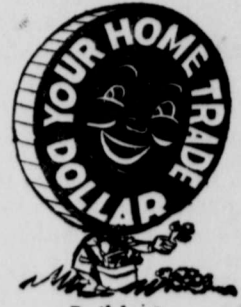


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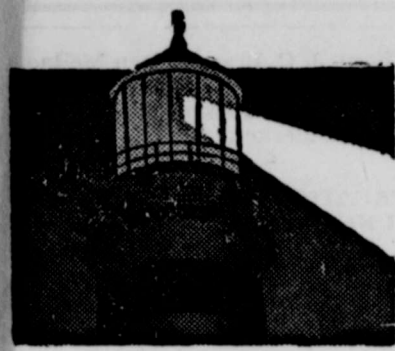

Civic responsibilities Every Citizen realizes I am sure that he or she owes something to his community in return for the privilege of living in it. Each citizen must determine for himself the length to which he will go in carrying out his responsibilities.

Paying taxes, being a member of a church, lodge or civic organization is not enough. If a man spends all of his time working for himself he misses a great deal. To perform a task that gives pleasure and benefit to the entire community is a very rewarding experience.

I would not suggest that any man neglect his personal business to perform a task for the community but I would suggest that you think about the matter carefully. A little time now and then spent on civic matters could make a lot of difference in your business. The public relations you gain in such activities will far outweigh the loss of time to your business, besides a great satisfaction in knowing you have done something for your community.

Doing something for one's community in most instances involves cooperating with others. Cooperation is what many of us individualists want to avoid. But getting right down to brass tacks you must know that cooperations of the citizens makes a lively progressive community. You must know that a lack of cooperation among citizens will make a community die.

One who spent nearly a half century in a business that is very exacting and depends on the cooperation of the community for its life would like to suggest, yea insist, that every man or woman in business in this community devote more time to public relations, cooperation, or whatever you call it. I know that before long you will observe that those who are not in business will cooperate with you better.

All doctors tell you to watch for Cancer's 7 danger signals: 1. Unusual bleeding or discharge. 2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.

3. A sore that does not heal. 4. Change in bowel or bladder habits.

5. Hoarseness or cough. 6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.

7. Change in a wart or mole. If a signal lasts longer than two weeks, consult a physician. Cancer starts and may spread without pain.

The best possible protection is to have a complete physical examination each year and to act promptly on Cancer's 7 danger signals.

As yet there is no cure for leukemia, but scientists have made it possible to extend the lives of many leukemia patients for months and even years. There is great hope for the future. More research is being supported by the American Cancer Society on leukemia than on any other form of cancer.

TEXAS GIRL, GOODWILL AMBASSADOR FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

A Texas girl will be one of the 53 physically disabled American young people to be chosen as goodwill ambassadors to Denmark on a unique three-week cultural and educational trip in late June and early July as guests of Danish official and voluntary agencies.

The announcement was made here today by George J. Zachariah, President of the Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc.

The invitation to the young people, who will represent every state in the Union, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, was extended yesterday in Washington, D. C., by Lord Urban Hansen of Copenhagen, on behalf of Danish agencies, officials and individuals who are sponsoring the trip.

Presentation was made to Miss Mary Switzer, Commissioner, U. S. Vocational Rehabilitation Administration and Sumner G. Whittier, Executive Director, National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, which is sponsoring the American phase of the journey. The Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc. is the state affiliate of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc.

Selection of the young traveler who will represent Texas in this unusual goodwill project will be under the supervision of a special selection committee of the Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults, the Easter Seal Society.

The group will meet in New York City on June 21, and leave that evening for Copenhagen via Scandinavian Airlines. Physical therapists and lay volunteers will accompany the group.

Library Week April 25 - May 1

AUSTIN, April 21, 1965—Governor John Connally urged all citizens "to avail themselves of the library facilities in every city and community" during Library Week in Texas, which he proclaimed for April 25-May 1, in a recent special ceremony in his office, Dr. B. O. Wood, San Angelo, State Chairman of Library Week in Texas, announced.

"The purpose of Library Week in Texas" Dr. Wood remarked, "is to encourage reading and library use and to urge concrete action resulting in better library service for all Texans."

The Texas observance, which is sponsored by Texas Library Association, is in conjunction with the National Library Week program which is supported by the National Book Committee, a non-profit educational group in cooperation with the American Library Association.

This year's theme is "Know What You're Talking About-Read", and "Open Your Future-Read", has been adopted as a subsidiary theme.

Governor Connally has placed special emphasis on library development in Texas as an "indispensable prerequisite to further cultural and economic growth." A message from Governor Connally, read to the more than 1,000 librarians attending the recent 52nd meeting of the Texas Library Association in Corpus Christi, pointed out the governor's awareness of inferior library services in many Texas cities.

Governor Connally said in part: "It is my belief that Texans are willing to do more about our inadequate libraries if a concentrated effort is made to make them aware of our plight. I am therefore calling Texas' first Governor's Conference on Libraries for March 23, 1966 in Austin."

"All that we seek for Texas must rest upon a base of excellence in education. Libraries, I believe, represent the touchstone of this education effort, and the reach for excellence must begin with your help and mine."

"I call on the Texas State Library, with the full and close cooperation of the Texas Library Association, to make preparation for this first Governor's Conference on Libraries in Texas," he concluded.

In Denison, Texas, Library Week will open with a special ceremony in the Denison Public Library Sunday afternoon (April 25). Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director and librarian, Texas State Library, will present a \$1,000 check to Miss Eloise Munson, chairman of the Denison Library Board in recognition of that li-

brary having earned a national honorable mention award (one of nine) in the annual Dorothy Canfield Fisher Library Awards Contest, sponsored by the Book-of-the-Month-Club, New York.

This is the fourth consecutive year for a Texas Library to receive national praise from the Public Library Association of the American Library Association, judges of the contest. No other southwest state has been so honored, Dr. Winfrey said.

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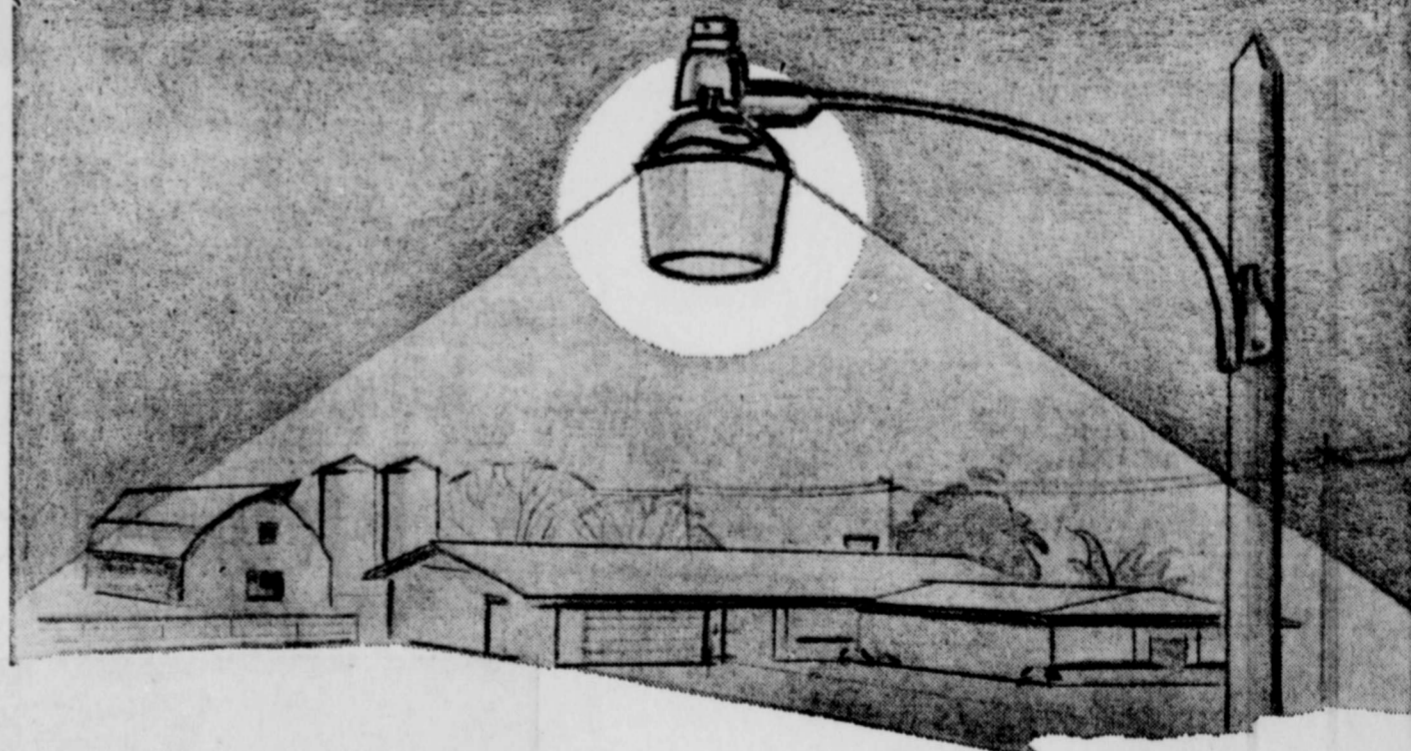

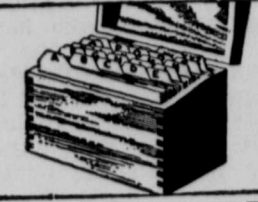

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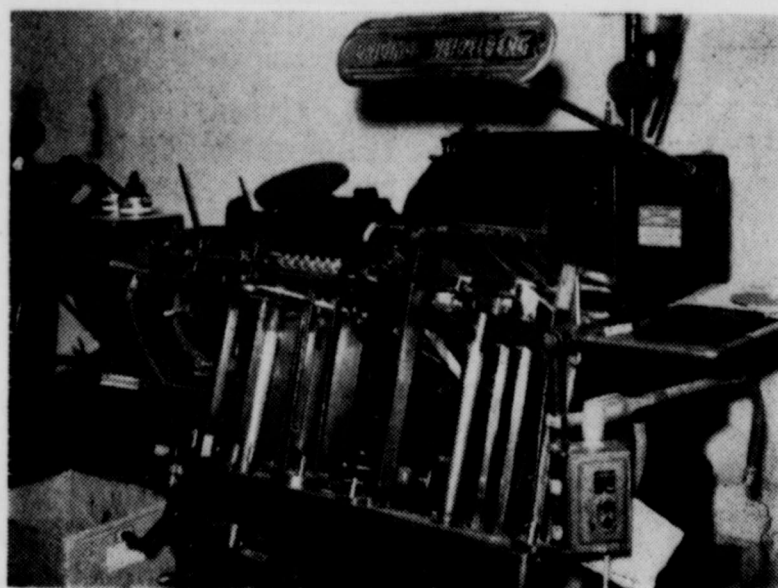

The next fall he worked at the South Plains Cotton Gin to earn tuition and expense money for return to college at West Texas State University at Canyon. There he was a varsity cheer leader and a member of the baseball team. As a senior he was elected one of the "five most popular men on the campus."

In four years of college work, he was graduated as a "Distinguished Military Graduate" and an outstanding senior student. He earned a BS degree in political science, which was designated as a pre-law major in government and history.

After graduation in 1957, Lt. Julian received officer training at Fort Knox and was sent to Germany with the 7th U. S. Cavalry, attached to the 3rd Infantry Division.

He served as a member of the Border Patrol unit between East and West Germany. He was active in Army marksmanship units, being captain of the 7th Cavalry pistol team and was 3rd Division director of the V Corps Le Clerks matches in Wildflecken, Germany. 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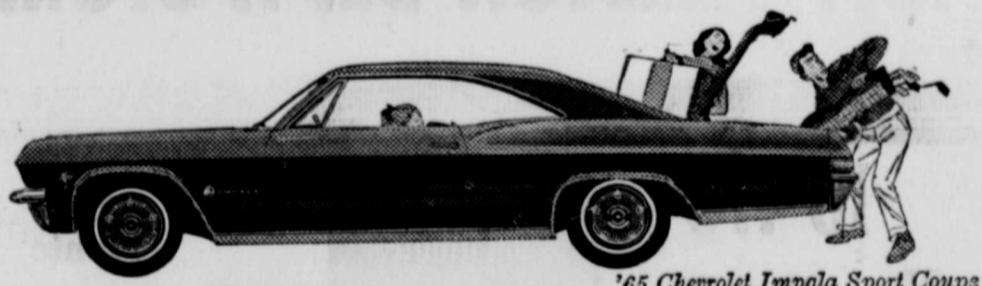
