FARMER SELLS 25 WAR RAGES AS BALES AT 30.30 FRENCH ADVANCE

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, March 3.—French troops crossed the Rhine today at Mannheim, apparently with the intention of cutting off the harbor, says a telegram received here. Mannheim is the third largest city in the Rhineland, and the chief commercial center of Baden.

Moroccan troops crossed the bridge near Karlsruhe, entering that place, and the workshops at Darmstadt and Mannheim were occupied by the advancing troops. The object of the advance is said to facilitate customs control.

German employees left their work, and thirty persons were wounded in a clash between Bavarian socialists and communists at Augsburg, thirty miles Northwest of Munich, says a Central News Bureau dispatch.

BLANKET, March 3.—The little two year old adopted daughter of Prof. and Mrs. E. L. Neve was burned to death yesterday afternoon about three o'clock when fire destroyed the home occupied by the Neve family at this place.

Prof. Neve is superintendent of the Blanket school and his wife is a teacher in the school. The child had been ill and the foster parents left it at home in care of older children while Mr. and Mrs. Neve went about their work at school.

When the fire was discovered it was centered about the room where the baby had been left and it was impossible to rescue her. Mr. Neve taught school at Brownwood last year, being principal of the Woodland Heights school.

EVOLUTION BILL IS ENGROSSED CLARKE IS FREE ON \$1000 BOND

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, March 3.—The House engrossed by a vote of 69 to 32 the Stroder bill prohibiting the teaching of evolution in all public institutions of learning in Texas. Evolution is interpreted as the theory that man sprang from a lower animal life, and the bill forbids this teaching in public or private schools.

The House adopted by a vote of 93 to 22 the conference committee report on the Pope text book bill.

The Senate passed the bill outlining the requirements of fire escapes on buildings over two stories high.

CONGRESS HOLDS UP HARDING APPOINTEE

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The contested nomination of James G. McNary, of New Mexico, as comptroller of currency, was reported favorably by the Senate banking committee today. Members opposed to confirmation of the McNary appointment predicted that despite the favorable report and recommendation the nomination will probably fail with adjournment of congress tomorrow. A recess appointment by Mr. Harding will probably result.

OFFICER AND GROOM BACK FROM A WILD GOOSE CHASE

SAN ANGELO, Mar. 3.—L. P. Grimes, Sterling county ranchman, and Sheriff Duckworth have returned from Los Angeles, California, where they went to identify Mr. Grimes' bride, who escaped with \$10,000 of the ranchman's money ten days after they had been married. They stated that the woman suspect arrested in the California city bore no resemblance to the woman Grimes married here last December, and only in her methods of operating did the description fit. The woman is being held at Los Angeles on charges of swindling in nearby cities. She posed as the wife of a rich Englishman, and spent money lavishly on new-made friends.

The ranchman and sheriff obtained some information which leads them to believe that the missing bride had been in Los Angeles. After marrying Grimes here she proposed to her husband that they sell their ranch and go to Los Angeles and buy an apartment house. The woman disappeared while the couple were honeymooning in Ft. Worth, the bride leaving her new husband at the hotel while she went downtown for "a few minutes."

GUARDS NEGRO AGAINST MOB TRUTH FABRIC BILL UP TO GOV.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., March 3.—Arthur Johnson, negro, is being closely guarded today. He was brought here for safekeeping to prevent possible violence following the storming of the jail at Palatka yesterday.

Mob spirit which came near resulting in lynching of the negro, has diminished considerably. Information from Palatka said that twelve men were arrested at Gainesville on orders of the sheriff and that they would be taken to Palatka tonight and arraigned on charges of attempting to commit felonious assault with intent to murder by shooting into a dwelling.

The mob attacked the jail yesterday and fifty shots were exchanged between the mob and the sheriff, who repulsed the mob. The negro is charged with killing a white man.

AUSTIN, Mar. 3.—The Jones "truth in fabric" bill passed the Senate today without a record vote, and the measure having been passed by the House, now goes to the governor. If approved by the governor the new law will require clothing manufacturers and merchandising establishments to place labels on all articles giving the amount of wool contained.

Dr. Carrie Weaver Smith, superintendent of the girls training school at Gainesville, testified before the House investigating committee yesterday, it became known today. She testified as to conditions of the school in general and the system of paroling in particular. The final hearing of the committee will be held tonight, after which the committee begins preparation of its report.

Recommendations that the penitentiary be relocated and placed in Central Texas by the joint legislative commission became certain today when eight of the fifteen members answered questions favoring such centralization.

The Senate conference committee on the Pope text book bill reported that it had reached an agreement with the House committee. The compromise plan provides for extension of contracts let by the commission last December to 1925, and permits the commission to award new contracts under certain conditions. The compromise also agrees to introduce separate measures to permit filing suits to test the legality of the recent awards on the agreement reached last night.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The administration plan for American participation in the international court of justice of the League of Nations was finally shelved for the present session of congress, when the senate voted against a consideration of the resolution to grant the president the necessary authority.

WILLIAMS AND DOOSE FOR RE-ELECTION

The Ledger has been authorized by his friends to place the name of C. A. Doose in the announcement column for mayor of the city of Ballinger, and at the same time friends of R. T. Williams have prevailed upon him to permit his name to be used for re-election as one of the city commissioners.

Messrs. Williams and Doose are serving their term as city commissioners. They both stated some time ago that they would not accept their term again, but their friends, and some of the heaviest tax payers of Ballinger, feeling that they should remain in the city administration and carry out the program of work which they started, especially the street paving, solicited them to permit their names to go before the voters in the coming election, and they have agreed to do so. Mr. Doose for mayor and Mr. Williams for commissioner.

There are perhaps no men in the city better qualified to carry on the work which they have started. Aside from being level headed business men, experienced and conservative in handling public affairs, they are successful in their own private business, and are among the heaviest tax payers of the city. Mr. Doose's part of the cost for city paving will amount to one-sixtieth of the total cost taxed against individual property owners and naturally he is vitally interested in the way the city's affairs are handled.

The office of city commissioner pays no salary, only in criticism, and it requires considerable time and worry, and those who agree to serve in such capacity deserve credit for their loyalty and service to their community.

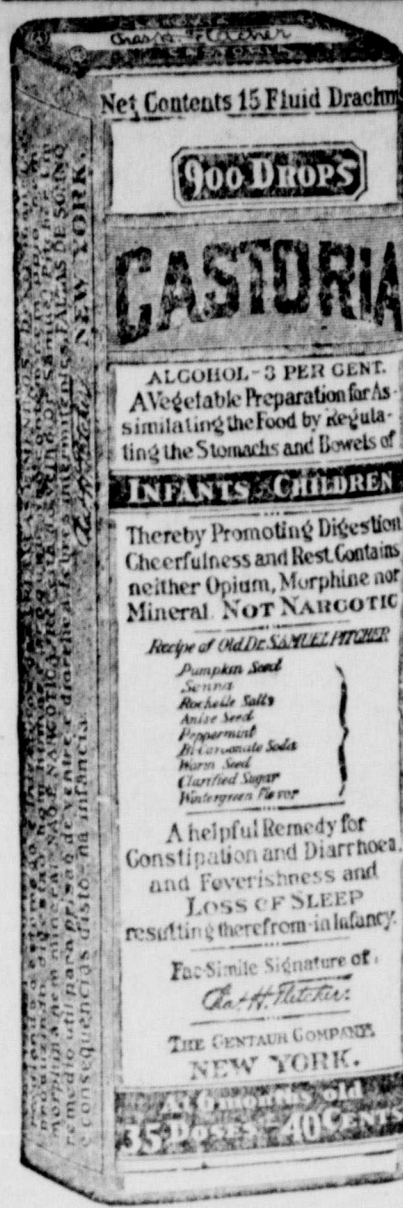
