Jury Deliberates Over Penalty In Assault Case Wife Held For Slaying Of Another Woman Friday

Two Shots From Pistol Fatal To Kentucky Woman

Alleged Murderess Tells
Police That Victim Was
Up Of Home.

CONDUCTOR GRABBED GUN FROM HER HAND

As Passengers In Day Coach
Of Train Scrambled For
Safety, Conductor Took
Pistol Away.

SOMERSET, Ky., Aug. 10.—Mrs. Leah Perkins, 27, of Whitley City, wife of a McGraw county, Kentucky circuit clerk, was in jail today after having shot a woman to death while she charged with breaking up her home.

Shortly after midnight this morning, Mrs. Perkins walked down side of a south bound Southern passenger train as it was passing Gerson near here, stopped behind a seat where her husband was talking with Miss Pearl Owens, 27, of Louisville, and fired twice killing Miss Owens instantly.

While passengers in the day coach scrambled for safety, Conductor Dan Demers snatched the pistol from Mrs. Perkins' hand before she had an opportunity to fire again.

Houston Storm Claims One Life

Exodus of Campers And
Tourists from Bay Shore
Following Disturbance Of
Friday Night.

HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 10.—A vicious windstorm, sweeping in from the north with a severe electrical display took heavy toll in the bay shore vicinity near here Friday night, exacting one life and causing an exodus of campers and tourists.

William Herbert Beasley, Jr., 8, year-old son of Dr. J. Herbert Beasley of Houston, was killed instantly when he was struck by lightning as he was attempting to lower a window in his parents' summer home at LaPorte.

As the mother carried the lad to a physician's office, the house was burned to the ground.

At Seabrook, a short distance from LaPorte, a trailer swept across the flats and unroofed a house and twisted the railroad station partially from its foundations.

Night crop and property damage from the storm was reported north of Houston. The wind blew down trees and telephone poles at Tomball, disrupting communication for a time and practically stopping traffic on the highways.

At Humble, a violent electrical storm, rain and wind were reported.

TESTS OUT PLANE

Non-Stop Flight To Nicaragua Planned

SCOTT FIELD, Ill., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Testing out a giant bi-motored monoplane in which he plans to fly to Nicaragua in ten days, Lieut. C. Frank Schell, marine aviator, arrived here from Washington today. His flying time was 8 hours and 30 minutes. He said the flight was uneventful except for a rain squall encountered over Illinois.

SELLING HOME FOLKS IS IMPORTANT, TOO

FIRST CAR FREIGHT OVER DENVER LINES

The Port Worth and Denver South Plains Railway company is already serving the South Plains area, and the first car of freight, a shipment of Chrysler Plymouth cars, billed to the Joe Hilton Company of this city, will be unloaded here today. The track has been completed from this city to Estelina for several weeks, but until this time neither freight nor passenger service had been announced.

Mr. Hilton was notified yesterday that his shipment of cars had been billed over the new road, and a representative of the company informed him that the car should arrive today. At this time the road has no unloading platform, and it will be necessary for Mr. Hilton to erect a temporary platform before the cars are moved. The railroad representative stated, however, that the company would "stand" the extra expense.

Just how long it will be before the Denver will announce complete service is not known, though Mr. Stevenson, representative, was of the opinion that it will be a matter of only a very few weeks.

Notification Of Hoover Will Be Celebrated Today

Mammoth Crowd Expected
To Attend Ceremony In
Hollywood Bowl; Speech
To Be Placed On Radio.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Aug. 10.—Awaiting formal notification tomorrow in this university's mammoth athletic bowl, Herbert Hoover celebrated the fifth anniversary of his birth today by applying himself a little more closely than usual to the task set for him by the Republican party in making his 1928 presidential standard bearer.

He was engaged in a round of conferences with Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican national committee, Senator George H. Moore of New Hampshire, and others high in party councils.

However, he laid aside these duties to be guest of newspaper correspondents at a birthday banquet.

Mr. Hoover began the day with a conference with Dr. Work, who arrived last night. For several hours the two studied reports brought west by Dr. Work. Mr. Hoover conferred with the New Hampshire senator over political conditions in the eastern states.

Work and Senator Moore were silent concerning their conferences with Hoover.

Governor Fisher predicted there would be no change in the political situation of Pennsylvania and the state would stand staunchly Republican in the forthcoming election.

Neither Hoover nor Moore would discuss the letter sent to the Republican nominee by Charles L. Burrill, Republican candidate for lieutenant-governor of Massachusetts, demanding resignation of Moore as eastern campaign manager.

TWO YOUTHS HELD

Charged As Delinquents
After Golf Ball Theft

Two of the four youths arrested by county officers Thursday on a charge of stealing a number of golf balls at the municipal golf course were still in jail yesterday afternoon facing charges of delinquency.

The other two boys were released for the present. Officers claim that the boys stole four dozen golf balls and were selling them about town at reduced prices. The youths now in jail will be released to their parents as soon as satisfactory arrangements are made, officers said.

SAFEGUARD NAVY

Coolidge To See Force Is
Not Reduced

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 10.—(AP)—President Coolidge does not intend to allow strength of the American army or navy to be tampered with or weakened because of the anti-war treaty now under negotiation with fourteen other nations.

He looks on the United States military establishment as moderate and designed exclusively for defensive purposes. The anti-war covenant binds signatory power to refrain specifically from attack upon each other and therefore in the opinion of the chief executive, has little connection with national defense.

TWO DIE IN CRASH

Forced Landing Cause Of
Accident

How the Stage Is Set For Sky Display

Meteors Due To Put
On Annual Display
Early Sunday

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The earth is about to keep its annual date with Perseids and anyone who cares to stay up until after midnight tonight has a good chance of getting an eyeful.

On that night, one is certain, according to the astronomers, to observe a brilliant shower of shooting stars. One can see meteors on other nights in the year, but the show put on by the Perseids is the biggest and most brilliant of all.

This year and that, they shoot almost horizontally.

It is also the most regular, for one may see it every year; as the earth passes through this cluster of meteoric fragments, revolving in space.

We have been passing through this area since the early part of July. The meteors are quite numerous from Aug. 5 to 15 and Aug. 10-13 always produces large numbers of flaming Perseids, especially after midnight.

Best After Midnight

But Captain C. S. Freeman, superintendent of the naval observatory here, says that the period of utmost intensity, with the biggest and most meteors will be between 2 and 3 o'clock on tomorrow morning.

After that, the earth will begin to edge out of the meteor belt.

These meteor showers, Captain Freeman explains, follow in about the same periods as comets. The Perseids shower comes just at the time the earth is crossing the orbit of Tuttle's comet of 1862, which we will not see again until 1908. These meteors form a closed ring or endless chain along the comet's path and the earth always finds them in its annual race.

The Perseids are meteoric fragments breaking off the comet cluster. As they strike the earth's atmosphere friction develops so much heat that they are generally entirely consumed before they hit the earth. Some of them, however, are too large to succumb to incandescence and reach the ground, whence they are unscathed and placed in museums. The remains prove to be some form of iron in most cases, though some have a rock base.

The flaming Perseids are to be seen in the northern sky.

Indications are, according to Captain Freeman, that they will be visible from most parts of the United States.

The most brilliant meteoric shower on record was that of Nov. 13, 1833. Hundreds of thousands of

Harmony Will Be Keystone of Meet For Smith Group

Singleness of Purpose And
Assurance of Peace Dominate
Air On Eve Of Austin Session

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 10.—Singleness of purpose and assurance of harmony dominated the attitude of early arrivals here today for Saturday's Democratic mass meeting of leaders planning an intensive campaign to carry the party solidly in Texas for the presidential ticket.

Mrs. H. H. Sevier, national committeewoman from Texas, said today that a statewide organization will be perfected Saturday to carry the campaign for a starlight ticket into every voting precinct and to concentrate on centers from which emanate the loudest threats of a "bolt" to Herbert Hoover, Republican nominee.

Mrs. Sevier, National Committee Chairman J. C. Adams and State Chairman D. W. Wilcox called the meeting.

AUGUST BIG MONTH

\$33,000 In Building Permits
Yesterday

That August will be a record month from the standpoint of building activity was indicated yesterday with the granting of two building permits here totalling \$32,000.

The month's total now stands at \$142,950 for the first ten days of the month. The year's total yesterday was boosted to \$2,312,218 for 463 permits. Thirty-four permits have been issued this month.

The largest permit granted yesterday was \$28,000 to Tom Jackson for the construction of a two-story brick veneer apartment house for W. A. Benson on block 34 lots 13 and 14 of the Old Town addition. The building will be 48x91 and will contain thirty-two rooms.

The other permit yesterday was \$5,000 to the Magnolia Petroleum company for the construction of a brick filling station.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 10.—Thirty-five persons were injured, several seriously, here tonight, when two Washington, Pa., interurban cars crashed head-on while passing over a trestle just after leaving downtown Pittsburgh. Reports that William Reiter, motorman of one of the cars, had been killed, proved erroneous, although he was seriously hurt.

The cars, one inbound and the other outbound, were heavily loaded with passengers. A mix up in signals was believed responsible for the accident, which crushed the forward parts of the two big cars.

Money training for children is more necessary now than it ever has been.

We have departed for good and all from the trade and barter system, where money was necessary for some but not for all things. Now we have left behind the good old days when butter and eggs were exchanged for coffee and sugar and a day's work was rewarded by a cast off suit or pair of shoes.

We cannot go to the woods for our fuel or the spring for our water. Indeed, we no longer get a free drink even out of the spigot.

What, then, can be more important than to teach growing boys and girls the value of money?

Sensible Spending
A savings bank on the mantel is a fine thing. It should have its regular diet of pennies and dimes slipped into its miserly mouth out of the week's allowance. But the savings bank is naive. It will not teach a child the fundamentals of wise spending, which is the true meaning of thrift.

Try to arrange giving a child a small weekly allowance. Better still allow him to do enough odd jobs about the house in keeping with his age and strength to earn the weekly allowance. Extra industry may be rewarded by extra earnings.

Have him take his pleasures and indulgences out of his weekly allowance, and be sure to make him keep within bounds. He even may be expected to pay his small obligations such as feed for his pet, or his little school supplies, out of what you give him.

He will soon learn that money won't go very far; he will learn that if he wishes one treat he will have to do without another. A valuable lesson! He will learn how to do without many small things so that he may buy a big one. Another good lesson.

Their Own Money
As to that savings bank: I should try to give it a pretty good character. Don't allow a boy or girl to feel that the nickels dropped into it are gone for good.

When it is opened once a year, and the clinky torrent rolls out, I should have a little talk. Perhaps there are fifteen dollars when it is counted. I should draw on his imagination and picture a great future if he has a little money in the bank. For the contents of the little bank can be deposited in the big bank. Some day perhaps three will be enough to send him away to college or to start him in business.

As a result, the next year he may drop his nickels in more eagerly. An incentive to save is invaluable. But in the meantime he should be learning how to handle money for himself.

Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Sliced watermelon, cereal cooked with figs, cream, broiled fresh fish, rye toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable salad, quick Packerhouse rolls with cheese, lemonade.

DINNER—Baked fresh mackerel, scalloped potatoes, buttered new turnips, raspberry delight, milk, coffee.

New turnips are unusually good cut in dice and parboiled for ten minutes, then cooked slowly in butter and a few tablespoons water until almost dry and tender. Sprinkle with minced parsley before serving.

Raspberry Delight
Two cups red raspberries, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup granulated sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, few grains salt, 2 cups milk, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 4 tablespoons powdered sugar.

Mix and sift sugar, flour and salt. Add yolks of eggs and mix thoroughly. Heat milk over hot water and slowly add to egg mixture, stirring constantly. Cook over hot water until thick and smooth, stirring to prevent lumping. Let cool and add vanilla. Turn into a baking dish. Cover with an even layer of berries. Beat whites of eggs until stiff, gradually blending in powdered sugar. Pile roughly over berries. Bake twelve minutes in a moderate oven to color and bake the meringue. The oven should be hotter at the top than at the bottom or the baking dish can be placed in a pan of cool water to the depth of the custard. Chill and serve.

THE HOLD-UP-1

When you become the declarer with a bid of no trump, your opponents try to establish their longer and strongest suit by forcing you to play the higher cards held by you in that suit.

If you hold only one stopper in the suit that is led, you immediately must determine whether you will take the trick on the first round or postpone taking it until some later round. This problem arises continually when the declarer is no trump and the importance of knowing whether to take the trick or to "hold up" cannot be stressed too strongly.

Assume that you are the declarer with a bid of no trump and examine the following illustration in which west leads the 6 of hearts:

Dummy holds: spades K J 7; hearts 9 5 4; diamonds J 10 9; clubs A 10 6 5.

Declarer holds: spades 10 9 5 4; hearts Q J 8; diamonds K 8 6 6; clubs K 2.

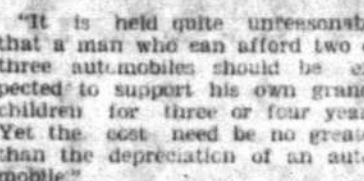
West holds: spades Q 3 2; hearts A 2 3; diamonds A 7 4; clubs Q J 7 4.

You immediately must determine whether to take the trick with the heart ace on the first round. Applying the rule of eleven, you learn that there are five cards higher than heart 6 held by the dummy, east and declarer. As dummy and declarer hold two of them, you know that east holds the remaining three.

You know that west is leading from his longest and strongest suit—that he holds at least four hearts. The dummy and declarer hold six hearts, making a total of ten. That makes it certain that east holds only three cards in that suit.

It is necessary to exhaust those three cards from east's hand to prevent your opponents from winning three tricks in hearts. If you take with the Ace of hearts on the first round, east will play that Queen of hearts as soon as he gets the lead. After that, east will play the Jack of hearts, west over-taking with the King of hearts. West will then win a trick with the 10 of hearts, giving your opponents three tricks in hearts.

On the other hand, if you hold up the Ace of hearts when the 6 of hearts is played, and also allow your opponents to take the next trick at hearts, you can prevent them from winning additional tricks in that suit by taking with your Ace of hearts on the third round, thus exhausting east's cards in that suit. You may now finesse safely from declarer's hand toward east, knowing that he cannot lead hearts back to west.

Grain Market Is Sent Falling By Federal Report

Wheat Touches Bottom, Becoming Cheapest Known Since 1924; Excited Selling Accompanies Break.

CHICAGO, Aug. 10. (P)—Every kind of grain crashed down today to below any price level heretofore known this year, with wheat becoming the cheapest known since 1924. Excited selling accompanied the general break in prices, which came as a direct result of the United States government crop report showing an unexpected big increase of 91,000,000 bushels over last month's official estimate of probable domestic wheat yield this season.

After a maximum setback of 3 5/8c a bushel, wheat closed unsettled, 3 1/2c to 3 c net lower, corn 3 5/8c to 2 7/8c off and oats 1 1/2c to 3/4c down.

Effects were intensified by news that the Liverpool wheat market had become demoralized owing to the American official report. Bearish sentiment as to what was given special impetus by word received today from Washington that Kansas in particular had a huge yield 179,944,000 bushels of wheat for that state alone.

With the exception of September all deliveries of corn established a new low-price record for the season. Heavy selling was induced by the government report which indicated 32,000,000 bushels greater production of corn than was looked for a month ago. On the other hand dispatches received late in the day told of the new corn crop firing because of excessive heat in South Dakota, Nebraska and Iowa.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK STOCKS.
NEW YORK, Aug. 10. (P)—Trading in today's stock market was unsettled by the marking up of the call money rate to 5 per cent, an increase in bankers' acceptance bids of 1/2-3/4 per cent for time money, and a break of more than four cents a bushel in wheat futures. With a few conspicuous exceptions, final quotations were generally lower, with numerous declines of 2 to 4 points. Chrysler was the outstanding feature, soaring 9 3/4 points to a new high record at 94 3/4 on a total turnover of nearly half a million shares, or approximately one fourth of the day's entire volume of business. Dodge Bros. issues, which are now convertible into Chrysler stock, recorded corresponding gains, the preferred jumping 10 1/2 points to 55 1/2, also a new top. General Motors ran into heavy selling, closing 1 7/8 points lower at 183 1/2 after having dipped to 181 1/4.

Call money renewed at 7 per cent, advanced to 7 1/2 and thence to 8 as banks called \$25,000,000 in loans to strengthen their position at the federal reserve bank.

DUN'S STATEMENT.
NEW YORK, Aug. 10. (P)—Dun's tomorrow will say: All commercial trends continue in the direction of a normal and seasonably active fall and winter trade. Although it is now the between seasons period, when it is customary to experience pronounced quietness in many mercantile and industrial lines, the uniformity with which improving conditions are reported by widely separated centers is a reassuring augury for autumn business. Sales of vacation specialties and other strictly seasonal commodities were sustained at an unusually high level by the recent hot weather in many parts of the country. That retailers generally are optimistically inclined is shown by the confidence with which they are placing orders for prompt and future delivery.

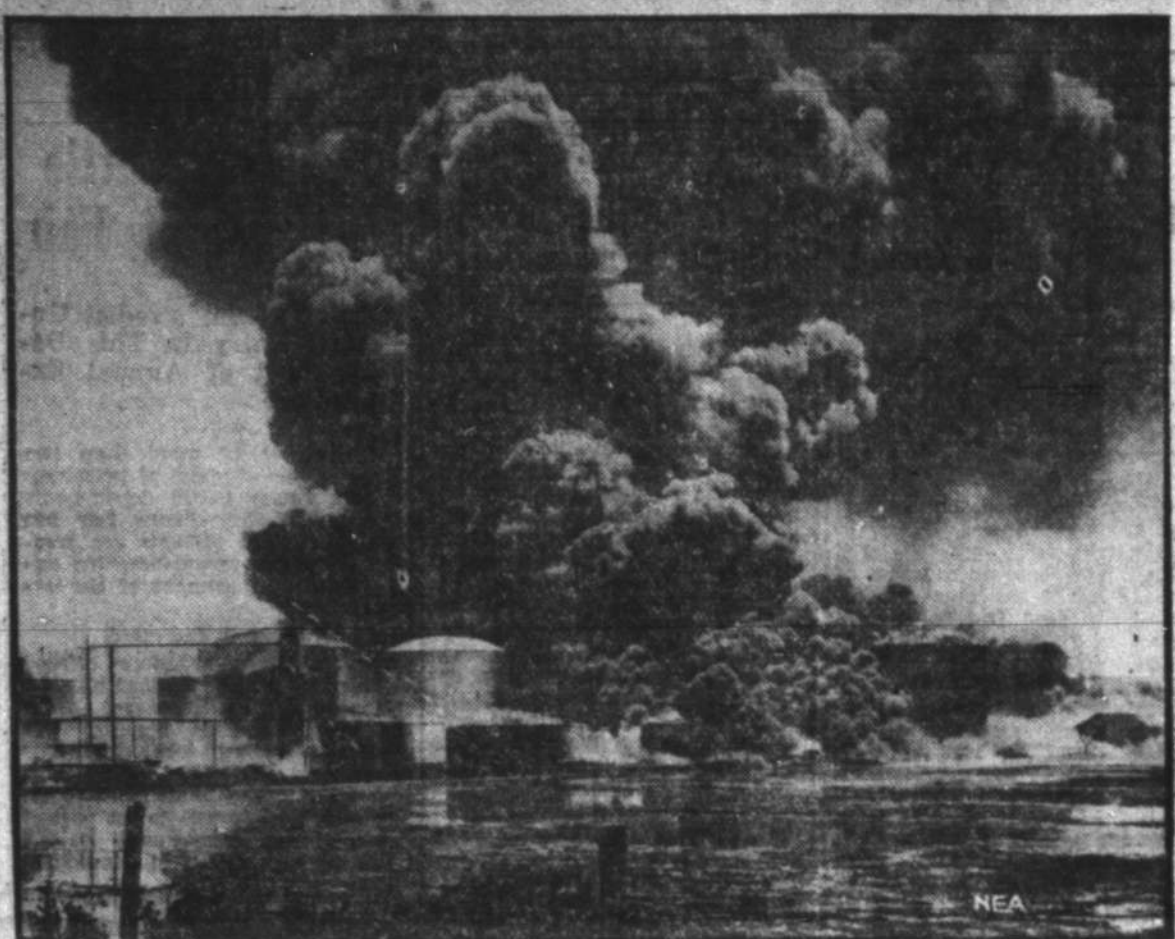

Science Learns How To Make Rain

Experiment Actually Done In Laboratory; Ultimately Possible In Open

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 10. (P)—

Science can now make it rain, but the experiment is still in the laboratory stage. Prof. C. T. Knipp of the University of Illinois, told the American Chemical Society institute at Northwestern University today.

"Ultimately, the work may be done in the open," Prof. Knipp declared, "but whether science will be able to go out into an arid country and produce rain at will is conjectural."

As a demonstration, Prof. Knipp performed an experiment in his laboratory. He took a vessel in which the air had been saturated with moisture—just short of precipitation. When he expanded the air, the moisture turned into fog. Then he introduced the presence of dust—by lighting a match stick near the retort and allowing the carbon smoke to filter in. Immediately, the fog turned into rain.

"If the rain over the city of Chicago were right at the saturation point," Prof. Knipp said, "and we wanted rain, all we would have to do would be to blow some of the city smoke into the air."

Du Pont added, "Governor Smith has proved himself an able executive, one who can be entrusted with the conduct of national affairs. As to prohibition, Du Pont continued: 'The really important issue before the country, that of maintaining intact our original form of government and the liberties of the people, is not dealt with in either party platform. The issue has been raised by the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution. Nine years of experiment have proved that prohibition does not protect the strong drink is still readily obtainable and the ill effects of its abuse remain with us.'"

WINDSOR, Ontario, Aug. 10. (AP)—More than a score of liquor warehouses along the Canadian side on the Detroit river were closed to night and their liquor stocks, estimated to be worth more than \$10,000,000, were held temporarily at least, by provincial police.

Seizures were made today after issuance of subpoenas naming thirty-six Ontario liquor exporters to appear in court to answer charges of violating the Ontario liquor laws.

DENIES LARCENY

Man Held For Embezzling Half Million

NEW YORK, Aug. 10. (AP)—After telling the district attorney he took money belonging to his employers with the intention of helping them rather than benefitting himself, Cornelius Cullahan, 28, pleaded not guilty today to grand larceny indictment.

He is charged with stealing almost \$500,000 from the Bancitly corporation, by which he was employed as assistant secretary, and was brought back today from Montreal where he was arrested.

WATER OVER FLORIDA

Vast Sheet of Water Left In Hurricane Wake

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 10. (AP)—A vast sheet of flood waters, 25 miles wide in places and of undetermined length, lay tonight in the everglades lowlands west of Fort Pierce and around the eastern and northern shores of Lake Okechobee as a result of torrential rains accompanying the West Indian hurricane.

Within the evanes were many marooned families, thousands of acres of fertile tilled lands, citrus groves and settlements. Definite news from many communities awaited recession of waters.

toward the Atlantic ocean.

Color and drenching rains caused minor damage to southern Georgia cities and towns. In Florida, extensive territory back of Fort Pierce and surrounding Lake Okechobee district was inundated, with families marooned and little direct news of Tuesday night's storm.

Citrus Industry Loses

Estimates of damage in Florida varied but the citrus industry was known to have suffered heavily in sections, especially in St. Lucie county where the Florida citrus exchange estimated a 90 per cent loss in grapefruit and 20 per cent in oranges. Around Kissimmee, inland some fifty miles from Fort Pierce, half the grapefruit was lost and oranges were damaged 30 per cent. Other points in the area reported citrus losses varying from 5 to 40 per cent.

Reports from outlying districts that four or five persons were killed remained unconfirmed, but nothing has been heard from a flying boat which left Nassau, Bahamas, Wednesday for Bimini, with two men aboard. Little hope was held for their safety although aviators said the plane may have sought shelter on some isolated island.

Search Marooned Party

A Palm Beach Red Cross unit today succeeded in reaching fifty marooned persons at Hull Groves, five miles west of Jupiter.

Thomasville, Valdosta, Moultrie, and smaller communities were the places affected by the blow last

night in Georgia.

Belen College Observatory in Havana, Cuba, reported that the second tropical disturbance, of considerable intensity, now central southeast of Jamaica, likely would confine itself to the Caribbean sea. The storm was moving west-northwest and it was not believed it would recede to the northeast and toward the American mainland.

two defendants during the closing hours of their trial when they heard the state demand the death penalty.

Bob McCampbell, defense attorney, told the jury death should not be the penalty where no life had been taken in the alleged offense. A. B. Haworth, of the defense, asserted Miss Bankhead in part assented to the commission of the crime by accompanying the defendants.

Tears filled the eyes of the jurors and many of the hearers as the district attorney pictured the alleged crime.

Evidence in the case was an almost exact repetition of that in the trial of Hazard. The state used the same witnesses and the defense again failed to introduce testimony.

Girl Takes Stand

Miss Velma Bankhead and her mother were placed on the stand today to complete the state's case. Appearing as a witness for the second time within four days, Miss Bankhead, withstood a rigid cross

examination as she told her story of the night of the alleged attack.

She recounted how Hazard and his two companions allegedly dragged her from an automobile and took her to a sand bar, there to attack her.

Mrs. Bankhead wept softly as she told of her daughter's return home on the night of July 21, when the offense was alleged to have been committed. She declared she heard occupants of the automobile from which her daughter was put out, threaten the girl.

shooting stars fell within two or three hours and the spectacle was witnessed generally throughout North America. Many persons thought that the end of the world had come and some of the observers compared the display to a celestial snowstorm.

How brilliant will be the August shower of this year cannot yet be determined. Sometimes it dazzles the whole heavens. Last year at least 40 large meteors were seen, traveling as fast in some cases as 30 or 40 miles a second.

Reach High Temperature

The velocity of the earth itself in 19 miles a second and Professor Newcomb figured out that the rise of temperature produced by the impact of our atmosphere with a perfectly stationary meteor would be some 600,000 degrees. But even the most solid metal must be burned up or volatilized with an immense evolution of light and heat

before such a temperature is obtained. Thus, we can see 50 to 100 miles away particles whose mass may not exceed a single grain.

Of the Perseids, Charles F. Oliver, astronomer at the Leander McCormick observatory and one of the greatest meteorologists says:

"Of all the annual showers they are most certain to return with average richness. Also, as they come in August, when the nights are still comfortably warm, they furnish the most excellent opportunity for a person casually interested in meteors to see a good shower. Many of the Perseids leave very bright and enduring trains which, being beautiful phenomena, add to the interest of those observing these meteors."

General Topic: The council at Jerusalem.
