## Chamber To Renovate County Rodeo Arena

An agreement was signed Monday between the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce and Western Riding Club giving control of the Riding Club Arena on West Highway 80 to the Chamber.

The agreement is subject to approval by the

Mitchell County Commissioners who have already given tentative approval and will again consider the matter in a meeting Monday when the agreement between the Chamber and Riding Club is presented to them in writing.

They gave tentative

approval after the agreement was told to them verbally. The County owns the land and leases it to the Riding Club and will be asked to change the lease to the Chamber of Commerce and make it for a longer term than present.

Approval and signing of the agreement was one of the main items on the agenda for a special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Monday morning.

The Chamber has asked the Riding Club for an agreement so that the Chamber could be guaranteed the right to hold the annual American Junior Rodeo Association (AJRA) Rodeo. In order to continue to do this, the Chamber is making plans to spend a considerable amount of money to totally rebuild the arena.

The Riding Club and its president, Joe Anderson, proposed that the control of the arena be turned over to the Chamber with the consent of the club. See CLUB Page 12

## Community Election To Be Held By ASCS

Mitchell County farmers are currently receiving letters in the mail in regard to an election of Community Committee members to be held December 3.

Farmers should receive ballots about 10 days prior to the election date, according to Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service Director Don Stewart.

The ASC communities in the county are: A Community, west of Colorado River, B Community, north of IS 20 and east of Colorado River, and C Community, south of IS 20 and east of Colorado River.

"Each farmer will be sent a ballot for the community in which his

principal farming interest is located," Stewart said.

A slate of at least six nominees will be developed for each community.

Currently a letter is being mailed to farmers including a blank petition suitable for nominating candidates, he noted.

The form must be signed by at least three eligible voters in the community and is limited to one nominee.

The nominee must certify willingness to serve if elected and the petition returned to the ASCS Office by October 29.

"In the event, six or more eligible candidates are nominated, no further nominations will be made. However, if less than six are nominated, the present Community Committee will add the number of nominees needed to complete the slate," Stewart said.

"Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. Members of the County Committee are not eligible to serve," Stewart stated.

Duties of Community Committee members include: informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of the ASCS programs; keeping the County Committee informed of local conditions; recommending needed changes in farm programs; participating in community meet-

ings. There are 14 posts in District Eight and about 300 people are expected to attend.

The convention will open at 1 p.m. Saturday and will conclude with a luncheon at noon Sunday.

### Mitchell County TEHA Members Enjoy Luncheon

The Mitchell County T.E.H.A. members and guests enjoyed a luncheon Thursday in the Medallion Room of Lone Wolf Electric and heard reports of the 53rd Annual State Convention held in Fort Worth, September 25, 26, and 27.

Mrs. Mabel Givens, TEHA Chairman, introduced the delegates, Mrs. E.E. Cummings, Mrs. Floyd Griffin and Mrs. Raymond Wheeler who reviewed the highlights and events of the convention.

The welcome address was brought by Mike Moncrief, Judge of Tarrant County, who spoke on the theme of the convention, "Home, the Basic Unit of Society." He noted that many factors contribute to the breakdown of the home; jealousy among family members, no responsibility given to children, parents are servants to their children-too permissive and too complacent. "When you put the child together right, then the home and society will be right," Judge Moncrief concluded.

Dr. Isleta L. Kudlaty of Lamar University delivered the keynote address on "Stress Management for Homemakers." "Stress will either be evaded or met head-on," she noted. "It can be positive as well as negative. The negative produces worry and depression, best counteracted by constructive activity. The positive stress yields an energetic response in accomplishment."

Beverly Barber, Nutritionist for the American Bakers Association, brought a presentation on the topic, "Bread Nutrition Facts." She emphasized the importance of carbohydrates in a well-balanced diet—even in the reducing diet. She illustrated her point by holding up eight slices of bread as the daily

need for carbohydrates, adding that rice, potatoes or macaroni could replace the bread. "Americans would do well to reduce fats, sugars, and salt in their diet," she stated.

The delegates attended the following workshops: Publicity and Membership, Cultural Arts and Recreation, Family Life, 4-H, Safety and Citizenship. Allen Tate Wood spoke to the workshop on Citizenship about "The Cult of the Moonies" telling his experiences as a former Moonie and warning of the dangers. His book "Moonstruck" relates his story and how he escaped back to a normal life.

## Myra Robinson Used Short Duration Grazing

Myra Robinson uses a short duration grazing system under a soil conservation program. This is a one-herd system where cattle are rotated between fifteen pastures. Fields with the most pastures receive only about one month grazing each.

Myra Robinson was one of the first in Mitchell County to use this type grazing system. She has used it about eight years. The system has increased the desirable grasses and maintained the seeded grasses, according to SCS.

This year she root-plowed 435 acres and seeded it to Kleingrass, sideoats grama, green sprangletop and blue panicum as a part of her Great Plains Conservation Program contract.

These pastures were deferred until the grass became established and are part of her grazing system, SCS reports.

This short duration grazing has increased grass production. Myra believes it pays and is easier to work the livestock. She also uses this system of grazing on her Long Ranch near the Howard County line.

**School District Honors Lease**

The Colorado School Board, in a called session Tuesday night, decided to stay with the car leasing agreement made with Jay Adams Chevrolet - Oldsmobile Company at the regular monthly meeting on Oct. 9.

At that meeting, the board had accepted an offer from Joe Weaver, president of Jay Adams Chevrolet-Olds, that the school would lease five vehicles for one year at a monthly rate of \$175 per vehicle plus eight cents per mile for every mile over 6,000 driven in each vehicle in a six month period.

This was an increase over the previous agreement with Jay Adams which called for a rate of \$90 per month per vehicle plus the eight cents per mile over 6,000 mile.

Weaver's offer stated that he was being forced to increase his rates because of the increasing rate of interest and other factors.

At the Oct. 9 meeting, the board members stated that they had gotten the impression from Dave Hutchins, president of Hutchins' Ford, that he wasn't interested in leasing cars to the school.

Hutchins, however, appeared before the board Tuesday night and stated that he wasn't interested in the bid when it was \$90 per month per vehicle because it wasn't profitable. He added that at \$175 per month it would be profitable to lease the vehicles and he went on to say, "I want some of the profit."

Hutchins stated that he thought that all the car dealers should have a chance to bid on the leasing agreement because "We have to keep it fair."

Board member Gene Blasingame replied to Hutchins' remarks, "We were led to believe you weren't interested in a leasing agreement at any price and we were looking for something to keep us going."

Hutchins repeated that he hadn't been interested at \$90 per month but he added again that he felt that letting out bids was the only fair way to settle the matter.

At one point in the discussion the point was brought up that the school board wasn't under any obligation to call for bids on the leasing agreement.

According to the Texas Education Code, Section 21.901, the school board must call for bids on a purchase contract if the value of the property to be purchased is more than \$2,000. This, however, was not a purchase contract, it was merely an agreement to lease the vehicles and Section 21.901 did not apply.

Weaver was also present at the meeting and stated, "I can't see any big profit in this thing." He added that \$175 was reasonable because of the type of vehicles that were involved.

After further discussion, Board President Tom Rees asked for a motion to rescind the contract with Jay Adams Chevrolet-Oldsmobile and put the agreement out for bids.

of the taxing district, the hospital district will be forced to pay the \$5,000 plus the \$18,000. Rees indicated he would obtain a ruling if possible.

After a silence of several moments with no mention being made, Rees declared that the matter was closed and the agreement with Jay Adams would stand.

Both car dealers left immediately without comment.

Hospital billing and statements have been delayed this month due to the change over to a computer program, Business Manager George Witten said.

Root indicated this situation has impaired cash flow and requested permission of the board to borrow funds from the bank for a 30 to 60 day period to adjust to the situation. The board voted in favor of obtaining the loan if necessary.

of the judge's time is spent in the capacity of veterans' service officer. County welfare takes about 10 per cent of his time.

The county judge is responsible for all mental, drug or alcoholic commitment to institutions. Any juvenile detained or held in custody must be with the approval of Judge Carter.

Carter serves as ex-officio county school superintendent, transportation or purchasing agent.

In his capacity as veteran's service officer, Carter has had 445 contacts since December 1, 1978.

He handles requests for veteran's loans, hospital admittance, dependent benefits, pension inquiries and social work.

Carter noted that in November of each year, questionnaires are sent to all dependents and disabled veterans for completion through his office.

He assists persons in obtaining information for benefits to dependent children in school or in obtaining copies of old documents for filing claims.

Because Mitchell County is small and has no Welfare Department, Carter noted, his office

handles the burial of paupers.

Needy and indigent persons are also assisted through the county judges office under the auspices of the Salvation Army.

The county judge's office is responsible for issuance of delayed birth certificates.

In his capacity as civil judge, Carter hears all probate cases within the county. Law requires that a will must be probated on the first Monday within ten days after filing the application.

In a mental, drug or alcoholic civil case, the judge must determine, in a formal hearing, if

the individual is non compos mentis (not mentally capable). An emergency commitment may be declared and the person transported to the Big Spring Mental Hospital.

In the case of a juvenile offender the case is always a civil one. The juvenile is afforded the same rights as an adult but there are only two charges which can be brought against him, Carter stated.

The child may be declared a juvenile delinquent, in which case he may be sent to the Juvenile Center in Brownwood, or he may be declared a juvenile in need of supervision.

A child with three or more offenses may be sent to Brownwood. The maximum period of probation is one year. This time may be extended by holding formal hearings annually until the age 17, Carter said.

It is within the power of the county judge to place a child on a provisional schedule limiting his activities, Carter said.

Parents are responsible for up to \$5,000 in damages in the case of a juvenile offense.

The county judge hears all criminal cases brought by the County Attorney's Office.

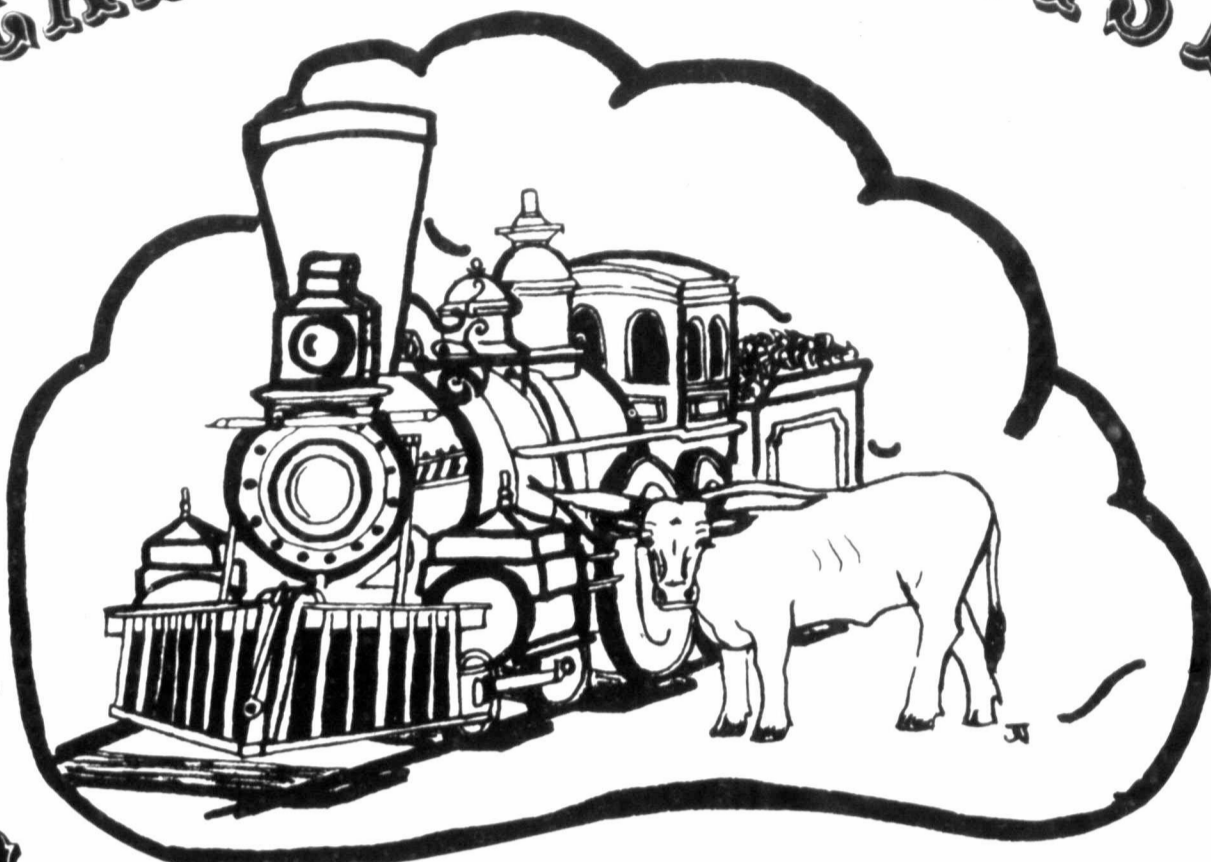

dition that the Riding Club could continue to use it for ropings and other activities. This was the agreement that was signed between the two groups Monday.

The Chamber directors also approved a basic design for rebuilding of the arena and asked that Anderson head up the effort. The Chamber has pledged \$3,000 to rebuild the arena and several individuals have pledged to match that pledge and another individual has said he will match all the pledges, giving the rodeo arena fund \$12,000 to start on.

Funds are being sought from the public to help pay for the rebuilding of the arena and those wishing to make donations may do so by going by the City National Bank and designating money for the rodeo arena fund or go by the Chamber of Commerce office.

Chamber Director Travis Cawthron also reported that he is having some difficulty in finding a stock producer for next year's rodeo and said those he has talked to have indicated the price will be as much as double the \$3,400 paid this past year.

This past year's producer, Bobby Kelley of Stanton, is getting out of the rodeo producing business and will not be available this next year.

Cawthron said one producer has said he will supply bucking stock for about the total price paid for all of last year's stock and that the Chamber will have to supply some 50 to 60 calves for roping and the down events. This is the way the Chamber may have to do it, Cawthron noted.

The directors also discussed having a dance one or two nights during the rodeo to help offset anticipated increases in expenses.

Sheriff Bill McGuire was also present for the meeting and said he had asked famed clown Quail Dobbs to appear at the rodeo but he will be appearing in another rodeo at that time.

The rebuilding of the rodeo arena will feature all-metal chutes and fences and stands for the spectators. The bucking chutes will be

placed on the south side so that stock will buck out toward the crowd on the north side. By placing the crowd on the north side, they will not have to face the sun during the summer evenings and it is hoped that awnings can be placed over the stands to provide shade for afternoon ropings.

Anderson plans to start building the bucking chutes first.

One of the problems with the existing arena is that stock producers say it is not safe for stock and it is crowded.

In other matters before the Chamber board Monday, final plans were made for the Railroad Arts & Crafts Festival set for this weekend. A work night to get the fair barns ready for the event was held Monday night.

Chamber President Mac McKinnon appointed Carl Beery Moore, Joe Kirschbaum and Chris Hubbard to a committee to nominate five directors to come onto the board next year as required by the Chamber's by-laws.

McKinnon also reported that there have been no other applications for the Chamber manager's job.



 Danny Davis and the Nashville Brass had just enough brass to accumulate 10 dynamic renditions of tunes from the big band era that may be an explosive best seller

It is, coincidentally, titled "Danny Davis and the Nashville Brass and Great Songs of the Big Band Era" (RCA AHL1-3415)

On this particular album, Danny and the Brass may have found themselves on the thin margin between country and pop. The album just possibly could be categorized in "undecided" territory musicwise when it is placed in the hands of today's picky program directors in radio.

The album cover depicts palm trees, tuxedos and champagne, indicating a throw-back to the dress and style of the bandstands in the '30s and '40s. The massive sound on the shellac is certain to please the ears of the followers of the big band sound.

The set contains such memorables as "String of Pearls," "Cherokee," "I'll Never Smile Again," "Moonlight Serenade," "Ain't Misbehavin'," "I'm Gonna Sit Right Down and Write Myself a Letter," "Smoke Rings," "Let's Dance," "Sentimental Journey" and "Oh!"

Even though the tracks contain noticeable steel guitar bits, possibly to satisfy the authentic country music radio station brass, a much greater percentage of the arrangements are directed toward the followers of the big band sound of bygone days. And I'm sure Danny is not apologizing for that obvious fact.

All-in-all, I found the album super-class and super-brass.

Johnny Cash's new Columbia album consists of 10 cuts that prove again that Big John is still the pyramid of country music vocalists.

As in the case of most Cash releases, "Johnny Cash Silver" (Columbia 36086) leaves the impression he is his next single. "I'm Gonna Sit on my Porch and Pick on my Ole Guitar" (which could also be his next single), "Lonesome to the Bone," "Bull Rider," "I'll Say It's True" (with the great George Jones), "Ghost Riders in the Sky" (this recent single), "Muddy Waters," "West Centerbury Subdivision Blues," "Lately I Been Leaning Toward the Blues" and the much done "Cocaine Blues."

It's an ear-appealing stack of songs by the mighty Cash. He's never been in a better voice.

Single-record wise, Sonny Curtis, the former Lubbock, Texas, picker, singer and writer, has a potential smash in his new Elektra record, "The Cowboy Singer" (Elektra E 46526). Ernest Tubb & Friends (this time it's Merle Haggard and Chet Atkins) rewarble E.T.'s old standard theme song, "Walkin' The Floor Over You." It may not be as big as his latest, "Waltz Across Texas" (with the help of Willie Nelson), but it's bound to be mighty big based on listener requests. One of the finest new releases, even though it's slow in catching on, is "Love Doesn't Care Whose House It Lives In" (Little Darlin' LD 792-2) by Charlie Louvin and Emmylou Harris. Leon Rausch sings the heck out of "You Can Be Replaced" (Derrick DRC 124). Leon is long overdue for a hit record to match his fantastic talent. Marty Robbins' new "Buenos Dias Argentina" (Columbia 1-11102) is good. It may not be as big as most of Marty's past releases, but it's certain to be a biggie.

With the current country music stars following the financially successful pathways of their cousins in other sets of show business, Hank Williams Jr. now has his book on the stands. It's a very well-written no-holds-barred 215-page hardback published by Putnam. I consider it to be one of the greatest books ever written by a country music star.

Hank Jr., almost an outlaw, doesn't hold back a letter in telling it like it is when it comes to following in the tracks of a legend father.

Hank, with the help of Michael Bane, pulls no punches in this most readable collection of wild words, that the non-conformist of ballads still retains that most respected position of being big enough and important enough to select his own material regardless of what the Columbia hierarches might think.

In this particular set of grooves, Johnny warbles through the Tom T. Hall composition "The L & N Don't Stop Here Anymore" (which could deservingly

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamasa, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles

northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

### AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LORAIN, TEXAS DECLARING CERTAIN OFFENSES AGAINST PERSONS AS MISDEMEANORS AND PRESCRIBING PUNISHMENT THEREFOR.

WHEREAS, the citizens of Loraine, Texas will strive to promote, through fair, orderly and lawful procedures the opportunity for each citizen to enjoy a good, wholesome and decent dwelling without regard to his race, color, religion or national origin; and, WHEREAS, the citizens of Loraine, Texas recognize the inalienable right of each citizen as a human being to provide for himself and his family a dwelling according to his own choosing; and further, that the denial of such rights through considerations based upon race, color, religion or national origin is detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of its inhabitants and constitutes an unjust denial or deprivation government to prevent; Now, therefore,

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LORAIN, TEXAS:**

Article 1: That to refuse to sell or rent, or to refuse to negotiate for the sale or the rental of, or otherwise make unavailable or deny, a dwelling

to any person because of race, color, religion or national origin shall be a denial of these constitutional rights.

Article 2: That to discriminate against any person in the terms, conditions or privileges of sale or rental of a dwelling, or in the provision of services or facilities in connection therewith, because of race, color, religion or national origin shall be a denial of these constitutional rights.

Article 3: That to make, print or publish or to cause to be made, printed, or published any notice, statement or advertisement, with respect to the sale or rental of a dwelling that indicates any preference, limitation or discrimination based on race, color, religion or national origin or an intention to make any such preference, limitation or discrimination shall be a denial of these constitutional rights.

Article 4: That to represent to any person because of race, color, religion, or national origin that any dwelling is not available for inspection, sale or rental when such dwelling is in fact so available shall be a denial of these constitutional rights.

Article 5: That for profit, or the hope or expectation of profit, to induce or attempt to induce any person to sell or rent any dwelling by representations regarding the entry or prospective entry into a neighborhood of a particular race, color, religion, or national origin shall be a denial of these constitutional rights.

Article 6: That any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a fine of not more than two hundred dollars (\$200) and each transaction in violation of any of the provisions thereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

Article 7: That it is the intention of the City Council that the articles, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases are separable, and if any article, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining articles, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases of this

Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this Ordinance of unconstitutional or invalid articles, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases.
