## Longhorns Travel to Bangs Tonight for Season Opener

Football season gets into full swing tonight as the local gridiron team travels to Bangs to take on the Dragons of that city. This game will be the third meeting between these two teams with each team having won a previous game from the other. Two years ago, Bangs defeated Bronte 13-6 while the Longhorns shutout the Dragons last year, 20-0.

Both teams have been working out for the past two weeks and they should be in top physical shape. Bangs will throw the same eleven boys against the Longhorns that they used last year.

Rev. Douglas Brown served as master of ceremonies at the barbecue and program and called everyone to attention, after which Rev. Loeffler gave the invocation.

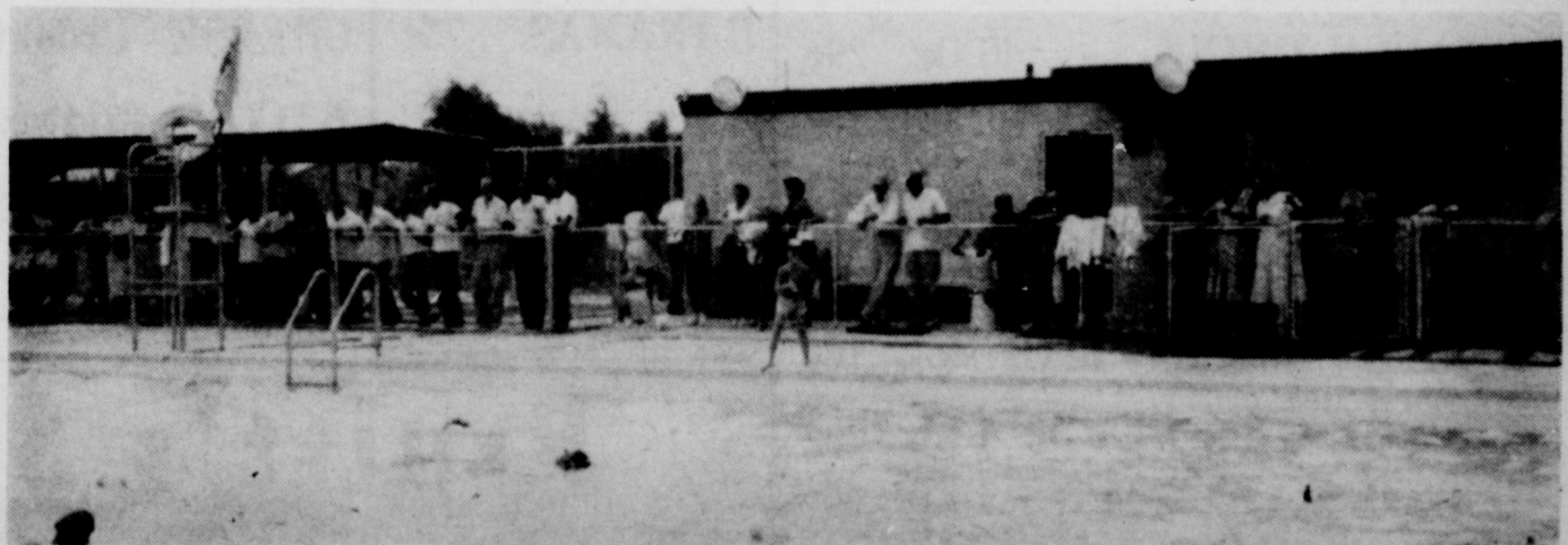

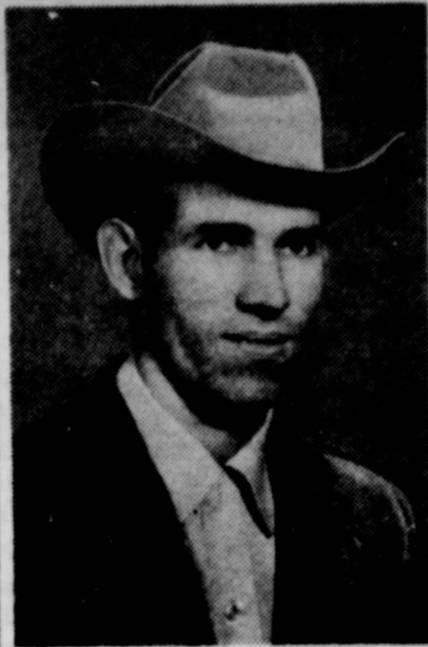

## Lindsey Takes Over As Coke New Ag Agent

Sterling Lindsey began his work here Aug. 12 as Coke County's new ag agent. He succeeds Jack B. Waide, who resigned in July to accept an executive position with a freight trucking company.

The new county agent was born and raised on small crop and stock farms in the Melon community near Pearsall in Frio county. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Lindsey of Pearsall who have eleven children, with Sterling being one of twin sons.

Sterling attended Pearsall school, graduated from high school in 1943, farmed one year and entered the army in February 1945.

He served 14 months in the Philippines.

After returning home he farmed another year. He enrolled at Texas A&M College in 1947 and graduated in 1950 with a degree in Agricultural Education. He taught vocational ag in the Colorado City high school two years, served as assistant county agent in Coleman and Runnels counties two years, and was county agent in San Saba county from 1955 until he resigned to accept the Coke County position.

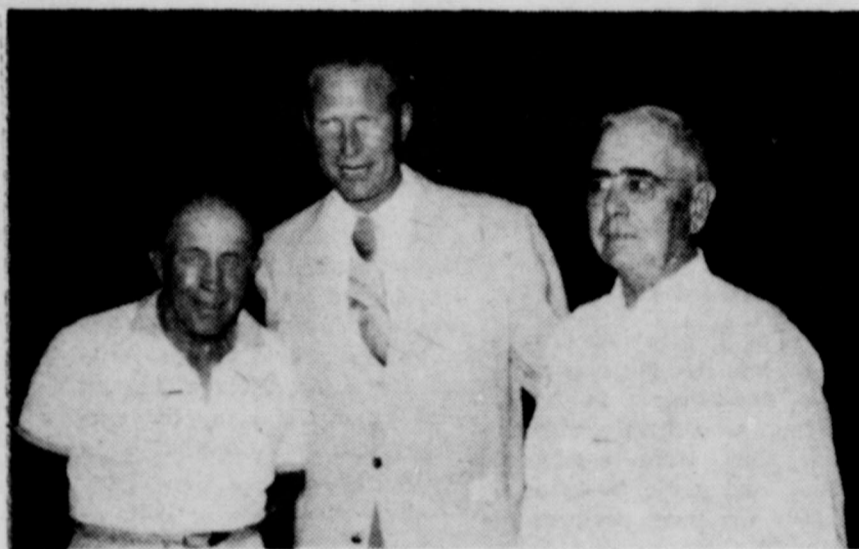

A new law which went into effect Sept. 1 requires that everyone who fishes in this state shall be required to have a fishing license. Cost of the license is \$2.15. The licenses may be obtained in Bronte from the White Auto Store.

A few exceptions to the above law are as follows:

No persons under 17 years of age nor over 65 shall be required to have a license. No person, or member of that person's immediate family, shall be required to have a sports fishing license when fishing upon property he owns or upon which he resides.

No license shall be required of persons fishing with trot-line, throw line, or ordinary pole and line, having no reel or other winding device attached, when fishing in the county of his residence.

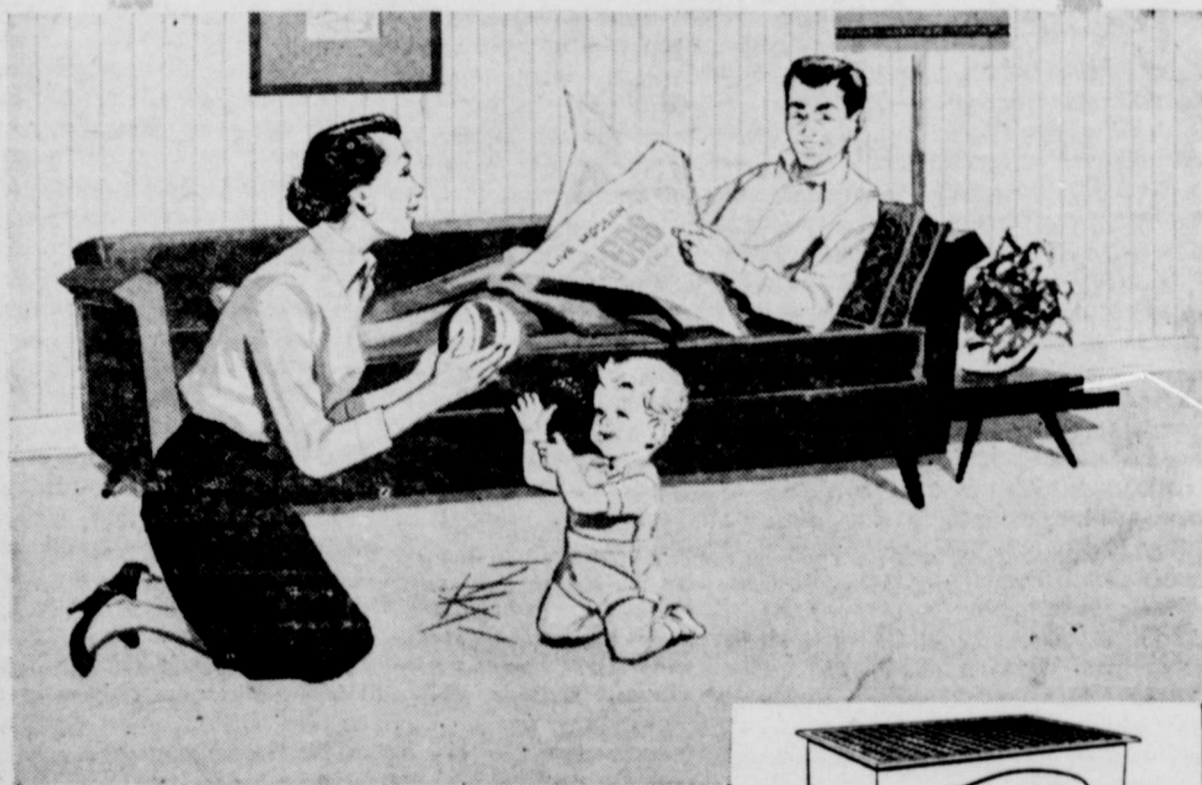

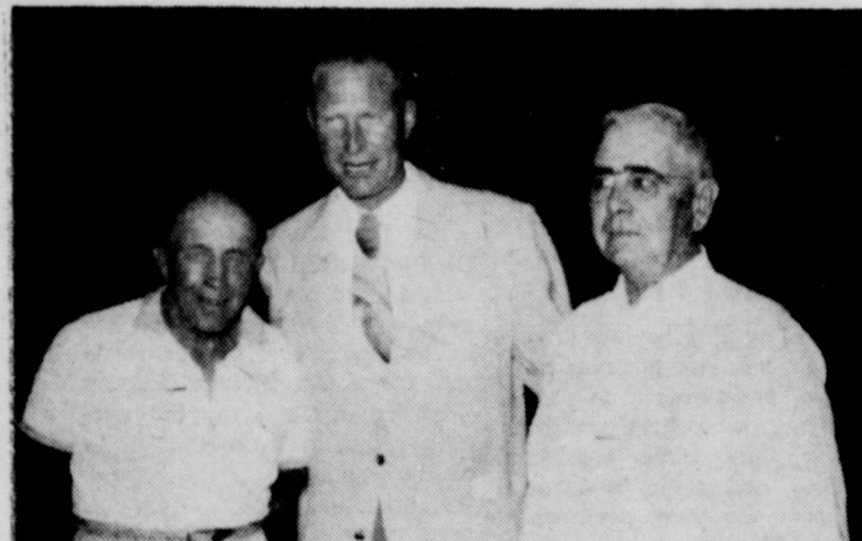

A new law which went into effect Sept. 1 requires that everyone who fishes in this state shall be required to have a fishing license. Cost of the license is \$2.15. The licenses may be obtained in Bronte from the White Auto Store.

A few exceptions to the above law are as follows:

No persons under 17 years of age nor over 65 shall be required to have a license.

No person, or member of that person's immediate family, shall be required to have a sports fishing license when fishing upon property he owns or upon which he resides.

No license shall be required of persons fishing with trot-line, throw line, or ordinary pole and line, having no reel or other winding device attached, when fishing in the county of his residence.

No other fishing license is required of a person holding a commercial fishing license issued in this state.

The new sports fishing law requires salt water anglers to be licensed.

Heretofore, special laws have applied to out of state fishermen. Under the new law these fishermen may obtain a license for the same fee as charged residents.

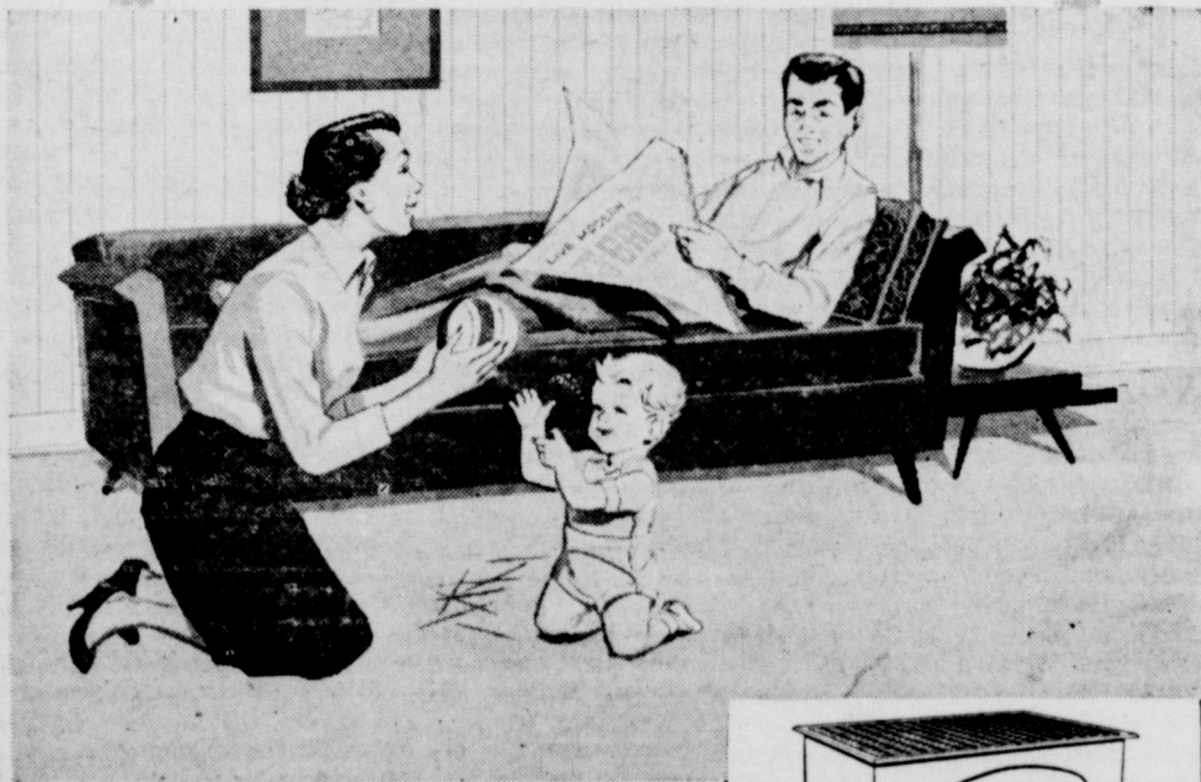

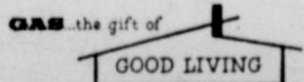

the recreational needs of residents of the community. Also, only 10 miles away is Oak Creek which offers unlimited recreation.  
12. We have the very latest in dial telephone equipment, making communication fast and easy.  
13. Natural resources of large deposits of petroleum. Also in normal time, this area is one of the leading wool producers of the state.

Undoubtedly there are many other factors we could place to the credit of Bronte, but these are enough to make it look good.

On the other side of the ledger you might list a few things that we need to make our town more attractive to someone looking for a place to live. The one we have in mind primarily, and the only one that would require the participation of everyone is a sewer system. Really, it's a dirty shame for a town to have all of the fine things that Bronte has and lack this one item of public construction which would make so much difference. We need it badly, even as the town exists today, but if we are going to progress and meet our opportunities as they come along, it is a must.

We can already hear the cry that it will cost too much money. We've heard those cries before—we heard 'em before the new school was built, before the streets were paved, before the park bond was voted and before the new court house was built in Robert Lee. All those things are built now and we are enjoying them—even those who cried the loudest about the expense. Our taxes are up a little and they would be up a little more after a sewer system is installed, but nobody seems to be hurting too badly from the increase.

For reasons of sanitation, nobody is going to encourage their employees to live in a town without sewage disposal facilities. For that reason, if a town is ever going to amount to anything, it must have a sewer system. In fact, it is amazing that Bronte has come along as far as it has without this service which people in most towns, many smaller than Bronte, take for granted.

Besides the sanitary angle, proper sewage disposal facilities would greatly enhance property value, make building loans easier to obtain and give us a chance to attract some industry.

We hear unofficially that Humble is only waiting on the construction of a sewer system here to disband its camp west of town. Seems they have a policy of not disbanding camps which are located near towns not coming up to their requirements. Most or all of those people would move into Bronte, if the camp were closed.

Of course there are people in this community who actually don't want to see the town grow, and there are others who don't care one way or the other. Frankly, the only thing we know to do about them, if and when the sewer question comes to a vote, is out-vote 'em.
