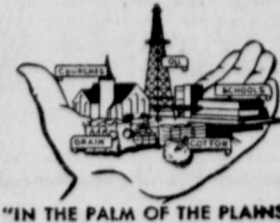

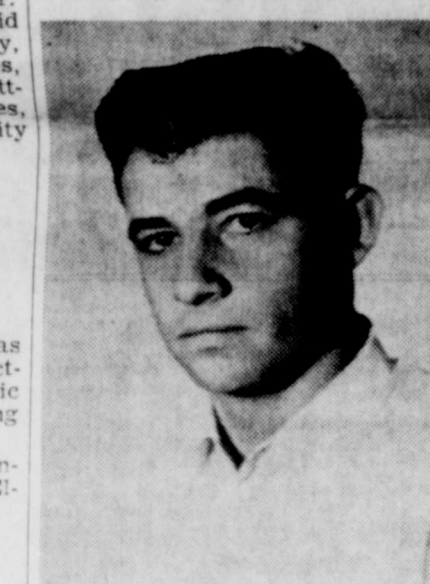
The necessary business will be transacted during which one director will be elected. The term of Hilburn Barrick expires. You may elect someone else or you may re-elect him.

Homestead Exemptions

Russell S. Hardin, county tax assessor-collector, reminded property owners that April is their last chance to render their property for 1964 taxes and to claim a residence homestead exemption from state ad valorem property taxes.

Under the state constitution, a property owner may claim up to

\$3,000 of the valuation for tax purposes of a residence homestead property taxes. The exemption does not apply to county or special district taxes.

The rendition for taxation and the application for the homestead exemption must be made each year before April 30 by the property owner himself, Hardin said.

This applies to persons who pay their taxes as part of their monthly payments to a loan agency or bank on a mortgage as well as to

persons whose property is clear of debt.

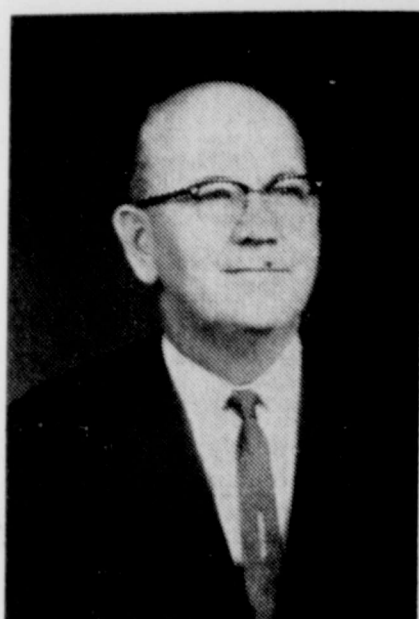
"Banks or loan agencies can pay the taxes on a piece of property on which they hold a mortgage and add the taxes to the monthly payments, but they cannot render the property for taxation or make an application for a homestead exemption. Only the owner can do that," Hardin said.

At the present state ad valorem tax rate of 42 cents on each \$100 of valuation, the homestead exemption can save the owner of a residence homestead up to \$12.60 on the maximum \$3,000 exemption.

The first U. S. Department of Agriculture rulings on the opera-

tion of the cotton bill recently signed into law by the President have begun to arrive. They are far from complete and several ends are left dangling, but at least they do indicate more or less what we will be faced with for the 1964 crop year.

The new legislation gives cotton farmers three choices. They can (1) plant total effective allotment, (2) plant total effective allotment plus five percent, or (3) plant domestic allotment only. Effective allotment means total 1964 acres, including any acreage

received under release and reapportionment, and by planting this amount the farmer will qualify for the base loan rate of 30 cents per pound, middling-inch cotton at average location, on all production. In effect, then, this alternative makes the producer's operation essentially the same as in 1963 with the exception that his price support is lowered by 2.5 cents per pound.

The second alternative is much more complicated and it is here that the dangling ends appear. Under this choice the producer qualifies for the 30 cents loan rate on all production from his effective allotment, but is eligible for neither price support nor export payments on production from the extra five percent. This five percent is called "export" acreage, and bond must be furnished to assure that cotton from this acreage will be exported, presumably at somewhere near the world price of 24 cents. Operators who adopt this plan will be required to make application to the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices and furnish bond by June 1.

In the third option, by planting only his domestic allotment the grower qualifies for the 30 cent base loan in actual production, plus additional income through Payment-In-Kind certificates worth 3.5 cents per pound on the normal yield from domestic acreage. A grower's domestic allotment will figure about 67 percent of his effective allotment except in the case of small farms, where domestic allotment is the smaller of his 1964 effective allotment or 15 acres. The normal per-acre yield will be calculated on an individual farm basis and the total PIK payment will be this per-acre yield times 3.5 cents times the number of domestic acres. The Commodity Credit Corporation has announced that it will assist the farmer in marketing PIK certificates.

Acreage diverted from cotton under this plan may be planted to non-controlled crops. On farms with domestic allotments of more than 15 acres, however, the feed grain acreage may not exceed the feed grain base for that farm. In calculating the domestic allotment, the Department has assumed that domestic consumption of cotton will rise to 9.6 million bales in the 1964-65 marketing year. And, at the four-year average yield (1959-62) it would take 10,766,000 acres to produce this amount. This is about 67 percent of the 16,000,000 national acreage allotment.

The new legislation provides for payments to be made through PIK certificates to domestic users of raw upland cotton grown in the U. S. to remove the price inequity between U. S. cotton users and foreign users. The Department has ruled that this payment will be at 6.5 cents per pound on raw cotton used from now until July 31, 1964, end of the current cotton marketing year.

How the program will operate in this respect from the beginning of the new marketing year August 1 until July 31, 1966, will be decided by the Department after hearing cotton industry views at two scheduled hearings. The first will be at Charlotte, North Carolina, on April 30 and May 1, 1964, and the second is set for Memphis, Tennessee, on May 4 and 5.
