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Alston Predicts Even Stronger Club Will Play In 1956 Series

Records Fall In Greatest Series of All

NEW YORK (AP)—Their long cherished dream finally a reality, the world champion Brooklyn Dodgers loomed today as the team which will represent the National League in the 1956 World Series.

Walton Alston, first of 20 managers dating back to 1890 to lead the Brooklyn club to a world title, modestly predicted his team would be even stronger next year than the one which whipped the New York Yankees in the series four games to three.

Better Pitching

"Improved pitching will make us stronger," the tall taciturn former Ohio school teacher said during a ball in the Dodgers' riotous victory celebration after their 2-0 triumph in the final game.

"Johnny Podres who was so superb in his two victories over the Yankees should develop into one of the game's greatest pitchers," Alston said. "He has all the stuff to make a great one and he may come into his own next year. Those world series victories should give him the necessary confidence."

"Then we have Karl Spooner, Roger Craig, Don Bessent and Sandy Koufax. All are young, strong and have shown tremendous promise. And remember, we still have our reliable such as Billy Lee, Clem Labine and others."

Alston did not mention such standout stickmen as Duke Snider, Roy Campanella, Gil Hodges and Carl Furillo. All undoubtedly will be at the old stand next year, including the aging but still brilliant Pee Wee Reese and Jackie Robinson. Junior Gilliam, Sandy Amoros, Don Hoak and Don Zimmer, representing the younger element, all figure prominently in the Dodgers' future plans.

All Assisted

There's no denying that all figured prominently in the great Dodger victory of 1955 climaxed by the pulse-pounding triumph at Yankee Stadium before 62,465 spectators.

Even the staunchest American League die-hards could not begrudge Brooklyn's finest hour as they watched the 23-year-old Podres become the first Brooklyn pitcher to win two games in a World Series. They saw the Dodgers make maximum use of their five hits and marveled at the brilliant Brooklyn defense that five times turned the Yankees back when it appeared they were about to break through.

At the finish, when Reese, the stonewall shortstop, threw out Elston Howard, the big park rocked with human emotion as the entire Dodger team raced out on the field to embrace the gritty young southpaw.

End Humiliation

In one blazing, thrill-packed afternoon, after four decades of trying, a Dodger team finally succeeded in winning a world title, and they won it from a team which had humiliated them in five previous series.

Never before had a team won a seven-game series after dropping the first two games. Another record that brought joy to the victors was the total net receipts of \$2,307,515.34, making it the richest World Series ever.

Brooklyn had to beat Tommy Byrne, the veteran southpaw who had given them a lot of trouble. They managed to drive him from the box in the sixth inning with the help of an error after scoring both runs off him.

The play of the game came in the sixth. The Yankees had runners on first and second with no one out when catcher Yogi Berra came up. Billy Martin had opened with a walk and had gone to second on Gil McDougald's surprise bunt single.

Berra lashed at an outside fast ball and sent it searing into the left field corner. It looked like a certain hit, possibly a ground-rule one-bounce double into the stands. Amoros, who had replaced Gilliam in left at the start of the inning when Junior moved in to play second base, was far over in left center for the left-handed hitting Berra.

Flashing a burst of speed, the little Latin-American outfielder caught up with the ball and caught it with an outstretched glove, about a foot or two from the stands. Then he whirled and pegged it to Reese, who threw to Hodges. McDougald, who had rounded second, was doubled up at first. After that, Hank Bauer grounded out, and nearly everybody in the park could sense that the Dodgers would not be denied their greatest hour.

Charlie Silvera has been a second string catcher for the Yankees since 1948 during which time he has played in less than 185 games.

"I think I can whip 'em seven times out of eight," Johnny Podres said yesterday after he had pitched the Brooklyn Dodgers to a seventh-game 2-0 victory which brought Flatbush its first world championship.

It was Podres who stopped Casey Stengel's naughty New Yorkers in the third game 8-3 after the Yankees had won the first two games. It was Podres who clinched the series yesterday with a crafty eight-hitter, cowing the big Yankee bats in the clutch.

Jackie Robinson Wants One More Year of Baseball

NEW YORK, (AP)—Jackie Robinson, generally recognized as baseball's greatest current competitor, said today he wants to play one more year with the Brooklyn Dodgers so he can realize his dream of rounding out a 10-year career in the major leagues.

The versatile veteran, still a dangerous batter and spectacular base runner despite the wear and tear of nearly 37 years, thinks he can be useful to the Dodgers for at least another year. He expected the Brooks to win the pennant again in 1956 and is anxious to play on another world championship club.

"I would love to play another year," he said yesterday during a lull in the clubhouse celebration proceedings after the Dodgers' World Series triumph over the Yankees. "It's up to the ball club, whatever they decide. If they want me, I'll play—but not for nothing. I feel that even though I didn't have one of my best years, I still have a little bit of good baseball left in me. As I said, I want to play provided they don't cut me to death. I am going to talk to Buzzie Bavasi, Dodger vice president tonight or tomorrow. I want to get this thing straightened out as soon as possible."

It Is Always More and More

FROM the day and time that our federal government inaugurated the "pride destroying" programs back in the early 1932 the clamor has been for more and more funds to carry out the programs of the "do-gooders" in our nation.

It first started with the federal government but later it branched out in the state governments.

Those programs were set up back in those days for an emergency that existed. Some four years later the emergency was almost gone but we have never gotten rid of those relief programs we inaugurated.

Today we continue to hear that clamor for more and more money to take care of more and more people.

And more and more money to take care of more and more people merely means more and more taxes to be paid by the American people.

It doesn't matter how plentiful work may be; it doesn't matter that the jobs are to be had for the asking; it doesn't matter that prosperity prevails in our nation, we see an increase in the constant demand for more funds by the welfare and other agencies.

For instance in our state the relief rolls have grown almost an average of 2000 each year since 1950. They have increased from some 32,400 to 42,700 from 1950 to 1955.

And during this period there has been tremendous increase in the cost of administering this program because of the so-called automatic pay increases.

So those advocating an increase in the funds and the great need that prevails here a good paying good at stake and the possibilities of an increase in pay if they get the funds. No wonder they are pushing it.

But sooner or later there must come a day when we restore pride to those who now feel the world owes them a living. Sooner or later we need to teach people as long as they are able and can find work it is up to them to provide for themselves.

Sooner or later we must destroy the situation we have created—that situation merely provides for taking care of people if they do not take care of themselves.

Everyone, we believe is willing to help and assist those aged people unable to work because of health and who do not have anyone to help them but they are tired of caring for able bodied individuals capable of making their own living which they would do if they had it to do.

uation personally, saying he would call out National Guard units only as a last resort.

The wounded in the shooting, stoning attack on the plant included three non-strikers inside the plant and five demonstrators outside.

None of them was believed seriously wounded.

Non-Strikers Shoot

Don Ballard, UAW regional publicity director, said he saw non-strikers firing on the crowd from an upstairs doorway. Ballard said he saw no shooting by the city police who were inside the plant with their chief, Clarence Justice.

Capt. Robert Dillon, who climbed onto a car top to urge the demonstrators to disperse, was hit on the head with a rock. He was not badly hurt.

Dillon warned the crowd that state police would be called in immediately unless the demonstration broke up.

At his side to plead for a dispersal was E. J. Kucela of Indianapolis, assistant regional UAW director.

Bricks Tossed

In spite of their pleas, hundreds of the demonstrators milled around the foundry, throwing bricks, stones and bottles.

The order mustering the state police force came from the office of Gov. George N. Craig, who is in Miami for the coming national convention of the American Legion.

Craig's executive secretary, Horace M. Coats, said, "we're hopeful and confident the disturbance can be quelled, and order restored without calling out the National

Guard." Handley added that he wouldn't call out guard units without consulting Craig.

Lothar Teeter, an assistant U. S. secretary of commerce, is a member of the board of directors of Perfect Circle, which makes piston rings. He resigned as board chairman when he took his job in Washington. His cousin, Ralph Teeter, is president and acting board chairman.

Three Plants Involved

Three other eastern Indiana plants, at Hagerstown and Richmond, also involved in the violent two-month-old strike, were quiet today. New Castle is 50 miles east of Indianapolis.

Union officials said the demonstrators gathered from all over Indiana but they insisted no official call had gone out.

Ballard said he "understood" the CIO had called a "one-day labor holiday in New Castle."

Several other industries in this city of 18,271 were virtually shut down. The Chrysler Corp. forge and machine plant, which employs 4,000 reported only 400 of the 1,500 day shift workers reported this morning.

The marching demonstrators hopelessly snarled traffic on the entire east side of the city. Cars were parked on most of the east side streets.

Woman Shot

Among the wounded was Ethel Roberts, 28, Greensboro, Ind., a non-striker at work in the foundry's inspection division. She and other non-strikers had reported for work before the huge demonstration started at midmorning.

She was shot in the hip by a bullet coming through a plant window. A ambulance later threatened its way through the crowd and

took her to a hospital, where she was reported to have suffered a compound leg fracture.

Also shot by glancing bullets coming into the plant were Kent Kern of Hagerstown, a supervisor and Bob Griffen of New Castle. Both suffered minor abdomen wounds. Griffen was wounded while standing in a doorway.

Among the demonstrators wounded in the exchange of shots were Paul Carper, 43, Anderson, and Henry Gibson both shot in both legs; Ross Drannon, 34, Anderson, and Robert Ford, 26, New Castle. All were reported in good condition.

Letters Key Riot

Striker anger began mounting yesterday when letters began arriving from Perfect Circle telling 35 workers they were fired for "improper conduct" during the bitter strike.

Among the dismissals were Carl Batchfield, UAW local president, and Sam Selke, local financial secretary.

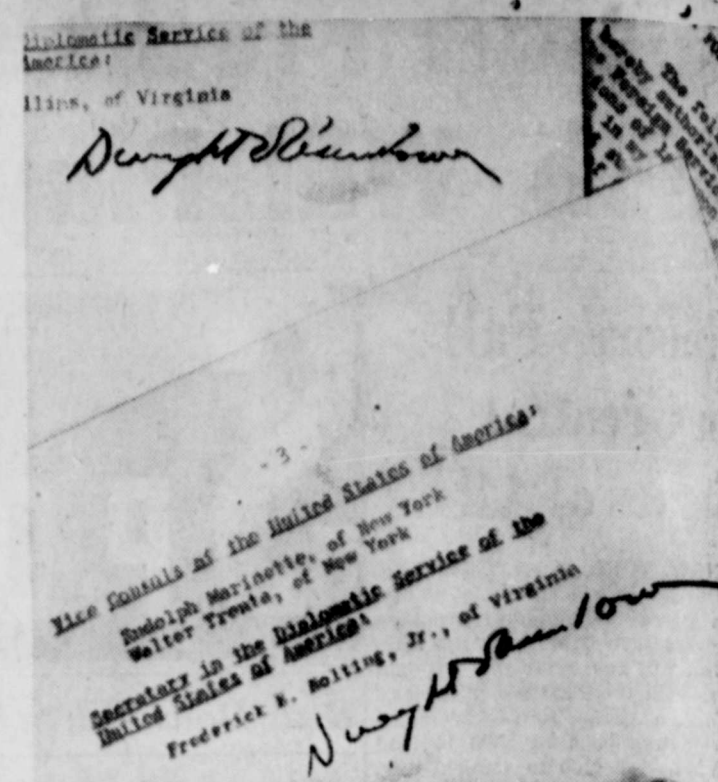
One of the biggest obstacles to a settlement of the strike, which started July 25, is the union's demand for a union shop and layoff pay.

The union demands a wage package amounting to 21 cents an hour. The company's last offer was an 11-cent raise. Old wage scales ranged from \$1.21 to "well over \$2."

Production has continued on a limited basis in the four plants most of the time since the strike began.

or's tax proposals yesterday. The fact that the houses brought the bills out to the light of day for the axing—rather than letting them die a pigeon hole death—was taken in some quarters to show the strength of the anti-tax sentiment in the legislative branch.

Wait on Senate

On other matters, barring unexpected drastic changes by the Senate in House-approved legislation, the legislature:

1. Appropriated one million dollars from the state general fund to the Welfare Department, along with a half million dollar loan with strings on it. The administration had asked \$2,800,000 and recommended use of tax increases instead of depleting the general fund reserve.

2. Approved \$236,000 to add 20 new state policemen. To the force, bringing the total authorized strength to 160 by July, 1957. The administration originally asked \$325,000.

3. Appropriated \$200,000 more to the State Finance Board's emergency fund. The administration had asked \$300,000.

4. Reversed itself from the regular 1955 session by passing property liens, relatives' responsibility and welfare publication laws, all asked by the administration. All

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Importance of Community Newspapers Being Stressed Nationally This Week

NEW YORK (AP)—Well, guess what? Darned if good old National Newspaper Week hasn't rolled around again.

And, as usual, caught us with our adjectives down.

The public, as usual, hasn't fired off any skyrockets. There have been no mass parades, no wide-spread excitement.

This is pretty much the way we hoped the populace would take the occasion. If no group has showed up to shower laurel wreaths upon us and ferry us twice around the town square in triumph, we are consoled by the more positive fact that no indignant subscriber, on the other hand, has marched upon us with the cry:

"Hang the editor."

So far as we have been able to find out from a careful check of the records, no editor ever has been hanged during National Newspaper Week.

One of the purposes of National Newspaper Week, of course, is to show that no editor really deserves hanging.

The other purpose is to emphasize the importance of a newspaper to a community.

There are all kinds of newspapers and they serve many purposes. At the worst a newspaper is a mirror of community smugness; at the best a newspaper is a community alarm clock.

A good newspaper works from a very simple standard. It alerts and informs the citizen about what is going on. If your daughter is graduated as valedictorian of her high school class, it will chronicle this event. It also will chronicle the fact, even though you are a leading advertiser, if you should run away from home with the strawberry blonde wife of the mayor.

Birth, marriage, life and death, crop failures, new buildings, visits, appearances in courts, all these are standard news items in every newspaper.

A good newspaper will go farther. It will chronicle the dreams and defeats of the community and its members. It won't wait for elected authorities to uncover and attack official wrongdoing. It it discovers wrongdoing, it will cry for remedy itself.

A good newspaper will reflect its community as it is, good or bad. It is the community conscience.

The truth about the average newspaperman is that he is a hurried man trying with all the energy and understanding he has to find out and tell what is going on in the most complex civilization the world has ever known.

October Is 'Typhoon Month' for Japan; Damage, Death Toll High

TOKYO, (AP)—Japan is the bull's eye at which from one to three dozen disastrous Pacific typhoons are aimed each year.

October is when most of them slam home.

When the typhoons rip into the densely populated Japan, thousands of houses are blown away, scores of persons are crushed by flying debris and drowned in flash floods, huge waves splinter fishing craft and thousands of acres of sorely needed rice plants are destroyed.

Damage from a single storm can top 100 million dollars.

Typhoon Louise, this year's most violent, took at least 42 lives last week during its rampage through southern Japan. Another 300 were injured. The storm's howling winds tore down a high-tension wire and started a fire that destroyed the center of Niigata, a city of a quarter million.

After Louise howled out to sea, nearly 300,000 persons were homeless.

On her way up "Typhoon Alley" from Guam, Louise also flattened the American base on historic Iwo Jima and took a pass at Okinawa, where the United States maintains a large garrison.

Typhoon Marge howled to a stop today on Japan's doorstep after

keeping 88 million Japanese on edge for days.

And new typhoons are brewing in the South Pacific, gathering steam for the charge to the north.

When full grown, Pacific typhoons are twisting horrors that whirl winds of 75 to 175 miles an hour around a hollow center. They cut paths as wide as 250 miles. They dump torrents of lashing rain—sometimes as much as a foot in a few hours.

Typhoons are called hurricanes in the Western Hemisphere. They act exactly alike and pack the same destructive power, with the edge, if any, probably going to the typhoon.

"Typhoon Alley" in the Pacific runs from Guam and the Philippines through the East China Sea, over Okinawa and up the Japanese island chain.

Some storms blow themselves out harmlessly over the ocean. But an average of three to six a year streak right up the island chain. They have plagued Japan for centuries.

Wrap sandwiches tightly in wax paper, then in a damp tea towel and store in the refrigerator. This treatment will keep them fresh-tasting.

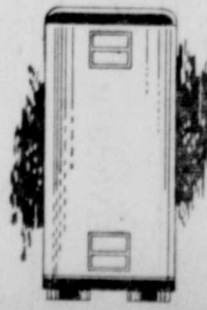

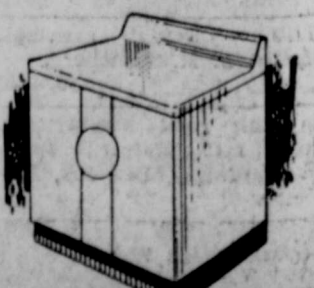
