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President Abolishes All Controls On Meat

Washington, Oct. 14.—Angrily assailing 'selfish' politicians, Pres. Truman tonight abandoned price controls on meat and announced that the whole decontrol program will be speeded up.

Thus three weeks before the congressional elections, the president altered the course he previously had set, removed the administration's hand from the meat situation completely and for good, and put it up to the industry to restock the housewife's icebox. He said it was the "only remedy for the shortage."

The action had been urged by many within his own party. And as he castigated congressmen and candidates whom he blamed for the meat shortage and failure of controls, he made no attempt to pin responsibility solely to Republicans.

"The responsibility rests squarely on a few men in the congress who, in the service of selfish interests, have been determined for some time to wreck price controls no matter what the cost might be to our people," he declared.

The ceilings on livestock and the food and feed derived from it go off Tuesday. That will mean, Mr. Truman announced, that the decontrol of all other items "will have to be accelerated under existing legal standards."

Included in the hastened decontrol process will be the wage controls, the president made clear—"we all recognize the close relationship between wages and prices." But he refused to abolish the wage controls simultaneously with the meat ceilings, as those labor leaders favoring meat decontrols have insisted.

"Moreover," he said that "this does not mean the end of controls now."

"Some items like rent will have to be controlled for a long time to come," he continued. "Other items, consisting of certain basic materials and other commodities of which there is now a grave shortage will have to remain under control until production of them has been greatly increased."

Industry representatives predicted a gradual return of meat to the butcher shops now, but some said it will take a little time.

The president said Secretary of Agriculture Anderson and Price Administrator Porter will remove tomorrow "all price controls on livestock and food and feed products (derived) therefrom. This automatically will remove the sub-

sidies now being paid to the industry.

Slaughtering quotas now imposed on the packers are covered by separate OPA orders. These quotas were removed temporarily at the time price controls lapsed in mid-summer, and presumably they will be abolished now.

The president said "The risk in the action we are taking in removing meat controls is less than it would otherwise be because production in general is now increasing at a significant rate" and national income is "at an all-time high."

Mr. Truman also announced that an agriculture department investigation indicates that the Mexican border may be re-opened at once to meat imports from that country. An embargo was placed upon Mexican cattle imports recently after Mexico had imported some bulls from South America which officials thought might be infected with the hoof and mouth disease.

The president's remarks indicated that this embargo soon will be removed. "When that happens," he said, "a substantial number of cattle from Mexico will come into this country. Most of them will be thin but they can be sent into the feed lots to replace the domestic cattle which have been sufficiently fattened to be shipped to the slaughter houses."

On the prospect that controls would be relaxed, fed cattle leaped 25 to 50 cents higher on the Chicago market during the day, and slaughter lambs also went up.

Anderson told reporters that his announcement was set for Tuesday as he and other officials emerged from a conference with Mr. Truman a few hours before the broadcast. The new price control act gives him the final say on price control of all agricultural commodities but his actions obviously will be governed by the president who appoints him.

The meat industry acclaimed the removal of price controls from meat and livestock and spokesmen predicted a gradual return of meat to the nation's dinner tables.

Some said meat prices immediately would be higher than OPA retail ceilings but that they gradually would become lower.

The American meat institute, spokesmen for major packers, said there wouldn't be "much more meat for consumers in the immediate future" but asserted the industry "now can go to work to provide meat just as quickly as possible."

QUITAQUE GRAIN ELEVATOR IS READY TO OPERATE

Quitaque Elevator, erected by George Setliff, is completed and ready for operation. All machinery has been installed except scales and those at Farmers Co-op Gin, adjacent to the elevator, are being used for the present. Odell Setliff is manager at the new elevator and has moved to Quitaque where he has an apartment at the Gates duplex.

The elevator is larger than needed at the present time, having a capacity of approximately 13,500 bushels, which is seven or eight cars.

There will be lots of feed made even if frost should come within a few days, George Setliff stated; but if the frost holds off for three or four weeks the feed harvest will be practically double, he estimates.

In the event early frost should catch the grain before it matures, the grain will still have a sale value as No. 4 or No. 5 grain, George said, and the elevator will handle all the grain regardless of quality.

Quitaque has been without an elevator for about 20 years, the one here at that time having burned. It was operated by the late Glenn Wise.

SCS INVESTIGATING IRRIGATION POSSIBILITIES

The Cap Rock Soil Conservation District is investigating the possibility of sufficient ground water in Briscoe county for irrigation purposes. In response to a request for information in regard to this, Earl Cantwell, chairman of the Cap Rock district, has the following reply from the district engineer of the ground water division, department of the interior, at Austin:

"Mr. J. H. Dante of our ground water group recently completed a ground water survey in Briscoe County with special reference to the cap rock area in the southwestern part of the county. His report, including well records, well logs, well water analyses, and a map showing the location of the wells, is now being compiled, and as soon as it is ready, we shall be glad to send you a copy."

"In the vicinity of Quitaque the available supply of ground water of good quality is limited to shallow stream and terrace sands and gravels, while the Permian rocks underlying these deposits ordinarily yield meagre supplies of highly mineralized water. It is possible that the terrace sands and gravels are capable of yielding water in sufficient quantities for irrigation in a few areas of limited size where these deposits are exceptionally extensive and thick. Test drilling probably would be required to determine the location of such areas." Signed Walter J. White.

Sailor Takes Car Into Home At Turkey

An alleged drunk sailor—or ex-sailor, took a wild ride in a borrowed automobile Saturday night, said car being used without the owners knowledge, it was stated. The car was parked at a business place on the Hill with the key left in the ignition. The young man climbed in and took off.

He had reached the lower end of Main street when a side-swipe with a pickup veered the car into a fence at the old stand of the Wooldridge Lumber Co. A panel of the fence, including three cedar posts, was taken out and the car proceeded across the yard where it plunged through another fence built of 2x6 material and through the side of the home of Dale Montgomery and his mother.

After knocking a hole in the wall of the house, the car came to a stop with the front wheels and motor inside the house. Mrs. Montgomery was asleep in her bed which was against the wall where the auto made its unexpected entrance. She and the bed were knocked across the room and against the wall on the opposite side. She was not seriously injured, but suffered severe shock and nervousness.

The driver of the car climbed out and ran but was soon overtaken and jailed, according to report. Mechanism of the car was pretty badly jammed.

When the vehicle was dragged from the hole in the house it was discovered that the foot feed had been pushed entirely through the floorboard.

The house sits on a concrete foundation and apparently the housing of the transmission hung on the concrete to stop the car in its wild plunge. The foundation stands about 14 inches above the ground and was busted when the car struck it.

Dangerous Disease

Austin—The State Department of Health has just issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, as the number of cases usually increases during the fall months. The majority of deaths from this disease occur from October through February.

Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may contact it, but children under 15 years are especially apt to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under 5 years and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, warns mothers to "not let your children take any chances with scarlet fever. Call the doctor as soon as the first symptoms appear."

If your child has contracted scarlet fever, the first signs you may notice are that he seems tired, restless and out of sorts. Usually, there is a sore throat, chills, vomiting, or convulsions and fever. His skin is dry and hot. His tongue is furred, and, under this white covering, it is red and swollen. In ordinary cases, these early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash, little flat points, close together, appear first on the neck and chest and soon the rash, very red in color, spreads over most of the body.

The doctor is required by law to report the case to the local health officer. Do your part by following carefully the quarantine instructions which the health officer will give you, since a severe or fatal case of scarlet fever may develop from contact with someone who has only a light attack. Children who have had scarlet fever or who have been exposed, must not return to school until permission is given by the health officer and physician.

Flomot Youth Killed in Plane Crash in Arizona

A message was received in Flomot about 1 a. m. Wednesday stating that Curtis A. Meece, Jr. had been killed in an accident. The Post could not learn the nature of the accident, nor any particulars at this time. The youth, who was about 19 years old, had left Flomot October 7, on his way to join an uncle Worth Hunt, at Phoenix, Ariz. Mr. Hunt was also injured in the accident, and at first was reported killed, but later reports denied this and stated that he was in a hospital at Phoenix.

The Stewart ambulance from Turkey left Wednesday morning for Phoenix to return the body to Flomot and was expected to arrive sometime Thursday evening. No funeral arrangements had been made.

Curtis was the son of Mrs. A. B. Cloyd of Flomot, and Curtis A. Meece, Sr., of Fort Worth. He had lived at Flomot since a very small child, and attended the Flomot schools. He served in the Medical corps of the Navy during the war and saw action in the Pacific. He received his discharge in the Spring of this year.

Besides his parents, and step father, he is survived by two younger brothers James Dickie and Dale Meece, several uncles and aunts and other relatives.

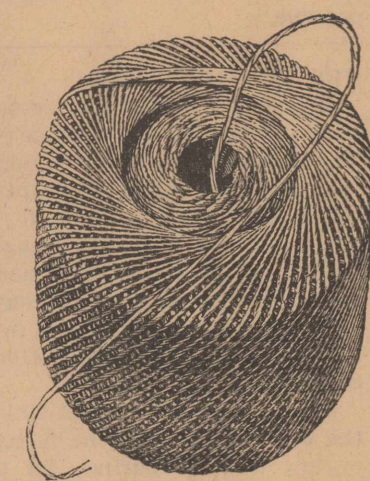
