SPECULATION OVER COOLIDGE RIFE

BOTH ARMS OF MAN SEVERED AT THE ELBOWS

RAILROAD WORKER IS FEARED VICTIM OF PLOT IN FIGHT

(Special To The Journal)

BIG SPRING, June 11.—Suspicion of foul play lurks over burned embers here today with the finding of a body of J. W. Fitzsimmons, 45 year-old railroad worker, in the ruins of the apartment house at an hour this morning.

Fitzsimmons' body, with the arms all burned away, was found after flames had de-voured the building. Both arms had been severed at the elbows.

Medical investigation of the body of the fire got under way this afternoon after the flames had been extinguished. Fitzsimmons was wearing a blue and white railway brakeman's uniform on the second floor of the apartment house.

The fire started shortly after 3 o'clock and the burned body was recovered several hours later.

Fight Is Rumored
Rumors that a fight preceded the fire and finding of blood stains around the premises lead officers to suspect foul play. An inquest will be held this afternoon.

Fitzsimmons had not worked for months due to injuries received in a train wreck at Sweetwater.

Family Shot And House Burned Down

MARQUETTE, Wis., June 11. (AP)—The bodies of August Pahl, his wife and two daughters, Eleanor, 9, and Betty May, 5 weeks, were found in a room of their burning home today. All had been shot to death. A pistol was found near Pahl's body, indicating, police said, that he had slain his family and then committed suicide.

MORE BANQUET TICKETS HELD

DALLAS GIVEN DEMO SESSION

PARTY PLEDGE HOLDS MUCH INTEREST IN EXECUTIVE MEET

(By Associated Press)
WACO, June 11.—Dallas was selected for the state democratic convention September 11 by the state democratic executive committee here today. Amarillo, Austin, Brownsville and Waco were other cities bidding for the meeting.

A dual attempt was made in the session to require all candidates to pledge their support of the democratic ticket throughout. Judge C. G. Krueger led this movement, directing his remarks mainly at Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas.

Motion Is Tabled

Judge Krueger's motion to require all candidates to vote the straight democratic ticket was tabled by a vote of 19 to 6. Following its defeat, Winbourne Pearce of Temple, moved to amend the resolution certifying candidates names with the inclusion of this phrase:

"No candidates' name shall be certified who does not furnish the secretary his pledge to support the nominees of the democratic party."

Keeling Resolution

W. A. Keeling, former attorney general, offered the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously:

"Resolved that all white democrats who are qualified voters under the constitution and laws of Texas and who subscribe to statute pledge 3110 or the revised civil statutes of Texas and none other, be allowed to participate in the primaries of July 26 and August 25."

RUSSIA ORDERS TWO OF GIANT ICE BREAKERS INTO THE RESCUE

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 11.—General Umberto Nobile, with a party of six men of whom two are injured, was reported by the Citta Di Milano to be making his way today towards land from the pack ice off Northeast land.

The advice indicated that one of the men originally with the party that was stranded when the gondola of the dirigible broke free from the airship's beam, was lost.

Two Russian Ships Ordered Into Hunt

MOSCOW, June 11. (AP)—The Nobile relief committee has ordered the two most powerful ice breakers in Russia, the Krassin and Malgosa, to proceed immediately to northern Spitzbergen to bring aid to the crew of the dirigible Italia.

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 11.—Safe after a perilous landing on the Arctic sea in the partially wrecked dirigible Italia, the crew of the Nobile, North pole airship, was still in greatest danger today as expeditions by land, air and sea got under way to bring them out of the frozen wastes north of Spitzbergen as speedily as possible.

Spurred by the watchword of the rescuers, for every moment lost meant an increase in the danger that the eighteen men of the dirigible, adrift on breaking ice floes, might be carried into more inaccessible regions or into the open sea.

Divided into two parties and carrying two of their number who were injured when the airship came down upon the ice after the gondola had snapped off, the men of the Italia today were slowly seeking to reach Northeast land, the nearest body of land to the point at which the dirigible came down after her brilliant voyage to the north pole more than two weeks ago.

HOUSES, CROPS DESTROYED BY MONDAY SEIGE

RAIN, HAIL ACCOMPANY TWISTER; DAMAGE IS CLAIMED \$100,000

(By Associated Press)
BROWNWOOD, June 11.—Several houses were blown from foundations and approximately \$100,000 damage done to crops and buildings by a tornado which struck two communities near Ballinger early today.

At Leaday, 18 miles southeast of Ballinger, the wind completely demolished the home of H. E. Wireman. The family had taken to the storm cellar and none was injured.

Milch, 20 miles west of Ballinger, reported 3,000 acres of cotton destroyed.

The tornado was accompanied by rain and hail.

Good Rains Fall On South Plains

Paving the way for a better crop season, 26 inches of rain fell in Lubbock county and vicinity during Saturday night and Sunday, boosting the total precipitation of 1928 to 5.54 inches, the records at the State Experiment Station showed this morning.

Forty-five hundredths inches fell late Saturday night while yesterday shower added 21 inches to the total.

With 2.97 inches of rain as the normal for June, indications point toward above normal precipitation.

The rain was general over the South Plains section, reports to the city stated today. Levelland received good rains both on Saturday and yesterday while Meadow, Tacka, Slaton and other points to the south fared in a like manner.

Drivers coming into the Union Bus Terminal from the South this morning reported a good fall at Sweetwater yesterday which became much lighter this way. Amarillo and the territory north of Lubbock did not receive so much rain yesterday, reports said.

The roads are passable and travel was going in all directions out of the city today.

"Haven" Bombed

GALVESTON.—A squadron of bombing planes manned by students of the army air corps advanced flying school at Kelly Field, San Antonio, was engaged today in demolishing "Boogymen's Haven," a group of derelict vessels off the coast of Bolivar peninsula, several miles north of here. Three stranded hulks towed to the position several years ago by army engineers were the target. The vessels form a breakwater behind which small rum running boats are said to find haven while waiting to make contact with larger craft.

One Governor Says Another All Wrong

OMAHA, Neb., June 11. (AP)—What the governor of North Dakota plans to say to the Governor of Nebraska when they meet in Kansas City promises to be plenty, pithy and pointed.

The North Dakota ecutive, Arthur G. Sorlie, pulled into Omaha at the head of a "farmer protest" caravan yesterday and expressed vexation upon learning that Gov. Adam McMullen of Nebraska was not there to meet and join him.

"Gov. McMullen started this caravan business," said the Governor of North Dakota, "and I led the farmer delegation from my state in the belief that he would meet us here and lead the rest of the way. Now I find he hasn't run out on us. Just wait until I see him in Kansas City. I'll tell him what I think of him."

At Kansas City Gov. McMullen was told what Gov. Sorlie had said.

"I believe Gov. Sorlie was only joking when he said he'd tell me what he thinks of me when he arrives," the Nebraskan said. "He isn't mad. He'll be welcomed here. And he's going to be made chief of staff of the farmer army."

Gov. McMullen denied he had "run out" on the caravanners.

CREAGER GETS SET FOR MEET

WOULD PUT THREE ON BIG COMMITTEES IN GOP CONVENTION

KANSAS CITY, June 11.—The Creager republican faction from Texas was called today to get lined up for the national convention, in which it intends to support Herbert Hoover unanimously for president.

Proceeding on the confident assumption that its temporary enrollment in the convention will be permanent, the Creager group sight from its ranks three members for national committees—platform and resolutions, permanent organization and rules. Orrville Bullington of Wichita Falls, chairman of the delegation, already is slated for membership on the credentials committee.

The Wurzbach-Littleton confessions of the Creager "regular" delegations' seat in the convention will go before the credentials committee after the convention opens Tuesday, but may not be heard until Tuesday night or Wednesday.

On Convention Role

Since the Hoover-committed delegation of 26, headed by national committeeman R. B. Creager of Brownsville, got on the temporary convention roll, it has the advantage in the seating fight waged by Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach and his allies. The Creager group will have its own man, Bullington, on the credentials committee and will have behind it the tradition that decisions of the executive committee rarely are upset.

Mr. Creager predicted that "Texas will become a two-party state without doubt if the republicans nominate Hoover and the democrats Smith."

Most of the Texas delegates had arrived Monday. Headquarters were in the Robert Lee hotel.

Garrard To Attend State Demo Session

Tom Garrard, member of the law firm of Lockhart and Garrard, left Sunday for Waco, where he will attend a meeting of the executive committee of the Democratic party of Texas today and tomorrow.

MELLON WITH PENNSYLVANIA DELEGATION HOLDING WHIP HAND IN HOOVER CAMPAIGN

KANSAS CITY, June 11.—A gigantic whirlpool of speculation and nervous expectancy gripped the assembling republicans today, centering about Mellon of Pennsylvania and sweeping with fury against the bouncing craft in which the political enemies of Herbert Hoover have chosen to seek a common fortune.

With the opening of the convention less than twenty-four hours away, and Secretary Mellon speeding toward Kansas City with his unpledged and vastly important Pennsylvania delegation of 79, the Hoover leaders and some of the best of Mr. Mellon's personal friends declared it was as sure as anything could be in politics that the Pennsylvanians would go to Hoover on the opening ballot. That almost certainly would nominate him.

The Treasury Secretary was quoted as having expressed a determination to have it all over quickly. This might or might not mean that all possibility of a Pennsylvania vote for Coolidge or even a delaying compromise vote for Mellon himself, has disappeared. But the very strong assurance of the Hooverites is that it means just that, and that there need no longer be a fear of a Coolidge stampede.

Other Cheering Words

From another quarter far across the country came a similar word of cheer for the Hoover managers. Senator Borah of Idaho, addressing the eleven delegates from his state who are pledged to vote for him if he wants it, declared that two candidates remain in the field—Hoover and Coolidge, and said that in his opinion it would be "highly dangerous" for the party to attempt to force the nomination of Coolidge.

On the strength of this the Hoover managers chalked up 11 more for Hoover, bringing their total very close to the nominating mark of 545 without even counting Pennsylvania.

Still the allies were not ready to quit. In a burst of confidence Senator "Jim" Watson of Indiana, whose home state is supporting him

He Favors Crepe

believed had surged through the crew of the base ship Citta Di Milano last week when radio contact with the long missing Italia was established, there were fears today for the safety of the men cut off from land by the open water leads and ice flows along Northeast land.

They and night the Citta Di Milano has been straining every nerve for the Italia's signals. The Italia's radio station has been growing weaker and is sending only short reports. It is not believed that this is an indication that its radio apparatus is failing, but that the Italia's operator is scarce the energy in the accumulator which

probably will be sufficient only a few days more.

Inasmuch as the Italia carries provisions for at least six weeks present regarding the food question, but definite fears that drifting ice flows upon which the men are stranded will drift to the open sea. The point at which the Italia came down is off Cape Leigh Smith, the most eastern extremity of Northeast land and is feared that the current will set the ice southward between Northeast land and Franz Josef land.

Ice Carried Outward
In that case, if the rescue parties do not arrive immediately, ice will be carried toward the K. Charles Island south of Northeast land or even will be carried in Barents Sea which is now open. Barents Sea lies within the peace area, but at the present season is open.

Since Friday the Italia's crew has drifted about a mile and a half to the east, being last reported 38.4 east longitude. This would place the crew just off the tip of Cape Leigh Smith.

Fear for the party which is without radio and which is scattered out of sight of the other group, is particularly strong as would be exceedingly difficult to locate it should they become definitely separated from the group without the wireless.

COLEMAN WINS SECOND STRAIGHT IN HUBBER SERIES

ACTION TAKEN TO HALT CLUB IN WITHDRAWAL

HUBBERS LOSE THREE GAMES AND GO TO SECOND PLACE

(Special To The Journal)
COLEMAN, June 11.—In a directors meeting of the West Texas League officials in the presence of Mike H. Mike Sexton ruled that the laws of the league the ruling made by Stevenson was the proper thing to do, but in a warm discussion of the games Midland's representative, Jim White and Jim Maloney stated that it would be necessary that the games be returned to Midland or the Midland franchise would have to be turned over to the league authorities for further operation. As a last resort to keep the league intact, the directors voted that they carry out the by-laws and constitution for the rest of the season.

Mike Sexton offered suggestion, maintaining to an \$1,800 monthly salary limit for next season. All clubs in the league with the exception of Hamlin were represented, including: S. D. Hunter, Lubbock; Earl E. Snapp, San Angelo; Les Tullos, Abilene; Jim Tullos and Jimmy Malone, Midland; Leon Shield, E. P. Scarborough, D. L. Snodgrass, George Perry, and R. D. Kiney, Jr., of Hamlin.

The schedule for the last half of the season of the league was adopted by the directors.

LONE EAGLE IN MEXICO BEGINS FLIGHT TO U. S.

NON-STOP JAUNT FROM MEXICO CITY WOULD REACH WASHINGTON

MEXICO CITY, June 11. (AP)—Captain Emilio Carranza, known as Mexico's Lindbergh, hopped off from the Valbuena flying field for a non-stop flight to Washington at 8:10 a. m. today to return Colonel Lindbergh's good will flight of several months ago.

The plane, called the "Mexico-Excelsior" was built in San Diego by the builders of the famous "Spirit of Saint Louis" and was flown by Carranza from San Diego to Mexico City on May 25.

Carranza wanted to hop off within a day or two for Washington, but it was necessary to postpone the hop-off until a special runway could be built since Mexico City's high altitude made an immediate take-off with the necessary heavy gasoline supply inadvisable.

The Captain is a noted army flyer. The aviator plans to fly to Washington by way of Tampico and New Orleans, crossing the Gulf of Mexico.

Carranza's non-stop flight from San Diego, Calif., to Mexico City made him a national hero. It was the greatest flight a Mexican had ever made. The other outstanding Mexican aviation achievement up to that time also had been made by Carranza. This was a non-stop flight from Mexico City to Juarez, opposite El Paso, last September.

During the Mexico City-Juarez flight, made in a Mexican built airplane, one of the wings caught fire. Carranza saw a storm ahead and ran his plane into a rain cloud. The rain extinguished the blaze and he successfully completed the flight.

Carranza's San Diego-Mexico flight was preparatory to his non-stop flight from the Mexican capital to Washington to return Lindbergh's flight from Washington to Mexico. The Mexico City newspaper Excelsior originated the idea, conducted a campaign for popular subscriptions to buy a plane, and selected Carranza as the "Mexican Lone Eagle."

To Be Personal Property
The plane in which Carranza flies to Washington is to become his personal property. Rodrigo De Liano, director of Excelsior, traveled to Washington by train before the flight to greet Carranza there and present the plane to him on behalf of Excelsior and those who helped buy it.

Carranza is expected to fly in the "Mexico Excelsior" to a number of cities in the United States after his Washington reception. Plans are not fixed, but he makes another non-stop flight from some United States city back to the Mexican capital.

Carranza was born Dec. 9, 1905, in the little town of Ramos Arizpe, state of Coahuila. His family moved to Texas while he was a child and lived short periods in San Antonio and El Paso. They returned to Mexico, but later young Carranza went to San Antonio again and studied there in a private school. Then coming back to his homeland he entered the air service and was sent to the north to bomb and reconnoiter regions in Sonora where Yecui Indians were on the warpath.

From time to time he has been similarly engaged in the state of Jalisco where the so-called rebellion has been strongest. He was at the "front" during the Gomez-Serrano revolutionary attempt.

Chicago to Mexico City
In the summer of 1926 Carranza attempted to fly with stops from Chicago to Mexico City, using a small plane. He had bad luck. A forced landing in a storm near Oklahoma City damaged the plane and put him in a hospital for about six weeks. Recovered and the plane repaired he continued to Mexico but was forced down again near Monterey with the plane so damaged that he had to abandon the flight. Carranza was married in Sonora about two months ago.

The flier expected to reach Washington within twenty hours or better and eight o'clock tomorrow evening.

Forced Nomination Claimed Dangerous

KANSAS CITY, June 11.—For the republican national convention to force the nomination of President Coolidge would be highly dangerous, Senator William E. Borah, of Idaho, today told his state delegation at his first conference with them.

"We should then be in a position of selecting a candidate who would withdraw, leaving the party to make a campaign with a second choice," Borah said. "As for President Coolidge I am confident he will not run and am inclined to believe he will ask that no further

votes be cast for him if any are cast on the first ballot.
"As I see it there are only two men in this race. One is probably in it without his consent—President Coolidge. The other is Secretary Hoover."

Strategic Advantage
Borah told the delegation that if there was any strategic advantage in voting for him, he was willing that it should do so. But he added that he hoped his statement would do nothing to impair any advantage it might have by taking a leading part in the selection of the presidential nominee.
The senator, it is known that he was willing to have the Idaho votes go to Secretary Hoover on an early ballot, even on the first if it should appear desirable to insure Idaho a place in Hoover's councils by this method. No definite vote was taken by the delegation on this question and further conferences will be held.

Sanders Refuses To Clear Up Muddle

KANSAS CITY, June 11.—(AP)—Everett Sanders, secretary to President Coolidge and possible bearer of word from the white house to the convention, arrived here today as silent on the possibility of Mr. Coolidge making another statement about his availability as to the president himself.

Mr. Sanders declined absolutely to discuss the president. He would not deny or confirm rumors that he had a message from Mr. Coolidge to the convention and there were no indications that he intended to participate in any of the pre-convention proceedings.

In Touch With Sessions

If the secretary has a message from the white house he has made no arrangements for making it public. However, from his room in the Muehlbach hotel where he and Mrs. Sanders are stopping, the secretary will be in a position to keep in touch during the day with the white house should it be desired.
Mr. Sanders declared he was coming to the convention from force of habit, recalling he had long been in the custom of attending the party's national convence. He was for many years a member of the house from Indiana.

BIG OIL WASTE SEEN IN PECOS

STATE URGED TO STEP IN AS CURTAILMENT AGREEMENT LIFTED

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 11.—An era of unrestricted waste and consequent heavy loss to producers in the Pecos county Yates oil field, some miles from the state steps in the breach in time to strengthen the voluntary curtailment agreement expiring July 1.
W. A. Moncrief, vice president of the Marland Oil company, predicted today in the railroad commission's hearing of proposed regulations for the area.

The other side of the proposition, put forward mainly by the transcontinental and oil operators' trust companies, was that there is little or no waste now—a statement agreed to by Moncrief when he was cross-examined.
A majority of the companies affected would have the commission put into effect conservation rules similar to those now in operation in Winkler county.

Big Drilling Operations
Moncrief testified that after July 1, if the commission does not act, vast drilling operations would get under way, involving gigantic costs for storage facilities. He said water already has been found on the southeast and northwest edges of the field and that in his opinion to loose the gas pressure would be to dissipate gas pressure uselessly, possibly to bring about additional water intrusion and to cut ultimate production.
Under the existing agreement, the output of the field, part of which is state school land, is limited to 51,500 barrels daily although the total potential production is 1,350,000 barrels, Moncrief declared.

Stewart Is Denied Instructed Verdict
WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—The motion of defense attorneys for a directed verdict of not guilty in the trial of Robert W. Stewart, charged with a misdemeanor for refusing to answer questions put by a senate committee was denied today by Justice Suddens in the District of Columbia supreme court.

Jury Selection In Murder Case Begins

The halls of the court house were in a congested order this morning as the 75 men in the special venire called for the trial of Mrs. Nina Stevens gathered for their appearance in the 99th district court before Judge Clark M. Mullican. Selection of the jury was under way this afternoon.
Mrs. Stevens is charged with the murder of Mrs. Thelma Collins, the divorced wife of her son last fall.

Building Permits Hit Regular Stride

Coleman Will Have County Farm Agent

COLEMAN, June 11.—Through the co-operation of the state agriculture department, the local school board, county court and the Coleman Chamber of Commerce, Elmo Cook, past vocational agriculture instructor of the high school, will become the county agriculture agent, devoting 90 minutes daily during the next school year to instruction in the high school and the balance of the day to actual field work.

The services of Mr. Cook were made possible through the Smith-Whites act by which the government pays half the salary of the vocational agriculture instructor. Cook recently completed his first term as instructor in the high school coming here from A. and C. College.

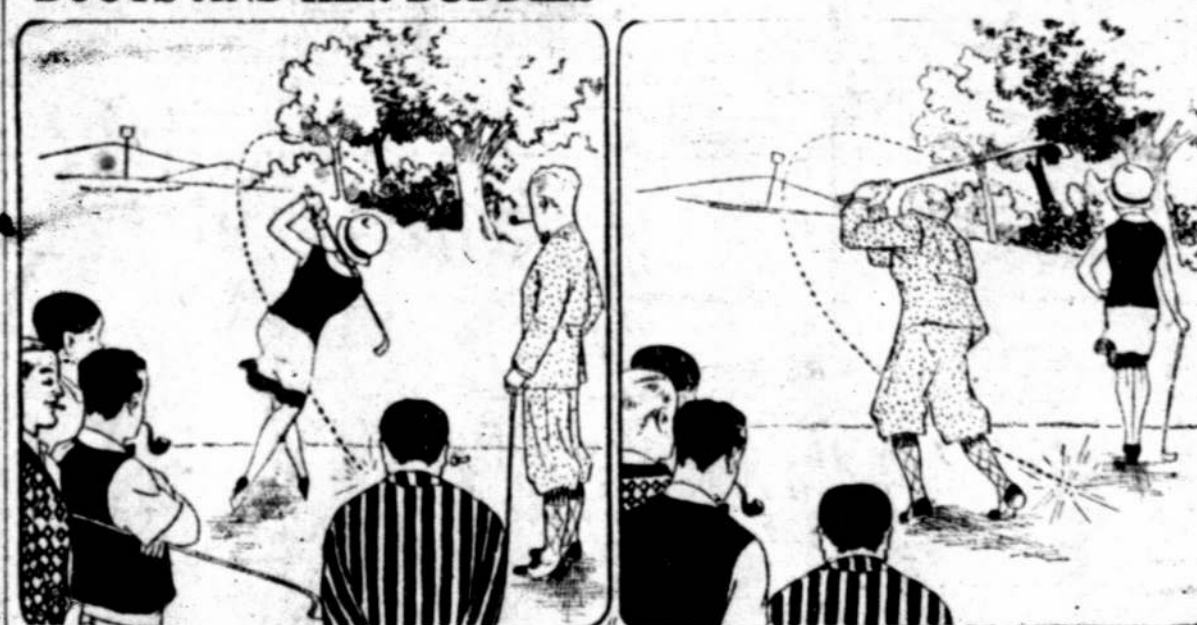

CORTISSE FIELD, N. Y., June 11.—Charles A. Levine, owner of the monoplane Columbia in which Miss Earhart and Boll intended to fly to Europe, announced that plans for a take-off this morning had been cancelled because of unfavorable weather over the ocean.

Friendship Held By Fog And Rain

TREPASSEY, N. P., June 11. (AP)—Thick fog and heavy rain seemed today to forestall the possibility that the monoplane Friendship could take off for Europe. Fine conditions yesterday had buoyed the hope of the three members of the crew that they might be able to break the jinx which has held them here a week after their flight from Boston.

Southern Cross To Fly Around World

SYDNEY, Australia, June 11. (AP)—The monoplane Southern Cross and its crew of two Australians and two Americans—the combination that conquered the Pacific in a flight from Oakland, Calif., to Sydney—will fly to London in six hundred miles south to Melbourne.

This was announced today by Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and Charles Ulm, Australian pilots of the plane, after they had declared their intention of flying around the world.

Cities Pay Respect
Sydney and Melbourne paid respect to the four fliers who conquered an airway between Australia and America. The American fliers, Harry W. Lyon and James H. Doolittle, and the Australian fliers, Charles Kingsford-Smith and Charles Ulm, were greeted by a band of music and a crowd of thousands of people.

Plans to fly back to Sydney on Thursday and sail for the United States. Nothing definite has been said about Warner's plans. Sydney forgot work yesterday and spent the day with the four fliers. A civic reception was held at the city hall. Hundreds of persons who were unable to gain ad-

mittance to the hall cheered the aviators on their arrival at the place.

Warner's Hat Is Feature
Warner and his celebrated Panama hat again figured as interesting sidelights of the Sydney visit. When Warner and his three companions arrived at Mascot aerodrome Sunday the radioman was so enthusiastically greeted by the jostling crowd that he lost his hat. He appeared worried over the loss but managed to face the crowd smiling and bareheaded. The headgear was eventually restored to him.

The civic commissioner requested that Warner favor the Australian commonwealth with a remembrance—his cherished panama. This the radioman did amid loud cheers.

Captain Kingsford-Smith announced that he and Ulm intended to fly the Southern Cross around the world and that the start would be made from Sydney in a few days. They have not made it clear whether they intend proceeding on this journey from Melbourne or return to Sydney.

Wayland Is Elated Over Summer School

PLAINVIEW, June 11.—The doors of Wayland opened June 4 to receive the largest enrollment in the history of the summer school according to Z. T. Huff, dean of the college. One hundred and sixty-one have enrolled to date which makes the enrollment taking the regular college curriculum at least one-third larger than ever before. There are twenty-five experienced teachers enrolled taking educational work under R. B. Sparks, teacher of education during the summer session. Thirty-two juniors are enrolled in the elementary grades and a greater per cent of the enrollment are students that have never attended Wayland before.

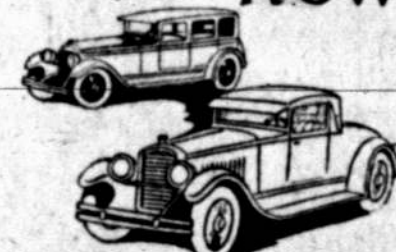

TWO OF ITALIA CREW HURT IN FALL OF CABIN

OTHERS ARE BRINGING THEM TOWARD LAND ON PERILOUS ICE

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, June 11.—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Rome today said that two members of the crew of the dirigible Italia were injured when a gondola Umberto's Noble, and seven men who were in the cabin at the time were thrown to the ice.

The other members of the crew were either inside the bag or in the engine cabins at the time. They came down on the ice thirty kilometers (18.6 miles) the east. For days that seemed to them, they were not far from North East land.

Men Adrift on Ice Are In Great Peril

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 11. (AP)—Adrift on ice floes of the polar seas the crew of the dirigible Italia was in peril today. Radio messages from the crew to the base ship Citta Di Milano stressed the necessity of speedy rescue. For days that seemed to them endless, sixteen men of the crew have been making their way slowly toward land carrying two others who were injured when the airship came down upon the ice. The eighteen men divided into two parties to make their way to safety.

Breaking floes dangerous. Open water leads among the floes and the danger of the floes breaking up made their trek slow and dangerous. The wind or sea currents at times drifted the floes to the east or south carrying the men out of their way. At times the drift has been to the west bringing the men nearer to North East land.

Powerful ice breakers were needed to rescue them. None was available here and Captain Romanga of the Citta Di Milano asked the Italian minister to Norway to request the Russian government to aid since it possesses vessels regarded as the best for battering their way through ice.

The sealing ship Hobby today was locked in the ice off Vertegne Hook about 140 miles from the coast of the Italia was adrift. Aboard the vessel were two Norwegian fliers, Captain Risler-Larsen and Lieutenant Luetzow Holm, each provided with a seaplane. It was doubtful whether they would be of much assistance to the marooned explorers, at present. Captain Romanga said the planes did not have space enough to carry food for eighteen men. He and Holm intended to try to get in touch with the Italia's crew but the ice packed around the Hobby prevented them taking off. Apparently the 18 men were in no immediate danger since they have provisions enough for six weeks.

Ice Breakers To Return
The ice breaker Braganza which had been searching for the explorers when word of their plight reached Kings Bay was ordered to return here to be fitted out as a base ship for flying operations. Ice conditions, however, prevented the vessel from making headway.

Word was sent to Milan to urge the flying boat Savoia-Marchetti Italian rescue mission, to come north as speedily as possible. The plane headed for Zurich, but was prevented by heavy clouds from crossing the Alps. Taking a round-about route by way of Marseilles it was forced down in the Rhone river near Lyons, France.

A dog driver here was asked by Commander Romanga if he could make his way over the ice to the Italia's crew. The driver, named Smith, said he probably could but the trip would be extremely dangerous and take a long time. Smith thought the best chance of rescue by dog sled would be if the marooned men reached North East land, from which point they could be brought to safety by dog team.

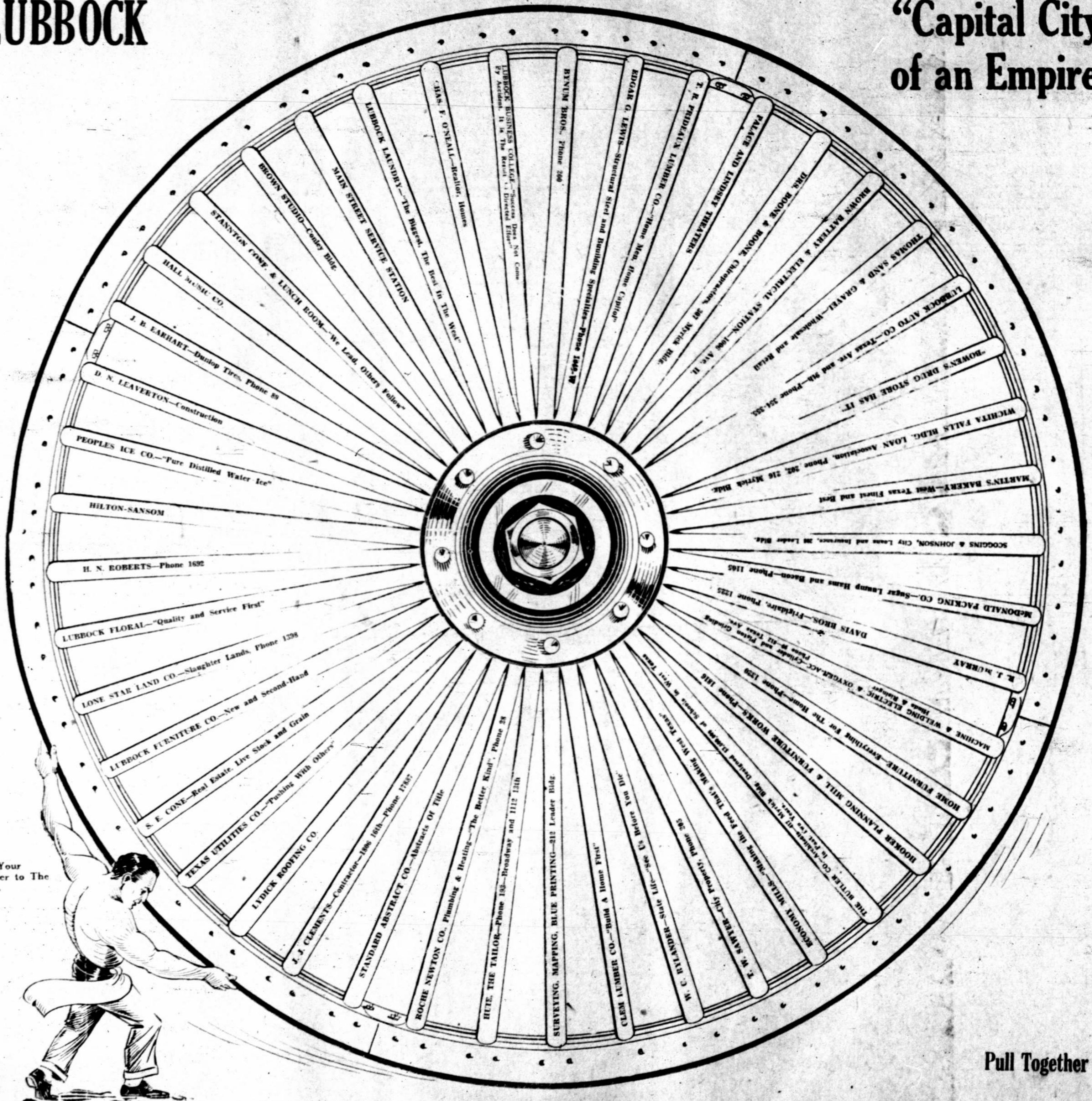
