Car License Tags on Sale Today

Over 1,300 New Tags Issued Up to Wednesday Night

Acting on a new ruling of the state statutes, Sheriff Talley's office is continuing the sale of 1943 license tags for cars and trucks through today, April 1. License tags purchased after today will carry an added penalty if the car or truck is operated on the highways after the 1943 license expires. New tags issued up to 6 p. m. Wednesday were as follows: passenger cars, 896; commercial cars and trucks, 97; farm trucks, 337. It will be illegal to operate any car or truck on an public highway after today unless same carries a 1943 tag.

OPA to Enforce Car Speed Limit

Even though Attorney General Allen has ruled that the State Highway Department exceeded its authority in fixing the maximum speed limit on all Texas highways at 35 miles per hour, the OPA says that persons who drive over 35 miles per hour will become ineligible for either gasoline rations or new tires or recaps.

State OPA Director has requested that Homer Garrison, Director of Texas Department of Public Safety, to have his state highway patrolmen furnish OPA offices with tickets on motorists who exceed the 35-mile speed limit.

Auxiliary Hallie Payne at Denton

PORT OGLETHORPE, Ga. Mar. 29.—Auxiliary Hallie E. Payne of Perryton has completed four weeks of basic training at the Third Training Center of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps here, and has been selected for specialist training in administration at Texas State College for Women, Denton, Texas.

She will receive detailed instruction in preparation for taking over behind-the-lines Army job, retraining a soldier for combat duty. There are now nearly 100 jobs in which WAAACs replace soldiers, among them are: bakers and cooks, camera technicians, chauffeurs, classification specialists, clerks, cooks, craftsmen, librarians, machine repair operators, stenographers, telephone operators, truck drivers, typists and weather observers.

Ochiltree county has been assigned a quota of 1,000 lbs. of scrap from every farm in the county. There are many farms that have been cleaned. There are others that have tons of unsalvaged scrap. Now is a good time to get in the scrap. The 1,000 lbs. per farm average quota is for the first six months of the year.

Let us urge parents and relatives of service men from the Perryton area to furnish us with correct mailing addresses. April Quota Is \$199,000 War Bonds

W. B. LaMaster, county Victory Bond chairman, and C. E. Woods, cashier of the Perryton National Bank, were in Canadian Tuesday night for a regional meeting to make plans for the special April drive for bond sales. Ochiltree county has been assigned a quota of \$199,000 for the month. Quotas for other counties in this district are as follows: Lipscomb, \$89,000; Roberts, \$138,000; and Hemphill, \$124,000.

Plans for the Ochiltree county drive will be made this week. Carl Ellis, president of the First National Bank, is chairman of the Ochiltree County War Bond sales committee. Committees will be appointed and plans for the county drive made this week by Mr. Ellis and Mr. LaMaster.

Plan Monthly Post War Study Meeting

A near capacity audience heard C. Wedgeworth, superintendent of the Perryton schools, discuss Post War conditions of the 1914-18 World War and plans for an abiding peace after the present conflict is concluded. Mr. Wedgeworth, in an able presentation, stressed the importance of an equitable and fair economic interdependence among all nations as the solution to the problem to end all wars.

The meeting was called by the Perryton Pastor's Association. Much enthusiasm and interest was manifested by those present. The group voted to continue the meetings under the same sponsorship, meetings to be held on the last Wednesday night of each month.

Wave Anna Tevis at Wacoina School

MADISON, Wis., Mar. 25.—One of Perryton, Texas women "serving in Navy blue," Anna E. Tevis, 24, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Tevis, Route 3, reported to the Naval Training School for WAVES radio operators at the University of Wisconsin here Monday to begin a 16-week course in sending and receiving code messages. Upon completing the course she will be assigned to duty at a Naval shore station within the United States and may be promoted to a third class petty officer rating.

Having completed a five-week indoctrination course at Hunter College, the Bronx, New York City, she is now enrolled in the regular Navy course given to men radiomen. Her curriculum will include learning to maintain and care for radio batteries, enciphering and deciphering code messages, and adjusting and repairing radio direction finders and sound equipment.

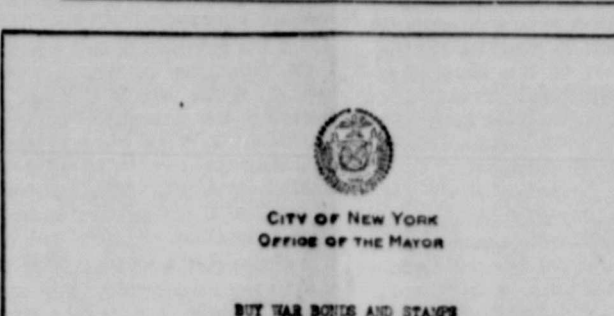

'Town and Farm in Wartime'

Ration Reminder
GASOLINE—"A" Book Coupons No. 5 good for four gallons each from March 22 to May 31.

SUGAR—Coupon No. 12 good for 5 lbs. Must last through May 31.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 26 (1 lb.) expires April 25.

TIRES—Class A First inspection deadline March 31.

SHOES—No. 17 stamp in War Ration Book One good for one pair until June 15.

FOOD—Red "A" stamps, valid March 29, good for 16 points worth of meat, cheese, and butter. Blue stamps D, E and F good from March 25 through April 30.

No Restrictions on Food in Lockers
Food in frozen food lockers may be used by farmers and other consumers without rationing restrictions.

The total amount of perishable food stored in lockers in private homes, on farms, and in commercial plants is considered too small to justify the inconvenience it would cause all consumers either to have this food declared, or to place any legal restrictions on its use.

Soldiers Back to Farms
The War Department has announced procedures by which soldiers, as individuals, may obtain discharges from the Army to return to their farms.

Soldiers on active duty in the continental U. S., who are 38 years of age and over, may be discharged upon favorable consideration of written applications submitted prior to May 1, 1943. These requests must be accompanied by a letter or statement from local farm agents to the effect that the soldiers will be employed in essential agricultural activities if discharged from the Army. Such requests are made by the soldier to his immediate commanding officer. A soldier meeting these requirements will be discharged promptly unless his release will seriously affect the efficiency of his unit.

Farm Machinery
The Government freeze on the

last item of farm machinery needed for food crop production has now been lifted. Distribution directives for all having and harvesting machinery are expected to be issued to manufacturers before April 15. Approximately 75 per cent of all types of rationed farm machinery, which was frozen November 1, 1942, has now been freed for distribution and local rationing through county war boards.

Tire Certificates
Rationing certificates for tires and tubes may be used at any time convenient to the holder, according to a recent OPA order withdrawing the provision which limited the life of a certificate to 30 days after the date of issuance.

Fats Collections Are Short
Collection of waste kitchen fats during January increased nearly 900,000 pounds over the preceding month, but fell short of the monthly quota of 1,667,000 pounds, according to the salvage division of WPB.

Dealers to Give "Point Invoices"
All dealers in foods covered by the meals and fats rationing program have been advised by OPA to give "point invoices" along with their customary dollar and cents invoices for products sold.

Recapped Tires
Farm tractor and implement tires will be recapped hereafter only with a material made almost entirely of reclaimed rubber, and replacements will not be issued for tires that are recyclable, the OPA announced in a rubber conservation move.

Jeffers Urges Reduced Speed
In a letter to state governors recently, Rubber Director William M. Jeffers stressed the importance of reduced speed in connection with the unrationed tire recapping program, pointing out that reclaimed rubber is now being used exclusively for this purpose. This material is more apt to fail and cause accidents if driven at higher speeds than 35 miles per hour.

Walter LaMaster Completes Training
GREAT LAKES, Ill., March 29.—Walter Ben LaMaster, Jr., 32, husband of Mrs. Elda LaMaster, Perryton, Texas, today completed a 16-week training course in the Service School for Quartermaster here at the U. S. Naval Training Station.

Men graduated are sent either to the fleet or to an advanced Service School for additional instruction. Then they serve under veteran petty officers in their specialized fields, receiving more practical instruction and experience. Service School graduates will be eligible for petty officer ratings as soon as they are able to pass the qualifying examination after graduation.

Busy People's Time is Of Little Consequence

According to a survey made by the National Industrial Conference Board, average business and industrial establishments spent about 1000 man-days in '42 answering questionnaires and filing reports required by various agencies of the Federal government.

Half the number of firms included in the survey found it necessary to devote 5000 or more man-days to this work. The highest figure reported was 18,000 man-days. The figure did not include in most cases time expended on government reports by top executives, auditors and legal staffs.

One large public utility spent more than \$50,000 in compiling information requested in the motor truck questionnaire, put out by the Office of Defense Transportation. More than a million farmers operating motor trucks were aggravated by the impractical nature of most of the questions propounded in this questionnaire.

Have Your School Age Children Been Listed in School Census?

It is very important that every child of school age within the confines of the Perryton Independent School District be enumerated in the census now being taken by Mrs. Luther Wade, Superintendent C. Wedgeworth points out that the per capita apportionment from state funds is based on the number of pupils enumerated. Children, age 6 to 18 (age 6 before Sept. 1 and not over age 18 before Sept. 1) should be enumerated. Keep Insects Out Of Your Garden
Ochiltree county gardeners are going to have trouble with insects this year the same as they have always had, says County Agent E. W. Thomas. The first insect to contend with is the cutworm. This is a dark naked worm found an inch or two below the surface of the ground.

Evidence of the cut worm damage is usually noticed about the time young plants in gardens are pushing through the soil when they are cut off even with the ground, the wilted top usually lying near the beheaded root stalk. Corn and other field crops suffer the same fate. As a rule the worms themselves are nowhere to be seen; but if one removes the soil to a depth of an inch near a dead plant, one will likely find the worm curled up and motionless.

In the garden injury may be avoided by the use of poison bran mash, scattering it over the ground before the plants come up. The worms will then be killed before they have done any damage. Mash may be made up in small quantities as follows: Bran, one quart; Paris green or white arsenic, one teaspoonful; cheap molasses, one tablespoonful; water to moisten.

Tomatoes, cabbage or other large plants may be protected by fitting a collar of paper around the stem, setting it two or three inches in the ground and letting the upper edge be three or four inches above the surface. Tin cans with top and bottom cut out will serve the same purpose.

Worse to Come!

On the very day that food was emphasized as "America's outstanding problem at this moment," in an article by Frank Gannett, there appeared in the same issue of The Times-Union an Associated Press dispatch stating that New York City faced a potato famine.

That such a common food item as potatoes should be scarce, shows the thin ice on which we are skating with reference to the available food supply.

Taking this in connection with severe restrictions on canned goods, another common source of supply for the poor of our great cities, Mr. Gannett's statement that we are in danger of food riots does not seem overdrawn.

Today, food is short artificially. Meat and grains were produced last year in abundance. But fixed prices have prevented the natural price control of distribution. So food has been consumed at an unusually rapid rate by a population with rising cash income.

The Army and other government agencies have also over-bought. Warehouses are filled to overflowing.

But worse, far worse, is impending.

A real shortage, especially in the highly prized animal foods, threatens. We may have to eat our grain—with little butter on our bread—because there is not enough feed for livestock.

It will be well nigh a miracle if the coming crop year should equal the 1942 record, when weather was so remarkably favorable.

What has been the action taken by the administration in this crisis?

Has it followed a course which will aid and encourage maximum production of food and its delivery to markets?

All too clearly and obviously it has not.

There has been much talk about the farm labor situation, yet little practical action.

If Congress finally resolves to do what the administration has so long neglected, and exempt farm labor from the draft, such action may come too late.

Manufacture of farm machinery has been drastically reduced—at the very time when the farming areas lack the skilled workers to produce the food needed to meet the combined needs of our soldiers, our fighting allies and the civilian population.

It should be remembered that essential farm labor is skilled labor. A farm worker cannot be trained in a few weeks, or even months. Real knowledge and experience covering a wide field are absolutely required.

Yet it is remarkable what our farmers can do, even under severe handicaps, if they know their crops will bring a good return. To permit such a return, to give a real price incentive for maximum production is the course the government should follow.

Any other course is blind folly, which will hurt the very consumers our present price restrictions are supposed to protect.

February 22, 1943

North Africa

Dear Folks:

Just a few lines to let you know who some of the boys are I have seen that are from home. I have seen them since I have been in North Africa.

The first one I saw was Fred Wilson. I was going through a chow line and he was on K. P. I had been driving for about three days and I had my head down, someone said "Hello Short" and I knew it was some one from home the minute I heard his voice. He called me short. I have never gone by that name in the army. By the way that was in England.

The second one I met was Walter Nies he was on C. Q. so we had a long talk, mostly of Perryton. I have seen Walter twice since that time, but never in the same place twice.

The next one I saw was Norman Swink I was on another trip and I wasn't sure I was on the right road so I stopped along side of the road to inquire about the place where I was going and who should be in the gang but Norman. We had just a small chat as I was in a great hurry, so we didn't get to talk long.

Boy a person never knows how it is to see someone from home. I don't know who to thank for sending the paper, but whoever sends it I sure want to thank them a lot.

I am still driving a truck. I sure keep a good lookout for the boys I know from home. All of the boys I have met are all O. K. They are all ready to go back home to Perryton as soon as we started talking about it. I was too.

Well folks till I see you in Perryton I will say goodbye. I would like a letter from any or all of the Perryton people. I may not have time to answer them but I will try, so until "Victory" is made I remain,

The school really is fine, and I can realize it, as being close to Texas one can still get that "old southern hospitality."

There are a few fellows here from the east. They call us Rebels and we likewise call them Yankees. A fellow can hear all kinds of tales about the other fellows' state. I am beginning to think the civil war has never been fought, but is about to start again.

Well I must close, and "fall out," and thanks again for the paper. I really do appreciate the kindness of the "home folks."

My wife is here with me, and we are living in Nashville. We are glad to be together again. We have the privilege of attending church services very often, but we do appreciate the prayers of the home people. God has marvelously blessed us here. Not only are we being blessed, but many boys in the service realize God is with them.

I wish to thank you again for the paper and all the backing, we boys in the service get from home.

Somewhere in North Africa
February 10, 1943

Hello Mother:

Got another bunch of mail this a. m. sure set me back on my writing. I doubt if I ever get caught up again.

Got the air mail envelopes from Leroy that had been in the mails for so long. Tell him I'm sure glad to get them, they are a premium over here now. I can get envelopes if I could only get to the APO but I haven't seen it myself in months. It's not "just around the corner" over here.

Received your letter of Dec. 21 and one from Mrs. Myers of Jan. 5, all the rest were back mail.

I am sorry that the little handkerchief I sent got lost, but it may show up later. I'm sending you a little ring. I hope it doesn't have the same luck. Here's the story that goes with it. One morning after breakfast I decided to climb a nearby mountain and have a look at the valley on the other side, so I took my rifle and took off by myself. Near the top of the mountain I met an Arab boy about my age and he was wearing this ring. I liked it and offered to buy it from him, but he gave me the impression that it was a kind of a wedding ring, and not for sale. I dropped the subject and made sign talk with him for awhile and started to leave when he brought up the subject of rings again, and in the end, I bought the ring, so I guess it wasn't his wedding ring after all. I wanted to get one that had Arabic writing on it, but so far have not done it. The Arabs in this particular section are very friendly with us, in fact if you stop and start a conversation with them, its hard to get away, especially if you have cigarettes or tobacco. They sure go for American cigarettes or candy. They have neither.

One of them invited me to dinner with him the other day, but unfortunately I had to go on the set at 12:00 and could not accept his invitation. I have eaten two or three meals in Arab homes, but it was in a town. This one lived in a rock house on the south side of a bluff and I'd have given a lot to have gotten inside his house. They are queer people, if they invite you into their house its a sign of true friendship, and to refuse, seems to hurt them deeply. But in my case he understood that I was duty bound. They make a kind of corn bread from cracked wheat that is hard to beat. It's the nearest thing to corn

bread that I've ever eaten. I really like it. The wheat is not milled, only cracked, but it makes delicious bread. They cook it in much the same fashion as Mexicans.

Mother they skin a pig without ripping the hide up the belly, cure the hide, tie up all the leg holes but one, then use it to carry water in. Just pull a stopper out of the remaining leg hole and pour you a drink of water as tho it was a water bag. The first one I saw I thought the pig was still in it, ha, ha.

Arabs do not eat pork in any form. A bunch of us did our best to get an Arab kid to eat a piece of sausage one day, but no luck. We even denied it was pork, but still no luck. The little cuss knew better and stuck to it.

The weather is overcast today but is quiet warm. I think it must be getting fixed up for another rainy spell. I guess its next to impossible to fight a war in dry weather. Whenever the army goes the rain follows.

Mother we are quite comfortably located here, of course everything can't be so convenient in a front line camp, but at least we don't suffer for any reason so far, plenty to eat, sleep warm, and have about all the cigarettes we need. What more could a soldier ask for, as for pay, we haven't been paid in some time, but what's the use, you can't

spend money here anyway, just use it to gamble with. I still have money in my pocket from last pay day.

First place I ever saw that I had money in my pocket all the time, ha, ha.

Well there's not much to write here now. Oh yes, we were right next to Norman Swink's outfit for a month or more and I never bumped into him, that's the way it goes. I knew that most of the boys in that outfit were from Texas and Louisiana too, because I talked to some of them. The Lord only knows where they are located now. Yes, I'll know old Phil if I ever get a squint at that red hair or even hear him laugh. I'll know who he is. I'd sure like to run into him sometime.

Tell Verlin, Sis and Leroy that I'll try to answer their letters some of these days, but for now I'm swamped in fact I've got to bring this one to an end and get to work.

Write me every Sunday. I know that you are pretty busy the rest of the week, but I'll expect you to not miss a Sunday.

Tell everyone I'll well and happy.

The Ought of a Christian
Among the many other good things in the Bible for Christians, there are some Oughts for them which are very outstanding and important. The word ought from a dictionary standpoint means Obligation.

The first we wish to consider is the ought of Love: 1 Jo. 4:11—Beloved if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another. Is this not true, since God loves us to such an extent that He sent His son, His only son, down to this earth to die for us who are not worthy. But love, His love, made Him do it. Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.

Second is the Ought of Prayer—Luke 18:1—He spake a parable unto them to this end, that men ought always to pray, and not to faint; The prayerful life is a victorious life. Jesus spent whole nights in prayer so the word says and also we read that He rose early as was his custom, to pray and to get instructions for that day's duties. Perhaps also to receive Grace from the Heavenly Father for the trial that was out there waiting for Him. If Jesus needed to pray surely we as His children ought to pray. Jesus told his disciples when in the garden to watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation. I believe we can say from our own experience and from watching the lives of others that the fasting Christian is a prayerless Christian if there can be

such an individual as a Christian that never prays.

Third is the Ought of Patience—Rom 15:1—We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak and not to please ourselves. It may seem hard sometimes to bear with those who are weak. But Brethren if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted. Paul became all things to all men that he might win some to Christ. If a Christian becomes impatient with a weaker one and cannot bear with him in all things he will not win him to Christ.

Fourth is the ought of Forgiving 2 Cor. 2:7—So that contrariwise ye ought rather to forgive him, and comfort him, lest perhaps such a one should be swallowed up with overmuch sorrow. In the context of this scripture the apostle has gone through much sorrow and much bodily affliction which might have brought grief and a suggestion of Satan is always on hand to suggest a way of revenge, however for the Child of God and the one that wants to show forth a Christ like spirit. The Spirit of God is there to prompt a forgiving spirit and any other attitude of mind that might be needful in any situation. By forgiving we keep our integrity with God and melt the thrusts of the enemy in trying to over power us.

In the Sermon on the Mount we read, If we forgive not men their trespasses neither will your Father forgive your trespasses. Look at the treatment that Jesus received. He was innocent, yet when He hung on the cruel cross, He could look up to His Father and say, Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do. When Stephen was dying from being innocently stoned, he looked up and cried, Lord, lay not this sin to their charge. What a forgiving spirit! Let us do likewise.

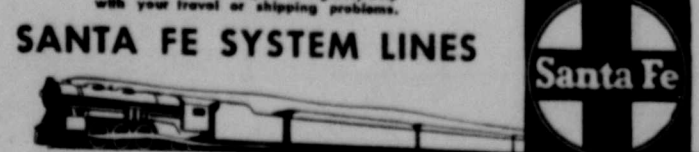

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NEWS IN THE WORLD
OF RELIGION
By W.W. REID

Not very many months ago the Rev. Edward J. Kroenke was preaching to the derelicts of New York's slums at the Inner Mission Chapel. Familiarly he was known as "the Bishop of Hell's Kitchen." Today he is Lieutenant-Colonel Kroenke, chief of chaplains under General MacArthur in the South Pacific. His friends have dubbed him "the Archbishop of the South Pacific."

Alarmed by the increase in juvenile delinquency in America, seemingly traceable to war conditions, the International Council of Religious Education, of which Governor Harold E. Stassen, of Minnesota, is the president, warns: "Christian teaching in our homes, churches and colleges must go forward more effectively than ever before to prevent defeat of the very aims for which the war is being waged. Group activities of churches through Sunday school classes, young people's societies, vacation church schools and clubs, are needed to stem the rising tide of juvenile delinquency, and in promoting mental health and character development."

Queen Salote, of Tonga, of the Friendly Islands of the South Pacific, has been named an Associate Dame of the Venerable Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem, in recognition of her service to the Order in raising funds for medical relief. The Queen, described as a very tall lady, is a Methodist class leader, an active member of the Christian Endeavor, and is the only person outside the British royal

family within the British Empire who is addressed as "Your Majesty."

Hundreds of mental hospitals are seeking conscientious objectors from the Civilian Public Service camps to act as attendants and nurses. There are about 600,000 hospital beds in mental institutions in the United States and there is difficulty in finding proper attendants because of the war, low wages, and the hardships and dangers of the work. Some 350 conscientious objectors are now serving in sixteen mental hospitals. Doctors and others are interested in finding whether or not the non-violent techniques advocated by pacifists will be successful in dealing with mental patients. The American Friends Service Committee and associated agencies which operate the C. P. S. camps hope to extend this service.

The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions (Congregational Christian Church) has just released a list of "forty immediate openings for Christian service overseas" for which it is now seeking missionary candidates. These posts are in Southern Rhodesia, the Union of South Africa, India, Turkey, Syria, China, and western Europe, and call for specially qualified men and women teachers, men and women physicians, surgeons, nurses, a male social worker, and several ministers. The Board lists the qualifications of a candidate as "Christian character, full commitment to Christ and his way of life, college or university training, plus professional courses and degrees; good health, practical experience." The Rev. Robert E. Chandler, 14 Beacon Street, Boston, Mass., is in charge of recruiting.

Illinois-born A. Garfield Anderson, M. D., who after thirty years of medical service under the Methodist Church in Union Christian Hospital, Pyongyang, Korea, was transferred to Nyadiri, Southern Rhodesia, Africa, to build a new hospital and medical service "from the ground" has been drafted by the British Government for additional medical work. The Government has asked him to superintend a clinic and hospital and a leper colony of 500 patients, at a place twenty miles from Nyadiri; and also a small hospital thirty miles in another direction.

As a means of promoting inter-American goodwill and also as an educational enterprise, the interdenominational committee on Christian Literature for Latin America is developing a series of books in Spanish and in Portuguese which will be circulated largely through the constituencies of the evangelical churches of the southern continent. The books are in the following subject-areas: the Bible, biography, life of Christ, church history, Christian philosophy of life, philosophy of religion, theology, social ethics, worship and devotion, the rural church, evangelism, missions, family and home, children's books, religious education, fiction. Dr. Wade Crawford Barclay is secretary of the committee planning the series.

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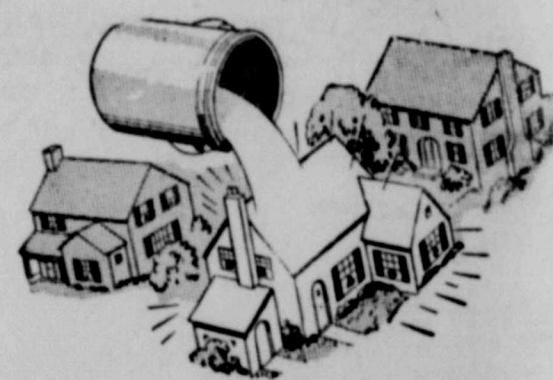
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
