WITH 35-16 VICTORY

Wolves Grasp District Crown

Colorado City Wolves, flashing bruising power to match a new 1960 spirit, knocked the wind out of Lamesa's Golden Tornado here Friday night, 35 to 16.

And, thus, they burst into the throne room of District 3-AAA football.

For the triumph — No. 3 against only 1 district defeat — assured the Wolves of at least a tie for the 1960 3-AAA championship.

Never behind, always in command of the situation, the young footballers of Coaches Sam Christy and Ken Kearns scored 3 touchdowns in the first half, added 2 more in the second.

All in all, it was a systematic walloping for the Tornado — a pre-season favorite with Sweetwater for the district title — and a booming testimony that the previous Wolves' week 26-24 victory over Sweetwater was the farthest thing from a fluke.

By all rights, the Friday night performance — the final in regular season play for Colorado City — climaxed a ragged climb for the Wolves.

Last fall they won only 1 game and were mired at the bottom of the 3-AAA heap. But this fall, under the new coaching leadership of Christy and Kearns, the Wolves began their climb — first with a new type of spirit and determination. They moved upward through a so-so non-district schedule, shook off the effects of a couple of heart-breaking squeaker losses, then surprised 3-AAA opponents.

Only a loss to Snyder, when illness knocked key players off their feet, marred their 3-AAA record.

Friday night against Lamesa — like it's been all season — it was a team victory again. Jerry McKay, Don Vest, Buddy Compton and Gary Lightfoot, provided most of the offensive fireworks.

But rugged linemen like Joe Weaver, Red Lemons, Jimmy Palmer, Bill Newell — along with Terry Doug Hodges and dependable Alex Campbell — were just as important and noticeable.

The victory placed C-City alone at the top of 3-AAA temporarily because Sweetwater and Snyder, the other 2 teams with only 1 defeat, still have another game each to play.

Sweetwater, 38 to 0 winner over Lake View Friday night, plays Lamesa (this week in its final) and Snyder takes on Lake View.

If Sweetwater and Snyder win in their final 3-AAA games, then they will share the championship with Colorado City. And a tip of the coin will decide who plays

Brownwood Lions in bi-district play.

If Snyder loses to Lake View, then Colorado City — although sharing the crown with Sweetwater — would move into bi-district play automatically because it defeated Sweetwater in regular season play.

And, if Lamesa should upset Sweetwater while Snyder defeats Lake View, then the Wolves would be co-champs with Snyder. But Snyder would move to bi-district by virtue of its win over the Wolves.

Discovery, More Locations Logged

New oil discovery for Mitchell County is El Cinco Production Co. Ltd. of Midland No. 1 Rhoda Thornton, 14 miles northwest of Westbrook Field and 9 miles northwest of Westbrook.

The discovery well pumped 60.71 barrels of oil from a section between 2,538 and 2,624 feet after acidizing with 1,000 gallons and fraced with 3,000 gallons.

A gas flow of 4,800 cubic feet accumulated and gas-oil ratio was 80-1.

Site is 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of Section 8, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Dean No. 1 Brennard well has been pumping during the week with no gauges reported after perforating the Clear Fork section between 2,353 and 2,727 feet.

The well, located 300 feet from south and east lines of Section 2, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey, was fraced with 20,000 lb. of acid and 100 pounds of sand and west lines of Section 11A

Thursday Meeting Looks To Business Development

Attendance Urged From All Firms

Colorado City business and professional men will look at themselves in the mirror, so to speak, Thursday night.

The occasion will be a unique "town hall" type meeting called by Colorado City Industrial Team Inc., starting at 7:30 p. m. in Civic House.

Every business in Colorado City is being urged to attend the meeting, according to Charles C. Thompson, president of Industrial Team and City National Bank.

Purpose of the community-wide event will be to appraise the business, industrial and economic condition of this community, appraise its potential and seek a unified manner of action to develop that potential.

A special attendance committee has been appointed to promote participation in the meeting. And individual businesses will be contacted by mail, by advertising and phone, and by individual citizens in behalf of the meeting.

"It is a bare-fact appraisal of what Colorado City now has, what it needs and what it must have for each of our businesses to prosper."

Eleven local citizens will appear on the town hall program, which will last less than 2 hours.

Thompson, the banker and Industrial Team president, will kickoff the meeting following invocation by Rev. Alan Conley, vicar of All Saints Episcopal Church.

Thompson will discuss the general conditions prevailing today in the community's business and industrial fields.

Frank H. Kelley, recently returned from conferences with economists studying the Southwest business picture, will discuss the "Economic Climate" for Colorado City and this area.

"Our Own Local Potential," as it adds up in dollars and cents, will be reported by District Attorney Eldon Mahon.

Another phase of the community appraisal will be by Dr. W. S. (Bill) Rhode, president of Lions, who will relate the various facilities and resources which Colorado City community has to offer industry.

"City and Farm Relations" will be the topic of Gus Chesney, City National Bank vice president. Chesney will point up the assets of both segments of the community and emphasize points for joint development.

Two new phases of local endeavor — Colorado City Museum, already established and open to the public, a proposed tourist attraction, "Frontier Town" — will be reported by Harry Ratliff, attorney, and Bob Reilly, insurance man.

An official of the Industrial Team, Bill Randle, will provide a report on the Team's work through the last year.

Concluding the program will be a brief discussion by Roy Bates, superintendent of Texas Electric Service Company's Morgan Creek Plant, on the type of industrial development foundation the community really desires.

First pulling dry land, \$1.50 per hundredweight; second pulling irrigated, \$1.50 per hundredweight.

Rates less than \$1.55 per hundredweight for pulling are not applicable to Mexican contract workers.

GINS' BALE PRODUCTION

County's Cotton Nearing 25,000

Mitchell County cotton ginning gained 5,000 bales in a week and now is climbing toward the 25,000 bale mark.

The county's 10 gins Thursday reported a total of 20,503 bales for the season — a ginning pace that's slightly ahead of 1959.

In the period from Nov. 3 to Nov. 10, the 10 gins turned out 4,679 bales of cotton. Colorado City gins produced 1,343 bales during the 7-day period while Lorraine gins turned out 1,619.

For the year, Lorraine gins have 7,859 bales and Colorado City gins have 4,665.

LETTER TO STATE

County Resolution Backs FM Project

State Highway Department will get a special resolution from Commissioners Court urging approval for a proposed farm-to-market highway south of Lorraine.

A group of citizens petitioned commissioners for the road — which would extend from Nolan County line west to State Highway 208 (Robert Lee).

Lorraine City Council also has gone on record favoring the project.

Now, Commissioners Court has approved a resolution recommending the road and asking the state to give priority to the project in its consideration of FM roads.

Here is the way the county resolution states the commissioners' support.

"Commissioners Court of Mitchell County certainly would appreciate any consideration that could be given for a Farm-to-Market road project in the Baumann community, approximately 4 miles south of Lorraine, beginning in Precinct 4 at the Nolan County line; thence west approximately 2 1/2 miles, intersecting FM Highway 644; thence west approximately 8 miles, intersecting with State Highway 208 in Precinct 1."

"Whereas, the Commissioners Court would recommend that this road be given consideration and would greatly benefit these communities in which it would serve, which would connect with other FM roads in Mitchell and Nolan counties, and is located in a good farming belt of dry land and irrigated farms, and would be a direct route to the new Champion Creek Lake."

"Whereas, the Commissioners Court, along with the many petitioners and the City Council of Lorraine, endorse this worthy project and do recommend this project be given priority in the next FM roads to be considered."

PETITION BEFORE COMMISSIONERS

Court Will Set Liquor Election Date Monday

Commissioners Court Monday will set the date for Colorado City's local option election on off-premises sale of alcoholic beverages.

And election day may be Saturday, Dec. 10.

Naturally, the date is only speculative, but Dec. 10 appears strategically on the calendar right in the middle of the 10-day period the voting must be held.

Petition for the local option election, confined to city limits of Colorado City, was filed with County Clerk Gilbert Leach Oct. 31.

The clerk's office revealed Saturday that the petition has met the prescribed requirements, so that means Commissioners Court must order a local option election.

On the petition were signatures of 469 bonafide and qualified citizens — more than 150 above the total necessary to require an election.

Petition signatures were obtained apparently on a systematic basis because a check by the clerk's office revealed not a single duplication of names.

All signatures 2 or 3, according to the clerk's office, met proper requirements according to poll tax and residency.

State law requires that Commissioners Court must set the election date not less than 30 days nor more than 60 days from the date of Monday's court meeting.

That means the election must be in the period from Oct. 13 to Dec. 14. And since Dec. 10 is the Saturday in the middle of that period, Dec. 10 looms as a likely election date.

However, Commissioners Court has not indicated in any manner what date it might consider. In fact, the question has not been placed before the commissioners and will not be placed there until Monday's meeting.

There always is the distinct possibility that Commissioners Court may select some week day for the balloting, instead of a Saturday.

But one thing for sure, the date must be between Dec. 4 and Wednesday, Dec. 14. And Dec. 4 is out for sure, since it is a Sunday.

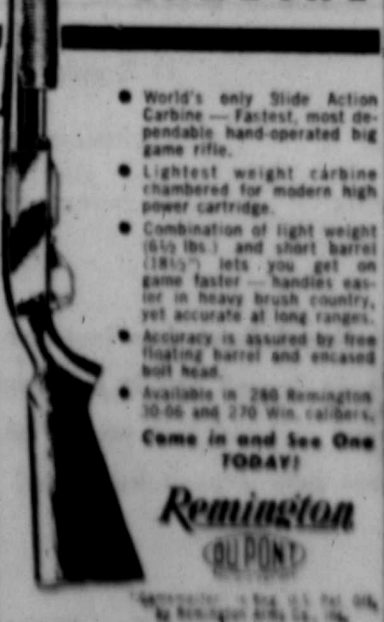
