Thoughts On Weather Season

Some thoughts about our current monsoon season:

— In giving tornado alerts last week, the radio announcers kept saying that the best cover to take during a twister was in a basement or under a workbench, etc.

Not once did they mention the best cover of all — a good, old-fashioned storm cellar.

Do they not know these exist? They exist in abundance in Clyde, Texas. One — on Hamby Rd. which has since been filled in, I think — became famous in the 1938 tornado. It was only about six feet square. Twenty-seven people crammed into it and were saved as the tornado passed overhead.

They laid the children on shelves along the walls.

— As it was pouring down in one of the heavy, general rains last week, the National Weather Service was forecasting a 100 per cent chance. Earlier in the day, when it wasn't raining, the NWS was forecasting only a 30 per cent chance of rain. Talk about an easy job. Maybe I should substitute the word "useless" for "easy".

— A few years ago I acquired the same type of rain gauge the Weather Bureau uses. I know why the bureau always reports less rain than anybody else. These gauges catch less rain.

In a good rain last week, I caught 1.48 inches in my "official" gauge. My next-door neighbor who has a little tube gauge, like the ones the bank gives away, caught 2 inches.

I don't know which one is correct but I'm getting tired of getting less rain than everybody else.

— I've got a male toy collie, Casey, who's plain nuts.

He's got a ritual he follows every time it comes a thunderstorm.

He takes his post underneath the lone plum tree in the back yard and every time it thunders, he jumps up and bites the limbs of the tree.

My study of his behavior leads me to believe he thinks the thunder is actually the little tree barking at him.

I can always tell how severe an overnight thunderstorm was by the number of limbs on the ground beneath the tree.

The twenty-two contributions total \$1,043. The Fire Department is still short of its goal, but with the generosity shown by the community, the project will be complete soon.

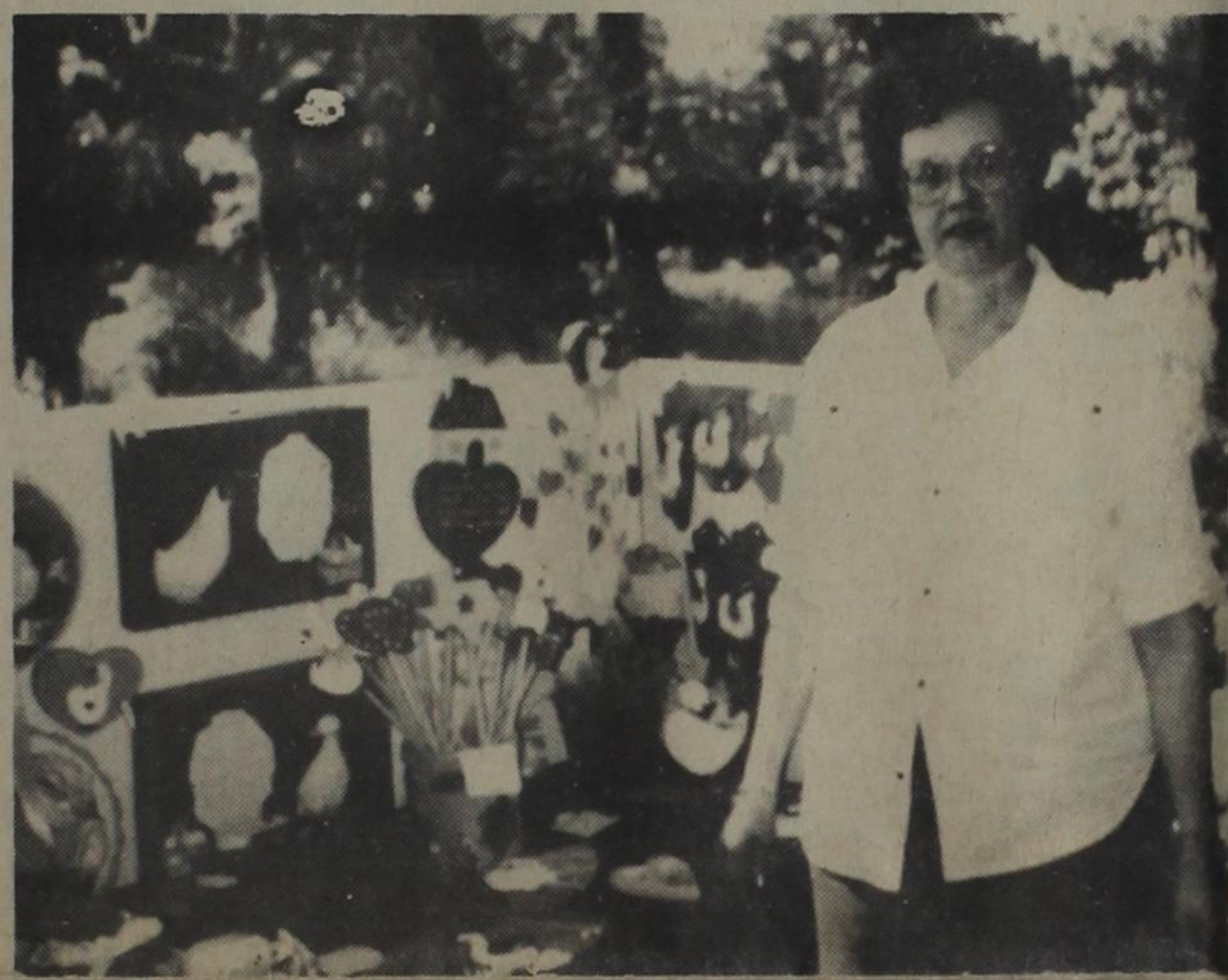
The Volunteers are very proud of the new unit and of the fact that Cross Plains is now well equipped for accidents.

Kerry Pointer Short By \$500

Kerry A. Pointer of Cross Plains will leave in July for a year's international adventure in Germany, one of 310 nationwide recipients of the prestigious Congress-Bundestag scholarship and a participant in the Youth For Understanding (YFU) International Exchange program. Kerry A. Pointer is a student at Cross Plains High School and the daughter of Margaret Pointer.

This scholarship program, now in its fifth year, is jointly sponsored by the United States Congress and the German Bundestag, and administered by YFU, one of the world's oldest and largest student exchange organizations.

Each fall every high school in the state has the opportunity to nominate two students, either sophomores or juniors, to be considered for the Congress-Bundestag scholarship competition. Finalists are selected from this field of top student nominees on a state-by-state basis.

While the 310 American students go to Germany for the year, an equal number of German high school students come to the United States as participants in the Parliamentary Patenschafts Program, a reciprocal one-year home-stay and study program.

Mid-year the American students will travel to Berlin and at the end of their stay in Germany, they are hosted at a

Henry Robertson, the next door neighbor, reported seeing a dish towel stained with blood on the floor near her bed and more drops of blood along the floor.

The neighbors had heard no noises during the night of the mishap.

Era Witt will be remembered as a resident of Colonial Oaks Nursing Home for a period of recuperation.

Monday was the first day of Buffalo Basketball Camp and fifty-nine students aging from 7 years to 11 years were ready to train.

Coach Bill McKinnerney, girl's high school basketball coach, and Jimmy Wren, boy's high school coach, were the instructors for the five day camp.

The basic fundamentals of the sport will be taught including shooting, dribbling, passing, and ball control. All the skills will prepare the players for either Pee Wee or Junior High basketball.

Everything was well disciplined, every child knowing to listen when the whistle was blown and hold the balls. The control was really amazing for that many children.

A lower net has been installed beneath the regular goals on the north and south side of the gym floor. These lower goals will be used in Pee Wee games next year. Students may pick up their report cards at the Principal's office, as final computations have been completed.

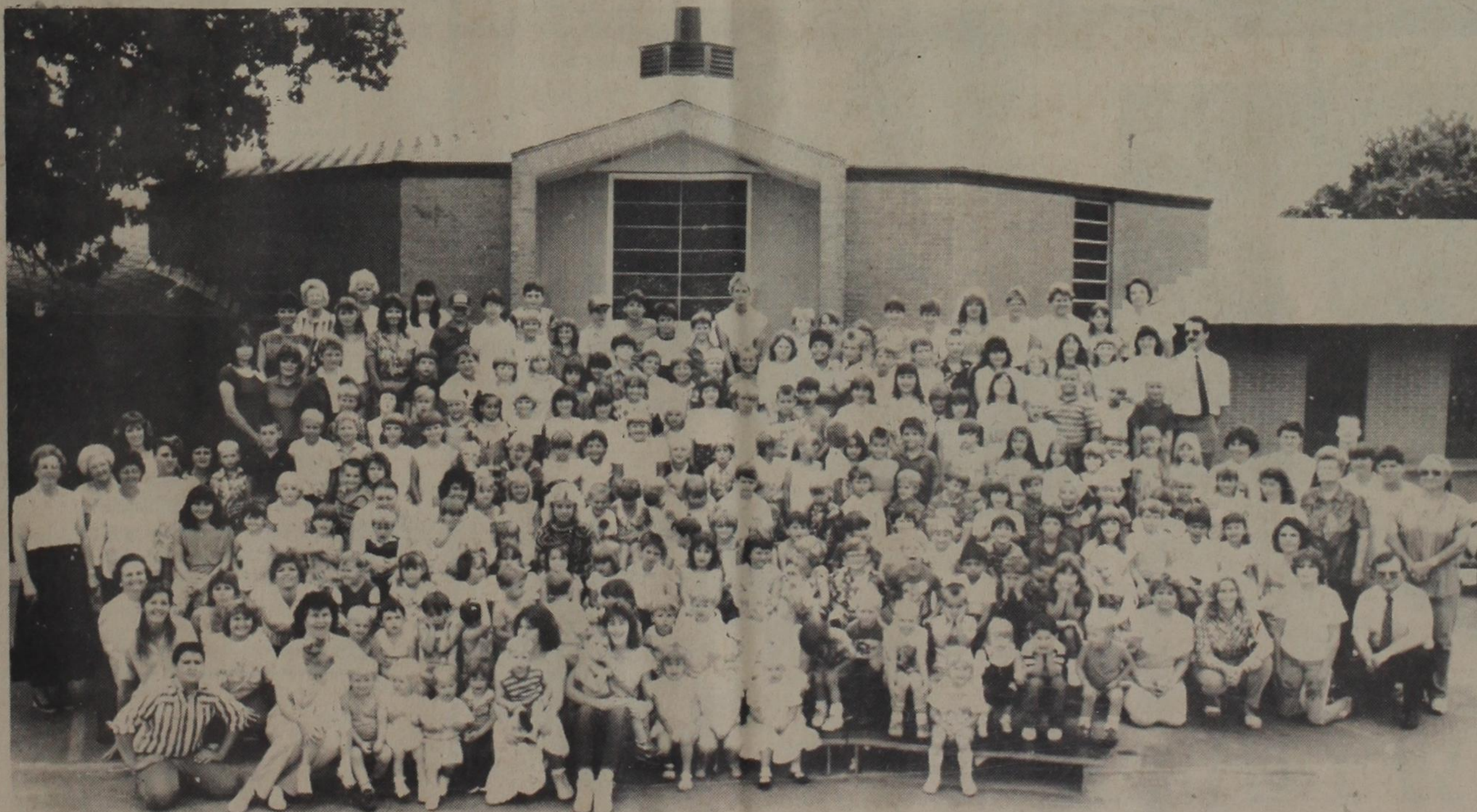
Exact Address On Storm Cellar

Employee Pregnancy/Employer Liability

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: An employee with our company is pregnant and has advised us that she must go on maternity leave beginning next month per her doctor's orders.

We are a small company and do not have any provisions for maternity leave. Are we obligated to hold her job open for her? We really cannot afford to have that position vacant for two or three months.

DEAR B.H.: If your company has no policy concerning maternity leave, then you are under no legal obligation to hold the employee's job open. You should be aware, however, that once the employee is released for work by her doctor, she will be eligible for unemployment benefits if you have no job for her to return to. If you think there may be some

comparable position available at the end of her "leave", you should advise her to at least check back with you when she is released by her doctor.

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: We hired a bookkeeper about six weeks ago and he is just not working out. This employee is basically a very pleasant person and he does try to do a good job, but frankly, I think he is in over his head. We

just need someone with more experience. If I terminate this person's employment, can he?

DEAR V.M.: Under the circumstances as you describe them, this employee would qualify for unemployment benefits.

An individual who has been fired can be disqualified from receiving benefits only if he was fired for work connected misconduct. INABILITY to perform a job to the employer's standards is NOT misconduct. For this reason, employers should make every effort to check an applicant's work history and skills prior to hire.

Although this employee would most likely qualify for benefits, you should be aware that your company might not be chargeable on the claim. In order for your

company to have chargeback liability, the employee must have worked for you during the first four of the last five completed calendar quarters prior to the date of the claim. For example, let us say you hired the gentleman in February of 1987 (1st quarter) and terminated his services at the end of May (2nd quarter). If he files a claim in June (2nd quarter), your company will have no chargeback liability. If he files a claim in July (3rd quarter), your company will have chargeback liability.

Clara Nell Spencer, President of the board, reported on the Regional Council meeting that she attended on May 19. The program given at the meeting was titled "New Beginning: Adolescent Pregnancy Support." The primary purpose of the program was prevention of child abuse and neglect.

Statistics reveal that teen parents are 100 times more likely to abuse and neglect their children than the average population. The program objectives were to help each expectant teenager have a successful pregnancy, prepare them for parenting and improving family relationships, and increase responsibility for birth control and life planning.

The board voted on a contribution to be given in honor of Daniel Moore to go to the fund for the playground at the Methodist Church. The board wishes Daniel a speedy and successful recovery.

A worker's Social Security number is the key to his or her lifetime earnings record, and the worker keeps the same number throughout his or her working lifetime. Glyn Hammons, Social Security Manager in Abilene, said recently.

Anyone who finds that his or her Social Security number has been listed incorrectly — as, for example, on a W-2 form — should report this immediately to the employer, Hammons said. The Social Security office should also be notified so that the worker's Social Security records can be corrected.

All workers, especially those who change jobs fairly often, would do well to check their Social Security earnings record periodically, every 3 or so years. A free form for this purpose can be obtained from any Social Security office.

Yet, each year, thousands die needlessly because this country does not yet have an adequate trauma care system.

Hosted by Merlin Olsen, "Critical Minutes" is part of "Lifequest," a series of documentaries about today's compelling health issues — issues that affect millions of Americans each year.

To assure immediate and specialized treatment of injury victims, each state needs a complete trauma system capable of delivering the most advanced care. Yet, only 10% of America's communities have such a system.

In "Critical Minutes," medical authorities are interviewed about this serious gap in America's health care

system, a system that operates in the most technologically advanced nation in the world.

Donald Trunkey, M.D., Medical Advisor to "Critical Minutes" and chairman, Department of Surgery, Oregon Health Sciences University, Portland, states, "We have to have a system of care modeled after the firehouse. We pay firemen to stay in a firehouse 24 hours a day to save our property. Shouldn't we have the same system to take care of people?"

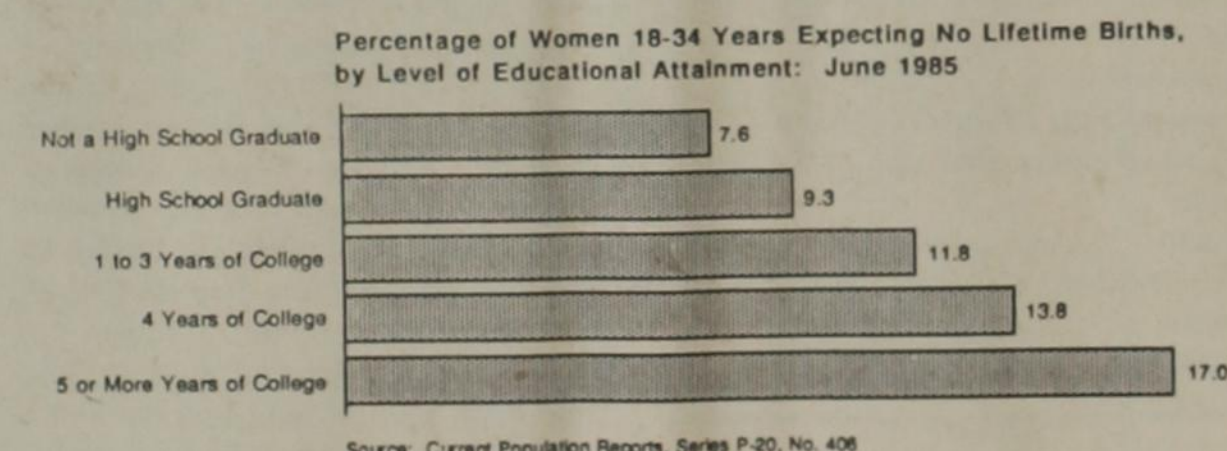
The labor force data will contribute to June's national labor force picture to be released July 2 by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The hail became so severe that they stopped along side an old deserted railway depot to watch the clouds. The funnel cloud was moving right toward them as they scampered out of the cars and into the abandoned structure. They reported that the funnel moved within about 200 yards of them, then right above them, before jumping the depot.

The men sighed a great relief thinking the worst was over. Actually it had just begun. People came to them begging for medical supplies and blankets. As they had been spared, the little town of Saragosa had not.

The group of men helped to look for victims and Richard Dolgener helped bring ambulance personnel in from the highway.

The injured and dead in the mass of debris was overwhelming to the men. They all experienced the real destruction a tornado can create.

I am sure the little town of Saragosa appreciated their assistance and compassion.
