Little Likelihood of 1938 Wind Erosion Funds

ANY EVENT MUST CONTROL WIND EROSION

Reorganization of Two Years Ago Is Exhausted; Act of Congress Required for More Money

Get ACP Funds Soon

Farmers Should Plan to Use Portion of Payment Under ACP To Control Erosion

According to County Agent E. W. Thomas there is little likelihood of there being any special funds available for combatting wind erosion in Ochiltree county as has been the case for the past two years. The funds appropriated two years ago for emergency listing have been exhausted and so far as known a special act of congress would be required to make additional funds available at this time. It is expected, however, that the payments under the Agricultural Conservation Program will be made in the near future and all producers could plan to use a portion of the payments in an effort to control the erosion of the land if necessary. The portion of all producers is called to provisions of the program under which all payments under the act will be withheld in the event a farmer permits land to become a wind erosion hazard. The County Committee has found it necessary to invoke the provision and cancel payments in the cases of some producers during 1937.

It is also advised that any listing of chisel plowing this winter or spring should be done on the condition to have the land in addition to comply with the 1938 program. Contour lines should be laid off in advance while levels are favorable for the work, and before plowing starts.

HORNE OUT FOR COMMISSIONER

G. I. HORNE IS CANDIDATE IN COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER ONE; FIRST TO ANNOUNCE

G. I. Horne is the first entry into the race for County Commissioner. Mr. Horne announces his candidacy for Commissioner from Precinct No. 1, subject to the action of the voters in the Democratic primary. W. L. Anderson is now serving his second term as Commissioner from this precinct.

Mr. Horne has been a resident of Perryton ever since the town started in 1919. Born near Wellington, Kansas in 1881, he moved to Oklahoma when just a boy when his father failed on a homestead in Kay County. In 1906, Mr. Horne came on west to Beaver county, locating on a farm near Gray. He afterwards entered the wholesale oil business at Gray.

When he came to Perryton in 1919, he went into the grain business, disposing of his elevator to J. H. Scott in 1922, since that time he has engaged in farming, his place adjoining Perryton on the southeast. Mr. Horne has been active in public and church life. For seven years he served on the Perryton school board. He is a leader in the Baptist church of this city and was their Sunday School superintendent for eight years.

In making his announcement for this important position, Mr. Horne states that this is his first time to seek election to any office but that if he is elected he will endeavor to serve the interests of every citizen and taxpayer of the county to the very best of his ability.

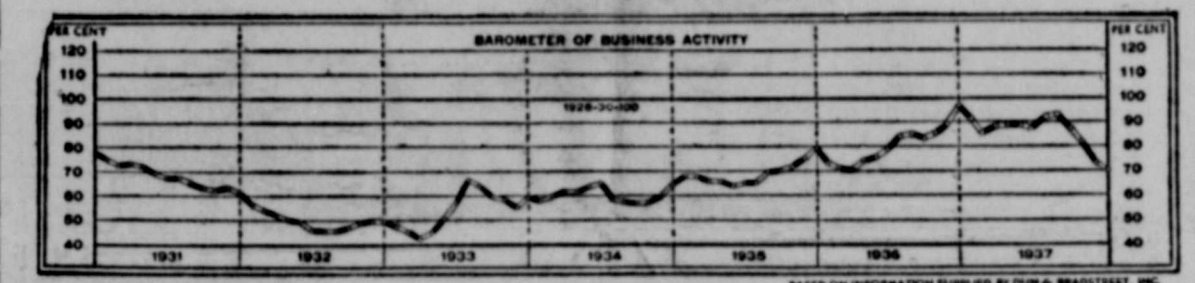

Panhandle Area In "White Spot" On Map



This map represents business conditions as of January 1, 1938, as shown in "Nation's Business", official publication of the United States Chamber of Commerce



For the first time in many years the Texas Panhandle is in the "White Spot" on the nation's business map. As will be noted above this is the darkest map of the year and reflects the slump in trade and manufacturing in the last four months of 1937. While our own particular region shows on the map to be enjoying "good" business, we believe that this can be explained by the fact that we have been "holding our own" while most of the nation has gone into a decided recession of business and trade. This same condition existed in 1929.

For many months after the general depression hit the United States the Texas Panhandle was the only region that remained in the "white" on the business map. The barometer of business activity on the above chart shows a less abrupt decline in December and indicates a slight trend toward leveling off.

DECK LEAVES FOR WACO FOR STATE AG MEETING

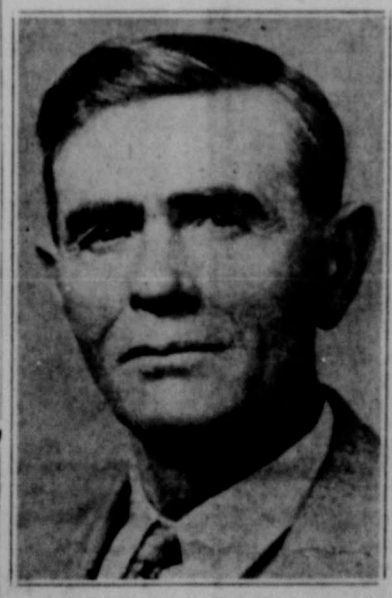

Ochiltree farmers and agriculturists are expecting their pay-off any day now. Over \$400,000 is due here in payment for "doing and not doing". Added to this is about \$7,500 that will be paid on the range control program. And does everybody need it?

Approximately \$7,500 To Be Paid In 1937 Range Program

A summary of the 1937 Range Program under the Agricultural Conservation Act, according to County Agent E. W. Thomas, discloses that 51 ranchmen cooperated in the program. Almost all phases of the work were represented in the survey of accomplishments. A total of approximately \$7,500.00 will be paid for carrying out these practices.

In building dams 26 ranchmen built 42 dams containing 33,762 yards of dirt to impound a maximum of approximately 54 acre feet of water. Four men contoured approximately 800 acres of pasture land with 214 acres solid basins. Cactus was cut on 26 ranches compiling a total of 4,122 acres. Deferred grazing was carried out on 11,821

ANNUAL REPORT ON WORK OF MISSOURI AVE. CLUB

The following is a summary of achievements of the Missouri Avenue Club as turned in by the secretary Mrs. C. O. Roach. The club was outstanding in record work.

During this last year, the Missouri Avenue club held their 23 regular meetings with two special meetings called to help the demonstrators. The club admitted five new members and 52 guests attended meetings during the year. For entertainment 2 parties were held at Halloween and Christmas. Two special study programs, "First Aid" and "Parent Education and Child Development" were held and one community program broadcast. Two of the members visited other county home demonstration councils and had a representative at every regular and call council meeting in our own county.

In achievement events, first place was won by the club in the county fair; the bedroom demonstrator won second place; first place was won by the club's pantry demonstrator; one club member scored high in county fair, and 19 members exhibited in Ball Jar Contest. Special gifts were given to the home demonstration agent, club president, pantry demonstrator and bedroom demonstrator. The club also shared obligations in sponsoring the Amateur Program and Banquet. Nineteen tea towel showers were given with 355 tea towels being exchanged. 980 feed sacks were used in "Utilization of Feed Sacks" project. Fifteen families were remembered with cards, gifts, and flowers in illness and deaths.

In our bedroom and pantry work, the following goals were accomplished: 13 bedrooms were improved; 20 mattress pads, mattress and spring protectors made; 10 bedspreads and 12 quilts added; 30 pieces of bed linen supplied; 4 hooked rugs made; 5 clothes closets remodeled; 10 members complete the Bedroom Goals for 1937; 1,119 quarts of fruits, jellies, jams, etc. were provided; 583 quarts of vegetables canned and brined; and 423 quarts of meat were canned. 1 member completed all Home Food Supply Goals for 1937. 6 members completed % Home Food Supply Goals for 1937. A member was elected and attended the Texas Home Demonstration Association meeting in San Antonio. A member was a delegate to the Texas Agricultural Association Meeting in Fort Worth.

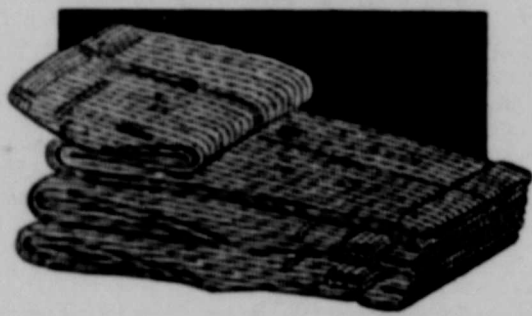

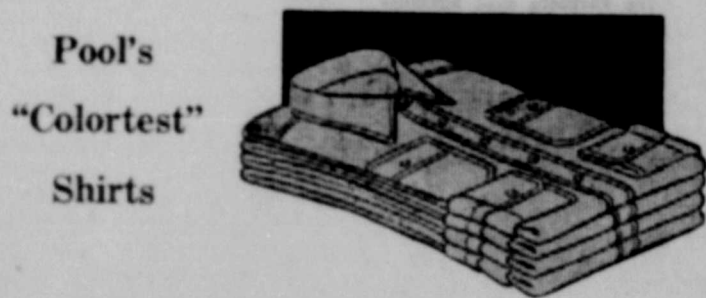

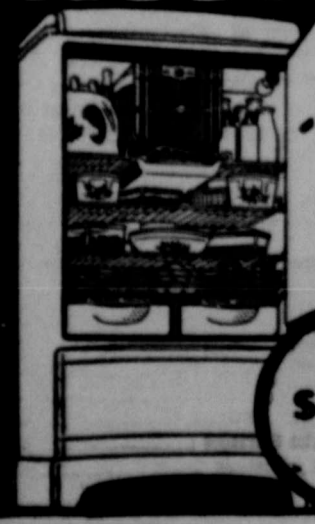

THEY drove no nails, sheveled no
sand, and mixed no mortar, but
nevertheless three fortunate fami-
lies in Ohio, Georgia, and Nebraska
suddenly discovered the other day
that they had built themselves new
homes replete with every modern
convenience. Their only tools were
pencils and typewriters.

Because a jury of well-known
people decided that Prof. Arthur
M. Brant (at bottom), of Columbus,
Ohio, Mrs. C. W. Smith (center),
of Clayton, Georgia, and Miss
Norma Carpenter (in circle), of Lin-
coln, Nebraska, had written more
clearly and sincerely about the
electrical way of living than ap-
proximately 275,000 other Ameri-
cans, the General Electric Com-
pany gave them Christmas presents
of new homes worth \$12,000, \$12,000,
and \$8,000 respectively. The spec-
ifications are to be worked out by
experts to suit the circumstances
of the three winners, whose only

contribution was a hundred words.
Professor Brant, who is in the
mineralogy department of Ohio
State University, already owned a
lot and was planning to build in the
spring. He has four children.

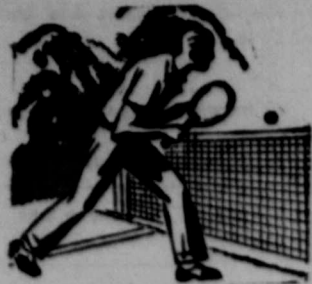

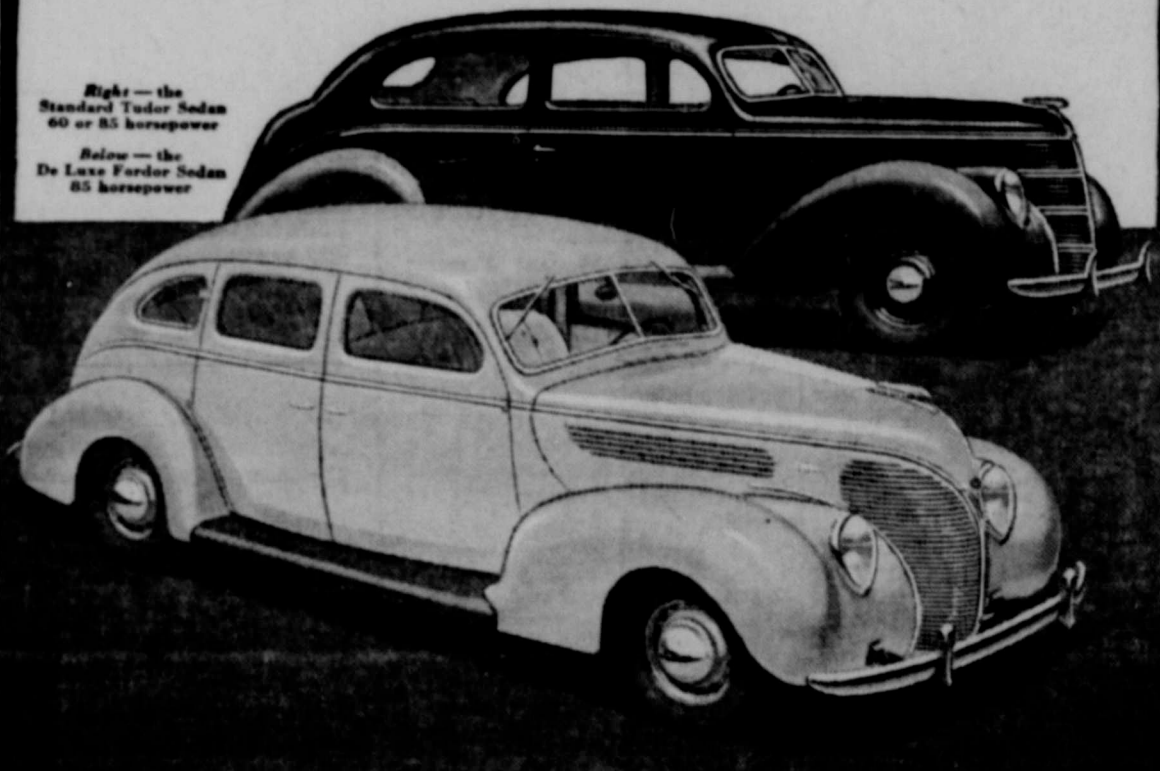

We want every taxpayer to study the Ochiltree county financial statement in this issue of the Herald. Note that the entire indebtedness of the county on January 1 was only \$57,000, and this has been reduced by \$11,000 since that date. \$5,000 was paid on outstanding courthouse warrants, and \$6,000 on road bonds. This was paid out of the "cash on hand for credits on retiring indebtedness."

Another fact that this financial statement does not show is that all of the general indebtedness securities of the county are owned by the permanent school fund of the county. In other words, Ochiltree county is paying no interest to any outside bond or warrant holders. The county owes a little money, it pays some interest, but it is paid into our own school fund.

This is a mighty fine statement and one that every citizen should be proud of. It reflects much to those men who for years past have managed the business affairs of the county, but there is one very important thing lacking about this
