Many Entering Courier Letter Writing Contest

Rules for Entering Contest

Write only on one side of the paper, placing your name and address at the bottom of the page. Write as plainly as possible, paying special attention to neatness.

Blanks may be secured from the Courier office for letter writing purposes upon application.

In the event of a tie declared by the judges, identical prizes will be awarded. All letters must be in the Courier office on or before December 5, 1936, the closing date of the contest.

Levelland Loboos Coming Friday For Non-conference Tilt

Supt. V. Z. Rogers has been informed by the Levelland school that the Levelland football team, accompanied by a large delegation of supporters, will arrive in Lamesa about 10 A. M. Friday in order to attend the Dawson County Fair before the football game which is scheduled for Friday night under the floodlights at McCollum field.

The Levelland team is coached by Bill Stevens, former Lamesa and Big Spring coach, and as they have not played a conference game yet this season, there is little hope to figure their strength on. They are anxious to try themselves out on Lamesa before entering the contest with the members of the north half of the district. Lamesa is also wanting more experience before tackling the three conference games they have scheduled in a row, Brownfield, Tahoka, and Slaton. And after their defeat at the hands of Rotan last Friday night they will try hard to get back in high gear. The good season schedule should put the locals in shape to give a good account of themselves in the conference games coming up. Lambeth had the misfortune of spraining his ankle in last week's game and Bridgeman is still suffering a painful abscess in the region of his nostrils and substitutes are being groomed to handle the positions played by these two.

Milk Plant Purchased By Kraft-Phenix

A crew of workmen have been busy at the milk plant in Lamesa this week preparing for the installation of new equipment for the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation, who have recently closed a deal for the purchase of the plant.

Mr. Earnest Leigh, who is in charge of the construction work said that plans had called for the opening of the plant for operation about the first of November, but due to unexpected delay in the arrival of two carloads of new equipment it is impossible to name a definite date for the beginning of operations. Plans are that the plant, when this construction work is finished will have a capacity of approximately 40,000 lbs. of milk daily and the plant as reconstructed will be so arranged that the capacity can be quickly increased to meet the demands of the territory when ever more milk is available.

Mr. Hugo Wilhowske will be in charge of this branch of the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corp., a nationally known concern and the largest operator in the industry. When Mr. Wilhowske arrives in Lamesa more definite information will be available in regard to the actual operation of the factory.

G. F. Ward Dies After Long Illness

Dawson County lost one of its most respected and beloved citizens Thursday, October 8, when the death angel called G. F. Ward, resident of the Hancock community, to his final reward.

Mr. Ward had been a resident of Dawson County for the past ten years, eight years in the Ballard community and the past two in the Hancock community. He had made a host of friends not only in these localities but over the entire county.

He was born in Mufsboro, Wilson county, in 1890, and died in Lamesa October 8, at the home of his brother-in-law, F. E. Patterson. He had been brought to Lamesa recently after he had been stricken with a baffling ailment, in order that he might be given the best attention possible. Members of his family and friends have kept a constant vigil at his bedside for several weeks before his death.

Mr. Ward had been a member of the Methodist church since he was 18 years of age and intimate friends say that a finer Christian life than his was unknown to them.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Lamesa at 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon with Bro. Berry Baker and Bro. J. G. Walker of Welch officiating. Interment was in the Lamesa cemetery where his grave was covered with a profusion of beautiful floral offerings, tokens of the esteem with which he was held by his fellow men. Pallbearers were Lefty Davis, C. A. Cox, Matt Hughes, Aubrey White, Sam Hodge and Jacy Myers.

Surviving besides his widow are five children, Clarence Ward of Ballard, Mrs. Ellis Todd of Abilene, Forrest, Thomas and Billy Ward of Hancock.

Western States Shows Furnishing Amusement Feature

The Western States Shows are furnishing the amusement feature of the Dawson County Fair this week. They arrived here Sunday and Monday but due to a delay of some of the equipment, were unable to set up in time to open Monday night as advertised.

The show is one of the largest and best on the road and have been showing to capacity crowds each night. Everyone seems to be well pleased with the entertainment for the fair.

The cellophane wedding which was advertised for Wednesday night has been postponed until Friday night in order that the patrons of the Fair would be able to see it at the same time they visited the Fair and not necessitate two visits in order to see everything. This is one of the free attractions of the Western States Shows and will center around a local couple who are to marry on the grounds that night.

Among the many riding devices of the show is the Rideoo, just from the Texas Centennial at Dallas. This is the first season this ride has been out and it is said to be a real thriller.

The Dixie Minstrels, a feature show on the Midway, have just added an attraction in the Kelly Brothers, 14-year old dancing and singing negroes who have joined the show direct from Hollywood, where they have been making pictures.

Dare-devil Geo. Puryear has the Motordome or Wall of Death and has the only woman motorcycle rider to ever appear here in a like attraction.

A complete line of entertainment, including a wild west show, freak shows, monkey show, musical shows and rides of every description and many concessions are included in their midway.

And it would be better for the customers also, since the merchant could better serve them and they would have more time to do their shopping and be able to better select the goods they might desire.

Many Exhibits Displayed By Clubs At Fair

Opening the gates this morning the Dawson County Fair bids fair to be the greatest agricultural exhibit which has ever been assembled by the residents of this county. Two large exhibit tents are full of worthwhile exhibits of 4-H club members and members of the county home demonstration clubs. In addition to these exhibits, many of the local merchants have display booths in the buildings and on the grounds.

Judging will begin Friday morning and prizes will be awarded Saturday evening in connection with the final program of the Amateur entertainment contest.

This Amateur contest is proving to be one of the most interesting features of the show. There will be five broadcasts in this series of eliminations. Two programs are to be given today (Thursday) one on Friday and two Saturday. The finals are to be during the second program Saturday. One program Friday is to allow the football fans to attend the game between Levelland and Lamesa at McCollum Field.

The high spot of the Fair will be reached Friday when all the school children of Dawson County are invited to take part in a mammoth parade through the downtown district of Lamesa and to the Fair Grounds where they will be the guests of the Fair Association and the management of the Western States Shows, receiving a ticket which will admit them to the Fair grounds and also good for a ride on one of the riding devices of the show company.

This parade will also include the High School band and the band of the Western States Shows as well as the two sound trucks and other persons and vehicles.

It is the hope of the Dawson county boosters that this Fair will be such a success that it will be the beginning of the plans for a permanent Fair grounds with suitable exhibit buildings and other necessary equipment.

LIFE CYCLE OF THE SCREW WORM FLY

Flies have four stages in their life cycle. The adult flies mate and lay eggs, and the eggs hatch into maggots or the worm stage. The maggot, after a period of feeding and growth, transforms into a resting stage called the pupal stage and from this emerges the adult fly. Thus we have in the life of a fly four stages—the fly, the egg, the maggot, and the pupa.

The adult female screw worm finds a living animal that has a wound, preferably a fresh wound. The fly lays masses of creamy white eggs on the edge of the wound. Ten to 400 eggs are placed in a single mass, and these eggs hatch in from 11 to 21 hours.

As soon as the young maggots are hatched, they enter the wound and begin feeding. As the maggots continue to feed, they shed their skin several times, growing larger each time this process occurs. In from 4 to 10 days the maggots complete their development and begin migrating from the wound.

The maggots drop to the ground and enter the soil, penetrating to a depth of one to several inches. At this point the maggot apparently becomes inactive, but actually a great change is taking place. The maggot contracts, becomes rigid, and the skin turns brown and hardens to a leatherlike texture. This is the pupal or resting stage, and within the pupal case the insect is transforming into an adult fly. In from 7 to 14 days the process is complete. During the overwintering period the insect sometime spends as long as 54 days in the pupal stage. The adult fly breaks through the pupal case, comes up through the soil and rests upon some twig or plant until its wings have dried and expanded and it is ready to fly away.

For five or ten days the adult flies feed upon various substances, the males and females mate, and then the cycle is ready to repeat itself. This cycle is completed within an average of 24 days. The screw worm fly will attack any cut, wound or abrasion in livestock, fowls, domestic pets, man or other warm blooded animals. It does not, however, deposit its eggs on carcasses or in any place other than a wound on a living animal. It will be seen readily that the screw worm fly population can be greatly reduced if wounds are treated and the screw worms killed. Each female screw worm fly is capable of laying from 2,500 to 2,653 eggs. Thus each maggot that is killed in the wound means the death also of an indefinite number of potential pests.

A screw worm case can be recognized readily by the watery discharge of blood and blood serum which flows from the wound and from the foul odor associated with it. Flies frequently lay eggs around infested wounds and thus worms of several sizes are sometimes found in the same wound. Screw worms feed with their head ends buried in the wound and with their tail ends turned out. Breathing occurs thru the exposed or posterior end of the maggot. This habit makes it easier to reach the breathing apparatus of the maggot with the fumes of benzol, which the United States Department of Agriculture recommends for use in killing screw worms in the wounds. Following this treatment, the wound should be coated with pine tar oil, specific gravity 1.065, to hasten healing of the wound and aid in repelling further attacks from the fly.

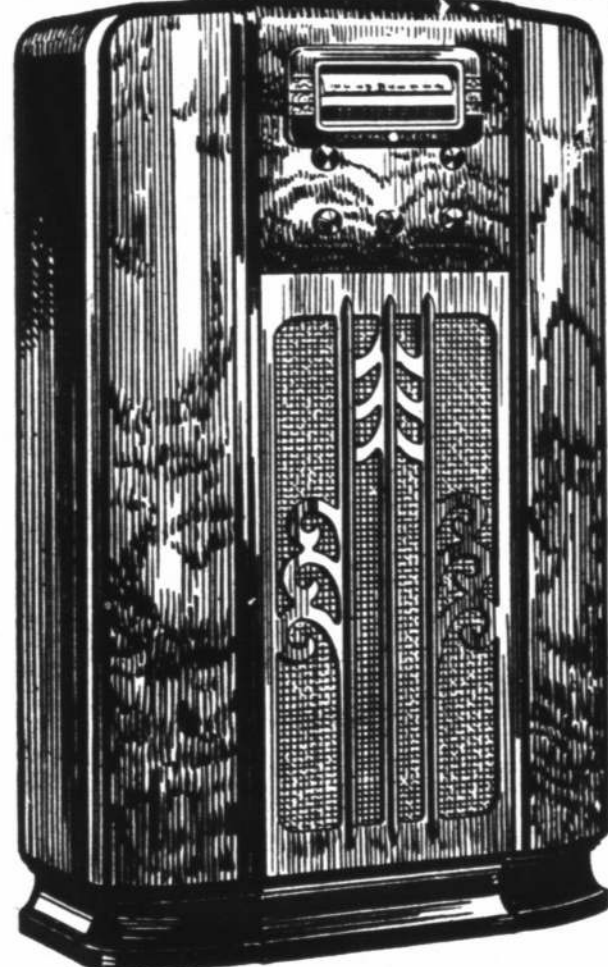

TEXAS PENSION CHECKS HELD UP FOR FEDERAL AID

Austin, Oct. 11.—Stacked high and packed closely were 80,770 envelopes containing 80,770 checks addressed to the needy aged this week at the office of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission, but not one of the warrants could be placed in the mails because federal grant from Washington had not been received.

Total of the 80,770 checks waiting in the giant safe at the Commission headquarters was \$1,265,529. The grant approved by the Social Security Board amounted to \$840,000, but the money itself had not reached the Texas Treasury.

Texas can not expect the Federal

Government to match retroactive payments as provided in the State Old Age Assistance Law. Frank Barre, executive director of the Social Security Board in Washington, told members of the House of Representatives last week. Orville S. Carpenter, Texas pension

director, made no statement other than that the matter was being studied by the Old Age Assistance Commission.

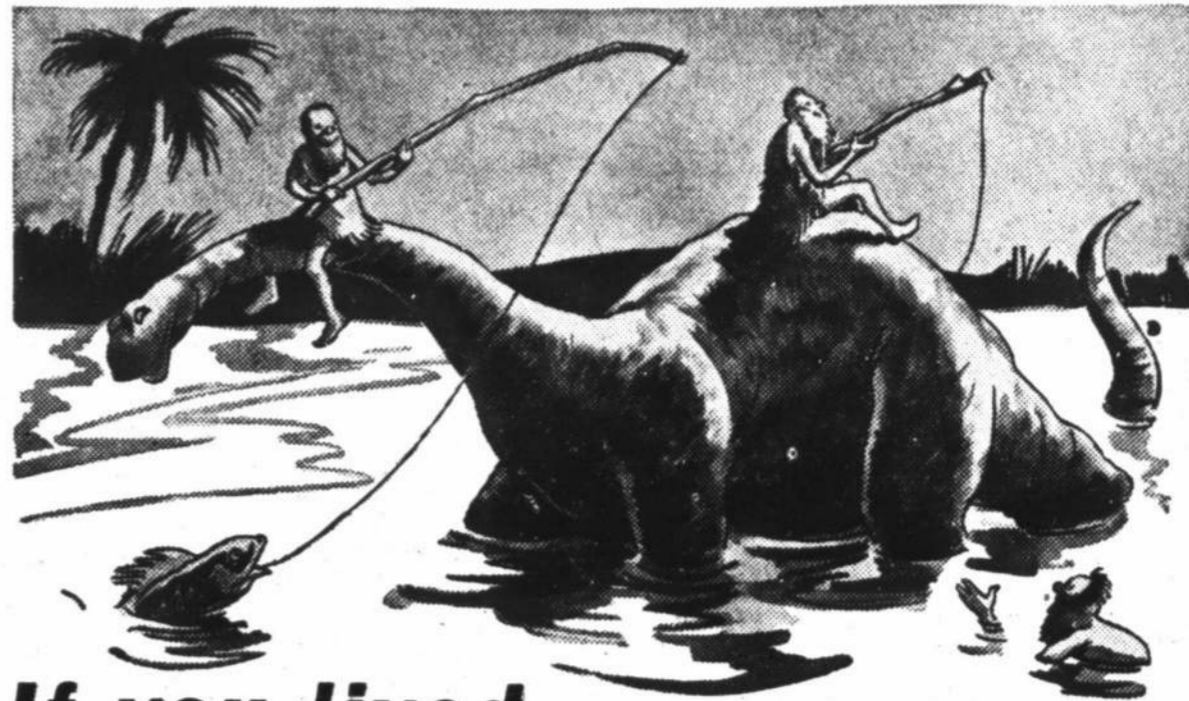
