Burkburnett Takes Bi-District For Third Time

Fred Brown and his co-workers trounced the Stamford Bulldogs at Stamford last Friday by the score of 26 to 0, to win the bi-district championship and a chance to play the Dublin Lions for the regional.

The lumber-legged quarterback who has given 9-A teams plenty of trouble all season, sparked the play for the visitors throughout the game. Reeling off one long run after another and scoring all four of Burkburnett's touchdowns.

For the most part it was a game between two strong offenses, with Burkburnett blocking and Brown's loose-hipped tactics beginning to prevail in the second quarter.

In that period Burk got the ball after an exchange of kicks, on the Stamford 26. Brown circled right end to the 19. Three more plays failed to advance the ball much and Freddie dropped back and passed to Stoker, who ran to the 1.

On the next play Brown slashed off guard for the first score of the game. Stoker kicked goal for conversion.

Stamford Penetrates

Only in the first period did Stamford seem to have the upper hand, penetrating to the Burk 6, where the visiting Bulldog line showed real defensive spirit.

The third period saw the 9-A champs come out of their wraps with blood in their eyes, launching a crushing offensive that Stamford was unable to cope with, the Burks swept 75 yards down field to score. Brown, Garrett and McKown led the drive. At the 27-yard line the visitors uncorked their best plays. Brown shovel-passed to Garrett, who gained 5 yards, and then the 135-pound quarterback slipped through the center of the line, shook off the Stamford secondary and ran across the goal line standing up.

Commissioners Solve Salary Problem

County commissioners in special called session Wednesday passed orders under which food stamp disbursers will be paid from the county oil royalty fund, none of which is derived from taxation.

County Attorney Ned McDaniel had ruled funds derived from taxation could not be legally expended for this purpose.

Precincts 1 and 2 each will transfer \$1,000 to precinct 4, which formerly received one-half of oil royalties from the county's two producing wells. All royalty monies now will go into one fund.

No definite solution was reached as to how Wichita county can provide its portion of the revolving stamp fund.

Monthly Report Of General Hospital

Wichita General hospital took in \$47,001 during the last eight months as compared with \$48,964 during the same period of the preceding year.

Expenditures aggregated \$76,551 this year as compared with \$71,665 in 1938.

November figures were \$5,904 receipts and \$9,285 expenditures. During the same month last year the hospital took in \$5,578 and spent \$8,502.

Average cost to the city and county was \$2.50 per diem for charity patients.

Brooks Of State Safety Council Here Wednesday

Pierce Brooks, director of Texas Safety Council, spent several hours in Burkburnett Wednesday conferring with the local safety council. Mr. Brooks states that Burkburnett should be especially proud of the activity of the local organization, which has done creditable work since its organization this year. He stated that it is very gratifying to the State Council to find a community as interested in safety measures as he found Burkburnett to be.

According to Mayor J. F. Kelley, the local safety council has booked safety films which will be shown at the Palace theatre from January 31 through February 3; from February 14 to 17; and from February 28 to March 2.

These films are sent out by the state organization and Mr. Brooks and Mr. Kelley both stated that they feel they will be very effective in turning public thought to road safety.

The Texas Safety Council charges no dues and its officers pay their own expenses. It started as the Texas Safety league in 1933 and obtained a state charter as Texas Safety Council in 1935. The council sends three motorcades to various sections of the state each year. It works principally through civic organizations and schools.

Mr. Brooks was accompanied to Burkburnett by M. E. Gregory of Dallas, secretary of the state council.

Griffin Funeral Held Here Sunday

Funeral services for T. E. (Uncle Tom) Griffin, 85, this city's first fire marshal and first chief of police, were held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the First Methodist church, with the pastor, Rev. C. W. Thomas, officiating. Burial was in the Burkburnett cemetery, under the auspices of lodge No. 1027, A.F. & A.M., of which he was a member, and under the direction of Owens & Brumley funeral home.

Pallbearers were R. H. Henry, Ray Hill, R. L. Gragg, A. H. Lohofener, Jim Alexander and John Blackstone. Honorary pallbearers were Griffin's six grandsons and the members of his Masonic lodge.

Griffin was a former manager of the Burkburnett water plant and one of the most respected citizens of this community, died at his home Thursday afternoon. He had been ill for several weeks.

Born near Athens, Ala., Griffin was married in 1874. His wife died two years ago. Coming to Texas, he first lived in Farmersville and then moved to Burkburnett, where he was one of the early settlers.

Survivors include five sons and six daughters.

Tickets are on sale at the drug stores and at the chamber of commerce office. All seats are on the west side and are between the two 40 yard lines.

Arrangements for the game were completed Sunday at Mineral Wells where Wilburn Page of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, and Jack Williams, also of Wichita Falls, closed the deal with officials of the two schools. A flat guarantee of \$1,000 was made by the chamber of commerce. Tickets will be available Tuesday, priced at 75 and 25 cents.

Taxes And Industrial Development

Governor O'Daniel's interest in the industrialization of Texas is commendable, but the practical difficulties involved in such a program must be recognized and dealt with in effective fashion. We can't attract industry to Texas simply by calling attention to our natural resources and our fine climate.

What some of us fail to realize is that convenience to consuming markets is sometimes more important than convenience to raw materials. Often it is much cheaper to ship raw materials from Texas to the heavily populated sections of the North and East than it is to manufacture in Texas and ship finished products to the same sections. Factors in sales and distribution are involved which cannot be overlooked. We must remember, also, that few industries use a single raw material. In the complex business of manufacturing supplies must be drawn from many sections of the world.

In selecting a site for a factory all of these factors must be given consideration. But others, even more vital enter into the equation. Taxes and freight rates are frequently the determining factors. Under the courageous leadership of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce the first steps have been taken to correct freight rate discrimination that has effectively blocked industrial development of the South and Southwest for a hundred years.

Only a few days ago the Interstate Commerce Commission for the first time in history adopted the view that the South and Southwest are entitled to equity in freight rates with the North and East. Victory is in sight on freight rates, but taxes are still in the way. What Governor O'Daniel and many others apparently overlook is the fact that our unbalanced state budget and the threat of \$50,000,000 a year in new taxes constitute a serious handicap to any program of industrialization of Texas.—Vernon Record.

Our School Band

Something more than just parading and playing is what the school band means to the hearts and very souls of its membership, which will complete its first "official" season Friday afternoon when they play for the Bulldogs Lions football game in Wichita Falls—with uniforms and all. For the first time, really, Burkburnett has had a band, fully uniformed and attractively outfitted, too, to add color, pep and atmosphere to the football games.

The lives of great men are honored by remembering and honoring their birth dates. In honor and in remembrance of certain great statesmen, we have designated as legal holidays, their birth dates. On these days patriotic songs are sung. Bands and orchestras play patriotic anthems. Flags are displayed. Many great speeches are delivered in their memory. Their tombs are visited by outstanding statesmen. The principles for which they stood are praised. Their accomplishments are lauded. All of this is well and good.

In just a few days all Christians will celebrate (???) the birth of Jesus of Nazareth. The greatest character that ever lived on this earth was Jesus, the Christ. If there was ever one worthy of remembering, it was Jesus. Since the year 400 A. D., December 25 has been set aside as a date to be observed in memory of Him, a date on which to celebrate or honor, His birth. (I feel sure that the Savior did not intend or wish the world to

celebrate His birth. If He had He would have given us the date, and He would have specified the manner in which to celebrate it. The only occasions in regard to Him that He has authorized us to remember and observe are not an annual observance.) But I wonder if we honor Him by our usual or customary way of observing Christmas. Many never "take a drink" on any other occasion, but they must have their "spirits" on Christmas. Of all seasons of the year that people whoop, yell, shoot fire works, "ball and dance, get drunk, pull wild parties" and etc. and etc., it is Christmas. Many people have had no Christmas until they have had a "toddy" or two. And we call this honoring and celebrating the birth of our Lord and Savior.

Why is it that we do not "get rough and pull our wild aprties" and etc., when we celebrate or honor the birth date of Washington, Lincoln, or Jefferson? It seems to me that the least that could be expected of us, if we are going to remember the birth of our Lord, would be to respect Him by endeavoring to manifest His spirit. We should at least refrain from doing things He would not do, and we should strive to do the things we feel that He would have us do, or that He would do if He were here.

Let us all strive this Christmas to spread a bit of cheer. Let us make some heart lighter, some sad one glad, and remember some neglected one. Perhaps there is an old couple living next door (or even across town) that the "hand of fate has dealt a lone hand," and they will not have any Christmas unless we take it to them. Or, perhaps it is a widow, or some little children we could make glad with a small remembrance.

Jesus the Christ was God's great gift to man. Let us all honor Him this Christmas. Come to the Church of Christ and have a part in worship to Him. A welcome awaits you.

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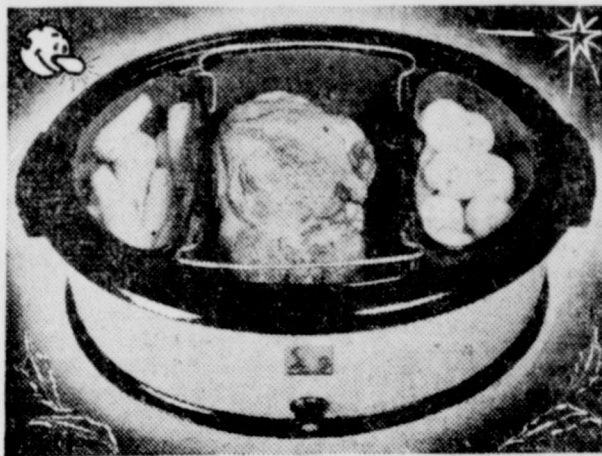
Dairy Herds Show Improvement

County Files
For \$224,755WICHITA IN LINE TO
SAVE OVER QUAR-
TER MILLION

Wichita county is in line to save \$224,755 in road bond principal by application of a new law (H.B. 688) passed by the legislature earlier this year, according to an audit recently made in the office of County Auditor Joe Gowdy by W. H. Gordon, auditor for the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness at Austin.

Analysis of this county's claims under the new law has been forwarded to the above board at Austin for approval, and probably will be returned to the Wichita county commissioners court within the next week, Gowdy said.

\$3,000,000 Accumulated

The bill passed by the legislature is designed ap prorate for the benefit of all counties in Texas the surplus accumulated from the four-cent per gallon tax levied on gasoline. More than \$3,000,000 had been accumulated as surplus last spring, it was shown. Distribution is to be on the basis of state highway mileage, lateral road completions, county population, etc.

The bill provides that highways now included in the state highway system, but which were not state highways when the state bond assumption plan was inaugurated in 1933, may now be placed by each county under that plan for state aid in retiring bonds. Two Wichita county highways brought under that phase of the law account for the saving of \$224,755 promised by Goddon's audit.

Clara Road Included

One of the highways is the 4.6 miles extending westward from Burk Burnett towards Clara. This road was built from an original all-county bond issue of \$1,500,000. On the basis of roads designated as part of the state highway system, the state six years ago assumed payment of 76.8 per cent of the original bond issue. This amounted to \$1,152,150 in bonds. The 4.6-mile leg now included in the state highway network adds \$147,237.75 to that claim, raising the percentage of bonds to be assumed by the state to 84.63 per cent. The total amount of bond assumption by the state on this issue is therefore \$647,660.50. Since the outstanding bond total is but \$650,000, the state's assumption will amount to almost 100 per cent of the remaining road debt, Gowdy pointed out.

The other road on which credit now is to be given this county is a 6.52-mile stretch eastward from highway 25 north of Electra towards Clara—known as highway 240 of the state network. State assumption of bonds on the original \$500,000 issue of road district No. 1 (Electra) was only \$44.11 per cent or a total of \$220,550 in bond principal. An additional credit of \$119,573.29 is due, however, under the new law, bringing the total of state bond assumption to \$340,123.29. The percentage of assumption thus amounts to 68.02 per cent.

Interest Returnable

These two additional credits are being given, Gowdy said, because the 11.12 miles of highway involved has been designated since 1933 as a state highway. A further and material saving to the county, not yet computed,

will be represented which would have been on the bonds now assumed, Gowdy said.

Work now is under county auditor's office phase of refunding under law. Four-tenths of from the gasoline tax allocated to a lateral Counties will be recom right of way purchases made for roads which Jan. 2, 1939, became state highway system.

Fire Commission Urges Safety

As we approach another holiday season we are faced with the stern realization that we have much for which we should give thanks, and may we as individuals enter into this season with renewed hope and good cheer for an early peace throughout the world.

Let us, among other things, give thanks to all of those who have worked so diligently this year in the prevention of fires and give to them encouragement by a willing spirit of cooperation in a continuation of this splendid public service, but lest we forget, the observance of Christmas is fraught with danger to life and property because of many special fire hazards that come into use at that time. A careless act or the use of an unsafe article, may blight the day, replacing joy with grief.

Some of the facts pertaining to special fire hazards that everyone should acquaint themselves with during the Holiday season are as follows:

"Use only non-combustible materials for Christmas tree decorations, and remember that clothing and Christmas tree decorations may be made fire resisting by dipping them in a 10 per cent solution of ammonium sulphate."

"That the cotton beard of a Santa Claus frequently catches fire with serious results."

"That the Yuletide custom of placing a lighted candle in the window near curtains has cast many a cloud of gloom."

"That small children should never be permitted to handle fireworks."

"That toy electric trains, motors and other appliances should not be attached to light sockets until all fuses and connections are in perfect order."

"That pennies or wire should never be used in replacing blown-out electric fuses. The fuse is the safety valve on your wiring system to protect you against fire."

"That lighted candles should never be placed on the Christmas tree."

Nobody's Business

Austin—Those citizens of Texas who have believed that the answer to the problems of the state lies not in increasing taxation on anybody—either on the people through a sales tax, or on the oil industry through increased natural resources—but in retrenchment, increased efficiency in government, may be without a candidate to represent them in the election for governor next year, but they are nevertheless growing into a group that is substantial in numbers, and powerful in influence. Candidates for governor and the legislature may well take note of the growing sentiment for a return to sanity in state taxation and expenditure. The law of diminishing return has already begun to operate, as the burden of taxation has mounted. It is inexorable, and those Texans who think before they vote, are getting a little weary of the constant cry of the demagogues for more taxes to raise more money to give more people something for nothing.

Want No Sales Tax
There is a definite, powerful and growing sentiment against a sales tax in Texas. There has never been, in the opinion of this correspondent during five years of close observation of the Austin scene, a time when a preponderant majority of Texans were not opposed to a sales tax.

So far as additional taxes on natural resources are concerned, it is becoming increasingly obvious that the limit of taxation on oil is being approached. The Mid Continent Oil & Gas Association has just completed an authoritative study of oil taxation in Texas, made by competent research experts. They have gone to the state and county records for their data, and there is no valid reason apparent for questioning its accuracy.

Briefly summarized, this study shows that every barrel of oil produced in Texas during 1939 will pay an overall average tax of 9.8 cents per barrel. That is approximately 10 per cent of its average value of \$1.00 a barrel. The oil men, and the millions of merchants, farmers, doctors, lawyers, and others in every line of trade who live off the oil dollars which circulate in 140 Texas counties that are now producing gas or oil, think that is enough. It is, according to the Mid Continent survey, the highest overall tax paid on oil produced in any state in the union.

What Oil Pays

The figure is arrived at as follows: Gross production tax at 2 3/4 cents per barrel, on total production of 460,000,000 barrels \$12,650,000; regulatory tax, 3-16 of a cent per barrel, 860,000; other state taxes, including franchise, gross receipts, social security, permits, fees, car and truck licenses, and gasoline taxes paid by the industry on its own cars and trucks, \$2,800,000. This totals \$16,875,000 state taxes, exclusive of the state ad valorem taxes on oil property, which figure \$7,686,000 this year. The grand total of state taxes is \$24,561,000.

The survey shows that local taxes—paid to counties, school districts, cities, water districts, drainage districts, levee districts, etc.—totals over \$20,000,000 additional. On a per barrel basis of total production, it makes the tax bill average 9.8 cents per barrel on all oil produced.

Despite the fact the legislature passed no increased taxes on oil at the regular session, the industry's tax bill went up this year \$3,600,000 to the state alone, due to the 57 per cent increase in the state ad valorem tax rate, payable in 1940.

High Rate Cuts Revenue

Texas has no monopoly on oil. If a tax burden on any non-monopoly becomes so heavy that it cannot carry the load and make a reasonable return, that business quits and moves into a competitive field, where it can operate. With production of oil or gas now a fact in 140 Texas counties, and exploration under way in 105 others, and with most voters cognizant of the part the billion dollar a year oil industry plays in the economic life of every Texan, it becomes fairly obvious that no Texas legislature is going to recruit a majority of members willing to stifle development of the

oil industry with heavy additional taxes. That would be cutting the throat of the goose that lays the golden egg, and, in fact, official figures from the Comptroller, showing a decline of more than \$2,000,000 this year in receipts from the gross production tax under 1938, would indicate that the law of diminishing return has already begun to operate. Several states, which piled taxes of seven, eight and nine cents a gallon on gasoline in the early days, and saw the net yield less than under a reasonable tax rate, learned about that law.

The answer, then, is not more taxes on anybody, but a wiser and more efficient expenditure of the \$175,311,068.53 of income which the state of Texas took during the 1938 fiscal year.

County Taxation

The big problem of all the taxpayers of Texas, including the oil industry, is not the state's tax bill, big as it is, but the hundreds of millions exacted by cities, counties, school districts, and the 101 other independent taxing bodies throughout Texas. The East Texas Chamber of Commerce, through its tax department, ably administered by Curtis Morris, has made a splendid start with its county tax control program in 70 East Texas counties. Actual reductions in tax rate were obtained in 1939 in 24 counties, by direct work with the county taxing bodies, totaling millions of dollars in savings to taxpayers. Next year, every county in East Texas, will operate under an intelligently planned budget—something that was never done before in nearly half the counties. The citizenship of East Texas is being encouraged to take an interest in local tax affairs, attend budget hearings, discuss matters with the taxing authorities, who usually are quite willing to do what the people take the trouble to let them know they want accomplished.

In East Texas, the folks have let their officials know they want economy and efficiency in county affairs. And they are getting it.

No matter what you order for breakfast, you'll get hash brown potatoes along with it.

And did you know that celery can be cooked? They serve it as a side order of vegetables. Imagine crispness and crunchiness celery!

Oil is the state's biggest industry, but the newspapers don't have an oil section or even an oil page (not even on Sunday); just a two-column headline stuck away down in the corner of a page. And, speaking of newspapers, the front page is Page 1 but the next page is "A" and the next one is "B" and the fourth page is "No. 2."

That's just done to make it a little more complicated, like the riddle: What has eight legs and feathers and sings? The answer is, A quartet. But why the feathers? Oh, I just added that to make it harder for you to guess.

Los Angeles has a bakery shop that makes nothing but bread, rolls, cookies and cakes with whole wheat and a "health cafe" that serves vegetables, cheese and fruits but no meats—and another cafe which serves only sea-food. The front window of this place is a pool with live fish, crabs and bullfrogs.
