are 500,000 eligible jurors—the remainder being women, children, disabled, insane, etc.—and of this half million, 115,000 would, if summoned, decline jury service this year. These figures are based on a study of Texas courts.

In his proclamation, Governor Shivers said, "This system of free courts can be maintained only as long as the citizenry assumes a toward jury service. For our system of trial by jury i one of our most basic freedoms."

The joint House and Senate resolution calling for observance of the month says in part, "the great difference between a dictatorship, in which all subjects are slaves of the ruling minority, and the government of a free people, is the fact that the citizen in a democracy has the inalienable right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury."

Civic clubs and schools all over Texas were being asked to take part in the observance of "Jury Service Month" by planning programs around the importance of a willing and intelligent attitude toward jury service.

"Jury service is a small thing to ask of a people who enjoy the many pleasures of freedom," said Shepperd.

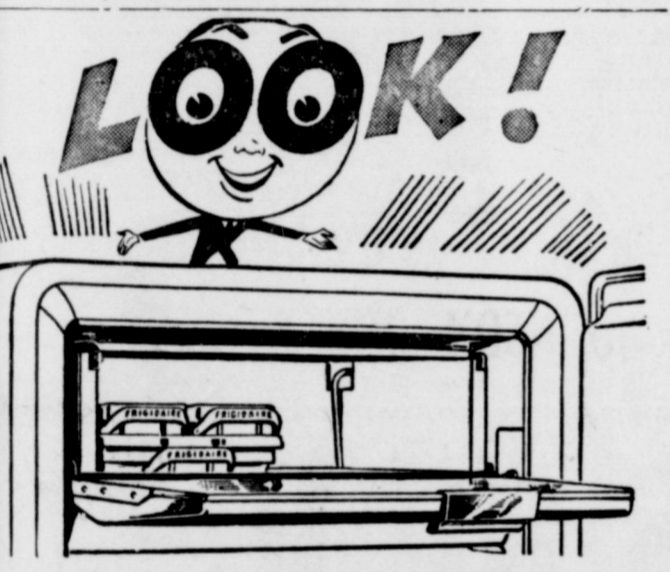

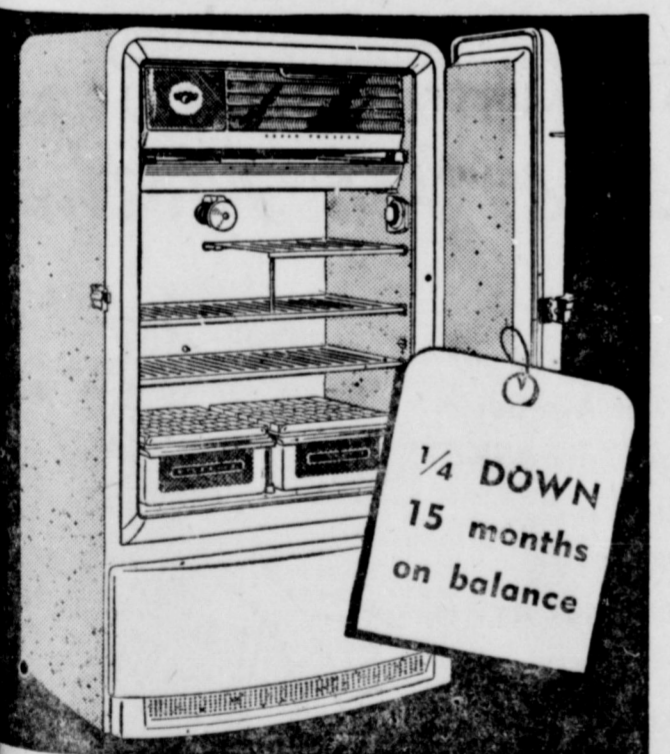

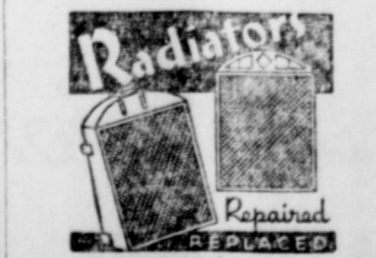
