RESOLUTION FOR WAR HAS BEEN OFFERED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Rep. Hamilton Fish, Republican, New York, house non-interventionist leader, today introduced a resolution to declare that a state of war exists now between the United States and Germany.

Rep. Fish's resolution would have congress to direct the president to "employ the entire naval and military forces of the United States and the resources of the Government to carry on war against the German government."

Rep. Fish previously had said that he would introduce such a resolution on the floor of the house, to force a showdown on the issue of United States participation in Europe's affairs.

The text of the resolution said: "Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, that the president employ the entire naval and military forces of the United States and the resources of the government to carry on a war against the German government, and to bring the conflict to a successful termination, all the resources and manpower of the country are hereby pledged by the Congress of the United States."

Rip Galloway And Garland Branton Go After Fish

County Clerk R. V. Galloway and County Treasurer Garland Branton decided Wednesday to go fishing at Philpoe Lake near Rising Star. They loaded a new canvas boat belonging to Galloway on their car and headed for the lake.

Reaching the lake they promptly loaded their fishing tackle and a bucket of minnows into the boat, crawled in themselves, and headed for deep water. They reached the deep water all right, but just as they did so a wave struck the boat and caused it to capsize.

Branton says he doesn't know how far he went down, but that the deeper he went the colder the water was, and that when he finally got his head above water Galloway was clinging to the boat shouting to him to know if he "could make it."

Finally making their way to shore the pair retrieved the boat and began their journey home, each promising the other that they would not so much as say one word to anyone about their mishap. Each vows that he faithfully kept this promise, but just the same everyone about the courthouse is "wise" and is having much more fun out of the fishing trip than Galloway and Branton had.

Railway Strike Is Expected To Result From Wage Demands

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—An authorized spokesman for 350,000 railroad employees predicted today that the "paltry" wage increase recommendations of the presidential fact finding board would precipitate a "strike showdown" such as confronted President Roosevelt in 1936.

Defense Guard Is Praised After An Inspection Here

Maj. Thomas W. Gahagan, from the State Adjutant General's Department at Austin, inspected Company B Texas Defense Guard and the 15th Battalion Headquarters Detachment at the armory building Wednesday night.

Maj. Gahagan stated this morning that Ranger had a very fine Defense Guard Company, of which the town should be very proud. He stated that it was rapidly getting into shape, though, like all the newly formed companies, it still had many small details to learn. He stated that it compared favorably with other guard companies over the state, which now comprises a total of 22,000 men, not counting approximately 4,000 which will be in the air corps when it is completed.

In commenting on the Texas Defense Guard in general, Maj. Gahagan issued the following statement:

"The men in the Texas Defense Guard are doing much in the defense program by virtue of offering their service, and preparing themselves in a purely unselfish and patriotic devotion without pay. They are buying their own uniforms and in many instances their own equipment, merely for the privilege of being of service to their community, their state, and their nation."

"In several instances the Texas Defense Guard, as a unit, have performed most commendable service in their localities without charge, and without official call by the governor, and appreciated the opportunity of doing so."

"The Department has approved from time to time, and encourages the Guard units in their respective localities, answering the calls of distress of temporary nature, without official call of the Governor, where it is possible for them to render a humanitarian service of relief in case of disaster and suffering."

"The Texas Defense Guard unit at El Campo was called out on April 20 in response to a lost child in the woods near that city. The unit responded to the call of the local authorities, and assisted in the search and spent the night and day tramping through the woods in the rain until the child was found and returned to its parents."

"On June 10th, reports from Albany that at least three hundred persons were in distress and routed from their homes due to the flood from Hubbard Creek, members of Company A, Texas Defense Guard, of Breckenridge, commanded by Captain James Brewster, answered the first call for aid shortly after three a. m. and rendered great assistance in the protection of life and property, and establishing order in this chaotic condition."

"The Texas Defense Guard has done much to bring about unity of thought directed toward the national emergency. Men in all walks of life are in the ranks and among the officer personnel. Veterans, former service men, men from military schools, bring the average number of years of military experience throughout the Texas Defense Guard to more than one year. There are many in the Guard who have had no military experience, from almost every conceivable occupation."

"In the history of Texas, the TDG is the finest example of democracy at work. In the history of this national emergency, Texas has the finest example of a State guard in the quality of its organization and strength. In the history of the Awakening to the National Emergency, Texas was the first to be aroused from its slumbers."

Federal Policy On Power Is Rapped By Dallas Paper

DALLAS, Nov. 7.—The Dallas Journal today, in a copyright story, charged that the United States Government, through the political use of the Brazos river Conservation and Reclamation District, was "Shanghaiing private enterprise at the expense of its own defense, material and labor."

The Journal charged that the Possum Kingdom generating plant had stood completed and idle since May, when it could have been pouring 22,500 kilowatts of electricity daily into quick-powered hookups for the power-starved Southwestern States, sorely needing it.

Failures Fewer In State During September, 1941

AUSTIN.—Only 12 commercial failures occurred in Texas in September, less than half the number—26—recorded in September a year ago, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Liabilities of the bankrupt firms totaled \$110,000, compared to a total of \$351,000 in September, 1940.

In August 14 failures with liabilities of \$100,000 had occurred. For the first three-fourths of 1941, the Bureau listed 208 failures, compared to 217 for the comparable period of 1940, with liabilities totaling \$3,761,000 as compared to \$5,890,000 for the first nine months of 1940.

Assult To Murder Case To Trial In 88th Court Nov. 12

Two criminal cases are scheduled for trial on Nov. 12 in Judge B. W. Patterson's 88th district court.

Bill Johnson of Rising Star is due to go on trial on a charge of assault with intent to murder V. B. Fenwick of Rising Star on Feb. 12, 1941.

Edwin Bush is due to face trial on the above date on a charge of cattle theft and for "Habitual Criminal." Bush is charged by grand jury indictment of stealing a milch cow in Eastland. The offense is alleged to have taken place about 60 days ago.

ROOSEVELT IS URGING A FULL COOPERATION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt said today that the Americans must make "full sacrifices now," must "submerge labor and industrial differences" and work "three shifts a day" to help defeat Hitler and to bring about the "better world we aim to build after the war."

Our place—the place of the whole Western Hemisphere in the Nazi scheme for world domination has been marked on the Nazi timetable," the president said.

The president addressed the International Labor Officers in the East Room of the White House, where delegates representing 33 nations gathered to end their annual convention.

The speech was broadcast by radio.

Funeral services for Mrs. Zella Kimbrough, 38, who died in the City County Hospital in Ranger late Wednesday afternoon of burns sustained the night before, were conducted from the Patterson Funeral Home in Ranger Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Services at the funeral home were conducted by Rev. David M. Phillips, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ranger. Burial was in the Eastland cemetery.

Serbian Sources Claim 300,000 Serbs Executed

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Yugoslav Refugee Government today was said to have received detailed reports from Serbian Orthodox Church sources stating that more than 300,000 Serbs have been executed since the German-Italian attack upon Yugoslavia.

Josef Stalin of Russia promised the world by radio today that a coalition of the Soviet Union, Great Britain and the United States would conquer Adolf Hitler of Germany, but he called upon his allies to exert the utmost effort and urged the utmost speed in providing war machines for the Red Army and in opening up a second fighting front.

The coalition of Russia with the United States and Britain can be described "with certainty as a reality" Stalin asserted in asking who would doubt that the two great Democratic countries would give their "full support" to a fight against the Axis.

As Stalin spoke from embattled Moscow the Red Army was reported counterattacking on isolated sectors of Leningrad, Moscow and the Donets Front and to be standing off the Axis armies all along the line with the possible exception of the Crimea. There the Germans said they were bombarding the naval base of Sevastopol with artillery.

Earlier Stalin had named Maxim Litvinov as Ambassador to the United States.

The Germans, Stalin asserted, have lost 4,500,000 Axis troops, including the killed, wounded and prisoners, while the Russian losses have been a total of 1,748,000 men.

New License Law For Drivers Is In Effect Now

The teeth of Texas' new model drivers' license law began to tatter at their first pressure Monday. At that time brand new and stiff examinations were started for unlicensed operators of all types.

But keep in mind these two things: Persons holding drivers' licenses now will not have to take examinations unless called because of bad records.

"There is plenty of time. The holders of even the lowest numbered licenses do not have to renew them until Dec. 31, 1941."

The drivers' license situation is complicated, but it lends itself to relatively simple solution by the individual.

Here is the procedure: If you have now a Texas drivers' license, look at the number. Nos. 1 to 450,000 may be renewed now must be by Dec. 31. Nos. 450,001 to 900,000 need not be renewed until March 31, 1942. Nos. 900,001 to 1,350,000 until June 30, 1942 and numbers over 1,350,000 until Nov. 1, 1942.

To keep from swamping the bureau at Austin, directors do not want all applications for renewal until three months before they expire.

Don't get excited about the expiration date printed on your license. The new law extends all such dates in keeping with the schedule above.

It will not be necessary to take an examination if you already have a license.

Men In Company 1 On Special Duty

Sunday at 9 o'clock the First and Second Battalions of the 142nd Infantry will go to Fort Worth for four days of demonstration work at Farrington Field. They will be camped at Sycamore Park. Company 1 is one of the four companies comprising the Third Battalion, which is under the command of Capt. Herschel Angus.

Sgt. F. H. Plamley of the company has been appointed as Moral Sergeant for the Third Battalion, and is also Public Relations Sergeant for the Battalion.

Four Are Killed In Virginia Hotel Fire

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Nov. 6.—Four persons were burned to death. 10 were rescued by firemen and 20 others fled in their night clothes early today when fire gutted the Monticello Hotel, one of the oldest buildings in the city.

Chemical Plant Is Wrecked By Blast Two Men are Dead

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 6.—A terrific explosion today wrecked a three story building at the Carbon and Carbide Chemical Corporation's Blaine Island plant, at which chemicals used in national defense are produced.

Hospital reports showed that at least two men had been killed and three had been injured.

More Vetch Being
Planted This Year

Eastland County farmers will plant the largest winter legume acreage on record for the county this fall, according to the county agent. Most of the legume acreage will be hairy winter vetch but some Austrian winter peas, sweet clover and bar clover will also be planted.

The vetch and other winter legumes will protect the soil from blowing and washing this winter and help build up the soil by adding

nitrogen and humus to it. Most of the vetch planted will be fertilized with superphosphate to stimulate growth. Among those planting winter legumes are Frank Robertson, Rising Star; A. W. Armstrong, Rising Star; A. A. Hyatt, Carbon; I. S. Echols and Blackwell Brothers, Gorman.

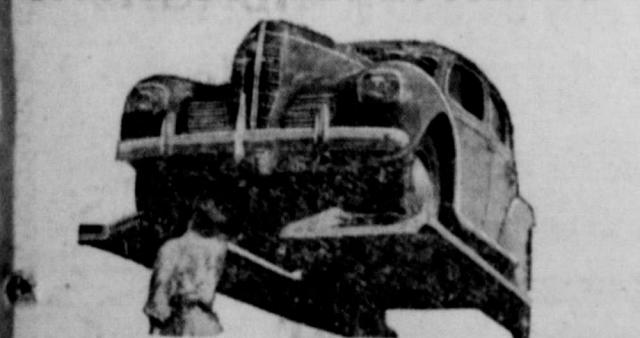

Industries Are Moving To Texas As A Safety Step

AUSTIN.—Industries coming to Texas to escape dangers of attack on the vulnerable eastern coasts are rapidly making the state a haven, believes Dr. Chester F. Lay, University of Texas professor of accounting and management.

Reporting on a survey of personnel activities in Texas, Dr. Lay set up a comparison with companies in the East. His results were based on 107 questions, under nine general classifications, returned from 162 personnel offices.

Texas companies give more attention to determining labor needs and also the retention of employees than do those of other states. Methods of training new employees, and wages are just as good; selection of employees and group negotiations are slightly lagging; and far behind are morale building schemes for employees.

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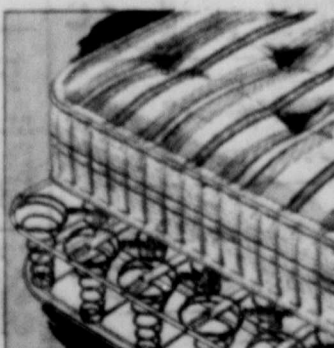
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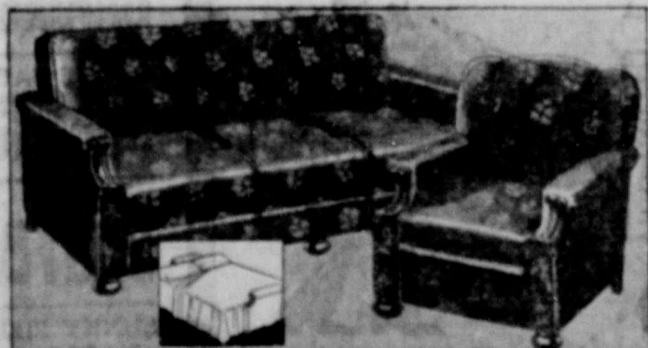
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
