Navy ROTC Applications Due Nov. 17

Interested young men of Mitchell County who are eligible may take the 16th annual national competitive examination for the Regular Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps.

The examinations will be given to eligible high school seniors and graduates on Dec. 9. Application forms for residents of this county are available from the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station, U. S. Post Office, Sweetwater. All applications must be completed and returned by Nov. 17.

Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Academy, the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at the civilian college of his choice which has an NROTC unit. All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an annual retainer of \$600 for not more than 4 years. During the summers the student goes on training cruises as a midshipman.

After completing the usual 4 years college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty as an officer with the Navy's fleets. Immediate assignments to flight training or submarine training are offered.

High school seniors and graduates who have reached their 17th birthday and have not reached 21 on July 1, 1962, may apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a physical exam early in 1962. Qualified men will be selected.

The NROTC college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty with the Navy and Marines. A separate quota is established for applicants within these services.

SAYS BELL OPERATOR

Area Code Aids In Long Distance

If you think Chicago is in Illinois, you're only half right—according to long distance telephone operators.

They'll tell you Chicago is located in the "312" dialing area. Operators use these 3 digit numbers—called Area Codes—to tell the long distance switching equipment how to route your calls to distant cities throughout the United States and Canada.

Their telephone number geography divides the United States and Canada into dialing areas, such as identified by a 3 digit Area Code. For example, Colorado City is in the 915 dialing area. The Area Code for New York City is "212" and it is "213" for Los Angeles and other nearby California cities. Operators use these codes to make your long distance service faster.

Now Colorado City customers also can use these Area Codes when placing long distance calls, according to Mrs. Imogene Alexander, chief operator for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

"Area Code calling will mean faster long distance service for customers here," she said.

Using this new calling method, you give the long distance operator the Area Code and the distant telephone number. It's not necessary to give her name of called city or state.

For example, if you were calling Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, CE 6-7798, you simply tell the operator: "Area Code 405, CE 6-7798." The operator then could immediately dial this number to the switching equipment which would automatically route your call to the Oklahoma City telephone.

"The '405' is the Oklahoma City Area Code and is actually part of the long distance number," Mrs. Alexander said.

Making Area Codes part of long distance numbers is necessary for direct dialing to telephones in distant cities, she added. Today operators dial direct to the telephones you call in most cities throughout the country.

"Direct dialing of long distance calls requires that no 2 long distance numbers can be alike in the United States or Canada," Mrs. Alexander said. "Area Codes are a key part of the telephone numbering plan that provides these different long distance telephone numbers."

She explained that no 2 local telephone numbers are alike within the same dialing area. By combining the Area Code with the local number, you have a long distance number unlike any other in the country.

For example, a local number in St. Louis, Mo., is "CH 5-1000." The Area Code for St. Louis is "314" so the long distance number is "Area Code 314 CH 5-1000" and there is no other such number in the United States or Canada.

Since no 2 long distance numbers are alike, the operator does not need the name of the city to complete most long distance calls or to fill out the charge ticket. The long distance switching equipment automatically routes calls to the correct telephone in distant cities when the

operator dials the Area Code and distant number. The operator records the Area Code and distant number on the charge ticket. When this ticket is processed by accounting machines, these machines automatically identify the city you called so you will be correctly charged for the call.

Mrs. Alexander gave these pointers for fastest long distance service under this new calling method:

1. Give the operator the Area Code and distant number. Like this: "Area Code 405 CE 6-7798."
2. Don't give the operator your own telephone number until she asks you for it.

Colorado City's area code number will be listed in front of the new Southwestern Bell directory that will be mailed out to users about the 15th of this month.

SCD OFFICE REPORT

Irrigation of Winter Crops

EDITOR'S NOTE—Another report from the staff of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District office discussing agricultural aspects of this county. This report concerns the irrigation of winter crops in this country.

Is the irrigation season over?

Many farmers will tell you they have completed irrigation for this year. They are gathering their cotton and will store their irrigation equipment as soon as the crop is gathered.

Many farmers in the Mitchell County SCD plan to plant winter cover crops to protect their land from blowing. Very few have made plans to irrigate their winter crops. They have not spent much time figuring out why they need to irrigate during the winter.

They have moved pipe, maintained pumping plants and bought fuel all summer and they are tired of it all. Besides, it will require labor and money to keep the irrigation system operating through the winter. Therefore, they will depend on moisture left in the soil, from summer irrigation plus rainfall, to make a cover crop.

Generally, there is very little moisture left after cotton matures and is gathered; and getting enough rainfall at the right time to get a cover crop up and keep it growing is a big gamble.

Dryland cover crops will make some growth and provide some protection from blowing.

Why not be sure of adequate protection, plus winter grazing for livestock, plus adequate residues to increase the organic matter in the soil and provide a mulch that will reduce evaporation from the soil during the hot summer months?

A properly irrigated cover crop will provide these benefits.

By good irrigation water management on winter, as well as summer crops, the available moisture in the root zone of the soil profile can be maintained at or near field capacity at all times. By having 25 per cent to 50 per cent of the available moisture in the upper portion of the root zone, at the end of the summer crop season a normal irrigation will bring soil moisture up to field capacity and give the cover crop a good start before cold weather sets in. Also if at spring planting time soil moisture is near field capacity, a normal application of irrigation water will bring the moisture to field capacity.

This eliminates the need for long hours of preplanting irrigation necessary if soil moisture has been greatly reduced. Light spring rains may be sufficient to restore moisture in the soil where proper irrigation water use was applied to winter cover crops, thus eliminating the necessity for any irrigation before planting summer crops.

Residues from cover crops will provide a mulch that will greatly reduce evaporation from the surface layer of the soil between planting time and the time plants are large enough to withstand irrigation. During this time, plant roots are near the surface and need the moisture in this zone to supply the plant and develop roots deeper into the soil. The mulch also reduces evaporation throughout the rest of the growing season as well as cushioning the detaching force of raindrops that accelerate erosion on bare ground.

Properly managed winter cover crops produce returns comparable to those of summer crops. Many of the benefits from cover crops may be indirect and not immediately recognizable or available for converting to quick cash; but there are profitable returns which become more and more apparent as winter cover crops are grown and properly managed year after year.

Every Mitchell County farmer, especially irrigation farmers, should give winter cover crops a fair chance to help conserve soil and moisture and reduce cost of operations.

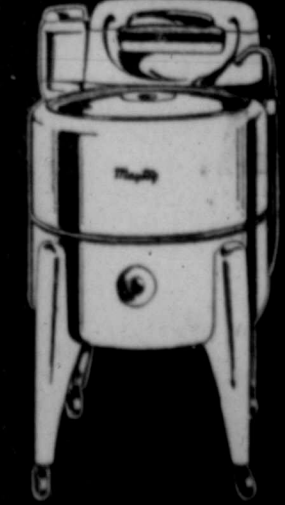

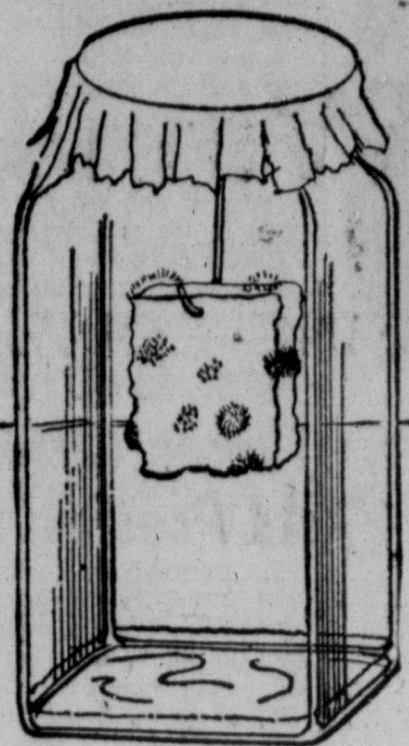

SCIENCE FOR YOU



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By BOB BROWN

PROBLEM: Bread Mold.

NEEDED: Glass jar or dish, foil, wire, water and a piece of bread.

DO THIS: Hang the bread on the wire inside the jar, as shown, or simply place it on a dish. Put water in the jar or dish to keep the bread moist. The jar may be covered with foil to keep the moisture in.

WHAT HAPPENS: Fungus spores, including those that produce bread mold, are always in the air. They fall on the bread, and when conditions are right, they grow into mold. It may take several days for a good covering of mold to appear.

The mold will be in several colors. A blue-green kind likely to appear is penicillium, a member of the genus from which penicillin is extracted. Examine some of the mold plants under a microscope or magnifying glass if one is available.

ON DILEMMA OF TOO LITTLE TIME

Mrs. J. S. Craddock, Jr., Talks to Zetagathian Club

Mrs. J. S. Craddock, Jr., was guest speaker at the Zetagathian Study Club's Thursday meeting in the home of Mrs. John Brand.

The second step is to make a plan and the third step is to put the plan into practice.

This country needs people who can think thru to the consequences of their decisions, instead of apparently ignoring the inevitable results, Mrs. Craddock continued.

The challenge today is to take our place in the world and not let someone else take it for us, she emphasized.

Another thing that at one time did not bother women, she said, is that many, both single and married, must support themselves.

This is a challenge to the woman of America, because

This means she is responsible for the emotional and physical well-being of her family.

Today there is a line between pressure and guidance, between over indulgence and reasonable enrichment, and between loafing and laziness on the one hand and meditation and thoughtfulness on the other is one that calls for

SAYS SAFETY REPORT

Home Falls can Result in Death

Falls are the main cause of accidental deaths in the home. Fatal home falls in a recent typical year totaled 13,400, according to Roy Porter, Lone Star Gas Co. manager. Lone Star and Colorado City Record are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety Program in Colorado City.

"The 13,400 fatal home falls," Porter said today, "represented 47.9 per cent of all home accidents."

"From year to year," Porter said, "only motor vehicle accidents outrank falls as an accidental killer, and approximately 64 1/2 per cent of all falls occur in the home."

The greatest number of fatal falls occur in the bedroom, falls on the stairs and in the yard and kitchen follow in that order. Fatal falls in the living room occur in the living room, bathroom, dining room, hall, basement, garage and on the porch.

Approximately 86 per cent of the victims of fatal falls are more than 65-years old. Eight per cent are in the 45-64 age group. The remaining 6 per cent are spread through the 0-44 age group.

A majority of fatal falls occur while victims are walking on a level surface. However, they also occur while the victims are standing still, ascending or descending stairs, working, sitting, playing, eating, drinking, climbing and reclining. Some occur while the victims are sleeping!

"Particular attention," Porter said, "must be given to the problem of protecting the older people. Lighting, particularly on stairs, must be adequate. Do not leave loose objects in the middle of the floor. This particularly endangers an older person. His sight may not be able to detect the objects."

If he trips, he is less likely than a young person to recover his balance. "Keep an orderly home. Arrange furniture so that it does not prevent free passage around the room. Do not let beds or other furniture clutter the middle of the room. Keep doors closed. Close dresser drawers when not in use. Do not leave shoes in the middle of the floor."

"When a person gets out of bed in the middle of the night and tries to make his way to the bathroom or kitchen in the dark, he is more than likely to fall over any improperly placed object. This danger can be eliminated by keeping the house in order and by having a light located within reach of the bed and at the entrance to all of the principal rooms," Porter concluded.

A home safety kit is now available at Lone Star's office or the Record office for use in the home. The valuable kit is free.

Patrolmen Suggest Auto Inspections

Buddy Hertenberger and Wendell Rehm, Mitchell County Highway Patrolmen for the Texas Department of Public Safety, suggested today (Sunday) that fall "is an excellent time to have motor vehicles safety inspected" in preparation for hard winter driving.

The new 1962 Texas Vehicle Inspection Sticker is now available at the official inspection stations here in compliance with orders issued by the Texas Public Safety Commission. The order states that all vehicles coming under the provisions of the Vehicle Inspection Act must display the new sticker by April 16, 1962.

They said that during the past 3 months mechanics at inspection stations have undergone an intensive training program on inspection of vehicles under the law.

"There have been no changes in the Inspection Law from last year," the 2 patrolmen explained, "but we have re-examined every mechanic in the program to be certain he knows the procedure."

Hertenberger and Rehm noted that since the beginning of the inspection program 10 years
