Steers Pass By Loraine

LORAIN — A tremendous Robert Lee aerial attack riddled Loraine defenses and gained a 29-0 win over the Bulldogs in a 4-B battle Friday night.

The Steers hit on 10 of 17 passes for 188 yards and three touchdowns.

After a scoreless first period, it seemed an extremely tight football game, but late in the second quarter the Steers made a pair of quick touchdowns to take a 12-0 halftime lead.

Scores came on a-rials from quarterback Gary Williams to Gaylon Pitcock for 15 and 42 yards.

Scoreless play marked the third quarter, but the Steers roared back for two tallies and a field goal in the final period to insure victory.

Donnie Devoll slashed one yard to paydirt for the first fourth period score and the Steers got a two-point conversion.

Devoll gathered in a Williams pass for 22 yards to get the final touchdown.

Tackle Glen Roach ended Robert Lee scoring with a 33-yard field goal just before the final whistle.

Stanley Hackfeld was Loraine's leading rusher with 33 yards in 10 carries. Guard Louis Rose played an outstanding defensive game for Loraine getting in on nine assists and three unassisted tackles.

POEM ON "THEN AND NOW"

Joe Earnest Charms Old Timers Audience

Hit of the Old Times Day reunion was the speech of Joe Earnest who addressed the 225 registered guests in original rhyme.

Earnest's six-page (legal size sheets) poem was in the nostalgic vein done in the mood of Ogen Nash verses with unusual and unexpected rhymes.

Included in the collecting narrative were many old family names, professions, businesses, early teachers, scenes and shenanigans of yesterday's youth in Colorado City.

Earnest, attorney, city judge and longtime resident here, called his speech in poetry "Then and Now."

"Our old games were slow ones Old Maid, Flinch, Parchesi and checkers. Now they're Canasta and Duplicate bridge and other home wreckers."

Outdoor games were bug-ridden, kick the can, hide and seek.

Or swimming at Round Rock, Little Blue, roaming up and down Lone Wolf Creek," the Earnest saga began.

From the start, he continued to coin couplets comparing "Then and Now."

"Children didn't drive cars at 80 miles per hour, or have such tendencies."

And high schoolers learned grammar from Nancy Ellis by diagramming sentences."

At another point he came up with, "If there are any girl basketball players now,

I've not heard of any as good as Lottie Pritchett and Winnie Quinney."

He mentioned, in rhyme, Miss Ella Dry, Mable Smith, Charlie Adams, Dr. Coleman, Nettie Sneed, T. J. Roe, Mike Ratliff, Jake Maurer, Lottie Pritchett, Winnie Quinney, Lee Jones, Ed Jones, Robert M. Webb, Colonel Mullins.

Then he listed practically every well known name in the town's history declaring he hadn't mentioned them before because he couldn't find any words to "rhyme their names with."

He also rhymed Joe Earnest concluded with these lines:

"What I've said is stored in my mind — I didn't borrow it."

"Now you know why I was never asked to be, or elected, Mitchell County's poet laureate."

Changes are, since that speech in poetry took the reunion by storm, that Joe Earnest could win such an honor — if there were one with no trouble.

Certainly he was the Poet Laureate of Old Times Day.

TAKES PLAINVIEW POST

Dr. Ralph Graham Resigns Position

Dr. Ralph Graham, pastor of First Christian Church here since May 30, 1961, has resigned to take a similar position with the First Christian Church in Plainview.

Dr. Graham will assume his new duties on Dec. 1 at the 478-member church.

He revealed his decision to leave in a Wednesday night meeting of the church's board.

An active worker in the community, Dr. Graham activities included being a member of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors, second vice president of Lions Club, chairman of Tuberculosis Assn. Christmas Seals program, president of the Mutual Investment Club, Masonic Lodge chaplain, vice presi-

dent of American Red Cross and a director in the Mental Health Clinic.

In church activities Dr. Graham served a term as president of Mitchell County Ministerial Alliance and is also president of District 5, Texas Christian Churches.

An active member of the Colorado City Playhouse, he had roles in the productions, "Haunting of Hill House" and "Mary Mary."

A new Bible course being taught at Colorado High School is being instructed by Dr. Graham.

His wife, Irene, is president of the United Church Women, vice president of Christian Women's Fellowship and a member of Hesperian Club.

Planning Work Started

City Council voted in a special Wednesday night meeting to assume responsibility for keeping Root Memorial Hospital in full operation by purchase, lease or other means until a hospital district is created.

Attorneys and bondsmen are now working for the city to find the best way for acquiring the hospital.

The council met in an informal session, with the attorneys and bonding men Monday to go over plans for acquisition of the hospital.

Eventual answer to the city's need for hospital services will be a hospital district that is expected to be in operation by the summer of 1967.

Rep. Temple Dickson and Sen. David Ratliff will introduce legislation in the coming session of the Texas Legislature to get the district in to shape for an election.

Both of the legislators will introduce their bills as soon as possible after the session opens in January.

County Commissioners voted Wednesday morning to continue payment for welfare patients in county hospitals through 1967. This move gave added financial help to whom ever was operating the hospital. The court had earlier voted to pay for indigent care for 1966 in a move designed to keep the hospital in operation for 60 days.

Owner Charles Root had originally planned to close the hospital on Oct. 15 due to losses in revenue.

Numerous citizen committees have been working on the problem in an effort to find a solution to the problem.

City is also negotiating with Root to find the most practical way for the city to assume the hospital operation.

Information from attorneys and bondsmen is expected this week as to the plans on acquiring the hospital according to City Manager Ford Merritt.

Sale Plans Announced

Max Berman has announced plans for the future sale of his department store in Colorado City.

Buyer for the store has not been revealed.

Berman has been in business here since March of 1920 and in his present location since 1931.

His future plans call for a "long vacation."

Berman thanked the people of Colorado City and the area for their patronage in over 46 years that he has been in business.

TOUGH DEFENSIVE BATTLE

Wolves Tie Bulldogs 6-6

Who won the game Friday night between Stamford and Colorado City?

That's a hard question to answer. The score ended 6-6 after four periods of close play highlighted by leather poppin' tough defensive action on both sides.

Colorado City won the battle of the statistics that went like this with the Wolves total listed first: first downs, 10 to 7; rushing, 130 to 150; passing, 43 to 33. Each lost two fumbles and the Wolves had a pass intercepted.

If you look at penetrations, and that is what would happen should the two teams tie for district, Stamford came out on top 3-1. Other than those figures it was about as close and bruising a battle as fans have seen in Wolf Stadium in several years.

After two quarters of play, there was still a lot of comment about who would win. The Bulldogs had gotten an edge in statistics in the first half, but the scoreboard still read 0-0.

But with 3:44 left in the

third period, the light pattern on the board changed and Stamford had six and the Wolves zero.

The Bulldogs drove 61 yards in six plays to paydirt. The scoring play was a 15-yard pass from Russ Russell to Don Cobb. A mixup on the point after left the Bulldogs with six scant points between them and the fired up Wolves.

After a faulty field goal try by Stamford, the Wolves took over on their own 29-yard line and 10 plays later had marched to the six yard line where quarterback Glen Nix turned and twisted his way over the scoring stripe for a six-pointer.

Try for point was low and bounded into an onrushing mass of Stamford linemen.

Three key plays by senior halfback Wayne Russell kept the drive alive along with an 11-yard completion to Dan Steakley and bruising runs by Donnie Higginbotham.

Hig got the initial first down on a seven-yard burst through the Bulldog defense. Nix then hit Steakley for 11 and another first at the 42-yard line.

Steakley was thrown back a yard as the Bulldog defense toughened, but Russell, who had come off the bench only moments earlier, darted and dashed for 12 yards into Colorado City territory for another first down.

Two plays gained only four yards, but Russell then took a Nix aerial and darted 13 yards for a first down on the Stamford 30-yard line.

The call again went to Russell who managed four yards before biting the dust. A late hitting Bulldog caught the referee's eye and cost Stamford 15 more yards and the Wolves were in business on the 13-yard stripe.

A well-executed delay play to Higginbotham got seven yards before Stamford caught on. Then Nix got the needed distance to paydirt and the tying touchdown.

First quarter of play ended in a stalemate with neither team able to do much against the other's defense.

Higginbotham recovered a Bulldog fumble, but three plays later a Stamford defender gathered up a Nix pass to even the count.

The Wolves held and got the ball back after a punt, but Dan Steakley lost the ball on the first play and the Bulldogs got it back as the first period ended.

Stamford moved deep in to Wolf territory and had a first down on the 11-yard line when Robert Mathers leaped on another Bulldog bobble and saved a Bulldog score.

The Wolves got moving going early in the third period after a 23-yard kick-off return by Russell, but a fumble by Bubba Kennedy gave the ball over to Stamford.

Two series later Stamford got on their scoring drive that was highlighted by a 36-yard run by Van Grimes to the Wolf 29.

Following the Stamford score, the Wolves were moving good before bogging down. Riley Tilley's punt was blocked and the Bulldogs took over on the C-

ity 12-yard line.

Three plays later the stout hearted Colorado City defense had moved the Bulldogs back some five yards from where an unsuccessful field goal was tried.

Leading the brutal defensive charge of the Wolves were linemen Ascension Bonilla, Russell Gundrum, Sammy Parham and Robert Mathers. Linebackers Ronnie Wilson and Macca Findley made consistent tackles along with Kennedy and Gary Parker.

Ralph Lindsay and Randy Parker handled themselves well in the secondary.

Steakley was the leading Colorado City rusher with 63 yards in 20 carries and Higginbotham collected 37 yards. Russell got 16 yards in three carries and Kennedy a like number on three totes.
