—At a meeting of the Vestry of Saint Marks Episcopal Cathedral on Wednesday night, Mr. Joseph Ulrich was chosen successor to Col. W. R. Gibson, Treasurer, resigned.
—The woolen mills men do not give up their hope of establishing themselves at San Antonio. We sincerely trust that success may eventually crown their efforts.
—Mr. Frank Edwards went in as a partner with Mr. Harry Cunningham, in the shoe business, on the first of the month. The firm name will hereafter be Cunningham & Edwards.

—There is not a sober and industrious mechanic in the city who has not, or cannot procure, good and profitable employment. The great drawback with our master mechanics, is to obtain ample assistance.
—Wilson county, where the necessity of rain has been long felt, was visited a few days ago with general and abundant showers. The cotton crop of that county will receive much benefit from these recent rains.
—Maurice—At Albany, New York, on the 29th of August, Mrs. J. C. Milne, of San Antonio, to a Mr. DeYoe, of Fairfield, Iowa. Mrs. Milne is well known in our social circles, and was also for some time engaged as a teacher in the German-English school of this city.
—The young Democrats of the city propose organizing first a central club, and to branch off in the wards. They will labor to influence the election of the next city administration. Rather ambitious, are they not? But the young men can make their power felt, when they will.
—FALL FLOWING.—It is now time that the plow should be turning under the weeds, grass, etc., on the fields where the crops have been gathered. Plow deep enough to turn fully under all vegetable growth, and do not fear the tradition that "deep plowing kills the land."
—One of our business men yesterday showed us a letter announcing that freight on the Peirce road would not be raised from Kingsbury to Marion. This is but just. Freight have gone up so largely of late upon the Peirce road, that a feeling of opposition to the unqualified demands prevail with our merchants. The best thing that Peirce's agents can do, is to use their influence to keep down their freight, or they will soon meet with a stronger opposition than they think for. We do not give that road \$300,000 for nothing, as Col. Peirce will learn before he gets through with us.
—The Express has been running under its present management almost a year, and this reporter has, happily, in that time, never been furnished occasion for writing up a respectable fire item. The only fire our city has been visited by in this long while, was the burning of Newcomb's shoe-shop, opposite the post-office, which amounted to almost nothing. This freedom of our city of 50,000 inhabitants from the flames, is wonderful.

A TERRIBLE DUEL.
We clip the following shocking account of a duel from the Waco Examiner:
Messrs. George Reeler and Spencer Orand, who returned Sunday from Kinland, Bosque county, give us the following particulars of a terrible duel which took place Friday morning on the bank of the Brazos river opposite the town mentioned. A party composed of Walter Turner, Ed Brown and Thompson, from Kaufman Co., had been in that locality several days with race horses. On Thursday last Frank and Lacy Robinson, Taylor Campbell and Wiley Norman, all of Hill county, went to the camp of the Kaufman county men and got into a dispute with them about a pony race, which resulted in a fist fight. The parties agreed to meet the next day and settle the thing in a more satisfactory manner. So at ten o'clock on Friday morning the Hill county men took a stand at the place agreed upon, in readiness for action. They had not waited long when the other party rode toward them. The men were all armed with six-shooters except Turner, who carried a needle carbine. When the parties had approached within twenty yards of each other, Taylor Campbell fired at Turner and the battle commenced. Turner leaped from his horse and fired three shots with his terrible carbine. The first shot went crushing through Campbell's brain, the second caused the instant death of Frank Robinson and the last shot mortally wounded Lacy Robinson; by this time a ball from Thompson's revolver had passed through poor Norman's breast, a boy aged 17 years; and all of the Hill county party lay weltering in their blood. Some twenty shots were fired altogether. More than half of the shots were by the Hill county party, but, strange to say, none of the Kaufman county men were in the least hurt. Campbell and Frank Robinson each fired five shots; Norman and Lacy Robinson also fired, but the only damage they did was to kill Turner's horse. The surviving party mounted horses and fled the country. A hundred men started in pursuit. Both the Robinsons leave families. Campbell and Norman are unmarried. The Kaufman county party are all boys, none of them being more than nineteen or twenty years of age.

BRENNAN'S BIG SCANDAL.

Brennan had a genuine sensation last night and to-day. Andrew Parker, a well known Texas land owner, entered the bedroom of a respectable widow, boarding at the Central House, at midnight, and she giving the alarm, ordered her to cease or he would either kill or ruin her. This was her sworn testimony at the trial.
Her cries brought one of the clerks to the rescue and he proceeded to whale the intruder with a stick. Parker fought him desperately and endeavored to draw his pistol, but the prompt action of the clerk not to kill him, then if allowed to go. He had his baggage at the railroad depot and intended taking the down train for St. Louis. The city police arrested him and placed him in jail.
The case being called this morning, Parker waived examination and his bonds were set at \$2500. The bondsmen offered not being acceptable, Justice Hines vacated the former order and proceeded to examine the case. It is now on trial and will probably take until midnight to close. Much indignation against the prisoner is expressed by all our citizens. Col. John Sayles assists the county attorney to prosecute.
