Shrimpers seek city council support

A request for support of legislation that would exempt commercial fishing boats from ad valorem taxation — already approved by Aransas County's commissioners — will go before Rockport's city council during its meeting Monday night, Feb. 28.

In the meantime, Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox has been asked to deliver an opinion on whether such an exemption can be granted by legislative

Ask for resolution approving tax-exempt legislation

action — as commercial fishermen hope — or if a constitutional amendment will be required.

The request, as it will be presented to Rockport's city council Monday, is for the council to adopt a resolution in support of legislative action that would exempt

commercial fishing vessels from ad valorem taxation.

Among those planning to appear before the council will be J.C. Harlan, who, in a telephone interview Thursday morning said there was a "misunderstanding" of what shrimpers are asking.

"We're not asking for a tax exemption," Harlan said Thursday. "We're asking to be taxed on our production as farmers are, rather than on ad valorem on our boats and

equipment. Harlan said commercial fishermen are already exempted from federal taxation on boat parts and equipment — provided the boat is a documented vessel of five net tons or more.

"In all legislation, we (commercial fishermen) are classified as sea farmers," Harlan said.

Shrimpers and other commercial fishermen along the entire Texas Coast have launched a general movement seeking

legislation that will substitute a productivity tax for the present ad valorem tax mandated by state law.

Leslie (Bubba) Casterline Jr., also interviewed Thursday morning, said support of the resolution has been gained in Freeport and Port Isabel. An effort last month to get such a resolution passed by the Aransas Pass city council failed, "but I think they're going back," Casterline said.

Casterline and Harlan gained support by a narrow margin from the Aransas County commissioners' court earlier this month when commissioners adopted the resolution by a vote of two, one against and one abstention.

First public hearing held on shopping center annexation

A request by owners of the property for annexation of the site of the proposed Harbor Oaks Shopping Village — now under construction — will go before the public in the first of two hearings Monday night, Feb. 28, at Rockport's City Hall.

Also to be considered during that hearing, which starts at 7:15 p.m., just prior to Monday's regular city council meeting, will be a proposal to annex Hwy. 35 North from Traylor Ave. north to Henderson Street.

The request to annex the 8,505-acre Harbor Oaks Shopping Village site came from Roger J. Seaman Jr., owner of Candy Stick Corp. of Corpus Christi, developers of the combination strip shopping center/mini-mall project. The request was first presented to members of the council last spring and again this past fall following announcement of a Stanley Food Store as the anchor tenant of the project.

It came before the city council again at the council's Feb. 14 meeting and city

officials called this coming Monday's public hearing. Under state law, two public hearings are required before an area can be annexed by a city, and the second hearing must be held on the site of the property for which annexation is proposed.

The council has already set the date for the second annexation hearing for 2 p.m. March 14.

Another annexation request is scheduled for council consideration Monday with the anticipated presentation of a petition from the developers of Oak Villas — a proposed retirement community to be located in Rockport — for annexation of a portion of their property on Enterprise Street adjacent to Enterprise Clinic.

Total size of the project site is 10.95 acres of which all but 3.573 acres is already inside Rockport city limits. The developers wish to annex the remaining acreage in order to have the entire project inside Rockport.

If the petition is accepted, the council will set dates for two public hearings.

In other action Monday night, the council is scheduled to meet with the city planning and zoning commission for a joint public hearing at 7 p.m. in City Hall. Zoning requests brought before the two boards will be considered by the council for final action during its regular session which will begin at 7:30 p.m. or following the annexation hearing.

Also on the agenda will be a letter from the San Patricio Water District, through which Rockport obtains water for the Aransas County residents served by the city. The San Pat District is increasing its water rates by eight cents per 1,000 gallons effective March 1.

The council is expected to reconsider a request from residents of Harbor Oaks for installation of a street light at the end of that street. The request was brought before the council Feb. 14 and tabled pending information from Central Power & Light on how much the installation will cost.

County sets bid opening on courthouse addition

Architect John Hicklin reported plans and specifications for an addition to the Aransas County Courthouse are complete and bids will be opened March 14. Notice of the letting of bids for the work will be published in local newspapers, he said at the Feb. 23 meeting of the Aransas County Commissioners Court.

Hicklin said that a \$200 deposit will be required for sets of plans in order to guarantee that only serious contractors consider bidding on the plans. It will also guarantee that copies of the plans will be returned to the courthouse.

In court action, the commissioners approved amendments to an airport lease held by J. Curtis Kovacs. The lease agreement was amended to allow the lessee to sell fuel and lease ground transportation (rental cars) from his base operation. The amended agreement lists Justice of the Peace William G. Walston as Kovacs' partner and allows mechanical work to be done inside the hangar according to Federal

Aviation Administration regulations. The lease also exchanges one small parcel of the original leased property for another, but the actual amount of leased square footage remains the same.

The amended lease concerns the property which contains a hangar built by Kovacs, not the property on which he and Walston plan to build a T-hangar.

The court also approved a motion to abandon 30-foot building setback lines on lots 191 through 201 in the Oak Terrace Subdivision. Juanita Wagley, who owns the land south of Apple Street, said developers who want to buy the land to construct fourplexes need more room than was allowed when the subdivision plats were drawn 20 years ago. The fourplexes, which will be located on the front west block of Oak Terrace, will be quality buildings, she said. She added she would not allow anything in there which would detract from the beauty or value of the subdivision.

The court deferred a decision to allow Petroleum Helicopters Inc. to connect with an airport sewer plant pending a decision on

what the monthly charge will be for the connection. Aransas County Judge John D. Wendell also told the court that PHI has accepted the court's offer of a 15-year airport lease at 5 cents per square foot for the first five years, 6 cents for the second five years and seven cents for the last five years.

Other airport news included a request from Baker Marine to renew a permit to store gasoline on leased property. Their current contract allows them to store gasoline for their own use at 5 cents per gallon. Most other leaseholders who store

gasoline are charged 6½ cents per gallon, a price which was put into effect after Baker Marine had entered into its contract with the county. The commissioners asked Wendell to speak to Baker about raising the price on stored gasoline to 6½ cents in a new agreement. Any action was tabled pending discussion about price with Baker officials.

County Marine Agent Richard E. Tillman appeared before the court to tell the commissioners about the various programs the Marine Advisory Service will be offering. Included in the programs are

vessel and engine maintenance workshops, crab and crawfish bait development, crab storage, recreational fishing workshops, marina cost analysis programs, a fishing tournament survey and marine science youth camps. Tillman said he would be updating the court from time to time on the status of these programs and the development of new ones.

Aransas County Clerk Val Jean Eaton asked the court for their support and for permission to correspond with the appropriate officials concerning two state

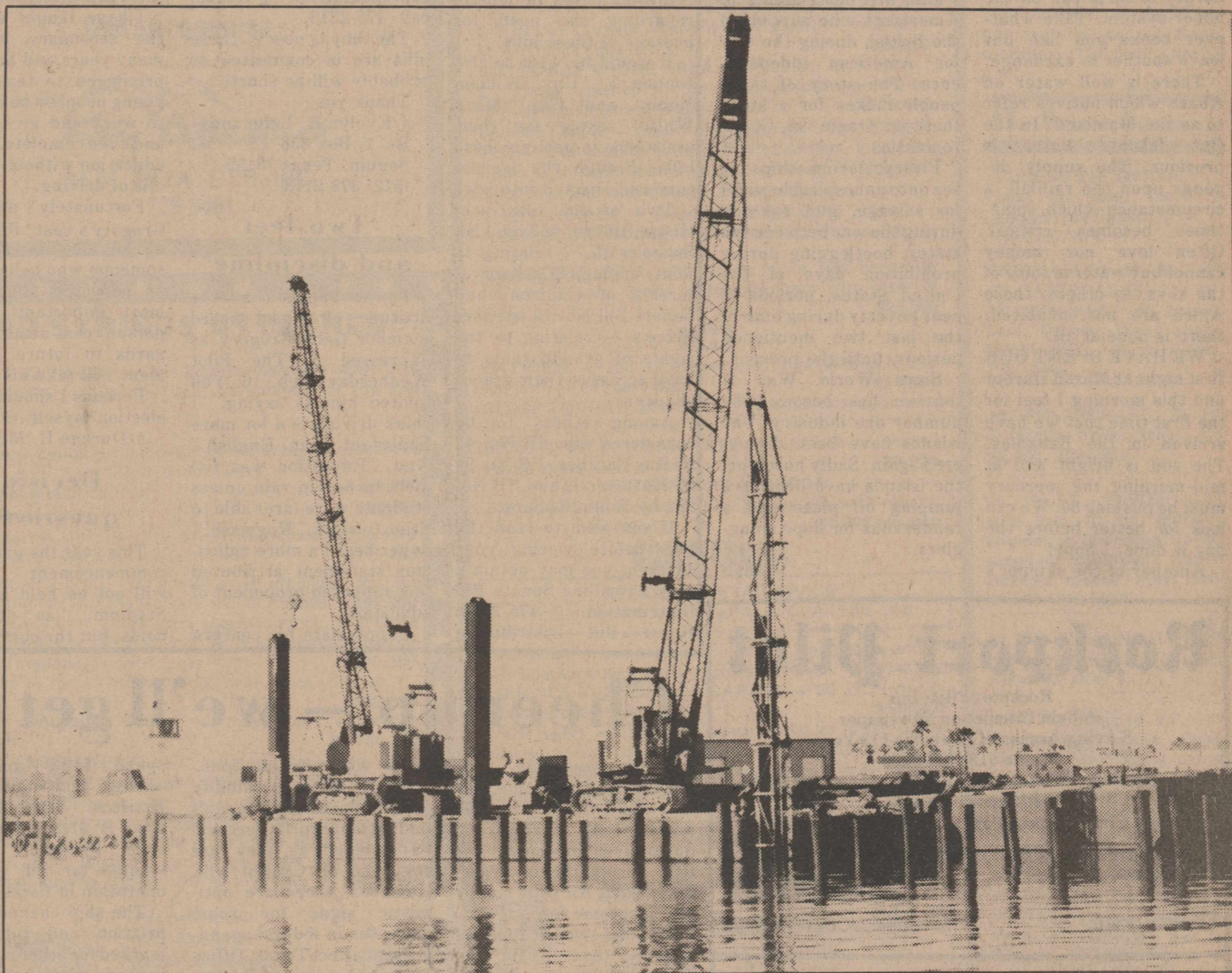

Texas' welfare rate among nation's lowest

Did you know Texas has one of the lowest welfare abuse rates in the nation?

Despite numerous reports of welfare abuse, the rate in Texas is less than one percent (0.6).

This and other information disputing "rumors about welfare" was given a Senate committee by state agency workers during a legislative hearing.

The workers came before the committee armed with statistics about Texas' poor people and attacked what they described as "common myths" about welfare families.

The agency's straightforward presentation earned praise from Senate committee members and others attending the hearing.

Because it is a tax-supported program and therefore an extremely sensitive one, public welfare agencies and recipients are often the butt of ridicule and false stories.

It was pointed out at the Austin hearing that moves on a national scale to stop welfare cheating has led to dropping some groups of people from the rolls who desperately need the aid.

Karen Landress, State Department of Human Resources (DHR), formerly the State Welfare Department, supervisor, agreed some Texans badly in need of help had been dropped from the rolls because of mounting national pressure to catch cheaters.

Attempting to dispel doubts by many Texans about how the welfare program is administered, Ms. Landress told the Senate committee, "There's no such thing as the welfare Cadillac. There's no such thing, even, as a welfare Chevrolet."

Stories have been circulating for years about people driving their luxury cars to pick up food stamps, state

welfare checks and federally-distributed commodities such as butter and cheese.

Ms. Landress is saying, in effect, there are no Cadillac owners on Texas' welfare rolls.

Ms. Landress also told members of the Senate Health and Human Resources Committee members the idea mothers on welfare have children to get an extra \$34 payment each month "is absurd."

"Frankly, I don't know how they get by on what they get," she told the committee.

The Department of Human Resources, which administers AFDC grants to poor families, is recommending the legislature raise grant payments from the current monthly allocation of about \$42 a person to \$60 a person. These amounts include food stamps.

It was revealed at the hearing that when food stamps

are subtracted from Texas' AFDC payments, the remaining amount total \$34 a month — second lowest in the nation.

The increase to \$60 would cost the state an additional \$31.4 million in 1985, it was estimated.

DHR commissioner Marlin Johnston labeled untrue a popular belief in Texas that welfare families consist of both parents, many children and payments continue for many years.

Instead, Johnston told the committee, welfare families are usually single parents with two children, and only receive public assistance for about four years.

Also, Johnston explained, about 95 percent of those families are headed by women who do not have high school educations. More than half of children in the program are under 6 years old.

Austin at Wharf

WITH A FOLLOWING wind Karakal and the cutter Zeeboot went rolling out of New Plymouth Harbor, southward along No Name Cay and turned into the Atlantic and passed east to Whale Cay, then back onto the shallow water of the banks. A beautiful sail under a bright sky. Marsh Harbor lay ahead, home to the skipper, never mind his years in Dallas. He began to get the idjits.

Penny, the British lady who manages the Conch Crawl, heard us talking to Zeeboot and came on the air to welcome the skipper, welcome him home. Sweet nothings were exchanged over the airwaves for every ship in the Out Islands to hear. "Penny's my love," he observed as he came on deck. No one needed to be told who Penny is. We all knew. There's a girlfriend in virtually every island. Sometimes we think of the skipper's island girl's name, more often by her island. A proper skipper we have, in the best of seafaring traditions. A lass in every port. All very platonic he insists. Oh well!

MARSH HARBOR IS A maze of masts, at the docks and at anchor. We move our way through the anchorage and tied up at the Conch Inn and went ashore for lunch at the Conch Crawl. Lunch? Better call it a midday dinner. The Crawl is another sailors' meeting place. They come to Marsh Harbor, exchange tales, pick up mail, rebuild dwindling larders and wax extravagant over \$1.50 to \$2 a bottle beer. Rum is cheaper.

They examine the alphabetically arranged pigeon-hole boxes and find their mail, always addressed: "Yacht whatever, please hold for arrival." A free service, and another, a library of sorts run on the honor system. Take whatever books you like but leave another in exchange. There is well water on Abaco which natives refer to as the Mainland. In the Out Islands water is precious. The supply depends upon the rainfall, a circumstance which sometimes becomes critical. Often love nor money cannot buy water in some of the keys. In others, those which are not inhabited, there is none at all.

WE HAVE SPENT OUR first night at Marsh Harbor and this morning I feel for the first time that we have arrived in the Bahamas. The sun is bright and at mid-morning the mercury must be pushing 80. We can look for better before the day is done, I hope!

Another of the skipper's

girls has showed up, this one a cruising sailor and a former entertainer from Chicago. She will make music at the Conch Inn. Tomorrow we, Karakal's crew, will board Zeeboot and sail to Hopetown on Elbow Key for the Hopetown Inn's renowned Sunday champagne lunch. You might say we are living it up, but tomorrow will be Kitty's last day aboard. She flies Monday for Corpus Christi, leaving Marsh Harbor at two and arriving in Corpus Christi just after eight in the evening. Karakal has now sailed just 1,800 miles in three months. After Kitty's departure we shall be off for the more isolated, even unpopulated cays — which is what this place is all about.

AT THIS POINT A BIT of Bahama lore and history may be in order. There are more than 5,000 islands and keys in this new nation which was given independence from Great Britain in 1973 and became a British Commonwealth. San Salvador, the easternmost island is where Columbus is supposed to have made his initial landfall nearly 600 years ago.

Today there are no real natives of the Bahamas. The real natives, the Lucayans, were a peaceable people who lived by fishing and farming the sparse and un hospitable soil. The Spaniards changed all that by transporting the entire population to forced labor in the mines and on the plantations of Hispanola.

The islands remained uninhabited until 1660 when an European company made an unsuccessful attempt at colonization. Then came the pirates who after more than a century were run off by the British.

Today most of the inhabitants, black and white, are descendants of Americans who supported the British during the war for American independence. The story of those people makes for a story that is tragic as it is romantic.

Piracy, luring ships at sea onto un hospitable rocks for salvage, gun running during the war between the states, bootlegging during prohibition days of the United States, periods of near poverty during both of the last two mentioned periods, until the present.

Since World War II tourism has become the number one industry. The islands have been discovered again. Sadly however, the islands have become a jumping off place and a rendezvous for dope smugglers.

Editor's note: The Live Oak Peninsula Philosopher on his grassburr farm comes up with an odd notion for speeding up court trials.

Dear Editor: As everybody knows, the courts are so clogged with cases these days it takes almost forever to get a case tried, and even the Supreme Court is suggesting a sort of Semi-Supreme Court to take some of the load off it.

I'll tackle only one part of the problem — the time it takes to get a jury. It's not easy to find 12 people who don't read the newspapers or listen to the news on TV or even listen to gossip, or, if they've heard about the case, don't have an opinion on a man who has admitted butchering and burying 15 or 20 people in his spare time. Frequently it takes a couple of months to find 12 such

people, longer if the defendant has enough money to hire enough lawyers.

What we need are professional jurors, people who do nothing but try cases and are ready to be sworn in the minute the judge takes his seat. They'd have to be kept in a sort of closed environment where news doesn't penetrate or gossip corrupt. They should be moderately educated but not so highly educated that they prefer theorizing to reasoning.

All crime news would be out of their newspapers and their television programs would be taped re-runs. We couldn't have them listening to a regular program where some announcer might break in with a news bulletin announcing the outbreak of nuclear war right while they were deliberating on the guilt or innocence of a congressman photo-

graphed in a hotel room taking a bribe. Such a news bulletin would have a tendency to take the jurors' minds off the matter at hand, causing justice to go awry and further clogging the courts.

You might think it would be hard to find a group of people so open-minded, opinionless and uninformed and willing to spend their lives as professional jurors, but if the pay is adequate, they could be found.

I don't know how justice would be served under this system, but maybe it could come up to the kind where the man who discovered the burglary that produced Watergate has now been sent to the pen for a year for shoplifting a pair of \$12 tennis shoes and the top man in the Watergate scandal was given a pardon without even being tried.

I would like to use this means of bringing them to the attention of your readers and to urge people to contact their representatives in Austin regarding the need for passage of these bills.

It would be wise to also contact Lt. Gov. William Hobby and Gov. Mark White, asking for their assistance in getting these bills through the legislature and enacted into law.

Two of the bills are: House Bill No. 367 by Alan Schoolcraft — relating to joint managing conservatorship of children; and Senate Bill No. 79 by Chet Brooks — relating to the rights of grandparents to have access to their grandchildren.

Decision questioned

This year the graduation commencement services will not be held in Pirate Stadium, as tradition holds, but the services will

A group of parents and the School Board decided on the location of the commencement services in a meeting held on Feb. 14. The chosen place was the new auditorium. In my opinion, this meeting should have been more publicized. This meeting wasn't even announced during school hours. This ceremony is for the seniors, and they should play a key role in deciding the place of the commencement services, not a group of parents. In a survey taken among seniors, more than half voted for Pirate Stadium.

Cheer up — we'll get some of our dollars back

When you file your income tax return this year and view with sorrow the number of hard-earned dollars you pay and have paid during the tax year, take heart. All your money won't become foreign aid.

A good-sized chunk of income taxes paid by Texans will be returned to help finance a host of projects such as flood control, rivers and harbors improvement, and other

public works installations.

There is a possibility some of President Reagan's budget appropriations will be changed as they are reviewed on Capitol Hill. However, there are optimistic signs for some increases in federal spending that affect Texas. Office of Management and Budget sources believe.

Included in the \$848.5 billion federal budget, for example, is a proposal to

spend \$12.9 million to operate and maintain the Houston Ship Channel. That is \$1.2 million more than President Reagan wanted for the channel's operation in fiscal 1983.

The ship channel appropriation and funds earmarked for other rivers and harbors projects in Texas underscore the president's earlier commitment to improve the nation's port system.

Several other major waterway projects, contained in the budget of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, reflect similar increases.

The budget also proposes spending \$3.2 million to maintain and operate Freeport Harbor; \$1.9 million more in 1984 than in 1983 on maintaining and operating the Texas segment of the Gulf intracoastal waterway. The 1984 budget calls

for \$13.9 million for the project.

Almost \$4 million is budgeted for navigation upgrading in Galveston harbor and channel and \$2.3 million for similar improvements on the Texas City channel.

Closer to Baytown, \$300,000 is being sought for flood damage and prevention surveys on the San Jacinto River. Also, \$3 million for flood control

construction on Vince and Little Vince Bayous in Harris County and \$400,000 for flood control surveys on Upper White Oak Bayou.

Additionally, more than \$9.9 million is included in the Reagan budget for operation and maintenance of the Sabine-Neches Waterway in Jefferson and Orange Counties.

Pirate tracksters are off and running

Rockport-Fulton's Track Team broke out of the blocks in the 1983 track season last week at Cabaniss Field in the Corpus Christi Invitational Meet and as a team they finished well for their first outing.

Trinelle Walls, out just a few days, cleared 6'2" in the high jump to get a fifth place.

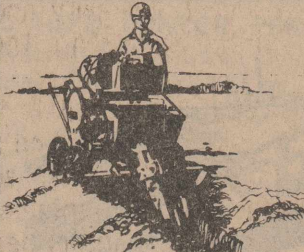
Joe Lara was sixth in the long jump and Charlie Ochoa was sixth in both the discus and the shotput.

Shropshire, senior vice president and treasurer of Miller Brewing Company,

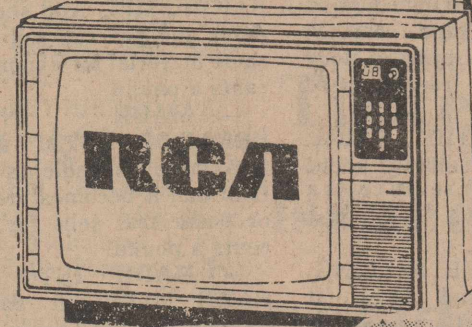

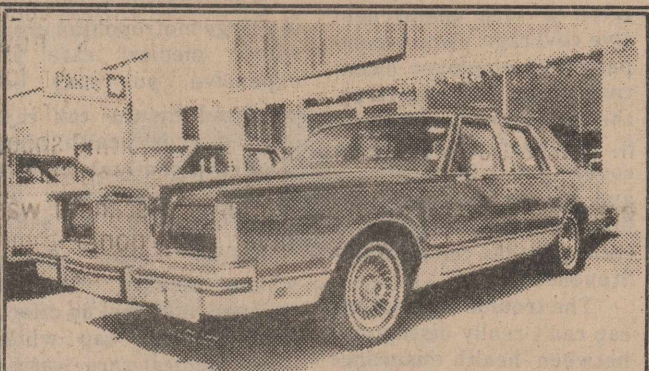

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Wade Butler of San Marcos said a recent net survey on the 800-acre reservoir showed an apparent abundance of striped/white bass hybrids and white bass.

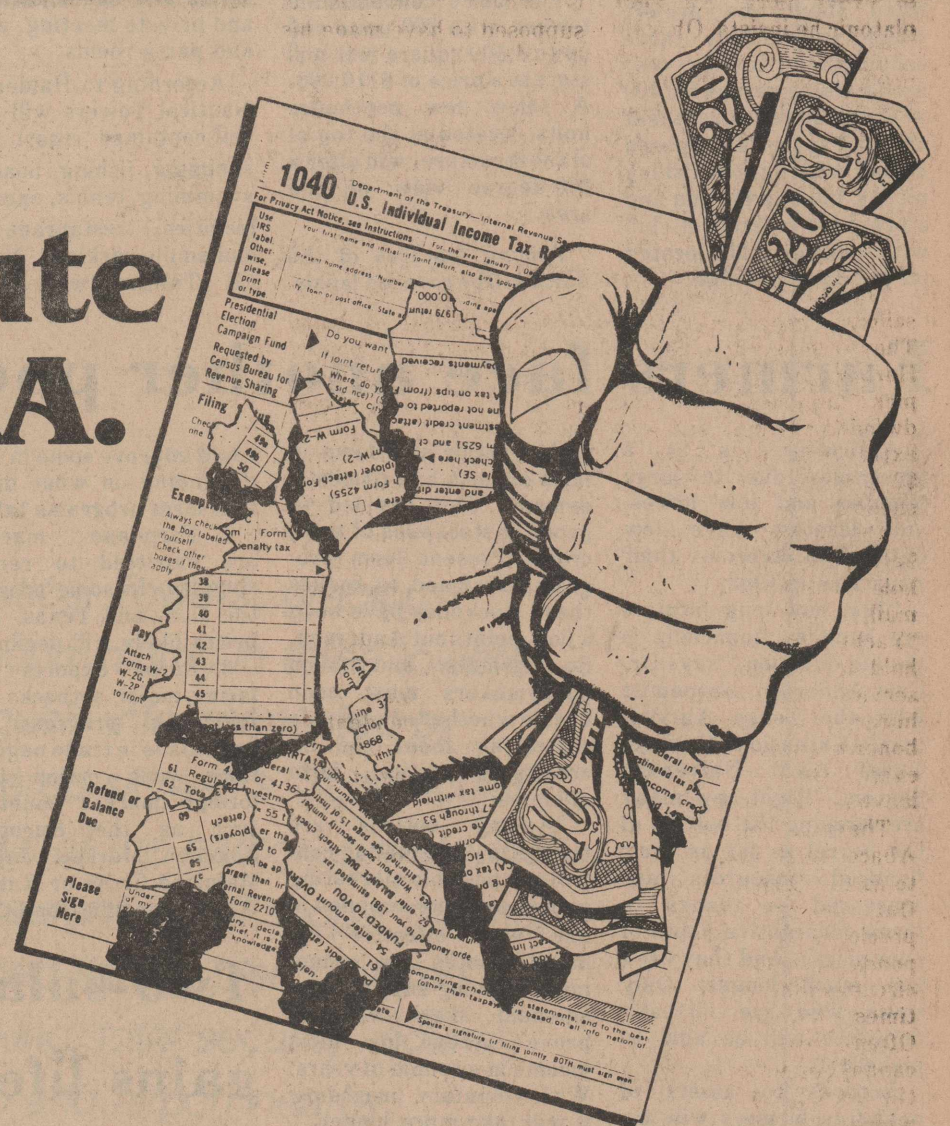
Five gill net sets produced 26 hybrids ranging from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds, and 48 white bass averaging over a half-pound.

Inks also is known to have a considerable number of pure striped bass which came through the dam impounding Lake Buchanan.

Also taken in the survey was a 6 pound 5 ounce largemouth bass which was in very good condition, Butler said.

Problem with coupon queen

She travels around the country, showing how it is possible to walk out of a supermarket with \$50, \$80 or \$100 worth of food for \$2.

This is not done, the Coupon Queen instructs, with a large coat and fast hands. It is done by aggressively collecting and using all those coupons that appears in daily newspapers and home magazines.

Clip them. Organize them. File them. Bring them with you to the supermarket, the Queen exhorts, and you'll bring down the crushing cost of food.

Is there a catch? Alas, yes.

The Coupon Queen's idea works best for people who plan their meals around coupons. That requires a bottomless hunger for peanut butter and cheese whiz. In fact, there is a simple alternative.

Rather than collecting coupons so you can afford the end product, eliminate the middleman — the processors and packagers — and make the product yourself!

This is called cooking. An arcane art that does not require the ownership of a home computer, cooking is what people once did with food. You can

understand the (home) economic opportunities it presents by taking a look at how value (and cost) is added to the price of flour as it moves from farm to table:

— **AT THE FARM.** Wheat now sells for about \$4 a bushel or seven cents a pound, down from last year.

— **AFTER MILLING.** In 100-pound bags at Kansas City, flour now sells for just over 10 cents a pound.

— **BAGGED AT YOUR SUPERMARKET.** Buy it in cute two-pound bags and flour costs 33 cents a pound; buy it in 10-pound bags and the price drops to 25 cents a

pound. **PACKAGED AS A BAKING MIX.** Add shortening and you can sell the same material for about 40 cents a pound.

— **MADE INTO BREAD OR PASTA.** Add a few more ingredients to flour and it becomes bread or pasta that sells for 70 cents a pound.

— **MADE INTO A CAKE MIX.** Put some 35-cent-a-pound sugar in the box and the price can go as high as \$1.99 a pound.

— **MADE INTO A ONE-DISH DINNER.** Tell people you'll help them stretch \$1.59-a-pound hamburger and you can sell them hamburger helper for \$2.35 a pound. Although

the logic is baffling, millions regularly spend \$2.35 to stretch their \$1.59 hamburger.

— **SERVED IN A RESTAURANT.** Finally, if work done between farm and market isn't sufficient, you can rent a table and have a spaghetti dinner cooked for you and hand-delivered, for upwards of \$5 a pound.

Obviously, what we pay for food depends very much on how much value is added by others. Every time we buy food we make choices, often saying we would rather have someone else do the work than do it ourselves.

In fact, rather than scrounging for coupons, anyone who wants to save money and, just maybe, restore a little self-confidence, ought to take a hard look at where and how they can do work now done by others.

Consider home-baked bread. If you bake seven loaves of bread a week, bypassing the baker, you'll save about 55 cents a pound of \$3.55 a week. According to the most recent figures from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the average gross hourly wage of non-agricultural workers is \$7.73. Take about a third

off for employment, federal and state income taxes and you're left with about \$5.18 an hour, net.

Spend 40 minutes at home making dough, loaves, etc. for a week of bread, and you have created the same value as the pre-tax wages of the average worker!

Bake a cake and you do even better.

The point here isn't to displace Pepperidge Farm or Pillsbury, or to advocate the growing of wheat on kitchen windowsills. It is that each of us, every day, has opportunities to add or create value. They don't require coupons. More important, at a time where one worker in 10 is unemployed, they don't require jobs.

They require only that we respect ourselves, our capacity to learn, and exercise our will to create instead of believing we're all doomed to being victims.

Home to roost

Nautical Towers plans revealed

Plans for Nautical Towers, Baker-Haldeman's \$60 million condominium resort development on Fulton Beach Road, were formally unveiled this past week at an invitation-only affair hosted by Managing Partner Jerry Haldeman in Rockport.

Approximately 300 persons attended the affair to learn about the project which will include three condominium towers, covered parking garage for 400 vehicles, 20,000 square feet of retail space, a proposed harbor with lighted fishing pier, a 100-slip marina and a proposed restaurant-club with seating for 200 located on the harbor's edge.

The covered parking and retail space will front the west side of Fulton Beach Road and be accessible by glass skywalks to the three condominium towers, according to the developers. Seven glass-enclosed elevators will be located throughout the development.

The three condominium towers, with 200 units and up to 3,500 square feet will start at a price of \$110,000. A select few penthouse units, located at the top of the structure, will offer a 360-degree view of the area.

Among features of the units will be covered lanais,

tile balconies, luxuriously equipped kitchens, solid wood cabinets, security systems. Some units will include wet bars and powder rooms.

Other amenities will include an indoor-outdoor swimming pool in the courtyard, tennis courts, an exercise health club with steam and sauna facilities and private meeting, game and party rooms.

According to Haldeman, Nautical Towers will be a self-contained resort with shopping, fishing, boating, swimming, tennis, exercise facilities, restaurant-club and ample parking. "Nautical Towers will be a

landmark," he said, "unique to the Rockport area and the Texas Coast."

The initial marketing strategy will be through private parties in Rockport, Corpus Christi, Houston, San Antonio, Austin and Dallas, according to Garron Dean, president and owner of Garron Dean and Associated Realtors and national marketing director for the project.

Architects are Total Design Four of Corpus Christi and general contractors represent a joint venture between Heldenfels Brothers Inc. and Durden and Fulton Inc., both of Corpus Christi.

Health tax 'cap' burdens workers

President Reagan's plan to tax workers' health insurance benefits would be an ineffective cost containment measure and would place a heavy tax burden on low and middle income workers, according to Aetna Life & Casualty.

Keith A. Stevenson, assistant vice president of Aetna's Employee Benefits Division, provided specific examples of how the proposed tax, included in the President's budget package, would affect a worker and family.

Based on Health and Human Services estimates, about 16 million families — approximately one-quarter of those covered by employer-sponsored health plans — would be affected in the first year alone. Under the proposal, a limit would be placed on employers' non-taxable contributions to employee health plans. Contributions above \$840 per year for a single person and \$2,100 for a family would count as taxable income to the employee.

As an example, Stevenson said that for a family with taxable income of \$25,000 and \$2,500 in employer health plan contributions, this so-called "tax cap" would result in an extra \$116 in federal income taxes.

In addition, Stevenson said, employees in similar situations in most states would pay about \$20 more in state income taxes and \$27 more in Social Security taxes. For these workers employers would also pay an additional \$27 as their Social Security contribution.

"Assuming your employer is willing to absorb the employer Social Security tax, you would pay an extra \$163 in taxes on \$400 you never saw — that is a 41 percent tax rate," he said.

Some economists believe the tax cap would lead employees in this situation to persuade employers to reduce their health insur-

ance benefits by \$400. This would place the benefit below the cap and employees would ask for the money in additional wages or other fringe benefits.

However, Stevenson warns, if an employee takes the \$400 as wages, it will still be taxed through federal, state and Social Security taxes.

Also, he pointed out, there is no guarantee the tax cap will be indexed to the rise in total health spending. Medical care costs have risen faster than the costs of other goods and services. Last year medical costs rose 11 percent, while the Consumer Price Index increased by 4 percent.

If, in the example provided, the employer raised the employee's health benefit by 15 percent the next year and there were no change in the tax cap, \$775 of the benefit would then be taxable. The total taxes paid would rise from \$163 to \$315 — a 94 percent increase. At this rate, in three years this family would pay \$700 in taxes on health benefits alone.

"So there is a very strong, hidden leveraging effect in the tax cap," Stevenson added.

"Ironically," Stevenson said, the tax cap "aims to cut private health insurance coverage after years of effort to expand coverage. It will increase labor costs in a time of high unemployment. And the burden of the tax will increase as income levels decline."

"One estimate is that affected families with incomes below \$15,000 a year would pay about 10 percent in taxes, while families with incomes above \$50,000 would pay only 2 percent more. Not surprisingly, the tax cap is being opposed by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the AFL-CIO, among others," he added.

The tax cap also discourages employers from add-

ing features like dental care, mental health coverage and preventive care to their health benefits plans. Even if such comprehensive coverage were accompanied by employee incentives to be cost conscious, the tax cap could bite into it. However, a health plan covering only hospital care and having no incentives for cost consciousness could escape the tax cap entirely, Stevenson said.

"The trouble is that a tax cap can't really distinguish between health insurance plans which encourage

cost-conscious behavior and those which don't," he said.

"For example, if you live in a large metropolitan area where medical care is expensive, you may be penalized by the tax cap even if your health plan contains incentives for you to avoid unnecessary or expensive care," he said. "Someone else, living where medical care is cheaper, may feel no effect from the tax cap while using medical care wastefully."

Farmers face another poor year

Agriculture is at a crossroads due to large supplies and low prices, and farmers have few options to improve their situations in 1983.

"Just how long farmers can hang on financially is the big question," says Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Right now many are scraping the bottom of the barrel as far as their financial resources are concerned — thanks to three consecutive years of poor prices. And they can't last much longer. Only those who are virtually debt-free will be able to make it."

Returns to assets of debt-free farmers will average in the range of minus 3 percent to minus 7 percent in 1982, says Anderson, while returns to farmers with a heavy debt load will be a negative 14 percent to 18 percent. "With that kind of figures, it's easy to see that farmers must depend less on debt financing," he adds.

Farmers generally are victims of overproduction in recent years coupled

with a major slowdown in farm exports and domestic demand. This has led to growing stockpiles of most crops. Present farm programs designed to reduce these stockpiles have been a flop, points out Anderson. So farmers and farm policymakers must soon decide whether or not to do something about the increasingly critical farm dilemma.

"Among options are mandatory production control and possible marketing quotas to bring supplies in line with effective demand," notes the economist. "Strong supply management likely will improve current low farm income in a couple of years. With voluntary programs, it will take much longer."

Regarding the dilemma of farmers, Anderson offers a number of observations:

1. For 1982 net U.S. farm income is projected at \$19 billion, down from \$25 billion in 1981. Cash receipts will be about equal to farm expenditures this year, so virtually all net income will come from government payments and non-money income. Income

could improve some in 1983 depending on what direction farm programs take.

2. Farmland markets are expected to remain sluggish. In some areas of the U.S. and Texas, land prices likely will decline.

3. Farm exports are facing major setbacks. No noticeable progress has been made in trade negotiations with major U.S. foreign market countries such as the European Common Market, Japan, Mainland China or Russia. When economic conditions

are bad, countries want to export more and import less. A big setback to Texas cotton growers is that China intends to grow more cotton and import less from the U.S.

4. Although credit is available, farmers have difficulty in qualifying unless they still have adequate collateral. Debt restructuring will continue. Loan delinquencies, foreclosures and bankruptcies will be up although lenders seldom benefit from liquidating a borrower.

Two-salary family gains lifestyle benefits

Around income tax time many couples start counting up the economic benefits of two salaries. "But lifestyle benefits may be just as important as economics for many," says Diane Welch, a family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. According to Welch, survey data indicates that

husbands feel less personal pressure for being the sole income provider. They also report feeling freer to make job changes, take job risks or increase their education. Wives in dual-earner families report an increased sense of independence, self-confidence and personal fulfillment. They also describe closer, more sharing relationships with their husbands, says Welch.

Some frequently-asked questions -- and answers

What Will The July 1, 1983 Tax Cut Mean For The Taxpayer?

A family of four earning \$25,000 will keep \$600 more of their hard-earned income in 1983 and \$800 more in 1984. For the economy as a whole, taxpayers will receive nearly \$32 billion for spending and saving.

This third and final installment of the 25 percent tax cut enacted in 1981 represents a permanent and real reduction in taxes. It offsets scheduled increases in social security payments and provides for indexing so that inflation will not throw people into higher tax brackets.

What Is The New "EZ 1040" Taxpayer's Form?

The "EZ" form is designed to simplify taxpaying for millions of Americans. The form is one page long with just 11 lines to fill out. It can be used by single taxpayers with

no dependents and incomes of less than \$50,000 a year.

Additionally, there are two other simplified forms for married people. The 1040A is a two-page, 31-line form that can be used to claim the new deductions for married couples. And, the Basic 1040A is a three-page, 71-line form that allows for itemizing deductions.

Why Are Low Interest Rates Essential For Economic Recovery?

Interest rates are the brakes and the accelerator of the economy. They determine who can and cannot borrow money.

In January 1981, the prime interest rate hit a record 21.5 percent. Getting a loan to buy a house or car was next to impossible. And worse, these rates effectively suffocated economic expansion.

By cutting inflation from 12 percent to 4 percent, the prime interest rate has dropped to 11.5 percent. Subsequently, millions more individuals can now afford a loan. This is evident in housing permits and starts which were up between 20 and 25 percent in August, September and October compared to the same period a year ago.

What Can Be Done About Unemployment?

As an immediate solution, the Job Training and Export Trade Company Acts will provide training and jobs for over one million people. And another 320,000 jobs will result from the User's Fee Program to rebuild our national transportation network.

The only lasting remedy for unemployment is economic progress and growth. And the best way to achieve economic progress is through low interest rates, low inflation rates and low tax rates which encourage

business expansion and creates new private sector jobs.

Do Huge Federal Deficits Stop Economic Growth?

When the federal government overspends and runs up huge bills it cannot pay, it must do one of two things. It must borrow or tax more money from the private sector — that's you and me — or, it must speed up the presses and print more money. If the government taxes or borrows too much, it makes money scarce for the private sector. This drives up interest rates. When it prints money, the money supply increases and inflation goes up. This also drives up interest rates. In both cases economic growth is hindered.

Deficits and overspending create a revolving door of inflation and high interest rates. The only solution consistent with economic growth is to force the federal government to curb its spending and live within its means.

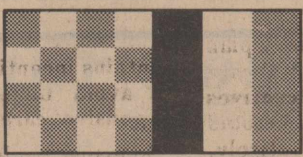

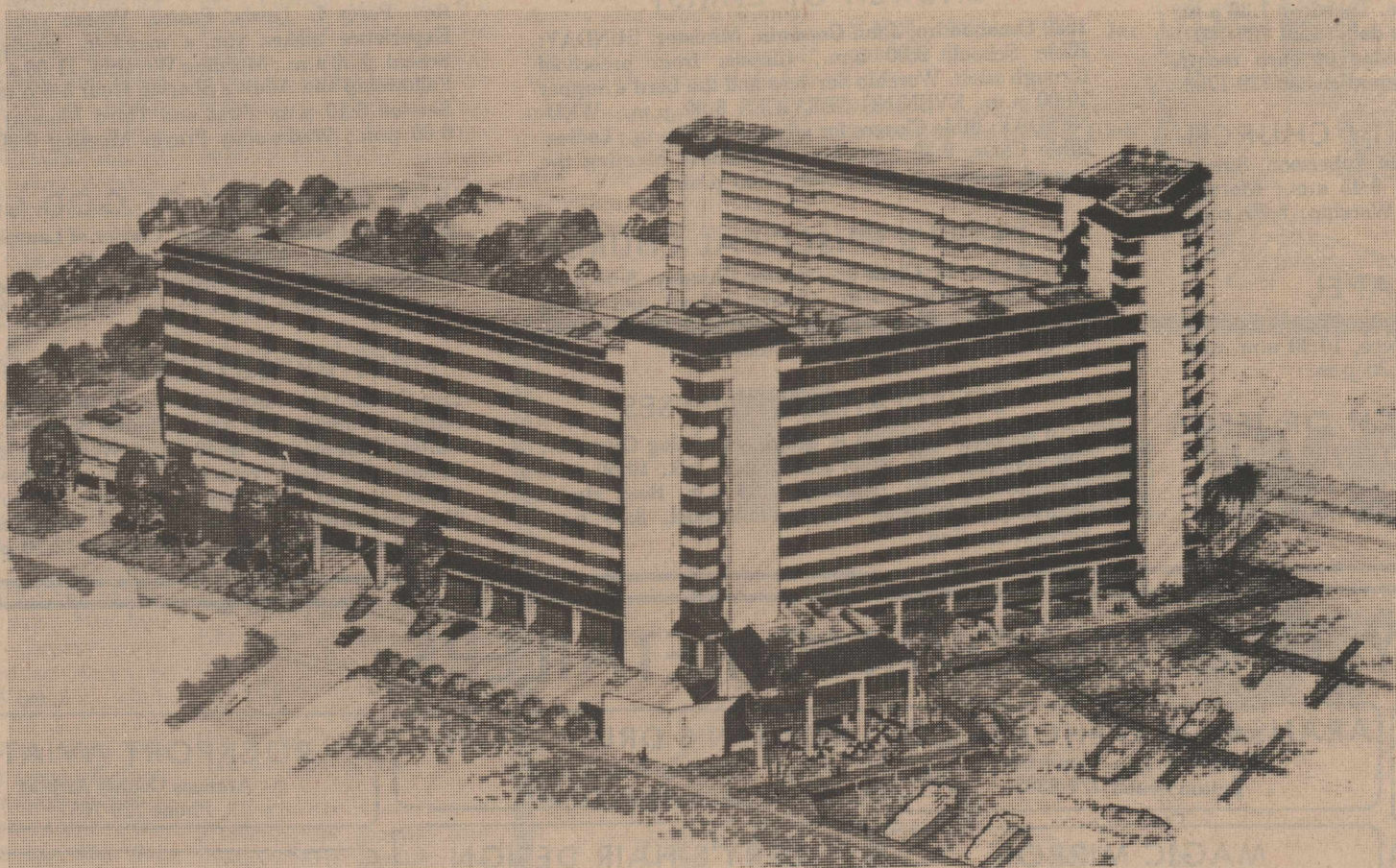

The collection of pie recipes that I borrowed from my mother is enough to make you gain weight just thinking about them! Here are some that have been prepared in our home for as many years as I can remember. And after a statement like that, don't remind me that I have trouble remembering what I had for breakfast!

COCONUT CREAM PIE
 1/4 cup cornstarch (or 1/2 cup flour)
 2/3 cup sugar
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 2 cups milk
 3 egg yolks
 2 tablespoons butter
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 cup coconut
 1 baked pie shell

for meringue:
 3 egg whites
 6 tablespoons sugar
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup coconut
 Mix cornstarch or flour,

sugar and salt; gradually add scalded milk. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and reaches boiling point. Cook 2 minutes and remove from heat.

Add a small amount of the mixture to slightly beaten egg yolks, then stir in remainder. Cook 1 minute. Add butter, vanilla and coconut. Cool slightly. Pour into baked pie shell.

Make meringue of remaining ingredients, cover and bake at 350° F. 12-15 minutes.

LEMON PIE
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 1/3 cup cornstarch
 1 1/2 cups water
 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 3 tablespoons butter
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 Mix sugar and cornstarch in a saucepan and slowly stir in water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick; beat in egg yolks, butter and lemon juice, return to heat and cook about 5 minutes. Cool and pour into baked pie shell.

Top with meringue and bake 12 minutes at 350° F. Cool before serving.

PINEAPPLE PIE
 1 cup sugar
 1 cup milk
 3 egg yolks
 dash of salt
 3 tablespoons flour
 1 small can crushed pineapple
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 2 tablespoons butter
 Boil sugar, flour, milk, egg yolks and salt until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add

pineapple, vanilla and butter. Mix well and pour into baked pie crust.

Top with meringue and bake at 350° F. until brown.

CHOCOLATE CREAM PIE
 1 cup sugar
 1 tablespoon corn starch

3 tablespoons flour
 2 tablespoons cocoa (more if you like it dark)

2 egg yolks
 2 cups milk

Combine sugar, cornstarch, flour and cocoa; add yolks to milk and mix well. Slowly add mixture to first

mixture and cook on low heat, stirring constantly, until thick.

Pour into baked pie shell, top with meringue, brown in 350° F. oven 12 minutes.

Next week we'll have a variety of pie recipes which I hope you'll enjoy. Bon appetit!

Patty McArdle: the voice is familiar

A lot of people in Aransas County would recognize her voice even if they don't know her name — Patty McArdle. For about eight years now, since she took the job as secretary at Rockport's First United Methodist Church, she's been answer-

ing the phone there — as well as handling other duties that include serving as treasurer, paying the bills and putting out the newsletters, the church bulletins, handling the correspondence. "It's a nice job," says Patty. "Mr. (church pastor Barrett) Renfro is absolute-

ly delightful to work for — and nobody yells at you if you mess up. . . . The work does, of course, involve a lot of details, but that's something Patty doesn't mind. When she first took the job, it was for mornings only but in the years since, hours have extended from 8:30 a.m. til 3:30 p.m. five days a week.

"In the years I've been working, I've gradually eased off on other things," she says. She is an associate member of the

Rockport Home and Garden Club. "I'm not really active," she says, "but I grow plants for SeaFair when they have a plant sale." She enjoys raising plants. "I garden quite a lot — when I should be keeping house," she says. Flowers grow in the yard, potted plants of several varieties clutter a small greenhouse behind the McArdles' residence on Paisano — and Patty gets peaches, nectarines and apricots off trees that she

has planted and nurtured herself. "I think," she observes, "I must be a farmer at heart." In years when crops from the fruit trees are good, she added, she makes jellies for money-raising bazaars.

Patty was born in San Antonio and grew up there, but went to high school in Corpus Christi for a year and a half before returning to get her diploma in her native city. She attended Texas State College for Women (now Texas Woman's University) in Denton, "but I didn't graduate," she adds. "I worked for a while, then I got married and went to California."

Her first husband was killed "in a Navy crash" and Patty returned home, eventually met Tom McArdle in Corpus Christi. They were married in 1960. "We were married about a year, then we went to New Orleans" where they lived four years. At that time, his company transferred him here, to Rockport.

"We liked it very much," says Patty — well enough that, 16 years later, they're still here.

Asked about activities outside her job and her

gardening, Patty says, "I don't do that much any more."

She is involved with the Aransas County Unit of the American Cancer Society — and has been for the past 15 years. "I think that started when Alice Moore invited me to a meeting," Patty says, adding, "It's all her fault."

Besides being chairperson of memorial donations to the ACS, Patty assists Walter Clark — the local unit's service chairman —

with some of the paperwork his duties require "and I help with some of the Crusade (the annual Cancer Crusade)," she adds. "There's a lot of 'pitching in' with that group."

She's also been a member of Rockport's city board of parks and recreation since 1972. "But this," she declares, "is my last year. I think it's time to retire, let someone else have a chance."

She doesn't worry about having time on her hands.

She has her plants . . . she knits . . . and she reads "a lot — most everything." Her two sons are grown, but she and Tom have "the grandchildren" — two cats, brother and sister — sharing their home.

And Patty has her work at First United Methodist.

Settled in a lounge chair at her home, she says again of her activities in the community, "I really don't do that much."

But what she does keeps her busy.

Quality is important when buying plants

Winter is an ideal time for landscape planning and planting. But if you're planning to buy landscape plants, a good rule of thumb is: consider quality rather than price. Plants, like all goods and services, come in many sizes, shapes and qualities. Because they do, it's just as important to evaluate a plant before purchase as it is to carefully inspect a garment or a home appliance.

Nursery stock offered at the bargain counter is usually undersized, or poor quality, or has been damaged in some way. Occasionally you may find a good "bargain" plant, but even then you usually get what you pay for.

For years, container-grown plants have traditionally been available in one- and five-gallon size containers. However, due to a lack of uniform standards in the nursery industry, all plants offered for sale are not alike. There can be, and often are, vast differences in plant sizes as well as appearance and quality. So shop around and compare before you buy.

What constitutes a quality plant? Growing plants, whether container-grown or balled-and-burlapped, should be well shaped and have many vigorous, sturdy and well placed branches. Examine the individual plant, because often single stem, poorly shaped plants

can be made to appear better than they are by crowding them close together in the sales area.

For a container-grown plant, make sure the root system is well established but not root-bound or growing out of the container.

Before purchasing any plant, check it carefully for signs of disease or insect damage. Close inspection may keep you from making a bad investment as well as prevent the contamination of your existing landscape plants with unwanted insects or disease organisms.

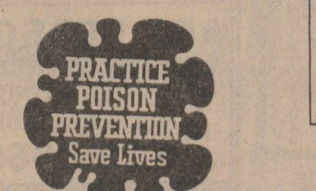

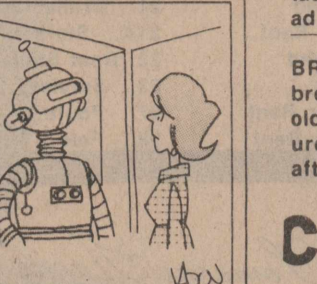

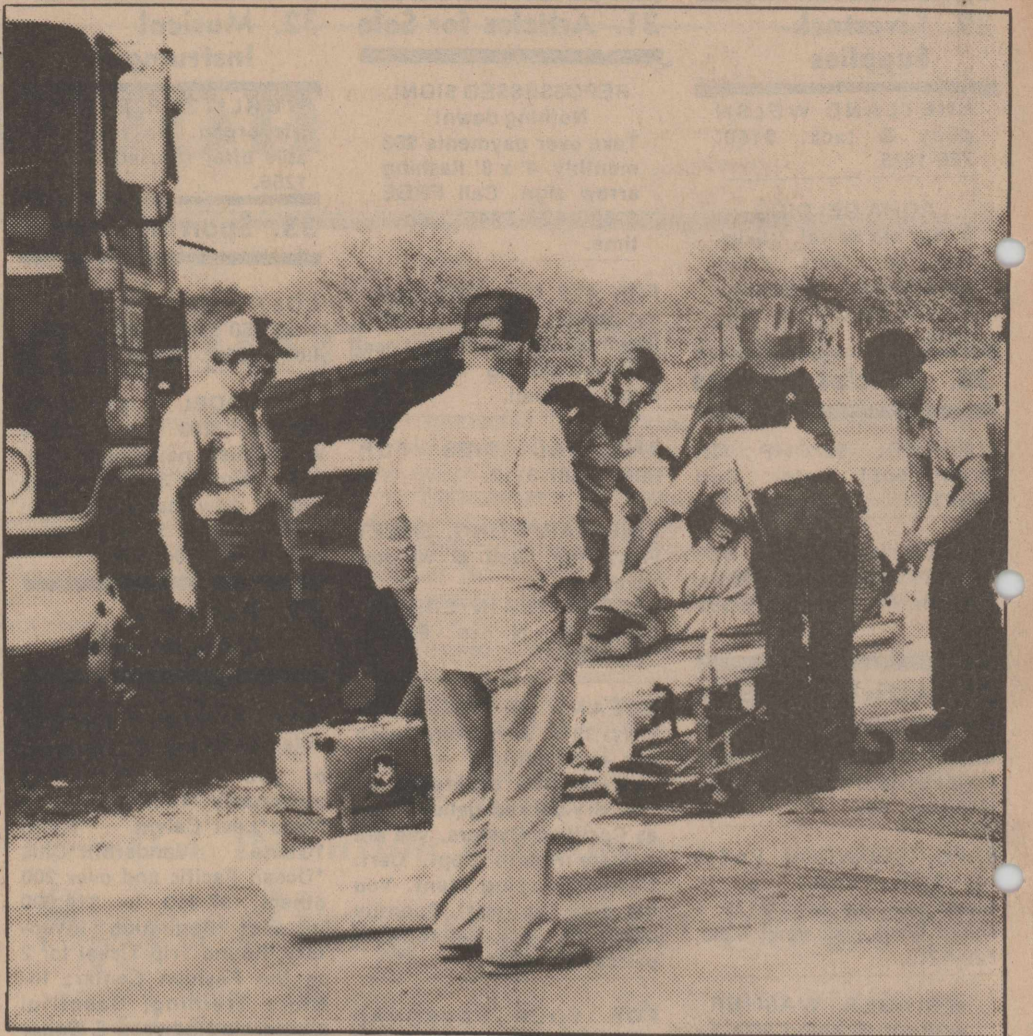

Filing deadline near for April elections

Only three days remain - until Wednesday, March 2 - for candidates to file for elections coming up April 2 in Rockport, Fulton, the county school district and the utility district serving Goose Island Lake Estates in Lamar.
As of Thursday morning, Feb. 24, only two candidates - the incumbents - had filed for re-election in Rockport, three races in Fulton had drawn four candidates. No filing had been reported for the Aransas

County Independent School District (ACISD) board of trustees and one incumbent had filed for re-election to the Aransas County Municipal Utility District (ACMUD) in Lamar.
Filing for re-election in Rockport were Richard Beck, incumbent in Ward 2, and W.B. Allen seeking re-election in Ward 1.
In Fulton, Katherine McLester had filed for re-election to Place 2 and had drawn an opponent in Gary LaBerge. Incumbents

Isabel Gutierrez, Place 3, and Pat Loflin, Place 5, were so far unopposed.
In the school district, the seats now held by Gene Gregory and William Buckley are up for election. Neither incumbent has filed for re-election so far.
Wilton Bluhm has filed for re-election to the ACMUD board of directors. Also up for election this year is the seat now held by Steve Shenk.

Taxes

Casterline said shrimpers are aware the Attorney General has been asked for a ruling on whether a simple bill or constitutional amendment would be needed to change the current tax status of commercial fishing vessels, but, he said,

"The resolution isn't for any certain bill. It just asks the cities to work on something to get us on an equal basis with farmers."
The shrimpers have not yet appeared before the Fulton city council, but they "probably" will, he said.
As for whether this request will be presented to the Aransas County Independent School District, he said, "I'm not real sure - we're just taking this one step at a time."
Casterline said he is hopeful the Attorney General will rule that a simple bill will be sufficient to change the law. "An amendment is a lot longer process," he said.
On Jan. 13, Texas Sen. John Sharp - whose 18th district includes Aransas County - introduced a bill that would allow exemption of commercial fishing boats from ad valorem taxation on a local option basis.
"During my second campaign (for the Senate) last year," Sharp said when contacted at his Austin office, "both me and my opponent endorsed the concept. I said I would support it on one basis only - local option. I don't mind granting the authority to exempt, but the final decision ought to be made by the local government, not mandated by the State."
Sharp emphasized his Senate Bill 167 would allow the exemption as a local option.
If Attorney Gen. Mattox rules that the ad valorem exemption can be granted in the form of a simple bill, Sharp's bill will be considered.
If the ruling is for a constitutional amendment, the legislature will consider a proposed amendment being sponsored by Sen. James E. (Buster) Brown (whose senatorial district included Aransas County until the redistricting that resulted from the 1980 Census).
Sharp added he believes Sen. Brown's proposal is also based on local option. He added he hopes Mattox will deliver an opinion on the matter within the next month.
"Anything I support," he emphasized, "will be on a local option basis."
At the Rockport council's Feb. 14 meeting, in a report on tax collections, City Administrator Herman Johnson told the council of the 1982 taxes collected as of Feb. 1, less than 1 percent were on commercial fishing boats.
Harlan said several of the commercial fishermen's organizations are involved in the push for legislation, including the Seafood Producers Association, PISCES and the Texas Shrimpers Association.

Article X requires city planning

Editor's note: On April 2, Rockport voters will be asked to cast their ballots for or against a proposed charter for the City of Rockport. As a service to our readers, the Rockport Pilot is publishing the charter articles in their entirety in each weekend Pilot edition.
If Rockport's proposed city charter is adopted by voters, the city's planning and zoning commission will be required to do something it has never had to do before - plan for the city's future growth.
Under proposed Article X, which deals with the organization, duties and powers of the city planning and zoning commission, the commission will be required to "make, amend, extend and add to a master plan for the physical development of the City" as one of its duties.
The ultimate decision on whether the master plan will be adopted or rejected lies with the city council, but once adopted, it will be used as a guide for all future council action concerning land use, regulations for development with-

in the city and all expenditures for capital improvements.
ARTICLE X PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION
Sec. 10.01 ORGANIZATION
(1) There is hereby established a planning and zoning commission which shall consist of seven members who shall be appointed by the City Council within sixty days of the adoption of this Charter for overlapping three year terms. Each member shall be a qualified City voter. Any vacancy occurring during the unexpired term of a member shall be filled by the City Council for the remainder of the unexpired term. The commission shall elect from its members a Chairman, Vice Chairman and Secretary each year in June to serve for one year beginning in July of the year elected. The commission shall meet at least once each month when practicable.
Sec. 10.02 DUTIES AND POWERS
(1) The commission shall be responsible to and act as

an advisory board to the City Council. The commission shall:
(a) Review all current and proposed ordinances and amendments pertaining to planning and zoning and make recommendations to the City Council for action to be taken.
(b) Make, amend, extend and add to a master plan for the physical development of the City.
(c) Submit annually to the City Manager, not less than ninety days prior to the beginning of the budget year, a list of recommended capital improvements to be constructed during the forthcoming two year period.
(d) Keep public records of its resolutions, findings and determinations.
(2) The commission shall have full power to:
(a) Exercise the authority of the zoning commission as provided by State Law, this Charter and City ordinances.
(b) Prepare, adopt and administer rules and recommendations pertaining to subdivisions and to platting in territories within the City limits and its extraterritorial jurisdiction.
(c) Make reports and recommendations relating to the master plan and development of the City.
(d) Within its budget appropriation, contract for professional and consultant services to aid in carrying out its duties.
Sec. 10.03 THE MASTER PLAN
(1) The master plan for the physical development of the City shall contain the commission's recommendations for the growth, development and beautification of the City and its extraterritorial jurisdiction. The commission may adopt the master plan as a whole or in parts and may adopt any amendment thereto. The adoption of the plan or of any such part or amendment shall be by resolution, but before the adoption of the plan or any such part or amendment, the commission shall hold at least one public hearing on the proposed action.
Sections 10.04-10.05 will be published in the March 5 Pilot edition.

senate bills which the county clerk's office opposes.
The first, SB 399, would grant the commissioners court the right to set the fees for the county clerk's office. Eaton is opposed to the bill since the fees are now uniform throughout the state and she feels the bill would raise fees, especially in larger Texas counties.
The second bill concerns the distribution of DWI and drug fines in county court cases. Under the proposed bill, 20 percent of the fine from an arrest in county jurisdiction would go to the county sheriff's office. If the arrest occurred in the jurisdiction of a municipality, 40 percent of the fine would be turned over to the city. Eaton says it is, sometimes difficult to determine exactly in whose jurisdiction the arrest took place. In addition, the county pays the cost of trying all these cases and she feels the bill would put an undue burden on the clerk's office and the county court.
The court supported Eaton's views and agreed to oppose the legislation.
Commissioner Ray Longino agreed to serve as alternate representative to the Coastal Bend Council of Governments. Commissioner W.B. "Pete" Sanders is the county's representative.

Peppard hoping 'A Team' makes grade

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the "second season" has been NBC's high-adventure series "The A Team," featuring George Peppard, Dwight Schultz, Melinda Culea, Dirk Benedict and Mr. T.

"We play soldiers of fortune who rescue people for a good cause or good money. We don't attack good people, so that changes us from mercenaries to people with a conscience," says the silver-haired Peppard, who plays Hannibal Smith, the squad's leader.

Peppard says he decid-

ed to do the series because it "was an opportunity to play a good part, maybe the best of my career."

"In a military sense, Hannibal excites me," he says. "In Vietnam, he'd been awarded every medal you could possibly imagine. He got hooked on the thrill of it — living on the edge."

Despite the show's theme, Peppard stresses that "The A Team" is actually a nonviolent drama.

"Nobody is killed. People get punched and there's no blood. It's fantasy... the fact that we

could kill but choose not to, makes a good moral statement that I approve of. It

also gives us latitude on the interpretations of our characters."

"The A Team" may be the first regular series to depict Vietnam veterans as heroes, a distinction that pleases Peppard.

"It's good for people to remember Vietnam vets. It's a good image for them. For children, these guys are heroic and are good Americans."

But what does the "A" stand for — "American"?

"Perhaps," says a smiling Peppard, "you can draw your own conclusions."

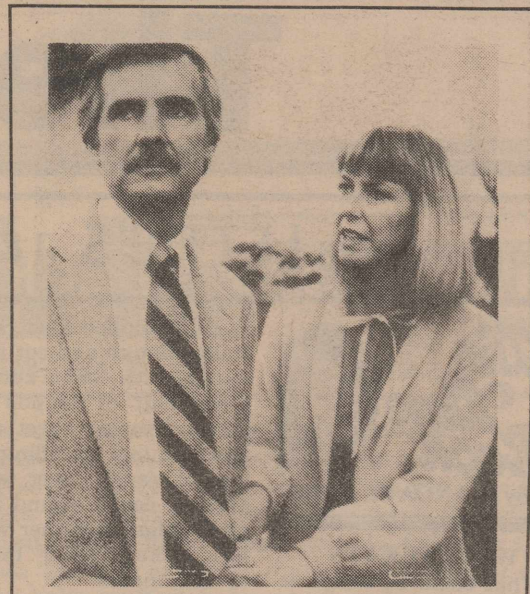

Wagner's 'Ring' continues

Richard Wagner's masterwork, "The Ring of the Nibelung" continues on Monday, Feb. 28 with the second part of "Die Walkure."

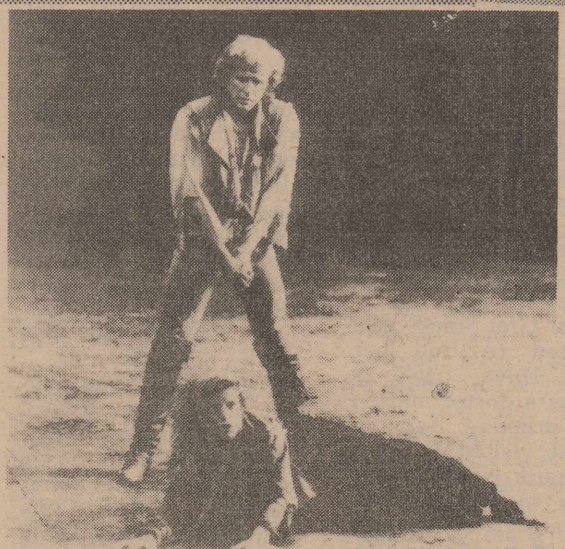
The second of four operas, to be aired on PBS via the "Great Performances" series, stars Peter Hoffman as Siegmund and Jeannine Altmeyer as Sieglinde. The cast also includes Matti Salminen, Donald McIntyre, Gwynneth Jones and Hanna Schwarz.

The presentation is hosted by the composer's granddaughter, Friedelind Wagner, who introduces all the operas in the "Ring" series.

Wagner regarded "Das Rheingold," the first opera in the quartet, as the prologue, so "Die Walkure" is actually the beginning of the story of the "Ring of the Nibelung."

A generation has passed since the events of "Das Rheingold," and the curse of the dwarf Alberich on the Rhine gold and the Ring that was fashioned from it has had time to mature and to ripen.

WINE TREATS

What could be better at the end of a cold winter day than a snack of cookies made with wine, pears poached in wine and a hot mulled wine drink:

Date-Nut Filled Cookies with Wine
(Makes 30 cookies. Recipe from the Fetzer Vineyard of Mendocino.) Cream together until fluffy, 1 cup margarine, 1/2 cup white sugar and 1/2 cup brown sugar. Add 1 egg, 3 tbs. milk, 1 tsp. vanilla; beat well. Stir in 4 cups sifted flour, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/2 tsp. baking soda. Chill dough in refrigerator for 1 hour. Make filling: in a saucepan, mix and simmer together for 4 minutes, 2 cups finely chopped dates, 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/8 tsp. salt and 1/4 cup Muscat Canelli wine, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, cool, add 2 tbs. lemon juice and

1/2 cup chopped nuts. Roll chilled dough and cut into rounds with cookie cutter. Place half of rounds on greased cookie sheet and spoon 1 tsp. of filling on top of each; cover with another cookie round and press edges together with fork. Bake at 375° F. for 10 to 12 minutes.

Pears Poached Purple Hot Mulled Wine
(Recipe from Mirassou Vineyards. Serves 6.) Peel 6 large, firm pears, leaving the stem attached. Core the bottom and place in a casserole just large enough to hold them. In large saucepan, bring to boil, 1 bottle Mirassou Cabernet Sauvignon, 3/4 cup sugar, 2 cloves, 2 tsp. powdered cinnamon, 2 slices of orange, 2 slices of lemon and 15 whole black peppercorns. Pour boiling liquid over pears and poach them covered until they are tender when pierced with a knife. Let cool slowly in liquid overnight. Remove pears from poaching liquid and chill; serve cold with whipped cream. Reserve wine liquid, add another half bottle Cabernet Sauvignon; heat through and serve.

Is any drug safe to take if one is pregnant? — G.B.
Any drug, prescription or non-prescription, has some degree of risk, even if you are not pregnant. The FDA wants to label all non-prescription drugs that are absorbed into the blood stream with the following statement: "As with any drug, if you are pregnant or nursing a baby, seek professional advice before using this product." That is a good idea.

What advantage does the new purified insulin have over the old standbys? — J.D.

The new purified insulin may allow the newly diagnosed diabetic to experience a prolonged "honeymoon phase," according to Nancy J. Bohannon of the University of California at San Francisco. The "honeymoon phase" allows the newly diagnosed diabetic to control blood sugar without insulin or with greatly reduced insulin dosage.

Should I give my child raw honey or formulas containing raw honey? — B.B.Y.

Samples of honey used in formulas were found to have contained clostridium botulinum spores, which causes food poisoning. The digestive system of certain infants less than one year old are ideal for the development of the spores, because most of them do not contain the millions of bacteria that older children and adults have. Thus, the spores can develop.

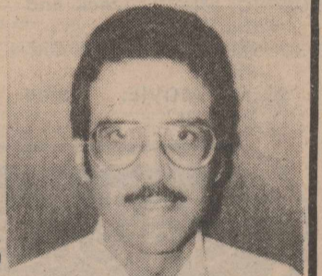

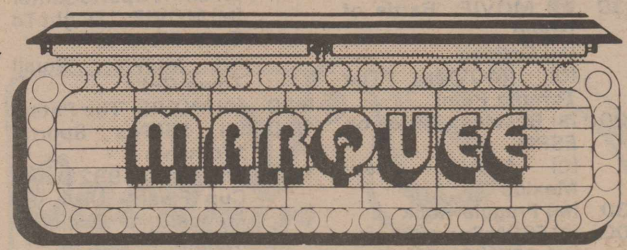

Just about every viewer who goes into the theater for this film knows that it's about a boy who has disappeared "without a trace." Thus the audience knows what to expect.

So when the moment comes for the boy to walk down the street, turn and wave goodbye to his mom, one can almost sense every parent watching saying to themselves, "No, don't let the kid walk to school by himself, even if it is only two blocks." It's a felling every good parent has whenever a child walks out the door.

Such deep-seated, almost instinctive fears are at work here. "Without a Trace" is adept at bringing them to the surface. It would be difficult to imagine the parent who would not be affected.

The fear for the child, the self-recriminations and the feeling of helplessness have made many such actual events nightmares. This film might leave a

parent with a few as well.

The events are as described. The 6-year-old boy has but two blocks to walk to school in Brooklyn Heights, New York, certainly not one of the worst sections of New York City. The mother (Kate Nelligan) watches him until he turns the corner. But the boy never gets to school. The police are called in, but to no avail.

The film is told largely from the point of view of the mother, played with remarkable control by Miss Nelligan. Her performance is Oscar-nomination quality.

Producer Stanley Jaffe takes a turn at directing here for the first time, and although he has chosen a sure-fire property, he was also careful to take few risks. His direction is rather listless, but with a story and performance as solid as this, he was wise to sit back and save the fireworks for next time. "Without a Trace" has some inherently potent fireworks of its own.

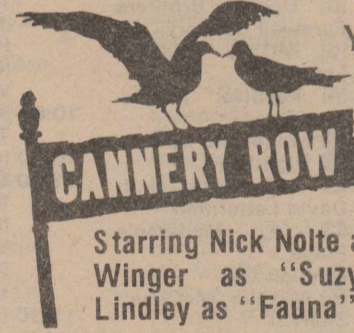
