# \$\$\$Multi-million dollar rainfall\$\$\$



**RUNOFF FROM TUESDAY'S WELCOMED** but unexpected rainfall for this time of year rushes down a creek near Cherry and 5th streets. Rainfall in different parts of Mitchell County ranged from 1 to 2 inches and higher, and the needed rain could eventually develop into a multi-million dollar economic boost for agriculture production.

## County ag production gets unexpected boost in July

What does a multi-million dollar rainfall look like?

It just happened to fall on Mitchell County on Tuesday, July 27.

Many residents may have overlooked the dollar signs that accompanied the rain, but farmers, ranchers and businessmen have no doubt what impact the 1 to 3 inches could potentially have on the county's economy in 2004.

Countywide, most areas received an average of 1 to 2 inches of rain, and there were reports of more than 2 inches falling in some areas.

The rainfall received at a critical time of the year is expected to benefit all agriculture production in Mitchell County, including the highly prized cotton crop, according to John Senter, County Extension Agent-Agriculture.

Absolutely, for a late July 1- to 3-inch rainfall and the nature that it fell and the manner it

fell, this is very possibly a multi-million rainfall in terms of ag production in Mitchell County, and not just cotton," Senter said late Tuesday.

"We're talking about a dramatic impact on our grain sorghum because it is coming at a time when that grain sorghum was beginning to fill those heads, and to color, and that can add tremendous pounds to the grazing potential," he said. "That can also add a great deal of yield potential to grain production."

"Also something that is very important this time of year is our native grass, or summer forage production. This is probably well even, well above expectations of what even the most optimistic person could hope for at this point in the year as far as rainfall."

"Pounds also compute to potential income, and this is a

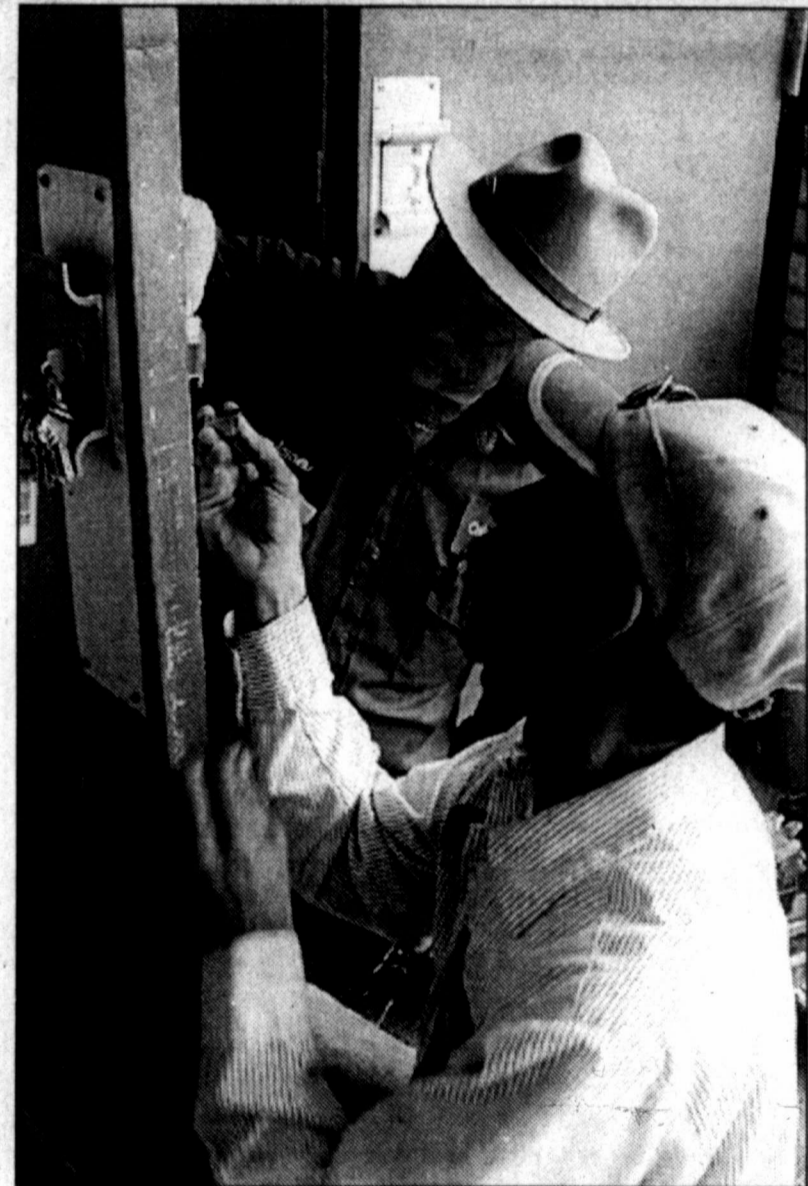

## Taxable values climb in county

### More property being purchased for deer, bird hunting

Mitchell County and seven other taxing entities will see an increase in their total taxable property values for the 2004 appraisal roll.

Kaye Nell Cornutt, chief appraiser for the Mitchell County Appraisal District, released the figures Monday, July 23, for the 10 taxing entities in the county.

Mitchell County's total taxable value for 2004 is climbing by \$6,302,005 because of minerals, including oil and gas.

The county's appraised property value for 2004 is \$524,217,418 compared to

\$476,319,893 in 2003.

Cornutt said the appraised value is the market value, and the figure increased significantly because of the sale of property in the southern portion of the county for whitetail deer, quail and mourning dove hunting.

"This is on native pastureland," she said.

"There is a lot of ranchland being sold for any kind of hunting," Cornutt said. "It's just unreal. No one ever thought it would be that high."

Cornutt said Mitchell County property is being purchased by

out-of-state hunters as well as Texas hunters.

Cornutt said one large ranch in south Mitchell County is being split into six, seven or eight sections at a time because "no one can afford to buy the whole thing."

Cornutt said each taxing entity still has to set their respective tax rates.

The City of Colorado City and the City of Loraine saw decreases in their taxable property values.

## County rejects appraisal district budget

The Mitchell County Commissioners Court approved a bid for a haul trailer and rejected the Mitchell County Appraisal District's proposed budget for 2005.

Commissioners Ed Roach, Carl Guelker and Wendy Inman approved a \$33,499 bid from Yellow House Machinery of Odessa for a haul trailer for Precinct 2.

The bid was one of four submitted for the trailer.

The commissioners also rejected the appraisal district's

proposed budget because it contains a 3 percent pay increase for three employees.

The appraisal district's budget that is billed to taxing entities is \$251,622.84 includes a contingency fund of \$21,344.

The district's 2004 budget billed to taxing entities totaled \$245,543.17, including a contingency fund of \$21,277.

The proposed 2005 budget includes salaries totaling \$75,219.17 compared with salaries of \$73,028.32 in the 2004 budget.

The proposed budget includes pay increases for the chief appraiser, appraisal clerk and deputy chief appraiser.

The City Council voted against the budget July 13, while the Colorado Independent School District trustees and the Mitchell County Hospital District directors have approved it.

County Judge Ray Mayo said the county voted against the proposed budget because "it included a 3 percent pay increase for the appraisal district employees."

Mayo said the decision was based on the county not being able "to fund a pay increase for county employees" in its 2005 budget.

"The court felt that it was not a wise decision to fund

somebody else's pay increase with tax dollars," he said. "We contribute to the appraisal district's budget."

"We felt like it was not wise to use our taxpayers' dollars to fund another entity's pay increases."

The county also approved a letter of agreement for the outside auditing firm of Stovall Grandey and Whatley to conduct the 2004 audit.

Mayo said the firm has conducted the audit for several years.

Commissioners also decided not to sell to the City of Colorado City county-owned property located between the Mitchell County Public Library and City Hall.

Mayo said the county owns three lots in that area.

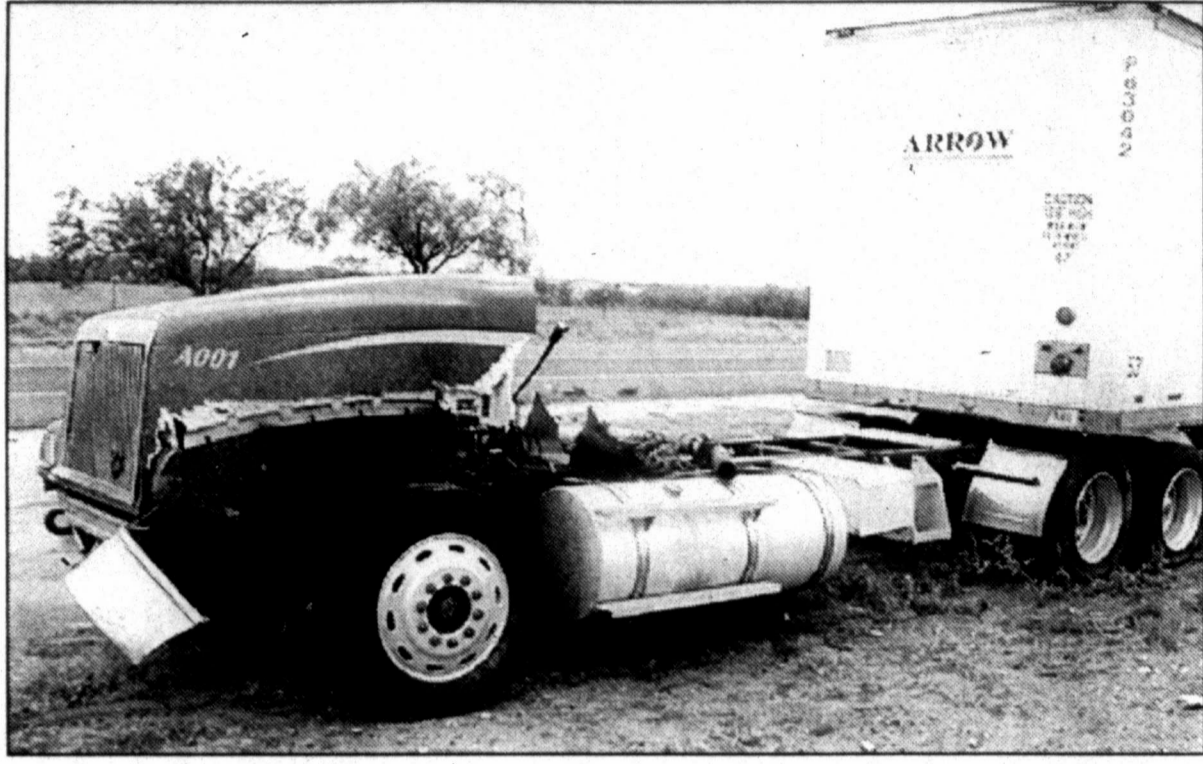

## Driver escapes injury when rig jackknifes

Gerardo Conde of El Paso escaped serious injury Saturday afternoon, July 24, when his truck-tractor trailer jackknifed, knocking the cab off the frame, near Mile Marker 226 on Interstate 20 near Loraine during a thunderstorm.

Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Sonny Flores of Colorado City credits seat belts with preventing Conde from sustaining serious injuries.

Conde was issued a citation for traveling at an unsafe speed. His rig was totaled, Flores said.

Flores said Conde was traveling eastbound in the right lane during a heavy rain, traveling at 68 mph.

Flores said Conde's rig entered a curve in the highway when the truck-tractor started to skid and jackknifed to the right.

Flores said, "The truck



tractor struck the box trailer with such force that it broke the cab off the tractor and ejected it into the south-ditch of I-20 where it came to a rest facing west."

Flores the chassis went under the trailer, and both the trailer and chassis came to rest facing northeast of I-20 blocking both lanes.

The lanes were closed for one hour 15 minutes. Traffic was rerouted on the south serv-

ice road. Conde was transporting electrical parts for vehicles. He was carrying 14,000 pounds gross weight. The rig is owned by Arrow Freight Co. of El Paso.

Troopers Josh Burson and Nick Jimenez, the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office and county EMS, Colorado City and Loraine fire departments, Texas Department of Transportation and PJ's Wrecker Service assisted at the scene.

rain that creates pounds whether it's cotton, or cattle, or grain, or forage, or grass. Pounds are important."

Senter said, "I have been here four years and I have never seen anything even close to resembling this at this time of year."

"We can get substantial rainfall in late August and September, but it takes a hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico."

"For this to happen at this time of year in terms of our total ag production, and that takes into account cotton, grain sorghum, hay, beef cattle and native pasture, it's very conceivable that this is a multi-million rainfall."

"It's very possible this could be a multi-million dollar rainfall in terms of agriculture income and the impact on Mitchell County."

"It's pretty unbelievable. This type of rainfall this time of year is nearly unheard of. I think it was more than anybody could have imagined for it to come in this time frame and this manner and amount."

"I think it's a tremendous boost to the total ag production in the county."

Senter also points out that "we can't just say that every ag producer in Mitchell County got the same amount of rain."

"In terms of countywide ag production and potential profitability, this thing is very, very incredible."

Bobby Lemons at City National Bank said that "an inch of rain in Mitchell County in late July means at least a million dollars from the cotton crop."

Lemons estimates that prior to Tuesday's rainfall the county's cotton crop "could have been over \$5 million and close to \$7 million."

"The rainfall could put the crop in the \$10 million range. It would be significantly more than a multi-million dollar rain."

"This could help us end up with an awfully good crop. A

good year for us would be \$10 million."

Senter said the slow rainfall will benefit the cotton crop over the long haul.

"I know that everywhere in the county did not receive substantial amounts, but where those amounts were substantial, and I mean 1 1/2 to 2 inches or more, this could well be a multi-million rainfall in terms of the cotton crop that we have because it did something that is very, very unusual for this time of the year," Senter said.

"It was a very slow rainfall in large amounts, and the nature of this rain and the way it fell, it allows the rain to soak deep down into the soil profile and that is critical as this crop heads into a time of the year when it is blooming and setting bolls," he said, "and at that time of year when the majority of that yield potential is set in the crop."

Senter said there is another side to the amount of moisture received in recent days.

"On the other side of the coin, if we want to say something bad about it, we have been very wet for three days now," he said. "We're talking about the potential of cool, cloudy, wet weather for in the neighborhood of five to seven days."

"When those night-time temperatures cool off into the mid- to lower 60s, and the daytime temperature is only in the mid- to low 80s, combined with the excessive moisture and humidity that we have, that creates a situation where it's possible for two things to happen."

"One is that in this very young cotton, we can see some seedling pathogenic type diseases show up. Number two is that it has been so cloudy and the temperatures have been so mild, it decreases the number of heat units that the cotton plant is able to accumulate in any 24-hour period."

Senter said heat units are "very critical for cotton to al-

low it to reach its full maturity, and to set bolls, and to produce lint which we know as cotton."

"The accumulation of heat units is very critical. The potential for some disease problems and loss of some heat units would be the only downside to this rain."

Senter said the slow rainfall Tuesday will allow "more absorption into the soil, and the intermittent periods of rain, when it rains and stops, allows the soil to soak up moisture."

"When soil soaks up moisture it swells. That allows the next period of rainfall to be more rapidly absorbed. When another segment of soil gets wet, then it expands."

"When the next period of rainfall comes, it more easily penetrates deeper into the soil, and that dry soil expands."

"The way this rainfall has come and the amount and in the manner it comes. It's nothing short of blessing."

Senter said September is a critical month for "our county cotton production because in September we need open, sunny weather."

"As this crop begins to grow and really take off, probably the best thing that can happen now in August is to have some days that are 95 to 98 degrees."

"As we get into September and this crop begins to mature and set bolls, 85- to 90-degrees would be very optimum."

Senter said rainfall in late August to mid-September would be beneficial, "but it won't take the amount that we received this time."

"As we get into September, October and November, as young as our crop is, that crop has got to have favorable conditions in terms of open weather, plenty of sunshine to allow heat to be created and absorbed into those bolls."

With the young crop, Senter said that "for the most part, we are going to need a late freeze, similar to what we had in 2003."

## Keep Foliage Feeders in Peanuts Under Control

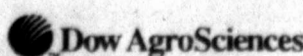

## Dress code established by CISD

The Colorado Independent School District has established a dress and grooming code for 2004-05 for Colorado High School and Colorado Middle School.

The CISD dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill self-discipline, prevent disruption, minimize safety hazards and teach respect for authority.

### General Guidelines

The student and parent/guardian may determine the student's dress and grooming standards, provided that the student's attire, grooming, and/or jewelry does not lead school officials to believe that such dress and/or grooming: -- Will disrupt, interfere with, disturb, or detract from the learning environment; -- Does not meet standards of common decency; -- Creates a hazard of any kind to health or safety; -- And adheres to the more specific guidelines listed below.

Students should appear neat and well groomed both at school and at all school functions. Sudden, unbecoming fashions, hair styles or anything designed to attract undue attention to the individual will not be allowed unless the principal or the principal's designee has given prior approval.

### Hair coloring/highlighting

The code also states students may highlight and/or color their hair if they adhere to certain guidelines. Only natural hair tones/colors will be permitted.

Examples of inappropriate hair tones/colors include, but are not limited to blue, green, yellow, orange, some reds, purple, pink, neon shades, gold and silver. Any type of hair coloring that creates a distraction will not be allowed.

The school administration

will determine if the guidelines for hair coloring/highlighting have been met. Students are encouraged to visit with the building administrator prior to making decisions regarding changes to their natural hair color.

Students involved in extracurricular activities may be held to higher standards at the discretion of coaches, directors, sponsors.

### Other guidelines

-- Male students may wear hair to the top of the collar, the bottom of the ear and combed out of the eyes.

-- Male students shall be clean shaven (no beards, goatees, mustaches) and must not have sideburns below the ear lobe (no pork chops).

-- Male students may not wear earrings or have any other type of body piercing.

-- Earrings worn by girls will be restricted to ear wear only and not to other parts of the body.

-- Students may not wear any type of head covering in the building.

-- Dresses must extend to mid-thigh or longer.

-- Students shall not wear halter-tops, spaghetti strap tops or low-cut style tops. Straps must be a minimum of 2 inches wide over the shoulder.

-- Girls may wear sleeveless shirts or dresses as long as the garments are fitted around the armholes and undergarments are completely covered.

-- No see-through shirts will be allowed.

-- Top and bottom garments should not separate to expose student's skin from the front, back or side when performing normal school activities (sitting, bending, stretching, reaching). No bare midriffs will be permitted.

-- Clothing that displays vul-

gar or unsuitable language or pictures, or drugs, tobacco or alcohol advertisements may not be worn. Pants shall not have writing across the seat.

-- Pajama style pants are not permitted.

-- Shorts of mid-thigh length or longer are permitted. If a student is sent to the office because a school official observes the shorts as not appropriate, the student will be required to change.

-- Trench coats, dusters, or other full-length coats and overcoats are in violation of this code as is any type of military/paramilitary fatigue, camouflage dress, or uniform in general.

-- Appropriate footwear should be worn in school at all times. Flip-flops and shoes of the shower sandal variety are not appropriate for school.

-- These guidelines are subject to administrative discretion.

The campus administrator and superintendent, in conjunction with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extra- or co-curricular group or activity may have additional requirements of students who participate in these types of activities. Extracurricular organizations may impose a more stringent dress code.

If your child comes to school wearing clothes that violate the dress code or in any other way violates our dress and grooming standards, he or she may be placed in in-school suspension until he or she is in compliance.

We will make efforts to notify you as soon as possible, and if the student changes clothes or otherwise comes into compliance with the dress and grooming standards, he or she will return to regular classes immediately.

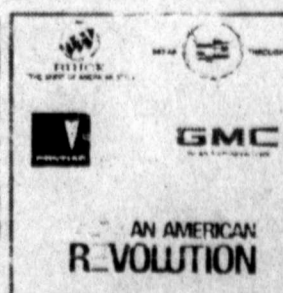
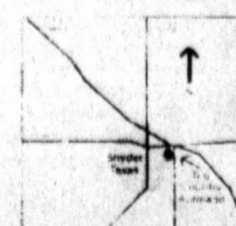

Directors also approved a \$22,000 settlement with architect Bob Cox's insurance company which is reimbursing the hospital for four specified items that were in dispute during construction of the new building south of Interstate 20.

The items included fire doors the hospital had to replace to meet Texas Health Department codes.

The hospital paid for the items and the insurance company is reimbursing the hospital.

Hospital Administrator Linda Mize said the settlement does not close the doors on any additional problems that might occur.

Mize said the money shuts the door on items specified in the settlement, but other situations that occur remain open.

"The items that are listed are ones I don't think we will have a problem with," she said.

Mize told directors that the Environmental Protection Agency's proposed fine against Mitchell County and Cooper Construction Co. has been dropped.

Mize said the district's attorney, Fletcher Brown, discussed the fine with Edward Spencer of the EPA.

The hospital district recently paid a \$10,000 fine to the EPA.

"When we paid that amount for that fine, we thought we were free and clear and that was the end of it," Mize said. "Once they understood the situation with the county and the contractor, Fletcher said the EPA agreed to let it go."

"The EPA also saw the county and contractor as operators on this site. We explained to them that they had no input into the day-to-day operation of, or direction, of the work."

Directors also approved associate staff privileges for Drs. Larry A. Fish and John R. Fish of Big Spring and allied staff privileges for Donna Fish, R.N., scrub nurse for the two physicians who perform cataract surgery.

Directors approved spending \$8,099 for clinic software at the Family Medical Associates clinic, and donating cranks to RAPHIA International.

They also set Tuesday, Aug. 17, for a strategic planning session, with Thursday, Aug. 19, as an alternate date.

During her report to directors, case management director Terry Munoz said the number of surgeries at the new hospital continue to increase with 33 taking place in June.

## The Amazing Bodie Gilstrap

Bodie Gilstrap of Eldorado has a case full of trophies. Some of them are for calf roping, but the majority of them are for showing lambs. In 1989, when Bodie was sixteen, he rolled his pickup and broke his neck. He was taken to a hospital in San Angelo, then transferred to the Dallas Rehab Center, where Bodie and his parents stayed eight months. When the Gilstraps arrived in Dallas, they learned about the generosity of their neighbors.



"When we got to Dallas, I looked in my purse and found two thousand dollars," says Carolyn Gilstrap, Bodie's mother. "I had no idea where it came from. When my husband got here, he had \$3,500 in his shirt pocket. People would just come in and give us a hug and want to know how Bodie was. Then they put money in our pocket."

Some of their friends came in and handed them some keys. "They told us they had an apartment in Dallas and wanted us to use it as our own. Before that, we didn't know what we were going to do."

Bodie is a quadriplegic, paralyzed from the neck down. He is ventilator dependent, which means that someone has to be with him all the time.

Jaime, Bodie's father, tends to Bodie every morning before he heads off to work on a ranch. He resumes taking care of Bodie when he comes in after work. In between, Carolyn spends the day with Bodie.

Bodie sleeps with one end of a breathing apparatus in his mouth. If it should come out, an alarm sounds. He sometimes has nightmares about that.

Bodie is one determined individual. While he was in rehab in Dallas, he did some school work. He came back and finished his junior year through the summer, then started the fall semester of his senior year with his regular class.

"He graduated number nineteen out of forty one," Carolyn says with pride.

Bodie went to A&M and majored in animal science.

"I got into A&M the summer of '92," says Bodie, "and I graduated in the spring of 01. Took me awhile, but it was something I had always wanted to do. I had the opportunity, and took it."

Bodie, now 31 years old, is a computer expert. He designed his own computer and ordered the parts over the internet. A friend assembled it.

"I have a computer that's voice activated, which means I control it with my voice."

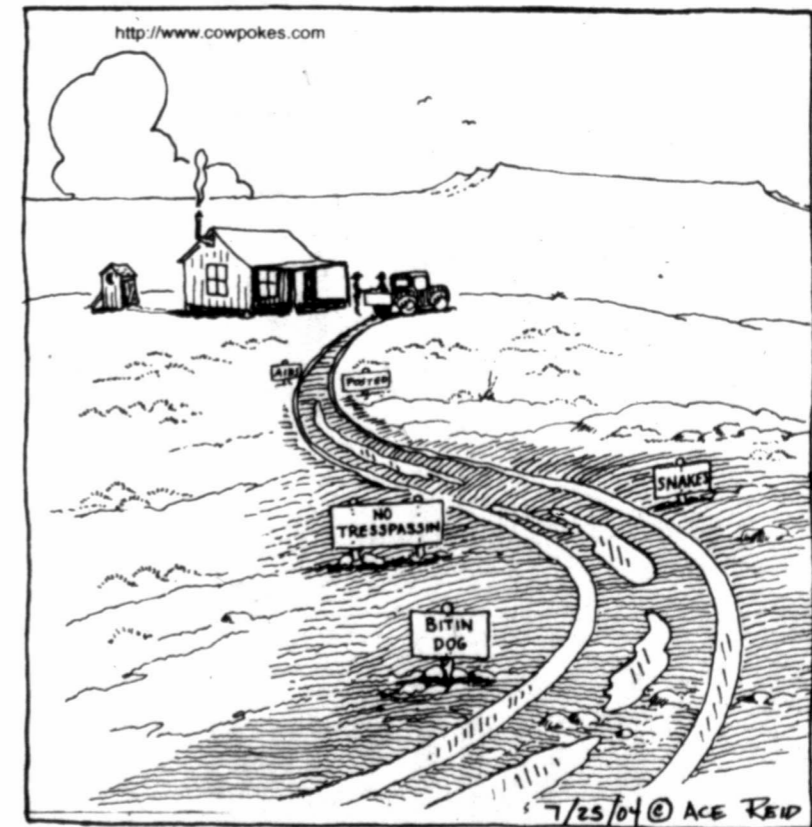
A dot on his forehead is used as a computer mouse.

"It's called a natural point mouse pointing system. It shoots an infrared beam to a camera and just moves the mouse wherever the dot goes."

He is a big fan of A&M football and has a countdown calendar on his computer screen.

"It tells me the number of days before the first A&M game," says Bodie, "Gig'em, Aggies."

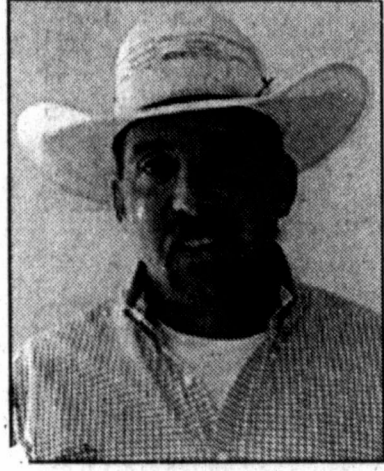

## 2004 horticulture call in program announced

In a continuing effort to assist

homeowners with landscape, horticulture, ornamental and water conservation, the Home Horticulture Tour was started three years ago. This effort has taken on several different avenues to assist folks with proper diagnosis of problems and solutions for correcting problems. This year we will continue the approach began last year and, hopefully make the program accessible to all county residents.

This year the Horticulture Program will be held on Thursday, August 12 from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m. For the second year we will conduct a live call in radio program, aired on KVMA/KAUM. To assist our efforts this year we will have on

hand, Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension Plant Pathologist in Lubbock. As you may recall, we utilized Harold for his expertise for the last three tours. Last year, Dr. Kaufman was present for our first call-in show and the response was incredible. Even to the point of his reporting such a tremendous success story all over the 20 counties of the South Plains District.

A new member added to this year's tour is Dr. Russ Wallace, Vegetable Specialist in Lubbock. Russ will bring with him a vast amount of expertise in the area of vegetable crops for you to draw upon.

This year, the call-in program will be done live and will last only one hour. We have care-

fully planned the time line to hopefully fit the vast number of folks in the county and allow you to access the program.

Realizing that, once again, this year's approach is a little different in terms of delivery, it also will offer folks who might be at work or some other location other than home to participate. During the 2003 show, we relied heavily upon call-in questions and we were overwhelmingly surprised with responses before, during and after the program. This year, the call-in program will allow you to call the station and ask Dr. Kaufman, Dr. Wallace or myself questions pertaining to any horticulture production information you might have.

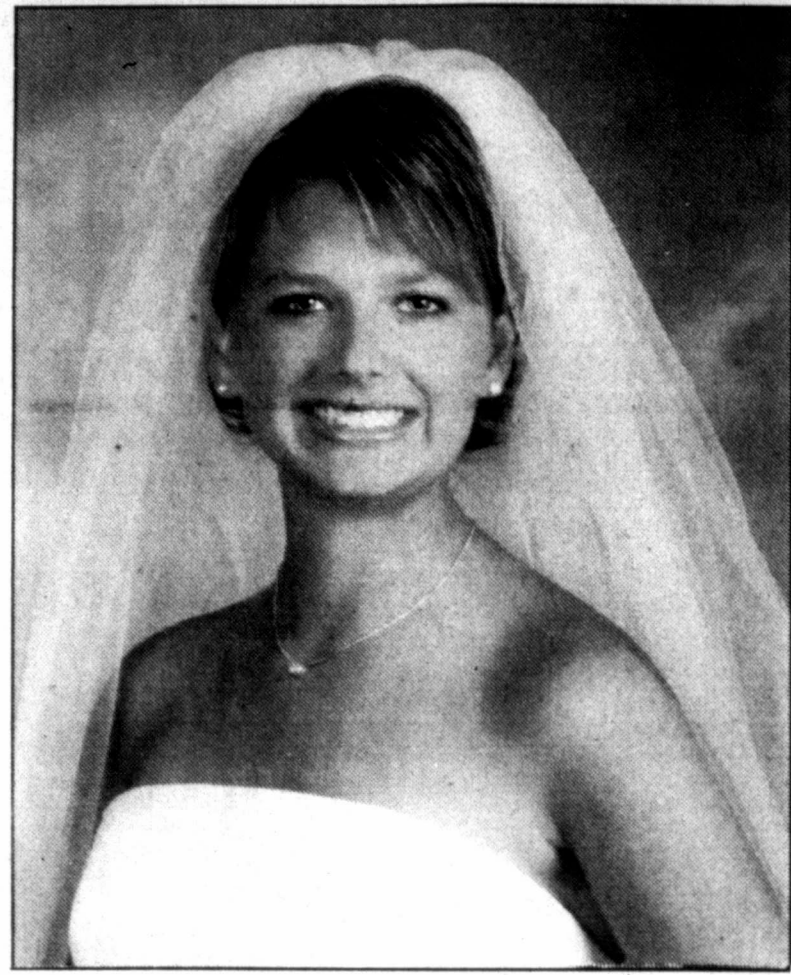

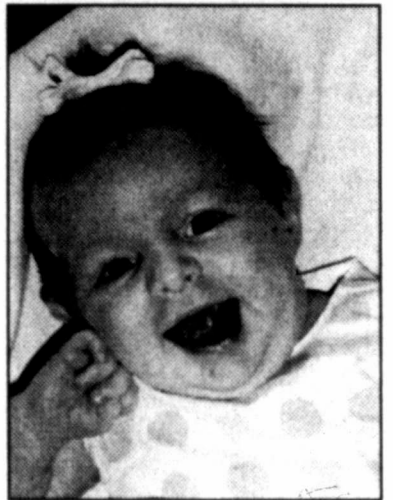

## Registration is Aug. 11 for CMS students

Colorado Middle School students can pick up their schedules for the 2004-05 school year Wednesday, Aug. 11, when school photographs will be taken and a parents meeting will be held in the auditorium.

Classes start Thursday, Aug. 12. Teachers report Monday, Aug. 9.

CMS Principal Mark Merrell said sixth-graders and their parents meet in the auditorium at 9 a.m.; seventh-graders at 10 a.m.; and eighth-graders at 11 a.m.

He said each meeting will be short, allowing students to get their schedules and have photos taken.

He said students will also be assigned lockers. He said there is a \$5 fee for an agenda notebook that is required.

Merrell said paraprofessionals Bridgett Finch and Megan Mott have been added to the CMS staff.

With 240 students expected to start the year, Merrell said changing to an eight-period schedule will be the big change at CMS.

"The purpose of that is so teachers will be able to see the kids each and everyday," Merrell said. "The class periods are around 49 minutes long."

"The schedule is a little different than what it has been in the past. We tried this out in the spring and the students and most of the faculty members really like it, so we are going to try it."

Merrell said a modified block schedule was used in past years.

"The first and eighth periods met each day, and then all the other class periods met every other day," he said. "It worked real well for us for a while, but we are going to try this, and hopefully help us with our test scores."

"It has probably been eight to 10 years since we have done this eight-period day."

The modified block schedule classes were one hour 30 minutes each.

"We did a survey at the end of the school year and both students and teachers voted heavily in favor of the eight-period day," Merrell said. "I think they like the idea of seeing their teachers everyday."



Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the above scale are eligible for either free or reduced price meals. The reduced price for lunch is 30 cents and for breakfast is 20 cents. Every household will be furnished with an application, which must be completed to apply for free or reduced price meals. To complete, please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information is not complete and cannot be processed by the school: 1) Names of all household members; 2) Amount of income received by each household member such as wages, welfare, alimony, etc., and how often it was received, or your Food Stamp or AFDC/TANF number if you receive these benefits; 3) Signature of an adult household member; 4) Social Security number of the adult who signs the form or the box checked stating person has no social security number. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for free or reduced price benefits, please tell the school and they will help you complete the application.

Within 10 days of receipt of the application, the school will notify you whether or not your child is eligible. The school or other officials may check the information on the application at any time during the school year.

If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must notify the school when: 1) your income increases by \$50.00 per month/\$600.00 per year or when your household size decreases; 2) you no longer receive Food Stamps or TANF. You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Children who receive free or reduced price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for their meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child is discriminated against because of race, sex, color, age, disability or national origin. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the USDA, Director, Office of Civil Rights. If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. ## 2004 football season kicks off Monday

The 2004 football season officially kicks off Monday, August 2, when the Colorado Wolves join hundreds of other schools across Texas with two-a-day practices.

Head Wolf Coach Frank Johnson enters his third year as the head coach of the Wolves after being the defensive coordinator under former Wolf

coach Gerald James who is now the head coach at Leonard.

According to coach Johnson, who this week is attending the annual Texas coaching school in Houston, prospective football players should report at 7 a.m. sharp Monday, arriving with

proper workout attire. Equipment will be handed out that

morning, though workouts through the first four days will be held in shorts, t-shirts, and cleats as well as the usual wearing of the helmets. Players are able to begin padding up after the fourth day as a normal rule.

Workouts will run from 7 a.m. until about 8:30 at which time a 30 minute break will be taken.

Practice will then resume at 9 a.m. until around noon.

After the first day teams will be broken down into a varsity squad, a junior varsity black squad, and the freshman red squad.

All physicals should be completed prior to being able to participate in the workouts for the first practice session.

## CISD coaches attend clinic

Colorado ISD Head Coach and Athletic Director, along with several of his assistants, have been attending the 72nd Annual Coaching Clinic held this year in Houston.

Coaches begin to arrive in Houston on Sunday, getting signed in and situated.

Almost 11,000 coaches from all over the state of Texas flocked to the big city for the three-day clinic which began on Monday, July 26, and concluded on Wednesday, July 28.

Coaches from the high school and college ranks give lectures on a wide range of topics, anywhere from "Attacking the Blitz," to "Training A Quarterback." Just a few of the notable speakers included Texas A&M head coach Dennis Franchione, Baylor's second-year head coach Guy Morris who was born in

Colorado City, but lived here only briefly, and Jim Ned head coach Brad McCoy who has resurrected a football program there in a matter of a few years to become a powerhouse in class 2-A.

An all-star football game made up of around 66 selected athletes gathered this week to play in their final high school football game. Several of the athletes will be moving on to college football such as district foe Kelby Kember of Coahoma who will be playing wide receiver for Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, Texas this season.

Also out for discussion during the clinic was the reading of the new rules and policies from the University Interscholastic League (UIL).

## Coaches watch for heat stroke

Though this week the temperatures have been rather mild, holding in the 80's, but as everyone who lives in West Texas knows, that is usually subject to change at this time of the year. When practices begin around the area for a new football season, the long-term weather forecast does not show favor for athletes coming out for football. Upper 90's, and temperatures past the century mark are a common problem coaches have to deal with each year during August.

Heatstrokes have been on a steady rise since the 1980's, but coaches have been doing a great job cutting those down considerably over the past few years.

Coaches at all three Mitchell County schools, Colorado City, Westbrook, and Loraine, take extra precaution to see that none of the players get dehydrated during practice. Plenty of water is available to them by the managers during breaks to keep them fully hydrated. Coaches have learned from experience that most heat related deaths come during the first two weeks of practice when conditioning may not be at its best.

The smart athletes report in good physical shape, using the summer break to work on weights, and keeping in shape with exercises, walking, running, or working during the summer.

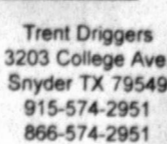
