## For Hooked Rugs At A Small Cost, Make Them Yourself, Expert Urges

While the craze for hooked rugs runs high, why not hook your own? There is creative joy in watching the flowers and birds emerge from nowhere, and hooked rugs when done add a quaint, pleasing note to any room.

To really appreciate hooked rugs and get yourself in the mood for making one you should know something about their history. For they are one more indication of how we in this 20th century, are turning back to the art of our ancestors for beauty.

**Revolutionary Days**

Everybody had hooked rugs in Revolutionary days. The Puritan grandmothers used up all their old scraps of dresses, red flannel undershirts, blankets and household materials, making them. Martha Washington even hooked them for Mount Vernon. They were "the" floor covering until the smooth machine-made rugs usurped their place.

The thrifty New England housewife used to save her scraps. Often yarn was used, dyed with leaves and bark gathered in the woods. She used burlap bags that had brought tea from China or sugar from the South for the frame upon which the pattern was drawn and the rug hooked. She utilized all the materials at hand and when a certain color gave out she filled in with another kind of scrap, seemingly not at all perturbed if the change of color came right in the center of a flower.

Designs were copied from old old-cloth, or the flower gardens or the family pets formed the motif.

**Making Your Own**

While antiques give pleasure by their beauty, a woman will never get the thrill out of owning one that she can have if she will hook her own. It is an adventure to see the colorful picture grow under your very own hands.

You can get the softness of antique colors by using faded scraps or dying them with pastel shades. Cutting flannel, calico, dresses, old sheets, silk stockings, even the children's play clothes can be washed, cut into half-inch wide strips, and dyed. Set your colors with salt and choose whether your rug will be cotton or wool, as one material should be used throughout. Silks made lovely rugs, but are not durable. You can buy burlap already stamped, or draw your own pattern.

**Simple Tools**

The only tools you need are a frame, shears, a rug hook and clamps. Make your frame of two pieces of soft wood two inches wide and a half inch thick. Buy the rest of your implements at the Five and Ten.

Fasten a narrow strip of cloth or ticking to the inside of the frame, with small, smooth-headed tacks. Baste the burlap for your rug to this ticking, pulling it taut.

To begin your rug, take any of the half-inch strips in the left hand under the rug. Push your hook down right on the line of the design, hook up the strip, pull it through the burlap, and form a loop, the height depending on how thick you wish to make your rug. One half inch loops make a nice, thick rug. Having formed the first loop, punch your hook through again, very near the first loop and pull a second loop through to the same height as your first loop. Start in the right hand corner of your pattern and work straight across to the left hand corner. Begin again at the right and work to the left on the second row. Continue until the width of the border is hooked, always drawing the end up on the right side of the burlap and curving with the loops.

The Design

Now take the colors called for and work out your design. It is a good idea to outline your pattern in color first to guide you in filling it in. Complete hooking the entire pattern and then fill in the background, in straight lines, always hooking from right to left.

If one wishes a "slipped" rug, pull the loops up to almost an inch and then cut off even with sharp scissors when the rug is completed. This gives a soft, rich surface and

## Phone Cable Is Wrecked By Gas Ditch Machine

Assuring service to telephone subscribers, the Southwestern Bell Telephone company was on the job for repairs five minutes after the test board received a report that a huge cable had been wrecked in the alley behind the Avalanche-Journal building, near 12th street, between Avenue H and Texas.

Repair workers of the telephone company say the cable was torn by a ditching machine of the construction company laying the gas line for the West Texas Gas company. Over 100 cable pairs were damaged, near 12th street, between Avenue H and Texas.

All telephones within the section south from 13th street between Avenue H and I were placed out of order as a result of the damaged line.

Officials of the local office of Southwestern Bell Telephone company have ordered 150 feet of new cable from Amarillo to replace service over the affected district. Workers will be on the job throughout the night and all telephones will be active tomorrow, the company assures.

## Management Of Mosque In Paris Brings Protest

PARIS, Aug. 4. (AP)—Parisians are protesting against the Mohammedan mosque near the botanical gardens of the city in run-down for tourists than for the benefit of the many Mohammedan residents of Paris.

The picturesque qualities of the mosque within the limits of bustling Paris are such a drawing card for tourists that Robert Bos, municipal councillor of the Val-de-Grace quarter, recently asked the prefect of the Seine for information about certain practices, among them a fee of 20 cents charged each visitor to a restaurant charge of \$1 for a meal without wines.

The latter charge, M. Bos points out, prevents all but wealthy Frenchmen from enjoying the Mohammedan restaurant and keeps out the simple "sidis" who follow humble pursuits in Paris, among them the sale of pearl beads and oriental rugs to foreigners in Boulevard cafes.

Paris donated the ground on which the mosque was constructed, the municipal councillor calls to official notice. At the door, he says, a Christian Parisian collects from his fellow citizens a fee of five francs for a sight of the mosque erected on ground donated by them. The Frenchman, as well as the tourist, once inside is invited to buy carpets and other wares of the orient which are on sale in a bazaar.

The mosque is one of the most modern in the world. It is the only one electrically lighted.

The visitors wait patiently to hear the Arab buzzer cry from the minaret, his voice blending strangely with honking of taxis and the rattle of trams. There is no god but Allah and Mohammed is his prophet. Come ye to prayer.

The Mohammedan restaurant is the only spot in France where it is necessary to drink bootleg liquor. Visitors must "bring their own" if they wish wine with their meals. Mohammedan doctrine forbids the drinking of alcoholic beverages.

"Watch some of our best players. They do not run. They glide. That's the way McLoughlin moved about the court. In my estimation Miss Wills sometimes makes the mistake of attempting to run around the court as some think she ought to. Great movement is not necessary for her. As she uniformly holds to position, great movement is not called for."

### Sister Revels Cobb

GEORGE SISTER hit a puncher for breaching records held by Ty Cobb.

Back in 1911, the Georgia puncher socked the ball to the extent of 420, to lead the American League in hitting eleven years later. Sister equaled the performance.

Another record of which Cobb was very proud, was that of having hit safely one or more times in 41 consecutive games. The same year 1922, that Sister tied Cobb's mark of 420, that best batting average ever made in the American League, he also surpassed Ty's consecutive hitting feat.

Starting July 27, Sister went on a hitting spree that didn't end until he had batted safely one or more times in 41 consecutive games, besting Cobb's record by one game but falling three short of Willie Keeler's 44 games made in 1893, which has stood for 33 years against the onslaughts of the game's greatest batsmen.

It was in 1911 that Cobb, with 248 base hits, set a new high water mark for getting the ball safe. During the season of 1920 the record was twice broken, Rogers Hornsby of the National League getting 250.

Several years ago, as I recall it, Sister made 10 hits in a row, only to be stopped in the same manner, a ground ball to the first baseman on which he was retired.

His Greatest Feat

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While George Sister went into the lead with 257.

However, Cobb still holds plenty more remarkable batting records for Sister to shoot at and a majority of them will remain unscathed.

Failed At This One

ONLY two days after he had threatened a hitting feat of which Ty Speaker is justly proud, the making of 11 consecutive base hits.

Speaker made his record during the season of 1920, noted for unusual batting feats. It included 10 single, two of them home runs and one double.

Sister's attack on Speaker's consecutive batting record was broken after he had made eight in a row. Unlike Speaker, Sister scattered a number of extra base hits into the effort, making his home run a triple, three-doubles and the same number of singles before he was stopped.

City's hitting of the Boston Red Sox was the pitcher to end Sister's base hit rampage. He made his ground out to first baseman Todd in the ninth attempt.

Timber Drive In Wyoming Streams Now In Full Sway

HEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 4. (AP)—Annual timber drives, which are rapidly decreasing in the United States with the building of railroads under way in Wyoming.

Most of the timber cut in this state is used for railroad ties. During the winter hundreds of thousands of ties are stacked or "banked" at the heads of small streams.

At the end of the summer, as the streams are filled by melting snows, the ties are floated down to shipping points.

The largest drive in Wyoming, if not in the United States, is that of the Wind river from DuNoir to the north.

More than 25 drivers are stationed in three camps along the river to see the ties are released.

At Riverton, the ties are guided by a spoolway to inspection sheds where they are stacked for treatment to withstand the elements.

## COOLIDGE IS HAPPIER THAN BEFORE RECENT "CHOOSE" EDICT

(The Associated Press) BOSTON, Aug. 4.—A marked change in the general attitude of President Coolidge—like that of the man who had "not something of his own"—has been noticed since he made the announcement "Sunday" that he would not choose to run for president in 1928.

Mr. Coolidge is described to those who are brought into closest contact with him as a much happier man. He is more talkative, although still far more reserved, freer in his preferences, and he seems to get more enjoyment out of the little incidents of daily life.

**Noticed Several Days**  
This change has been noticed for several days before the statement was issued and it is believed by many to show that he reached his decision some time before it was announced.

Meanwhile, the surprised Coolidge household is split into two groups which argue on the gentleness of the announcement. The argument "made about the word 'choose'" used by the president and whether he would accept the nomination now even if it were tendered him.

Whatever may have been the president's mind, it is believed from circumstantial evidence that he knew exactly what he wanted to say something before he said it.

**Sees Many Visitors**  
Between the time of the regular Tuesday morning press conference and the hour when he had asked the newspapers to call again for an announcement the president has accepted almost constantly in receiving visitors and in taking care of routine work of his office.

Exactly 24 minutes before the hour when he is expected to make the statement he called in Everett Sanders, his secretary, and handed him a piece of white paper on which the announcement was written in pencil. The president's handwriting and asked him to have this message typewritten on small pieces of paper. There was then no opportunity of mistaking what he meant to say.

These papers were handed by the president to the correspondents. Fifty minutes of twelve o'clock yesterday, it is said to say that another person had the slightest inkling of what Mr. Coolidge intended to announce.

Obviously enjoying the conversation, the announcement has created a decision he will say anything more about it in way of explanation.

**Probably To Retire**  
It is the opinion of some who have been associated with him for many years that Mr. Coolidge's statement means, without doubt, that he will not run even if tendered the nomination. This group recalls the famous six word statement in his message to congress last year: "I do not favor the honors," and how he stubbornly refused to sign the honor bill after it was passed. They recall that then he might have said:

"I will not sign," instead of "do not favor," just as yesterday he selected the word "choose" rather than "sign."

The other school of thought which includes many just as close to the president—those from Massachusetts—and more significantly his close friend and political manager, William M. Butler, is just as convinced that Mr. Coolidge would accept the nomination if tendered him, although he will not make a race for it.

**Others Say Way L-f Open**  
These persons argue that the words "do not choose" were selected with care and leave the way open to the president to accept the nomination. They feel that the president does show that he is satisfied and willing to retire at the end of his term and if any other course is to be taken, it must be at the explicit request of the people.

In the summer White House it is said there is no discussion whatever as to whether the president and Mrs. Coolidge or their guests of the statement.

Indication of the apparent belief of Mr. Coolidge, from his selection of the announcement of his choice is the information that he surprised even Mrs. Coolidge last night by the hearty manner in which he laughed while withdrawing a comic magazine picture at the same lodge. It is thought for the president to show his feelings outwardly to any extent.
