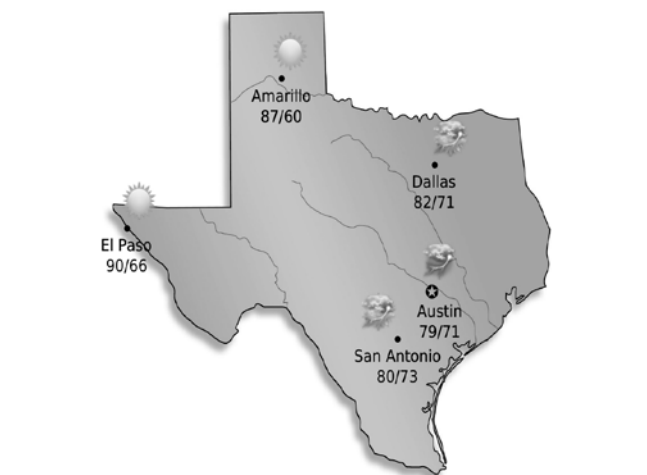

I have been here,” said Museum Administrator Amber Stokes. “It’s just something to do for the community to have some people out to the hanger.”

Stokes said that while the museum has shown military films in the past, she is hoping to attract those who have never been to see Hanger 25 for themselves before.

“I kinda thought, ‘How about people that have never been to the hanger come and experience this?’” said Stokes. “I want to see how this movie night goes and we may have another one in the spring.”

North Texas educator placed more than 120 ads seeking sex

SHERMAN, Texas (AP) — Records show a Dallas-area elementary school principal calling himself “daddy” placed more than 120 online advertisements seeking sex with young males.

Oscar Figueroa of Carrollton on Aug. 1 was sentenced to 10 years in federal prison for trying to solicit sex from someone he thought was a 16-year-old boy.

Prosecutors later released documents on the case. Some of the solicitation ads were posted when the 47-year-old Figueroa traveled to Waco, Austin and San Antonio.

Figueroa was principal of Viridian Elementary School, in the Hurst-Euless-Bedford Independent School District, when he was arrested last summer at a Frisco mall. Authorities say Figueroa thought he was meeting a boy.

Figueroa resigned amid the undercover investigation that led to his April conviction for attempting to coerce and enticement of minors.

He’s appealing his sentence.

More Texas parents nixing children’s vaccines before school

HOUSTON (AP) — State figures show the number of Texas parents refusing to have their children vaccinated for nonmedical reasons rose nearly 9 percent last school year.

The Houston Chronicle reported Sunday that nearly 45,000 Texas children were not vaccinated due to “conscientious exemption.” That compares to about 3,000 children opting out in 2003, when Texas began allowing vaccination exemptions.

Texas, with about 5.5 million schoolchildren, is among 18 states allowing waivers of vaccine requirements based on conscience or personal beliefs. Children heading to school are required to receive immunizations against illnesses such as polio, measles and mumps.

Critics of vaccination exemptions have raised concerns about the re-emergence of diseases such as

measles and whooping cough.

Opponents say they’re protecting their children by avoiding vaccines.

Public health officials say vaccines are safe.

Tech regents OK facility in Odessa

ODESSA — The Facilities committee of the Texas Tech University System Board of Regents voted Friday to approve construction of the new Permian Basin Academic Facility at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC) at the Permian Basin in Odessa.

“This new facility in the Permian Basin will allow an already thriving campus to expand,” TTUHSC President Tedd L. Mitchell said. “This construction is essential in allowing TTUHSC to continue to serve the health care needs of West Texans.”

The project’s \$22.3 million budget includes more than \$14.25 million in tuition revenue bonds authorized by the 84th Texas Legislature. In addition, more than \$5.54 million will come from institutional funds and \$2.5 million from private donors.

The 51,000-square-foot building will house lecture halls, smaller classrooms, research laboratories, offices, conference areas and additional support space. These facilities will allow the Permian Basin campus to increase the number of graduate students it accepts for medical and other related health care disciplines.

Gary Ventolini, regional dean for TTUHSC’s Permian Basin School of Medicine, said plans for the two-story Spanish renaissance building also include gathering and event space to host community-focused outreach activities and Medical Center Hospital functions.

“The proposed construction will serve TTUHSC’s Permian Basin students, faculty and researchers with modern facilities, classrooms and labs,” Ventolini added.

TTUHSC at the Permian Basin was established in 1979 and is part of a six-campus regional system that serves the greater Permian Basin area.

Hillary Clinton becomes president and appoints liberal judges, or his repeated insistence on the falsehood that President Barack “Obama founded ISIS.”

“If the disgusting and corrupt media covered me honestly and didn’t put false meaning into the words I say, I would be beating Hillary by 20 percent,” he tweeted before noon. That tweet was followed by: “My rallies are not covered properly by the media. They never discuss the real message and never show crowd size or enthusiasm.” His anti-media tweet storm topped a half-dozen posts by midafternoon.

It was the latest in a series of implicit acknowledgements by the Republican presidential nominee that he is not winning and in fact could be headed for a big

loss to Clinton on Election Day in less than three months. Signs were popping up across the political landscape that Trump’s year-plus flirtation with presidential politics was in danger of not advancing much further.

Gaffe-by-gaffe, additional Republicans have come forward to say they’re not supporting his bid, with Carlos Gutierrez, secretary of commerce under President George W. Bush, announcing his support for Clinton on Sunday. Meanwhile, GOP leaders in Washington and in the most competitive states have begun openly contemplating turning their backs on their party’s presidential nominee and putting their money and effort instead behind the party’s House and Senate candidates.

Frustratingly for Republicans, Trump’s missteps have overshadowed difficult news for Clinton: The new

release of 44 previously-unreleased email exchanges Clinton had while at the State Department. They became public on Tuesday and showed her interacting with lobbyists, political and Clinton Foundation donors and business interests while serving as secretary of state.

The New York Times on Sunday catalogued a culture of crisis inside the Trump campaign.

That set off Trump on a Twitter rant Sunday morning. He called the report “fiction” and reiterated that he is not about to change what he sees as a winning campaign formula. “I am who I am,” he tweeted.

Given that, Trump’s allies set out Sunday to bat down bad publicity and warn people not to write Trump off.

Sen. Jeff Sessions, R-Ala., warned that the “campaign is not over” and described Trump as still being in transition from the bulldog who beat 16 rivals in the

GOP primary to a general election candidate who communicates differently to a wider electorate what he wants to do differently than Clinton.

“He’s got to wrestle in his own heart, how does he communicate who he is, what he believes, the change he thinks he can bring to America, why what he’s doing is fulfilling the desires of the American people,” Sessions said on ABC’s “This Week.”

Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort criticized the news media for not focusing on what otherwise would have been a substantive week of dueling economic speeches from Trump and Clinton. He said

Trump is continuing to raise millions of dollars while traveling to key battleground states — Ohio, Pennsylvania and Florida — and remains personally “very connected” to the operations of his campaign.

“You could have covered what he was saying, or you could try and take an aside and take the Clinton narrative and play it out. And you chose to do that in-

stead,” Manafort said on CNN.

Pence said on “Fox News Sunday” that he remains proud to be Trump’s running mate and advised: “Stay tuned, it’s very early in this campaign. This coming Monday, you’re going to see a vision for confronting radical Islamic terrorism.”

behalf of Thomas.

The acquaintance told authorities he came across Thomas dumping trash in a field and that she told him she needed help moving right away.

When the man asked about her kids, she calmly said she had killed them, authorities said.

“She was so matter-of-fact about it, he didn’t think she was serious.

He thought she was joking,” Smith said. “He continued to help her pack.”

Smith said the man eventually realized something was wrong when he asked again and got the same answer. He then drove the woman to a nearby police precinct and flagged down an officer, Smith said.

The mother apparently tried to bury the children but when that proved too difficult she hid their bodies under a neighbor’s house, Smith

said.

Smith said investigators don’t yet know if the mother has a history of mental problems. He said police had been to the home before but for “nothing major.”

Tejal Patel, a spokeswoman for the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services, said state child welfare officials have visited the family, but that she could not disclose the nature of those visits.

Patel said a “top to bottom review” of the family will be conducted.

Bolt makes Olympic history

Jamaican 1st ever to win three straight gold medals in 100-meter dash

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Usain Bolt sauntered onto the track, stretched out his arms and waved his hands, signaling for more applause.

He knew exactly how the sprinter-turned-showman's swan song in the Olympic 100 meters Sunday night was a no-doubter — a pedestrian-by-his-standards 9.81-second sprint down the straightaway, but not so slow that he couldn't take time to point at his own chest with his thumb as he crossed the finish line.

"It was brilliant," Bolt said. "I didn't go so fast but I'm so happy I won. I told you guys I was going to do it."

He won his record-setting third straight title in track's featured event and his seventh Olympic gold.

He has already swept aside pretty much every sprinter who had any claim on being the greatest.

So, on a muggy night in Rio, Bolt took aim at Michael Phelps and the Olympics themselves, shoving the swimmer and all his 23 medals to the background and making this official: The Bolt Games have begun.

"I told you guys I wanted to set myself apart from everybody else," Bolt said. "This is the Olympics that I have to do it at."

Bolt beat American Justin Gatlin, who was greeted by the fans with raucous boos, by .08 seconds. Andre de Grasse of Canada took the bronze.

Bolt has a chance for two more golds — in his favorite race, Thursday's 200 final, where he has pro-

nounced he'll be gunning for the world record, then the 4x100 relay Saturday night.

Speaking of world records — a few minutes before Bolt's race, world champion Wayde van Niekerk of South Africa eclipsed what many thought was the most-unbreakable mark in the book — Michael Johnson's 17-year-old run of 43.18 seconds in 400 meters.

Running out of Lane 8, where the lag puts him well in front of the rest of the field, van Niekerk never saw a soul — crossing in 43.03 and only glancing to his left when he approached the line to peer at the clock, which showed him what he had done.

"Usain Bolt will be retiring soon, but this could be the next star of the sport," Johnson said during his commentary on BBC.

But Bolt isn't done quite yet.

The 6-foot-5 sprinter/celebrity overcame his typically slow unfurling from the blocks — he was second-to-last after the break.

"I just said, 'Take your time, and chip away,'" he said.

Churning his legs to gradually build up speed, he eventually caught Gatlin with about 40 meters left and took it to warp speed. The rest was a matter of how hard he wanted to run to the line.

"From the start, really," Bolt said, when asked when he knew he was going to win. "When I got going, got to about 50 meters, I was all right. I could tell I was going to catch him."

Gatlin made Bolt work for it, the way he has for the past four years. He

said the short turnaround between the semifinal and final sapped his strength, and Bolt agreed.

"First time we've had to jog to the warmup area to get ready for the final," Bolt said.

Gatlin finished with silver to go with his 2004 gold and 2102 bronze and, at 34, became the oldest man to win a medal in a non-relay sprint.

And while Bolt was celebrating with anyone he could find, Gatlin was parading the American flag around the track virtually alone. The boos from the Brazilian crowd were the latest ugly chapter in Gatlin's saga. He's been punished for doping twice. His last ban ended in 2010. But fans in the stadium bought into the "Good vs. Evil" story line that's been pitched by the media for all these years, and they let the American have it.

"We all have respect for each other," Gatlin said of himself and his fellow competitors. "I'd like to see everyone have respect in the audience, as well."

A split-second after Bolt crossed the line, he raised the index finger, and then, the real party began.

Bolt unlaced his now-famous gold spikes and took selfies with the fans. He turned his yellow hat backward, kneeled down and gave the crowd what it really wanted — that famous, arching, "To the World" pose that he debuted eight years ago in Beijing.

Chants of "Bolt, Bolt, Bolt" rang out from the near-capacity stadium. Yes, the show lived up to its billing.

But this was not Bolt at

his fastest. Four years ago, all three medalists broke 9.8. Nobody did this time, and neither Bolt's world record from 2009 (9.58) nor his Olympic record from London (9.63) were ever in jeopardy.

It was not Bolt at his toughest. Some might argue his gutsy effort at last year's world championships, when he overcame a season's worth of injuries to beat Gatlin by .01, might have been the grittiest race he has won.

But it certainly took hard work. Before the Olympics, Bolt hadn't run a 100 since June 30, when he pulled out of Jamaica's national championships with injuries to his left hamstring.

The rehab started immediately, with trips to Germany to see his doctor, then a warm-up 200 in London to prove to his Olympic committee that he was fit for the Olympics. Shortly after he arrived in Rio, he conceded that, yes, he wished he'd had more chances to run in real races, but that everything would be OK.

It was better than that. From the moments before he crouched into the blocks, putting his finger to his lips and asking for silence, until long after the race, when he worked the crowd and posed for photos, Bolt made the troubled world of track feel fun again.

He turns 30 the day of the closing ceremony and has insisted his Olympic days are over.

"Somebody said I can become immortal," Bolt said. "Two more medals to go and I can sign off. Immortal."

Rangers blanked again

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Jeff Banister is more impressed with some stout Detroit pitching than the Texas manager is concerned about an offense that got shut out in consecutive games for the first time this season.

Michael Fulmer pitched a four-hitter for the first shutout from a Tigers rookie since Justin Verlander 10 years ago, and Victor Martinez and J.D. Martinez homered among three hits apiece in a 7-0 victory over the Rangers on Sunday.

Fulmer's gem came a day after Matt Boyd, not too far removed from rookie status himself, threw seven scoreless innings in a 2-0 win over Texas ace lefty Cole Hamels.

"Let's don't take away from what two guys have been able to do on the mound," Banister said. "When you've got good stuff and you can execute, you can make any hitter make an out. I think that's more the case the last two nights."

Still, the Rangers have been shut out an AL-high four times since the All-Star break. And that includes two weeks since the trade-deadline boost of catcher Jonathan Lucroy and designated hitter Carlos Beltran.

"It's going to happen man," Beltran said. "Baseball is a game of ups and downs. We feel that we have a good team and we feel that we're going to be able to bounce back."

Fulmer (10-3) retired 16 of the last 17 hitters he faced as Detroit kept the AL West-leading Rangers scoreless over the final 21 innings of the three-game series.

The 23-year-old right-hander, who topped his previous longest outing of eight innings in a no-decision against Kansas City, allowed just four singles a day after Boyd limited the Rangers to two hits and Texas finished with three.

"What I learned was that they were an aggressive team against him," Fulmer, the AL rookie leader in wins, said after striking out nine — two off his career best — with no walks. "I just looked to make quality pitches on 0-0 counts and early in the count and try to get grounders and weak pop-ups."

Ian Kinsler added a solo shot against A.J. Griffin (5-2) after striking out his first three times against the Texas right-hander. Miguel Cabrera hit his team-leading 27th homer in the ninth.

Fulmer's streak of 13 straight retired ended with Nomar Mazara's single leading off the ninth. But Fulmer finished by getting the top of the Texas order — Shin-Soo Choo, Ian Desmond and Beltran — on his way to a career-high 112 pitches.

Victor Martinez started the scoring with a two-run shot in the fourth, and J.D. Martinez hit his 100th career homer to knock out Griffin and give the Tigers a 6-0 lead in the seventh.

Griffin allowed 11 hits and six runs with eight strikeouts in 6 2/3 innings, his second-longest outing of the season. He gave up at least one homer for the 10th straight game, the longest single-season streak for the Rangers since reliever Joaquin Benoit in 2003.

BOPPING BELTRE

The 37-year-old third baseman extended his hitting streak to eight games with two singles, giving him multiple hits in seven of those games. It's his third streak of at least eight games this season. The longest was a 10-gamer from June 21 to July 1.

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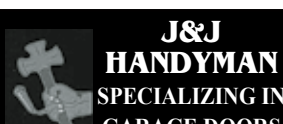
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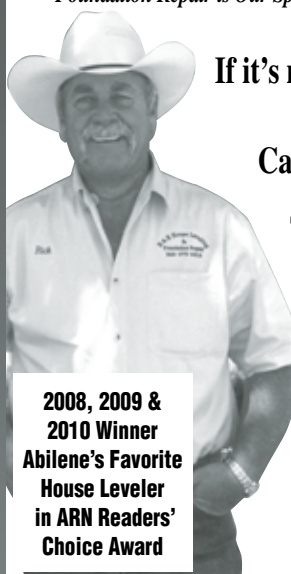

Getting Over the Anger

Dear Annie: I am writing to get your input on an issue I am unable to resolve or forget.

out talking -- I called to see how his battle with cancer was progressing. His wife, who I thought was also my good friend, answered the phone. After a brief conversation, I asked to speak with my friend. She then informed me, in a somewhat surprised voice, that he had died 2 1/2 months earlier. I was so absolutely shocked, stunned and hurt I could not say anything. I just hung up and cried. I later learned that she had notified many of our mutual friends, many of whom had attended his funeral.

Since that conversation, I have been angry and resentful of her, wanting badly to let her know how I feel. Should I? If not, how do I forget her and this incident? -- Persistent Anger

Dear Persistent: I am so sorry for your loss. I could feel your heartache as I read this letter.

Don't confront your friend's widow. She was (and still is) in a deep state of mourning and didn't mean to leave you out. What's

more, I don't believe that you are really angry with her. I believe you're angry that your friend died, and it's easier to project this anger onto a person than to accept there's no one to blame, because to accept that is to realize your powerlessness over the situation.

I think you are also angry with yourself. You feel guilty that you weren't more in touch with your friend during this time. But it isn't your fault. You had no way of knowing he would relapse. You were focusing on your nephew and niece, and rightly so. Although you weren't physically by your friend's side during those final weeks, you gave him 50 years of friendship and helped him live life to the fullest. That is what counts. That is love.

Seeing as you weren't able to attend the funeral, find another way to say goodbye. Perhaps visit his resting place and say what you would like to say to him, or go to a place

you two always used to go and meditate on the time you spent together.

Forgive yourself, and forgive your friend's wife. I'm sure it's what he would have wanted.

Dear Annie: I am writing in response to your column concerning the person who wrote in about her humming co-worker.

The letter writer may be suffering from misophonia, a condition with which I also suffer. Repeated noises produce intense anxiety responses in people with this condition. I have tried biofeedback, behavioral modification, psychoanalysis and medications, to no avail. Before you dismiss your reader's responses as just "unpleasant," please realize that some sensitive people have physical responses to repeated sounds (such as the current fad of "like" before almost any phrase) that are impossible to control and, indeed, are debilitating. The medication I am currently taking helps me to calm

down a bit, but I have not found anything to control or remove it. -- Living With Misophonia

heart. The jack play had the great advantage of establishing a possible trump coup position against East later in the play.

East won the jack with the queen and returned a spade, West's jack forcing dummy's ace. Cummings then ruffed a diamond to shorten his trump length and cashed the K-Q of spades, producing this position:

Cummings now led the club three to dummy's ace, brilliantly demonstrating that finessing the queen would unnecessarily jeopardize a sure contract. (Give East the K-5 of clubs instead of the 9-5 and finessing the queen is fatal if East returns a club.)

Next came the ten of spades from dummy. East could not gain by ruffing, so he, and declarer also, discarded a club. Cummings then ruffed the ten of diamonds with the four of hearts, excited with the jack of clubs, and was sure to score a 10th trick with his 9-7 of trumps sitting behind East's K-8.

Today in History
Today is Monday, Aug. 15, the 228th day of 2016. There are 138 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On Aug. 15, 1945, in a pre-recorded radio address, Japan's Emperor Hirohito announced that his country had accepted terms of surrender for ending World War II.

On this date:
In 1057, Macbeth, King of Scots, was killed in battle by Malcolm, the eldest son of King Duncan, whom Macbeth had slain.

In 1483, the Sistine Chapel was consecrated by Pope Sixtus IV.

In 1812, the Battle of Fort Dearborn took place as Potawatomi warriors attacked a U.S. military garrison of about 100 people. (Most of the garrison was killed, while the remainder was taken prisoner.)

In 1914, the Panama Canal officially opened as the SS Ancon crossed the just-completed waterway between the Pacific and Atlantic oceans.

In 1935, humorist Will Rogers and aviator Wiley Post were killed when their airplane crashed near Point Barrow in

the Alaska Territory.

In 1939, the MGM musical "The Wizard of Oz" opened at the Grauman's Chinese Theater in Hollywood.

In 1946, the DuMont television network made its debut over two stations, WABD in New York and WTTG in Washington, D.C. (The network lasted a decade, folding in 1956.)

In 1947, India became independent after some 200 years of British rule.

In 1965, The Beatles played to a crowd of more than 55,000 at New York's Shea Stadium.

In 1969, the Woodstock Music and Art Fair opened in upstate New York.

In 1974, a gunman attempted to shoot South Korean President Park Chung-hee during a speech; although Park was unhurt, his wife, Yuk Young-soo, was struck and killed, along with a teenage girl. (The gunman was later executed.)

In 1989, F.W. de Klerk was sworn in as acting president of South Africa, one day after P.W. Botha resigned as the result of a power struggle within the National Party.

Ten years ago: Te Arikinui Dame Te Atairangikaahu (teh-ah-ree-kee-noo-ee, Dame teh-ah-ty-rung-ee-kah-hoo), the queen of New Zealand's indigenous Maori population, died on North Island, New Zealand, at

age 75.

Five years ago: Hitting back against an emboldened GOP, President Barack Obama launched a rare direct attack on the Republican presidential field, criticizing his potential 2012 rivals for their blanket opposition to any deficit-cutting compromise involving new taxes during a town hall-style meeting in Cannon Falls, Minnesota. Jim Thome (TOH-mee) hit his 600th home run an inning after he hit No. 599 to help the Minnesota Twins outslug the Detroit Tigers 9-6.

One year ago: Japanese Emperor Akihito expressed rare "deep remorse" over his country's wartime actions in an address marking the 70th anniversary of Japan's surrender in World War II, a day after the prime minister fell short of apologizing to victims of Japanese aggression.

Islamic State gets know-nothing recruits and rejoices

PARIS (AP) — The jihadi employment form asked the recruits, on a scale of 1 to 3, to rate their knowledge of Islam. And the Islamic State applicants, herded into a hangar somewhere at the Syria-Turkey border, turned out to be overwhelmingly ignorant.

The extremist group could hardly have hoped for better.

At the height of Islamic State's drive for foot soldiers in 2013 and 2014, typical recruits included the group of Frenchmen who went bar-hopping with their recruiter back home, the recent European convert who now hesitantly describes himself as gay, and two Britons who ordered "The Koran for Dummies" and "Islam for Dummies" from Amazon to prepare for jihad abroad. Their intake process complete, they were grouped in safe houses as a stream of Islamic State imams came in to indoctrinate them, according to court testimony and interviews by The Associated Press.

"I realized that I was in the wrong place when they began to ask me questions on these forms like 'when you die, who should we call?'" said the 32-year-old European recruit, speaking to the AP on condition of anonymity for fear of reprisals. He said he thought he was joining a group to fight President Bashar Assad and help Syrians, not the Islamic State.

Trump looking to institute political tests for immigrants

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP) — Donald Trump will declare an end to nation building if elected president, replacing it with what aides described as "foreign policy realism" focused on destroying the Islamic State group and other extremist organizations.

In a speech the Republican presidential nominee will deliver on Monday in Ohio, Trump will argue that the country needs to work with anyone that shares that mission, regardless of other ideological and strategic disagreements. Any country that wants to work with the U.S. to defeat "radical Islamic terrorism" will be a U.S. ally, he is expected to say.

"Mr. Trump's speech will explain that while we can't choose our friends, we must always recognize our enemies," Trump senior policy adviser Stephen Miller said Sunday.

On the eve of the speech, the Clinton campaign slammed Trump's campaign manager for ties to Russia and pro-Kremlin interests, an apparent reference to a New York Times story published Sunday night. The story alleges Paul Manafort received \$12.7 million from Ukraine's former pro-Russia president and his political party for consultant work over a five-year period. The newspaper says Manafort's lawyer denied his client received any such payments.

Trump on Monday is also expected to outline a new immigration policy proposal under which the U.S. would stop issuing visas in any case where it cannot perform adequate screenings.

One person shot in Milwaukee protest but no repeat of riots

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Police said one person was shot at a Milwaukee protest on Sunday evening and officers used an armored vehicle to retrieve the injured victim during a second night of unrest over the police shooting of a black man, but there was no repeat of widespread destruction of property.

Some two dozen officers in riot gear confronted a group who were throwing rocks and other objects at police near where the black man was fatally shot

a day earlier. Police moved in to try to disperse the crowd and warned of arrests. Police took the injured person to a hospital in an armored vehicle.

Local television showed police forming a line and using shields to deflect the objects. One police officer fell to the ground after apparently being hit by one of the objects and was moved away by fellow officers. Police also said an injured officer was taken to hospital after a rock broke the windshield of a squad car.

Earlier, video taken from a media helicopter showed a small group of protesters running through the streets, picking up orange construction barriers and hurling them out of the way. Police posted on Twitter three locations where they said shots were fired. There were no other reports of injuries and no major destruction of property after six businesses were burned in the unrest Saturday.

Police Chief Edward Flynn said at a press conference on Sunday that the man whose death touched off Saturday night's rioting was shot after he turned toward an officer with a gun in his hand.

Water everywhere, Louisiana residents struggle for dry land

WALKER, La. (AP) — Barbara Manuel saw a flicker of sun and that gave her hope that the worst of the horrific flooding to hit southern Louisiana was over. But then the skies ripped open, the lights in her house started to flicker and with three feet of water outside threatening to come in and two young kids to care for, she knew it was time to get out.

"I've never seen anything like this before," Manuel said, speaking on the side of the road as she was about to get in a National Guard vehicle. The 41-year-old is one of more than 20,000 people rescued from their homes as of Sunday as rain-swollen rivers flooded their banks and wreaked havoc across southern Louisiana.

She was worried about her mother who lives just up the road. High waters made the trip impassable and cellphone problems made it difficult to reach her. But Manuel's two children — a 5-year-old daughter and 8-year-old son — were fine.

"As long as my kids are safe, that's all that matters," she said.

Northern California wildfire forces 4,000 to evacuate

LOWER LAKE, Calif. (AP) — A wildfire destroyed at least 10 homes and forced some 4,000 of people to flee their homes as flames jumped a road and moved into a Northern California town located miles away from a devastating wildfire nearly a year ago.

The fire reached Main Street in Lower Lake, a town of about 1,200 about 90 miles north of San Francisco, on Sunday and burned the post office, a winery, a Habitat for Humanity office and several businesses as thick, black smoke loomed over the small downtown strip. Staff at a hospital in Clearlake, a neighboring town of about 15,000, rushed to transfer 16 patients to another hospital while firefighters carried goats and other animals to safety as homes burned around them.

The blaze was one of 11 large wildfires burning in California, where high temperatures combined with parched conditions brought on by a five-year drought raised the fire danger. In central California, a day-old wildfire burned 20 structures and threatened 150 homes.

Officials confirmed 10 homes around Lower Lake were burned, although witnesses said they could see more. Tragically, the Habitat for Humanity office was working to raise money to help rebuild homes destroyed by a devastating wildfire that

killed four people and destroyed more than 1,300 homes nearly a year ago.

"Emotions are still incredibly raw from the Valley Fire," said state Sen. Mike McGuire about last year's wildfire.

Turkey says failed coup was decades in the making

ISTANBUL (AP) — Turkish investigators call it the ultimate long game.

In 1986, the Turkish military expelled dozens of cadets suspected of loyalty to a young Muslim cleric named Fethullah Gulen, seen as a potential threat to the country's strict secular rule. Officials, a magazine reported at the time, said an alleged recruiter had told the students to work their way through the ranks and wait for instructions that would come in a few decades.

Fast forward 30 years to July 15, when renegade officers staged a failed coup and President Recep Tayyip Erdogan accused Gulen of orchestrating it. Gulen, now based in Pennsylvania, denies any involvement, but a rising tide of allegations challenges the moderate image promoted by his Islamist movement and casts it as a cover for secret designs on Turkish power that included efforts to infiltrate state institutions decades ago.

In the 1970s, when Turkey was run by a military-backed, secular government, the group seemed like a conventional religious movement that attracted young, middle-class recruits through a successful network of schools and dormitories.

Gulen, who had been associated with Islamic mysticism, promoted a message of tolerance and charity along with Turkish patriotism. His group — known as Hizmet, Turkish for "service" — raised money through donations from individuals and businesses. By the early 1990s, it was expanding into other countries with a network of schools, burnishing an international reputation as an advocate of interfaith harmony.

Unexploded bombs extend Yemen war's deadly toll

HASN FAJ ATTAN, Yemen (AP) — Screams rang out through the hilltop village outside Yemen's capital after 10-year-old Youssef al-Salmi set off a bomb he had found in a field, perhaps thinking it was a toy.

He became the latest of several Yemeni civilians to be killed by unexploded ordnance from the country's ongoing civil war, which pits Saudi and U.S.-backed government forces against Shiite Houthi rebels.

The conflict has killed more than 9,000 people, displaced 2.4 million, and destroyed much of the already limited infrastructure in the Arab world's poorest country. U.N.-backed peace talks held in Kuwait collapsed earlier this month.

Rights groups and U.N. agencies have expressed concern that even if the fighting is brought to an end, the country will still grapple with a brutal legacy of unexploded munitions, including bombs dropped by Saudi-led warplanes in and around the rebel-held capital, Sanaa.

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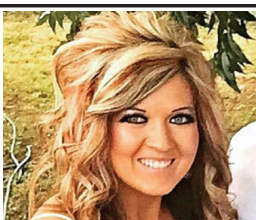
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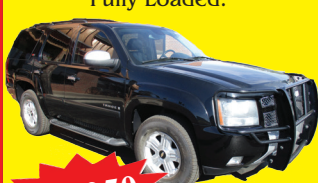
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
