Appeals, too, are compulsory on first degree verdicts.

No reason was given for advancing the date of sentence.

BONDS SLAYING IS NOW LAID TO JOHNNY FISHER

KILLING OF FORMER
SHERIFF ENDS A
BITTER FEUD

COMPLAINT SWORN

MONROE FISHER WAS
FIRST ACCUSED OF
THE SHOOTING

(By Associated Press)
BELTON, Tex., May 11.—Johnny Fisher, 32, was charged tonight with the murder of former Sheriff Bonds slain on the street here at noon today, shortly after his elder brother Monroe had been charged with the same slaying.

Johnny Fisher was said by friends here to be in Temple. The complaint was based on a sworn statement at a court of inquiry here late today to the effect that Johnny Fisher was recognized as the man who fired the fatal shot.

Monroe First Charged
Monroe Fisher, 30, of Temple, was charged Wednesday night with murder of Albert Bonds, former sheriff of Bell county, on the street here about noon.

Bonds was under indictment for the slaying of Wylie Fisher, father of Monroe Fisher, here some months ago and had surrendered some time later to state rangers, who returned him here against the advice of Bonds' friends. Monroe Fisher was under a charge of assault to murder in connection with the wounding of Bonds since the latter's return, but had not been indicted.

Bonds funeral is to be held at the First Methodist church at 4 p. m. Thursday. Bonds was shot five times about noon at a spot a few yards from where Fisher was killed and died in a hospital about 45 minutes later. After being shot the first time, he cried "tell my wife and children good-bye."

The man drove to the prison entrance in an automobile which was followed by a second car containing several men. J. A. Francis, assistant warden, said prison officials had received information of the plot to dynamite the prison. Guards arrested the man dressed as a priest. Men in the second car fled.

KELLY AGGRESSOR IN FATAL BATTLE

MAID SAYS HE POUNDED ON
RAYMOND AS LATTER
LAY ON FLOOR

(By The Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, May 11.—Emma Lee, maid in the home of Ray Raymond, actor for whose murder Paul Kelly, film athlete, is on trial, this afternoon testified as an eye witness to the fatal fight, that Kelly struck the first blow, and that he pounded Raymond's face while he held the actor on the floor.

Miss Lee, under the state's questioning, described the fight picturing Kelly as the almost unopposed aggressor.

The eye witness to the fight testified Kelly hit Raymond in the face four or five times while he held Raymond's head with one arm around the actor's neck. She testified Kelly struck the last blow as he let go of Raymond, and with which the actor fell against a table.

Previously, autopsy surgeon, A. P. Wagner had stuck to his statement that Raymond died mainly of a cerebral (brain) hemorrhage caused by nothing else than violence, although the defense suggested him to severe cross examination.

The nature of the detailed testimony of the surgeon caused Miss Dorothy MacKaye, widow of Raymond, to become ill. She hurriedly left the courtroom early in the technical testimony and with the support of her friend, Miss Helen Wilkinson, went to the witness room.

One admission from the autopsy surgeon, which was to the effect that the fatal injuries might have been caused by a fall, was claimed by the defense as a point in its favor. The later, however, contention that Raymond's injury was caused by his falling from bed due to intoxication the night of the alleged fight. The witness qualified his admission with the expression of his opinion that the injury was the result of a blow or a kick.

DIES AFTER HOME-RUN

Charlie Coleman Makes Fatal Trip
Around Bases in Practice
Ball Game

PLOTTDADA, May 11.—Charlie Coleman, 18, dropped dead after knocking a home run in a rural school ball game, Tuesday afternoon held at McCoy, 14 miles southwest of here.

Coleman had circled the bases and sat down to rest when one of his team mates noticed that his head had dropped over on his shoulder. Doctors expressed the belief that he had died of heart disease, after making an examination.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Coleman who moved here from Oklahoma about 15 months ago. Funeral arrangements are being held up pending arrival of relatives.

LEAKING GAS IS GIVEN AS CAUSE FOR EXPLOSION

LODGE MEETING ADDS
TO LIST OF DEAD
IN TRAGEDY

ROOM CROWDED

FIREMEN ANSWERING
CALL WERE AMONG
VICTIMS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, May 11.—Eight were known to be dead, 29 were known to be injured and a large force of firemen, policemen and volunteers were working late tonight to clear away debris in a gas explosion which wrecked two buildings, one a two story brick and the other a one story frame, on the southeast side here. From 30 to 35 men were in the Metropolitan lodge of the I. O. O. F. on the second floor and a dozen or 15 persons were in the drug store of O. D. Allen downstairs.

Included among the men in the building were a company of firemen from Fair Park station who had answered an alarm of fire in the building a few minutes previously. A few persons, including one unidentified girl, were injured while standing outside of the building by being struck by flying fragments. Windows in buildings adjoining blocks were shattered and the streets were blocked with debris.

Gas Explosion Terrific

The explosion found only a small trash fire in the rear of the drug store, but a few moments after their arrival the explosion, which firemen said from its character must have been caused by the ignition of an accumulation of gas took place. The building collapsed immediately, the walls fell outward and the second floor and roof dropped on those inside. The grocery store and the barber shop, the latter occupying the frame building, were closed at the time.

The gas is said to have escaped from a leaking meter.

Claud Struve, soda fountain clerk, escaped almost unharmed after being blown through an opening and buried under timbers, bricks and plaster. He never lost consciousness, he said, and managed to dig himself out. O. D. Allen, the proprietor, about 34, and Claud Allen, 24, were in the drug store along with about a dozen patrons when the blast came without warning.

Queen Of Sweets

WAS ONCE \$6-A-WEEK SALESGIRL

LOS ANGELES, May 9.—One day, a few years ago, a little red-haired, blue-eyed girl took an order for cream wafers in a two-by-four candy shop in Lexington, Ky.

"Yes," she'd be sure to have the order out on time. "No," she would not fail the lady, who was giving a dinner party.

An hour later the owner said to her: "You've been called out of town and would not have time to fill the order. He departed, leaving behind him a worried, anxious, fast-thinking little salesgirl.

"We promised those wafers," she kept saying to herself. "And the lady is going to have a party. She's just got to have them."

Moving cautiously into the kitchen at the back of the shop, where she had often watched confectioners inside, she surveyed the scene.

"Why can't I make them?" thought she. And late that afternoon, after many queer-shaped, lopsided, irregular wafers had been made and discarded, she delivered a perfect order to the customer.

"And that was the beginning of my dream come true," laughed Margaret Reardon, now owner of a wholesale candy factory, and manager of a big retail candy concession in a Los Angeles department store.

Two Lessons

"Small as it was, the incident taught me two valuable lessons: one, that an emergency must be met, not side-stepped; the other, that effort and initiative bring practical returns. The day I delivered those wafers, I determined to have my own candy shop—some day."

From a \$6-a-week sales job in a small store to ownership of a \$100,000-a-year business is an extraordinary achievement for a young woman even in these days of economic depression. These maxims are partly responsible for it.

"Don't hire people you have to watch.

"Once, generally speaking, is enough to tell anyone what to do. Too much money invested often spells ruin.

Beat eggs until light. Add sugar, molasses and melted butter. Mix well and add bran and salt. Dissolve soda in sour milk and stir into mixture. Sift flour over raisins and add. Mix thoroughly and drop from spoon into oiled and floured pan. Bake 25 to 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven.

No New Gas Franchise Will Be Let By City Rulers Till Present One Expires

The majority opinion of the city commission of Lubbock regarding the application of A. L. Bullock, of Wichita, Kansas, and others, for a franchise to supply natural gas to Lubbock and other Plains towns, apparently is that no other franchise should be granted at least until expiration of the present contract with A. J. McMahon and associates. On June 30, it was learned from authoritative sources Wednesday.

The Bullock application was made to the commission last week, but in the absence of Mayor Pink L. Parrish, no action was taken, and will not be taken until the return of the mayor, it was said. It was said also that the Prairie Oil and Gas company, one of the largest, if not the largest, operators in the southwest, also is interested in the South Plains gas situation, and possibly may file application for a franchise in the event the McMahon contract is not completed.

City officials apparently are disposed to give Mr. McMahon every opportunity to make good on his contract, and apparently are of the opinion that the project is financed and ready to proceed. Representatives of the company have paid Wednesday night several cars of pipe are now in transit and others are being shipped. It has been said that construction work will begin in earnest about the middle of May. One mile of line already has been constructed in conformity with a contract with the city that this work must have been laid by May 1. This mile is between Lubbock and Station.

New Well Is Begun Near Big Spring

BIG SPRING, May 11—The World Oil company will start this week on section 43, block 24, township 28, McDowell ranch twenty miles southwest of Big Spring. This location is one mile south of the discovery well that was drilled by Bill Gallagher in 1919. Mr. Gallagher is to drill the new location. The wild cat test in 1919 was the first well drilled in this part of the state. It produced about 50 barrels per day, but soon shut off, salt water broke in and it was abandoned.

S. E. J. Cox promoted the development. Geologist are optimistic about the new location according to Mr. McDowell.

Gray Found Guilty In Bad Check Case

W. R. Gray, contractor of Station, charged in county court here with having given a bad check for \$96 to the Five Hubber company, was found guilty and his punishment fixed at \$100 fine and costs, and 24 hours in jail to a jury late Wednesday afternoon.

Gray, who had promised to hold the check and that it had later been paid, was represented by J. L. Ruff.

Dr. V. V. Clark, tried Tuesday on charges of driving without proper license plates was found guilty and penalty placed at \$1.00 and costs. The case is to be appealed.

Clark had previously been sentenced in justice court to pay a fine. He contended that he had the plates in the care of his car at the time of his arrest, and that it was the first day in which the law had come into effect.

BIG AIRPLANE FLIGHT

Nineteen Pursuit Machines Fly from Michigan to Kelly Field San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, May 11 (AP)—Nineteen pursuit planes from Selfridge Field, Michigan, swooped down to Kelly Field here today shortly before six o'clock after completing one of the greatest formation flights the U. S. army has attempted.

The squadron completed the trip of 1,240 miles in approximately twelve and one-half hours actual flying time. The planes left Selfridge Field at 4:30 a. m. today and maintained an average of 115 miles an hour throughout the trip. Stops were made at Belleville Ill., and Muskogee, Okla.

Very few formation flights of this length have been made by the army and never has a formation as large as the Selfridge pursuit group made such a long flight. The flight was made without incident. Mechanics at the two fields where stops were made servicing the planes in record time and sparing them to go on. High winds and tornadoes have swept the region which the planes traversed in the last few days but no difficulty was experienced today.
