The Board of trustees of the Spearman Independent School District met in regular session, Tuesday evening with all members, superintendent, business manager and John Work present. The following motions were made and approved: Mrs. Allen Alford's resignation accepted; Mrs. Albert Clark employed as half time home-making teacher and Mrs. Don Seymour employed as the public school music assistant for the 65.66 school year; Lewis Construction was paid \$719.75 for seal coating the drive at the East end of the new high school; Mason and Bechtold employed to do 64.65 audit; the insurance coverage on boilers and pressure vessels be increased from the present \$15,000 maximum to \$50,000 maximum at the expiration of the policy, October 2 and bills were paid.

Murder Trail Opens At Court Monday Sept. 20

According to the docket of the 84th District Court, the trial of John Grissam, for alleged murder of Mckie Westerfield of Gruver will be opened next Monday, September 20th. A special venire of 150 prospective jurors has been summoned to appear in the court room early Monday morning, and as soon as the criminal court is opened it is assumed that the challenging of prospective jurors for the coming trial will be made by the defense and prosecution lawyers. Westerfield of Gruver was killed on the night of February 26. The Hansford county Sheriff office began working on the case and was able to make the arrest of John Grissom, soon after the murder.

Attorney's Don Revis of Perryton and Charles Ballman of Borger have been appointed defense attorneys for the trial. A brother of John Grissam, Ernest Grissam, employed in Spearman was arrested in connection with the death and attempted robbery of the Westerfield store. He is charged with burglary, and will not likely be tried at this term of criminal court.

County Agents Report - Robt. Adamson -

FEDERAL GAS TAX REFUND

Farmers can get a four-cent per gallon refund on each gallon of gasoline used for farming purposes during the 12 month period ending June 30 by filing a claim with the Internal Revenue Service.

The tax refund claims are to be submitted on Form 2240 available at my office or through the Internal Revenue Service.

The claims must be postmarked no later than September 30. They should be mailed to District Director, Internal Revenue Service Dallas, Texas, 75201.

Extension Farm Management Specialist James Murphrey says sufficient records should be kept by each claimant to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the claim. Murphrey said a farmer who uses 2,000 gallons of gasoline a year could probably compile the necessary records and fill out the form in about one hour and for the hours work he would get a refund of \$80.

DON'T SAVE GRAIN SORGHUM FOR SEED

"Why can't I save grain sorghum to plant for seed next year? I paid plenty for the seed this year, the harvest should be good enough to plant again". This comment is often voiced by Texas farmers who'd like to cut costs by saving a part of their grain sorghum crop for next year's seed.

A quick look at a plot of grain sorghum at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center at McGregor will soon convince even the staunchest doubter that saving grain sorghum for seed is folly.

The plot at the Research Center was planted with seed held out from harvest the previous year. Some heads in the field were four or five feet high, while others were a scant two feet from the ground. This means more foliage has to be run through the combine to harvest the grain.

In addition, there were numerous white heads in the field. This is caused by the genetic makeup of seed saved from the products of first cross grain sorghum harvest. Mixed grain always means a dock at the elevator, and many times it is difficult to find a buyer at any price.

Many of the heads were mature and ready to be harvested, but there were also heads that were immature and could not be harvested, or at best, would raise the moisture test. Again this means a dock at the elevators.

Superintendent of the McGregor Research Center Henry O. Hill, says planting grain sorghum saved from your own harvest will cause the following: (1) Some of the grain sorghum will have white or different color heads. (2) There will be a marked difference in height and maturity of the heads. (3) The yield will be below what it would have been if new hybrid seed had been planted.

Everyone knows experience is a sad teacher, don't learn the hard way.

FERTILIZER NOT NEW

Fertilizer is not new. For more than 4,000 years, farmers have used fertilizers to increase crop yields.

The Chinese, Greeks and Romans used animal manures, chalk and wood ashes for plant food. They had no knowledge of the chemistry of soils or fertilizers to guide them, but knew that animal residues and manure increased plant growth.

When white men came to America, Indians were placing fish under each hill of corn at planting time. They had learned that often this practice meant the difference between a crop and no crop.

First commercial fertilizers were used about 1830, when Chilean nitrate was imported. Guano was also brought from Peru. These two materials stimulated farmers interest in fertilizer and prompted further study into its usefulness.

In 1868, the production of superphosphate from chemicals began in Baltimore. For many years the fertilizer industry remained largely a salvage outlet for waste products from meat-packing plants, fish canneries and oil seed industries.

Two new processes made it possible for fertilizer to grow into a large chemical industry. These were the recovery of ammonia from byproduct coke ovens and the chemical separation of nitrogen from the air.

Don't be led to believe that fertilizer is a "new fangled" device to drain the farmer's pocketbook. On the contrary, it is a necessity for producing good crops just as food is a necessity for growing strong bodies. There is no need to apply more than the plant can use. Take a soil test. This is the best guide a farmer can get.

IRRIGATION WELL OWNERS



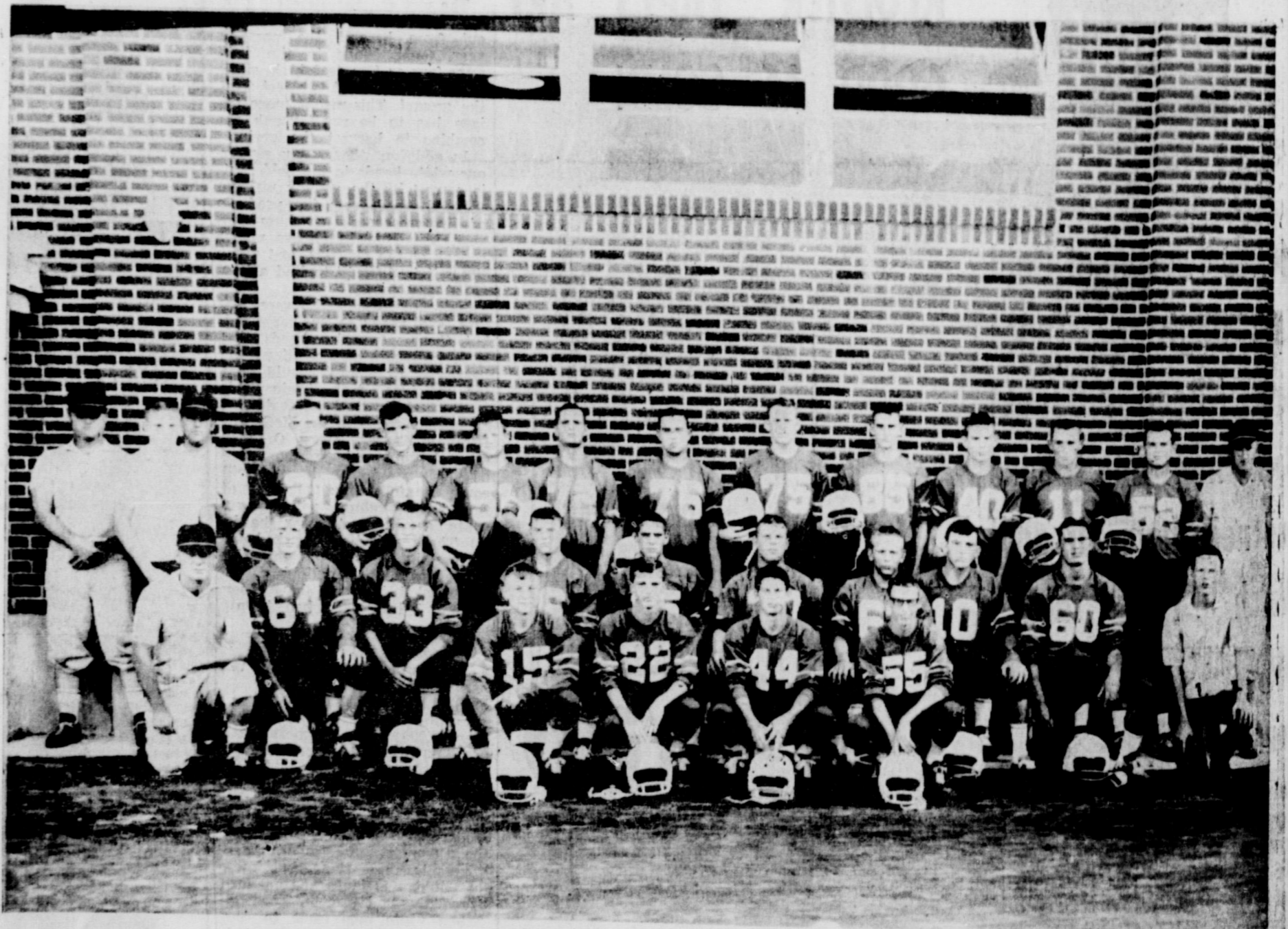

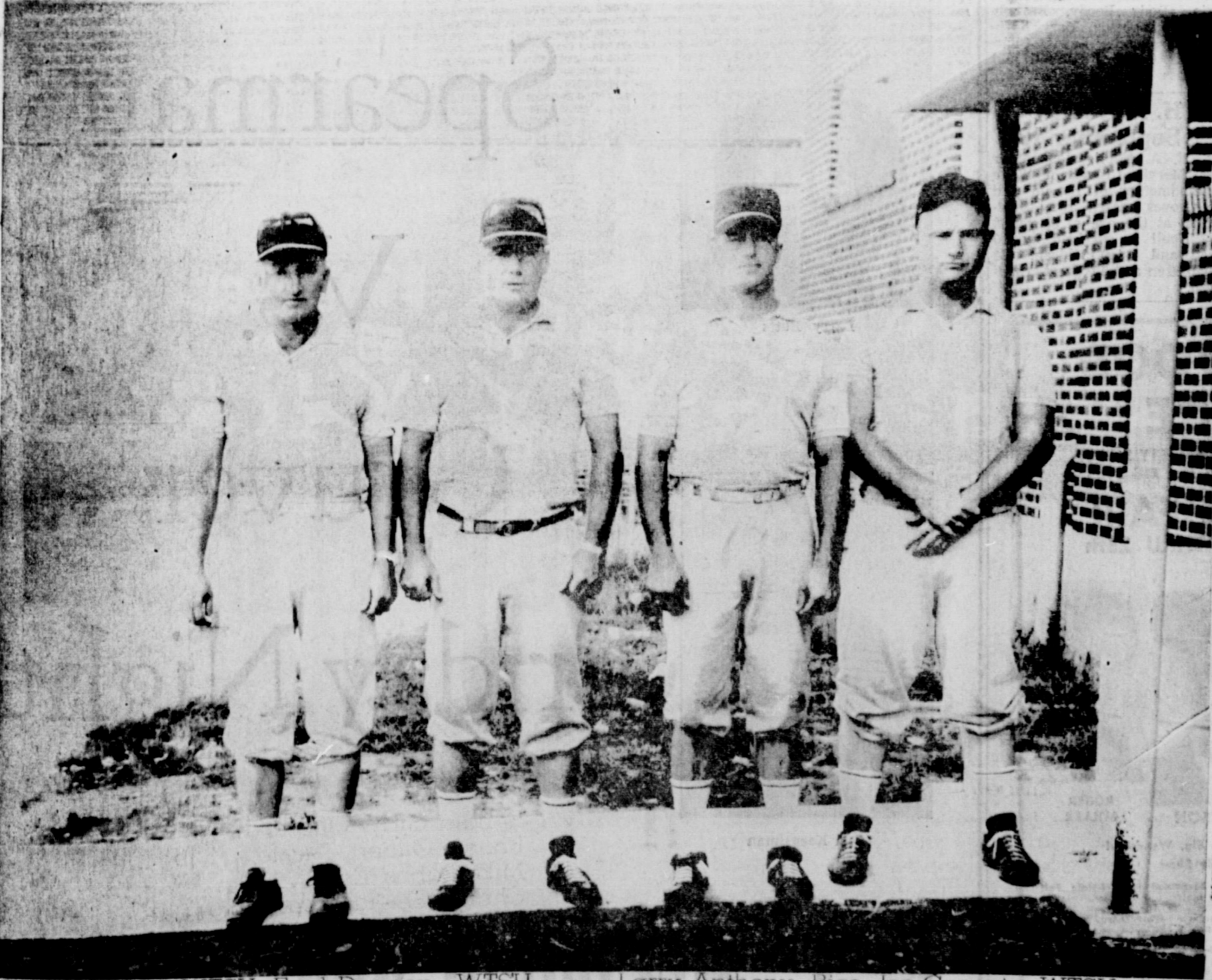

Homemaking Notes

How many poisons do you have at home which are in the reach of young children? Accidental poisonings continue to mount each year. Not all are fatal but in 1961 there were 42,000 cases of poisoning — 90 percent which involved children under five years of age.

Let's take a quick survey of your home: Aspirin is the leader in 21 percent of the reported cases. Is your aspirin bottle easily accessible to children?

Other items are insecticides, bleaches, and detergents. Any liquid, powder or tablet which youngsters can put in their mouths is dangerous. They have been known to swallow household ammonia, roach tablets and oven cleaners. Parents keep this in mind: a child that young cannot be held responsible. His parents must protect him, because he is full of curiosity. Part of his big task in growing up is to explore his world; so, he does it by poking, opening, tasting and swallowing. Therefore parents must be constantly aware of all forms of danger to children and protect these children in every way.

Stage a poison hunt in your home. Remove or put under lock and key those things which might harm your child. Don't let a child in your home become a victim of accidental poisoning.

Cooler weather has gotten me into a general housecleaning mood. So I have a few housecleaning hints to pass along to you which may be new, or at least reminders.

Protect ashtrays before they become a cleaning chore. To beat laborious scrubbing, rub a few layers of hard paste wax into the clean ashtray. Then as you clean it, just dump out the ashes and wipe the ashtray with a damp cloth. The wax keeps ashes from being ground into the tray, making cleaning a breeze.

If you are tackling the big job of washing walls, here's a bit of advice to heed — begin by washing from the bottom to the top. Here's why. Washing from the top may let water streak down across a dirty wall, leaving a water mark in the dirt which is often impossible to remove later.

When you begin with a clean wall on the bottom, water may drip and streak down as you get higher, but it can be wiped from the clean wall to leave no dirty streak marks.

On the other hand, when dusting walls and curtains, you should

work from the top down, since picked up on a downward sweep dust and dirt will fall and can be er is the best utensil vacuum cleaner. The dusting brush vacuum cleaner covered with a cloth rag will do a good job.

If you own a vacuum cleaner, do you get the full benefit from it? What type of care is best for your floor? Do you use wax and if so, what is best for your own floors? These are questions I will answer for you in the next couple of weeks, in this column to help you to keep up with what's new.

THE LAST NOTE: Folks used to go without luxuries to have money in the bank. Now they go without money to have luxuries.

Or do you, like so many, come up to a stop sign and stop, then pulling out in front of oncoming traffic? This I observe happens all too frequently.

Are we a people that are in too big a hurry? We act as if another minute of waiting is too long. And I'm sure I too am often guilty.

But the fact is, God says we shall not kill. This means we should not carelessly handle a car as well as a gun. We are to so love the life of others that we in no way endanger them but help them preserve their life as well as our own. Love is the answer-yielding in love to the oncoming car.

Observe your driving habits in this matter. Instead of bearing down with all speed and abandonment, try a little love. Far too many lie for weeks injured and suffering because of carelessness. Far too many homes suffer deaths of loved ones because of fleeting moments that we think are too long to spend at a stop sign.

Laws aren't the answer. Even patrolmen observing these mistakes in our driving habits and arresting us is not the answer.

The only answer is that we love others life enough to drive carefully, sanely and not pull out in front of oncoming traffic. Another moment or two yielding in love is the answer. Try it!

FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION
Over 39,766 families of farmers ranchers and rural residents in Texas benefitted from Farmers

Home Administration loan services during 1965. This is an all time high according to L. J. Cappelman, State Director for the agency.

Loans made or insured by the Farmers Home Administration in Texas during the fiscal year ended June 30 totaled a record \$89,289,230.

State Director Cappelman said that the Farmers Home Administration preserved its long standing record for keeping its various lending programs in a sound position during fiscal 1965. Repayments of principal and interest by borrowers totaled the largest volume collected in the agency's 30 year history.

"This good credit record signifies the initiative and integrity displayed by the people of rural Texas in their vast self-help effort which these loans represent," Cappelman stated.

Included in the number of Texas rural people benefitting from these programs are the members of 28,245 families forming rural groups that use Farmers Home Administration credit. Most of these groups borrowed funds to develop rural community water systems.

State Director Cappelman emphasized that loans to strengthen family farms and build new rural homes continued as the agency's top priority.
