Twenty Men Go To Army From County In March

Ten To Go Friday And Ten More In Next Two Weeks

Ninth And Tenth Calls Will See Twenty-Six Men Report To Draft Board

Announcement from the Dawson County Local Draft Board this week, states that ten more men have been called for induction on March 19th, making a total of twenty men will be inducted Friday of this week. The new order, issued Wednesday calls up the following men:

Many Pertinent Questions Are Explained Here

New Plan Will Provide Cotton Order Stamp Pay For Farmers Of Area

Pointing out the benefits to be derived by individual farmers from the new supplementary cotton program and the special home food conservation program to be administered by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, Vernon Martin, administrative officer of the AAA in Dawson County, this week begins a series of question and answer articles on the program.

"Now that the war has closed many foreign markets, the need for holding down the already huge surplus of cotton continues to be acute," the AAA official said. "With this reduced outlet for cash crops, it is more necessary than ever that farm people produce more food and feed for home consumption."

The supplementary cotton program puts added emphasis on the efforts to reach the objectives of the national farm program through special payments. A total of \$25,000,000 worth of cotton stamps will be made available by the Surplus Marketing Administration for distribution by the AAA to cooperating farmers. In addition, \$3,000,000 in cash payments will be added to encourage additional food production and storage for home use.

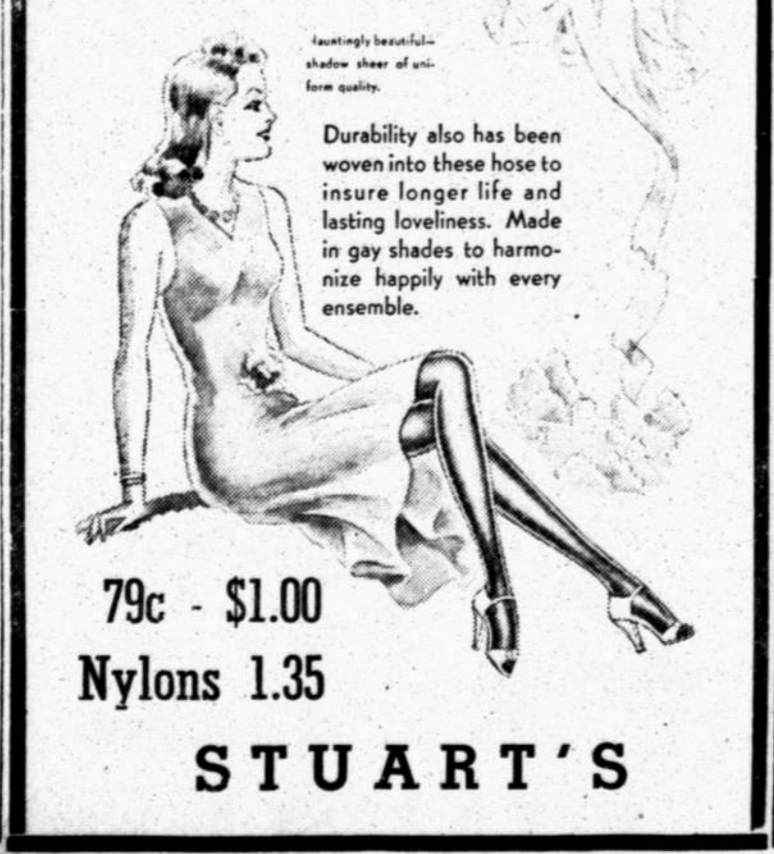

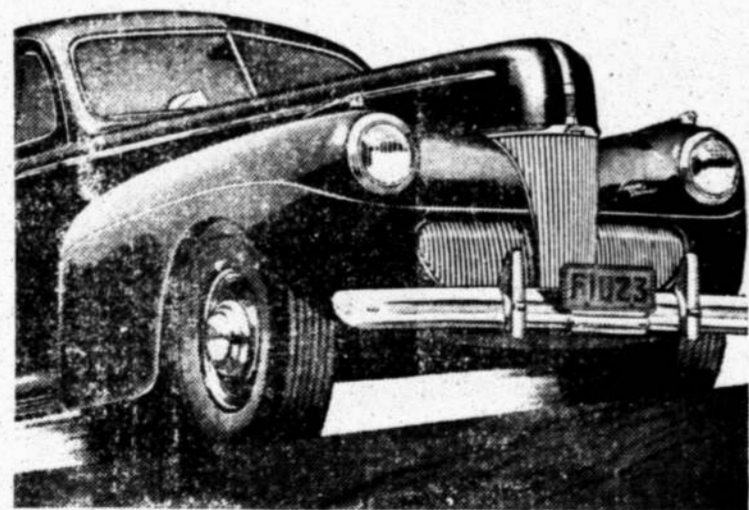

WASHINGTON — This is the tale of Falla, the most famous dog in America today.

Falla is a jet black scottie. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt calls him the "wigglingest bundle of fur you ever tried to lay hands on," resident Roosevelt calls him "Falla."

His formal name is "Falla of Murray Hill." It was appropriated from one of the President's old Scottish ancestors. Falla of Murray Hill, so the story goes, was an outlaw in the days when being suc-

cessful as a Scottish outlaw was as much of an achievement as being elected President of the U. S. for a third term.

Falla came to live at the White House something less than a year ago. He was a gift from one of President Roosevelt's Dutchess county relatives.

The President doesn't say from whom and he doesn't say anything about Falla's parents, ancestry or kennels either. The reason is obvious. Many persons would pay fabulous sums and burst with pride if they could say: "My pup is a sister (brother, cousin, nephew, niece) of the dog who lives at the White House." The only thing I could dig out was that Falla was born in Indianapolis of pretty royal scottie blood.

Aside from the squirrels that camper around the White House lawn and the pigeons that bum a

luxurious living along the White House paths, Falla has in a bid for the only permanent animal resident in the Roosevelt administration.

Jack and Jill, two beautiful brown cocker spaniels that belong to Mrs. John Boettiger, daughter of the House of Roosevelt, have been popular guests, but their tenure never was long. There was another scottie, but he was a snappish sort and had to be packed off to the country before he had got to first base in Presidential affection.

With Falla it's different. There hasn't been a day that he hasn't wagged his way a little deeper into the President's heart, and if there is any one on the White House staff who has ever thought, "Damn that dog!" it has never been uttered in a whisper anyone could hear.

One of the ceremonies of the President's day is giving Falla his evening meal. No one else dares cut in. Mrs. Roosevelt commented recently that Falla is rapidly becoming a one-man dog. There's no doubt about it. Who else would have had the effrontery to try to crash the President's third inaugural by hopping without invitation into the limousine and perching proudly on the back seat at the President's side?

Another thing about Falla is his rapidly increasing travel mileage. He has been to Hyde Park so many times he knows the trees there as well as he knows those on the White House lawn. And when the President made his last Caribbean cruise, Falla sailed with the Skipper, as first mate. He got seasick, too, and like all the others he made a dash for the rail. Fortunately, he was caught before he slipped over for a dog-paddle in the briny.

If any further proof were needed that Falla is the nation's First Pet, it could be found in the amount of fan mail he gets. I'll bet you there isn't a glamour boy in Hollywood who wouldn't be proud to do so well.

In addition, Falla has such a surplus of luxuries that he couldn't use them all if he outlived the oldest living scottie. There isn't a manufacturer of flea powder, dog biscuits, curry combs or collars that wouldn't be happy to have Falla head his testimony list and most of these pass out generous samples just in hope.

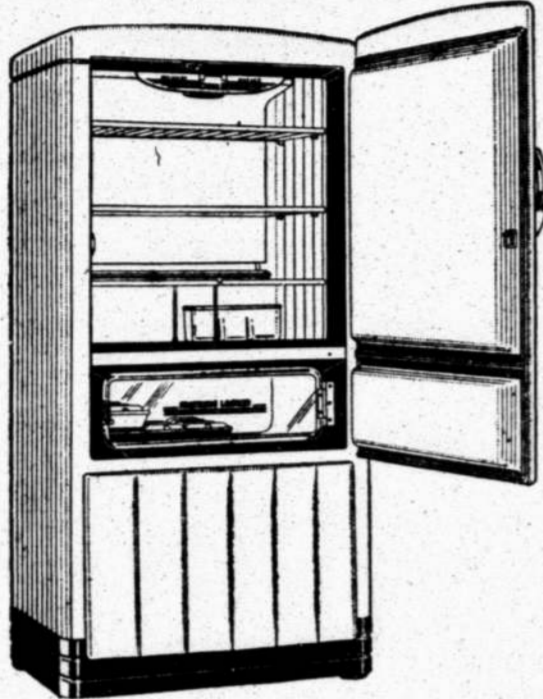

Safer Highways Are The Results Of Safer Driving

As a vital factor in reducing highway fatalities in Texas, the need of additional Highway Patrolmen is cited in a statement of the Texas Safety Association. "In every instance where highway and street deaths have been reduced within a certain city or section of the state," the report declared, "the enforcement of traffic laws has been a very important part of the safety campaign."

The association has released a comparative report covering the period from 1939 through 1940 which reveals that highway deaths have fluctuated opposite to the increase or decrease of the Patrol force. During a three-year period from 1935 through 1937, after the Patrol force had been increased to 126 officers and men, the fatality rate decreased from 16.6 to 14.6 per hundred million miles of vehicular travel. The force was increased to 251 officers and men for 1938 and 1939, and in these two years the death rate dropped to a low of 10.2.

When the Patrol force was reduced for 1940, the report reveals that the death rate on streets and highways increased. During last year 174 more deaths occurred from traffic accidents than in 1939. The January toll of 161 persons killed in Texas street and highway traffic accidents still presents a gloomy picture, the report stated. "This increase in deaths amounts to 9.5 per cent over the same month in 1940. In cities where stricter enforcement has been made the fatality rate dropped 16.7 per cent under January 1940. However, on the open highways, where more patrolmen are needed, deaths from accidents during the first month of 1941 increased 32.4 per cent over the figures of a year ago."

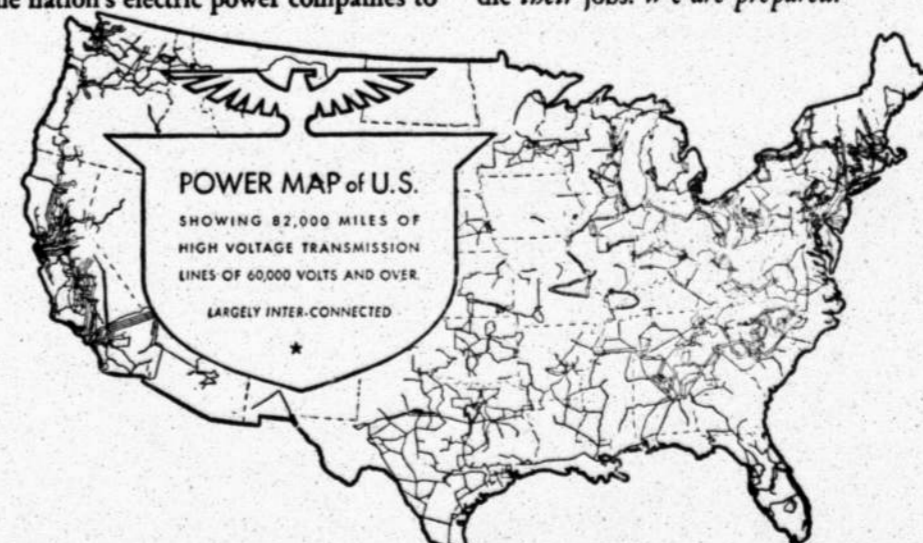

Failure of the registrant or any other person concerned to exercise any right or privilege within the time authorized by the Selective Service Regulations or within an extension of time granted by the Local Board, may constitute a waiver of such right or privilege.
