Boy Scouts Make Good Astronauts

The crew and back up crew of America's first Gemini flight March 23rd were all Scouts.

The pilot Virgil I. "Gus" Grissom, who is the second American to travel in space, was a Cub Scout in Mitchell, Ind.

He reached the rank of Star. He now has a son active in scouting.

The co-pilot for the two man flight was John W. Young. Young's Scouting was in Troop 21 of Orlando, Florida. He made second class Scout.

The two back up pilots Walter Schirra and Thomas Stafford were both Scouts. Schirra was a first class Scout in Troop 36, Oradell, New Jersey, and Stafford was a member of Troop 355, Weatherford, Okla.

Astronaut Grissom says: "Participating in Scouting activities teaches— it taught me, I know—to be by myself, to rely on myself and to handle all small situations early, to take care of all small problems while I was young and learning, before the big ones come along."

"Confidence comes from many things. And it's all pretty much in your Scout Oath, in your Scout laws, and in the motto, 'Be Prepared'. I would like to turn your motto back to you and tell all Scouts to be prepared—that America needs you."

Of the present 28 astronauts, 25 have Scouting backgrounds. Five were Eagle Scouts. All 12 astronauts scheduled as crews or back up crews for Gemini flights this year are former Scouts.

Successful Lindsay Okla. High School coach William Froman was hired recently by the Burkburnett school board as Bulldog head coach, effective March 1.

Froman, 31, has an outstanding record, including three class A Oklahoma State championships. He replaces Zac Henderson as coach.

Froman has been coach at Lindsay since 1959 and has a head coaching record of 54-14-3. He was an assistant at Lindsay from 1957 to 1959. His total coaching record is 76-16-3. Lindsay was state champion in class A (equivalent to class AAA in Texas) in 1958, 1962, 1963 and state finalist in 1964.

A native of Miami, Okla., Froman attended Bacone College at Muskogee, Okla., is 1951 and 1952 He played in the 1952 Junior Rose Bowl.

The new Bulldog coach graduated from Tulsa University in 1957 after playing on the varsity at end for two seasons under coach Bobby Dobbs.

The Burk school board was high in its praise for Froman and indicated it was happy to get a coach of his caliber and experience. Froman indicated he was pleased with his new job.

He is married and has three young children.

9. Do your shopping at home; look through the advertising columns of your newspaper for best buys, mark them, and take your newspaper with you when you shop.

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IS THIS REALLY POVERTY?

The President's much-touted war on poverty isn't off
the ground yet, so to speak, but apparently already it is
out of control.

The war on poverty is intended to help those who are
considered to be living in poverty; that is, those with in-
comes of less than \$3,000 a year.

But what is happening in New Jersey?

The salaries to be received by the war on poverty
commanders in New Jersey are coming in for plenty of
criticism.

New Jersey's anti-poverty commander is John C. Bul-
litt. Mr. Bullitt is receiving \$25,000 as the director of the
New Jersey Office of Economic Opportunity. Furthermore
Bullitt's assistant is receiving \$19,000 annually.

Even worse as far as the state of New Jersey is con-
cerned is the fact that Bullitt receives more than any
member of the New Jersey governor's cabinet.

Take Newark, New Jersey. Here, the top man gets
\$23,000, his assistant, \$18,000. But, this isn't all. Newark
has hired at least 26 other staff members who are to re-
ceive more than \$10,000 annually each.

There are fireworks also in Paterson, New Jersey,
where a director was hired at \$18,500, a salary that is
\$1,000 greater than that paid to the city's Mayor.

In one New Jersey county, \$52,000 of a \$67,000 anti-
poverty grant has been earmarked for salaries and ad-
ministration.

You can see from all this just how much help the
man who needs it is going to get from the war on poverty
program. If the New Jersey story is an example of what
will happen throughout the country, the program will do
very little except provide lush jobs for smart politicians.

Could it be that the war on poverty program is actu-
ally intended to provide pay-off jobs for party sup-
porters?

Time alone will tell.

LBJ, The Press And The Public

President Johnson's dislike for the press and his
contempt for the public are problems of grave concern
to both the Fourth Estate and the people who have a
right to know what the man in the White House is think-
ing and planning.

LBJ's treatment of the reporters assigned to the
White House is nothing short of abominable. He has
brushed aside the Democratic concept that the public
has a right to know and that the press is the proper
transmission belt.

LBJ has consistently avoided the televised press
conference and for two reasons: (1) He doesn't sparkle
on television, and (2) Reporters fire questions he is
averse to answering; not necessarily for security rea-
sons, but because he simply does not know the real an-
swers, or knowing them, is afraid they may show up his
jerry-built "Great Society," or reveal a policy of ap-
peasement of the Communists.

A recent example of the President's contempt for
press and public came on February 4 when he gave
45 minutes notice of a conference in the theatre of the
White House, where seating facilities for 30 or 40 were
jammed by about 150 newspaper men, radio-TV rep-
orters and their cameras.

Mr. Johnson then further discomfited the news-
men through the discourtesy of being 20 minutes late.
There was no apology for the delay, but there was caustic
criticism of the Fourth Estate for its speculation
and criticism of the President for not sending the Vice
President to represent the United States at the Church-
hill funeral.

This problem has more serious implications than the
President's personal dislike of an alert press, and vice
versa. Its significance is whether the American public
is to have accurate and factual news coverage of the
nation's Chief Executive, or depend on the whims of a
thin-skinned man, far too sensitive to press and other
criticism, to permit accurate reporting of facts.

We must have direct and accurate reports on Ad-
ministration policies that bear directly on the Ameri-
can pocketbook or the American family whose son may
be drafted to fight in a face-saving retreat or a real war
in far-off Southeast Asia.

And if we don't, we can look forward to one-man
government — dictatorship, it is called.

The most powerful weapon
in the world is not the hydrogen
bomb but Public Opinion. The
Communist bloc every year de-
votes 150,000 hours of broad-
casting time to radio programs
in all languages; produces two
billion brochures, 120 million
books, 200 films and dispatch-
es 20,000 people across the free
world to spread their propagan-
da.

We have a couple of radio
programs. But it is often diffi-
cult to tell which side the Voice
of America is on, and Radio
Free Europe is ineffectual. We
have some great anti-communist
and pro-freedom publications:
"American Opinion," "Human
Events," "National Review," "The
Wanderer," "The Freeman," etc.
However, the combined circula-
tion of these is far below 300-
000, and the five largest Ameri-
can magazines reach 30 million
homes. Almost any week you
can read about the "mellowing
Communists, the fanatical right
wing", the glories of peace at
any price and lies and distor-
tions about the communist in-
vasion of Selma and the South.

One Mold

A recent issue of "Post" car-
ried an article, "Communism
Is Not What We Think." The
article said Communism and
Communism aren't really so bad;
what's bad is our misconception
a partial cause of the Cold War,
which 'keeps our government
under pressure to follow policies
based on ignorance. In time
we will accept (Communism) as
a civilizing force that deserve
encouragement because it is im-
proving the lot of the Russian
people. A blind fight against
Communism' is self defeating.
It means, in the case of Russia,
that we are fighting against
many of the hopes and ideals
we cherish for ourselves."

Even the Posts interpretation
of the telephone conversation
between Bear Bryant and Wally
Butts was more accurate than
that!

The Posts tendencies, of
course, are well known. For
years it has wielded tremen-
dous influence in this country—
with articles by Edgar Snow
which helped in our sellout of
China; by Ring Lardner cited
by HCUA; and by an innocu-
ously conservative editorial page
which was doubtless supposed
to offset the leftists; and then
the editorial page turned to the
left and to the right, and back
left like a corporal calling ca-

dence for his marching squad.
I don't know what the "Post"
editorial policy is now. I haven't
read it this week.

But the "Post" is certainly
well-known. Few magazines
have ever been sued for more.
Few have lost more money. Few
have influenced more people.

Another Mold

A September, 1964 issue of
"Life" Magazine describes Rus-
sian prisons and life glowingly
and pictures its killers as men
of distinction. The Communist
butchers are made to look like
ministers. When the leftist press

pictures "right wingers", they
are made to look like wild-eyed
maniacs who should be in an
institution.

Speaking of institutions, the
following letter was sent to Con-
gress recently: "Dear sirs: They
tell me that Congress is one of
our best institutions. Would
you please tell me what I have
to do to get into it, as I have
spent most of my life in insti-
tutions. Please excuse me for
writing in crayon, but they
don't allow us to have anything
sharp in here."

I'd rather have him than
some who are already in Con-
gress. At least he knows where
he stands, and he tells you the
truth about it.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 277 Park Ave., N.Y., N.Y., 10017

Q. Two years ago, I ran into serious financial problems and couldn't pay the premiums on my life insurance policy. So it lapsed. Now that I am in better financial condition, can I get the policy reinstated? Would this be better than simply taking out a new policy?

A. If you are still insurable, you can probably get the policy reinstated by paying your back premiums, plus interest (usually at 5 per cent a year, to reimburse

the insurance company for interest it would have earned by investing your premiums). If yours was a participating policy (the kind on which you receive dividends), the amount you owe for back premiums would be reduced by any dividends paid during the period your policy was lapsed.

Most life insurance policies can be reinstated within three or five years after a lapse, if the policyholder is still insurable. However, this privilege does not usually apply if the policyholder has been paid the cash value of his policy, or if the policy was converted to extended term insurance and then expired.

If there was a loan outstanding on your policy, the loan (plus interest) would have to be repaid or reinstated.

The chief advantage in reinstating an old policy rather than buying a new one is that the premiums on the old policy would undoubtedly be lower, because it was issued at a younger age. But you should consider whether the saving in premiums is worth the cost of reinstatement. (Of course, in the case of a permanent policy, most of what you pay in back premiums would be reflected in the increased cash value of your policy.)

Another reason for reinstating might be that the same type of policy is no longer issued, or that the settlement provisions are more liberal than in policies currently being issued.

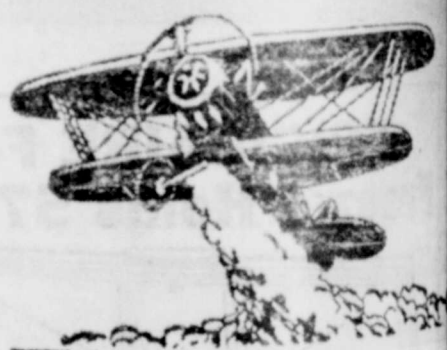

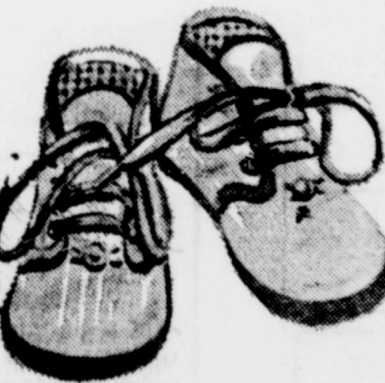
