

Judge Grants Estes Trial Continuance

OAS May Be Giving Up Its Struggle

By ANDREW BOROWICZ ALGIERS (AP)—Leaders of the terrorist Secret Army Organization in Oran, which has virtually held that city in its grip for months, appeared today to be giving up the bloody struggle. It was too early to be certain that the secret army was fading off the scene in the western Algerian city.

There were no fresh reports of violence in Oran, which has frequently been tortured by explosions and fires for weeks. Telephone communications, cut by sabotage, were returning to normal. A huge fire on oil tanks on the waterfront caused authorities to close the port Tuesday, blocking the exit of European refugees by ship for at least 48 hours.

Change Of Site Is Being Considered

By RAYMOND HOLBROOK PECOS (AP)—Dist. Judge J. H. Starley postponed today the trial of Billie Sol Estes on state charges of defrauding a fellow Reeves County farmer and said he would move the case out of West Texas. Judge Starley said Judge John F. Union of 175th District Court in Bexar County (San Antonio) was agreeable to accepting the case.

Estes was indicted in Reeves County in April on eight counts of felony theft after six farmers charged they were defrauded of a total of \$828,576 as a result of making purchase agreements with Estes for fertilizer tanks. The Pecos trial this week, however, involved only the one count which dealt with Bell's agreement with Estes.

Change of site is being considered. The panel of 22 prospective jurors was called into court and dismissed. He asked both the state and defense for recommendation for a change of venue. Defense attorneys questioned prospective jurors closely about whether they were familiar with newspaper, wire service, magazine, radio and television accounts of Estes' activities.

Say USDA Given Advance Warning

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate investigators were told today the Agriculture Department had advanced warning of Billie Sol Estes' get-rich-quick deals in cotton acreage allotments in Texas with one in Washington calling a halt.

Paul W. Kaminerick, assistant counsel to the Senate investigations subcommittee, testified he has learned that the warning was given as far back as Dec. 29, 1960, and that every one of Estes' discredited cotton acreage deals was sanctioned at later dates by farm aid officials in Texas with one in Washington calling a halt.

He said H. L. Manwaring, Agriculture Department deputy administrator of production adjustment, ruled on that date in 1960 that the complex deals under which Estes was to sell land to farmers, then lease back the cotton acreage allotments on these acres, appeared to constitute a scheme or device which should not be approved.

Kamerick, a former FBI agent, said he found the Agriculture Department to be a sort of bureaucratic jungle that needs an overhaul. But he said he considers it inconceivable that inefficiency or carelessness alone could explain all that happened in the Estes case.

With Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman a scheduled witness, Kamerick's testimony opened the Senate subcommittee's massive investigation of the scandals flowing from the collapse of Estes' Texas financial empire.

Freeman once said the Estes affair was being ballooned out of all proportion but later he was quoted by Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., as saying he regretted the remark.

Sen. Karl E. Mundt of South Dakota, the ranking Republican on the subcommittee, said "We are as much concerned with discovering what's wrong in a system which has permitted a man like Estes to operate as he did as we are concerned with discovering who was responsible for such derelictions."

The subcommittee is searching among other things for evidence of any political influence in connection with Estes' multimillion-dollar cotton, grain storage and other dealings with the government. A House subcommittee conducting a separate inquiry is in temporary recess.

Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., the subcommittee chairman, reviewed in an opening statement the law that Congress enacted in 1953 which made it possible for farmers, if cowed out of their lands by public projects, to transfer their cotton allotments to other land acquired by them.

"Under these circumstances allotments have a distinct monetary value; land with a cotton allotment in a cotton-producing area is far more valuable than land without a cotton allotment," McClellan said.

During 1961, he said, 8,718 acres of cotton allotments were transferred in the United States. Of this number 60 per cent were transferred to two counties in Texas—Reeves and Pecos. Of the total transferred to those two counties, 60 per cent accrued to the benefit of Billie Sol Estes. The inequity is apparent. Domesticity Needs Prestige, Says Esther Peterson

WASHINGTON (AP)—If women did not have a low grade opinion of their own value around the house, at least one very important working mother would have a lot less work to do.

She is Mrs. Esther Peterson, assistant secretary of labor and director of the Women's Bureau.

As such she has recently been busy urging Congress to eliminate inequities in wages, job and advancement opportunities among some 25 million women in the nation's working force.

But she also wrangles her brow about two other problems: the working mother's need for dependable help at home, and the need for more employment opportunities for the mature woman without previous business training or experience.

These two dilemmas could solve each other, and industry could benefit at the same time, points out Mrs. Peterson who has four young Petersons at home.

"But everybody has to have a little more respect for domesticity. We need to make it a bit more of a profession."

Prestige Needed

"Who has already had success and experience in raising children and taking care of a home? Why, older women of course," she tall, handsome blonde sometimes answers her own questions.

If there was more prestige and more money for this kind of work, older women would be unshamed to take over chores left behind by the mother on the job, she says.

"But women are to blame. We downgrade our work so we can't attract the pay for it when somebody else must do it."

Of course, working women must have salary large enough to make them to do the job. Adequate help around the house. And these have not been sympathetic enough to help women to do their own jobs. We have to make it a profession.

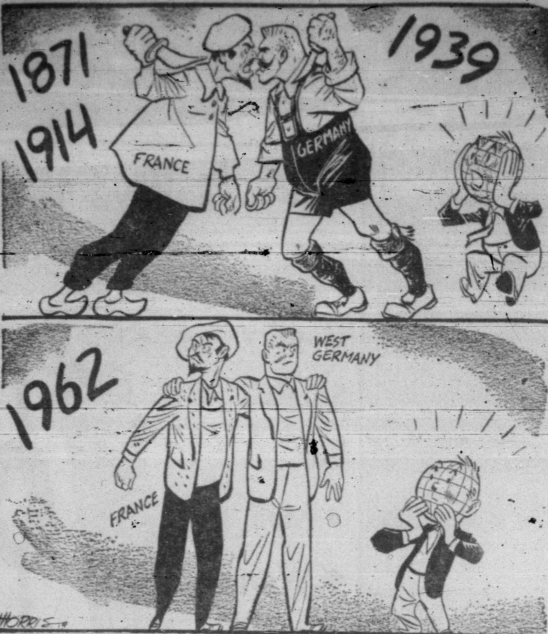

"I wouldn't mind if you had a little fire around your middle, Grace, but does it have to be a truck tire?"

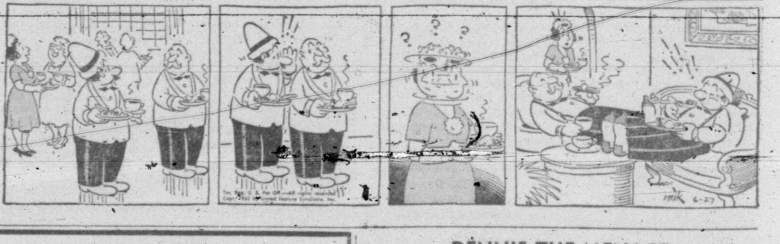

QUESTION: When did the first covered wagon trains cross the Rocky Mountains?

ANSWER: The crossing of the Rockies by covered wagon was part of the great push toward the West which had begun years before. By the terms of the peace treaty with England after the Revolution, the U.S. was to be granted the English territory west to the Pacific. But there were French and English settlers in this area as well as hostile Indians. In 1778 George Rogers Clark set out to establish the U.S. claim and succeeded in defeating combined French, English and Indian forces. This victory started the movement of settlers westward. St. Louis and Independence, Mo., became known as starting points for covered wagon trains. The Santa Fe Trail led southwest toward Santa Fe and the Rio Grande; the famous "Oregon Trail" crossed the Rockies further north. The honor of being the leader of the first covered wagon train to cross the Rockies belongs to Capt. B. L. Bonneville, who took his party over the South Pass in 1822. Soon pioneers by the hundreds were moving west in the "Great Immigration" of 1843. 900 people crossed the plains and mountains in a body and settled in the Columbia Valley.

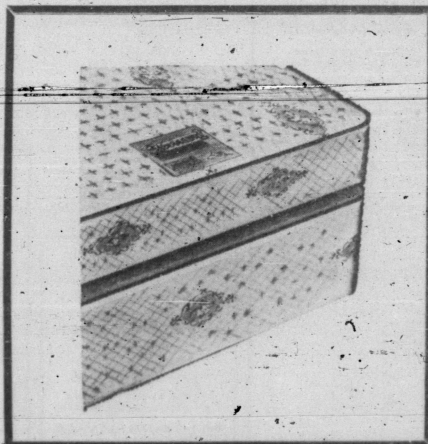
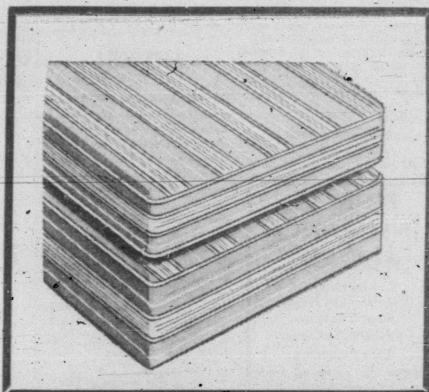
