## THREE ARE DEAD IN CHICAGO GUN BATTLE

(By Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, June 23.—Darkness was maintained in a triple slaying in a North Side alley today with no eye-witnesses left to tell what had happened except a "mystery girl" who fled the scene of the gun-battle.

Two policemen shot it out with an automobile thief and the three were killed.

The dead are: Sergeant Thomas Kesoe, 52, Officer James Farley, 32, and Dan Leather.

"There was a woman in the car with him," Farley gasped, as he died.

The figures are carved with great attention to detail and require the use of specially constructed and exceedingly fine tools, which she employs deftly and without wearing eyeglasses.

## 3 DROWN WHEN BOAT IS SUNK

TRURO, Mass., June 23.—Three members of a crew on the fishing schooner Surg are missing and are believed to have drowned after a collision with a Clyde Line steamer, the Ozark, five miles off this section of Cape Cod, today.

The other 19 members of the crew of the Surg were rescued by the Ozark, which was damaged and beached immediately.

### LIGHTNING HITS PAINT ROCK SUB-STATION

For the second time in the last thirty days, lightning struck the sub-station of the West Texas Utilities Company at Paint Rock Wednesday, burning out a transformer there.

The first transformer was burned out some two or three weeks ago and caused the necessity of installing a new transformer. A crew is at work now replacing the transformer that was burned out Wednesday.

BROWNSVILLE, June 23.—Flooding lowlands on both sides of the Rio Grande, cloudbursts for a distance of several hundred miles up the international stream today threatened the highways in the closed lower valley in many instances.

The greatest damage was done at Rio Grande City and at Rio Caramge, in the state of Tamaulipas, Mexico.

Unless rains continue no damage is expected here although there is a possibility that Santa Rosa, Sabar and Matamoros in Mexico may be flooded when the crest of the rise reaches here.

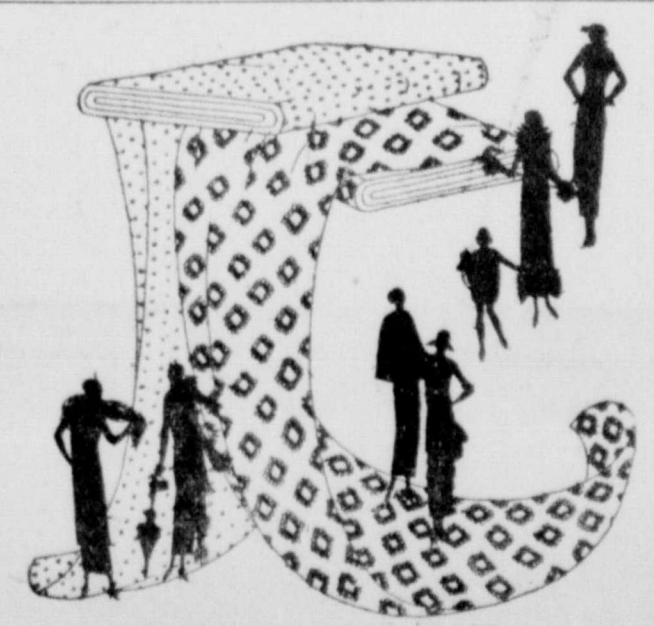

## CITY IS LOSER IN BUS FIGHT

AUSTIN, June 23.—Cities can not deny use of their streets to motor busses engaged in intercity transportation nor can they adopt valid ordinances fixing one depot for such busses to stop for the reception and discharge of passengers. This was held in two cases Wednesday by the Court of Civil Appeals, Third District, in affirming City of Ballinger et al against Nichols et al, and town of Winters vs. Murphy et al, both from Runnels county.

The Ballinger ordinance described the streets forbidden to the motor busses and was so extensive that the court held it to amount to a denial of the use of the streets of the city and that this can not be legally done. It was held that a town can not deny the use of all of its streets to motor busses passing through

the place, but can only indulge in a reasonable regulation thereof.

The establishment of depots comes within the conduct of transportation business and is not a street traffic regulation, holds the court, and the legislature has not delegated to the cities the right to regulate transportation. "If in any sense it may be regarded as a street traffic regulation it is manifestly arbitrary and unreasonable," says the court. It points out that one of the attractive features of motor vehicular transportation is the convenience it affords to members of the travelling public in permitting them to board and disembark at any convenient point on the route. To require one central depot is not a proper exercise of the city's power, even if that were classed as street regulation, holds the court.

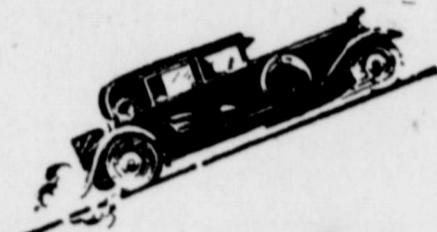
