Powder Used in Treatment Of Weakened Heart Muscles

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Talcum powder has been blown onto weakened heart muscles to create a stimulating irritation, says a New York surgeon.

Dr. Samuel Thompson, associate professor of surgery at the New York Medical College and professor of thoracic surgery at the Flower-Fifth Avenue Hospital, New York, described the technique yesterday at the annual meeting of the Jefferson Medical College Alumni Association.

He said the new method was developed to rehabilitate persons stricken with coronary occlusions — the closing of a branch of the arteries supplying the heart.

Of 42 patients operated on by the staff, Dr. Thompson reported, 37 claim they are leading normal lives.

After slitting the pericardial sac enclosing the heart, Dr. Thompson explained, talcum powder is injected into the sac by blowing.

The talcum irritates the area and creates a new blood supply.

In persons who suffer from coronary occlusion, there is an almost complete lack of blood supply to the heart muscle. This causes either instant death or cripples the victim to a point where he is barely able to move about without severe attacks of pain.

The placing of talcum powder in the heart sac and the creation of a new blood supply through irritation changes the condition from a lack of blood supply to one of abundance, Dr. Thompson said.

The talcum powder, he said, remained in the sac for years without undergoing any change.

Valuable Selection Ignored by Thieves

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — Thieves passed up a group of fine once owned by Marie Antoinette but stole 22 other "historically valuable" objects from the Carnegie Institute museum.

Wallace Richards, museum director, said the theft was discovered yesterday and that the robbers apparently remained in the museum after the closing time Tuesday night.

The things taken were from the museum's Dupuy collection — donated by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Dupuy. He was a business associate of steel magnate Andrew Carnegie.

The items taken included an enameled pill box, needle case, watch fob and six dance card cases.

Richards said the thieves made their selections carefully, passing by some objects to take others. They overlooked some valuable treasures, including the Marie Antoinette fans.

Richards said the value of the missing objects "could not be estimated."

Thrice-Married Girl Asks Court Action To Untangle Mess

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Earlene Mildred Hunter, 20-year-old parolee from the California Youth Authority, has asked superior court to annul her marriages to three men.

Her trio of suits yesterday said she wed Newman Berry in Reno, Nev., Feb. 21, 1947; Teddy Wayne Cantrell in Salome, Ariz., Sept. 1, 1948, and John Bowling in Yuma, Ariz., Oct. 9, 1949.

At the time of each wedding she was not legally free, the petitions said.

Earlene, 20, is in jail. The Youth Authority, under whose jurisdiction she came after she ran away from her Bell Gardens home, charged she violated her parole. A parole officer said her record shows she has two children, expects a third, and filed the suits to facilitate placing her expected child for adoption.

Frozen Grapefruit Juice Price Slashed

DADE CITY, Fla. — (AP) — The giant Pasco Packing Company has slashed wholesale prices for grapefruit concentrate to a point it figures will let the frozen juice retail at two six ounce cans for 29 cents. That's about half the present price.

Pasco said it was making the reduction to create sufficient demand to take care of a 1950-51 national grapefruit crop it expects to hit 60,000,000 boxes. This season's crop is about 36,000,000 boxes. Last season's was about 45,000,000.

The company is lowering its price for a dozen six ounce cans from \$1.85 to \$1.12 1-2.

The price of single strength canned orange juice is being boosted 30 cents per dozen six-ounce cans. The new figure is \$3.30.

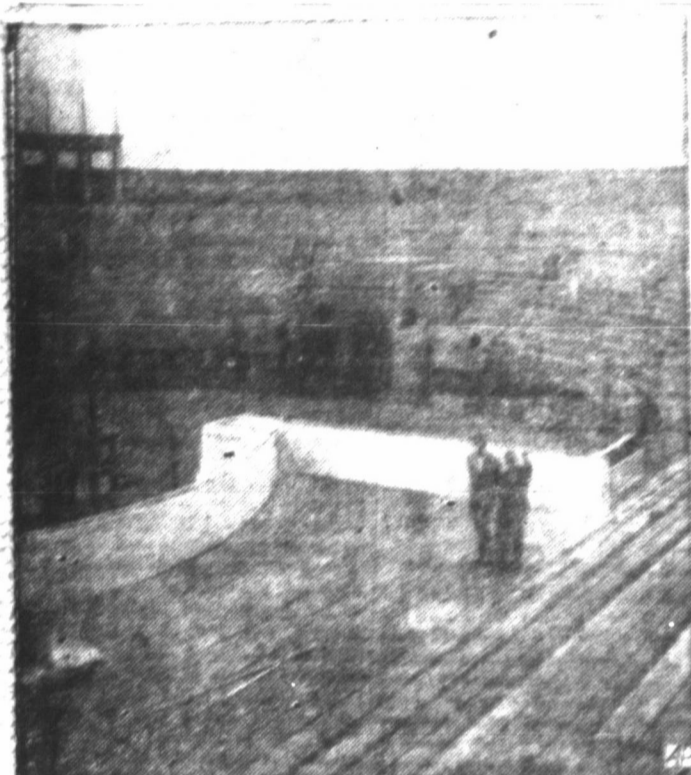

Court Upholds Negro's Death Sentence Ruled by White Jury

AUSTIN — (AP) — The Court of Criminal Appeals yesterday said it made a mistake in previously ruling that a Negro's death sentence should be dissolved because no Negro served on the grand jury which indicted him.

The court reversed its decision of April 19 and affirmed the death sentence of Herman Lee Ross. Ross was convicted in the gun slaying of a Galveston package store keeper.

Presiding Judge F. L. Hawkins, concurring opinion urged that the case go to the U. S. Supreme Court for final decision.

The appeals court held that Ross received a fair and impartial jury trial and therefore it made no difference whether a Negro served on the grand jury.

"If due process of law resolves itself into a fair and impartial trial, then appellant (Ross) admits having received such, regardless of the color of a grand jury commissioner, or their actions thereof in the past," wrote Judge Harry N. Graves, author of the court opinion.

Judge Hawkins took an unusual step in adopting the state's motion for rehearing in full as his concurring opinion. The motion

was prepared and filed by Galveston County Attorney Raymond E. Magee.

Magee said the case should go to the Supreme Court of the United States because "it will permit and require (the court) to declare definitely and unequivocally whether the 14th Amendment to the Federal Constitution demands (in felony prosecutions against Negroes) that there be no discrimination against Negroes . . . in the selection of grand jurors or in the selection of grand jury commissioners."

He said the Supreme Court should decide whether this is the law "even though it be admitted that no discrimination was practiced to bar Negroes from the petit or trial jury which tried and convicted a Negro defendant."

State Water Group Says Run-off of Waters Is Spotty

AUSTIN — (AP) — General rains of widely different intensities brought "a very spotted picture of flood run-off" in May, the Board of Water Engineers reports.

The board said that if you would take the state as a whole, rainfall was nearly normal, but the rainfall in the northeast was twice normal while West Texas rainfall was less than half of normal.

This difference in rainfall characterized the surface runoff in Texas rivers for May, the board reported. Sabine, Neches and Trinity rivers were at or above flood stage for the entire

month in their lower reaches. Neches River at Evadale averaged 15,280 second-feet for May which is nearly twice the median flow.

In contrast, there was no appreciable flood runoff in the Pecos River watershed in West Texas. Water impounded in Red Bluff reservoir on the Pecos fell from 77,000 to 62,000 acre-feet during the month.

Runoff was varied in the Upper Colorado River watershed and its tributaries. North Concho River near Carlisbad flowed at 287 average of 49.3 second-feet. This was caused by heavy local rainfall in this particular watershed.

Buchanan Reservoir held 830,700 acre-feet at month end, an increase of 54,000 acre-feet for the month. Marshall Ford Reservoir decreased its holding from 698,000 to 670,000 acre-feet.

Flow on the Guadalupe was still below normal.

Man Not Bothered By Ordinary Worms

DAVIS, Calif. — (AP) — Only about 25 of the 250 kinds of worms that infest domestic animals have been found in people, reports Dr. James R. Douglas of the College of Agriculture here.

Four of the 25 can be considered normal human parasites, he says.

There are two reasons why so few animal parasites have moved in on the human race, he believes. The first is that man comes into contact with them infrequently. Second, most of them have become so well adapted to animals, through long residence, that they are not capable of establishing themselves in man.

For a particularly good meat soup, brown the meat bones in a little fat before adding them to the water and vegetables.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — (AP) — The courage of two electric power company workers was rewarded yesterday by presentation of Claude L. Matthews Valor Awards.

John Fallis, a boiler operator of the Kentucky Utilities Company, Lexington, Ky., received one award for bringing a speeding power plant turbine under control, at risk of his own life.

A. L. Herriot, representative of the Texas Power and Light Co., at Denton, Texas, was honored for his action in coping with

the effects of an ice storm, although painfully injured.

The valor awards, established by the president of the W. N. Matthews Corp., of St. Louis, Mo., were presented at the 18th annual meeting of the Edison Electric Institute, trade organization of the privately-owned power companies.

The annual presentations honor acts of devotion to duty by utility employees which call for extraordinary courage in efforts to maintain important electric service or to restore service in the shortest possible time.

Texas Church Has Unique Television Show of Own

A Texas church has its own television show—a unique series of weekly programs in which church members perform.

In 19 programs, more than 120 members have acted before the television cameras, with such success that the First Methodist Church of Dallas is drawing fan mail from over the entire South and has turned down offers from prospective sponsors.

Dr. Robert E. Goodrich, Jr., pastor of the church, had the idea for the show, which is named "The Pastor Calls" Station KRLD-TV contributes 118 times and the services of Producer Ed Hallack and 11 technicians to stage the 15-minute program on Thursday nights. After a summer layoff, a new series will begin in the fall.

"The Pastor Calls" is non-sectarian in approach. Generally Goodrich holds the program in round standard questions propounded by those who doubt or scoff at the value of religion. He plays the part of the pastor who visits with people who make such statements as "I don't need the church. I can be good Christian without it."

The pastor's answer to that one was to tell the doubter how much every citizen in church member or not owes to organized religion.

Mrs. Howard Grimes, a member of the church, directs the program. A "show" conference is held on Friday to select a theme. Over the weekend, Mrs. Grimes or her husband faculty member at Southern Methodist University, writes the script. Hallack gets the script on Monday and a two-hour rehearsal is held Thursday afternoon, a few hours before the show is aired.

Between Monday and Thursday, the church member actors have memorized their lines. We don't rehearse them very much," said Hallack. "We don't want them to start 'acting.' All we want is sincerity and we really get it."

In a striking program on prayer for a nine-year-old girl and a gray-haired woman in her seventies prayed about a cancerous tumor. The wife of the pastor of a liquor store called around to tell Hallack a heart-breaking story. A man came in the store and said, "I'll take a couple of drinks tonight. My wife died last week and I don't care what happens." Just then "The Pastor Calls" flashed on the store's television screen. The show was built around the misery of a

man who asked the pastor: "What's the use of living now that I've lost my wife?"

The liquor store customer watched the whole program. When it was over, he put his money back in his wallet. "Keep the two pints," he said. "I just changed my mind."

Hospital Building Bids To Be Asked In About 6 Months

AUSTIN — (AP) — First bids on the new six million dollar state hospital building program will be called for in about six months.

The board for hospitals and special schools yesterday approved a plan for spending the money to relieve congestion in state mental hospitals and other institutions.

H. B. Zachry of San Antonio, chairman of the building committee, estimated it would take about six months to get ready for bid taking on the new work.

The board also adopted budgets for the next fiscal year starting Sept. 1.

It proposed \$180,000 for operating its central office, and \$29,814,715 to run the 23 units of the eleemosynary system.

These proposals were submitted immediately to the legislative audit committee, which has reviewing powers.

This agency approved a budget based on annual rate of \$175,000 a year. Hiring of more employees and salary boosts had hiked the board's budget \$55,000 above the annual rate during the past quarter.

Needle Is Pulled Through Stomach

BEDFORD, Ind. — (AP) — A Bedford physician removed a needle from the stomach of a four-year-old boy yesterday by pulling it through the stomach wall.

The youngster, Stephen Corpa, swallowed the needle Monday. The first anyone knew of it was his complaint to his mother that "my throat hurts."

His mother, Mrs. Edward Corpa, brought the boy to Dunn Memorial Hospital Monday night. X-rays showed the needle had slipped into the boy's stomach, and additional X-rays yesterday showed it was deeply embedded.

An operation into the abdominal cavity was made, and the doctor, whose name was not disclosed, said he brought the point of the needle into view by pressing on the stomach.

If the needle was removed by hand, leaving only a small wound, the doctor said the boy would be out of bed by the end of the week and as good as new.

FILLMORE, N. Y. — (AP) — "A Century of Rigor Mortis." That's the none too boastful slogan this Allegheny County village of 500 has picked for its centennial, July 3-8. Others have suggested that a better, non-Latin slogan would have been "A Century Without Progress."

Committee members are quick to let you know that their slogan about 100 years of rigor mortis (a stiffening of the muscles after death) is not a joke.

They say they picked it because they hoped to arouse interest among business people in improving the appearance of the village.

Robert G. Aldrich, centennial committee business manager and publisher of the Northern Allegheny Observer, says Fillmore looks like a frontier movie set.

"The business buildings," he says, "are almost all of wood frame construction, displaying a line of ancient false fronts equalled by no other town in the country."

"Some of them are sadly out of plumb and seem to lean on their neighbors for mutual support."

Before 1850, Fillmore was known as "Mouth of the Creek." It was a tiny community on the old Genesee Valley canal. In 1850, the village fathers adopted the present name in honor of President Millard Fillmore.

At that time, Fillmore had a shipping center. But years later, when the Rochester-Olean Railroad replaced the canal, Fillmore became a shopping center for farmers.

Fillmore has few industries. The Rochester Gas and Electric Corp. has a branch office which employs about 50 persons. The Perry Knitting Corp. hires about the same number.

But Aldrich says Fillmore "is by no means a dead town."

"The volume of business transacted here," he says, "is double that of many surrounding communities of twice the size and half the ingenuity."

Nevertheless the stationery of the centennial committee has sketches of a stage coach captioned "still in the horse and buggy days," and a tombstone with the inscription:

"Fillmore, New York, 1850-1950, Rest in peace."

Wool Men Get Exemption on Overtime Pay

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Labor Department said yesterday that Texas employers engaged in receiving raw short "Texas wool" or mohair for storage may take the 15-weeks-a-year limited overtime pay exemption provided in the wage-hour law for seasonal industries.

The exemption gives employers 14 weeks a year during which they will not be required to meet overtime pay rules of the act until an employe has worked at least 12 hours in any one day or 56 hours in any week. Ordinarily, overtime at time-and-a-half must be paid for time worked over 40 hours a week.

The department said the exemption will apply to "raw short 'Texas wool' as that term is used in the industry" — and to mohair.

It will apply only in Texas, where the department said it has been shown that warehouses engaged in storing those products receive more than 50 percent of their annual volume during a period of 14 weeks or less.

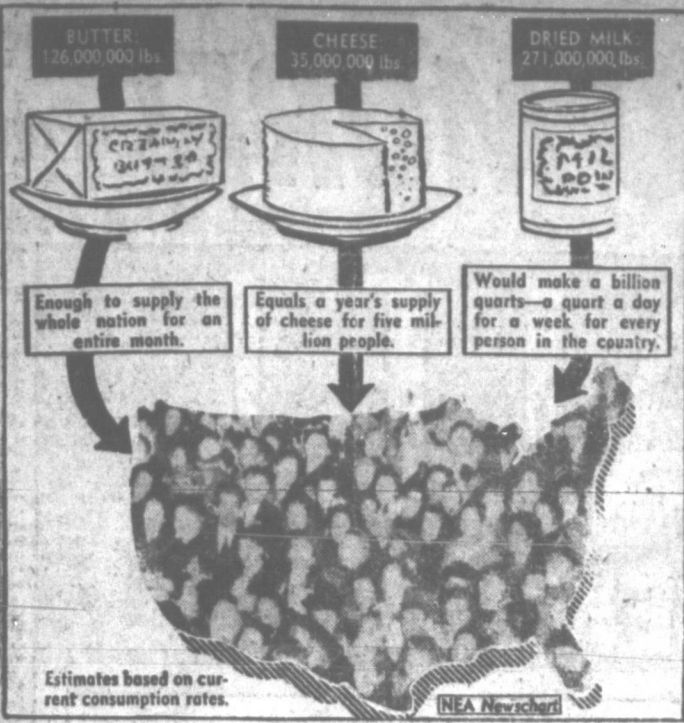

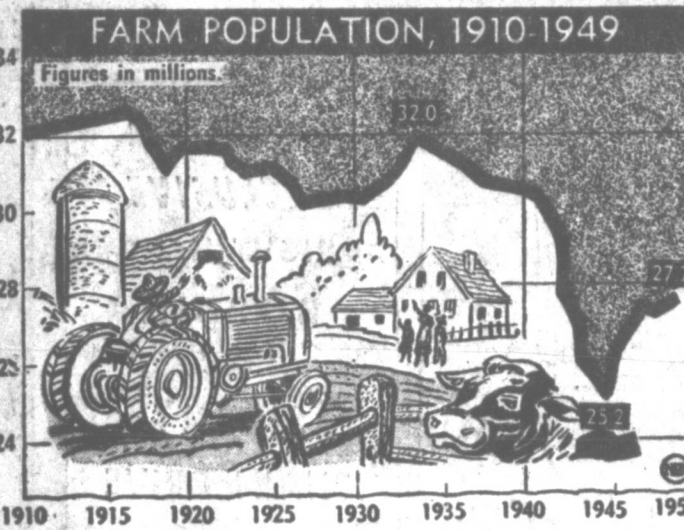

The newschart above, based on data from the Department of Agriculture, shows how the U. S. farm population declined steadily from a 1925 depression peak of 32,000,000 to 25,200,000 in 1945, then climbed back to 27,700,000 by 1949. Improved business conditions after 1933 caused a steady migration from the farms. World War II hastened the trend, as millions left the farms for city war plants of the armed forces. Farm population today appears to be leveling off about midway between the prewar normal and the wartime low.

New Peers Appear as Britain Celebrates George's Birthday

LONDON — (AP) — London as an industrial worker during a 'venturesome career'... London celebrated the birthday of King George VI today as Australia's most distinguished soldier, Gen. Sir Thomas Blamey, went a field marshal's baton. He was the second soldier from outside the United Kingdom to be so honored. South Africa's Jan Christian Smuts was the other.

Three of the new barons are Labor Party figures no longer in the House of Commons as the result of the last general election. They are Lewis Silkin, former Minister of Town and Country Planning, whom the Labor Party district organization would accept as a candidate; Lt. Col. Harry Morris, who resigned his seat in favor of Solicitor General Sir Frank Soskice after Soskice's defeat in his own district; and D. R. Ross-Williams, former junior minister, defeated cycle racer and Britain's ace steeplejack.

Those named by the king to his birthday honors list included political figures, actors, musicians, factory workers, a motor-cycle racer and Britain's ace steeplejack.

The steeplejack, Sidney Larkins, last November brought down a policeman's helmet that unidentified pranksters hung atop the 310-foot spire of the House of Commons. Today he was awarded the Order of the British Empire for general competence.

Honeymoon Proves Tough on Students

OKLAHOMA CITY — (AP) — Students of Grandview rural school are having to make up a week of lost studies because their teacher wanted an early honeymoon.

Eddie Higgins, of the State Department of Education, said Opal O'Brian Reed, the teacher, closed the school early and held graduating exercises May 12. After the commencement, she got married and moved to Tokio, Texas.

Higgins ordered an investigation when he received a perfect attendance record for the week beginning May 15. The record — mailed from Tokio — showed nobody tardy and everyone present.

As a result, the school board hired a substitute teacher and started school again after a three weeks vacation. "Romance sure can complicate things," Higgins commented.

Milk Producers Delay Contract

DALLAS — (AP) — The North Texas Milk Producers Association has decided to wait a while before opening negotiations for its first

marketing contract with distributors in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. At a meeting of 832 producers yesterday in Arlington, Association Manager J. O. Woodman said the association wanted to find out how much milk the association has under control in the 30-county area. "We are determined to get most of the milk in these counties under contract before we start dealing with the distributors," he said.

Texan Handed Death Penalty

HOUSTON — (AP) — Albert Edwards, 37, was assessed the death penalty here yesterday by a criminal district court jury in the slaying of Paul Franklin Walker, 35, of Channelview. Walker and Edwards' estranged wife, Mrs. Betty Lou Edwards, 31, were shot to death May 26 of last year as they sat in a parked car on the outskirts of Houston. Edwards has not been tried on a charge of murder in the death of his wife.

Japan Increases Oil Production

TOKYO — (AP) — Japan is expected to produce at least 2,000,000 barrels of crude oil in the 12-month fiscal period ending next March 31. This compares with 1,556,000 barrels last year, occupation officials said. Increased production comes in the hopes of developing a new Yabase, on Japan's west coast.

Malayo Iron Mine Tries British Market

SINGAPORE — (AP) — Malaya's largest iron mine has sent Britain a trial shipment of ore in the hopes of developing a new market. Operated by the Eastern Mining and Metals Company Ltd., the mine, formerly Japanese-owned and situated at Dungun, Trengganu state, north of Malaya, has sold 300,000 tons of ore to Japan this year. Malayan iron ore is of a higher grade than that now mined in England. Malaya is the only country in the Far East now producing iron ore.

Former Texan Heads Capital Press Club

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Mrs. Ruth Shick Montgomery of the New York Daily News Washington bureau, was elected president of the Women's National Press Club last night. The elections took place at a buffet dinner held by the newswomen at the United Nations club. Mrs. Montgomery began her newspaper career in Waco, Texas, at the age of 17. She also worked on newspapers in Louisville, Ky., St. Louis, Indianapolis, Detroit and Chicago. She came to Washington in 1944.

Meat Consumption Highest in Nation Since Summer 1948

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The American appetite for meat is stronger now than at any time since the summer of 1948.

The Agriculture Department in reporting this today said the desire for more meat, particularly beef, is reflected in a heavier demand at the meat counter and in rising prices. Just after the war, demand for meat was unusually strong relative to consumers' incomes, the agency said. In the summer of 1948, demand rose to a peak. It then weakened, beginning a prolonged decline.

In 1949, consumers spent a smaller portion of their incomes for meat than they did before the war.

"The strengthening this spring is the first material increase in demand for meat since the summer of 1948," the department said.

Nevertheless, the gain in demand is probably no greater than the rise that has occurred in incomes. The retail value of meat consumed is probably remaining slightly below a prewar average relationship to incomes. The department said that demand for meat will increase much more in the coming months or the next year or two, unless it is stimulated by a further rise in personal incomes.

Nevertheless, prices of most meats and meat animals are likely to go higher during the summer. They usually advance during that season, inasmuch as it is the period of shortest supplies.

Price increases are likely to be most noticeable in the case of upper grades of beef, the department said.

Market studies were said to show that there is a declining appetite for fat cuts of pork.

South Dakota Canvass Seen

SIoux FALLS, S.D. — (AP) — An official canvass may be necessary before South Dakota finds out if the state has a Republican nominee for governor.

The race was between Sigurd Anderson, present state attorney general, and Fred W. Foss, a World War II aerial ace from Sioux Falls. With 42 of 1,946 precincts missing, Anderson had a 34.82 percent majority. For nomination, 35 percent is necessary.

In total votes, Anderson had 35,119 votes, Foss 33,546. If the count of missing precincts fails to give Anderson the needed percentage, the nomination goes to the top state convention next month.

Rep. Francis Case, Custer, House veteran of 16 years, won the GOP senatorial nomination from Sen. Chan Gurney, incumbent, and will fight it out for that seat with John A. Ehgel, Avon attorney who eliminated Dr. John S. Tschetter, Huron mayor, in the Democratic primary.

Joe Robbie, Mitchell, had no opposition for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Spray Protects Costume Jewelry

Costume jewelry, bright and shining on the day you buy it, has a way of going dull and spotty after a few wearings unless you take preventive measures.

A quick, simple method is with a clear plastic coating sprayed from a dispenser.

A quick press of the thumb on the dispenser will coat inexpensive bracelets, necklaces, brooches, clips and earrings, protecting them indefinitely from discoloration or dullness. Jewelry sprayed should be new, since the color of some costume jewelry is affected immediately by the wearer's skin.

Use it, too, for glove guards, metal trimming on handbags, metal buttons, buckles or for any inexpensive metal which usually starts out shiny and ends up dull.

It will act as a budget-stretcher, making frequent replacements of inexpensive jewelry and gadgets unnecessary.

Mercy Underlies Message of Micah

By WILLIAM E. GILROY, D. D.

We have seen how the prophet Micah simplified the definition of religion, in his famous saying, "What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?"

We might think of that as the climax, the highest point in the seven chapters of his prophecy that have come down to us. But there is something higher. The real climax is in the closing verses of the prophecy. Micah 7:18-20, in which Micah describes the pardoning grace of God.

Could God require mercy of man without being merciful himself? That would be contrary to all right and all logic. God is not only merciful says Micah, but He delights in mercy.

That highest note in the Hebrew prophecies should never be missed, or forgotten. They rebuked evil with such sternness that a hasty and unintelligent scanning of their messages might incline us to regard them as harsh and pessimistic. But beneath it all was the note of mercy, the message concerning God's continuing love and His willingness to forgive all iniquities.

Reconciliation was the theme of the prophets. They often pictured the forgetfulness of God and rebelliousness of Israel in terms of gloom, but it was never in terms of despair. Always there was the note of hope.

Paul, a Christian thoroughly versed in the Hebrew Scriptures, was to write (in Romans 8:24) that "we are saved by hope. It is interesting to take a comparison and see how much the New Testament has to say about hope.

It is a theme to which Paul, especially, returns again and again. Faith is the motive power of salvation, as love is the great and true issue of salvation (see I Corinthians 13), but hope is its condition and its beginning. Without hope faith can never become operative and effective, and love can never appear. Complete despair means the complete death of the soul.

Here, then, is the climax of Micah's message: "Who is a God like unto Thee, that pardoneth iniquity, and passeth by the transgression of the remnant of His heritage? He retaineth not His anger forever because He delighteth in mercy. He will turn again, He will have compassion upon us; He will subdue our iniquities; and Thou wilt cast all our sins into the depths of the sea."

That is a better place for them than in our hearts and lives.

German Seeks Fasting Record

FRANKFURT, Germany — (AP) — Willy Schmidt is a 48-year-old German who would warm the heart of any boarding house cook.

Nobody has to set the table for Willy. He's been fasting for 43 days now in an effort to set a new world record for going without food.

All Willy gets are four bottles of soda water and a lot of cigarettes each day and he's as pleased as a man with a T-bone steak.

Willy, who styles himself as a "hunger artist," is set up in a glass cage in the Frankfurt zoo. He does his fasting under the sharp eyes of Red Cross nurses. A doctor visits him every day and makes a thorough physical examination weekly.

So far Willy has lost 55.5 pounds, and he has 10 more days to go. He wants to set a new record at 53 days, and already claims the existing record.

Willy says he first went on his hunger endurance stunt in 1926 and did without anything but his smokes and soda for 48 days. Then in Luxembourg he did a stretch of 30 days but pulled the big one off in 1949 in Krefeld, Germany. He fasted for 50 days.

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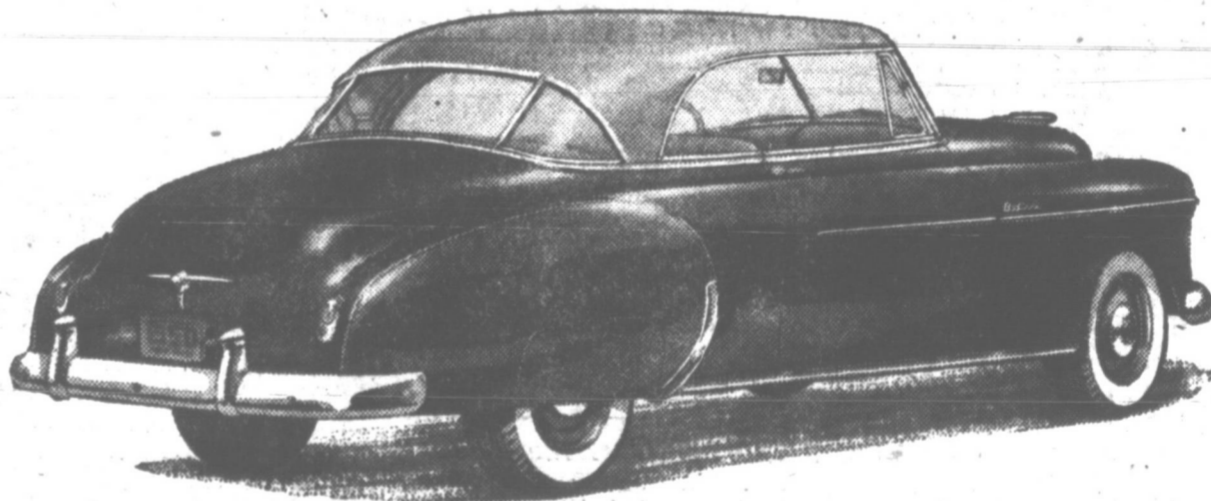

Airliner Passengers Should Be Capable of Flying Plane

If you're riding an airliner and the hostess asks you if you can fly an airplane — brother, you'd better be able to do it!

It may mean that both the pilot and co-pilot are unconscious or dead.

We learned this recently by spending a cheerful evening with one of those cute airline hostesses.

"The airline," said she, "has briefed all hostesses on what to do in emergencies. One of the most urgent emergencies is where the pilot and co-pilot are unconscious or dead. Maybe they flew into a flock of ducks and both got knocked out. Anyway, when the hostess discovers the plane is flying itself, she is supposed to keep calm and cool so as not to frighten the passengers. Our instructions, always, are to avoid upsetting the passengers."

"The hostess is supposed to approach each male passenger and quietly ask: 'Sir, can you fly an airplane?' And if none of the men can fly she is supposed to go up to the cockpit, haul the dead or injured pilot out of the way, and try to fly the plane herself. Since we have no instruction on how to go about it, I imagine it would be a risky business."

Some more things the hostess told us: hostesses prefer night flights. The air is smoother and work is easier since most passengers sleep. Hostesses make from \$185 to about \$250 per month. Whenever the weather is rough, passengers always look back at the hostess to see how she is taking it, and she is supposed to "give them a reassuring smile". A good way to calm a very nervous passenger is to tell them that the pilot and co-pilot both are married and have lots of children and so never take any risks.

Hostesses are instructed not to serve coffee to both pilot and co-pilot at the same time, as once was the custom. The reason: too many passengers asked: "Who's flying the airplane?"

CAA regulations forbid admitting a drunk on an airliner, but now and then one slips by. If he becomes troublesome, the pilot pulls an old trick... goes up three or four thousand feet higher and the altitude puts the drunk to sleep.

"When the pilot is going to fly into a weather front," said the hostess, "he presses the signal for passengers to fasten their seat belts. Most people don't realize the importance of the seat belt — a bad stretch of turbulent air can throw you to the ceiling of the plane. The hostess has about three minutes to persuade people to fasten their belts. If a passenger fails to do it, the hostess is instructed to repeat the request... in a loud voice, so that witnesses will hear. Then, if the fellow gets his hands up against the ceiling, he won't be so likely to sue the airline."

Rotarians Hear City Engineer

AUSTIN — (AP) — The state's motion for rehearings of arguments in the highway wage rate dispute between the El Paso Building and Construction Trades Council and the Texas Highway

Commission was overruled yesterday by the Third Court of Civil Appeals.

Now written decision was involved in the court's refusal to rehear the case, which it previously had ordered sent back to district court for trial on its merits.

The state sought reconsideration on the ground that the appeals court had erred on several points in allowing the trades council (AFL) to maintain its suit.

The trades council is fighting for higher minimum wage rates on highway construction in El Paso County. It maintains the rates of plants that are found true prevailing scale ranges from 95 cents to \$2.50 per hour.

Highway commissioners are defending a scale of 75 cents to \$1.50 per hour as the minimums which contractors receiving state contracts can not go below.

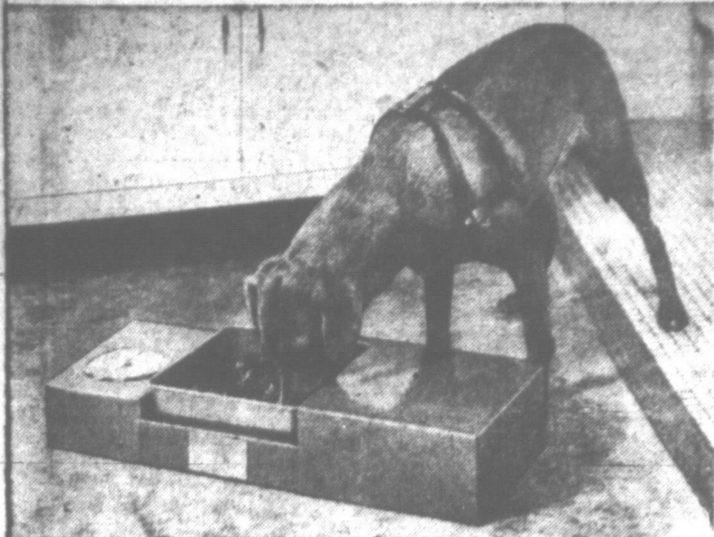

Reds Revamp Zone Regime

BERLIN — (AP) — Russia today named four Soviet diplomats to replace her military rulers in East Germany. Western allied officials said this is another Soviet step toward a separate peace with East Germany.

These officials predicted that in addition Gen. V. I. Chukov will be replaced by a career diplomat as chief of the Soviet Control Commission. He was formerly head of the Soviet Military Administration in Germany, which was replaced by the control commission when the Russians set up the East Zone Republic.

The informants said the separate peace will be proclaimed shortly after the first East German election on Oct. 15. This election is certain to confirm the present Communist-led provisional government. Only a single list of Communist-approved candidates will be on the ballot.

One of the biggest apparent obstacles to a separate peace was cleared away two nights ago when Communist Deputy Premier Walter Ulbricht signed a renunciation of Germany's claims to eastern territories occupied by Poland since the war.

(Continued from Page 1) that the Navy felt the arrests should be delayed pending further investigations as to whether anyone in the Navy Department other than Roth figured in the case.

The Baltimore Sun, in a story from its Washington bureau, said today it has information that Forrestal's reported action may have stemmed from a desire to avoid friction with Russia about this country's trusteeship rights over islands seized from Japan.

It said Forrestal reportedly suggested delaying the Amerasia arrests until after the United Nations conference then going on in San Francisco.

All six of those arrested in the case were charged with conspiracy to obtain illegal possession of government documents. Charges against four — including Roth — were dropped. Two of those arrested were fined.

Vardaman, who was naval aide to President Truman when the Amerasia case broke five years ago, now is a member of the Federal Reserve Board of Governors.

He will be questioned behind closed doors tomorrow by a Senate foreign relations subcommittee which is making a new investigation of the Amerasia episode.

Boyle Says Nation Isn't Running Short of Heroes

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK — (AP) — The other day a friend said to me: "There are no more heroes." He seemed sad about it. Thinking it over later, I decided he was wrong. He just had run out of personal heroes himself, and hadn't yet found a new one. But I am sure he will. For heroes are as necessary to the development of the mind as food is to the growth of the body. Nations need them as much as individuals. The quality of the nation is shown by the type of men it picks to hero worship. Every man's memory holds a catalog of personal heroes. Some of which rather lose their luster as he grows from childhood into youth, maturity and old age. I was a lucky kid in one here — my father. He was big and strong and kind. He had his weaknesses, but he never did a petty thing or sulked in his tent like Achilles. He died a dozen years ago, and he is still the big hero of my lifetime. Others in my index of heroes were Buffalo Bill, Stonewall Jackson, Man-O-War, Jack Dempsey, and Babe Ruth. They all belonged to that period of boyhood when you worship the cut of the champion — the prime man in his field. In college I ran short of heroes, and the pick of the lot was probably H. L. Mencken or perhaps George Bernard Shaw. In those critical days your hero's main qualification was a high I.Q. During the second world war my idea of heroism changed a great deal — heroes didn't have to stand alone upon a peak in history. Heroes, as the infantry proved, could be anonymous and multitudinous. And I think I grew up a great deal when I realized that the main work of the world is done by quiet and earnest heroes, who live and die in obscurity. It is a joy to discover them, to appreciate them, and to learn from them. And they are all around you everywhere. Look in your own neighborhood. Can't you find one? He's there — if you have the heart to know a hero when you see him.

Fire Destroys Structure at Michigan U.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — (AP) — Priceless records and the work of years of research were destroyed in a fire which swept the University of Michigan's historic Haven Hall yesterday. The university estimated that to replace the 87-year-old building would cost \$3,500,000. One fireman was injured. Five student volunteer fire fighters were overcome by smoke. The blaze was first noticed on the roof in late afternoon. Four hundred students taking final examinations in the building fled outside safely. Police of this university city estimated at 15,000 the crowd of spectators which assembled to watch the fight with towering flames. Haven Hall, one of the university's oldest buildings, housed the institution's Bureau of Government Library. The library was destroyed. Also destroyed were records of the sociology, journalism and history departments. The cause of the fire was undetermined. However, state fire marshals had warned that the building was a hazard because of its age. Construction of Haven Hall was begun in 1863 and completed in 1885. It was named for Dr. O. E. Haven, the university's second president.

Angler Catches Lively Turkey

AUSTIN — (AP) — Rosemary Smith of Dallas went fishing and caught a turkey. Here's how she described it in a letter to the game department: "Yesterday, Sunday, June 4, a turkey gobbler (band No. 606) and I met out on Eagle Mountain Lake where I only went to catch fish. What that bird was doing swimming across the lake is still beyond me but I ran the boat up beside him, picked him up by the tail feathers, took off the skirt to my play suit, wrapped him up so he'd keep warm and much, much later took him to the shore. "He apparently wasn't homesick. He shot a claw through my new skirt, ripped it from top to bottom and went flapping off into the sunset. I hope he had a girl friend waiting for him." Q: Where did Rutherford B. Hayes receive news of his election to the presidency? A: He was probably the only president who received news of his election while riding on a train, because formal declaration of his election had been delayed by the Electoral College. This incident occurred on March 2, 1877, while Mr. Hayes was en route to Washington, D. C.

Polio Strikes Hardest Blow

AUSTIN — (AP) — Polio struck its hardest blow of 1950 in Texas, with 51 counties having been

stricken with polio this year compared with 29 in 26 counties for the same period a year ago. Dr. Cox urged the public not to despair, noting that the general conception of polio is inaccurate. "The crippling connotation of polio is not consistent with the facts as many of the reported cases are actually the non-paralytic type," he said. Laurence Olivier Due in Filmland

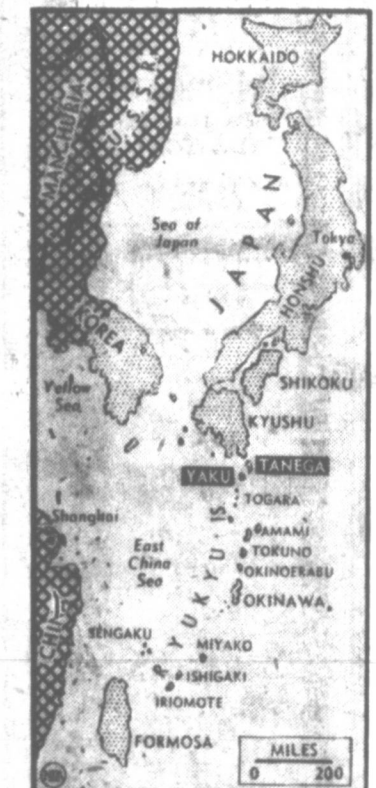

Audie Murphy Is 'Fed Up' With Most-Decorated Title

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Audie Murphy "fed up" with being the most decorated soldier of World War II, disclosed today that he has given all his medals away.

"I've been fed up with that 'most decorated' business for a long time," said the soft-spoken young Texan. "I realize that it is an honor, but only because it symbolizes the work done by a lot of other guys, too. But it has never meant much to me."

I asked what has happened to all the medals.

"I gave them away, mostly to kids."

Does that include the Congressional Medal of Honor?

"Yes. I forgot whom I gave that one to. I think it was one of my nephews."

To understand the unusual gifts you have to know Audie himself. He's not ungrateful for the nation's honors, but he's a modest man with no pretense about his own achievements. He feels deeply the loss of his com-

rades who didn't come back from the war.

He's equally unassuming about his film career. Although he is playing his fourth leading role, in "Kansas Raiders," he still considers himself more of a farmer than an actor.

Audie indicated being a hero has its hazards. He discovered that when he went home to Farmersville, Texas, after the war, a local tough who had spent the war at a stateside army base was using abusive language in a cafe.

"There were ladies in the place and I asked him to leave," Audie recalled. "He made a comment about my medals and started for me, so I let him have it."

TRONA, Calif. — (AP) — Fossil remains of what may be a prehistoric flying fish or lizard were dug out of a tunnel at nearby Salt Wells Canyon by Zieist Rizir, a miner.

The skeleton has the wings and bones of a bat and the claws of a rat. Imprints in the stone indicate it had a scaly, fishlike skin. The fossil was sent to the University of Southern California for study.

GOA, Portuguese India — (AP) — The body of St. Francis Xavier, enshrined in an elaborate tomb in the Church of Bom Jesus in the ruined city of old Goa, will be exposed to public view again in December, 1952, church and civil authorities have announced.

The saint's body, in what many consider a miraculous state of preservation, has been shown to the public periodically since it was brought to Portuguese India, scene of his early missionary work, some years after his death in 1552 on an island off the China coast.

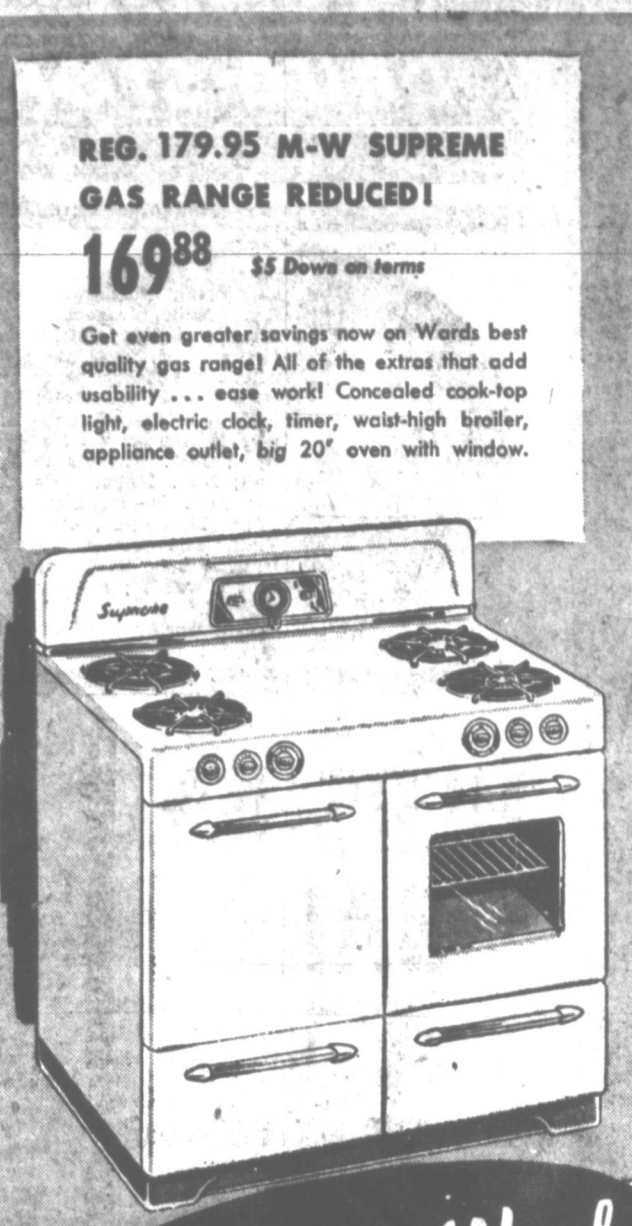

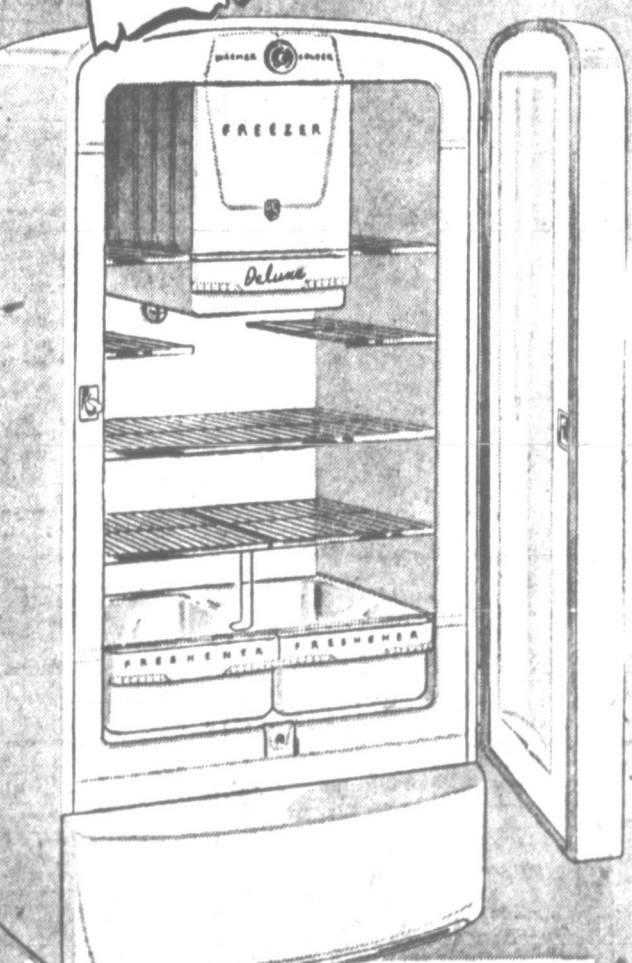

Steel Shortages Bring Fear Of Government Intervention

By SAM DAWSON
NEW YORK (AP)—Steel mills are pouring out the gray stuff as never before. Customers are clamoring for even more. They are complaining of shortages. They are paying premium prices to get some steel products.

And the steel industry is nervous. It's not nervous about orders, or so it says. Few steelmen will admit they look for any letdown in demand—at least, not before the snow flies.

What worries steelmen is Washington. When the customers cry about shortages, someone in the government (last time it was the president) brings up the demand that the government be permitted to get in the act.

The argument is: the steel industry won't furnish enough steelmaking capacity to meet a growing nation's needs, (because the industry "wants to keep supplies tight and prices high"), and so the government must build steel mills of its own "to protect the public's interest."

Even before the issue is raised this time, the industry is hitting back on two fronts. The American iron and steel-making capacities increased in the last 12 months and the North, East, West and South are all represented.

"Iron age," widely followed trade weekly, reports that a confidential survey of the steel companies' plans shows that within the next two years about four million tons more capacity will be added—all by private companies. Pointing up this trend, Arthur E. Homer, president of Bethlehem Steel Corporation, announced a thirty-two-million-dollar expansion and modernization program of the company's plant in Johnstown, Pa., increasing raw steel capacity there by nearly 15 percent.

Private industry's overall expansion plans would mean that between the end of the war and the end of 1952 the United States would have increased steel-making capacity by 11 million tons a year. By comparison, that additional capacity would equal more steel than either France or Germany made last year, and just about half what Russia made in 1949. It would bring total U.S. capacity to nearly 104 million tons.

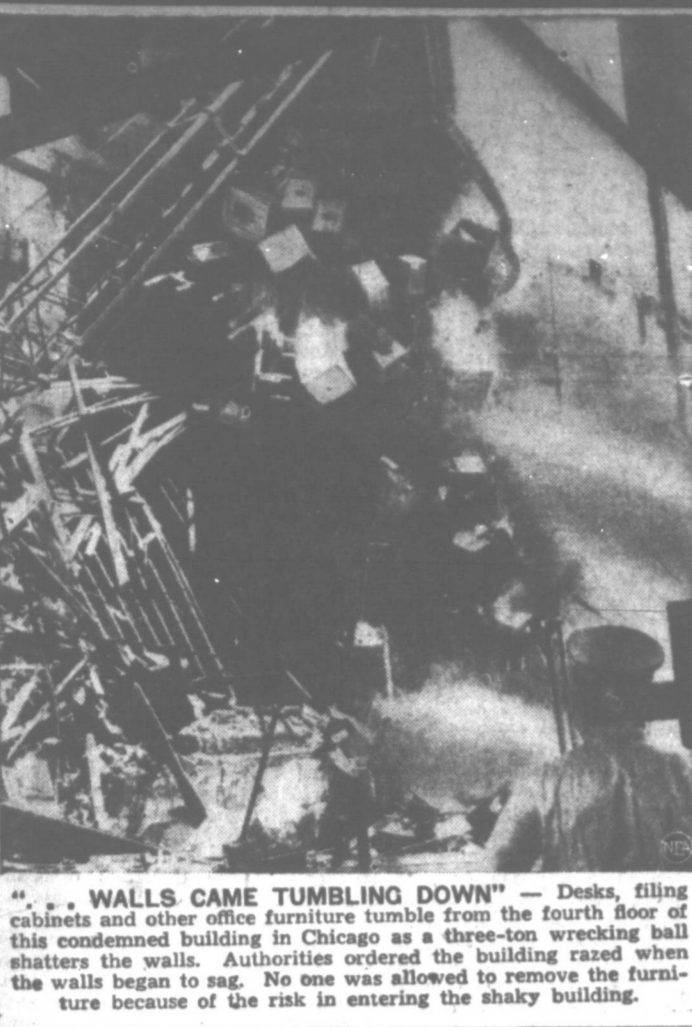

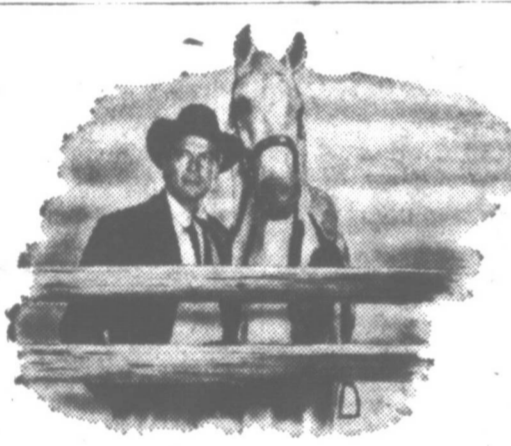
Yugoslavia Accuses Russians of Worst Economic Warfare

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP)—Yugoslavia charged yesterday that Russia, while accusing the West of trade discrimination, "has resorted to the worst form of economic warfare, economic blockade and economic aggression."

In view of this and what it has done to Yugoslavia, "it is very hard to understand how the Soviet Union could muster the courage to propose a measure against discrimination," Yugoslavia's representative told the Economic Commission for Europe (ECE).

The Yugoslav Deputy Foreign Minister Joza Vilfan, said Soviet trade with Yugoslavia ceased completely in the final quarter of 1949, a year after Premier Marshal Tito's Communist Party was expelled from the Cominform.

Vilfan spoke after the Russians asked the commission to take steps to "eliminate the discrimination practiced in the commercial domain by the United States and certain countries of Europe."



Chinese Reds Claim Big Lake Is Tamed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Chinese Communists say they have tamed Poyang lake, which flooded about 2,500,000 acres of farming land last year and contributed to China's current famine. The lake, fed by the turbulent Yangtze, is located between Hankow and Nanking in east central China.

A Communist broadcast said more than 120,000 peasants repaired and strengthened 1,800 miles of dikes around the lake. Reds predicted this would prevent a recurrence of the floods even though flood conditions along the Yangtze are as bad as last year. Last year's floods were the worst since 1931.

NCAA to Charge More Violators Of Sanity Code

CLEVELAND — (AP) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association will haul another six colleges on the carpet for "sanity code" violations at an NCAA council meeting in Chicago in August.

Burning Plane Kept Away From Town

ELSINORE, Calif. — (AP) — Capt. Roy C. Gray, Jr., of El Toro Marine Air Base was burned seriously last night as he stayed with his flaming plane long enough to get it away from this city before parachuting.

The plane crashed in a dry section of Lake Elsinore. Gray was taken to March Air Force Base hospital, suffering from first and second degree burns.

Police said Gray parachuted from a very low level, perhaps 200 feet. Air Force public relations said the pilot reported the plane — a Corsair fighter — exploded.

BERN, Switzerland — (AP) — Nearly all price controls were abolished today by the Swiss government.

Only electricity, gasoline, rents and bread remain under control.

Q: What species of big game are becoming extinct?
A: In North America, the moose, caribou, and grizzly bear are rare. The bison and sea otter grow in number, but there are few of them. Detectives Harry Marten and Paul Rehn said the 24-year-old beauty who placed 16th in the Miss America contest told them she started smoking marijuana when she couldn't find steady work as a model or entertainer.

Falling in love with a drummer, Miss Ellsworth began to use heroin, Marten said she told him. Recent treatments by her physician, she claims, have cured her.

Marten and Rehn said they found a hypodermic syringe, needles and a capsule containing a narcotic in her apartment.

After the 1947 Miss America contest in Atlantic City, Miss Ellsworth said she worked for a time in New York and Detroit in night clubs here.

"Finally," the detectives quoted her as saying, "I nearly became a destitute slave to junk (drugs)." Agents began to say I had no talent — that I had failed."

She refused to name the drummer with whom she said she fell in love, but Marten said she told him she tried to cure him and failed.

T. Primo, agronomist in charge, said the plan is sponsored by a cooperative which pays for transportation from Italy and supplies the farmers with equipment and seeds.

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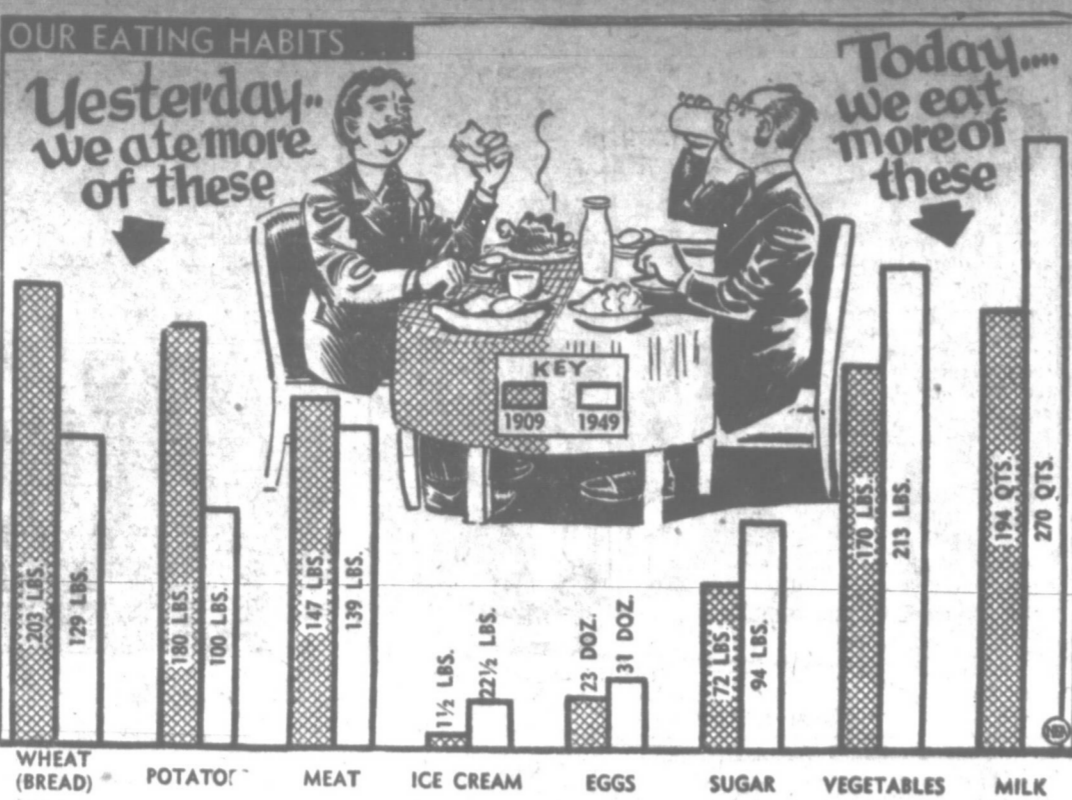

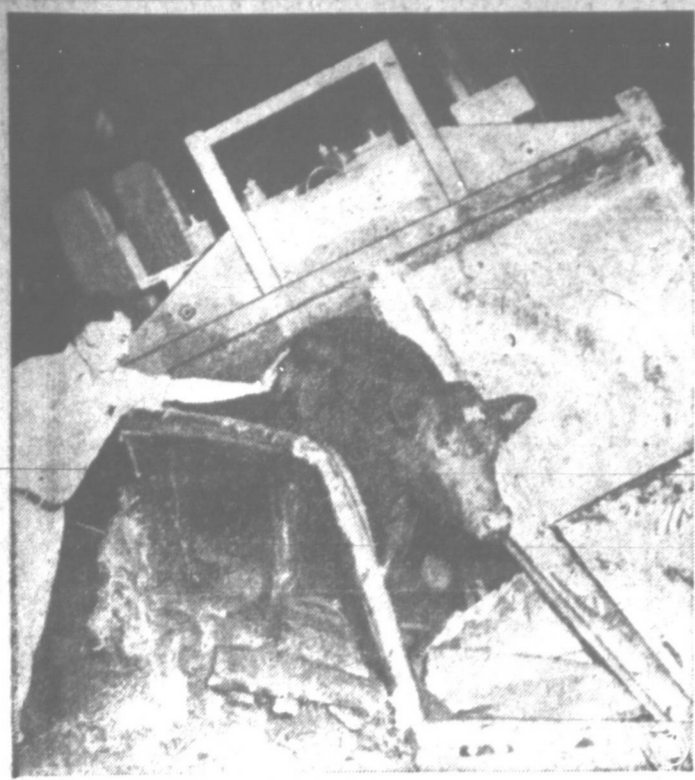

"Please tell us who was the coward on this hand," requests a Chicago reader. "We were the only pair that didn't bid three notrump on these cards in a duplicate game the other night. North said he could hardly bid notrump with three little spades and three little hearts. He also said he didn't think much of a raise of three diamonds with just two diamonds in his hand. South said he could not bid notrump with just one stopper in spades and with no really good suit to run. He said he would

they would not fail to bid the game. Some experts would open the South hand with one diamond and then bid two notrump at the next turn. They do not consider this rebid of two notrump as a very powerful bid in a match-point game. They use it as a sort of bid of convenience. There is no trouble, of course, if South bids two notrump. North is overjoyed to raise to three notrump. Many experts, however, would not use the rebid of two notrump with the South hand. They use this type of bid to show a powerful hand. Instead they would bid only two diamonds.

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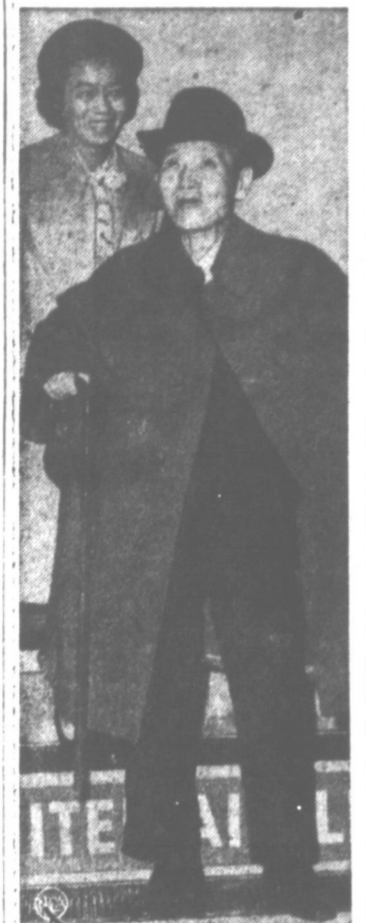
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34 Women Enter Air Race Sunday
