Social Security Itinerant Service Established Here

Burkburnett has been selected by the Social Security Board as one of the points where itinerant service will be established...

Regular semi-monthly visits will be made to Burkburnett at 10 a. m. on the following days:

March 15, March 29, April 12, April 26, May 17, and May 31, Surles said, with space provided at the City hall.

The representatives of the Social Security Board will handle claims for old-age and survivors insurance, applications for social security account numbers, applications for employer identification numbers, and wage discrepancy cases.

The recent amendments to the Social Security Act authorized the payment of monthly insurance, beginning January 1, 1940, to qualified wage earners...

Insurance is also provided for currently-insured individuals who die after January 1, 1940, to young widows with minor children, to minor children themselves, and lump-sum payments to survivors and to those equitably entitled where the wage earner is not survived by a relative eligible to receive monthly insurance payments.

Miss Margaret Tanner is directing the production and states that she is very well pleased with the progress shown in rehearsals and feels that the choice of a play has been very good.

Kaiser Flays Self-Murderers

The Rev. Paul Kaiser, pastor of the Clara Lutheran church, in an impressive appeal to his hearers Sunday, deplored the increasing tendency of moderns to escape unpleasant realities, and the fact that the medium of escape so often takes the form of suicide.

The speaker pointed out that every issue of the daily papers carries notices of self murders and even some of our greatest thinkers speak in defense of suicide, quoting Dean Inge, great English churchman, Bernard Shaw, Irish man of letters, and Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, American club woman.

Kaiser stated that he was alarmed at this attitude in the minds of our people which is an indication of weakness.

He spoke of the many reasons which influence people in their choice of self-destruction, naming satiety, financial reverses, fear of disgrace, disappointment in love, and suffering from disease.

Farmers And Businessmen Hear Talks

A number of Burkburnett business men were guests of Burkburnett farmers last Friday at a luncheon meeting held at Iowa Park where plans were discussed for the betterment of the farmers and the business men.

An informal session directed toward an exchange of opinions between rural and urban residents was sparked by questions and answers between the two groups. Short speeches by agricultural officials and farmers featured the program.

The business leaders were guests of the farmers, members of the Wichita County Agriculture association. Each member of the county group had invited one or more business men from his community.

School Census Is Now In Progress

According to C. J. Duncan census enumerator for the Burkburnett schools, the first part of the census work has been completed. At the present time 925 white students and approximately 50 negroes have been listed.

Last year the total number of students enumerated in this district was 1159. This year's enumeration is 183 short of last year's final count. Allowing for a natural decrease in the number of children of school age in Burkburnett, there should be at least 1100 boys and girls of school age residing in the district.

The people of Burkburnett should bear in mind that we receive \$22.50 annually per student from the state to operate our schools and that this comprises approximately one-half our total school revenue.

In other words, we receive from the state between \$25,000 and \$30,000 to be used in operation of our schools and, according to state law, all of this money must be used to pay the teachers' salaries. Census enumeration has nothing to do with compulsory school attendance.

At the present time, Mr. Duncan states that 42 six-year-olds have been enumerated. Last year 70 boys and girls six years old were listed and there should be at least 60 of that age this year whose birthday's fall either on or before the first of September and who will enroll in public school this year for the first time.

Therefore, you are urged, if you have a boy or girl in your home who will be six years old before school opens in September, to be sure to notify the school. You may call the high school office, telephone 157, and a census blank will be brought to your home at once.

If you know of any children living in your neighborhood who are of school age but not enrolled in school, you will be of material assistance to the school if you will notify the school authorities so these children can be enumerated and the state apportionment on them secured for the coming school year.

Texas Highway Map Up-To-Date

The state highway department has done a real service for Texans and several hundred thousand tourists and visiting motorists. It has brought up to date and reprinted the state highway map, and is distributing the new "edition" of this map through the courtesy stations at highway entrances to the state, through chambers of commerce, tourist centers and other points of easy accessibility to the public. No charge is made for this map.

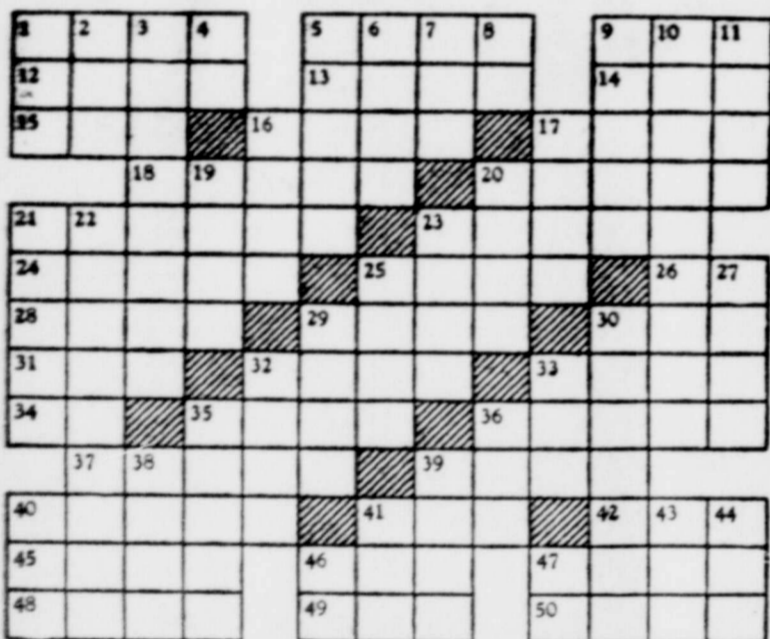
The map doesn't change as suddenly or as greatly as the map of Europe, yet within a year, there are many revisions in the highway system. New routes are designated, dirt roads are improved, many roads are surfaced. It is decidedly helpful to the public to have this official road map brought up to the minute.

There are many attractive features to the big map. In colors are shown pictures of many of the state's historic spots and points of interest. The highway markers are pictured, and their meaning explained. The rivers and lakes and parks and playgrounds are shown, and the through traffic arteries of the major cities are sketched.

The new map will be most useful to those who travel Texas highways this year.

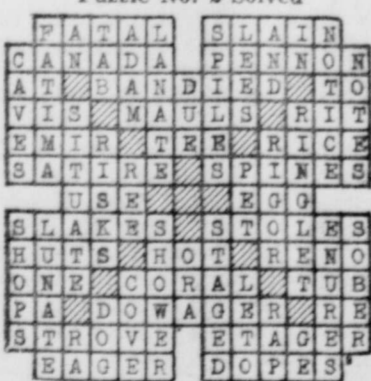

This spring, in test cities to be selected by the Department of Agriculture, relievers will be credit stamps, for the purchase of U. S. spun made from U. S. grown cotton. The families are permitted to purchase \$3 worth of the stamps person every three months, but will pay only price. The Federal Surplus Commodity Corporation is underwriting the other 50 per cent. The stamps will be good in any store carrying U. S.-made goods. The plan is patterned after FSCC's stamps, may eventually be extended to other products.

Cities will be designated shortly for starting the sales. Goods must be all cotton (except but, tape, etc.) No one has more than a good guess as how much additional cotton will be sold.

The inspired writer of the book of Hebrews, 3:13 says, "But exhort one another daily, while it is called Today; lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin."

One of the exceedingly sinful things about sin is, that it is deceitful. It is bad enough for sin to be "out in the open" where everyone can see it and recognize it, as such. But it is more treacherous when it comes under a false cloak, and when it "appears" to be righteous, and thereby deceives. To deceive one, is to gain his confidence, and afterward betray him. To appear to be right and do one right, but do him wrong. Spiritually, it is to make one think you are leading him to do right, but in reality you are leading him to do wrong.

Evidently this is what the Savior had in mind when he taught his disciples to "Beware of a wolf in sheep's clothing". Mt. 7:15. The wolf was a wolf and he knew it, but he put on sheep's clothing to be able to deceive and mislead all that he could induce to follow him. This is the most wicked of all methods to seduce and mislead. The innocent victim has faith in him, trusts him to lead him right, and follows in all good faith, and possibly does not realize that he has been misled until it is too late. He has been deceived. Mt. 15:14.

The Savior said, Mt. 23:27, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye are like whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within full of dead bones, and of all uncleanness." They were deceitful. They purposely appeared outwardly, righteous, and wanted others to think they were, that they would follow their cunningly devised ways, for their own profit, though they were wrong and knew it.

A warning just here is timely. We must beware of false teachers, who are in the world, and who "through covetousness make merchandise of you," II Pet. 2:1-3, if possible. They are deceiving and misleading honest souls, for gain. Let us try them and prove them, by the word of God. Do not follow blindly. Always demand a "thus saith the Lord," then turn to your own Bible and read it for yourself, and see if it is there, and that he is
