No Ceilings to Be Placed On Cotton Wage In Area

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 29 (AP)—Lack of a majority vote by eligible West Texas cotton producers for setting of a wage ceiling for picking and pulling cotton has caused the Texas War Food Administration wage board to decline to recommend establishment of any ceiling to WFA Administrator Marvin Jones.

Acting board Chairman E. R. Alexander of Texas A. and M. College said that returns showed that of 33,227 eligible producers, about 40 per cent, or 14,741, have voted, of which number 13,643 favored the setting of ceilings.

Alexander explained that although nearly 93 per cent of the voting producers favored the proposal, the law requires that a majority of all cotton producers within an area request that action before the wage board can recommend the setting of ceilings to the administrator.

The board plans no further action on cotton wage ceilings, said Alexander.

Dawson County was among the counties seeking to set up wage ceilings.

The Odessa Bronchos blasted the Lamesa Tornado team there Friday night, 45-0, before a crowd of 5,000 fans. Backs Cook and Elmore sparked the touchdown parade for the first Odessa conference game this season.

Cook made the first tally for the Bronchos in a sustained drive early in the first quarter. The kick for extra point was wide. A few plays later, Cook intercepted a Lamesa pass on the 20-yard line, but Odessa fumbled on a lateral in the first play. Lamesa took the air, but a fumble resulted in Odessa's recovering the ball. Elmore raced 25 yards on a left guard run for a touchdown, which was nullified on an off-sides penalty.

Early in the second quarter, Bates made his second touchdown of the evening with a 23-yard run on the strong side. The kick for extra point was wide. Another Odessa drive for pay dirt was stopped cold on the three yard line when Lamesa punted out of danger.

Gamble intercepted Lamesa pass on his own 45 yard line and galloped to the goal line. Bates, kicked the extra point as the half ended. On the second play after recovering a fumble by Lamesa after the kick-off, Cook raced 42 yards for his third touchdown of the game. Odessa's final score came late in the game when Bates scored from his own one yard line after a Broncho drive. The kick for extra point was wide.

A New Shoe Stamp Will Be Good Nov. 1

Another shoe ration stamp will become valid November 1, the Rationing Division of the Office of Price Administration announced today. In addition, both of the currently valid shoe coupons—Airplane stamps 1 and 2 in War Ration Book III—will overlap the new stamp and will continue to be good indefinitely.

Early assurance that another stamp will be validated is being given so that the shoe trade can prepare its stocks, and to let customers know they can count on a new ration before winter.

Metal and Paper Collections Were Large In County

A report received from the Provisional Collection Battalion at Fort Bliss, by Buford J. Miller, 1st Lt. QMC., Commanding, gives the amount of scrap metal and salvage paper collections received from Dawson County during the recent campaign held here.

The report shows that 445,305 pounds of scrap metal was shipped via rail and truck from Dawson County, and that 38,070 pounds of salvage paper was shipped via truck to Big Spring from this county.

This collection of salvage materials was conducted by an army unit which was stationed in Lamesa during the latter part of August until September 9. The paper and metal were donated by citizens here, and were shipped on to mills to be converted into war materials.

Additional Details of Pfc. B. H. King's Death Received

Mr. and Mrs. C. J. King, who reside at 905 South Fifth Street, have received additional details concerning the death of their son, Pfc. B. H. King, who was reported killed in action in the Southwest Pacific Theatre of war on July 24. Pfc. King, a member of the Marine Corps since June 5, 1943, had been overseas since December. His brother, Sgt. Onial R. King, a member of the Special Service Unit now in France, has been overseas for the past 25 months.

The letter giving facts of Pfc. King's death was written by Chaplain Thomas Brody, to Mr. King and O. H. Tabor, local minister.

September 22, 1944

Dear Sir:

Your letter inquiring about Pfc. B. H. King reached me yesterday. In the absence of the Protestant Chaplain, who was wounded and evacuated, I am taking the liberty of sending you all available information.

Pfc. B. H. King was not attached to our regiment previous to our last operation. He joined us as a replacement during the Saipan engagement. I did not know him and I am afraid that the Protestant Chaplain had little time to make his acquaintance. However, the men tell me that he finished the Saipan engagement and was at Protestant Services during the rest period before going on to Tinian.

His company commander told me he was hit by enemy machine gun fire July 24th, the afternoon of the landing on Tinian Island. He was evacuated to the hospital on Saipan but died the same day. He was buried July 25 in the 4th Marine Division Cemetery on Saipan and for your information his grave is in Plot No. 6, Row 3, Grave No. 1076. A Chaplain was present each day for burial services because of the fact that both of us of the regiment were on Tinian Island. He was also given with the others full military honors.

His personal effects are probably with the organization he joined before coming to us. Regardless, these will be inventoried and sent home through official channels.

Please tell Mrs. King that even though we did not get to know her son that we regard him as a real Marine who will be missed by the officers and men. I know that this will not lessen the heartache of a Mother's love but you can assure her that while praying for her heroic son, we shall not forget the loved ones back home. Please extend my sympathies to her and the family on behalf of the officers and men of the 2nd Battalion.

Part of the 88th Infantry Division, first Selective Service Infantry division to enter combat on any front, the 349th piled up a total of 95 miles gained in 46 days of actual combat during the Fifth Army sweep up the Italian Peninsula.

Known as the "Kraut-Killers," composed of the 349th fought across some of the worst mountainous terrain to capture Fondi, key point in the vaunted Adolf Hitler Line, and protected the flank of the French Corps in its push across Mts. Ausoni and Ispini.

Highlights of the regiments action below Rome came at Maenza when one platoon ambushed an entire German armored company attempting to flee the town.

After driving through Rome, the 349th was pulled back for rest about mid-June. It returned to combat early in July, and after its envelopment of Volterra, it overcame stubborn enemy resistance in a smash to the south bank of the Arno River.

During the action, one of its toughest battles occurred after capture of Palaia and San Miniato, when a platoon of the 349th beat off eight German counterattacks of near battalion strength while holed up in a house at Calenzano.

Colonel J. B. Crawford, veteran of North Africa, Sicily, Salerno, and Anzio and holder of six decorations for bravery, commands the 349th Infantry Regiment.

L. B. Mahon, Who Has Four Bronze Stars, Promoted

AT AN OVERSEAS BASE OF THE AIR SERVICE COMMAND — Sgt. Lothen B. Mahon of Lamesa has been promoted to the rank of a Sergeant for his excellent work in the armament shop of an overseas Air Service Squadron, according to an announcement made recently.

Sgt. Mahon entered the service in November 1941 and received his basic training at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. He later attended the Armament School at Lowry Field, Denver, Colorado, and was then sent to Columbia, S. C., where he joined the Air Service Squadron that he is still with today.

Overseas for more than two years, Sgt. Mahon has four bronze stars in his campaign ribbon for his participation in the Algerian-Moroccan, Tunisian, Sicilian and Italian campaigns. Sgt. Mahon's work consists of the maintenance and repair of the guns, bombracks,

gunsight and ammunition of all the planes that the squadron is servicing. The efficiency that he has shown in his work merited his recent promotion.

Sgt. Mahon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Mahon of 212 North Houston Street in Lamesa. He formerly lived in Robert Lee, and was a graduate of Robert Lee High School, where he was active on the school's football team. Sgt. Mahon has no plans as to what he will do after the war except to be home with his folks in Lamesa.

Brother of Local Minister Is Cited for Heroic Action

O. H. Tabor of this city has had word that his brother, Sergeant Leon R. Tabor, who was reported missing in action June 24, and who it was later revealed was a prisoner of the Rumanian Government until being released when that country surrendered to the Allies, has recently been cited for heroism.

The announcement of his heroism came from an embarkation depot in Italy and stated: At one of the last get-together overseas for the more than 1000 American air force crewmen recently flown out of Rumanian interment, following the capitulation of that country, 18 of the enlisted men were awarded the highly regarded soldier's medal, for their part in rescuing fellow prisoners during a continuous 48 hour German retaliation air raid on their Bucharest prison camp.

The citation which accompanied each medal read as follows: "For heroism at great risk of life during the period from August 24 to August 26, 1944. Volunteering to evacuate wounded American flyers who had been interned in an enemy prison hospital in Rumania, these gallant men, during a intense and heavy bombardment and strafing attack lasting continuously for over forty-eight hours, carried wounded personnel to air-raid shelters and also carried medical supplies, bedding, good and clothing from blasted and burning buildings in order to insure the comfort and safety of the patients. Regardless of incessant sniping, strafing and bombing, these men with complete disregard for their own safety, were instrumental in saving the lives of countless American and allied wounded personnel. By their superb courage, valor, and devotion to duty, these men have upheld the highest traditions of the military service, thereby reflecting great credit upon themselves and the armed forces of the United States of America."

Among those listed was Sergeant Leon R. Tabor, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Tabor of Causey, New Mexico, who served as a tail gunner on a B-17 before being taken prisoner.
