Business Continues To Boom

Sales Tax Check Received By City

A state sales tax check made out to the city of Colorado City by State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert was the largest amount ever received by Colorado City.

The amount of the check was \$20,321.90, an indication that local business has reached an all time high.

Several new businesses have opened here in the last few months, plus the increase in employment at Colorado City Manufacturing, Sequoyia Mobile Homes and Foam Tex. There is some construction work being done around Colorado City, work is being done on Interstate 20 and all activity is on the increase.

The check was for sales taxes collected during the second quarter of 1973, April-June, and represents one cent for each dollar spent on which tax is collected, minus a small amount retained by the state for handling and bookkeeping.

The highest amount received by the city prior to the check was a \$18,379.47 check from sales during the last quarter of 1972, a peak business period because of Christmas buying.

The twenty-thousand plus check amounts to almost two thousand dollars more than the largest amount received, that

of last year's heavy shopping season.

Since the city approved the collection of the extra one cent in an election three years ago, the amount received has increased almost every time.

The smallest amount was \$14,

913.39 for the first quarter in 1972, usually a slack time as it follows the heavy Christmas spending quarter.

The first quarter for this year brought in a check for \$16,970.45, an increase from a year ago of about two thousand dollars.

The check for \$20,321.90 compares to \$14,617.05 received for the second quarter of 1972 and \$15,169.79 received for the second quarter of 1971.

Thus far this year, Colorado City has received \$37,292.05 which is almost \$7,000 more than was received thru the first half of 1972.

Fair Opens Thursday New Department Added

Chairmen for the Mitchell County Fair, to be held Oct. 4, 5 and 6, met Thursday afternoon to make final plans for the Fair to open next Thursday.

An important change in the rules for the Crafts Department was made that will allow a person to enter something in each of the different categories in Crafts.

Because of the success and interest shown in the Antiques display last year, fair chairmen decided to add an Antiques Department to this year's Fair. Chairman for the Antiques Department will be Mrs. Lora Timberlake.

Entries will be accepted from 7:30 a.m. until noon on Thursday. The barn will be closed to the public from 1-2 p.m. to allow the department heads to arrange the exhibits for judging and viewing.

Judging will be from 2-5 p.m., and the barn will also be closed during the judging. No publicity will be given to winners until after 5 p.m.

All exhibits will be open to the public from 5-10 p.m. on Thursday and from 10 a.m. through 10 p.m. on Friday and Saturday. All exhibits must be kept on display until 8 a.m. Monday morning, October 8 when the barn will be open for people to pick up entries.

The meeting should provide swine producers with the latest information on all facets of swine production, states Benson.

Constitutional Revision Study Concluded

State Rep. Elmer Martin confirmed for the Record Saturday that the Citizens Constitutional Revision Commission has concluded three months of public hearings on the Texas Constitution.

After hearing recommendations and ideas in 19 hearings over Texas, the Commission will now give final study to possible revisions and present their final report by November 1 to the 181 members of the Texas House and Senate who will convene in January, 1974, as a Constitutional Convention.

Martin of Colorado City, said House and Senate members will study and debate the proposed changes before presenting a final version of a proposed new Constitution or revisions to the existing Constitution to the people of Texas to be voted on in general or special elections throughout the State.

"I am anxious to receive the final Commission report in November in order to devote full time and study to the proposals before the Convention meets in January and also to have time to get the ideas of citizens throughout Jones, Fisher, Mitchell, Nolan and rural Taylor counties," Martin said.

Non-District Play Ends

The Hamlin Pied Pipers led the Colorado City Wolves to disaster Friday night as the undefeated Hamlin club scored eight touchdowns, three of which followed Colorado City fumbles and one on a punt return.

A large number of turnovers has stopped the Wolves efforts in their four games this season. Friday night, the Wolves fumbled six times.

The Wolves crossed the 50 yardline three times Friday night with the 37 yardline as the deepest penetration into Hamlin territory. The Wolves reached the Hamlin 37 twice, with one drive being stopped by a fumble, the second drive ended when the Wolves couldn't make the first down.

The only other time the Wolves crossed the 50, another fumble stopped that drive.

The Wolves got the kick-off and fumbled on the Wolves 36 a short time later. Two plays later, Hamlin's Johnny Jones went 31 yards up the middle for the score with Steve McKissack tacking on the extra point.

On the Wolves' next possession, there was another fumble on the Wolves 23 and again Jones ran for a touchdown, this time from 15 yards out. The try for extra points failed.

Jones scored his third touchdown after fielding a Wolf punt in a crowd on his own 44. He broke three tackles and ran for the score. The try for extra point was good.

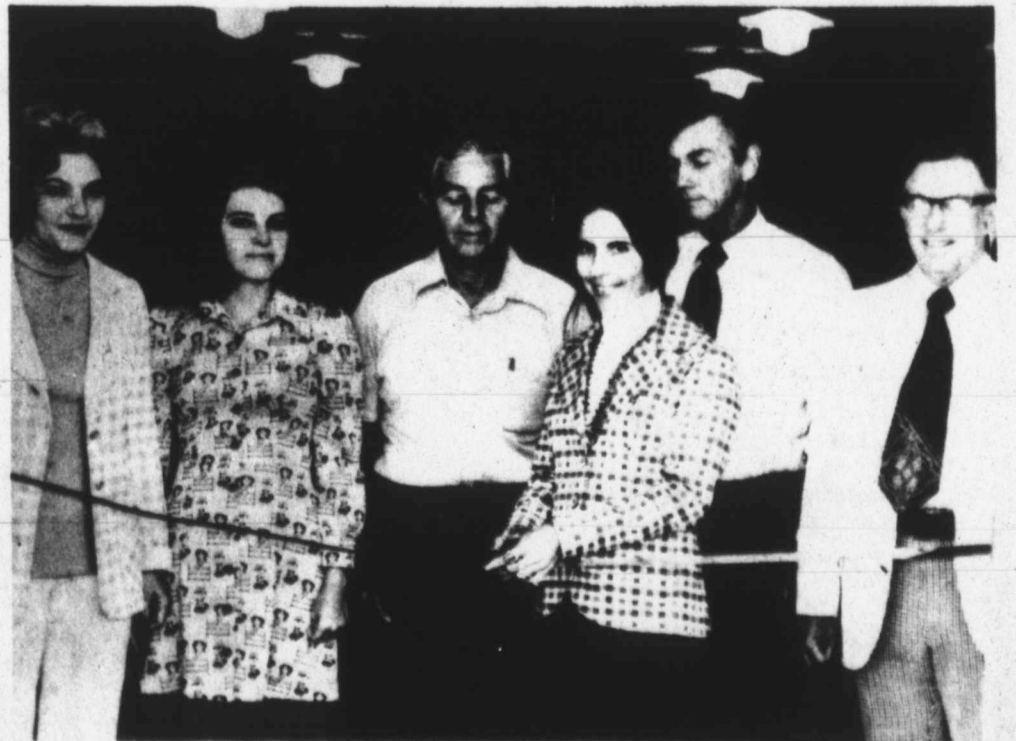

Savings Bond Sales Revealed

Series E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Mitchell County during the month of August totaled \$33,593, according to County Bond Chairman, Wayne Shawn.

Sales for the eight-month period were \$108,885 for 72% of the 1973 sales goal of \$150,000.

Texas purchased \$17,913,390 in Savings Bonds during the month while the year-to-date sales totaled \$155,083,171 compared to \$142,833,527 for the same period a year ago, an increase of \$12,249,644.
