Mr. Diggs took the examination several months ago along with a number of other applicants, when a vacancy was declared on the resignation of former Postmaster Foote.

HATLESS FAD IS BAD FOR HAIR

The collegiate habit of wandering about the streets without hats is one of the big reasons for the increase in the number of bald heads in this country, Dr. E. Lawrence Oliver, clinical professor of dermatology at Harvard, said in a lecture at Harvard Medical School.

Too Much Exposure

Dr. Oliver said sunlight was beneficial and even necessary because of the Vitamin D, but that continued exposure to it was harmful. "Sunlight is not entirely harmless to the skin," he said, "and over-exposure to it is a cause of baldness." Just as exposure to the X-ray can cause complete falling out of the hair, continued exposure to the rays of the sun by the habit of going without hats may lead to it. There is more baldness than ever before because of this habit. "Excessive and long continued exposure to sunlight can produce baldness and all the other skin and scalp troubles. Over 100 years ago women realized that the rays of the hot sun were harmful to the scalp and the skin, but they did not realize how beneficial they were to the general health.

Useless to Warn Girls

"I have often warned young girls against the habit of getting overtanned. The effects on the skin are not always immediate. It is not until they are 30 or 40 that the harm done becomes apparent. Then the too frequently tanned and burned skin becomes puckered and old looking.

"But it is useless to warn young girls of 18 how they are going to look when they are 40. They answer that they will probably be dead by the time they are 40, or else, if they are alive, they don't care how they look."

Continuing on the subject of the harmful effects of over-exposure to the sunlight, Dr. Oliver said he was a friend once who lived in Mexico and who went bare-headed. Because he went hatless under the hot sun for a long period, Dr. Lawrence said he became bald.

Little Hope for Bald

Dr. Lawrence held out little hope for the man who has become bald. He said women who for some reason or other lose their hair sometimes get it back, but in the case of the man it happens almost never.

There is no general rule for shampooing the scalp. Some people with oily scalps should wash it once a week. Others with dry scalps may let it go for months without trouble.

Brushing the hair acts as a stimulant and the rubbing in of olive oil in a dry scalp also helps, he said. Dr. Oliver said hair dyes are sometimes harmful, causing loss of hair and in other cases irritations of the scalp.

Dr. Lawrence said the history of cosmetics is of great antiquity and that the only modern aid to beauty is the permanent wave. All the rest was known to the ancients, he said.

AGRICULTURAL BOARD ELECTED AT MEETING SATURDAY

At a meeting of representative farmers from over the county, which was held at the courthouse last Saturday afternoon, an agricultural board was elected to take over the supervision of the work of the County Agent in Haskell county. The directors elected at the meeting were Henry Smith, chairman; C. A. Thomas, secretary; Sam Reed, Fred Monke and D. G. Griffith, directors. The board will be composed of a representative from each of the school communities of the county.

This action was made necessary recently when the Commissioners' Court withdrew the appropriation for the Agricultural Agent here. The county's part of the expense is being financed by interested citizens by contributions from over the county.

A contract for the continuance of the work with the extension department is being worked out and the agents work will be carried on without interruption.

RECEIVER ASKED FOR ESTATE MRS. KATE F. MORTON

The following Associated Press dispatch was carried in the morning daily newspapers from Fort Worth regarding a suit filed there, requesting the appointment of a receiver for the estate of the late Kate F. Morton:

"A suit requesting the appointment of a receiver for the estate of the late Kate F. Morton, pioneer of Haskell county and sister of former Governor James E. Ferguson, was filed here today by Jasper C. Lawson, her foster son, who recently was appointed permanent administrator.

"The suit follows two contests by the former governor and the alleged failure of temporary administrators to make a final report. The temporary administrators, defendants in the receivership suit, are Joe Lee and Alex M. Ferguson."

Haskell P. T. A. Officers Attend Crowell Meeting

FIRE DEPARTMENT HAS BUSY WEEK

Members of the local fire department have been enjoying quite a bit of exercise during the past week, and incidentally some hard work thrown in.

Saturday morning the department was called to the Sanders Gin, to extinguish a blaze in the sample room of the gin office. The flames were extinguished with slight loss to the structure.

Wednesday at noon, a large two-story frame house several blocks west of the square caught fire about noon. Firemen were able to subdue the flames, but not until practically the entire roof was burned off. The property was owned by M. S. Shook and was occupied by two families. Origin of the fire was not ascertained.

The home of Hurley Howard, two blocks west of the cemetery, was destroyed by fire Thursday morning about 9:30, together with practically all household goods. In answering the alarm, firemen went to the residence of Monroe Howard in the extreme north part of town before learning they had gone to the wrong address. Very little assistance could have been given, however, had the boys gone directly to the fire, as the house was located outside the reach of water mains.

Thursday afternoon at 1:45, a small barn at the Simpson garage, one block south of the square, was discovered in flames. Firemen were able to extinguish the blaze before it spread to adjoining structures, prevent what might possibly have been a disastrous fire.

The following information to the cattle owners of Haskell county has been received from the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas cooperating with the United States Bureau of Animal Industry. The tuberculin testing of all breeding and dairy cattle in the county is now under way and according to the department will continue until the work is completed here. Their communication follows:

To the Cattle Owners of Haskell County, Texas:

The tuberculin testing of all breeding and dairy cattle in the county of Haskell will continue under the County Area Plan with the view of accrediting the county. The owners of range herds are required to test only the bulls and ten per cent of the cows. The test does not apply to feed lot cattle. All other cattle are required to test.

An Accredited County is one in which all breeding and dairy cattle have been tuberculin tested and the tuberculosis infection has been reduced to less than one-half of one per cent, and rules and regulations established governing the movement of cattle into that area.

Cattle will be tested by a regularly employed State or Federal veterinarian, without cost to the owner, but all owners are expected to cooperate with the veterinarians in carrying forward this work, by having their cattle up and arrangements made to handle them, so that the test may be properly applied. Each cattle owner will be notified in advance of the time that the veterinarian will be at the place to apply the test. Cattle of all ages will be tested and it will be necessary that each animal be restrained either by tying or placing in stanchions, stalls or chutes.

All reacting cattle will be slaughtered at an establishment where Federal inspection is maintained and owners will be indemnified for all cattle slaughtered in the following manner: Each animal will be appraised; the owner will receive the salvage, and in addition to the salvage, two-thirds of the difference between the appraised value and salvage, not to exceed a maximum of \$100.00 on purebred cattle and \$40.00 on grades. A purebred animal is one that is registered in a recognized association of that breeding.

The intradermal test will be used. The cattle will be injected one day and readings will be made approximately twenty-two hours later. All cattle owners are requested to cooperate in submitting their herds to test so that the work may be completed at a minimum cost to the State, County and Federal Governments.

FARMS

(By Joe C. Williams, County Agent)

Garden Tile Demonstration

Thirty-one men and women met at the Steve Perrin farm in the Myers community with the county and home demonstration agents for the garden tile demonstration. In this demonstration all were shown how to find the proper level for laying off the rows or tile ditches for laying the tile. Three inch garden tiling one foot in length was used, concrete mixture of four parts of clean sand to one part of cement, for cementing the intake joints. The balance of the tiling was placed end to end on a level in the bottom of the trench, with newspaper laid over the joints to keep the soil from filling in the tile joints. One hundred and twenty feet of the tile was laid.

Care of Baby Chicks

In brooding baby chicks to get the largest per cent to live it is best to get your brooder stove to going at least two days before placing the chicks in the brooder house. This is necessary to get your brooder heat regulated and have the house warm for receiving them. Unless the chicks are kept warm and not too crowded they are apt to take brooder pneumonia, as a result of overcrowding, getting too cool, or too hot. The best temperature is from 95 to 100 degrees for the first week or two. I find that good results may be had by putting the chicks on half screen with a frame made of one by four inch timber, made in the same dimensions as a window frame, the screen nailed on the edges of the one by four timber frame. This keeps the chicks from picking up the droppings, and keeps them more sanitary.

Commercial chick starters work well if freshly mixed. If mouldy food is used diarrhea is usually the result with heavy death losses. A good home mixed starter can be made from the following mixture in this proportion:

- 55 pounds yellow corn meal.
- 20 pounds wheat bran.
- 20 pounds wheat shorts.
- 8 pounds fine meat and bone scraps.
- All the milk they can drink either sweet or sour.
- 5 pounds alfalfa leaf meal, not stems or common hay.
- 2 pounds finely ground oyster shell.
- 1 pound bone meal.
- 1 pound of salt.

Feed this mixture sparingly the first few days; feed several times daily all they will clean up in thirty minutes. Have enough feed through so that every chick has an equal chance. After ten days feed coarse yellow corn meal three times daily, giving them all they will clean up at night.

Growing Mash may be made from the following mixture in the following proportion:

- 35 pounds yellow corn meal.
- 20 pounds bran.
- 20 pounds shorts or 40 pounds of ground wheat may be used instead of the bran and shorts.
- 5 pounds alfalfa leaf meal.
- All the milk they can drink each day.
- 10 pounds cotton seed meal.
- 1 pound bone meal.
- 2 pounds oyster shell.
- 1 pound salt.

Leave the mash before the chicks at all times and feed grain morning and night. In addition to the above mixture chicks should have plenty green feed. After about six weeks train the chicks to roost. The feed above should be used after the chicks reach approximately one pound of weight, caponize the young cockerels when they reach one and one-half to two pounds of weight.

If you have trouble in losing your chicks consult your county or home demonstration agent as to possible remedies.

Fake Guaranteed Medicines

Every spring agents who make house to house canvasses of farms selling so called dope that they guarantee to increase egg production, with other miracles they claim their medicines will do. Green feed and a surplus of milk that is fed to the hens actually give the increase in egg production. If you have one of the poultry remedy men call on you with such claims ask him if the county and home agent has recommended his remedy to the farmers of the county. Such a question will mean his hasty departure from your home.

Hog Cholesterol

Every man who buys pigs or hogs that are trucked into the county takes a great risk of getting all the hogs on the place infected with cholera, some come from the river bottoms and some come from various places. One case of cholera has been reported and the particular farmer lost three head of nice hogs. Haskell county has enough mature hogs and pigs to supply

practically the entire county with plenty of pigs for making the fall and winter meat supply.

AN UNSUNG HERO

Behind the scenes of the political show in Washington there is usually an unsung hero. In the case of the consolidation of federal loaning agencies, and in the undertaking to refinance farm mortgage indebtedness, the hero is Representative Marvin Jones, of Amarillo, Texas, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture.

Chairman Jones' bill to take care of both of these financial functions was introduced during the last session of Congress and according to the result of a thorough search of the records his measure was the first to suggest the consolidation that has resulted in the abolishment of the federal farm board and the reorganization of farm loaning agencies.

Aid to Morgenthau

He has been working with Chairman Henry Morgenthau, Jr., for several weeks, perfecting the plan, and his suggestions have been carried out to a large degree.

It has been Chairman Jones' contention that if farmers were freed of the restrictive burden of short term credits, and excessive interest charges, a great part of his battle would be won.

He believes that the heavy mortgage indebtedness of the farmer retards his endeavors. He does not feel that the farmers' credit should flow to him freely and without the application of sound protection for the government.

Believes in "Free Farmers"

Mr. Jones is one of those who believe in the doctrine of the "free farmer." He contends that debts bind debtors, and that it naturally follows that farmers relieved of the threat of foreclosure and the overpowering load of debt, would be free farmers, entitled to the pursuit of happiness.

Mr. Jones says: "If it were possible for every farmer in America to be free from debt so that he could plant his crops in proper season and grow them in independence, he would advance toward prosperity. If there could be linked with his freedom from debts the removal of the discrimination against him through trade barriers and excessive freight rates, he would have a chance for success on the same dead level with the other fellow, and a large portion of his problems would be solved."

Mr. Jones enjoys a record in the House of never having been defeated on any bill which he has brought to the floor from his committee. He has the full confidence of members of his committee, and of the House, and they have habitually followed his suggestions on farm legislation.—Wichita Beacon.

THE GOOD OLD TIMES

THEN: Everybody worked hard; they saved their money and bought homes; they had big families, went to church, chewed tobacco and voted. If they went any place at all they walked or drove a horse. They took in Uncle Tom's Cabin once a year, ate ice cream at the Sunday School picnic, beer was a nickel a glass and the butcher gave away the liver.

There was an ingrain carpet on the parlor floor and a hanging lamp with a red glass shade with warts on it. Men wore long pants, and the boys short pants, and a wood stove made red flannel underwear and leather beds popular. If a man wanted to take a drink he took it, and wasn't a criminal. They never saw a policeman and didn't know there was a sheriff. They didn't have to get a license to do anything, if they got sick, which was seldom, they either died or got well and it didn't cost ten or twelve hundred dollars either way, but generally they lived to a ripe old age and died at home with some of the children around who didn't expect the county to take care of the old folks.

NOW: Few work, none save, some go to church, about half vote and if you don't drink you are a social outcast. The unfortunate have large families and the children are orphans from birth. If they

grow up they stay out all night and nobody understands them. Women paint, smoke, drink, cuss, drive cars and fly and if they break a leg they would starve to death if they lost the can opener.

Everything is licensed, taxed, inspected or prohibited. We have high taxes, Volstead, racketeers, farm relief, athlete's foot, crooners, jazz, and everybody owes the finance company.—The Interlude.

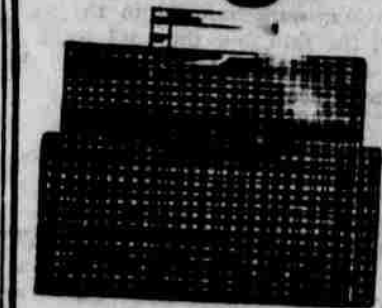

TO HALT FORECLOSURES

President Roosevelt struck another popular note last week when he recommended to the Congress that specific measures be included in its farm relief program for debt relief for farmers and stated that he will later ask similar aid for the small home owners of the nation who are threatened with foreclosure.

It is generally recognized that the farmers who contracted mortgages and other debts when prices were high are entitled to relief from the disproportionate condition resulting from the collapse of agricultural prices. A more equitable readjustment of the principal of the debts as well as a reduction of the interest rates is sought.

To a considerable extent these same conditions apply to small home owners who undertook the purchase of property at boom prices and have been struggling to hold it under depression conditions.

The President proposes a temporary readjustment of amortization to give sufficient time to farmers to restore to them the hope of ultimate free ownership of their land. He points out that he seeks an end to the threatened loss of homes and productive capacity now faced by hundreds of thousands of American farm families.

The legislation which he proposes will not impose a heavy burden upon the national treasury, but will provide means by which, through existing agencies of the government, the farm owners of the nation will be enabled to refinance themselves on reasonable terms, lighten their burdens and give them an opportunity to return to sound conditions.

Whatever the means required, both the farmers and the small home owners are entitled to the relief proposed.

IT MUST NOT HAPPEN AGAIN

Those investment bankers who, in violation of their trust, connived in the defrauding of American investors in foreign issues or other securities should be prosecuted with all the power of the Department of Justice and punished to the limit of the law.

The securities bill now before Congress is designed to prevent, through publicity, fraud in the flotation of securities that enter into interstate trading, and we are pleased to note that Congress is moving rapidly toward its enactment.

It is said that some investment houses are moving in droves on the capital to prevent such legislation. They claim that the bill has faults—that the liability clauses make each director a guarantor. And why not? Why should not the burden of telling the whole truth be placed upon the directors?

The public which has been so mercilessly fleeced by the misrepresentation of securities are demanding action to compel common honesty and decency in the marketing of securities in the future and they should not be disappointed.

There is not a thing in the proposed measure as to publicity that any experienced businessman would not demand before purchasing; there is no disposition merely to harass those selling securities since that is not only a legitimate but a necessary work—the sole purpose of the legislation being to give the purchaser a square deal on the security market. To the ancient rule of "Let the buyer beware" has been added a new one—"Let the seller also beware."

The public will have little patience with any attempt to delay passage of this needed legislation. Their attitude is, it must not happen again.

Natives in Alaska are said to be turning to civilized practices, including the awarding of alimony. For deserting his squaw, Charlie Big Eyes, of Ninilchik, was made to pay her one bull moose, butchered; 10 mink skins, dressed; 5 fox pelts, and 100 full grown salmon.

Those of us who were country boys half a century or more ago will remember the copper-toed boots and shoes of those days. The Vicksburg Herald of August 22, 1865, advised: "Shoes are an important item in the expense of clothing children. They invariably wear out the toes first. It will be wise for parents to buy metal-tipped shoes."

A Bible lecturer announces as one of his subjects the old question: "Why is the Devil Permitted to Live?" If he can satisfactorily answer it he will throw much light on a matter which has worried a good many folks for a long time.

The appointment of Governor Dern, of Utah, as Secretary of War recalls his famous campaign slogan a few years ago, when his opponent was former Governor Charles R. Mabey. Dern's supporters rallied to the battle cry of "We want a Dern good governor and we don't mean Mabey." And Dern was elected, although Mabey is a Mormon and Dern is a Congregationalist. We may expect to have a Dern good Secretary of War.



Tips on Taxes

AUSTIN.—It is known that the costs of the State government for the next two years will be substantially lower than for the past two years. The single uncertainty is what may be done with reference to appropriations for support of the public schools. Other major appropriation bills have been finally passed by both houses of the Legislature. They represent reductions varying from 25 to 40 per cent. The aggregate reductions will probably be from 30 to 33 per cent.

However, the possibility of upsetting the results of the start toward economy—and it is only a start, notwithstanding the impressive savings made—is by no means remote. There are two very pressing influences that may supply the necessary support to bring about the enactment of laws that will open new sources of revenue, which would eventually neutralize the progress already made. These are the persistent demand of public schools for liberal appropriations and the desire to balance the State budget and wipe out the existing deficit during the next year, or two at most.

Thus far, no general new taxes have been levied. The sales tax, which was the most important means suggested for raising new revenues, has been killed again. This time, its death is supposed to be final, but it is known that plans are being made to revive the idea, bring it up in a fresh Spring outfit, bring it out as the angel of public school education and the Santa Claus for badly depleted county and city treasuries, through an ingenious proposal to split the proceeds between the schools, counties and cities. Basically, this is the familiar "old" method of increasing taxes, which has been a prolific cause of the increase in the cost of government in this country for the past ten years.

Those who oppose new taxes will need to be alert during the closing days of the session of the Legislature. It is also well to bear in mind that up to the present time the fundamental causes of high taxes have not been removed. Nothing

has yet been done that will provide effective barriers against a return of extravagance, once the present emergency is passed. Changes have been proposed, which, if finally adopted, will give some degree of permanence to measures of economy. The fate of these really constructive changes is still uncertain and there seems to be possibility that some of them will fail.

The amendment in the Senate proposing to reduce the State ad valorem tax for general revenue purposes from 35 to 15 cents has been engrossed in the Senate but apparently lacks the required two-thirds support to submit it as a constitutional amendment.

The amendment placing an arbitrary limit on total expenditures of the State government has been finally passed by the Senate by the necessary two-thirds vote. It is yet to go through the House. The judiciary reorganization amendment, making drastic changes in the set-up of the courts and promising important economies, which passed the House some time ago, awaits an uncertain fate in the Senate.

Amendments proposing reorganization of costly county government are yet to be acted on. This is also true of a bill which proposes county unit system of public school administration. These latter two subjects are vital, because local taxes are much more burdensome than State taxes.

The Senate has passed unanimously a bill limiting the amount of compensation which would be allowed county and precinct officials. The reductions will radically affect official incomes in counties of population above 25,000. The top compensation allowed any county official in Texas would be \$5,000, and this would be possible only in counties above 150,000 population. The following maximums have been set: Counties under 10,000 population, \$3,000; between 10,000 and 25,000, \$3,250; between 25,000 and 37,500, \$3,500; between 37,500 and 75,000, \$4,250; between 75,000 and 150,000, \$4,750; above 150,000, \$5,000. The rates do not apply to all fee officers alike. The maximums are for more important county offices. Lower figures are fixed for justices of the peace, constables, etc.
