Submission Outlook Favorable

If the hearty cooperation which we have been receiving continues we will win the fight for Submission." This is the substance of a statement issued by M. H. Wolfe, State Chairman of the Submission Committee. Continuing Mr. Wolfe said: "From all sections of the state we are receiving encouraging reports. Real friends of the cause of prohibition have subordinated their personal ambition and from all sections of the state there comes assurance that the campaign is being waged on the high plane inaugurated by the State Submission Committee."

"Very few men," the Chairman stated, "who really have the cause of prohibition at heart are willing to embarrass the Committee in its work by injecting personalities into the campaign."

"The work of organization of the state by counties, precincts, voting boxes and school houses is going forth rapidly," declared Mr. Wolfe. "But there still remains much to do before the primary is held, and we must earnestly ask our friends, and all those who believe that the question should be submitted for settlement to a vote of the people to see that the work of organization in their community is carried out."

The long list of counties which have reported their organizations shows most of the largest voting counties to have organized and appointed their county and district chairmen. Among the counties reporting are to be found, Dallas, Tarrant, McLennan, Travis, Bexar, Collin, Bell, Hunt and Jefferson.

THE LAST WORD.

On Saturday, July 22, 1916, the voters of the Thirty Third Judicial District will register the expression of their opinion in reference to the issues involved in the District Attorney's race. The two candidates are T. E. Hammond and Alfred P. Petsch; the former an old man sixty-eight years of age, or older, and the latter is a young man twenty nine years old. Both men are before the public for the first time asking their endorsement. Mr. Hammond notwithstanding the fact that he has wasted twenty years longer to run for the office than any one else ever has. Mr. Petsch because he is young and ambitious, and anxious to climb the ladder to success.

Mr. Hammond was appointed to succeed Mr. Moss, without an endorsement from the voters of the District; he got the office by political pull of the leading politicians of the district, and their influence is seeking to elect him. If the politicians succeed in this last enterprise as they did in the former venture, then Mr. Hammond will be under obligations to them in the future, as he has been in the past—vote for Hammond is an endorsement of that idea.

Mr. Petsch is a lawyer of six years experience in his profession, with a reputation for honesty and zealously serving his client's interests. He is ambitious and desirous of the election for the district attorneyship, because he admires that office for the work that the performance of his duties will demand, and for the great field that its opportunities afford. He is running upon his own merits, and if he is elected, the people and not the politicians will be credited with the work, and he will recognize only one servant, the people—A vote for Petsch is an endorsement of that idea.

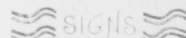

WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THIS?

Junction needs another clean up Day. The last one we had—really the only one of real effectiveness—did a great deal of good. But the job wasn't finished. We need to take another trial at it. We need to get busy and make Junction really a clean town. We can. It's a matter of will to do it—cooperative will to do it. That's all it takes. But it takes that.

When we had the Cleanup Day in May the Civic Club set the day, appointed committees and covered the town in a systematic manner. The business houses closed for half a day and all gave a hand to the clean up work. A day when the work was finished Junction had a cleaner appearance than it has ever had in all its history. It did. But there is more to be done. Let's do it again. Let's do it right at once.

In a few days the big Methodist Encampment will begin here. There will be from one hundred to two hundred people here from other places. They will come, see and observe conditions in general in Junction. They will spend some ten days here among these conditions. And when they leave they will go away talking of these conditions in general in Junction. In various parts of the "whopper state", wherever these people go, they will tell about the days spent in Junction—and the general conditions here. This isn't surmise. It's an inevitable result of their visit here. They are going to ADVERTISE the conditions at Junction. They are going to tell others—many others—of the impressions they received of Junction. And these others will tell others, and on and on the story will go. If these impressions are good, think of the resultant good to our town. Think of the good advertising that will be given our town in North, South, East and West. But that which is going to be given out to the public at large by these visitors on their return will be FACTS. Will the FACTS reflect credit on Junction?

There's lot of unsightly weeds on the main streets of our town. There is a lot of trash on vacant lots that hasn't been disturbed since the war—and there are several lots that are not vacant that need attention also. How about YOUR OWN PREMISES? This is a heart-to-heart talk for Junction people. Just plain facts. We are not mind slapping. WE are going to clean up a bit. What are YOU going to do? We want those visitors who come here next month to go away telling about what a nice clean, SPLENDID town Junction is. They will do so, if we but put forth a little effort now. Let's do it. Let's suggest that as soon as possible a day be appointed for another Cleanup Day, and let that cleanup day come as soon as possible. Let the business houses close for half a day and manager and clerks all assist. That's the only way to do it properly. We submit this as a suggestion to the Civic Club, and Junction people. What do you think about it? Let us arise and do our duty as becomes Junction people.

THE "GRAND LEADER,"

Died.

John M. Durst of Austin, Tex., oldest son of John S. Durst of Junction, died at his father's home at 3 A. M. of the 10 inst.

He came to Junction about 10th of last April all broken down in health, in the hope of recovery but the disease could not be arrested and he slowly grew weaker till the end came.

He was born in Leon Co. Tex., on the 25th of July 1868. In June 1895 he married Miss Hatie Callahan daughter of Dr. P. H. Callahan, at Georgetown, Texas, and they have lived in Austin all the while.

In answer to a telegram his wife reached him two days before his death. He leaves behind him his devoted wife and four bright children, one boy and three daughters.

He became a member of the Church of Christ in 1884 and while he had not lived at all times as he should have lived he became a penitent at the mercy seat and died reconciled to his Lord and Savior surrounded by all the family now at home and his dear wife; being perfectly conscious, he spoke audibly and distinctly the words "Good by," and passed away. The interment took place at the Junction cemetery at 6 P. M. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Brannon of the Church of Christ assisted by Rev. J. C. Campbell of the Methodist Church.

How dark seems the hour when the death angel calls and takes a loved one from family and friends! Yet may the sorrowing ones realize there is no gloom so dark that no light is behind it, no sorrow so poignant that there is not a balm for the wound it inflicts. We realize that at some time we must each be called away. And it is the broken ties at the grave that prompts us to a fuller appreciation of the ties not yet broken. Through the gloom of death we see, more clearly the beauty of life. In the passing of this loved one much has been taken from the large circle of relatives and friends; but much is left. The Christian's hope and faithless memories are still theirs.

To The Voters of Kimble County

My official duties are such as to deprive me of the pleasure of calling on you in person in order to present to you my claims to the office which I now hold by appointment.

Since my appointment as District Attorney by Governor Ferguson on the first day of last April, I have been constantly in court, and I now have on hand four capital cases to prepare for trial.

I do not believe that any officer should neglect his official duties no matter how pressing and urgent his private interests may be, and being impressed with this idea, I have followed the line of my duty to the State and have denied myself the pleasure of meeting with you. I take it that my competitor is a gentle man and that he will not take advantage of one who is trying to do his duty to the people, and who on account of that fact, is unable to follow him from place to place throughout the District.

There have been eleven convictions out of fourteen cases that came up for trial since I have been District Attorney, and out of these cases I only asked for two suspended sentences, believing at the time that the ends of justice would be met thereby, and that a reformation of the young man could be had outside of the walls of a penitentiary.

I have practiced law in this District for 28 years, and I refer you to your District Judge and to the lawyers of the District, as to my qualification. In accepting the appointment as District Attorney, I was forced to give up my practice at home, to a large extent, and it seems but just and fair that I should be permitted to hold the office for at least one term. I feel assured that I will receive kind consideration from you at the Primary Election.

FOUNTAINS OF THE CAPITAL

They Line the Way of the Tourist No Matter What Direction He Takes.

Whatever direction a tourist may take in Washington, fountains line his way. Whether he starts from the bronze stork fountain not far from Union station, and travels across to the bright fountains that play along the sunset way of Pennsylvania avenue or from the slender fountain on Connecticut avenue down to the new Little ones playing in the Potomac Park gardens, all are lovely, each differing from the other in glory, each worthy of separate praise.

At Twentieth street and Connecticut there is a dainty little fountain set in the open triangle of green, its low-falling spray sprinkling the flowery shrubs and creating a cool disturbance in the air that sets the snowball branches swaying. Alongside the car track this delicate shrine dares to waste itself for the sake of the chance wayfarer.

Another has its habitation west of Dupont circle and P street upon a pleasant green plot all its own. A low spray springs from the center and the surrounding jets gracefully pour toward it, while the whole lies conched in a half moon of shrubbery.

For many years the big bronze vase in front of the treasury has faithfully performed its mission, where, on particularly hot and glaring days, the sight and sound of the cool fall of water over the dark bronze brim is refreshingly refreshing to both sense and spirit of the pilgrim.

Through the tall iron railings that fence the northern front of the White House, one glimpses, as it continually springs in a full white rush, the most carefully tended of the fountains, ringed round with daffodils and narcissus shrubs and dark purple iris.

In the great southern garden of the White House, gracing the center of sweeping lawns and in the company of broad-boughed trees and fair open spaces, stands the beautiful fountain which, when the winds waft the water over, swashes the air in its delicate volume of mist. One can hear some distance away the rush of the waters upward, and as one draws near he experiences at the sight something of the ever-abundant sense of immortal life.

At the eastern entrance to the White House, opposite the treasury, is perhaps the most exquisite of all the fountains. Here, held together closely at the center, the tall jets rise on high, falling gradually apart and drooping down in the form of a bouquet of flowers.
