GIBSON DENIES MORGAN MURDER GUILT

NEGRO SAYS HE
WAS FORCED TO
ASSIST BENTONRUMORS OF MOB VIOLENCE
AT CROSBYTON DENIED;
CASE NEARS END

(Special To The Journal)
CROSBYTON, Mar. 25.—Son Gibson, negro, charged and on trial jointly here with Robert Benton, alias Robert Stanley, another negro, for the murder of H. E. (Bob) Morgan, prominent Dickens county farmer recently, corroborated from the witness stand this morning the testimony of Stanley of yesterday, saying that his every action in connection with the slaying of Morgan, to which the two are said to have confessed, was actuated by force and under threat of his life from Stanley.

Stanley had testified that he had forced Gibson at the point of a gun to participate with him in the slaying, and that Gibson was not responsible for his actions, whatever they might have been. The black, placed on the stand in his own defense by defense attorneys, was cool and deliberate in his examination and cross-examination by the district attorney.

Reports of threatened mob violence following Stanley's testimony were denied today, and it was the opinion of police officers that no such action is contemplated by the citizenship. Several other defense witnesses in addition to Gibson were examined by counsel at the morning session, and it was anticipated by court officials that testimony in the case would be completed late today, with arguments to begin Saturday morning.

It is expected here that the jury will be given the case before noon Sat-urday, and an early verdict is antici-pated.

Mr. Morgan was slain Monday, Feb-ruary 14 on his ranch seven or eight miles from Spur, across the line in Crosby county. His body was found by searching parties the following day, pierced by three bullets. Stanley was arrested by Fort Worth police, and taken from a train in the railroad yards there the night of February 15. He was brought back to the Lubbock county jail for safe keeping, where he was held pending trial on the charge of murder.

Gibson, his alleged accomplice, was arrested here, and was held in the Crosby county jail for arraignment.

Good Will Fliers On
Way French Guiana

PARA, Brazil, Mar. 25. (AP)—The United States army good will fliers homeward bound on their 26,000 mile jaunt covering Central and South America, left at eight o'clock this morning for Cayenne, French Guiana, a distance of about 500 miles.

An attempt to get away yesterday was unsuccessful when the San An-tonio was unable to leave the water. Commander Francisco de Pinedo, the Italian aviator, also resumed his flight this morning, leaving at 8 a. m. for Georgetown, British Guiana. From there he will fly to Curacao, off the Venezuelan coast.

Sapiro Counsel Is
Victorious In Tilt

DETROIT, Mar. 25. (AP)—Counsel for Aaron Sapiro in his \$1,000,000 libel suit against Henry Ford got from Wil-liam J. Cameron, editor of the Dear-borne Independent, admissions today that he wrote Mr. Ford's personal col-umn in that publication and that he and the motor car manufacturer had discussed the international banking ring.

The plaintiff's counsel seemed to be getting a little more leeway today in his interrogation of the witness, but when William Henry Gallagher sought to get too deeply in Cameron-Ford conference, the defense attorneys in-terposed objection after objection un-till finally they got in one which, as usual, caused the jury to be sent from the court room while they argued over the law governing the question.

AID TO FARMER
HURT HIM, SAIDCommerce Leader Tells Texas
Cotton Men How Federal
Help Was Hindrance

DALLAS, Texas, Mar. 25.—Dr. J. Parker Willis of New York, editor of the Journal of Commerce and profes-sor of banking at Columbia univer-sity, New York, told the 19th annual convention of the Texas Cotton association here Friday that efforts of the government to aid the farmer through artificial credit and other un-suitable methods have hindered rather than helped him.

He declared that these efforts have been in the main responsible for farm mortgages totalling hundreds of mil-lions of dollars which are subject to foreclosure in this country.

The convention was called to order by H. G. Stafford of Houston, first vice president in the absence of D. C. Reed of Austin, president, who was un-able to attend because of illness.

The business session this afternoon was active, only members of the as-sociation and the American cotton shippers association being admitted.

Another Good Well

SAN ANGELO, Mar. 25. (AP)—Winkler county today gave indications of attaining rank with Reagan, Upton, Crane and Pecos counties in heavy oil production through the drilling in its second well by the Gulf production company. Gulf's No. 1 Hendricks be-gan flowing Thursday at the rate of 397 barrels a day and increased during the night to 200 barrels hourly as the hole was deepened. It had dropped this morning to 125 barrels an hour.

The well was topped at 2,824 feet and was penetrated to 2,842.

COLLECTION OF
RAILWAY MONEY
DRAGGING HEREC. C. COMMITTEE TO OPEN
RIGHT-OF-WAY DRIVE
IN A FEW DAYS

While collections are slowly coming into the offices of the Lubbock Cham-ber of Commerce on delinquent sub-scriptions to the Denver railroad right-of-way, subscribed several months ago, definite steps toward securing the right-of-way for its line into this city are expected to be started by the railroad commit-tee of the Chamber of Commerce in the next few days, it was learned to-day.

The committee's actions have been held up since beginning of the recent collection drive pending receipt of in-formation as to the exact location of the route, and while some information in this connection has been re-ceived, other parts of the route are yet in doubt here.

NEW BUILDING
LAW IN EFFECTCommissioners Hear Last One
Of Three Readings Then
Adopt New Measure

The new building ordinance passed through final reading and adopted by the City Commission in regular ses-sion here Thursday afternoon, is largely a revision of the ordinance that has been in effect here for some time, but offers a few points that are of particular interest. The new ordinance was designed largely to clarify regu-lations in the old statute, and make them clearer.

Provisions of the new ordinance that at least are not clear in the old one include: a provision that no sheet iron building of any nature will be allowed inside the fire limits; that all brick flues must be lined with fire clay flue lining; that no structure which costs over \$50 can legally be started without the owner or contrac-tor first having secured a permit from proper authorities; that residences cannot be built closer than three feet to the property line on either side; that no brick wall in the fire limits can be less than twelve inches thick.

Famous Dry Agent
Resigns His Post

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25. (AP)—A. Bruce Bielaski, famous under cover agent of the prohibition department has resigned. Making a trip here from New York for the purpose Bielaski submitted his resignation today to Assistant Secretary Andrews, in-charge of day law enforcement. The date of his retirement has not been definitely determined.

Mr. Andrews said M. Bielaski re-signed for personal reasons and that his work had been exceedingly credit-able. Bielaski was attacked by sev-eral members of congress during the last session for his enforcement meth-ods.

Special Meeting Of
Legislators Is Set

AUSTIN, Mar. 25. (AP)—Governor Dan Moody today officially announced through W. E. Galloway, his secretary that a special session of the legisla-ture would be called to convene either April 25 or early in May.

The date will be made tentative un-till Moody can advise with legislators as to which would be preferable.

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May Bar Ferguson
From Senate Race

AUSTIN, Mar. 25. (AP)—Belief that the anti-annexity measure, when signed by Governor Dan Moody will bar former Governor James E. Ferguson, not only from holding a state office, but from the United States senate or any other office which expected here today by Senator Thomas B. Love, author of the measure.

Love, although he waited in Gov-ernor Moody's reception room, said he was not here to inquire about the progress of the anti-annexity bill but had come to Austin of private busi-ness.

Rumors that Ferguson intends to run for the United States senate have been persistent.

HEADS U. S. Forces
In Chinese WatersNAVY READY TO
FORCIBLY HALT
NATIVE ATTACK

SHANGHAI, Mar. 25.—Wanton de-struction, vandalism and outrages, per-petrated by uniformed Cantonese "rooms" in Nanking, are described in reports received tonight from the trouble-torn city on the Yangtze.

Approximately twenty Americans are yet unaccounted for. Thus far the only known American casualty is the death of Dr. J. E. Williams, of Shaw-nee, Ohio, a member of the Northern Presbyterian mission, and vice pres-ident of Nanking university.

Position Somewhat Easier

An ultimatum by the American and British naval commanders, backed by the grim muzzles of big guns trained on the Cantonese positions, has eased the perilous position of the foreigners, and the first of the 120 American mis-sionaries who took refuge in the uni-versity while yesterday's fighting was under way began arriving at the dock near warships early today.

American women were subjected to the greatest brutality during the anti-foreign rioting, the reports say, and in many cases their clothing was par-tially "orn off" by nationalistic soldiers in uniform.

All the official and personal prop-erty at the American consulate was looted or destroyed by uniformed na-tionalists.

BOMBING IS POSTPONED

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25. (AP)—Pre-parations for a bombardment by Amer-ican and British ships at Nanking has been postponed until tomorrow be-cause of a partial evacuation of the city by foreigners, which has been ef-fected.

Notice had been served on the Can-tonese commanders at Nanking that salient military points would be shelled unless immediate guarantees of safety of foreign life were furnished.

HOUSTON, Mar. 25. (AP)—Re-organi-zation of the entire state ranger force has started with requests for the re-signation of three members, R. L. Hol-bertson, state adjutant general, said to-day.

Captains J. M. Fox, at Marfa, D. E. Lindsey at Del Rio and R. C. Nichols, with headquar-ters at Marshall, have been asked to resign, Robertson said. Fox and Lindsey were appointees of the Per-guson administration.

Late George Sand And Her Amours To Be Aired In Court

PARIS, March 23.—A great woman and her amours are to furnish France with a topic of gossip similar to the recent sensational Gladstone libel trial in England.

Feminist literary and fashionable Paris is agog with anticipation. For reliable report has it that Madame Aurora Sand, granddaughter of the famed George Sand, the novelist, is instituting a suit against Jacques Boulenger, leading journalist and author, charging him with libeling her illustrious grandmother.

Madame Sand alleges that not only her own reputation was damaged by Boulenger's articles, but also the reputation of her grandmother, the late Madame Sand, maintained in England that his late father, "The Grand Old Man" of British politics, had been defamed.

A Parallel In the English incident, Captain Peter Wright wrote a paragraph in one of his books which presented the great moralist Prime Minister rather in the attitude of a woman chaser. The statesman's eldest son, Lord Gladstone, thereupon wrote Wright a smashing letter, whose object was to force him to sue for libel. Wright did so and lost the case, the evidence and the verdict of the jury completely vindicating the elder Gladstone.

In the French instance, Boulenger is alleged to have referred to "the first lovers" of George Sand. This is avowed by the grandchild, and means that the novelist was fickle and impulsive. The action is therefore, to be undertaken to defend George Sand's memory and protect the honor of the granddaughter.

If George Sand had led as rigid a life as Gladstone the cases would be parallel. But Sand was no saint. She was a great lover. Books have been written about her amours. Some of her own letters, which were carefully preserved by the novelist, have been published and clearly establish her affair with Alfred de Musset, the great French poet. It might seem, therefore, that the defendant has little to worry about.

French Courts But you can't tell what French courts will think. France allows greater license to its writers than any in the world. But the fact remains that such famous modern poets as Remy de Gourmont, Beranger and Jean Richepin and great novelists like Flaubert have been prosecuted by the state for writing books alleged to be offenses to public morals. And there is a law of 1881 which gives heirs the right to take judicial action if they consider that their own honor has been injured by attacks on their ancestors.

The heirs of George Sand have once before successfully invoked this statute. Thirteen years ago a French dramatist wrote a play based upon her amours with the famous de Musset, in his defense, the playwright cited the fact that Charles Maurras in his book, "Les Amants de Venise" ("The Lovers of Venice") had devoted its contents to this famous episode. But the judge ruled against him. He said Maurras' book was a work of literary and historic criticism and of psychological analysis. What was complained of in the play was that it was a work of imagination.

Of Royal Blood Sand, who was born in 1804 and died in 1876, had the royal blood of the house of Saxony in her veins. When she left her hard-drinking husband, she plunged into a liaison with the novelist Jules Sandeau. They broke

DANIELS TALKS OVER POLITICS

Ex-Cabinet Member Scores His
Party's Stand Thus Far On
Prohibition Question

(By Associated Press.)

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Mar. 25.—Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy under President Wilson in an interview here yesterday scored democratic leaders for talking side issues and ignoring the vital issues in preparing for the 1928 presidential campaign. The issues which find the campaigns of Tilden, Cleveland and Wilson are just as important today, he declared, as they were then.

Raps Boose Stand

"A democratic victory next year will be cast if the leaders are wise enough to concentrate on the major issues, and not short-sighted men who would be diverted to the rabid path of liquor. They are insulting the American people if they think for a moment they can make the issue an appetite for or against booze."

Mr. Daniels made no direct reference to any of the possible democratic presidential candidates.

"No one is alive today who will see the population amendment repealed," Mr. Daniels said. While he believed the election of a wet president "would undoubtedly have some moral effect" on the prohibition question, he asserted that "a wet president could not effect a repeal." "Congress will always be dry by a big majority," he said.

"Reform" His Platform
The platform for the democratic party to stand on next year is reform," Mr. Daniels said, adding: Republican oil padding, corruption in elections,

the party's treatment of the world war veterans, are all issues which the democratic party should take a decided stand on."

"The party," he asserted, "must show an honest hostility to tax reduction which benefits only a certain few and should come out in favor of a tax reduction program which benefits the majority."

Mr. Daniels criticized what he termed "secret tariff rates," and said there could be no improvement in agriculture until such rates were eliminated.

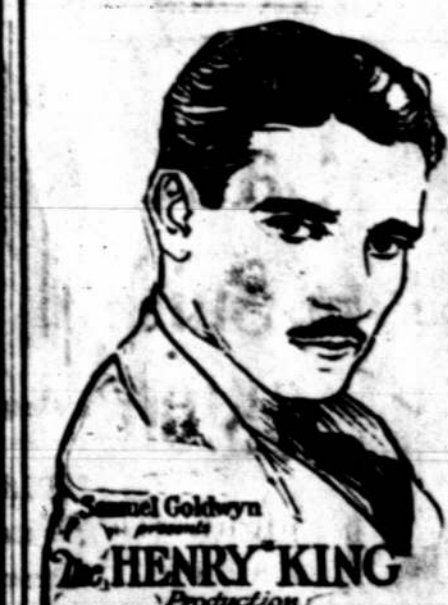

The Browns bombarded the St. Louis Browns for an 8 to 5 verdict at Tarpon Springs and the Giants pounded St. Augustine for an easy 13 to 4 victory.

However, the Yankees, however, ran second to the Boston Braves in a slug fest, 18 to 9, at St. Petersburg.

Manager Jack McCallister of the Cleveland Indians, was cheered with the news that George (Babe) Ruth, which he had chosen to hoist the ball.

Florida's Original Booster

Ponce de Leon is generally credited with having discovered the fountain of youth in Florida.

It was back in 1914, I believe, that Al Lange decided that a lot of major league ball clubs were making a serious mistake in leaving Florida as training quarters.

It so happened Al Lange had a close friend who went to college with Branch Rickey, who was then managing the St. Louis Browns. Between the two, Rickey was persuaded to bring his club to Florida.

There were no other clubs training in the state, making it impossible to book exhibition games and recover through them a portion of the training expenses.

St. Louis, while satisfied with the abundance of good weather, didn't care for the lack of gate receipts. It decided not to return.

Winning Pennant Helped Scheme

The late Pat Moran, managing the Philadelphia Nationals then, was persuaded to bring his club to Florida.

The Florida brand of weather that spring was ideal, other ball camps located in various sections, ran into cold and rain.

As a result, the Phillies came north far advanced as to condition and got away to a flying start. They continued to play consistently good ball throughout the season and surprised by winning the National League flag.

Eleven Clubs In Training

Their success made Florida—as a spring training state.

This year we find 11 of the 16 major league clubs getting into condition under a Florida sun. Next season, I understand the Chicago White Sox will join the big parade.

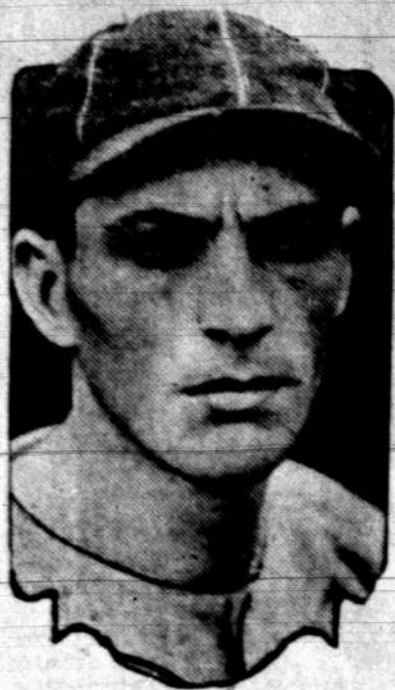
In addition, five other clubs from the International League and American Association are also doing business in the state, making 16 ball clubs in all.

"Our recruit pitchers are not really recruits, at all for they have been pitchers and good ones, in the minors before. Two of the best are Herb Pruett and Alex Ferguson. You won't find any one who will deny that Carlson is a great pitcher. There are some others in the bunch who will be made much better than they were."

"We have absolutely no catching worries. I do not know a club with two catchers as good as Wilson and Jonnard. The dirtied too, is all right. We have four experienced outfielders who can both hit and field, and either one of two young fellows we have will make a splendid quintet."

"Will I play? Certainly, some. How often depends on circumstances. I am told that Wrightstone has the making of a clever first baseman. I think I know a little something of how first base should be played, and I shall spend much time coaching him. He can hit for he has an average of .300 for seven years in the National league."

When it is necessary I will be out there.

"I confidently expect our club to be better than it was last year but that will not be enough. It must be much better. The other clubs have strengthened. As I see it now five clubs have a chance to win the pennant so it can easily be seen that we have our work cut out for us to 'make a showing.'"

"What we do I think, depends on what the boys want to do. If they hustle, and I believe they will, we will surprise the fellows who have tucked us away in the cellar before the season starts."

TARPOON SPRINGS, Fla., Mar. 25.—Pitching is the most uncertain feature of the "prospects" of the St. Louis Browns. To show improvement over last season's record, a better brand of twirling must be displayed.

Here are a few reasons why Manager Dan Howley is inclined to be optimistic:
Walter Stewart, the young southpaw secured from Toronto, during the past four years in the minors, one in the Southern and three in the International League, has averaged 22 victories a year.

During that period, the opposition has earned a trifle less than three runs per game. His greatest forte is control. Incidentally, he is a fine fielder.
Such a record is deserving of a thorough trial in the majors, thinks Howley. Stewart will get it.
Milton Gaston, one of the best right-handers in the American League, had a very poor season in 1926, winning only 10 ball games. A sore arm handicapped him greatly. Howley figures he should win at least five games more than last season.

Win Ballou, who has been threatening to make the grade for several years, seems ready to go over. He won 18 and lost 16 last season.
Tom Zachary, veteran southpaw, won 14 games last season. That he about as he should, Howley will be more than satisfied if he turns in 15 victories.

Vangilder, according to Manager Dan, should also be good for 15 wins, against nine of last season. He also figures Sam Jones, secured from the Yankees, should win that many.
Chester Falk, Ernie Nevers, George Blauvelt and Eddie Wingard are prospects. The latter should be good

for more than five games on the right side of the ledger, his record last year.
A resume of the pitching staff by Manager Howley shows his twirlers are about 20 games better than they delivered last season.
That many additional victories certainly would make the Browns mighty troublesome.

EFFORTS TO REACH DEAD MAN'S FATHER ARE WITHOUT AVAIL

On their honeymoon trip from California to Texas yesterday, they met their death 15 miles east of Douglas, when their automobile skidded in a freshly plowed road and overturned.

While final funeral arrangements are withheld pending communication with young Waggoner's father, Guy L. Waggoner, Sr., who is on an ocean tour with his bride, formerly Miss Anne Burnett, grand daughter of Captain S. H. Burnett of this city from whom the present city of Burkburnett takes its name, it is expected that burial will be in Fort Worth. Waggoner was expected to dock at Bermuda today and attempts have been made repeatedly since the death to bring him to communicate with him by wireless.

Three Others Injured
Miss Catherine O'Hearne and Valle Henry, both of this city, members of the Hollywood bridal party, who were returning to Fort Worth with the Waggoners, were slightly injured. Guthrie Garretson, of Dallas, also in the ill-fated automobile, sustained bruises. Miss O'Hearne's injuries will permit her to leave the hospital in Douglas today, according to special dispatches received here.

Mrs. Waggoner was formerly Miss Dorothy Scott of this city and was first married to young Waggoner in 1925 at Montague, Montague county. Although a divorce followed a few months later, friends of the young people were not surprised when they heard of their second nuptial at Hollywood inasmuch as they had been on a tour of the world together.

WALTER TEAGLE TALKS OF WEST

Standard Oil President Home After Trip Over West, Is Full Of Ideas

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Mar. 25.—Limiting of oil on the coast, and devoting more attention to producing costs was advocated yesterday by Walter C. Teagle, president of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, returning from an inspection of the Southwest and West Texas areas. Too much crude oil still is being produced, and too much crude oil and finished gasoline are being held in storage, Mr. Teagle said. Whether there will be further cuts in prices as a result of continued over production he declined to predict.

"Of course it is too soon," Mr. Teagle said, "to expect a radical change in the volume of crude oil produced, for a large number of wells which had started drilling before the recent price reductions are being carried out to completion. Prevailing prices for crude should result in materially reducing the number of wildcat wells started."

Talks of West Texas
"Aside from large daily production both in the Southwest and West Texas areas, there is considerable production which is shut in, but the actual amount is difficult to estimate. West Texas will produce a great deal of crude oil. This oil has some sulphur content, but it will be a big factor in any consideration of the future available supply of crude."

Commenting on prices he added: "The past few years the average cost of producing oil has been steadily increasing. Production costs could be materially reduced. The present over production ought to bring this to the attention of every operator."

"Stocks Should Be Cut"
"Stocks of 536,000,000 barrels should be reduced regardless of the fact that oil in storage costs more money than current production. It is a great economic mistake to regard this oil as locked away until new production is selling for as high a figure. The producer should use stocks to make up any deficiency in the current supply. In the long run the producer will be much better off if he suspends drilling projects until a very substantial draft has been made upon reserves."

Girls Start Race
AUSTIN, Mar. 25.—The Mexican Indian girls began their 26 mile foot race at 11:38 o'clock today, cheered on by hundreds of spectators assembled at the starting point. Their course was 15 miles from the city and returned to the stadium of the University of Texas about the time the Texas relay games start at 1:30 p. m. The girls started at a slow jog trot. Each carried a bamboo stick which it was explained helped balance their strides. Two automobiles accompanied them.

Weather was perfect for the relay games with a large number of star athletes ready to compete.

Seven miles out at 12:50 o'clock the sprinters showed no signs of slackening and were keeping all together, their heads held high.

Early Report Given
NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas, Mar. 25.—With Jose Torres about 50 yards in the lead, the three Tarahumara Indian runners, running the 82 miles from San Antonio to Austin, were reported going strong about nine miles south of here at 7 o'clock this morning, four hours after the start.

The half-way post at Munters was reached shortly before 10 o'clock and at 10:05 the Indian "superman" had been pounding the hard surfaced road 19 minutes less than seven hours.

Fighting grimly to keep in the running despite a faulty shoe which caused her severe pain and broke her stride, Juanita Pacencia, 15 year old girl of this three Indian ladies doing a 26 mile marathon, passed the 5th mile after her second enforced halt.

Her two running mates, Lola Cuzarare, 14, and Juanita Cuzarare, 15, were half a mile in the lead, sailing along apparently without effort, their bright red and white costumes flashing in the hot sun.

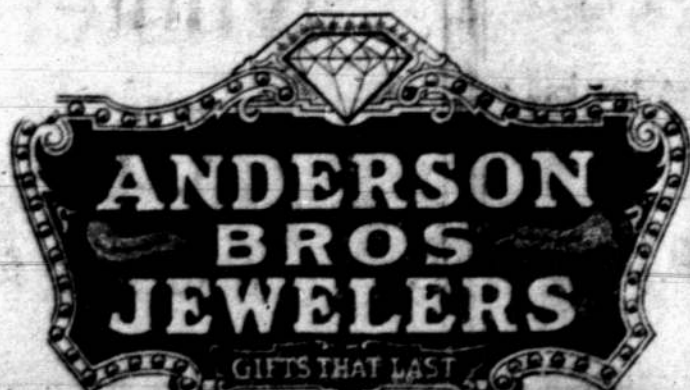

The bombardment was to have begun late this afternoon.

Threat Shows Results
The decision to postpone the drastic action decided upon was reached by the American and British naval commanders when it was seen that concrete results had followed the announcement of their firm stand.

Rear Admiral H. M. Hough, the American commander, requested to the navy department that the Japanese navy department be notified that the evacuation of Nanking was being completed. That evacuation of the city and that there was a fair possibility that 120 Americans who took refuge in Nanking university would leave tonight.

Americans Said To Have Been Molested

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23 (AP)—British misadventure of many Americans, including women, by Chinese soldiers in the national uniform at Nanking was officially reported to the navy department today by Admiral Williams who forwarded a proclamation by Rear Admiral Hough at Nanking.

Clothing was stripped from the women and they were otherwise maltreated, they reported, adding that in one instance a Chinese officer shot down a French priest with his pistol.

"At Nanking as far as is known," the admiral said in his statement, "all American missions and homes have been looted."

"The following American property is known to have been burned down: The Episcopal seminary, The Hill Crest school."

"The residences of Buchanan and H. A. Miles."

Many Chinese Killed
SHANGHAI, Mar. 23 (AP)—Local in-

formationists report there were 2,000 Chinese casualties yesterday when American and British warships shelled Nanking. Nothing has been received in wireless messages to bear out this report. As a matter of fact, it is pointed out here, the shell fire was directed mainly behind a hill, which area was uninhabited.

Steamer Fired On
SHANGHAI, Mar. 23 (AP)—The steamer Kungwo, bearing refugees from Nanking and escorted by the American destroyer Preston, was fired on this morning off Chinkiang. The Preston returned the fire.

SHANGHAI, Mar. 23 (AP) 7:45 p. m.—Latest authoritative advice from Nanking is that 150 Americans are still ashore. Several are feared to be dead, although the authorities are unable to determine this fact.

Refugees Begin To Arrive At Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Mar. 23 (AP)—The first of the 120 American missionaries who took refuge in Nanking university from the rioting Chinese began to arrive at the dock near the American and British warships at 7 o'clock tonight.

Among them was Miss Moffatt, who had been shot twice through the body (Anna E. Moffatt of Fort Sheridan, Ill., was among the workers at the Nanking station of the Presbyterian missionary workers.)

The missionaries came through without military escort and without molestation from the Chinese. It was not known whether the entire 120 were coming out.

American women in Nanking are reported to have been most brutally treated by the Chinese. It is believed

GREER DEFENSE STARTS BATTLE

Judge Overrules Motion Made To Dismiss Charge After Lawyers Argue Long

(By Associated Press)

PRYOR, Okla., Mar. 23.—The defense in the case of Mrs. Anita Greer, charged with killing her husband, Leonard Greer, a Spavinaw, Okla., merchant, started giving its testimony late yesterday, after Judge A. V. Coppedge overruled motion to stop the trial and dismiss the defendant on the ground that there was no evidence to connect her with the murder.

The state completed its three days of testimony shortly after noon.

Attorneys Argue
Attorneys argued the motion to dismiss for two and one-half hours, the defense contending no direct evidence was being brought out connecting Mrs. Greer with the killing. The jury was sent from the room during the argument.

Greer's body was found on a flaming bed in his home at Spavinaw on the evening of October 16, 1926. Shortly afterward Mrs. Greer was arrested and a search was made for Ben Schuh, a former employee in Greer's store, who was believed to have been very friendly with her. Schuh was arrested in Iowa, and returned to Oklahoma.

He was convicted last week of the Greer murder and sentenced to life imprisonment.

W. H. Kornecky made the opening statement for the defense.

Greer Heavy Drinker
He traced the movements of the Greers since their marriage in Alabama when she was 22 years old. Mrs. Greer was a devoted wife, he said, and Greer was an habitual drunkard.

Kornecky admitted at one time in his speech that Greer had been murdered, but declared Mrs. Greer knew nothing about what did it. He declared that Mrs. Greer would take the stand.

Thirty-one witnesses were listed by the defense.

The first, Dr. W. R. Marks, declared he had been family physician for the Greers since 1920. The husband got drunk frequently, Dr. Marks testified.

except in buildings of small dimensions, and final judgment in this is left largely with the building inspector; that no building will be permitted inside the fire limits which is more than three stories or forty feet in height, unless the structure be fire-proof throughout; that no wooden structures of any kind will be allowed inside the fire limits except storage rooms for construction crews; and that no repairs can be made following a fire or other partial destruction on wooden buildings inside the fire limits, where the damage is more than 50 per cent of the cost, or where the part damaged is more than 50 per cent destroyed.

These steps are taken by the commission as a precautionary measure against fires, and will be strictly enforced as soon as the new ordinance can be published and legally put into effect. G. C. Merrill, city building inspector, said today.

Mr. Merrill said also that those found guilty of violation of the provision regarding issuance of permits for construction will be liable before proper authorities for attention.

Warning Issued To Chinese War Lords

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23 (AP)—Unless immediate arrangements are made for the safety of foreign lives in Nanking, military police in the city will be shelled by British and American warships.

Flat notice to this effect has been served on the Cantonese leaders by direction of Admiral Williams who is commanding the American forces in Asiatic waters.

Warning Given Chinese
Nanking, nominally listed as an un-defended city, could not be bombarded under ordinary circumstances, but after the killing yesterday of Americans and other foreigners, the British and American commanders informed the Chinese officials that unless the situation was remedied, Nanking would be proclaimed a "military area." Such a proclamation would open it to whatever military operations were necessary to protect foreign lives.

The American commander-in-chief reported that he had received an "instant" reply in response to the three demands made yesterday by the British and American naval authorities at Nanking. The reply was followed by the warning that military police would be fired on late this afternoon, (Chinese time) unless the demands were complied with. Whether he has found it necessary to carry out the threat has not been reported to the navy department.

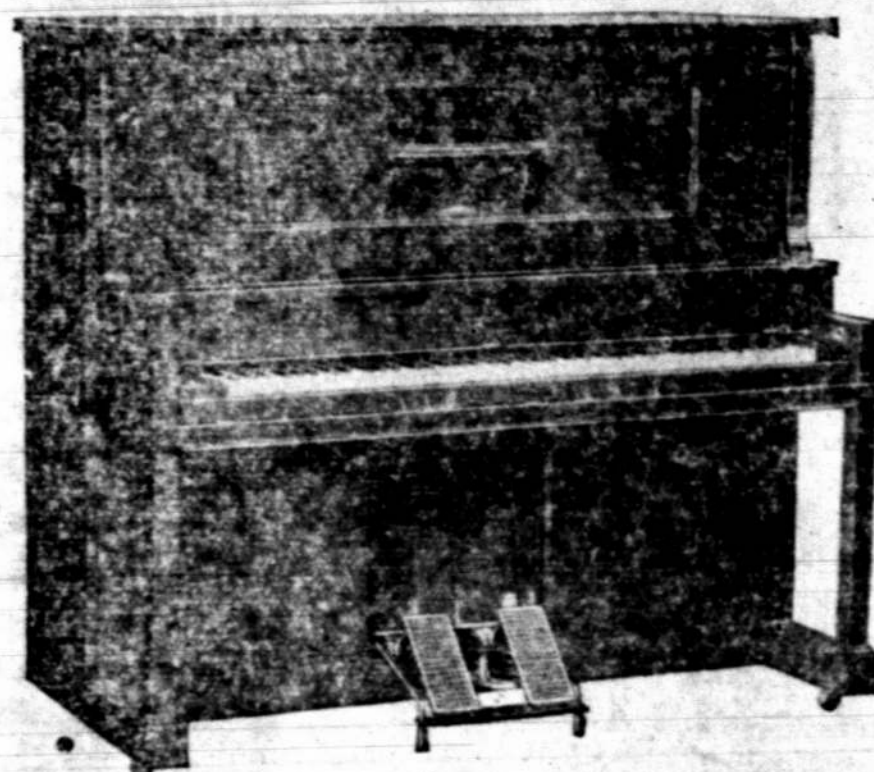

that a determined shelling of the military points in that city, avoiding as much as possible those sections occupied by civilians and non-combatants, would have a beneficial effect upon the situation.

Rescue Is Attempted
A dispatch from Admiral Williams sent at 6:20 p. m. today (Chinese time) said an attempt was under way to rescue foreigners in Nanking, participated in by American and British representatives and local Chinese authorities.

At 11 a. m. (Chinese time) Admiral Williams said attempts to establish communication with foreigners in Nanking had been unsuccessful. He reported that the entire staff of the Standard Oil company of New York, situated in Nanking, was safe.

Admiral Williams at the time the report was forwarded, said he had been

able to learn of the killing of only one American in Nanking, Dr. Williams of the Nanking university. One British sailor on the cruiser Emerald also was killed by snipers firing from the shore.

Jap Troops Land
Japanese naval craft at Nanking had landed a detachment of 50 men under the command of three destroyers, the situation along the Yangtze River was described by Admiral Williams as "tense."

Two hundred and fifty American missionaries had sailed from Hankow for Shanghai and other steamers are being held in readiness at Hankow to evacuate the remaining Americans, if necessary. A heavy movement of Chinese and Japanese troops across the river from Hankow was reported.

American refugees comprising 19 men, 21 women and 52 children had sailed from Nanking for Shanghai on

the steamers Kungwo and Wenchow early today.

U. S. Boat Fired On
The American destroyer William B. Preston, while escorting the refugee boat Kungwo from Nanking to a point below Chinkiang, was fired upon from Nanking points. The fire was returned by the destroyer's machine guns.

Chinese forts above and below Chinkiang also fired on the Preston and the destroyer again replied by turning loose its four-inch battery. No casualties to the Preston's personnel resulted.

The situation at Chinkiang, was described as serious. All Americans there have taken refuge at the Standard Oil company's installation and British refugees have concentrated at the Asiatic petroleum station.

Looting and firing were reported in progress throughout the concession

area and Americans were preparing at 4:45 p. m. today (Chinese time) to leave on the steamer Wanchow for Shanghai.

Williams Orders Began
Admiral Williams has ordered six destroyers to proceed at once from Manila to Chinese waters. The Perry, Ford and Pillsbury have left for Shanghai, the Edsall for Swatow, the Forrest for Foochow and the Bulmer for Amoy. Previously the light cruisers Richmond, Marblehead and Cincinnati were ordered to China from Honolulu.

At present there are 21 American fighting craft in the China zone. They carry 3,718 blue-jackets and about 600 marines in addition to the 1,500 marines landed at Shanghai under command of Brigadier General Smedley Butler, who reached that city last night.

ONE of the most serious conditions that may affect man is bichloride of mercury poisoning. Some years ago a banker in Georgia took bichloride of mercury and during the ten days that passed before his death, newspapers reported constantly the various symptoms. The mere publication of these facts and the publicity associated resulted in numerous cases, because of the suggestive possibilities inherent in such publicity.

For many years it has been thought that raw eggs, the whites of eggs and milk have a special value in the treatment of such poisoning. As pointed out by Dr. Torald Sollmann and his colleagues they form combinations with the mercury which delay its absorption from the stomach. At the same time, they serve to coat the lining of the stomach to protect it against contact with the poison.

If the mercury remains in the body death occurs. A physician, therefore, promptly empties the stomach, by washing it out when he is called to treat a person who has swallowed such tablets.

It is advisable, in bichloride of mercury poisoning, to give eggs and milk immediately to delay the absorption of the poison and its irritating effects on the stomach wall, and the stomach should be pumped out as soon as possible.

If the stomach contains a considerable amount of undigested food the washing out is difficult, and it is necessary to put in water and pump it out rapidly several times in order to get the mercury out. Experiments made on animals indicate that it is best to give a glass of milk or two first and then several raw eggs. Apparently the use of egg white alone does not have any advantage over the whole egg.

If the tablets have been swallowed dry, and if milk is not available at least a half glass of water should be given just before the eggs to prevent the cementing of the tablets by the white of the eggs. But it is most important of all to pump out the stomach as soon as possible, because this procedure removes the mercury from the body and prevents its action upon the kidneys, the primary cause of a fatal result.

We know what he looks like—we have seen his picture thousands of times—but it is peculiar that each one of the three times that I have met him I have had a singular feeling of surprise. 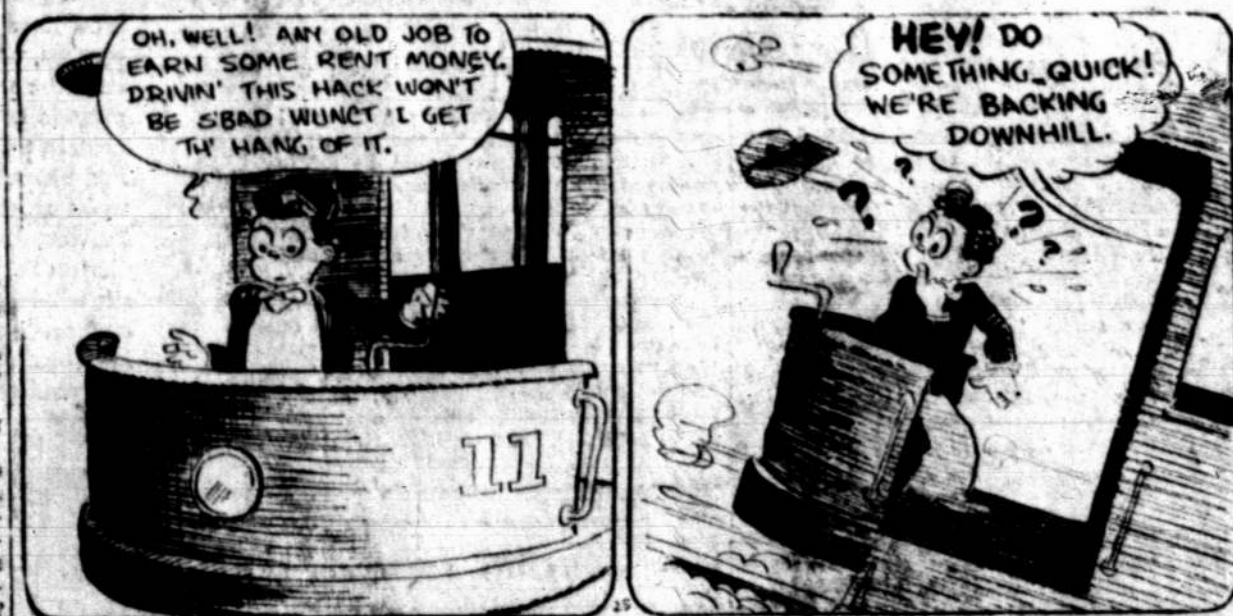

Not long ago the Shanghai munici-
pal council appointed a commission to
study child labor conditions in this
European ruled city. This commis-
sion's report discloses appalling con-
ditions.

The setting of young girl children
into slavery, it states, is common.
Thousands upon thousands of child-
ren work in factories. Many of the
children are no more than six years
old. The 12-hour day is the rule. Con-
tractors bring children in from the
country districts, paying the parents
\$2 a month for each child. The con-
tractors make a profit of about \$1 a
month per child, and the youngsters
are miserably housed and fed, paid not
at all and are kept like regular slaves.

(In the silk mills are the worst abuses.
The report cites only two mills
where relatively humane working con-
ditions prevail and one of these is
under native Chinese management and
the other under Japanese management.
The worst conditions were found in
the British owned and operated mills.)

The report cites a long list of
abuses. It closes by declaring that
the council has found it difficult to
draw up regulations to protect the
children because the mills are on a
highly competitive footing and cannot
afford to have their trade shaved.

This little report is worth remem-
bering. We had been led to believe
that only in native ruled China were
such atrocious conditions prevalent.
This proves otherwise.

It indicates, possibly, that the white
rule in Chinese cities is not quite as
beneficial for all concerned as we have
been told.

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 25.—Put your finger on the phonograph, boys and girls, turn the radio dial to the snappiest black bottom tune coming through the ether, jiggle the pocket flask, start swiveling, thumb your noses at your elders, and if anyone dares modest you, shout this at 'em: "Flaming youth burns with a pure fire. We are the salvation of the country. If we didn't flame, you'd be buried in your own dead ashes."

And if the elders don't stop picking at you—try this one: "For the first time in the history of civilization youth is decent."

Then if the elders regain consciousness and chorus: "Who says so?" your cue is to say "Rupert Hughes."

No Hedging

It's a fact, Rupert Hughes, who perhaps has written more palpitating love chapters than any other novelist, and

whose latest exploit was to get talked about by saying that even George Washington had a best seller and took his highballs straight, came right out in meeting here and said:

"Flaming youth is a beautiful tower of strength."

"The graybeards who nag the young folks have no more brains than agricultural scientists expressing amazement and condemnation against a colt kicking up in the pasture."

"Youth of today finds the directions for living coming from other persons about the same thing as using another person's tooth brush."

What's more, went on the world's prize hollyhocks of youth, flaming or otherwise, it's nothing new to pick on the kids.

Take those old clay tablets of the ancient Assyrians, back there in 4000 B. C. with all their mean wise-cracks at the youngsters.

Then, take the time of King Philip's

war. The graybeards blamed that on their offspring. They wrote it down in the archives that the war happened because girls wore immodest dress and sassed their parents, and that God sent the war as a judgment against low bodices, hair in curls, and ribbons on dresses.

Eve's Case

Flaming youth is nothing new, continued Hughes. Take Eve's case. Eve was really the first flapper. She was just a young girl, and she began to flame and wonder about apples and snakes and things.

"They say she caused trouble, but honest now, hands up, how many of us would have liked to live in the Garden of Eden all our lives?" asked the novelist, indicating that again we owe a vote of thanks to flaming youth.

Last, and in conclusion:

"Flaming youth is God's process for race perpetuation."

Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver is greatly misunderstood in his stand for advanced marriage relationships, Hughes asserted.

"He is merely seeking a way to save the basis of civilization—which is marriage," said the writer. "The religious people should stand by him. Yet he is abused as an abominable influence."

"He is walking in the path of the saints, and like them he is being persecuted by those who do not and will not understand."

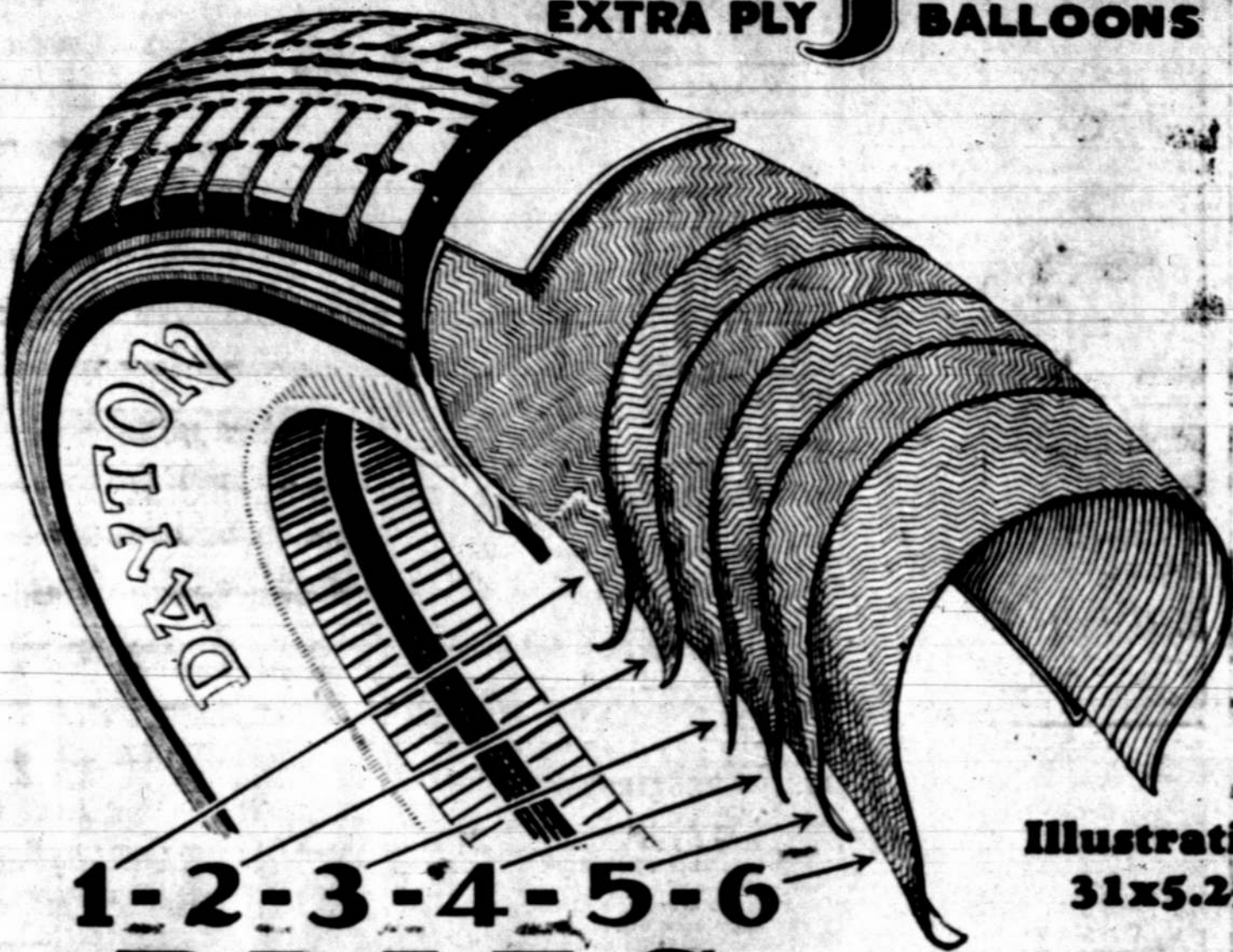
