ATTEMPTED BURGLARY

SAFE BLOWERS WRECK
TICKET OFFICE.

Attempt to Blow the Safe at
Union Station At An Early
Hour This Morning.

An attempt was made at about 3:45 o'clock this morning to blow the safe at the union depot ticket office. The work is evidently that of amateurs and it is thought that their efforts to open the big safe proved unavailing, but the full extent of the loss will not be known until the arrival of bloodhounds from Cameron, as the building is closely guarded and no one allowed to enter.

The safe can be seen from the outside of the building, but is in such a position that the extent of the damage to it cannot be ascertained. The knobs from the door and the dial are lying on the floor of the office, while the safe itself lies on one side near the west wall with the door in such a position that it cannot be seen from the outside of the building, and it is not known whether it was opened by the explosion or not. The force of the explosion was terrific. Every window in the ticket office with one exception was blown entirely out and fragments of glass are to be seen twenty or thirty feet from the building. A small wooden closet near the safe was demolished, as was also the cabinets in which the tickets are kept. One of the sidelights in the main waiting room was shattered and a large transom in the extreme east end of the building was blown out.

The noise of the explosion awakened many residents of the north side, but no investigation was made and the cause was not known until the employees arrived for the day's work. Lights were turned on in several residences near the depot, however, following the explosion, and this is thought to have frightened the burglars away, and it is believed that they never entered the office to see the results of their work.

The usual precautions were taken by the cracksmen to prevent being trailed by dogs, and large quantities of snuff and red pepper were scattered around both inside and outside the building.

The only clew so far discovered is a short piece of fuse picked up near the bridge this morning, but this will prove of little or no value in running down the criminals. Evidence which may be of some value will possibly be found inside the ticket office, but no one will be allowed to enter until it is ascertained whether or not bloodhounds can be secured.

The full extent of the damage to the building cannot be estimated, as it is not known whether the walls have been weakened by the force of the explosion or not. The cost of replacing the glass in the windows will probably amount to several hundred dollars, as they were of extra heavy quality and very large in size.

MORE EQUIPMENT.

Board of Managers of Department Make Purchase.

The Board of Managing Trustees of the Brady Water and Light Works last week closed a deal with the First National bank of Temple for a lot of machinery located on the Colorado river near Waldrip and will move it here to be used in improving the local water and light plant.

The new equipment consists of the following items:

One 72x16 125 horse power Atlas tubular boiler, with fittings.

One 14x20x17x15 Worthington compound pump.

One 125 horse power Warren-Webster water heater.

One 5 1-2x2 3-4x4 boiler feed pump, with connections.

This machinery was installed on the river several years ago for the purpose of irrigating a large tract of land, but was abandoned shortly afterwards, and has only been in actual use a few months. All of it is in first-class condition and it is said to be worth many times the price the trustees gave for it.

The purchase was made by the board in order to obtain possession of the boiler, it being badly needed at the city plant, as the one now in use has been giving considerable trouble for some time. The pump, heater and boiler feed pump will likely be disposed of, as none of them are needed at present, and it is thought that they can be sold for a sum sufficient to leave the boiler clear for the city.

J. W. Eatey has taken the contract to move all the machinery to the city, and left last Thursday for Waldrip to start the work. The big oil pull engine belonging to the county will be used to haul the machinery in and it is thought that they will reach the city the first of next week.

BETTER FARMING.

Texas Industrial Congress Will
Give \$10,000 in Prizes.

The work of the Texas Indus-
trial Congress for better farm-
ing in Texas will be continued
through its usual offer of \$10-
000 in gold for best results se-
cured, cost of production con-
sidered, during 1914 in yields of
corn, cotton, kaffir, milo, feter-
ita, cowpeas and peanuts. Classes
will also be provided in
live stock for the best results
in feeding steers, calves and
hogs. The conditions for the
live stock contest will be an-
nounced later. For the agricul-
tural products the classes will
be practically the same as in
former years.

Class A, open to everybody,
will be model demonstration
farms of four acres cultivated
in corn, cowpeas, cotton and
either kaffir, milo or feterita.

Class B will be for boys and
girls cultivating an acre in corn.
Class C will be limited to boys
and girls and will consist of
one acre cultivated in cotton.

Class D, open to everybody,
will be for one acre cultivated
in either kaffir, milo or feterita,
with or without irrigation.

RECEIVER APPOINTED.

Dallas Man Appointed to Take Charge of Affairs.

Dallas, Feb. 25.—S. W. King, Jr., president of the Dallas Cotton Exchange, was today appointed receiver for the Southern States Cotton corporation by Judge E. R. Meek in federal court. The receivership for the Alabama corporation was decided upon by Judge Meek at the close of a hearing in voluntary bankruptcy proceedings brought by four creditors who alleged they had unpaid claims aggregating \$2,000 against the corporation.

Judge Meek in making the appointment commented upon alleged use of funds of the corporation in dealing in cotton futures, and said in his opinion it was useless to proceed further owing to the fact that the matter seemed to indicate that the company was insolvent.

Officials of the corporation maintain that the corporation is entirely solvent and showed during the hearing that a large amount of cash is held in various banks to its credit.

The court decreed the corporation's answer, setting forth why it should not be declared bankrupt, must be filed by March 14, 1914.

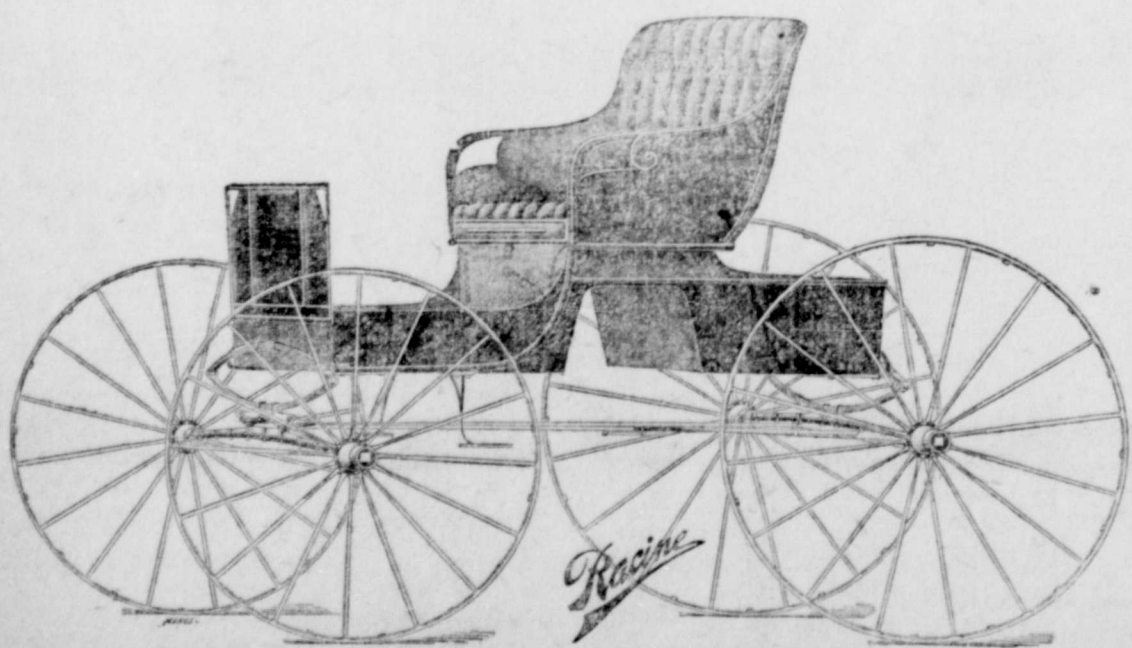
