New Concept In Christian Ministry Developed Here

The Cross Plains Community Christian Association ("CPCCA"), parent organization of the city's Christian Youth Center, has announced that Cross Plains has been chosen as the site for the development of a new concept in Christian ministry.

According to Rev. Pete Kennamer, pastor of the First United Methodist Church here and chairperson of the CPCCA, "the new ministry combines existing concepts of social ministry and military chaplaincy to create a new model of ministry, to be known as 'community chaplaincy,' which is a marriage of the principles of social work and pastoral care."

Rev. Kennamer explained that the community chaplaincy program, which will be headquartered in the building presently housing the CYC, located at the corner of 8th Street and Ave. D in Cross Plains, will minister to both the human and spiritual dimensions of persons residing within the CPCCA service area, which corresponds to the boundaries of the Cross Plains Independent School District. He stated that the CPCCA will seek to implement services to the physical, mental, social and economic needs of area residents while also seeking to reconcile to God all persons separated from their Creator, and to encourage all Christians to increase their commitment to Christ, to their church, and to their community.

Among the services being considered by the CPCCA are a Saturday movie matinee featuring G-rated films for children; a thrift shop and food bank, to be located in the basement of the CPCCA complex; supportive services for the elderly, including in-home care and a support group for widows and widowers; screening and referral assistance for persons seeking emergency health and human services; consumer credit counseling; conflict resolution services; personal growth and development workshops and seminars for youths and adults; pastoral counseling; theological

Bison Golf Team Takes 4th In State Tourney

Cross Plains High School claimed fourth place in state Class A golf tournament last week in the first ever trip to the state tournament for a Cross Plains squad.

The Buffaloes carded a two-day score of 727 strokes, out of the medals but a credible showing for the first trip in history to Austin.

Buffaloes were in third place after the first day's competition, but that 356 aggregate on the Lion's Golf Course ballooned to a 771 on the second day and allowed Rankin to come around the herd. Salado won the championship with a 701 net score, and Throckmorton was runner-up with

a 708. Rankin's 715 moved in front of Cross Plains' 727. Trailing in order were Booker 734, Overton 739, Lago Vista 787 and Ledonia 800.

Buff scoring for both days was listed by Coach Mitchell Atchley as Terrell Harris 92-86-179; Ronald Hilburn 86-95-181; David Grier 91-91-182, Alan Hilburn 86-100-186, and Conda Odom 101-99-200.

Coach Atchley said that the team members did a real good job overall. "In order to win in the stiff competition in the state tournament a team must have two real good, consistent days, not playing hot and cold."

Ex-Local Grad Guides Diboll To Girls State Track Title

Sylvia Graham, formerly of Cross Plains and daughter of Georgia Graham of this city, recently coached the Diboll Ladyjacks to the State Class AAA Girls State Track Championships.

Miss Graham, a 1971 graduate of Cross Plains High School, reported that the track and field UIL title was the first state championship of any kind for the

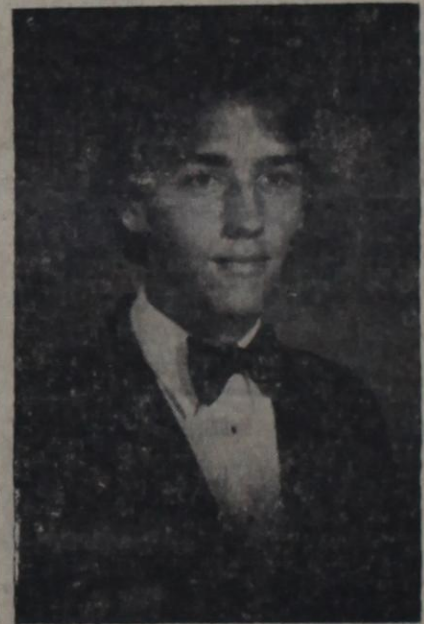
The following two poems were found in a book brought to the Review for use in this column. The first is entitled "The Preacher's Wife". There is one person in your church

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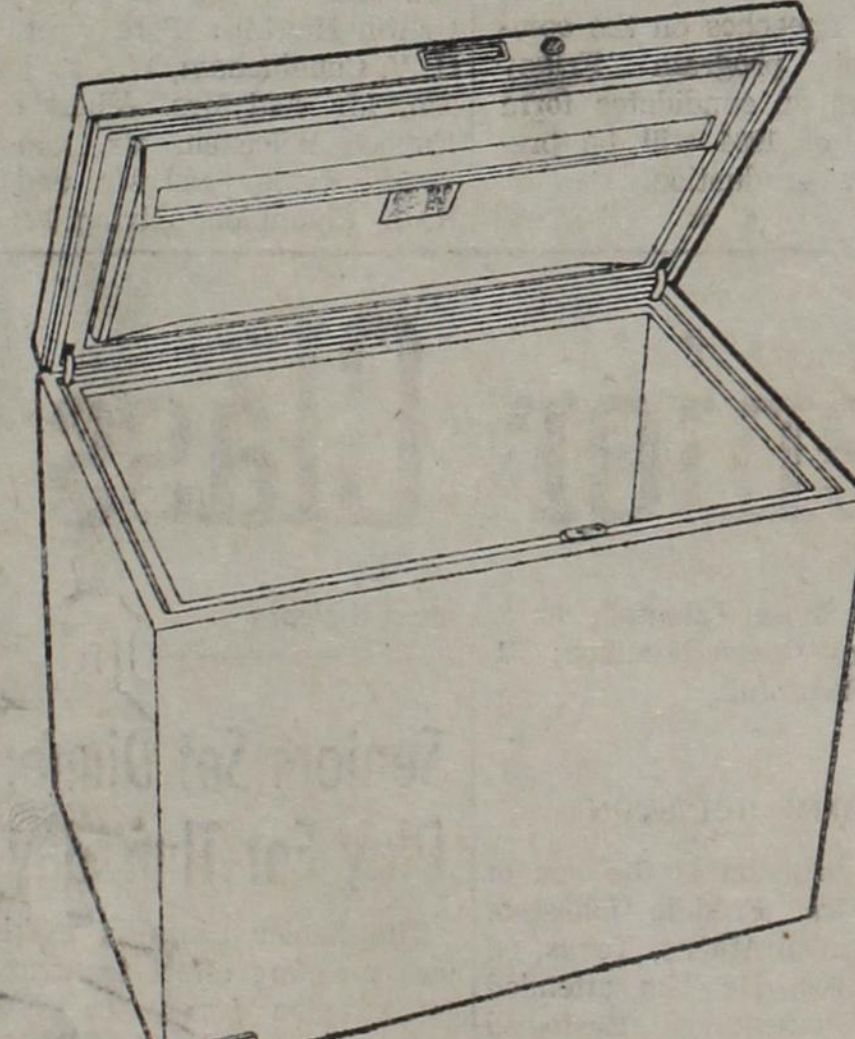

No Charge For S.S. Card, Earnings Data

No charge is made by Social Security to obtain a Social Security card or a record of your earnings, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security District manager in Abilene.

"Although various private companies advertise the availability of their assistance in such matters," Hammons said, "these services are provided by your Social Security office without a fee."

Anyone wanting a Social Security card for the first time must complete an application and submit original or certified documents establishing age, identity and citizenship or legal residence to the Social Security office. Applicants age 18 or older must apply in person.

Those wanting to change their names must submit the marriage certificate or other evidence attesting to the change. If a duplicate of a lost card is needed, only proof of identity is required. All documents submitted will be returned.

"A simple pre-addressed card requesting a record of earnings is available from all Social Security offices," he states. It may be annotated "QC" for a record of quarters of coverage or "estimate" for all ball park figures of what benefit you may expect," Hammons added.

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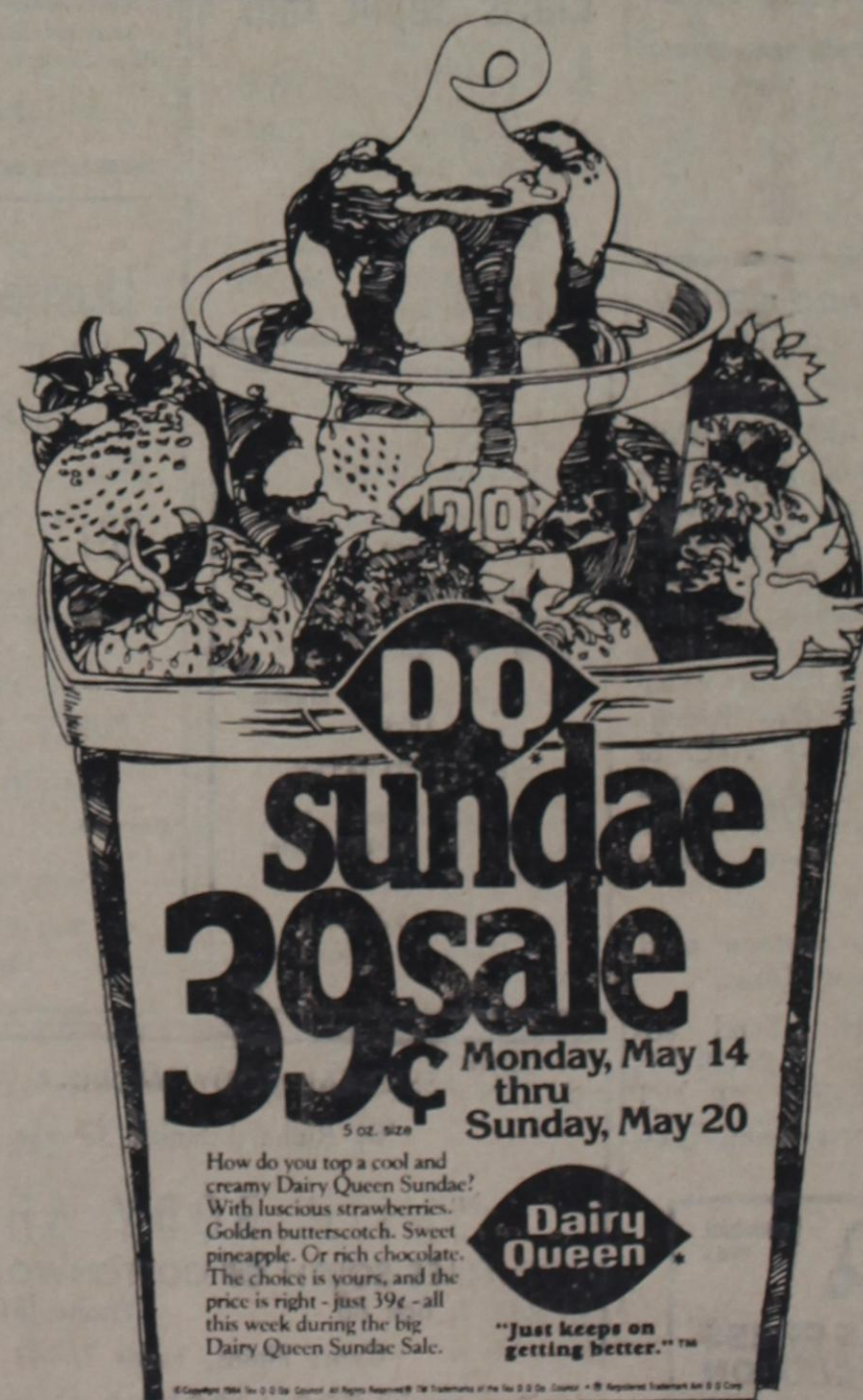

Surplus Food Hand Out Style Changed

Distribution for the Surplus Food Program will be somewhat different this quarter. The eligible families will sign up before the commodities are requested, and will be distributed at a later date. This is necessary because of the lack of cold storage facilities, says County Judge Mack Kniffen.

"The eligibility guidelines are the same as last quarter and you may sign up before June 1, 1984," said The Senior Citizens Centers in Baird, Clyde, Putnam and the Multi-Purpose Center in Cross Plains," the judge noted.

Eligibility guides range from 1-person household with \$6,318 yearly, \$527 monthly and \$123 weekly income to 10-person household at \$28,158 yearly, \$2,347 monthly and \$541 weekly income. Guidelines for a 5-person household at \$15,054 yearly, \$1,255 monthly and \$290 weekly.
