'Go Cooker' Travels Down Streets, Highways

Have you ever heard the expression, "If you could patent that, you'd make a million dollars?"

Well, that's exactly how Bill Worrell came to invent what may prove to be a million dollar idea.

"One summer, several years ago, I was down at Ft. Davis, when a friend of mine rode up on his motor bike."

"I fooled around and got my leg up against the exhaust. It cooked my leg. I thought, 'If it's hot enough to cook my leg it can cook anything.'"

"That's when I began thinking about the 'Go-Cooker.' The idea came in a flash but we built five models before the final product," Worrell stated.

According to Worrell, the one factor they tested and retested was backup pressure. The cooker had to be vented properly to prevent exhaust back-up damage to the engine.

The end result is cylindrical, about 8 1/2" high and 11" in diameter. The cooker is made of light weight aluminum alloy. It is attached with brackets to the bumper of the vehicle. The exhaust pipe passes under the cooker.

"It can be assembled or disassembled in approximately 20 seconds," Worrell commented, "and is extremely durable."

The process works off the heat from an internal combustion engine, there is also a model for a motorcycle. The cooking chamber is sealed so no exhaust enters it.

Worrell noted several persons have become involved in the project and it will be named Go-Cooker Inc. They are publishing a cook book, "Crusing Cuisine", to accompany the cooker. It gives recipes for everything from fried eggs to bar-b-que chicken.

The recipes use miles per hour and distances rather than temperature and times.

Worrell gave these examples:

-100 miles, at 55 mph, a five pound roast well done.

-50 to 60 miles, at 55 mph, baked potatoes.

-12 to 14 miles, at 55 mph, bacon, eggs and biscuits.

He explained the operation for cooking as very simple.

"I wrap a chicken in foil, season it and set it in the cooker. Then I head for home."

To cook eggs, he places a tin foil pan, containing the eggs, on the bottom of the cooker, covers it with another foil pan and places still another with bacon in it upright on that one and covers it. A third pan containing biscuits is also placed inside the cooker. He then drives from his house to the airport (12 to 14 miles) breakfast is ready.

"The real beauty of the thing is, after you've finished breakfast, you simply place the dirty dishes in the cooker with soap and water and they wash as you drive down the road."

"It eliminates having to fight the restaurant hassle when traveling. No waiting for a dirty table, greasy ill-prepared food, unpleasant waitresses and high prices.

Instead you pull into a quiet roadside park and enjoy a home cooked meal with very little mess.

A spin-off from the "cooker" invention is a hot water heater. "It's ideal for campers," Worrell noted. "It holds enough for a good hot shower when you stop for the night."

The hot water heater functions on the same principle as the cooker.

When asked what he plans to do with his first million dollars, Worrell said he would do a lot of nice things for his mother, daughter and sister.

Worrell's mother, Mrs. John M. Worrell, lives in Colorado City. Worrell has moved to Odessa where he teaches Art at Odessa College.

Texas Monthly and NBC recently did features on Worrell's invention. "I was down on the Pecos making photographs for Myriah Magazine when NBC finally tracked me down. I was very flattered and happy," Worrell commented.

The television segment was filmed in Odessa and aired Thursday.

The cooker is currently in production and can be delivered within six weeks. The smaller model and the hot water heater for a motorcycle must be special ordered. The large cooker sells for \$119.95.

From time to time different publications are sent or brought to the Record office. A great many of these are informative and interesting but not newsworthy.

For this first column I have decided to incorporate some of the information which I found of interest personally.

Texas Forest Service, College Station, TX 77843 Topic: New publications Available on Shade Trees (available at no cost from above listed address).

Briefly, the circular outlines, in non-scientific language descriptions and habits of major tree pests, most susceptible tree species, visible damage and approved control methods. This indicated pests common to trees in our area.

Another pamphlet deals with the fur industry in Texas. It noted the sale of trapping licenses has increased from a mere few thousand to 37,770 last season due to soaring fur prices. During this past season more than 32,000 hunters and trappers took 1,139,678 pelts valued at \$18,160,090. Taken pelts were listed in order of rank; raccoon, opossum, ringtail, red and gray fox and nutria.

Two predators which are not classified as furbearers, the coyote and bobcat, have become highly valuable. A total of 94,482 coyote pelts brought \$2,210,680 while 22,900 bobcat brought \$1,470,180.

The Wildlife Department has sent out questionnaires to trappers because of the jump in licenses sold. These harvest figures will be extremely important in management of this valuable resource.

Emergency Farm Aid Requested By ASCS

On May 21, 1979 approximately 50 farms were hit by severe flooding. On June 4, 1979 approximately 100 farms were severely damaged by flooding.

This was the report requesting emergency assistance sent to the State Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service by Don Stewart, Executive Director of Mitchell County ASCS.

This action was taken after the regular monthly meeting of the County Committee Wednesday.

Stewart noted in the request that farms which had received emergency assistance in the past 10 years would not be eligible.

Similar damages occurred, according to the report, in 1970-71; 1975-76 and 1977-78.

Stewart stated he believes of the approximately 150 farms involved only 25 to 50 will be eligible because of prior assistance.

He estimated the need for repairs to 30 water-way acres, 52,800 cubic yards of diversion terraces and 6,363,000 feet of terraces.

A total of 24,000 acres of farmland are involved. He estimated a total cost of \$145,680 with the farmer paying 20 percent.

Stewart stated the prevented planting date which had been June 10 with five days to report, has been moved by the state ASCS office back to June 25 due to wet weather.

"Most of the farmers will plant. They have used a chisel to knock down the high places and plan to repair the damage this fall after

the crops are out of the field," Stewart said.

Mitchell County farmers have until July 1 to certify their crops. Stewart pointed out this date will not be extended. There are about 800 farms and 500 farmers in the county and of those only 15 have certified.

"That leaves 10 days to certify 500 farmers," he commented. "They need to come on in and if there are some failed

acres we can adjust those later," he commented.

Stewart added without certifying the farmer will not be eligible for assistance under any government program.

He also reminded farmers with wheat not to cut it if it is certified as grazed acres. To do so will put the farmer out of compliance and he will not be eligible for disaster benefits.

Area Farmers To Have Enough Fuel

Mitchell County farmers with few exceptions have not felt the effects of the existing fuel shortage according to reports from the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The Federal Energy Administration has supplied ASCS with forms to be distributed to any farmer, upon request, who has trouble obtaining fuel.

Insurance Bids To Be Awarded

Bids for city health and liability insurance will be awarded at a special called meeting of the City Council 2 p.m. Thursday at City Hall.

According to City Secretary Brenda Tarter, also listed on the agenda is discussion of city airport.

This provision include propane, butane, motor gasoline, kerosene, diesel fuel and miscellaneous others.

ASCS noted they only disburse the forms. Each farmer mails the completed form to the Energy Agency.

Farmers are reminded by ASCS that July 1st is the deadline for certifying set-aside and crop acreages.

Regular conservation program cost sharing money may be available for Mitchell County farmers upon request and participants are reminded to report completion of practices as soon as possible.

Those farmers who have not earned cost shares in recent years and who have damaged terrace systems may be eligible for cost sharing. However, they are reminded to contact Soil Conservation Service before repairing the damage.

"We are so very glad to live here and to know so many wonderful people," she stated.

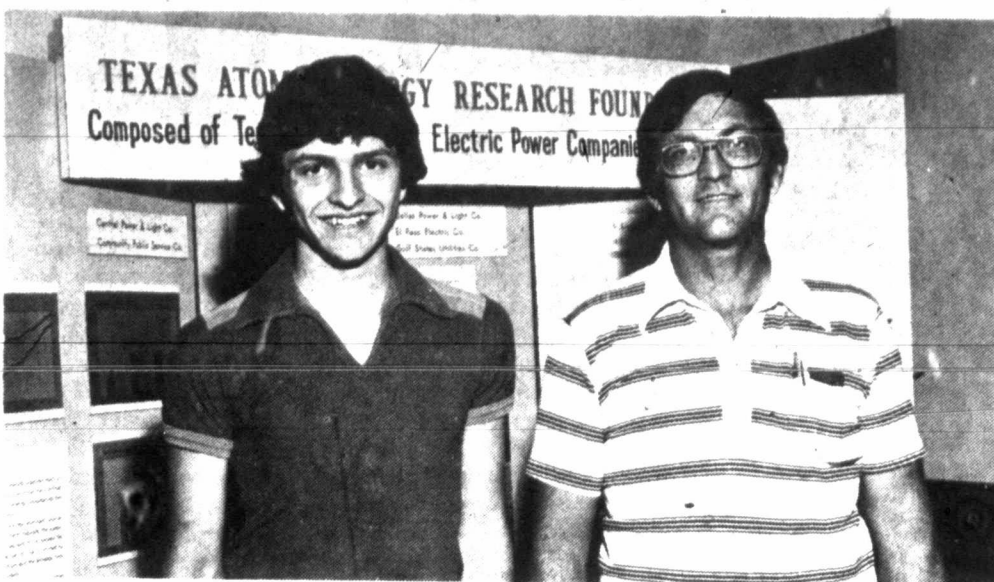

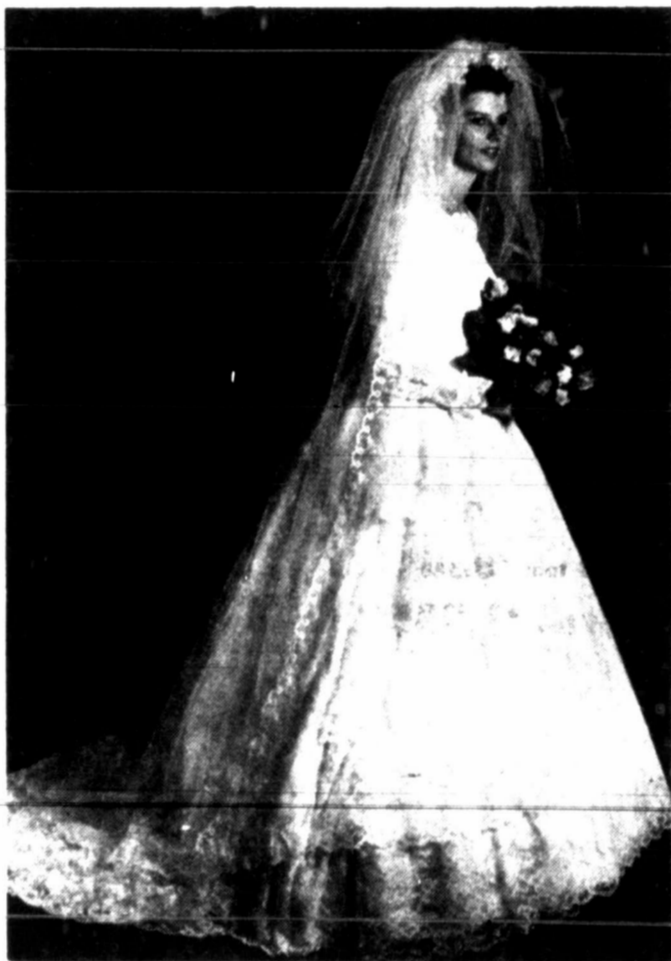

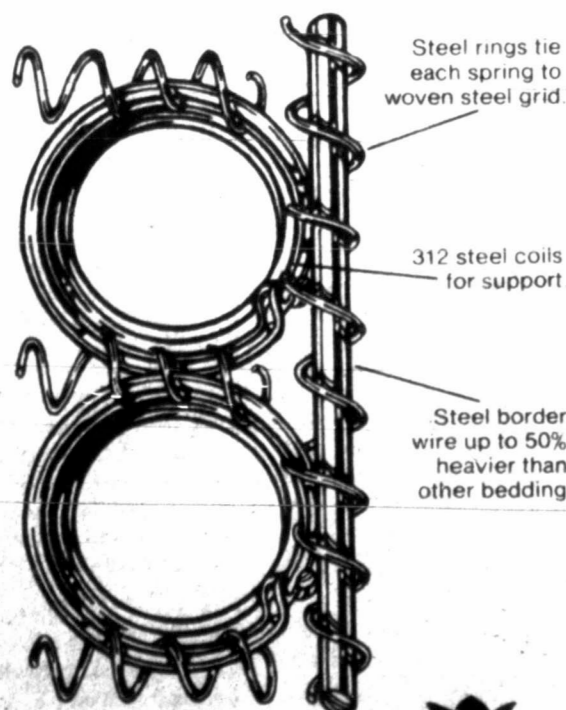
