Wolf Hunters Meet Here Monday

Tragedy Visits Two Homes In This Section

Prominent Farmer Killed In Auto Accident; Baby Is Victim Of Poisoning

Stark tragedy stalked into two Dawson County homes this week and claimed the lives of a man and a 2-year-old baby, within twenty-four hours of each other.

Walter Thomas, well known farmer of the Welch community was injured in an automobile accident near the New Mexico State line Sunday, and died from his injuries on Tuesday.

Little Glenn Curtis Hindman, 2-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Hindman, who live near Key, died in a local hospital Tuesday night as the result of drinking some poisoning which was being used to poison worms.

Walter Thomas Killed As Tire Blows Out Sun.

Walter Thomas, pioneer farmer of the Welch community, died Tuesday as the result of an automobile accident which occurred Sunday night.

Mr. Thomas, together with his wife, was taking his daughter, Mrs. James Phillips and little son, to their home in Hobbs, after they had been visiting in the Thomas home.

About two miles this side of the state line, a tire on the Thomas car blew out, causing it to overturn. Mrs. Phillips received painful cuts and bruises, while Mrs. Thomas and the baby escaped injury.

Services were held at the Fairview Church Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with Rev. A. A. Watson officiating. Interment was made in the Fairview Cemetery. He had been a member of the Baptist Church for forty years.

He was born November 14, 1880, and died September 16, 1941.

Survivors include the widow, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Thomas, four brothers, two sisters, the following children: Dewey Thomas of Welch, Marvin Thomas of California, Mrs. M. Swinson of Lamesa, Mrs. James Phillips of Hobbs, and seven grandchildren.

He drank the poison around 3:30 Tuesday afternoon and was immediately rushed to a Lamesa hospital, succumbing at 10:25 the same night.

Church Of Christ Congregation And Friends Celebrate Paying Of Debt

The beautiful Church of Christ building reproduced on this page, is the outgrowth of a small congregation that was first established in 1903 and governed by an elder.

The first elders of the young church were Eros, Coffee, Stone and Stockton, and the first local minister was Grady O. Woods.

In 1908 the congregation erected their first building, and as the body grew, a large building was planned and constructed, being used by the

church until 1927, when it was apparent that the great growth of the congregation demanded larger and more adequate quarters, so this beautiful structure was started, at a cost of \$25,000.

The depression of the late twenties and early thirties, made the going rough for the congregation, but they never gave up.

Under the ministry of Bro. J. C. Foster, now of Frederick, Oklahoma, the congregation began a special drive in 1937, working to-

gether as one unit to erase the debt against their building. On September 8th of this year the congregation realized their goal and the final note was paid.

A special celebration is being held this (Thursday) afternoon on the church property where members and friends will gather and rejoice together.

Their present minister is O. H. Tabor, formerly of Stamford, who assumed his duties only a few days ago.

Rain Totaling 2.11 Inches Is Recorded Here

To Let Contract For Paving of 15 Through Borden

Word was received in Lamesa Thursday morning by Sam Richardson, that the Texas Highway Department had appropriated \$300,000 for the completion of Highway 15 in Borden County, the work to get underway within a very short time.

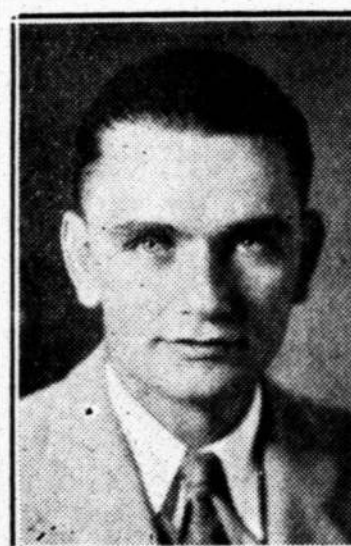
Grading and drainage has been completed on this section for some time, but the topping and completion was not expected for some time to come, by road enthusiasts in this section. This appropriation will be sufficient to complete the entire road in every detail, it is pointed out.

As is generally known, the highway through Scurry County is now being completed with topping being put on at this time, and with the completion of the Gail sector, Highway Fifteen will be hard surfaced its entire length from Fort Worth to El Paso, with the exception of about

fifteen miles through Fisher County. It is thought that the Highway Department will take care of this section within a short time. With the Bankhead Highway facing a heavy congestion of traffic due to the Defense Program, the completion of this road is being pushed ahead so as to divert some of the traffic off the older road.

Word from Borden County officials state that the location of caliche pits is already under way there, and that as soon as they are located the contract for the road will be let, probably some time in October.

Local enthusiasts will welcome this piece of news, for Lamesa has staged a long and hard fight to see Highway Fifteen paved from one end to the other, feeling that its completion will mean much to Lamesa as well as every other town along the route.

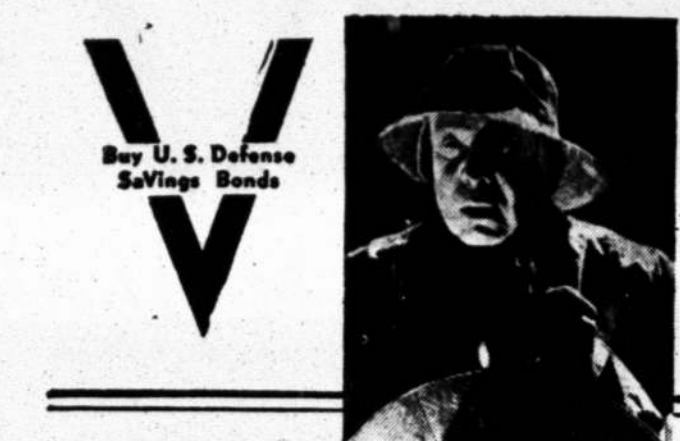

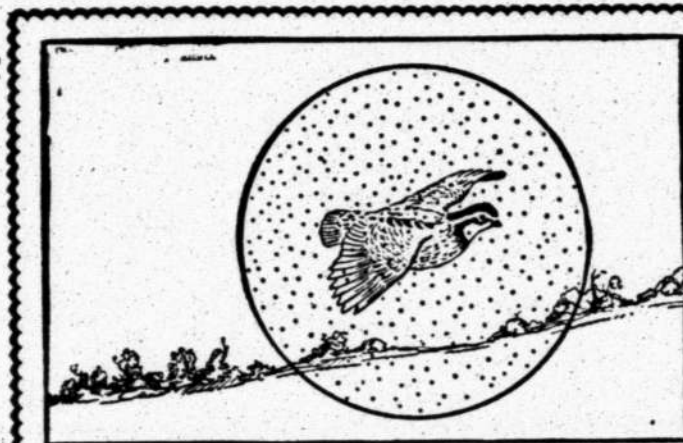

Quarterly Return Due On Social Security Taxes

The next quarterly social security tax return is due in the office of the Collector of Internal Revenue on September 30, according to Robert M. Mayne, manager of the Big Spring Office of the Social Security Board. Each employer was cautioned to include the name and social security account number of each employee to whom wages were paid during the previous calendar quarter.

"In making this tax return, every employer of one or more individuals in work covered by the social security law is required to list each employee's account number, his name, and amount of wages paid. This wage report with the tax money paid by the employer and the employee is sent direct to the Collector of Internal Revenue. After the tax return is checked by the Treasury Department, the wage report is then sent to the Social Security Board in order that each employee's earnings may be credited to his old-age and survivors insurance account. Wages of an employee are thus credited to his account after the employer's report is received by the Social Security Board," Mayne said.

"In nearly all instances," Mayne continued, "the employee's wages are reported under the name and social security account number shown on his account number card, and the wage earnings are added to his own individual ledger account."

count. However, if some discrepancy turns up in the name of account number, there is difficulty in posting wages. This necessitates asking the employer to check back on his records, and frequently the worker himself has to be contacted in order that his account may be properly adjusted."

Mayne explained that such annoyance and waste of time can be avoided if the employee and employer will take the simple precaution of seeing that the employee's name and social security account number are reported exactly as they appear on the account number card issued by the Social Security Board.

Farmers Having Cotton Equities Being Notified

Cotton growers of Dawson County who still retain their equities in loan cotton for 1938, 1939, and 1940, will be interested in the following letter which has been mailed by the secretary of the A. C. A. Vernon Martin. The letter is self explanatory.

"This notice is being mailed to all Dawson County producers who cotton in the 1938, 1939, or 1940 loan.

"Many producers are not aware of the equity that they may have in loan cotton. This office has been advised that on the basis of present markets middling 15-16 inch cotton in the 1938 loan is worth approximately 6 1-2 cents per pound above the 1938 loan. Most of these producers, will very likely wish to redeem this cotton rather than wait for the settlement from pool operations.

"The Department of Agriculture has announced that Commodity Credit Corporation will allow producers until October 1, 1941, to repay outstanding loans and redeem cotton pledged under the 1938, 1939 and 1940 loan programs.

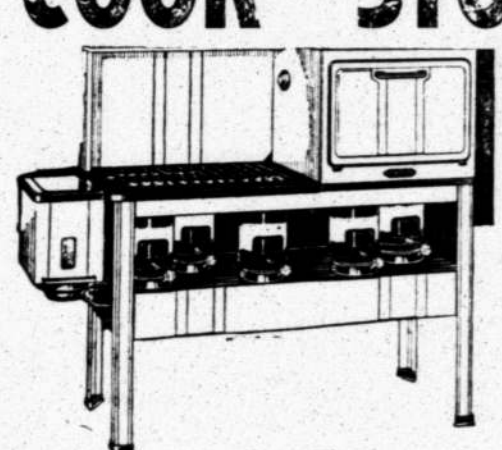
"The Department has also announced that all of this cotton not redeemed by October 1, 1941, will be placed in pools, as provided in the loan agreement, and sold in an orderly manner by Commodity Credit Corporation. Under this plan unredeemed loan cotton from each crop will be placed in a separate pool, with the producer retaining title to the cotton.

"On final liquidation of all cotton in each pool, the net proceeds, if any, after deduction of all advances and accrued costs, including storage, insurance, and handling charges, will be distributed among producers whose cotton has been placed in the pool, in proportion to their interest. No payment will be made to the producers at the time the cotton is placed in the pool and individual producers will not be entitled to order the sale of the particular cotton which they placed in the pool. No sales of these pool stocks will be made prior to March 1, 1942."

Navy To Expand Subcontracting To Aid Industry

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 — Acting Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal today issued orders designed to further spread Naval defense contracts just as widely as possible, limited only by the paramount consideration of expediting rational defense and by existing laws.

The orders issued specifically aim for a greater degree of subcontracting; a greater subdividing of original purchases, and the assisting in the conversion of industrial plants engaged in producing normal civilian use products to render them capable of turning out articles needed vitally in national defense.

The order directs the formation of the Naval Contracts Distribution Division in the office of the Under Secretary of the Navy. The new division is directed to formulate policies and procedure subject to the approval of the Under Secretary of the Navy and to take all other necessary steps essential to carry out the Navy's part in attaining the objectives of the President's executive order of September 4 designed to help communities and employees

whose industries are threatened by shutdown or dislocation by withdrawal of raw products needed for manufacturing in defense fields.

Efforts will be made to utilize the services of plants, which otherwise would face shutdown, through the placing of navy contracts and subcontracts; also through Office of Production Management to assist in training employees of such plants to take their place in turning out defense items.

The Acting Secretary emphasized the necessity of producing immediate results to forestall hardships on firms, employees and communities and simultaneously to obtain the maximum use of existing equipment and personnel in producing articles vital to National Defense. He pointed out that the magnitude of the National Defense effort is seriously affecting industrial life of the country through the application of priority needs and through the shortage of certain materials and other factors.

The Navy's cooperation looking toward the relief of the industrial situation will include expediting of National Defense work by furthering subcontracting; assisting and advising potential contractors for navy work, and in general obtaining the greatest possible spread of defense production consistent with speed and efficiency. It must be recognized, the Acting Secretary pointed out, that the broader the field employed for producing de-

fense articles, the more rapid will be the ultimate rate of production.

The Navy is not embarking on a new policy but simply stretching every effort to expand its existing practices. During past months, the Navy, in connection with the first while defense contract service of the Office of Production Management, has been exceedingly active in distributing work widely and in subcontracting.

Within each of the continental Naval districts there have been created under the District Material Officer of each district, groups of special reserve officers experienced in production, whose duties are to collaborate with and assist in defense contract service through their branch offices in the thirty-six branches of the Federal Reserve banking system. Results have been to increase materially the number of naval contractors and distribution of naval work as compared with the situation a year ago.

Similarly, in the Navy Yards, and other naval industrial shore establishments, the practice of "farming out" has been pushed to an increasing pace with consequent benefit to smaller industries. The prime contracting agencies of the Navy Department, including the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts, yards and docks, ships, aeronautics, and ordnance have been directing their efforts along the same line.

The large and competent field force of inspectors of the Navy has been utilized to assist in this work, including the inspection of many private plants to determine their suitability for subcontracting work. In this connection, the Navy's plant surveys have been made available to the Office of Production Management and the Army in combination with the large number of plant surveys already available in the War Department files.

It is fully realized that in some instances the proposed distribution of defense work may involve some slight delays, but the fact must be recognized that by broadening the base, the ultimate rate of production will be decidedly increased.

The Navy's part in the expanded effort to relieve the industrial situation falls into three broad categories:

1. Examination of all current and proposed naval procurement needs to determine the most desirable and practicable subdivision and distribution of purchases to relieve communities and industries depressed by priority rating and thereby deprived of their normal activities. The material bureaus of the Navy Department will be instructed to direct their procurement planning to this end.
2. Subcontracting or "farming out," as far as practicable, of work at the Navy's industrial shore establishments, principally the continental Navy yards, but including ordnance stations, aircraft factories, air stations, and other Naval industrial stations.
3. Assisting the Division of Contract Distribution in the Office of Production Management in obtaining a greater use of subcontracting by the Navy's prime contractors and

Buffalo Grass Makes Good Lawn

Buffalo grass, sometimes erroneously called curly mesquite grass, makes excellent sod for lawns where a moderate supply of water is available.

On that account, says Sadie Hatfield, specialist in landscape gardening of the A. and M. College Extension Service, it would be well to consider this grass for the home lawn. But she cautions not to give it "an abundance of water and fertilizer for that is likely to make it grow so rank that it will require a great deal of mowing."

In areas of thin rainfall this grass will make a thin sod, but the sod can be improved by diverting water from adjacent areas to the lawn and allowing it to soak in.

Among the advantages of using this kind of grass, Miss Hatfield lists its ability to withstand prolonged dry spells better than Bermuda, St. Augustine and other lawn grasses; the ease with which it is controlled by cultivation when it spreads to gardens and fields; it grows closer to the ground than other grasses and thus requires less mowing; it has a fine texture, and a pleasing, soft green color.

Buffalo grass is started from seed, but that is expensive and slow. Miss Hatfield suggests that a better method is to plant pieces of the sod about three inches square with a depth of about five inches. It is necessary to cover the roots but avoid smothering it by covering the leaves and stems with soil. Placed two or three feet apart, these plantings will make a complete sod in one good growing season.

St. Augustine sometimes is combined with buffalo for a lawn covering, the buffalo growing well in sunny portions and St. Augustine thriving in densely shaded sections where Buffalo does not thrive.

Odium, the Director of the Division of Contract Distribution in the Office of Production Management, will be provided as rapidly as circumstances will permit.

Inventory On Trucks, Buses Being Taken

A nation-wide inventory of buses and trucks will get under way in September or early October, announces John M. Carmody, Federal Works Administrator. This inventory is strictly confidential and is a part of the National Defense program.

"Our farmers, owners of all types of trucks and other conveyances, will be asked to give a description of such conveyances at an early date," states B. J. Baskin, County Agent. "This information will be compiled by the FWA and made available to our National Defense Committee. Modern warfare is based on fast, mobile transportation of all commodities and equipment, both military and civilian. Our Government is trying to determine where we have trucks and buses; available to the government and how they may best be used to supplement present rail and truck line facilities. Such equipment could be leased or used on a commercial basis in cases of an emergency, thereby releasing present commercial equipment for immediate use in National Defense. Highway transportation by trucks and buses is highly flexible, and fits into modern defense plans nicely. Information as requested by the United States in this matter is vital, is timely, and confidential.
"Farmers will receive cards and letters of instruction regarding the filling out of the card. It will only take four or five minutes of a person's time to fill out the card. It does not require any stamp on mailing the card. Such information will be of untold value to the United States in case any emergency should arise.
"If you have any difficulty in filling out your card, the county agent will be glad to assist you. But please fill out your card and mail it promptly."

CCC Camp Will Move From City

With only a skeleton crew remaining, awaiting orders to abandon camp, the Lamesa CCC Camp is all but moved, it is understood this week.
Announcement of the removal of the Lamesa Camp was made several months ago, but nothing definite has been done until quite recently, when the personnel was started to other sections.

Wheat Growers Urged To Stay In Their Limit

Since wheat farmers will vote in a National Referendum next spring to decide on Marketing Quotas, Dawson County wheat farmers should consider their acreage allotments when seeding their 1942 crop.
If quotas are approved by a two-thirds vote, farmers planting wheat in their allotments will be able to sell the entire crop without penalty, but farmers exceeding allotments will be required to pay a penalty of 50 per cent of the national loan rate on all wheat defined as "excess" wheat under marketing quotas.
In the event quotas are voted down next spring, a Government loan will not be made, since marketing quotas protect loan collateral. Loans at 85 per cent of parity are in effect on this year's crop since quotas were given a favorable vote in a national referendum earlier in the year.
Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, issued the wheat proclamation several weeks ago, since, according to the A. A. A. Act, an announcement must be made prior to May 15 of any marketing year when it appears that the wheat supply will exceed a normal year's domestic consumption and exports by more

than 35 per cent. The national referendum will be held before June 10, 1942.

The purpose of wheat marketing quotas is to divide a limited wheat market equally among producers so that each will get his fair share.
