1st Congressional Dist. of Texas

"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"
PRIDE AND FAITH IN AMERICA. Our fellow Texan and former President, Lyndon B. Johnson, has thought deeply on his favorite subject — the United States of America. Recently he spoke at Temple, Texas, with such good effect and fine purpose that his remarks were featured on the editorial page of the New York Times. I share President Johnson's unshakable belief in America.

THE HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT ACT OF 1972. H. R. 16704 has been reported out favorably by the House Banking and Currency Committee of which I am Chairman. This multi-billion dollar legislation will improve the quality and quantity of housing, and will tighten up existing programs to eliminate the abuses and waste which have been a national scandal.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT — A STATUS REPORT. It now appears that the Rural Development Act, signed into law on August 30, will be implemented in three stages: (1) minor "house-keeping" provisions which raise operating loan ceilings and provide for loans based on actual market value will be operational this week; (2) more substantive provisions such as water and sewer assistance for towns of up to 10,000 population and removal of loan limitations for water supply organizations should be in effect by October 10 and (3) major provisions to stimulate industrial growth in rural areas and the build community facilities will be implemented at some later date depending upon policy decisions by the Nixon Administration. It is this last area which is of first concern since, based on past performance, the Administration may deliberately delay these strong programs for rural America. I will, of course, continue to demand prompt and full implementation of the entire Rural Development Act.

THE RUSSIANS TAKE OVER THE SUNFLOWER. This native American flower has long been popular as an ornamental plant and source of bird seed, but the Russians now have a clear lead in sunflower production with over 11 million acres. The Soviets, of course, are motivated by simple economics — sunflower seeds yield a high-quality, low fat cooking oil which is gaining world-wide acceptance among great chefs (like the French) and among health food enthusiasts. As late as 1968, sunflowers grown commercially in the U. S. were used mostly for bird seed and confections, and even last year the U. S. had only a half-million acres under cultivation of which 15,000 was in Texas. Note that the U. S. total was only 5% of the Russian acreage.

THE U. S. RE-DISCOVERS THE SUNFLOWER. As a result of a recent research breakthrough by scientists at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, however, we are rapidly catching up with the Russians. New hybrid sunflower varieties are being developed that resist disease and insects, mature uniformly, and produce increased yields per acre; American production is expected to double this year to over a million acres. While still a marginal crop, the new and more efficient hybrids should make the sunflower an important U. S. crop within the next few years; we may even surpass the Russians in the production of this useful plant which is as American a corn, the tomato, and the turkey.

Austin. — The special session of the Legislature got off to a bumpy start last week with Gov. Preston's Smith's proposals facing tough criticism.

Critics of the governor's competitive insurance rating bill charged it repeals some of the best provisions of the Texas insurance code.

Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas and others insisted on a state-set ceiling if competitive rating is passed. Senate sponsor, Sen. Mike McKool of Dallas, indicated he would go along with that.

The governor's budgetary control bill met a mixed reaction in its first committee test. Proponents said it would help put "fiscal responsibility" in state government, but opponents claimed it would make the governor a fiscal "czar." The latter were particularly critical of a provision that would let the governor alter agency budgets when he found "evidence that the expenditure is not necessary."

Smith assured another lively appointments hassle in the Senate when he nominated his secretary of state, Bob Bullock, to the State Board of Insurance.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes denied reports that he was trying to line up votes to block Bullock's confirmation by the Senate.

Bullock's name was sent up as a replacement for Smith's longtime friend, Larry Teaver, who was rejected for Insurance Board membership last July by unfriendly senators.

PARTIES HOLD CONVENTIONS — Harmony prevailed at both Democratic and Republican conventions, although there was enough controversy at both to make them interesting.

Democratic gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe got his choice for State party chairman (Calvin Guest of Bryan) and was allowed to write the platform about the way he wanted it. In return, he agreed to accept a liberal, Sen. Barbara Jordan, as State Democratic Executive Committee chairman.

Sen. Joe Bernal of San Antonio and Mrs. Billie Carr of Houston (liberals and George McGovern backers) and Hal Timanus of Houston (a George Wallace supporter at the June convention) were named to new Democratic National Committee posts. Briscoe may, or may not, have control of SDEC. Some counts evaluated the breakdown 26-26 liberals and conservatives with 10 moderates as the balance of power.

Republicans had little to squabble about. They wrote their own state platform and re-elected Dr. George Willeford and Mrs. Malcolm Milburn of Austin as state chairman and vice-chairman.

AG OPINIONS — County Clerks are not authorized to issue marriage licenses to two persons of the same sex, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in a recent opinion.

In other new opinions, Martin concluded:

- A Texas water corporation and public utility has the right to lay its pipes along the right-of-way of county roads, subject to conditions fixed by law.

- A sheriff's food bill for feeding prisoners (submitted to county commissioners) must show the name of each prisoner and each item of expense incurred on the individual accounts.

- Those who are not licensed

registered nurses would be violating the law to use identifications such as "SRN" or "RN."

- Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches has the authority, without city consent, to close a portion of Raguet Street constructed over school property within the campus in 1938.

- Texas Board of Examiners in Fitting and Dispensing of Hearing Aids is not authorized to impose on an applicant for a reciprocity license a requirement that he have a residence or a place of business in Texas.

ANIMAL DISEASE FIGHT FUNDS CLEARED — Texas will receive a \$120,414 federal grant to fight animal diseases.

Money will supplement Texas Animal Health Commission's eradication programs aimed at screwworms, scabies and fever ticks.

This year Texas is suffering its worst fever tick outbreak since 1941, according to Commission Executive Director Dr. H. Q. Hibley. Parts of Jim Wells, McMullen, Duval, Live Oak, Kent, Nueces, Leon and Dimmit counties are under tick quarantine.

Governor Smith also noted Texas is facing its worst screw-worm epidemic since 1961, and scabies has struck in several areas.

ENROLLMENTS GROWING — Texas colleges and universities are still climbing, though not so fast as in the early 1960's.

About 450,000 students enrolled in public and private, junior and senior colleges by September 14. This compares with about 438,000 at the same time last year. The Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System concludes there will be about a three and a half per cent increase in enrollments this fall over 1971.

Enrollment in all segments of higher education last year was more than 475,000, and projections by the Board point to about 493,000 this year. While senior college enrollments are up less than one per cent, the community colleges have an increase of more than 11 per cent in their student bodies.

SUPERPORT AID PROMISED — Gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe promised top priority efforts to secure a deep-water superport for Texas.

Briscoe said it is vital to the economy to get a port capable of handling ships with drafts of up to 100 and 120 feet. He said the state is "blessed with having several desirable locations."

SHORT SHORTS — Texas Air Control Board has been approved for a \$2.1 million federal grant from the Environmental Protection Agency.

Texas industrialists are offered exhibit space on the Queen Elizabeth 2 for a floating trade fair to North Africa, the Middle East and Europe in 1974.

A new study of the role of motor vehicles in air pollution is underway in the Houston-Galveston area, one of 14 air quality control regions to be checked.

There are more Texas voters over 64 than in the much publicized 18-20 bracket — 16 per cent for the senior citizens, 10.4 per cent in the youth bracket.

This is Texas Highway Week — with speeches and observances marking the event over the state.

Cotton Quality Continues Good

The Bogata Gin reports 1594 bales weighed in. The showers have stopped the harvest and they are about to get caught up with their ginning as of Wednesday noon.

Rains have delayed the cotton harvest. Last cotton brought to Blackland Prairie Gin was Thursday, Sept. 21. At that time 2724 bales had been checked in. Seed price remains \$45. Blackland Prairie Gin has caught up with ginning and will be ready when strippers can get back in the fields, probably the latter part of the week or first of next week.

Cotton quality continued good, according to Roy W. Gilreath, Officer in Charge of the USDA Classing Office in Dallas. Scattered showers slowed harvest which was at about the half-way point, he added.

Samples classed for the week ending September 22 totaled 60,925 compared to 42,316 the previous week. This brought the seasonal total to 145,925 according to Agricultural Marketing Service records.

For the week, samples from 2637 bales ginned in Lamar County were classed, bringing the season's total to 5602 from this county.

Grades again showed little change from the previous week. Middling Light Spotted (32) accounted for 46 per cent of the cotton classed during the week. Strict Low Middling (41) was next at 22 per cent, followed by Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42), 12 per cent and Middling (31), 16 per cent, up from 10 per cent.

Staple lengths averaged shorter than the previous week. Staple 31 remained the dominant length, accounting for 44 per cent of the samples. Staple 30 moved into second place, accounting for 28 per cent of the cotton compared to 16 per cent the previous week. Twenty-two per cent of the samples were staple 32, down from 32 per cent previously. Three per cent stapled 33, down from ten per cent the previous week.

Micronaire readings held steady with 94 per cent in the 3.5 - 4.3 range.

Pressley strength continued to average 87,000 pounds per square inch. Seventy-four per cent of the readings were in the 85,000 PSI or higher range, 23 per cent in the 80184,000 range and three per cent in the 75-79,000 PSI range.

Prices continued the downward trend, although at a slower rate. Lot prices generally ranged from 20.50 - 22.50 with most sales in the 21-22 cent range. Available price information showed Middling Light Spotted (32) staple 30 selling at an average of 21.55 cents per pound.
