EASTLAND MEMO

With the return of Spring we might reflect on one of the blessings of winter; the Cedar Waxwings. This beautifully marked grayish - brown bird comes to the Eastland area around late October, and stays with us until up into April, or later. They are still in the area at this date.

The Waxwings have severe markings in multicolors that sets them apart; like the thick black mask outlined in white over their eyes, the dot of red on the black wing, and a fringe of yellow at the tip of the tail, that catches quick attention. A reddish brown top knot is also a distinguishing feature of this stately fellow at maturity.

To catch a Waxwing in your binoculars is a real treat, but to hear his call in a high, quavering monotone, is not particularly impressive, yet it is his signature.

The Waxwings seemingly rotate around Eastland looking for their favorite berry - bearing bushes. Any berries seem to attract them, including the mistletoe as a parasite which it is, but it still provides food for our friends the Waxwings. While around the area in good size flocks of fifty, or more we noted for weeks that they were in our back yard between noon and one p.m. bathing and drinking from the bird baths.

So next winter if you want to observe these unusually marked birds, we would suggest a bird bath, which of course will attract other birds too. Berry bushes of any kind would add greatly to the attraction.

In line with our thinking about the departure of the Waxwings in the near future, we were pleased with the first Hummingbird visit to our yard feeder on Sunday, March 24, and that little fellow had to be chilly.

The first scant view of a Scissortail was on Wednesday, April 3.

Question - Does the appearance of the Hummingbird, or the arrival of the Scissortail indicate that there will be no more freezes until fall?

In the orientation meeting Monday evening, votes were canvassed and officers elected. Reid was elected chairman; John Morren, vice chairman; and Wright, secretary.

School Secretary Mrs. Ima Ruth Taylor is acting as school administrative officer as Supt. Wendell Siebert is recovering satisfactorily at his home from recent surgery. Mrs. Taylor is assisted by Mrs. De Gordon.

School Tax Director Mrs. Nell Hightower attended the Monday night board meeting to brief the trustees on upcoming tax equalization plans for the summer. Dates are to be announced.

Hold-over trustees are Reid, Morren, Eugene Frost and Don Kinnaird. Trustees not seeking re-election, Catherine Germany, Bob Perkins and Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., also attended the Monday night meeting until the canvass and reorganization was completed.

A total of 449 voted in Saturday's election. Johnson polled 298 votes to defeat Mrs. James M. Smith with 147, for Place One, the post formerly held by Mrs. Germany. Mr. Hart polled 336 votes to win over Richard L. Rossander with 109 for Place 2, formerly held by Mr. Perkins; and Jim

Wright got 322 votes to win over Jerry C. Carter with 127, for Place 3, formerly held by Mr.

Seaberry. I.C. Inzer got 379 votes for county school trustee, Place 1.

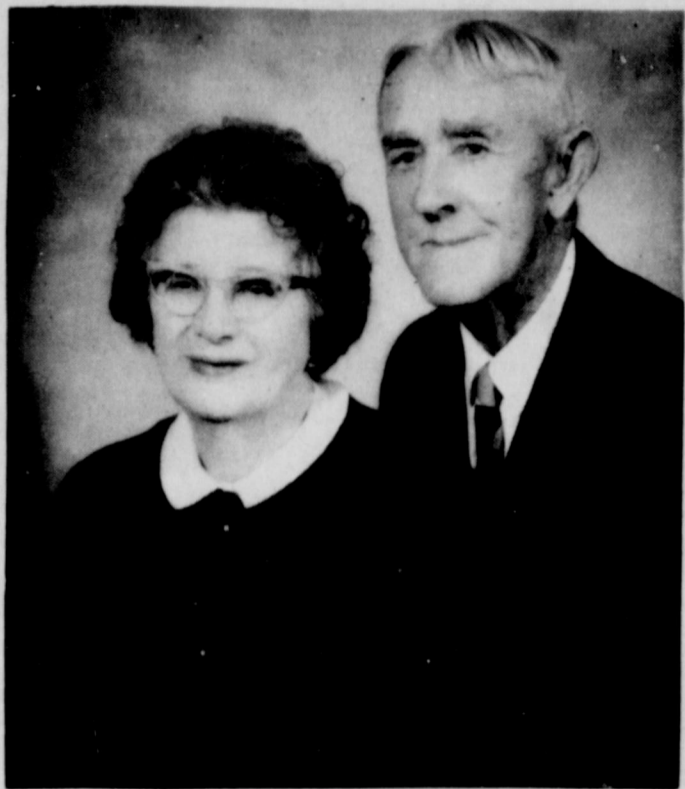
They also broke the 880 meet record by running a 1:48.5 in the Prelims, the Mavettes finished 2nd to Paducah in the finals.

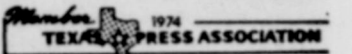

Tickets for the Omar Burleson Day Celebration to be held on the Courthouse Square in Anson on Saturday, April 20, beginning at 5 p.m., are available in Eastland County.

Eastland County Farm Bureau Official Ray Norris, in charge of local tickets, reports that tickets are available from him, at the Farm Bureau Office on East Main in Eastland, at the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association Offices in Gorman, at the Chambers of Commerce in Gorman, Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, at Eastland National Bank, Cisco First National Bank, Cisco Federal Savings and Loan of Ranger and First State Bank in Ranger.

The festivities will begin at 2:30 in the afternoon with a ladies tea, honoring Mrs. Omar Burleson from 2:30 until 4:30 in the First Methodist Church parlor at Anson. During the same hours, a coffee honoring Congressman Burleson will be given at the Anson High School Cafeteria for all men, and both events are open to the public.

According to Mrs. A.J. Smith of Anson, Chairman of the Ladies Tea, the sculptress, Juan Dell of Lubbock, will be introduced at the tea.

Serving of the barbecue will begin at 5:00 which is to be catered by the Texas Trails Chuckwagon of Albany, according to chairman Gist. Gist also pointed out that tickets to

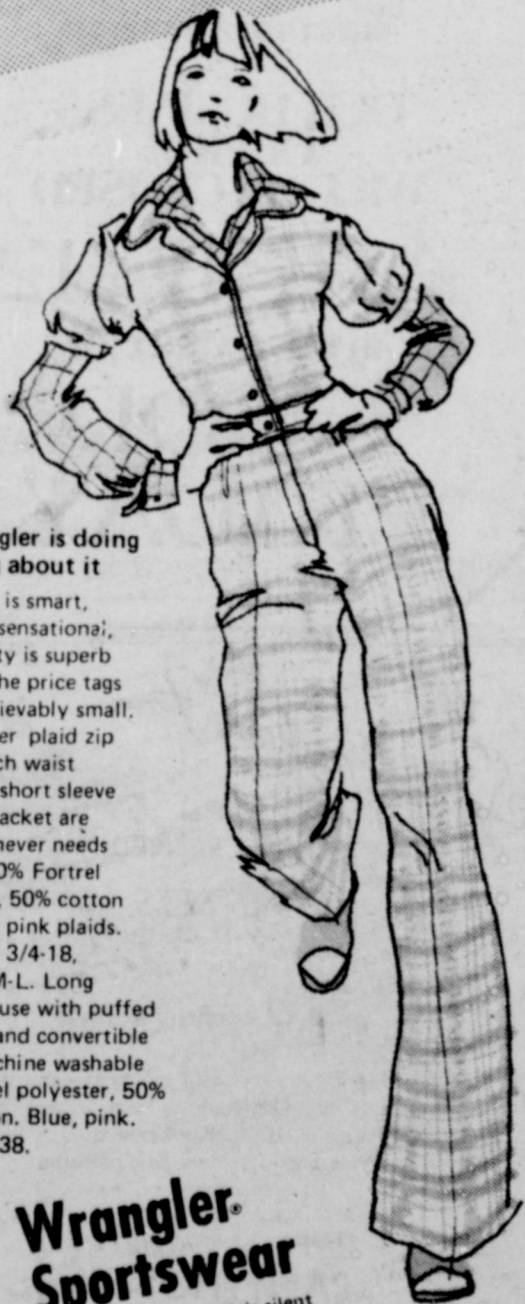
the barbecue are \$2.50 each and are available at a number of locations in each county of the district. He added that ticket sales are going well and all indications are that several thousand people from over the

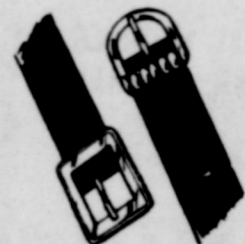

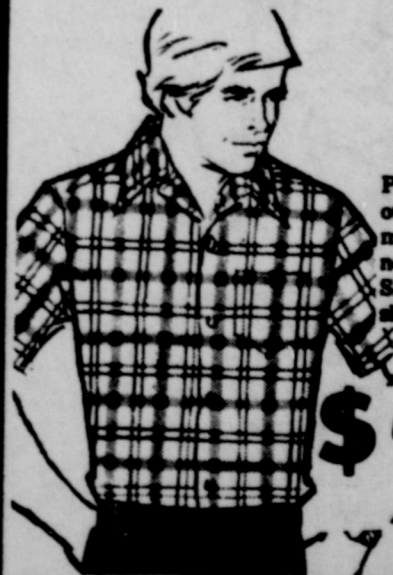

COUNTY CIRCUIT RIDIN'

Gay Nell and I attended one of the finest events ever Monday evening.

We were guests of one of our employees, Herrell Hallmark, a Cisco High School senior, who invited us to attend the annual Cisco High School Distributive Education Banquet at the Corral Room Monday evening. Distributive Education is a vocational training program for students engaged in retail, wholesale, and service occupations. The Cisco schools have successfully operated the program for many years, and it gives young people an opportunity to find out in advance about the business world into which they are going to be soon engaged.

Mr. Ricky Whitley is coordinator for the program which now has about 40 students involved from the Junior and Senior level.

Former Eastlander Ken Norris, now on the Cisco coaching staff and instructor, was guest speaker. (Mrs. Norris is remembered as the former Becky McAllister, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.E. McAllister, longtime Eastland residents when Elmo was supervisor of the County Soil Conservation Office.)

Speaker Norris laid it on the line to the students and parents and employers. He saluted their achievements and challenged them to greater achievements. He said that with the advancing interest in vocational training in public schools, the DE students are already a jump ahead. "Time spent with our youth will be repaid many times over," he said, "in contributions which

they will make to the nation and to the communities." DE students get classroom instruction and credit at school and on-the-job experience in their various after-school jobs. He pointed out that some of the school's best students are DE students and emphasized that one of the most important points is successful working out of working schedules between the school, student and employers.

Big yardstick of measurement is "How well does a young person meet the public," he emphasized, and answered that it generally depends on the students' attitudes. Attitudes toward himself, others, to work and school and to life.

'O Plus' Long Distance Telephone Dialing System Will Go In Service May 5

Eastland's new "O Plus" long distance telephone dialing system will go in service at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, May 5.

This new system will allow Eastland telephone users to dial virtually all of their long distance calls.

The new "O Plus" system is scheduled to go in operation in both Cisco and Ranger later this year. The exact date the new service will go in operation in these two cities has not been set, according to Southwestern Bell Manager Burnice Gorr.

Introduction of "O Plus" long distance dialing is not related to message-free calling between Eastland, Cisco and Ranger. This is still another new service which will go in operation later in the year. A firm date for implementing this service has not been established.

The Eastland area has been served by "1 Plus" long distance dialing for sometime. This system enables telephone users to dial their own station-to-station, long distance calls.

Mrs. Gorr explained that the new "O Plus" system will enable telephone users to dial direct on person-to-person, collect, credit card and third-number-billed calls.

On any of these calls requiring some type of operator assistance, the customer can reach his distant city number by dialing "0", the area code - if it is different from 817 - and the telephone number. If the number is within the 817 area, the caller simply dials "0" and the telephone number, Mrs. Gorr explained.

When the customer finishes dialing, an operator will come on the line and obtain the necessary information to complete the call. For instance, if it is a person-to-person call, the operator will obtain the number of the called party

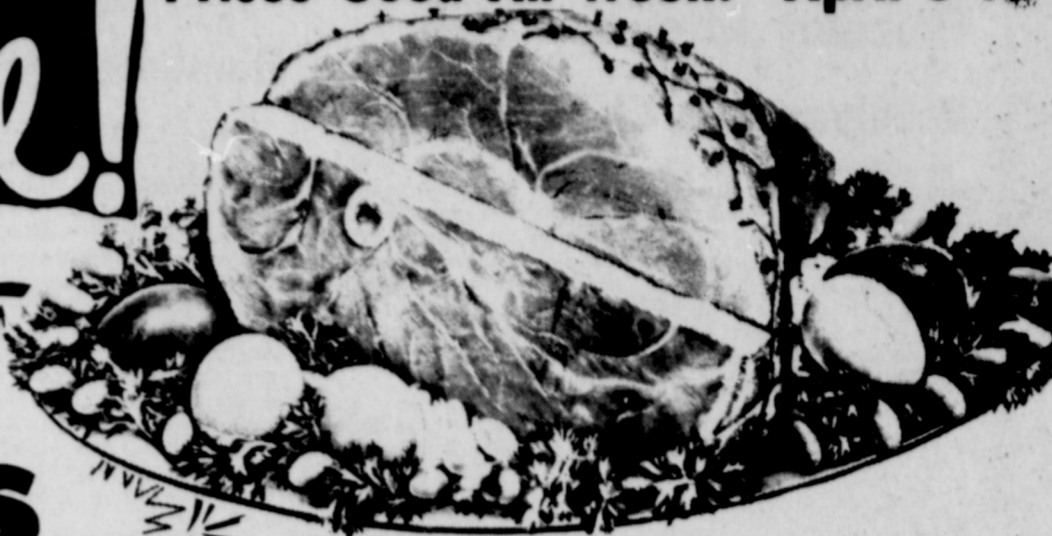
