110 Musicians to Give Band Concert Tonight

Tonight at 8:30 when the combined forces of three bands are heard from the court house lawn Ballinger people and visitors will have a privilege they have not had before, and probably will not have for a long time to come.

Bandmaster H. H. Carby said this morning that everything was ready for the concert, and that the three bands had been rehearsing the music to be used in the program for some time.

The program has already been announced, and no changes have been made nor are any contemplated it was stated.

The massed band to play here will number over a hundred pieces and contain nearly all instruments used in any band. The combined band will be a larger musical group than any other band now in existence, larger than the United States Marine, Army bands, or the Sousa organization.

All the instrumentation of the three bands will be used with the exception of the bass drums. Drummers of the three bands will alternate in playing that instrument.

Chairs will be placed on the lawn in concert formation Friday afternoon and additional lights will be installed so that the large number of musicians can see their music score. The musicians are anxious for as many people as possible to be present and hear the program. Publicity has been given the concert all over the county and parking space will be out of the question for many. Motorists who are unable to find parking places are requested to leave their cars elsewhere and walk to the lawn. The benches will be arranged to take care of a large number and others will find comfortable sitting around the grassy park.

The concert will start between 8:00 and 8:30 and will last about one hour.

ST. LOUIS, July 26.—Col. James W. Byrnes, declared at a reunion of the Laymen's Retreat League, at Jefferson Barracks, near here recently that stronger moral training instead of more laws, examining commissions and pleas for law observance will solve the problem of law enforcement.

"We are overlooking the necessity of appeal to the spiritual side of man," he said, "and this loss of moral training lays the foundation of disrespect for constituted authority."

Army Orders of 1842 Found at Ft. Riley

WICHITA FALLS, July 26.—It was sport—being a member of the United States Army in 1842 according to Sgt. Cal Montgomery of the Army recruiting headquarters at this place. Sgt. Communities to Flood Building With Exhibits

Fair officials are of the opinion that twenty communities will have exhibits on display at the Runnels County Fair this fall. If this is true the office, school booths, individual farm exhibits and county exhibits will have to be removed from this building to take care of the community entries as the hall will only accommodate ten to each side.

Those already talking fair work in different parts of the county state that there is more interest than has ever been shown here in years before. Some communities are already getting their backgrounds ready for their booths and many products have been prepared and stored away to be placed in their displays.

The score cards and prizes will remain the same in these displays and communities will receive as much as ten dollars whether they win a prize or not. This is calculated to help some with the expense of decorating the booths and is some incentive for communities to enter.

The largest number of community booths ever entered here before was ten but more spaces have already been reserved than that for the coming fair and a number of others are expected to make their reservations at an early date. An inclined elevated floor will be built in the agricultural building on the east side so that it can be arranged and decorated the same as the side formerly used by communities.

Just where the office, school booths and individual booths will be placed in case of an overflow has not been figured out yet. The fair association is in need of another building to match the two they have with another covered building between. This would give sufficient room for all entries and an automobile show. The new building cannot be had this year and it may be necessary to rent a big tent to take care of everything but a good tent will serve the purpose very well.

The witnesses include doctors of insane asylums, wardens, state rangers, and numerous county officials, all of whom declared that in their opinion Leahy is sane.

While trying to conduct a mental examination of Leahy the witnesses said he asked them "who sent you?" They replied, "the governor." Leahy came back with "what the hell has Governor Moody to do with it now?"

The testimony in the case is expected to be completed today.

Frisco Miss, 9, Claims World Title as Cook

OAKLAND, Calif., July 26.—The proverbial "born cook" has come to life in the person of Edith Richardson, who has just celebrated her ninth birthday by disclosing to twelve guests at her birthday party that she not only had planned the festive dinner but had made most of it. Edith claims to be the world's champion 9-year-old cook. Her contributions included the birthday cake, raspberry gelatin charlotte, chicken a la king, and the cereal beverage.

Edith is the daughter of Herbert A. Richardson, president of the American company of Angus Watson & Co., Ltd., in San Francisco. From the time she could toddle, Edith has "played" with ingredients until she turned them into delicious edibles. At four she rose superior to toy utensils, and two years later vied with the family cook for honors.

In the past year she has developed her skill as a maker of desserts, and her success in this field has won her fame as "The Mistress of Twenty Desserts." However, the foreign dishes which she learned to make while traveling abroad especially appeal to her love of the unusual in cookery. Born in England, she has also lived in Scotland, France, Spain, Italy, and India. In this country she lived in several eastern cities—Philadelphia, Boston, Montclair and New York—before she came to California.

Edith's half dozen favorite dishes include her native Yorkshire pudding, lemon-jellied fruit salad, curried eggs, French onion soup, Spanish rice and filet mignon en casserole.

She will devote the next two years, she said to mastering the secrets of making piquant sauces and gravies.

LAMBERT FIELD, St. Louis, July 26.—Close to the finish of their second week in the air, the pilots of "The St. Louis Robin," reported "everything fine" as the plane passed the 316th hour aloft at 11:17 o'clock this morning.

ST. LOUIS, July 26.—Nearing the close of their second week in the air, Forrest O'Brien and Dale Jackson today flew on in their monoplane, "The St. Louis Robin," bent on adding a third week to their endurance record.

The fliers stated in notes that they would not land while the Houston plane, "The Billion Dollar City," is up, as it might pass them, and that would never do. The Houston ship is trailing the St. Louis ship by 103 hours.

"The St. Louis Robin" passed its 312th hour in the air at 7:17 o'clock this morning.

HOUSTON, July 26.—Joe Glass and G. L. Loomis, in "The Billion Dollar City," had been aloft at 10 o'clock this morning for 213 hours. Notes from the fliers said all was well.

HOUSTON, July 26.—After a night's battle with stormy weather "The Billion Dollar City," piloted by Joe Glass and G. L. Loomis completed two hundred and ten hours of continuous flying at 7:49 o'clock this morning. The plan's barograph is expected to run down today after clocking the flight since noon of July 18th.

A request was made by the fliers for permission to move to another airport in the event of storms. The matter was taken up with the National Aeronautical Association with headquarters at Washington.

SPEAK BETTER ENGLISH IN U. S. THAN ENGLAND

Doctor Vizetelly said that the broad 'a' a long feature of the English of the Englishman's speech is fast disappearing. He expressed his opinion while on a visit here recently.

"This shifting of vowels values, may be attributed to their greater facilities of contact. To my amazement the broad 'a' approximated in 'bawth,' 'glawss' and 'graws' of my old school town in East Sussex, has been superseded by the more melodious 'a' as in 'bath,' 'glass' and 'grass.' 'Water' however, is still 'wahter' and not 'wotter.'"

GUIDE'S BURRO FALLS OVER 500 FOOT CLIFF

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Summer vacations for students will soon be over. The Ballinger schools will take up on September 2nd and all students will start the school work again. Many local students have worked during the summer and very few have spent the summer in idleness.

San Angelo and Abilene are at present engaged in raising money to build railroads with. Abilene is attempting to raise 400,000 and with only a few days work had subscribed to the amount of \$266,000. San Angelo is coming along fine with her project but both towns are yet short of their goals.

September 1st usually marks the close of the dull summer period in Runnels county but with an early crop business conditions should greatly improve early in August this year. Runnels county has one of the earliest crops that has been seen in many years and many bales of cotton will be ginned during the month of August.

Showers that are falling in West Texas are mighty bad for the breeding of insects that will injure cotton. A majority of the farmers do not want any rain for the next two weeks, fearing that the large plant the cotton now has will cause leaf worms and boll weevil to start their dirty work. Hot sunshine will keep the pests away from the good crop that is far on its way to maturity.

The Runnels county delegation to the short course at A. & M. College will be among the largest from any single county. At least 75 will board the train at Ballinger Sunday morning and according to newspaper reports from

other counties this will be by far the largest delegation to College Station. Most counties in this section are sending about forty representatives. Much good is derived from these courses and each year more Runnels county men, women, boys and girls are taking advantage of them.

KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK

During 1927 and 1928 fire losses in the United States showed an appreciable reduction, in comparison to former years, in spite of a large increase in the total value of insured property.

This would indicate that the gospel of fire prevention is at last beginning to bear fruit. Through building inspection, better building codes, improved fire departments, better water system, fire prevention weeks and similar activities, every citizen in this country has been given a knowledge of the menace of fire and the tragic magnitude of fire waste.

The recent fire in the Cleveland Clinic, which took 124 lives, has given us a terrible object lesson. It is now officially claimed that the fire was the result of carelessness in storing and guarding films. Every home or building fitted for human occupation presents hazards which need constant watching.

The two years' decrease in the fire loss is hopeful, but not conclusive of permanent improvement. The waste, both in lives and property, is still tremendous and inexcusable. It is the duty and privilege of every citizen and public official to do his part in the war against fire.

School Ready to Open on Sept 2nd

The board of trustees of the Ballinger Independent School District announces that everything is practically in readiness for the opening of school here on the first Monday in September, September 2nd.

The primary building and the grammar school building have been thoroughly overhauled and all obsolete equipment discarded and new equipment installed. Both of these buildings have been painted inside and outside with the roofs receiving heavy coats of roofing paint to put them in first class condition. A number of old teachers' desks in these two buildings have been discarded and modern desks substituted. All blackboards that were in bad condition have been taken out of the buildings and new blackboards of late design installed.

Work on the West Ward building has been completed and equipment will be placed in three rooms within the next two weeks. Most of the seats, desks and blackboards are already here and as soon as the rest arrive, workmen will complete the job and have these rooms ready some time before opening day. The board has installed gas heating in the West Ward building, removing the old coal stoves. The three rooms will be just as good as any other part of the local school system. The playgrounds have been worked over, weeds cut, and new play equipment put in.

Education here this year will get an early start and teachers are expecting the largest number of students on the first day that has ever entered here for the beginning of the session. The board has made plans for a heavy enrollment and will have plenty of room so that no half-day sessions will be necessary in any grade.

The enrollment in the high school section will be large this year as many students have been

transferred here to take work which is not taught in their communities. Where students are transferred here from districts where their grades are not taught the state pays their tuition, and that has caused many boys and girls to be sent here for the senior class especially.

In addition to the regular school work, Coach Felton Wright announces that he will have football equipment here ready to issue to candidates at the beginning of the term for football practice. This material will probably be issued the first day and actual work-outs started on Tuesday or Monday if possible. A raft of material will be on hand to try for the team this year and it will take the coach some time to give all the hopefuls a chance and pare the men down to a first string eleven. Letter men from last year's squad are plentiful and will not take much speculation as to their ability. Several of the boys are playing their last year of high school football, having starred for the past two years.

Tuition in all buildings will remain the same as last year, \$3 in the primary grades, \$4 in the elementary section, and \$5 in the high school.

Teachers will begin to arrive here about one week in advance of the opening of school to select boarding places. Several faculty meetings will be called prior to the opening so that the entire teaching staff will be ready for the work connected with the opening.

Ballinger On Top After 3 to 1 Win

Jimmy Parker led the San Angelo Sheep Herders down Thursday with two hits, and the Ballinger Bearcats went to the top of the percentage column with a three to one win. Parker was never in better shape than he was Thursday and pitched ball that would win against any club. There was no earned run and one of the hits off him was of a very scratchy variety and under ordinary circumstances would have been an easy out. Parker had good control and plenty of stuff on the pole and with a one-run lead the Ballinger fans felt reasonably safe.

Another reason for the complacent view of the situation was on account of the powerful defense put up by Parker's teammates. Every man on the club played airtight ball and hustle was noticeable at every position. Only three balls were hit to the outfield and the infield was functioning like a streak of lightning. Kittrell and Mueller handled some chances and threw men out by inches that took fast work. Lynch was everywhere after the agate, and Bean got them if they were anywhere in his direction.

Ballinger started scoring in the second inning when E. Mueller hit a line drive on a short hop to Williamson that bounced off his shins into left field. The ball was too hot to handle and went for a hit. Al Mueller sacrificed him to second and Dan Lynch came thru with that long double between right and center fields. Mueller scored on the hit.

San Angelo tied the score in the fourth frame. Moos, first man up, drew a walk. LaBauve got a very scratch hit back of first base, and Moos went to third on the play. With LaBauve on first and Moos on third a delayed steal was started which resulted in a score for San Angelo on a very close decision.

The game rocked on in a 1 and 1 tie until the eighth. In this round Parker was safe on a boot by Williamson, went to second on a passed ball by Taylor, and scored when Sealing singled thru the pitcher's box with a well placed hit. Sealing stole second and scored on E. Mueller's hit back of second base. That finished the scoring on both sides, and only one other man was on base during the game. Grant, Angelo center gardener, walked in the ninth to give the Herdsmen a ray of hope but the light soon went out when Taylor and Sikes popped up with no advance for

the runner. Big Moos started another thrill when Parker threw him three straight balls, but Jimmy tightened up and made the fellow whiff at three fast ones and the game was over.

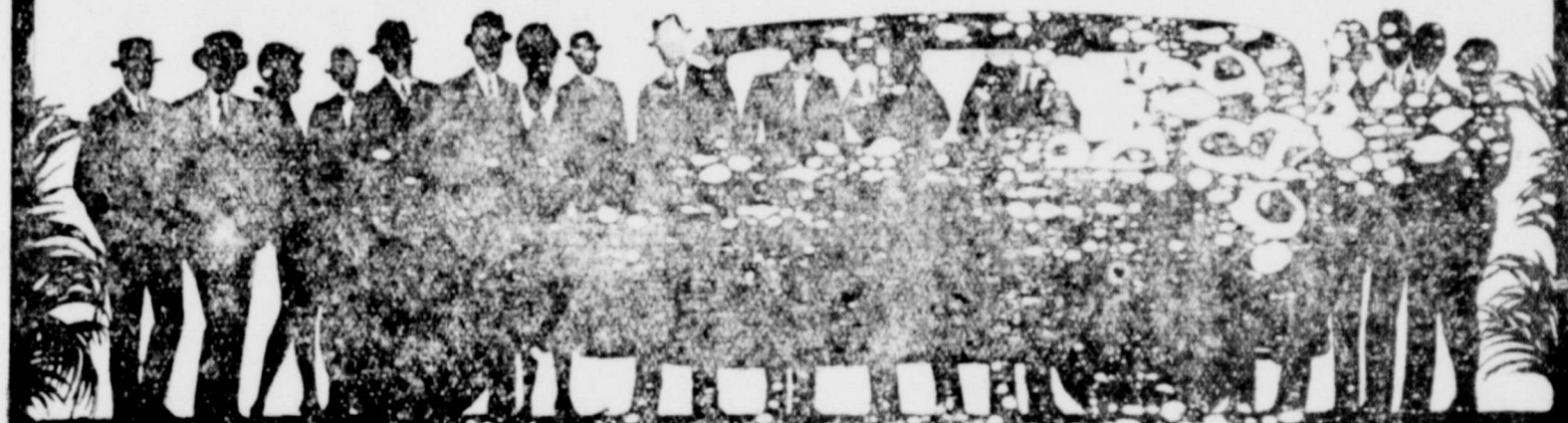

CHICAGO, July 26.—Elliott Ballinger, in an address before the National Sausage Casting Convention, stated that skinless hot dogs are totally without pep and spirit and will not long remain in vogue.

CHICAGO, July 26.—Windy City visitors of a generation ago grabbed onto their hat strings and craned necks in passing "the Ta-a-comah-h building, tallest in the whole world," famous as the brew of beer from which it derived its name. Since those days rubberneck wagons have quit calling attention to structural heights to direct energy toward more novel sights.

Chicago now has approximately 450 skyscrapers on hand, with 15 new ones on pencil tips, and prospects for a round 500 by the end of 1930.

While New York still leads the numerical list with its 2400 cloud-scratchers, and the flags float higher there than in any other city, Chicago is soon to acquire the largest and tallest office structure in the world, distancing New York's famous Woolworth Building.

As soon as several million dollars can be properly apportioned among architects, structural engineers, supply companies and similar adjuncts, work will begin on the Crane building. It is to be a city within itself, covering an entire block and housing between 3000 and 4000 office suites. But the latest structure actually on the way up to help lost fliers find the city is the Cuneo building, on North Michigan Avenue.

In one respect, however, has Chicago outdistanced Gotham in this superstructure rivalry. That is in the amount of floor space available in individual buildings, where this city leads. At present the enlarged Furniture Mart stands in a premier position, but the new Merchandise Mart under

construction will soon assume these laurels.

Among industrial institutions, the Western Electric plant here claims to have the largest amount of floor space, with more than four million square feet of working area actually in use.

Other American cities with more than 100 skyscrapers each include Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Boston and Detroit. St. Louis, San Francisco, Kansas City and Pittsburgh are adding up and constantly counting their skyscrapers, but they still have some to build before they achieve the century mark.

In point of size, the number of skyscrapers in Chicago has been divided into two classes. Those rating between 10 and 12 stories are figured at 385, with 65 others ranging from 20 stories up in height.

The Tacoma building, which started the structural altitude race at the close of the last century, has been razed.

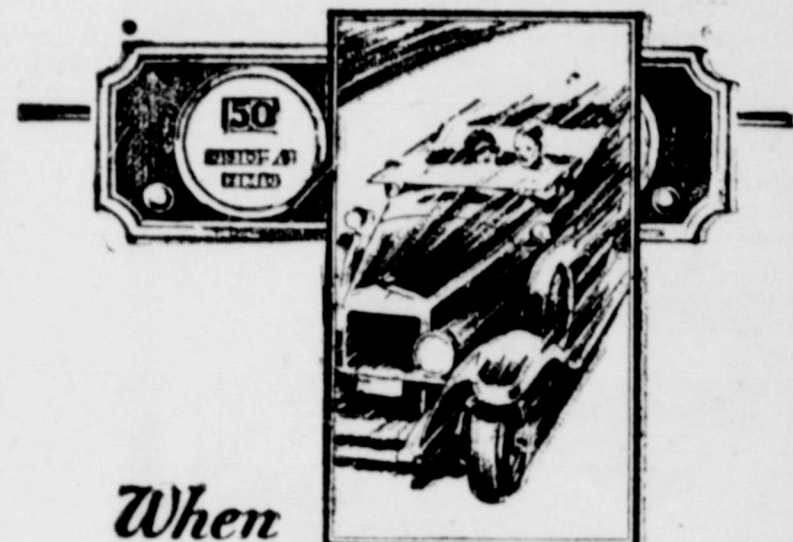
Schroeder had eleven diamonds,
