Good schools are, and always have been, the bulwarks of American liberty and freedom. The making of good citizens of our boys and girls ranks next to the happy home as a National obligation. The Home Demonstration clubs of our country are not only solving the "live at home" program but are helping wonderfully in the improvement of homes and schools. The Federal Government should continue its support of all Extension work.

The Texas Technological College, located in this Congressional District, should be made a land grant college. It is as much entitled to Federal support as any other college anywhere.

Amend Federal Income Tax laws so that Profiteers, Big Bankers and Investment Banks will have to pay their proper income taxes. The very rich largely evade payment of taxes. The very poor pay no taxes at all and the tax burden, therefore, falls on the Middle Class, the COMMON PEOPLE—such as you and I. This ought to be changed and it can be with sufficient representation.

I would study economy of Government and vote for it as I did in the Texas Legislature when appropriations were cut \$13,000,000.

**Solution of Crime Problem**

Gangsters, Chislers, Racketeers and Profiteers certainly are a National problem today as well as a National disgrace. The cost of crime is estimated at some thirteen billion dollars annually which is more than the cost of the National Government with such emergency measures as RFC, AAA, OWA, PWA, and all the bal-

## Corn-Hog Reduction Contracts to be Ready By January 1st

County Agent, Joe Williams, stated this week that the Corn-Hog Reduction for 1934 would be ready to sign about January 1.

The contracts read that farmers who sign the corn-hog reduction contracts must agree to reduce their corn acreage 20 per cent below the average of 1932-33 and to curtail their litters of pigs and hogs marketed from these litters by 25 per cent. Such a reduction should help the home market to absorb the present surpluses and raise prices of both corn and hogs next year, Administration leaders believe. Farmers who cooperate in the plan will be paid 30 cents per bushel less local administrative costs for the corn they don't raise next year on their retired corn acres, and \$5.00 per head for the 75 per cent hog crop they market. The five year average corn yield on the 1929-33 period will determine the yield on the retired acres.

Farmers who have been in the habit of buying feeder pigs to feed out may continue to do so after signing the contract but they must agree not to buy and feed more than they did in 1932 and 1933. Payments however will be made only on the hogs raised and sold by the farmer.

Half the corn payment or 15 cents per bushel is promised as soon as possible after the contract is accepted, and the remainder next fall. Of the hog payment \$2 is promised as soon as possible after the contract is accepted, \$1.00 next November and the remaining \$2 per head less administrative expense in February of 1935.

## Local Farmer Found Dead from Gun Shot Wounds Saturday

Frances M. Mullins, 58 year old farmer, residing in the McCarty community, was found in a dying condition in the rear of a local hardware store at 11:15 A. M. Saturday. Shortly before he was found three shots were heard; one of the bullets from the .3220 pistol found by his side pierced his right temple and passed through his brain. Chief of Police A. L. Boyd was the first to reach him.

The hardware store manager stated that Mr. Mullins entered the store asked about the shot guns and pistols seemingly wanting to buy one. He selected the pistol, which later ended his life, carrying it to the rear of the store to see how the cartridges would fit. It was only a few seconds before the three shots were fired.

Relatives of Mr. Mullins said that he had been despondent the last few weeks over financial difficulties.

He came to this county in 1929 from Merkel and had since that time been residing on his farm seven miles east of Lamesa.

He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Leona, and one son, Lane.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at the Higginbotham Funeral home, and burial was made in the local cemetery.

## Cotton Acreage Reduction Contracts Received here by C. A.

The cotton acreage reduction contracts for 1934 and 1935 have been received by county agent Joe Williams and signing up will begin on January 1, he stated.

In a statement issued this past week by Chester C. Davis, farm adjustment administrator, he said approximately \$125,000,000 would be paid to planters next year under the adjustment program in the form of land rentals and a parity payment of not less than one cent a pound on farm allotments.

The rate of rental payment for each acre rented to the secretary of agriculture will be 3 1-2 cents per pound on the average yield of lint cotton in acre for the farm in the years 1923-32 inclusive, with a maximum rental of \$18 per acre. The rent will be paid in equal installments, the first to be paid between March 1 and April 30, 1934, and the second between August 1 and September 30, 1934. The parity payment of not less than one cent a pound on the "farm allotment" will be made between December 1, 1934 and January 1, 1935. The "farm allotment" is defined in the contract as "forty per cent of that figure expressed in pounds which results from multiplying the annual average number of acres planted in cotton on this farm during the years 1928-32 inclusive, by the average yield (expressed in pounds) per acre during the said years."

Cotton farmers are urged to compile in advance the information necessary in filling out a contract, these are as follows: 1. Number of bales of cotton produced on farm for each year of base period, 1928-32 inclusive. 2. Average weight of lint per bale for each year of the base period. 3. Total lint produced in each period. 4. Acreage planted to cotton in each base period year. 5. Number of lbs. of lint per acre produced in each base period year.

In addition to the above information as the basis for determining the acreage planted to cotton during the base period, the farm allotment and contract, producers will be asked to the amount of payments under the give their cotton production for 1933 and crop acreage for 1932 and 1933.

**Cotton Growers Should Not Lose Parity Payment**

College Station—Cotton growers should not let their interest in the cash land rentals offered by the Government on land retired in 1934 from cotton production blind them to the importance of the cash parity payment of one cent per pound on 40 per cent of the average five-year production, it was pointed out by C. H. Alvord of the Cotton Section Agricultural Adjustment Administration, during a recent visit to Extension Service headquarters at A. and M. College.

The coming campaign will definitely establish each farm's domestic allotment of cotton which will be 40 per cent of the average five-year production for the years 1928-32. In

1934 contract signers will receive \$5 a bale on their domestic allotment but it may be more than this in 1935, and the land rentals may be smaller that year, depending on how much acreage reduction is required to keep up cotton prices, Mr. Alvord said. The tenant shares in this parity payment according to his usual share agreement.

Speaking of the division of the land rental payments Mr. Alvord said that a landlord who has a written or verbal contract for 1934 with a managing share tenant must either agree to a 50-50 division of the Government rentals as stipulated in the contract, or satisfy the tenant by private agreement if he wishes to cooperate in the plan. Contract rights must be respected, and if a landlord has already rented the land to a managing share tenant he cannot reasonably expect to re-rent the land to the Government without special agreement with the tenant.

What is commonly known in Texas as a "third and fourth" tenant may qualify as a managing share tenant if he operates the entire farm with out landlord supervision, Mr. Alvord explained. Such a tenant may sign a cotton contract for presentation to his local cotton committee if the landlord will sign with him.

In every case the landowner must sign the cotton contract except where a cash tenant has a contract with landlord for both 1934 and 1935. This is based on a recognition of the property rights, Mr. Alvord declares, and also on the necessity of some guarantee that the terms of the contract will be fulfilled throughout the two year period.

Cotton contracts have been sent county agents and as soon as handbooks of instruction are received from Washington and distributed to the agents the information campaign in Texas will begin, O. B. Martin, Extension Director, has announced.

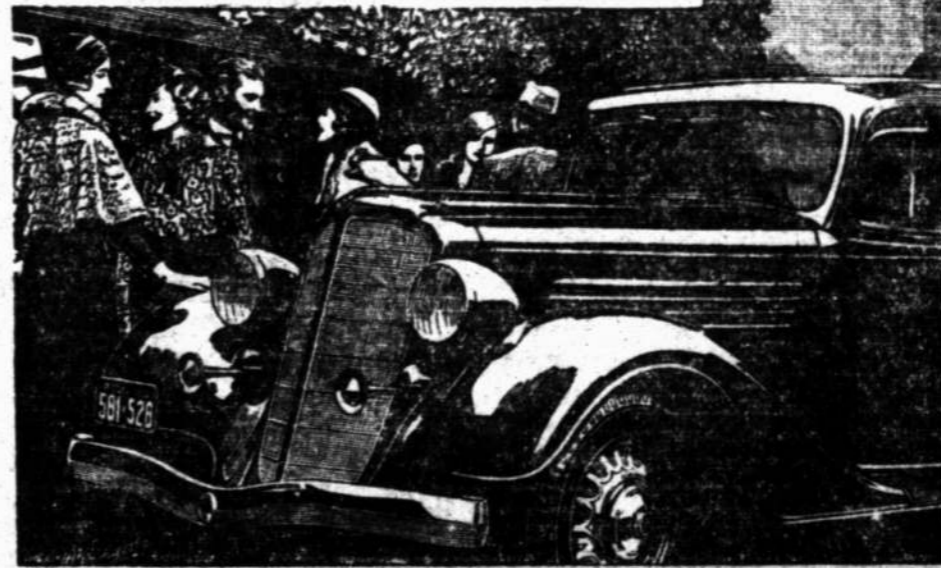
